5	THE CHAIRPERSON: Good evening. Good
6	evening. Once again, I'm your Chairman,
7	Willie Bell. I'm the Chairperson of the Board of
8	Police Commission and also represent District 4.
9	We do not have a quorum at this time, but
10	we're going to start the meeting on time. I'm
11	pretty sure two other commissioners will be joining
12	us. We've got about four absenteeism, excused
13	absent this evening, but my understanding that the
14	pastor's wife is here. Reverend Sharpe is the
15	pastor of this great church that's accommodating us
16	this evening. We appreciate that. Is she going to
17	come forward to for the opening prayer, please,
18	if you don't mind, or deacon or reverend or
19	whosoever from the church that would be. Surely we
20	stand in the need of prayer at the house of the
21	Lord. And any other remarks you may want to make in
22	terms of welcome before or afterwards, whatever's
23	appropriate.
24	OFFICER SHARPE: I'm Officer Sharpe. I

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am the first lady here at St. John the Great Baptist

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1	Church. I thank God for each and every last one of
2	you coming out on tonight. I just want to welcome
3	you in the Lord's house. This is the church where
4	my husband presides as the bishop of this church.
5	Welcome, welcome.
6	And now Minister Franklin will open us up
7	in prayer.
8	THE CHAIRPERSON: Thank you, ma'am.
9	Appreciate the welcome.
10	MINISTER FRANKLIN: Let us bow our heads.
11	Father, we just thank you, Lord God. We just thank
12	everybody had a safe trip here. Lord, we just pray
13	for peace in this building, God. We just ask that
14	we have a wonderful session here. We just ask,
15	Lord, that everybody make it home safe, and we just
16	thank you, we just praise you, and we just bless you
17	right now. In Jesus' name we pray. Amen.
18	THE CHAIRPERSON: Thank you, appreciate
19	it. All right, I've never encountered a first lady
20	being a police officer. That's really a blessing.
21	And I'm familiar with your church, St. John the
22	Greater. My younger brother was funeralized here
23	two or three years ago. Your son played basketball
24	at Warren Mott with my nephew which is called T.J.
25	Bell, Tommy Bell. So it was really a welcome

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1	opportunity under the circumstance. You opened your
2	doors for the family, so I appreciate you coming out
3	tonight. And I didn't know your background. I give
4	you your respect as a police officer and the first
5	lady of the church and a woman of God. Thank you.
6	I'm just going we have Elizabeth
7	Brooks, Commissioner Elizabeth Brooks is excused.
8	Commission Willie Burton is excused. Eva Dewaelshe,
9	Commissioner, is excused, and Conrad Mallett is
10	excused. So I'm going to start the row call to my
11	left.
12	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: I'm Reggie
13	Crawford, Commissioner of the Third District.
14	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Good evening.
15	Ricardo Moore, District 7, Vice Chairman. Thank you
16	for coming out this evening. It's good to see each
17	and every one of you.
18	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Good evening. Lisa
19	Carter, District 6.
20	COMMISSIONER SANDERS: Derrick Sanders,
21	at large.
22	THE CHAIRPERSON: That's a short row
23	call. That's right. Okay. We going to skip on
24	down to asking Mr. Gregory Hicks now, our board
25	secretary, to introduce the staff, please.

Page 7 1 2 SECRETARY HICKS: Thank you, Mr. Chair. I just want to introduce the staff and a couple 3 other items prior to getting to the staff. I want 4 5 to indicate that Sergeant Quinn is doing the recording for us tonight. Media Services is doing 6 the audio recording for us tonight, audio visual 7 recording for us, and Theresa Roberts is the court 8 reporter who will be recording our -- I mean 9 10 transcribing our proceedings for the night. In terms of the Board of Police 11 12 Commission staff, if we look to the front row here, Jonya Underwood, the administrative assistant; 13 Ms. White, who is the executive director for -- I 14 15 mean the executive manager for our policy area. 16 Ms. Johnson, who is the executive manager for our 17 fiscal area; Robert Brown, who is sitting up here at the table, and then Chief Drake who typically 18 19 introduces other individuals who are connected with our staff. And, Ms. Drake, if you can introduce 20 21 your staff. 22 MS. DRAKE: I think the only one here 23 tonight is Supervising Investigator Lawrence Akbar.

