4 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Good evening,  
5 welcome to the Board of Police Commissioners  
6 monthly community evening. I am Lisa Carter,  
7 police commissioner for District 6, Chairperson  
8 for the Board of Police Commissioners.

9 On behalf of the Board of Police  
10 Commissioners I'd like to thank you all for  
11 attending this evening's meeting.

12 I'd like to thank the principal of the  
13 Cody Academy of Public Leadership and the school  
14 principal Mr. Matthews and, Mr. Matthews, at this  
15 time if you would like to step up to the podium  
16 and welcome -- any remarks that you'd like to  
17 say.

18 MR. MATTHEWS: On behalf of the  
19 students, the staff and the community of Cody  
20 Rouge we welcome you to the Cody campus.

21 For anyone that doesn't know the  
22 background of Cody and where it stands today, I'm  
23 Jonathan Matthews, principal of Cody Academy of  
24 Public Leadership. This is my 10th year on this  
25 campus.

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1           I came into the school as the principal  
2           of all of Cody and we broke it up into three  
3           small schools that you see today. On this campus  
4           there is the Academy of Public Leadership which I  
5           am principal of, Medicine and Community Health,  
6           Principal Parker is the principal of that  
7           particular school, and Detroit Institute of  
8           Technology run by Principal King.

9           There's approximately 800 students on  
10          this campus. We are one of the largest  
11          comprehensive high schools -- the largest one on  
12          then west side of Detroit.

13          We've been able to make major shifts in  
14          the culture. I can tell you this. It's an honor  
15          to have -- to host this at this date because when  
16          I first came here I remember the summer of the  
17          first year I came seven young people were shot  
18          broad daylight on Warren and Southfield, and to  
19          get to a point now where we're hosting an event  
20          like this in that very same community and knowing  
21          that we've been achievements to make it safer and  
22          better for young people, it's a proud moment.

23          So on behalf of law enforcement I  
24          really do thank you guys for being there for us  
25          over these years and as our -- I feel like we're

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1 brothers in this battle, and we've been able to  
2 make a lot of progress in this community and we  
3 once again just thank all of you to putting forth  
4 the effort to help us education young people.

5 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you,  
6 Mr. Matthews and thank you for your leadership  
7 here at Cody Academy. I know a few students who  
8 speak very highly of you and really appreciate  
9 all the love and support that you give them, so  
10 thank you very much.

11 MR. MATTHEWS: Hank you again, thank  
12 you.

13 COMMISSIONER CARTER: At this time I'm  
14 going to ask Commissioner Vann please do the  
15 invocation.

16 COMMISSIONER VANN: May we play?  
17 (INVOCATION WAS GIVEN).

18 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you,  
19 Commissioner Vann. At this time I'm going to ask  
20 each commissioner to introduce themselves  
21 beginning to my far left.

22 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Richard Shelby,  
23 Commissioner, District 1.

24 COMMISSIONER VANN: Edgar Vann,  
25 Commissioner, District 2.

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1                   COMMISSIONER BELL: Willie Bell,  
2           District 4.

3                   COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Elizabeth Brooks,  
4           appointed and I'm also a member of the Cody  
5           Academy of Public Leadership. I sit on their  
6           Advisory Board.

7                   COMMISSIONER SANDERS: Derrick Sanders.

8                   COMMISSIONER CARTER: And I see  
9           Commissioner Burton at the back of the room, he  
10          will be up shortly. Thank you for joining us,  
11          sir.

12                   At this time, Commissioners, you have  
13          before you the agenda for November 9, 2017.

14                   COMMISSIONER SANDERS: So moved,  
15          Madam Chair.

16                   COMMISSIONER VANN: Second.

17                   COMMISSIONER CARTER: It's been moved  
18          and supported that we approve the agenda for  
19          November 9, 2017.

20                   Is there any discussion? Those in  
21          favor?

22                   COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

23                   COMMISSIONER CARTER: Those opposed?  
24          Motion carries. At this time, Commissioners, you  
25          have before you the minutes from October 26,

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1 2017. Is there a motion to approve --

2 COMMISSIONER VANN: I so move,  
3 Madam Chair.

4 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Support?

5 COMMISSIONER BELL: Support.

6 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Is there any  
7 discussion? Those in favor?

8 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

9 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Those opposed?  
10 .The motion carries. At this time we'll have  
11 introductions by Mr. Hicks of the staff of the  
12 Board of Police Commissioners.

13 SECRETARY HICKS: Thank you, Madam  
14 Chair and for the record you do have a quorum  
15 with eight members present.

16 Before getting to our staff I do want  
17 to indicate a couple of housekeeping kind of  
18 things. First of all, taking tonight's meeting  
19 is Sgt. Quinn. Media Services is providing and  
20 audio-visual assistance for this evening's  
21 meeting and Dale Rose is the court reporter.

22 And then I would start at the front  
23 row, we have Ms. Johnson who is our Fiscal, Ms.  
24 White who is with our Policy and Ms. Blossom  
25 behind Ms. White who does our media outreach and

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1 then we can go to Acting Chief Lawrence Akbar who  
2 wil introduce himself and his staff.

3 ACTING CHIEF INV. AKBAR: Good evening,  
4 Honorable Board. It's my pleasure to introduce  
5 to you my staff. We have today present Acting  
6 Supervising Investigator Lisonya Sloan, Sr.  
7 Investigator Roslia Madregal, Investigator  
8 Coleman, Investigator Markita Stantan and  
9 Investigator Giana Coulter and that's all I have  
10 for today.

11 (COMMISSIONER MALLET ARRIVES.)

12 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you. At  
13 this time I'd like to introduce Deputy Chief  
14 Fitzgerald. I couldn't see you, I'm sorry,  
15 standing in for the Chief, Chief Craig.

16 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: Yes, ma'am and  
17 the Chief sends his regards, he's a little under  
18 the weather.

19 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Would you like to  
20 introduce any staff you have here.