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1	I introduced perhaps by his full name now.
2	And to my far left, sitting in for Chief
3	Craig, as the person he don't need an
4	introduction, but he's Assistant Chief Dolunt.
5	CHIEF DOLUNT: Good evening.
6	THE CHAIRPERSON: Thank you for your
7	attendance this evening. Do we have any sorry,
8	why don't you introduce any command or any DPD staff
9	at this time.
10	CHIEF DOLUNT: If you want me to I can.
11	THE CHAIRPERSON: Yes, sir. I wouldn't
12	attempt to.
13	CHIEF DOLUNT: Okay, DC Fitzgerald with
14	the glasses on; Sroka, Captain Sroka; Captain
15	Patterson, Amanda Leach. Who is behind you?
16	Tim Commander Sims. Commander Barron, Commander
17	Mounsey, I should know him. I hope it's good.
18	We have Dearborn PD. You guys want to
19	stand up for me. Dearborn's here.
20	COMMISSIONER MOORE: That's Lieutenant
21	Armstrong and Corporal Marvin Sanders, former DPD.
22	CHIEF DOLUNT: I got Captain Roshon
23	Commander Wilson. Hold on, I'll call you. Tiffany,
24	would you stand up first, please. Thank you. Then
25	Captain Miles, okay. Okay, Commander Mahone. Who



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1	is back there. Captain Muhammad, you all should
2	know him. Commander Kyriacou, Captain Szilagy. Did
3	I miss anybody else? Oh, Commander Bettison, is
4	that it on the command staff? That's it. Oh, gosh,
5	she's a director. She's my boss. Celia Washington.
6	Extraordinaire.
7	THE CHAIRPERSON: I looked at her too. I
8	didn't recognize her also.
9	CHIEF DOLUNT: I'm sorry, so there you
10	go.
11	THE CHAIRPERSON: Thank you for DPD
12	president as always. We appreciate you coming out
13	to this evening's meeting.
14	Do we have any elected officials or
15	anyone representing elected official this evening
16	which you acknowledge? If not, any community
17	activist? I see Detroit Citizen Patrol, Detroit
18	Citizen Police organization, Ms. Vannel Academy.
19	Again, good to see you this evening and your
20	compadres.
21	SPEAKER: Ms. Mackenzie is the president.
22	She's over there.
23	THE CHAIRPERSON: Okay, where she hiding
24	at? Oh, that's right, that's right. Good to see
25	you, President Barton McFarland.



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1	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Tom Wilson.
2	THE CHAIRPERSON: Theo Broughton.
3	MR. SANDERS: Terry Sanders, President of
4	Neighborhood Association, and Ms. Theo Broughton,
5	she's my vice president.
6	THE CHAIRPERSON: I thought she might be
7	your president.
8	MR. SANDERS: No, I'm learning. I'm in
9	training.
10	THE CHAIRPERSON: Good. Any others?
11	SPEAKER: Yes, I would like to have you
12	ask the precinct delegates to stand. They are
13	elected officials, first level for all of our
14	elected officials.
15	THE CHAIRPERSON: I ask any precinct
16	delegates. Introduce yourself, please.
17	MR. WILSON: Tom Wilson.
18	THE CHAIRPERSON: Tom Wilson, okay.
19	SPEAKER: Theo Broughton, Precinct
20	Delegate.
21	MS. SMITH: I'm Bernice Smith.
22	THE CHAIRPERSON: You a precinct delegate
23	too. I am too.
24	MS. SMITH: Mid town, 15 years.
25	THE CHAIRPERSON: Let the record speak