21 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: I sure would  
22 but I tell you what I'm going to do. I'm going  
23 to have them stand up because some are tucked in  
24 the back and I don't see most of them, so why  
25 don't we start right on the front here with Comm.



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1 Steward, please.

2 (DPD PERSONNEL WERE INTRODUCED).

3 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: And that's  
4 it. I'm sure the Commander will introduce her  
5 NPOs when she comes up.

6 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you very  
7 much. At this time I'd like to recognize  
8 Commissioner Mallett who stepped in about five  
9 minutes ago.

10 COMMISSIONER MALLETT: And I want you  
11 to know, Madam Chairperson, I came in with a  
12 number of Detroit police officers and, like me,  
13 they couldn't find the door so I got witnesses.

14 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you.  
15 Commissioner Burton, would you like to say  
16 something?

17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You know, I just  
18 wanted to say thank you to the citizens of  
19 Detroit for four more years and I look forward to  
20 working with all of the community.

21 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you,  
22 Commissioner Burton. At this time we're going to  
23 move on to my report.

24 This is the 11th community meeting of  
25 the year, our 11th community meeting of the year.

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1           Scheduling these meetings, we hope to meet every  
2           section of the city. If you would like for us to  
3           meet in your community, please contact us and let  
4           us know. I also want to remind everyone the  
5           Board will not meet Thursday, November 23 for  
6           Thanksgiving recess.

7                        On behalf of the Board, we continue to  
8           express our support and concerns for fallen  
9           officers and their families. The Chief's Office  
10          may want to add some specific information about  
11          the recent conditions of some of the injured  
12          officers, but I would also like to ask for a  
13          moment of silent reflection for Mr. James Haller  
14          Jr, manager of the for O'Reilly's Auto Parts  
15          store and for the 25 church victims in  
16          Southerland Springs, Texas and for all other  
17          victims of recent tragedies and senseless  
18          violence.

19                       (MOMENT OF SILENCE.)

20                      COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you. I  
21          would also like to congratulate all of the civic  
22          and community organizations, individuals and  
23          groups who participated in our democratic process  
24          in the recent election.

25                      As you know, beginning in January our

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1 Board will have several new members. After the  
2 Elections Commission certifies the results of the  
3 election I will reach out and welcome our new  
4 members.

5 I would also invite them to attend an  
6 orientation workshop to review the  
7 responsibilities of the Board. Tonight we will  
8 also have a presentation from the 6th Precinct,  
9 Commander Tiffany Stewart and Capt. Kenneth  
10 Leminski will address the Board.

11 We will also formally vote on two DPD  
12 retirees from our November 2 agenda, Det. Scott  
13 Shea and Inv. Charles Weaver.

14 Toward the end of the meeting we will  
15 have oral communication from the audience, so if  
16 you would like to speak to the Commission please  
17 make sure you print your name on the speaker's  
18 card. The cards are located on the back table .

19 We have a resolution for Mr. Arthur  
20 Leon Edge, former City of Detroit employee and  
21 president of Far West Detroit Civic Association.

22 And at this time I'm going to ask that  
23 Commissioner Bell is going to read the resolution  
24 for Mr. Arthus Edge and I know he's here.

25 COMMISSIONER BELL: This is a

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1 resolution honoring retired Mr. Arthur Leon Edge  
2 and I didn't know you was retiring. Well, that's  
3 what it says her, but --

4 WHEREAS, Mr. Arthur Leon Edge was born  
5 on August 5, 1956 in Detroit, Michigan to Arthur  
6 Lee and Lucille Marie Edge. He is a proud  
7 graduate of Mumford High School class of 1974.  
8 Mr. Edge has three children, Arthur Edge, III,  
9 Eric Harris and Alexis D. Edge and two  
10 grandchildren, Ariana Richards-Harris and  
11 Anderson J. Harris and

12 WHEREAS, Mr. Edge has been employed by  
13 the City of Detroit Building and Safety  
14 Engineering and Environmental Department for 23  
15 years as a building inspector supervisor. He was  
16 previously a manager of Tektron Industries, Ltd,  
17 family-owned stamping stamp that supplies General  
18 Motors and Chrysler automobile parts and

19 WHEREAS, Mr. Edge is president of the  
20 Far West Detroit Civic Association, the  
21 Vice-President of Friends of River Rouge Park,  
22 president of the Civic Optimist Club of Detroit,  
23 board member of Revive Detroit CDC and  
24 Neighborhood Partners and

25 WHEREAS, Mr. Edge is a strong executive

1 board member with the Detroit 300 Community  
2 Action. He has assisted with the North End Youth  
3 Improvement Council outreach program. He has  
4 unselfishly volunteered his time and energy to  
5 assist in numerous Detroit Police 6th Precinct  
6 events and has received various leadership and  
7 community participation awards and

8 WHEREAS, his strong code of ethics  
9 reflect the type of citizen every resident of  
10 this community would covet as a next-door  
11 neighbor. Residents of this community consider  
12 him to be a stand-up citizen, always vigilant  
13 against lawlessness. His memo is "Look out for  
14 your fellow man and treat people like you would  
15 want to be treated".

16 NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the  
17 Detroit Board of Police Commissioners speaking  
18 for the citizens of the city of Detroit and the  
19 Detroit Police Department acknowledge the  
20 dedicated hard working, committed support of  
21 Mr. Arthur Leon Edge his dedicated public service  
22 and devotion on behalf of the board which  
23 advocates accountability through civilian  
24 oversight, signed by all the Commissioners, most  
25 prominent is the Chair of the Board, it's my

1 pleasure to present this resolution to you and  
2 you say you're not retiring.

3 MR. EDGE: No, I'm not.

4 COMMISSIONER BELL: I didn't think, so  
5 you are a active, engaging not just on this side  
6 of town, he all over in the city of Detroit, so  
7 what an honor, what a pleasure, that on behalf of  
8 the Board that you are recognized on this evening  
9 for this type of resolution.

10 Thank you.

11 (APPLAUSE).