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1	for itself. Any others that we missed? If not, I
2	thank all of you for coming out on this warm, warm
3	evening here on Puritan and Schaefer which is
4	I've worked started my second career as a
5	sergeant over here back in the day in Second
6	Precinct when it was an old building. I was there
7	when they moved the new building, so I spent like
8	six years working the Second Precinct, so this is
9	one of the area Second Precinct, yes. The
10	boundaries might have changed somewhat back, been a
11	while.
12	COMMISSIONER MOORE: West side of
13	Detroit.
14	THE CHAIRPERSON: That was my that's
15	how I got familiar with the west side, east side
16	going to the west side. I said, wow, they do have
17	people over here.
18	SPEAKER: Got some good people over here.
19	THE CHAIRPERSON: Yes, I'm glad you
20	clarified that.
21	We do not have a quorum at this time. So
22	what I'd like to do is we can follow the script and
23	have AC Dolunt report out at this time.
24	CHIEF DOLUNT: Okay, good evening. So I
25	want to start with last night. We had a fatal



accident involving our officers, and they were going to assist officers from Highland Park who were calling for assistance. I was out there late last night, early this morning. They were exiting the Davison Freeway. They had a green light and lights and siren. Went through the intersection. A cyclist, bicyclist was going through the same time, had headphones on and apparently didn't see them coming. He was fatally injured.

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The last thing I have is we have yet to identify him, which bothers me because there's a family out there that's missing a son right now. At the same time I have two officers that a tragic accident and are trying to deal with that. So I would ask for the prayers for the deceased as well as the officers to get through this. We've had a rough couple months, and everything like this really takes its toll.

Also on yesterday, in the murder of Officer Rose, they let the individual go. And I give credit to both the Wayne County Prosecutor and to our Homicide Section who said early today, "Some people questioned why would we do that." Because we had the wrong person. At least we think we do.

When we arrested him, we had probable cause to

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

Page 13 believe he was the individual who did it. However, like a good investigation, questions arose, and we delved into it a little further, and there was some discrepancies. And rather than err on the side to make us feel good, we erred -- I don't know if we erred. We let the individual go pending further investigation. I think that says a lot about the transparency of the department. We didn't rush to judgment. We took our time. It says a lot about the leadership of our command staff to make a decision that probably wasn't very popular with the officers. Commander Wilson down to Captain Miles to the lieutenants and the sergeants, I'm sure there was some heated discussions about who did it and who didn't. But in the end I think we got it right, and that's what counts. And I think that's why we've earned the trust of the community because we're not rushing to judgment. So with that said, our Homicide -- the last two years numbers were down. Unfortunately this year, approaching 300. I'm not happy about





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1	pleased with that. Most of our major crime is down.
2	Our homicide is up there a little bit, number 2.
3	Let me get this right. I don't want to screw this
4	up. Our homicides are down, four; is that right,
5	Brian?
6	COMMANDER MOUNSEY: Yes, sir.
7	CHIEF DOLUNT: Our nonfatals are up
8	unfortunately 19%. But some of that happened before
9	Brian got here. It's my understanding that the
10	leadership, according to DC Fitzgerald, has been
11	very good. I'm getting positive response from the
12	officers. Several members of the community had
13	expressed some concern about losing Captain Roshon.
14	But for the most part I believe that with the
15	officers in the community, believing in Mounsey and
16	Muhammad, which says that the chief's decision was
17	correct.
18	With that being said, I think that's the
19	end of my report. Any questions?
20	THE CHAIRPERSON: Commissioners, any
21	questions or comments for the AC?
22	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Chief, the
23	investigation as it relates to Mr. Davis, Wayne
24	State and Detroit Police, who is the lead agency in

that particular case?

Page 15 CHIEF DOLUNT: We are because it's a 1 2 homicide in the city of Detroit. We handle all the homicides. 3 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Okay. And my second 4 5 question deals with the accident that occurred last night. 6 7 CHIEF DOLUNT: Yes. 8 COMMISSIONER MOORE: What led up to the officers going to Highland Park? What was happening 9 10 in Highland Park? 11 CHIEF DOLUNT: It's my understanding that 12 the Highland Park officers were calling for assistance. As you know we dispatched both police 13 and fire to Hamtramck around the same district. Our 14 15 officers responded. Don't care what city you are. 16 If you're blue or whatever, we respond. And they 17 responded to help -- my understanding to help 18 officers that needed assistance. Unfortunately the 19 accident occurred and they didn't make it. And I 20 don't know the disposition of the one in Highland 21 Park quite honestly. 22 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Okay. And just for 23 clarification, there is a difference between an 24 officer in trouble and an officer who needs

assistance?

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1	CHIEF DOLUNT: Yes. And, again, I'm not
2	doing the investigation, so I don't know
3	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Right.
4	CHIEF DOLUNT: if it was an officer in
5	trouble or officer needing assistance. They were of
6	the opinion that Highland Park was calling. They
7	normally don't call for assistance as a rule. They
8	were trying to get to the closest one, and they were
9	taking the expressway. It's not like they were on a
10	side street. They were on the Davison Freeway. So,
11	yes, they were at a high rate of speed, but it
12	appeared to be exigent circumstances.
13	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you.
14	THE CHAIRPERSON: Any other comments or
15	questions for the assistant chief?
16	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, sir, through
17	the chair.
18	Yes, sir, Assistant Chief, what agency is
19	investigating the fatal accident that occurred in
20	Highland Park?
21	CHIEF DOLUNT: Actually it would have
22	been Highland Park. They deferred to us because
23	they do not have the manpower. So I called in the
24	Fatal Squad. The State Police ended up getting
25	there after we did regarding going. I said, "If you

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1	want it, you can have it; we already started the
2	investigation." They said, "It's top side, you guys
3	can have it." We already started it, so we took it.
4	And it's my understanding the investigator's report
5	was submitted to the prosecutor's office this
6	morning.
7	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, sir. With
8	all due respect I was remiss prior to asking that
9	question. I would offer my condolences to the
10	family of the person that was killed.
11	CHIEF DOLUNT: And it's a good question
12	because it came up with the chief today because it
13	was an outside jurisdiction. But, again, we reached
14	out to Chief Logan, who did not have the sufficient
15	manpower to handle the investigation, so we took it.
16	I was out there this morning along with Captain
17	Thornton. And, again, the investigator's report was
18	submitted to the prosecutor's office this morning.
19	So we're just waiting on the denial or whatever they
20	decide to do with it in terms of the warrant.
21	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: I want to, I
22	guess, just state, I want to thank the department
23	for the moving quickly on the release of and also
24	the prosecutor's office in the release of
25	Mr. Deangelo Davis. He's been some 16 days in jail,

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1	in the Wayne County Jail for that's the
2	information that's come out for a crime that he
3	didn't commit.
4	Also, too, it's important to me and also
5	this board, I guess it was several weeks ago,
6	Prosecutor Kym Worthy came to one of our board
7	meetings and more or less laid out a procedure and
8	just information or presentation on one might say
9	such procedures as one might follow in investigating
10	something of that nature, unfortunately, with the
11	death of the Wayne State officer. So the
12	information was timely then, and I'm so glad that
13	the presentation was done weeks ago.
14	And I do want to state, too, that I know
15	I don't I didn't hear any voices of the DPOA as I
16	did before, more or less calling out the prosecutor.
17	I'm certainly glad that that didn't occur this time,
18	which has something that occurred previously
19	involving something different, which was what I call
20	was really minute compared to this issue
21	involving the death of an officer.
22	Thank you, sir.
23	THE CHAIRPERSON: Any other questions or
24	comments from the board?
25	Assistant Chief, thank you for reporting