12 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: We actually  
13 have two awards for him, but I only have one  
14 currently with me, the City Council Spirit of  
15 Service Award was not printed by the time I came  
16 here, but for outstanding service in the  
17 community, certificate of recognition to  
18 Mr. Arthur Leon Edge signed by Chief Craig and we  
19 do appreciate everything you do in our community.

20 MR. EDGE: Thank you.

21 (APPLAUSE).

22 MR. EDGE: Good evening, everyone.

23 Thank you. I'm a man of few words, but I want to  
24 thank everybody. This is what it's about.

25 Everybody coming together, a community, DPD, the

1 residents, looking out for the children of our  
2 great city because they are our future.

3 So if we don't look out for them, we  
4 have no future. And I want to give these awards  
5 to my wife.

6 (APPLAUSE.)

7 MR. EDGE: Because with all the things  
8 that I do, she keeps me on schedule. If I double  
9 book, that's my head so she makes sure that  
10 everything that I do, that it's organized and in  
11 place and I would just to, again, want to thank  
12 the Commission, the citizens, DPD, and my  
13 friends, NPOs back there, thank you everybody.

14 (APPLAUSE.)

15 MR. EDGE: Detroit 300, we're her for  
16 you, we're here to make a difference.

17 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you,  
18 Mr. Edge for all that you do do and of course  
19 everybody knows that behind every good man is a  
20 good woman, so thank you Mrs. Edge for allowing  
21 Mr. Edge to do what he does.

22 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: Madam Chair, I'd  
23 like to make a motion to approve Mr. Arthur  
24 Edge's resolution.

25 COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Second.

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1                   COMMISSIONER CARTER: It's been moved  
2                   and seconded that we accept the resolution --  
3                   approve the resolution for Mr. Arthur Edge.

4                   Is there any discussion? Those in  
5                   favor?

6                   COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

7                   COMMISSIONER CARTER: Motion carries.

8                   COMMISSIONER SANDERS: I wanted to say  
9                   something about Mr. Edge. I met him about maybe  
10                  I think 13 years ago and my son has just gotten  
11                  into the operating engineers and the first  
12                  company that he went to work for was a company  
13                  that he helped get him there in the operating  
14                  engineers and he really stood up because I was  
15                  having problems of my son as a teenager, you  
16                  know, those kids, but he was very patient and we  
17                  got through it and I really appreciate him.

18                  COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you.

19                  (APPLAUSE.)

20                  COMMISSIONER CARTER: At this time,  
21                  Deputy Chief Fitzgerald, I'm going to turn the  
22                  mic over to you for your report and following  
23                  that we'll have the presentation from the 6th  
24                  Precinct.

25                  DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: Yes, ma'am,



1 and I'll keep my remarks short. I just want to  
2 continue to kind of beat the drum for our men and  
3 women of the Detroit Police Department because  
4 they're working very very hard to get rid of a  
5 lot of this crime we see.

6 And I know one homicide is way too  
7 many, but as of this morning we were down 28  
8 homicides over the same time ast year which was,  
9 once again, a decrease over the year before.

10 So as it right now, as of this morning  
11 we're sitting at 238 homicides, way too many I  
12 know, but last year we were sitting at 266,  
13 that's an 11 percent decrease.

14 Our non-fatal shootings are down as of  
15 this morning 102 over last year. We're at 731  
16 non-fatal shootings as of this morning, we were  
17 at 833 last year which is a 12 percent decrease.

18 Two of the continuing trends that keep  
19 going down and that Green Light helps, it really  
20 really does, is our robbery and carjacking  
21 categories.

22 Our carjackings this year are down 37  
23 over the same time last year, we're sitting at  
24 262 as of this morning, which again is a 12  
25 percent decrease, and I really don't want to

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1 steal their thunder, but the 6th Precinct is down  
2 30 percent in homicides -- and 25 non-fatal  
3 shootings, so the team that is assembled here in  
4 the 6th Precinct is really really getting it  
5 done.

6 So that's about all I have. Response  
7 time yesterday was 11 minutes which is below the  
8 average that we set as our standard. Typically  
9 we're right around 13 or 14 minutes, and that's  
10 from the time the call comes in until the time it  
11 gets dispatched to someone, so that is a good  
12 number in our estimation, and other than that I  
13 think No. 6 will be ready to do their  
14 presentation. Commander.

15 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Before we do  
16 that, Commissioners, do you have any questions  
17 for Deputy Chief Fitzgerald? No. All right  
18 thank you.

19 COMMISSIONER VANN: Madam Chair, very  
20 happy to hear those statistics. I wanted to ask  
21 about, you know, we've been reminded here every  
22 week and the Chief's Office is reminding us of  
23 the Officer Johnson who was very critically  
24 wounded and his status through these months has  
25 been pretty projected and has not made great

1 improvement.

2 I was just wondering what kind -- and  
3 I've been seeing on the news where they've been  
4 having spaghetti dinners for him, bowling things  
5 for him to try to raise some money for him.

6 I'm just wondering what provisions does  
7 the department make for officers who are injured  
8 in that way?

9 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: I'm going to  
10 have Comm. Mounsey come up because it is his  
11 commanding officer and he can give you -- he's  
12 been involved in every step of the way, so I  
13 think he'll be able to help you answer that.

14 (COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE ARRIVES).

15 COM M. MOUNSEY: Good evening, Board.  
16 My name is Brian Mounsey, I'm the Commander of  
17 the 2nd Precinct, where Officer Wallace Johnson  
18 is assigned.

19 This incident did happen on April 30,  
20 it's been just over six months. He remains in  
21 stable condition. However, he's been determined  
22 to be in a permanent vegetative state. Basically  
23 where he's at now, it doesn't appear as though he  
24 has much, if any, awareness as to what is going  
25 on around him.

1           The family has decided at this time  
2           that they would like to continue to see if he  
3           will improve despite the fact that there's been  
4           two medical professional opinions that say that  
5           basically what you see is what you get and that's  
6           basically what's been about the same for the past  
7           three months at least.