Page 19 1 out. 2 CHIEF DOLUNT: Thank you, sir. 3 THE CHAIRPERSON: I guess the next item of business would be the Second Precinct, our 4 5 command officers coming before the board. COMMANDER MOUNSEY: Good evening. 6 7 COMMISSIONERS: Good evening. COMMANDER MOUNSEY: My name is Brian 8 Mounsey. I'm the commander here at the Second 9 10 Precinct. Once again, the honorable board, I'd like 11 to welcome you into the Second Precinct community, 12 also the community, members of the Second Precinct, 13 welcome. 14 Captain Muhammad has prepared a 15 presentation for the Second Precinct, but before we 16 get into that, there's two things I'd like to do. 17 Chairman, I'd like to echo your sentiments and expressing our gratitude to Bishop Victor Sharpe as 18 19 well as not only his first lady, but our neighborhood police officer and fantastic 20 21 neighborhood police officer, Yolanda Sharpe for 22 their hospitality in opening their doors to us for this meeting tonight. I thank you very much for 23 that. 24



In addition, some members of my staff are

Page 20 here today. I have in the back Captain Bilal 1 2 Muhammad who will do the presentation today. We 3 also have Sergeant Vanessa Wyatt who is our neighborhood police officer sergeant. I've already 4 5 introduced neighborhood police officer Yolanda Sharpe, and neighborhood police officer Colette 6 7 Burkes Weathers; neighborhood police officer Devon Maples and neighborhood police officer and minister 8 Errol Franklin. With that I'll turn it over to 9 10 Captain Muhammad for his presentation. 11 THE CHAIRPERSON: Thank you, sir. 12 Appreciate it. 13 CAPTAIN MUHAMMAD: Greetings and 14 salutations. 15 THE CHAIRPERSON: Good to see you. 16 CAPTAIN MUHAMMAD: Good to see you. 17 Give you a few stats about the Second Precinct. Second Precinct located at 13530 Lesure 18 19 encompasses ten and one half square miles. The 20 boundaries are as follows. To the north, West 21 McNichols; to the south, west Warren; to the west, 22 Greenfield and the east, Livernois. 23 The Second Precinct borders the city of 24 Dearborn. The Second Precinct has four neighborhood city districts, one, two, six and seven. According 25

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1	to estimated figures for 2013 from the U.S. Census
2	Bureau, the Second Precinct has a total of 58,792
3	citizens. 98% are African-American, and 2% other.
4	Within the Second Precinct there are six schools of
5	various levels. We have no high schools, which
6	include Breithaupt Career and Technical Center.
7	Some of the larger organizations and businesses
8	within the Second Precinct consist of the Adam
9	Butzel Recreational Center, Xfinity, Uncle Ray's
10	Potato Chips and Dave's English Muffin.
11	Currently the Second Precinct has five
12	green light locations, a Citgo Gas Station located
13	at 13601 McNichols; another Citgo Gas Station, 15439
14	Schoolcraft; Valero Gas Station, 15440 Schoolcraft
15	and McDonald's Restaurant, 9815 Grand River, and the
16	Glass Bottle Liquor Store, 9540 Greenfield.
17	SPEAKER: We got two more green lights
18	there.
19	CAPTAIN MUHAMMAD: We have two more green
20	lights, 15401 Joy Road. That's the Benchmark Liquor
21	Store, and we have a McDonald's right in front of
22	the precinct, 13676 Grand River. So we encourage
23	everyone to utilize those facilities so the
24	investment is well spent, and it's a safe spot now.

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The Second Precinct initiative and

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accomplishments: The Second Precinct has seen tremendous reductions in crime in 2016 as compared to the previous year. These reductions include 17% decrease in homicides compared to the same period of 2015. 30% reduction in robberies, 31% reduction in carjackings, a 12% reduction in aggravated assaults and an average 18% reduction in part one violent crimes in total from the same period of 2015.