8           He is being cared for by Specialty  
9           Rehabilitation Center. To my knowledge this  
10          police department is paying all of his medical  
11          bills. I don't believe there's any issue with  
12          finances with that. He is being carried in a  
13          disabled status s which means that he still  
14          receives a paycheck which is turned over to his  
15          legal guardian.

16          Without going into a whole lot of  
17          detail, there has been a court-appointed guardian  
18          that's been set up for him and a trust fund.  
19          Some of these fund-raisers that you're hearing  
20          about, Commissioner Vann, are not sponsored  
21          through the Detroit Police Department.

22          Not to say that we don't want to show  
23          support, but the one recently with the bowling  
24          was actually put on by his daughter's soccer  
25          team, so exactly what they're doing with those

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1 funds we're not getting involved in.

2 But any funds that are raised for him  
3 through the department or any donations that come  
4 in are being directly sent to his legal guardian  
5 and but into that trust fund, so --

6 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you, sir.  
7 Any other questions?

8 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Through the  
9 Chair, could you inform the Board the next time  
10 you have a fund-raiser so that we may participate  
11 also?

12 COMM. MOUNSEY: I certainly will, sir.

13 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you. I'd  
14 like to at this time acknowledge the Vice-Chair  
15 Commissioner Eva Dewaelsche who came in about  
16 five minutes ago.

17 COMMISSIONER DEWAEELSCHÉ: I apologize  
18 for my lateness.

19 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Glad you're here.  
20 At this time 6th Precinct, Comm. Stewart.

21 COMM. STEWART: Hello, everybody. My  
22 name is Tiffany Stewart and I'm the Commander of  
23 the 6th Precinct located at 11450 Warwick Street  
24 which is the northwest side of the city. I would  
25 like to welcome everyone here tonight,

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1 Commissioners and the community as well as thank  
2 Cody Leadership Academy for hosting tonight's  
3 meeting.

4 I would also like to thank former  
5 Commissioner Ricardo Moore and Tijuana Mexican  
6 Kitchen for providing the food for tonight.

7 I'm going to introduce my fellow  
8 officers at the precinct. Capt. Kenneth  
9 Balinski, please stand and our wonderful and  
10 dedicated neighborhood police officing staff,  
11 Sgt. Elaine Williams, Neighborhood Police Officer  
12 Michael Gordon, Neighborhood Police Officer Cary  
13 Livingston, Victoria Etching, Heather Ivy and  
14 Charles Staples. There's a couple of them I see  
15 outside in the hallway.

16 (APPLAUSE).

17 COMM. STEWART: They are indeed the  
18 best and we cannot do what we do without them, we  
19 love them to death. Now, on the crime stats,  
20 it's been a good year for 6th Precinct and we're  
21 hoping to end the year just as strongly. We've  
22 trended down the ast few months in violent  
23 offenses and property offenses.

24 We're currently down 8 percent in total  
25 Part 1 crime from this time last year. That's

1 includes a 2 percent reduction in violent crime  
2 and a 10 percent reduction in property crime.

3 We have continuously had reductions  
4 with the precinct for homicide, robbery and  
5 on-fatal shootings and, as DC Fitzgerald told you  
6 earlier, we're down 30 percent in homicides from  
7 this time last year, 22 percent of robberies and  
8 25 percent in non-fatal shootings.

9 With those great numbers we also have  
10 a 26 percent increase in criminal sexual conduct  
11 and a 3 percent increase in aggravated assaults  
12 and the vast majority of those reports in both of  
13 those crime categories, the suspects are actually  
14 known through the victim through an acquaintance,  
15 a close acquaintance for familial relationship.

16 We have reductions in all of our  
17 property crimes across the board, burglaries at 9  
18 percent, larcenies at 7 percent and motor vehicle  
19 thefts at 16 percent.

20 Some of our significant statistical  
21 information here today, we've arrested over 1,600  
22 adults at the 6th Precinct, we've seized over 140  
23 guns. Year-to-date calls, we've had over 8,500,  
24 over 5,500 of those as Priority 1 and over 3,000  
25 as Priority Other.

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1           In order to continue these downward  
2 trends in our crime categories Capt. Balinski  
3 will tell you about a few of our crime  
4 initiatives and community initiatives that we  
5 employ at the precinct.

6           CAPT. BALINSKI: Good evening. For the  
7 record, Capt. Ken Balinski, 6th Precinct. Some  
8 of our crime strategies we employ Cease Fire  
9 which is an initiative that targets group or  
10 gangs and we've been doing very well on it and  
11 it's a special focus on those groups that usually  
12 cause the violent crime.

13           We are in Gun State, it's a new  
14 program, Gun Stat scores a person that's been  
15 caught with a gun and if they get a score of 11  
16 or more, then we take special attention to it, go  
17 to the court, pled bonds, try to get remand if  
18 it's a shooting or if we have any other issues  
19 that we want to address with the Court to try to  
20 get a higher bond for the person to stay in. So  
21 far, pretty successful.

22           Right now ongoing as we're talking here  
23 we have a restore order going on. We have to do  
24 those weekly where we go and round up individuals  
25 with warrants and take them into custody.



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1 I know as I left I can tell you I know  
2 they did take two guns off the streets already  
3 today, so those work very well.

4 Our NPOs do wraparounds for property  
5 crimes and also our major felonies so that they  
6 can go to the community and see if they can help  
7 out, if the community can help out, is there  
8 anything we can do for the community based on the  
9 crimes that are committed around there.

10 We have an Eyes and Ears Program with  
11 citizens and we have six CB patrols in the 6th  
12 Precinct that patrol and help us out also.

13 We have a domestic violence advocate  
14 that helps us on domestic violence cases to get  
15 PPOs and just recently we received a licensed  
16 social worker that's going to be working at the  
17 precinct to help the citizens with issues they  
18 might have.

19 We have 22 Green Lights that we patrol  
20 on a regular basis. We have partnerships working  
21 with state, federal agencies. Our traffic cars  
22 are still doing school routes and we also have  
23 license plate readers in the precinct. I won't  
24 tell you where they're at, but we also have  
25 dumping cameras in our precinct, so that helps us

1 with a lot of blight and sometimes with hits.