In addition nonviolent part one crimes such as burglaries, larcenies are down an average of 14% percent. These results have been accomplished by the hard work of our men and women in uniform and through forming of community relationships and partnership and the result of the following efforts.

On average the Second Precinct services approximately 82 calls per service per day and will approximately service 34,000 calls for the year.

Officers of the Second Precinct have maintained the fastest citywide average travel time to priority one calls for service of approximately 7.6 minutes.

The officers of Second Precinct have taken 255 guns off the street this year. Our crime intelligence officer has developed a Second Precinct Facebook page to inform citizens of ongoing/upcoming events within the precinct. The page will also

Page 23 allow citizen to report illegal activities within 1 2 their respective neighborhoods. 3 I'm going to turn it over for a quick update from our community neighborhood policing 4 5 sergeant, Sergeant Vanessa Wyatt. SERGEANT WYATT: Hello, I am Sergeant 6 7 Vanessa, V-A-N-E-S-S-A, Wyatt, W-Y-A-T-T. The Second Precinct community relation 8 neighborhood police officers have been instrumental 9 10 this year in taking on several initiatives, quite a few of them we're very proud of. We've created a 11 12 database for our senior citizens. And the purpose of that database is for us this year we will be 13 executing well-being checks. We're going to provide 14 15 some services for them during the wintertime. We 16 find that some of them are shut in. They can't get 17 out. They can't get their snow shoved. We're going to try to do some things for them. 18 19 We've also developed a Citizens Advisory Board. We've done a radio patrol. We have one new 20 21 group. We had a problem with getting them together, 22 so we sent them over to Barton McFarland, which is 23 our oldest and well ran radio patrol for them to 24 help them, and so they have become a part of them in 25 getting set up and being able to do a larger area of

1 the Second Precinct.

We have three new block clubs. We began a gas station and clergy coalition. We started to kind of build our community by -- I like to use the word layers. We began meeting with our gas stations. And meeting with the gas station gave them an opportunity to kind of network with each other and exchange ideas on cleanliness, hiring, the communities in which they're serving, and we began to see some significant changes in our gas stations. We've got seven green lights now, so that was something that we done.

The officers -- well, MPO Maples, here's of something that we feel is very important in our community, which is a male mentoring. We have a dad's club at Burns Elementary School that was actually started a couple of years by MPO Mingas, who retired, and MPO Maples took that club up. It has served as an excellent tool in that school. We found that we didn't just have dads. We have grandfathers, we have uncles that are participating in that program. They've done a lot with the youth there, taking them on field trips, and we've done a lot with them at the precinct.

Also, we have youth seminars that we've

1	been doing. We've been going to schools, and we've
2	been doing Eddie Eagle, the gun safety program. In
3	addition to that, which is MPO Franklin has
4	developed a program and MPO Burks-Weathers, they all
5	do this program, and it's on cyber bullying and
6	bullying. And that's been going from school to
7	school. Burks, Weathers is going to do something
8	over at Noble. They want to have a mom's club, so
9	she's going to work that, start working with that.
10	We have MPO Sharpe who handles our clergy, and we
11	just really, I think, doing some wonderful things in
12	the community, and we have a lot of support from our
13	community.
14	So at this time I am going to turn it
15	over to Sergeant Washington who is going to give you
16	some information on our special Ops Unit.
17	COMMISSIONER SANDERS: To the Chair,
18	before he comes up.
19	THE CHAIRPERSON: Yes, sir.
20	COMMISSIONER SANDERS: I'd just like to
21	remind everybody that Precinct 2 did win the
22	softball championship.
23	THE CHAIRPERSON: I thought he was going
24	to say the football championship. But softball,
25	okay.