2 I know the other day I heard on the  
3 radio that one of the license plate reader  
4 locations actually read the license plate and  
5 found a stolen car moving in a different  
6 direction and they ended up catching up with that  
7 car.

8 As far at community, for our youth we  
9 have a gun safety program where we teach them K  
10 through 3rd grade to help identify dangers of  
11 weapons.

12 Cookies with a Cop, I was just talking  
13 to the NPOs today and they did have with an 8th  
14 grade group today where they have cookies and  
15 talk with the youngsters at schools.

16 We have a health fair just before  
17 school where we give children school supplies,  
18 sometimes supply them with a haircut and there is  
19 a mobile dentist that comes and give them care  
20 free of charge.

21 We have a youth fair, a youth safety  
22 fair for ages up to 16 years old to teach them  
23 about safety. Career Days for high school  
24 students who do not want to go to college that we  
25 might be able to try to help them find jobs with

1 the high school diploma that they're going to  
2 achieve.

3 And lastly an anti-bullying initiative  
4 that the NPOs work with with the children to  
5 teach them about not only how to identify it, but  
6 not to be one.

7 Senior programs, we have a Senior  
8 Awareness Program which is a crime prevention  
9 program to help them stay safe. We have Blight  
10 Committee that helps deal with the blight within  
11 the precinct. We have Coffee With a Cop where  
12 we invite citizens to come in.

13 I think the last one I was there at  
14 yielded about 20 to 30 citizens that came in and  
15 had coffee and donuts with us.

16 Our National Night Out with a great  
17 success and our last event was Trunk or Treat  
18 which was really a great success also.

19 Lastly we have 55 active organizations  
20 in the community. Base block clubs, our CB  
21 patrols. Neighborhood police officers interact  
22 with them regularly to address neighborhood  
23 issues and that concludes our presentation.

24 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you,  
25 Commander and Captain. Any questions for --

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1                   COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Yes, I have a  
2 question. On your career day do you have a  
3 recruiting table there? Do you have people there  
4 recruiting? That would be a great spot.

5                   CAPT. BALINSKI: I believe they do. I  
6 would have to talk --

7                   (REMARKS FROM THE AUDIENCE.)

8                   COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Thank you.

9                   COMMISSIONER CARTER: And for the  
10 record that was Sgt. William.

11                   Any other questions?

12                   COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, I just  
13 want to say to the Captain and the Commander, I'm  
14 glad you didn't talk too long. Just an inside  
15 remark, I just thought about that.

16                   I just want to say that I'm always  
17 impressed how DPD interacts with the young  
18 people, the children, in terms of middle school,  
19 high school and that's beyond what we was able to  
20 do in the past outside of PAL and Explorer, but  
21 you really reach out throughout this city in  
22 terms of trying to interact with the young people  
23 at an early age and do so much in terms of  
24 bridging that gap.

25                   And I think some of us older adults

1 will appreciate that because we did not have that  
2 experience when we was younger, so I just really  
3 want to commend you for taking that type of  
4 initiative, as you stated if they not moving on  
5 to Wayne State or Oakland or Howard or whatever,  
6 that is you try to assist them where they are in  
7 terms of what they might -- so that's a plus  
8 plus.

9 And I'm glad Commissioner Brooks got  
10 that in about a recruiting table. She wants to  
11 make sure that we have that opportunity. I just  
12 want to thank you for that type of initiative.

13 CAPT. BALINSKI: Thank you.

14 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Any other  
15 questions, Commissioners?

16 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Yeah, through the  
17 Chair, I'd like to congratulate the command staff  
18 and the officers of the 6th Precinct. You guys  
19 are really doing a fantastic job and I thank you  
20 for your efforts.

21 COMMISSIONER CARTER: All right. No  
22 other questions or comments, thank you all.  
23 Thank you for your commitment to the residents of  
24 the 6th Precinct. You guys do an outstanding  
25 job.

1                   At the time are there any standing  
2                   committee reports or ad hoc committee reports?

3                   No?

4                   At this time we'll have the report from  
5                   the Board Secretary.

6                   SECRETARY HICKS: Thank you, Madam  
7                   Chair. On the agenda you have four items listed  
8                   as incoming communications and, again, these are  
9                   listed on the Board's agenda as information  
10                  coming into the Commission.

11                  They're not intended for Board action  
12                  for this evening. You see the list in front of  
13                  you. There's no particular item of greater  
14                  importance than the other, so that would include  
15                  -- unless you have questions about them, that  
16                  would conclude my remarks for the evening.

17                  COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you. At  
18                  this time under old business we have approvals of  
19                  the resolution for retired Det. Scott Shea which  
20                  was read into the record last week. Tonight  
21                  we're voting on it only on the resolution because  
22                  we did not have a quorum last week.

23                  COMMISSIONER DEWAEELSCHÉ: Motion to  
24                  approve.

25                  COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Support.

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1                   COMMISSIONER CARTER: It's been moved  
2                   and supported that we approve the resolution for  
3                   retired Det. Scott Shea. Is there any  
4                   discussion?

5                   Those in favor.

6                   COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

7                   COMMISSIONER CARTER: Those opposed?  
8                   The motion carries. And tonight we also have  
9                   the approval of the resolution for retired Inv.  
10                  Charles Weaver which was also read into the  
11                  record last week when we did not have a quorum.

12                  COMMISSIONER VANN: Motion to approve.

13                  COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Support.

14                  COMMISSIONER CARTER: It's been moved  
15                  and supported that we approve the resolution for  
16                  retired Inv. Charles Weaver. Is there any  
17                  discussion? Those in favor?

18                  COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

19                  COMMISSIONER CARTER: Those opposed?  
20                  The motion carries. Is there any new business,  
21                  any new business. Commissioner Bell?

22                  COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, thank  
23                  you. Not under new business, under the committee  
24                  reporting out. I did not respond so I'm going to  
25                  respond now.

1                   Part of the Ad Hoc Towing Committee  
2                   that we get an opportunity to -- when I say "we",  
3                   the Chair, the Vice-Chair, Commissioner Vann and  
4                   myself and our attorney to the Board and also our  
5                   Board Secretary met recently with the Mayor's  
6                   attorney to address issues dealing with the  
7                   towing issue.

8                   And they reassured us that we would  
9                   have the opportunity to be involved with the  
10                  policy, the procedure as we are mandated by the  
11                  Charter and there would be ongoing to address our  
12                  concerns in terms of what has transpired, but  
13                  right now everything is pretty much held in  
14                  abeyance in terms of the contracts -- or the  
15                  permits that went out.

16                  So we just want to reassure the public  
17                  and the towers that we are engaging, we are  
18                  involved, and we looking forward to another  
19                  meeting to resolve those issues, but they was  
20                  able to entertain all our concerns, so that took  
21                  place just this week and we was pleased that we  
22                  had the opportunity to render our concern and in  
23                  the near future we in fact would be submitting  
24                  those concerns in writing, but the Mayor's  
25                  attorney was receptive to all our concerns in



1 reference to that we have a major role to play in  
2 terms of the towing, not just in terms of hour  
3 desire, but as the charter mandates that we have  
4 a significant role under that process.

5 So we looking forward to greater  
6 interaction to resolve those issues, perhaps even  
7 this year that we should be resolved those  
8 concerns that have been raised in the last two or  
9 three months.

10 And as you well know, investigation is  
11 going forward. We have not involved with that.  
12 I can't enlighten you on that, but that's the  
13 process that the Law Department representing  
14 those issues which they are mandated by the  
15 Corporation Counsel, so that is the thrust in  
16 terms of what has transpired.

17 Other than that, we only get what we  
18 read in the paper, but our role has been clearly  
19 defined and we think we're going to get some  
20 redress there.

21 Thank you, Madam Chair.

22 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: We also took  
23 that opportunity to ask some questions about the  
24 budget process, I mean actually it was the  
25 close-out of some requisitions.

1 I know that at the meeting before we  
2 had talked about how requisitions had been  
3 submitted and were not processed completely and  
4 therefore the amount that was ties to those  
5 requisitions was taken out of our budget for last  
6 year and I know our fiscal people will be happy  
7 to hear that.

8 Dave Masuron who is the attorney that  
9 we met with said he would look into that to see  
10 if maybe we could get some relief on that amount  
11 that we may have lost in our budget last year, so  
12 that was brought up. Thank you, Ma'am Chair.

13 COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Madam  
14 Chairperson, let me just say so that the public  
15 is at least clear on my position. 99.9 percent  
16 of what Commissioner Bell I'm sure was accurate  
17 as it relates to the meeting that he attended.

18 The legal conclusion that there is a  
19 charter-mandated role for the Board of Police  
20 Commissioners as it relates to towing, however,  
21 is not one that I agree with.

22 And while I respect my colleague  
23 tremendously for his energy around all of the  
24 processes affecting the Board of Police  
25 Commissioners and the department, as I read what

1 was produced by the legal counsel for the Board  
2 it was very very clear to me that we don't have a  
3 role mandated by the charter.

4 We might in our policy development  
5 responsibilities, but directly affecting towing  
6 is not something that I see in the charter and I  
7 think it's of significant termination, No. 1.

8 No. 2, as I stated many many times  
9 before and I want to state now, I do not believe  
10 that the Detroit Police Department should have a  
11 role in towing. I believe firmly as the  
12 Department of Purchasing of the City of Detroit  
13 ought to take over that entire process.

14 I believe that removing that  
15 administrative irritant from the department is  
16 appropriate. I don't think that it is necessary  
17 to the job done by the men and women of the  
18 Detroit Police Department and as much as there is  
19 energy to support keeping that as a part of the  
20 department's responsibility from a certain number  
21 of members of the commission, I'm speaking only  
22 for myself, but I'm opposed, so I don't want the  
23 people in the audience to think that the Board is  
24 unanimous in its desire to maintain this point of  
25 potential corruption.

1 I am adamantly opposed, well remain  
2 adamantly opposed and again as I say to you,  
3 Madam Chairperson, as I read the charter it's not  
4 a mandated responsibility for us or for the  
5 department per se.

6 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, I'm  
7 not going to debate, but I just want to clear up,  
8 there's also a city ordinance that was passed by  
9 Council that gives us that role and therefore  
10 that's why we are pursuing this.

11 This is something that this Board did  
12 not take up, it was a process of all parties  
13 involved several years ago and some of you  
14 perhaps are aware of that, so that's the position  
15 that we stand on and I think the majority of the  
16 Board understands those issues, concerns and  
17 that's why we move in that particular area.

18 He can always have a minority opinion  
19 on anything, but it's clear that this board here,  
20 the majority of us, feel as though this is  
21 something that we have to engage in and not just  
22 by the charter, but more importantly the  
23 ordinance that was drafted and the public took  
24 part in that process, a long process.

25 So we understand the role that DPD,

1 they have a clear role. They are the  
2 organization that's involved, but as you well  
3 know, that was issues not with the Board, but  
4 when in the process of criminality dealing with  
5 that issue, so that issue is being pursued now,  
6 by not just in terms of local, but also the  
7 federal involvement.

8 So that's why we want to continue our  
9 role, we cannot just relinquish that until  
10 perhaps that might be resolved, so that's  
11 basically where we stand on that.

12 I respect Commissioner Mallett's  
13 position on that, but that's basically how we are  
14 moving at this particular time; thank you.

15 COMMISSIONER MALLET: The good news,  
16 Madam Chairperson, me and Bell going to have four  
17 years to fight this out.

18 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you. At  
19 this time Commissioners, under announcements our  
20 next meeting will be Thursday, November 16 at 3  
21 PM at the Detroit Public Safety Headquarters.  
22 Located at 1301 3rd Street and our next community  
23 meeting will be Thursday, December 14 at 6:30 PM  
24 in the 2nd Precinct at St. John the Great Baptist  
25 Church located at 16101 Schaefer at Puritan south

1 of McNichols, Six Mile, east of Greenfield.