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SERGEANT WASHINGTON: Good evening. 1 My 2 name is Sergeant Reginald Washington. That's R-E-G-I-N-A-L-D, Washington, W-A-S-H-I-N-G-T-O-N, 3 and I'm one of the two sergeants that supervises the 5 Second Precinct Special Ops Unit. And for the citizens that know, we pretty much concentrate on your, I guess, quality of life where the patrol officers answer your runs. You know, once they answer the runs, if you have any problem with 9 10 neighbors or narcotic locations on the street, me 11 and my unit usually comes in and try to take care of 12 the stuff for you. 13

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Currently have like 13 officers assigned to Special Ops, ten that work the street and two traffic officers. And just to give you a brief idea of the type of work these officers have been doing this year, they have made -- excuse me, I don't have my glasses with me -- 675 felony arrests from guns to subjects wanted for homicide, home invasions to different, you know, warrants and stuff in the precinct. 134 misdemeanor arrests, confiscated over 137 guns. We've seized over 79 vehicles for OTE's, prosecution, narcotics things, recovered over 61 stolen vehicles. We have investigated over 7,434 people. We've issued 7082 traffic citations in the

Page 27 precinct. We've confiscated over 347 grams of 1 2 cocaine, 197 grams of heroin, 51,000 grams of marijuana and to date over \$103,000 in cash seized 3 in the precinct. 4 5 Just let the citizens, if you have any problems, you know, I usually work nights. You can 6 7 call the station and give it to Commander Betterson -- I'm sorry, Commander Mounsey and Captain 8 Muhammad, and we'll usually try to come out and 9 10 usually try to take care of it. You know, you see 11 us out there, like I said, we'll have any type of 12 operation going, troubled liquor store, see anything 13 on the block or anything like that, just give us a call and we'll try to, you know, take care of the 14 15 problem for you. 16 CAPTAIN MUHAMMAD: In closing, Commander 17 Mounsey and I who like to thank our Number 2 family, all of the citizens of the Second Precinct who 18 19 demand safe neighborhoods and report any and all issues in their neighborhoods that impact their 20 21 quality of life. 22 Second we want to thank the Second 23 Precinct Community Relations Council who keep 24 everyone together and bring the neighborhoods 25 together and the people of the Second Precinct

He talked about some of the stops, et cetera, and I asked him do you stop people who have their volume of this vulgar rap music and any other music blasting so you can hear it all the way to Six Mile. Anyway, he said they do. And I said to him that it would be appreciated if he would have them stopped, stopped because of the health issue.

When our young people are in cars with drivers and they blast the music, they don't seem to have sense enough to know that they are causing the children to go deaf and babies in particular who have very delicate eardrums. It is possible that the bicycler who was involved in that accident

Page 37 didn't even hear the police coming. He, I guess it 1 2 was a he, may be partly deaf. He's deceased now. I don't know what kind of investigation can be done on 3 the level of his hearing at this point, but it 4 5 definitely has an impact when it comes to traffic accidents, and that is something that you might want 6 7 to take into consideration when telling folks to turn that crap down. When they leave out of 8 Detroit, they seem to do it automatically, at least 9 10 that's what we keep hearing. It needs to be down in 11 the city of Detroit because we don't need our young 12 people going deaf. mayor's initiative. The City is going to start to issue municipal ID cards. And the purpose of these cards, there's a number of purposes. For those individuals who may have some difficulty obtaining or securing a Michigan ID card or a driver's license, this is only a form of identification. This card is not intended to replace a driver's license, nor is it intended to replace a Michigan ID.

with undocumented, but it's not targeted for undocumented, but there's a number of undocumented individuals, homeless individuals, returning citizens, seniors, and other transgender. There's a number of groups that have a hard time getting the ID. So the — there was a presentation, the mayor was present this morning because the buy—in of the police department was critical, and the chief has agreed to — that the department will accept this ID as a form of ID. It serves two purposes: To offer identification and to prove residency.