2 At this time we'll have oral  
3 communications from the audience. Please give  
4 your name and limit your comments to two minutes,  
5 please. if.

6 MR. BROWN: Madam Chair, I currently  
7 have three cards. Our first speaker will be  
8 Bernice Smith followed by Star Carter.

9 MS. SMITH: Good afternoon -- or good  
10 evening rather. Bernice Smith, political  
11 activist. I just want to give kudos to my police  
12 department. This week you've done a marvelous  
13 job and this morning along with the ATF you did a  
14 raid that was really outstanding and it was so  
15 many of you that was involved, so I'm very  
16 pleased and kudos to all the work that you've  
17 done -- matter of fact, all this week and  
18 especially when you captured the two men that  
19 raped and taken the young lady's credit card.  
20 That was a wonderful job, so throw the book at  
21 them as far as I'm concerned.

22 Because anyone a man rape a woman, you  
23 know, I don't have no pity for them.

24 In the meantime when Edge was getting  
25 his kudos and everything we had the president of

1 the 300. He forget to say that he's a member of  
2 the 300 which I'm a part of. I started with --  
3 and his wife, I had no idea she was wife until  
4 tonight, but in the meantime -- because she works  
5 along with is also.

6 So I'm happy that he had the award and  
7 knowing how he worked not only with the 300, he  
8 did a marvelous job because they continue to  
9 still do good work out there in the neighborhood.

10 So, again, I thank the police  
11 department, I'm happy this week for you, I really  
12 am. And one last thing, we have some celebrities  
13 in our midst that was grinning and hugging and  
14 going on Tuesday night on TV.

15 So I don't know whether you guys saw it  
16 or not, but I'm proud of my police commissioners  
17 that was there on the stage with the mayor  
18 hugging and going on, so kudo to you two ladies.

19 That's' all I got to say, think you so  
20 much.

21 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you.

22 MR. BROWN: Ms. Carter followed by  
23 Ms. Marilyn Jordan.

24 MS. CARTER: Good evening,  
25 Commissioners, how are you. I'm Star Ellen

1 Carter. In 2015 I approached you asking for  
2 help.

3 My daughter was abducted by human  
4 traffickers. Detroit did join Homeland Security  
5 and the FBI. Earlier this year at Ashton and  
6 Warren when you shut that human trafficking  
7 operation down, that was the one who had gotten  
8 my daughter, but tonight I come here to tell you  
9 -- I don't know what procedure that the  
10 Commissioners do, but to acknowledge the  
11 following officers because they helped safe my  
12 daughter's life on October 20.

13 And as a result of that incident in  
14 2015 she does have medical issues and she was at  
15 BCA Strong Craft and I as her mother and we've  
16 been on this rough journey, noticed that she was  
17 being overmedicated.

18 I had a court order from Judge  
19 Brackston not only as her birth mother, but as  
20 her guardian. The hospital refused to leave her,  
21 so I went to the 9th Precinct and they told me to  
22 call a squad car, squad care came out.

23 The hospital gave them a hard time and  
24 they sensed something was wrong, so they called  
25 their lieutenant and their lieutenant said, "Get



1 her out of there". She was comatose, she  
2 couldn't sit in a wheelchair and the officers did  
3 not wait, they took her to Detroit Receiving and  
4 I had them take her blood test.

5 Her normal level for Depakote, she was  
6 given Haldol, Valium and Depakote, 2000  
7 milligrams of Depakote. The normal level in 30,  
8 her blood level was 167 near liver failure.

9 So I want to tell you please tell those  
10 officers thank you because my daughter is alive.

11 (APPLAUSE).

12 MS. CARTER: It's Lt. Deluca at the 9th  
13 Precinct. In fact he met my daughter yesterday  
14 and also D. Mahone, Badge No. 4357 and Officer J.  
15 Borkowski, Badge No. 457.

16 Please honor those officers and thank  
17 you.

18 (APPLAUSE.)

19 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, I  
20 just want to say we will look into this, but you  
21 can always draft a letter of appreciation on  
22 behalf of those officers and the department would  
23 appreciate it and we would appreciate it and the  
24 officers would definitely appreciate the  
25 recognized good work and that would be in their

1 file and thereafter, so if you would be so kind  
2 that would really be one way that you can  
3 recognize them is put something in writing.

4 MS. CARTER: Okay, I sure will.

5 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: Ma'am,  
6 through the Chair, I'll actually fast track it.  
7 If you don't mind staying after for two minutes  
8 so I can talk to you and get your number, and  
9 I'll report back to you.

10 Most likely something was done, but  
11 I'll make sure something was done.

12 MS. CARTER: Okay, I appreciate it and  
13 my daughter is alive.

14 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you for  
15 taking the time to come here tonight. We really  
16 appreciate it.

17 MR. BROWN: Ms. Jordan followed by  
18 Ms. Tawanna Rankin.

19 MS. JORDAN: Good anything. I too  
20 could like to commend the Detroit Police  
21 Department for all the good work that it is doing  
22 here in the city.

23 I come as representation for the  
24 Detroit People's Task Force, a non-profit  
25 organization and we have -- we are seeking due

1 diligence for the Detroit Crime Lab.

2 We know that there is going to be some  
3 upcoming information concerning the operations of  
4 the new unit that's supposed to be established,  
5 so we're just trying to get information on is  
6 there any public announcement that will be made?

7 We did hear from Kym Worthy's office  
8 that they will be making a public statement in a  
9 couple of weeks, but we were just concerned about  
10 whether or not the police chief have made --  
11 established a director to head up the crime unit  
12 or is there any information on that?

13 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Dep. Chief  
14 Fitzgerald?

15 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: Through the  
16 Chair, you know, I don't know. I can get some  
17 follow up to the Commission, but that's a chief  
18 officer that is not me. So I will get with  
19 either AC White or the Chief and we'll get that  
20 information for you.