There are three primary ways that you can get the ID; all of them involve going to visit what they call intake centers. So in terms of, I think our biggest push back, if you will, or concern,

1	we'll say, is the risk of identity fraud. So an
2	individual will go to one of these intake centers,
3	one at the Samaritan Center and one at Patton
4	Recreation Center Mondays and Wednesdays and
5	Fridays, and they have to take a number of documents
6	to support or to earn 300 points. And, again, it's
7	for people who don't have traditional papers, if you
8	will. As I understand it is difficult sometimes for
9	returning citizens to get ID because they don't have
10	a social security number.
11	On the back of the handout it shows how
12	an individual can earn the 300 points. The process
13	has been described to us as being very thorough in
14	terms of the betting. So that a Mr. Moore and a
15	Mr. Crawford could not come in and represent
16	themselves to be the other person. There's a number
17	of safeguards.
18	COMMISSIONER MOORE: They get us confused
19	all the time.
20	DEPUTY CHIEF WASHINGTON: Well, that's
21	why I picked you two, sir.
22	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: One's older,
23	one's younger.
24	DEPUTY CHIEF WASHINGTON: But, again,
25	facial recognition and a lot of other protections



and safeguards are in place. So there -- so far there's only one credit union in the city that has agreed to accept this ID to open an account. There are a number of city buildings that you cannot go into with an ID. This ID will be accepted for that.

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Again, when you interact with the police, it is not suggested that one would pull out this ID card in

replacement for a driver's license because it will

not have a particularly good outcome.

You could also use this ID card to open DTE services. The water department has agreed to accept it as well. There's discounts and there's other things that are available to individuals who have the card. And, again, there are minors 14 through 18 who may have a school ID, may not have a school ID. But we're encouraging -- the City is encouraging everyone to at least apply for one, minors 14 through 18.

And if you look at the card, there is a unique identifying number at the top. The mayor's signature is embedded. It's almost impossible to duplicate the card, but of course we all know that you can duplicate anything. If a member suspects, however, that the card that's being presented to them, it is counterfeit or it has somehow been

Page 43 altered, it's very likely that that member will 1 2 confiscate that card and return it to the Health 3 Department who is the entity who is managing the 4 program. 5 On the back side of it, it's got a magnetic strip that contains all of your 6 7 information. You can also have an emergency contact I believe on the back. It indicates a veteran if 8 you are one and your willingness to become -- or to 9 10 be a donor. And, again, I draw your attention to 11 the fact that it does not include gender, 12 particularly those people that are in the 13 transgender community are uncomfortable identifying, 14 and that does not require that they do so. 15 THE CHAIRPERSON: Thank you. Questions 16 or comments? Before that, I want to acknowledge 17 Bishop Edgar Vann joining us, represent District 2, joining now. It is, so to be clear in terms of the public, it is not an opportunity for us to -- or for you, in the case of the commission, to vote.

Because if you voted on such a thing in a situation like that, you would be going up against the Open Meetings Act.

So -- but we do think in the case of the details that are associated with this -- with a fairly large budget, one of the largest budgets in which the City of Detroit departmental level has, that it would require some more detailed explanation of the type of findings and or process -- procedural

So where we would look, for example, to years gone by, audit reports and things

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like that, those things may or may not be there that would help us in this particular situation.

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I would finally add that as we sit here, we're in fiscal, and I hope I get this correct, we're in fiscal 1617. The books for the previous fiscal year, however, has not been closed, and this does hamper our investigation because we were not able to establish an initial financial baseline for the year. And it will further complicate any multi-year analysis that we were attempting to perform that talked about what trends did we have in the department, relative increase or decreases in funds, what may be carried over from year to year and so forth, because we simply don't have the kind of information to do that. You only get that information once. The books have been closed, for example, and last year, which we have not, and a third party auditor would have performed a comprehensive annual financial report. The last one that we have that we can use is -- ends with the 2015, the close of fiscal year in 2015. So we are several months from getting or having the ability to give you that kind of finite picture. But our obligation is to, within the information that we have or can gain access to is to give you as best