21 MS. JORDAN: Can I get your name and  
22 number afterwards?

23 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: Absolutely.  
24 Keep up the good work.

25 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you, ma'am.

1 MR. BROWN: Ms. Tawanna Rankin and she  
2 will be our last speaker?

3 MS. RANKIN: First of all, let me start  
4 off by saying I would like to thank Commissioner  
5 Burton. I met him at a meeting and we met and we  
6 talked and I appreciate everything that he helped  
7 me with and will continue to help me with.

8 My name is Tawanna Rankin. I'm a  
9 mother of Jada Rankin. She was murdered last  
10 year October 16th by a speeding driver who my  
11 son told him to slow down, he shot out his car  
12 and killed her.

13 I'm the owner and the founder of  
14 Justice for Jada. Justice for Jada is an  
15 organization that I created on justice for my  
16 daughter.

17 My daughter killer is still out there.  
18 On the statistics that you spoke -- I'm sorry, I  
19 didn't get your name, you said homicides was down  
20 to 238. My daughter is a part of that.

21 Justice for Jada is an organization  
22 that I created for mothers and parents like  
23 myself who lost a child to gun violence.

24 What I do is I find and seek out  
25 parents like myself and I console them. I have a

1 group that's called the Justice Group that is  
2 combined with myself. I reach out to them.

3 I give a financial donation to their  
4 child's funeral. I have different events in  
5 honor of my daughter. I had a cupcake drive  
6 where I raised \$4,500.

7 I have a Ride For Justice where I  
8 raised \$6,500. On this CrimeStoppers, it's  
9 \$13,500, I raised out of this myself. I feed the  
10 homeless, I clothe the homeless in honor of Jada.

11 When my daughter died her homicide  
12 detective came to my house, he sat at my table to  
13 question my son to what he saw. I have not seen  
14 him one time, it's been over a year.

15 And I know you're saying one minute  
16 and I apologize. So with that being said, I'm  
17 just here to inform the City, she was murdered in  
18 the 2nd Precinct and just to let you know that if  
19 you hear Justice for Jada, if you know about  
20 Justice for Jada, that's what I live and die for.

21 Her life was taken unexpectedly. My  
22 daughter was a 4.1 student. She went to high  
23 school and college.

24 I went from planning a Sweet 16 party  
25 to a funeral. I'm went from putting out an

1 invitation to an obituary.

2 So I just want to extend the invitation  
3 to anyone who would like to support or join the  
4 Justice for Jada Foundation. Thank you very  
5 much.

6 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you, ma'am,  
7 and certainly our hearts and prayers are with you  
8 and your family during this time.

9 Please give us the information about  
10 your organization. You can send the Secretary  
11 the information so we will know about events that  
12 come up with your organization.

13 LT. GARDNER: Lt. Gardner from  
14 Homicide. We will speak directly with her to  
15 make sure that all of the information is garnered  
16 and taken care of.

17 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you, we  
18 appreciate that, lieutenant.

19 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Madam Chair,  
20 that's exactly what I was about to ask, can we  
21 have someone from the department to speak with  
22 her and I'm glad that Lt. Gardner is going to  
23 speak with her because we have a lot of families  
24 in the city of Detroit that are in pain and we  
25 need to be able to work with those families and

1 also a follow-up on different leads.

2 We got people out here preying on our  
3 children, preying on those out in the community,  
4 so I mean, you know.

5 I'd like to also note that where we are  
6 right now as far as with stats in relation to  
7 this nature?

8 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: Briefly, I  
9 stated that earlier, the homicide number, we're  
10 down 28 homicides over the same time last year  
11 which is a 11 percent decrease and as of this  
12 morning the closure rate for homicides is sitting  
13 at 58 percent.

14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you, Chief.

15 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair,  
16 perhaps Lt. Gardner would come forward because  
17 there is an established organization mother's who  
18 have come together several years go. Mrs. Clark  
19 I think is the president and have you interact  
20 with them and I know they interact with the  
21 Chief's staff and with Homicide closely in  
22 reference to coming together, have you interact  
23 with them, ma'am.

24 (COMMENTS FROM AUDIENCE).

25 COMMISSIONER BELL: You are aware,

1 thank you.

2 COMMISSIONER VANN: I would just like  
3 To add this is really what I do every day and  
4 I deal with families every day who've been in  
5 grief and bereavement and what we discount often  
6 times because we're human beings and we move on.

7 You know, we tell people, you know,  
8 I'll be praying for you or whatever we say to  
9 them and we kind of go on with our lives.

10 What has happened over the years here  
11 in our city and in other cities is that there is  
12 always a constant backlog of families who have  
13 been in grief, who are broken, who are in pain,  
14 and that has a tremendous effect upon families at  
15 large, communities at large, schools where  
16 children have been lost, workplaces where people  
17 have been tragically lost and here's a human  
18 toll, what's what I'm trying to say, and I'm  
19 aware of that toll. I think that all the time.

20 And I'm hoping that, you know, the  
21 young lady who has come before us tonight and so  
22 so many others, you know, we've tried to have a  
23 couple of city-wide support organizations and I'm  
24 glad to hear about this one tonight.

25 But we really need to keep that on the



1 front burner and not the back burner because it  
2 has a great effect on children who grow up to be  
3 adults who sometimes end up in trouble, etc, etc.

4 The nexus of connectivity to a lot of  
5 other kinds of dysfunction is very very deep, so  
6 I would want us not to take this lightly, but to  
7 understand tha it's a very very deep problem.

8 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you,  
9 Commissioner Vann. It is a very deep problem and  
10 I take its seriously and would like to be more  
11 instrumental in bringing people together and I'm  
12 going to vow to do that during tragedies. And I  
13 myself and my family experienced one almost a  
14 year ago, so.

15 Thank you. At this time is there a  
16 motion for adjournment?

17 COMMISSIONER BELL: So moved.

18 COMMISSIONER DEWAEELSCHE: Support.

19 COMMISSIONER CARTER: It's been moved  
20 and supported that we adjourn; we are adjourned.  
21 Thank you.


