Thank you. 8 9 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Good evening, Police Commissioner Ricardo Moore, representing 10 District No. 7 which is northwest Detroit. 11 12 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Commissioner 13 Elizabeth Brooks, Mayor appointee. 14 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner 15 Eva Garza Dewaelsche, appointee. 16 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: Commissioner 17 Derrick Sanders, appointee. 18 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you. 19 Attorney Bernard, are there commissioners that 20 were asked to be excused? 21 MS. Page 5 1 At this time I'd like to then introduce Chief 2 James Craig. Thank you, sir, for coming out this evening. 3 4 CHIEF CRAIG: Thank you. 5 COMMISSIONER CARTER: And at this time, Chief, do you have any staff that you would like 6 7 to introduce, sir. 8 CHIEF CRAIG: Yes, they can go around. 9 I'll start with 1st Asst. Chief Lashinda Stair. 10 (VARIOUS POLICE COMMAND OFFICERS INTRODUCED THEMSELVES FROM THE 11 12 AUDIENCE.) 13 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Any others from 14 the Chief'S staff? Okay, Attorney Bernard, can you introduce the rest of the Commission staff, 15 16 please? 17 MS. BERNARD: Yes, Madam Chair. 18 apologize for these glasses. I have a very bad 19 eye infection, so when it looks like I'm crying, 20 I'm really not, I just wanted to let you know. 21 In terms of the staff that's present, 22 we have Mr. Ansley Cromwell from the Office of the Chief Investigator sitting on the first row 23 24 to my left. We have Mr. Robert Brown who's the

administrative assistant to the Board.

1	Sgt. Alan Quinn is assisting in
2	recording this meeting today and Dale Rose from
3	Hanson Court Reporting is recording the minutes
4	of the meeting.
5	George Anthony is excused. The Chief
6	Investigator, Pamela Davis-Drake, is also excused
7	and Ms. Oxendine I gather is absent.
8	That completes our introductions, Madam
9	Chair.
10	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you. At
11	this time we'd like to thank Pastor Hunter and
12	the Grace Church of the Nazarene for their
13	accommodations and Pastor Hunter, if you would
14	like to come forward and say any welcoming words
15	if you'd like. If not, we can move forward.
16	And I'd like to thank you. I work
17	personally in this community and I know that your
18	doors are always open for community events, so
19	I'd like to thank you on behalf of the community
20	for all that you do in this community.
21	At this time, Commissioners, you have
22	before you the agenda for Thursday, February 11.
23	Is there a motion to approve the agenda?
24	COMMISSIONER SANDERS: Move adoption,
25	Madam Chair.



Page 7 COMMISSIONER MOORE: 1 Support. 2 COMMISSIONER CARTER: It's been moved and supported that we adopt the agenda for 3 4 Thursday, February 11. Is there any discussion? 5 Those in favor? 6 COMMISSIONERS: Aye. 7 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Those opposed? 8 The motion carries. Commissioners, you have 9 before you the minutes from Thursday, February 4. Is there a motion to approve the minutes? 10 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: 11 So moved. 12 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: Supported. 13 COMMISSIONER CARTER: It's been moved 14 and supported that we adopt the minutes from Thursday, February 4. Is there any discussion? 15 16 COMMISSIONER MOORE: I'm going to 17 abstain, I was absent last week. 18 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you. Those 19 in favor? 20 COMMISSIONERS (except Moore): Aye. 21 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Those opposed? 22 The motion carries. At this time I'm going to 23 pass on the Chairperson's report, I have nothing 24 really to report this week and go straight to the



Chief and his 9th Precinct report or Comm.

1	Decker's 9th Precinct report.
2	Chief?
3	CHIEF CRAIG: Oh, you're going to go
4	right to the report?
5	COMMISSIONER CARTER: No, not to the
6	report, to you and then Capt. Decker.
7	CHIEF CRAIG: Thank you. As I like to
8	always do, talk about crime. Year-to-date we're
9	sitting at an 8 percent reduction in violent
10	crime. Homicide as of last week's reporting were
11	down I think we're actually even with this
12	time last year.
13	Property crime we're doing 9 percent
14	with an overall Part 1 crime reduction of 9
15	percent. So early in our first quarter we're
16	trending down, continue to trend down from our
17	crime reduction efforts last year. I don't get
18	too excited in the first quarter.
19	Once we get through the second quarter
20	we'll have a greater gauge of where we are
21	overall. Just an update, you seen the news
22	reports regarding a Facebook posting by one of
23	our supervisory employees.
24	As you may know, that posting has been



taken down of the concerned member. We have

1	opened an internal investigation and that
2	investigation is proceeding and I'll take any
3	questions or concerns anyone may have on that.
4	Then the last issue regarding the
5	recent report of a terrorist suspect that
6	threatened to shoot in a church in Detroit.
7	I've had a number of conversations with
8	the FBI on that issue. I've talked to both
9	Bishop Vann about that matter as well as Bishop
10	Ellis. We're going to be putting together a
11	response in terms of an active shooter situation
12	in churches.
13	In fact, what I've come to learn is
14	that Bishop Ellis probably is one of the leaders
15	in preparing his parishioners and so we're going
16	to meet at his sanctuary and see if we can
17	replicate the training in other churches across
18	the city. So we're excited about that, so at
19	this time I'll take any questions that any
20	Commissioners might have.
21	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Commissioners, do
22	you have any questions for Chief Craig?
23	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Through the Chair,
24	Chief, in regards to disciplining officers, is
25	the Code of Ethics used in that process?



Page 10 1 CHIEF CRAIG: Through the Chair, of 2 course the Code of Ethics is there. We don't make specific reference, but we certainly address 3 4 it and how we mete out discipline. 5 Certainly we have a mission statement, we have Code of Ethics. 6 7 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Any other 8 questions? 9 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Through the Just, Chief, I haven't read the policy 10 Chair. dealing with the social media. I read it last 11 12 year, I haven't recently is what I'm saying here. 13 I consider it a pretty good policy. As 14 a matter of fact, our Secretary to the board, ma'am, could you get us a copy of that policy and 15 16 distribute it to all the Commissioners? 17 MS. BERNARD: Which policy? 18 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: DPD policy 19 pertaining to social media. It's pertaining to 20 -- there's a section dealing with social media. 21 MS. BERNARD: Social media? 22 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, ma'am. 23 MS. BERNARD: Yes, sir. 24 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Facebook



postings, etc, First Amendment, free speech

1	rights. Just so that we all the Commissioners
2	are informed as to and I don't know if it's
3	been updated since last year.

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I remember reading it last summer just perusing it. Also too just to comment, it's really an educational moment, because there's a lot of people who weren't aware as to what the Black Panthers were really all about and versus the KKK, and Lord knows Beyonce who's hip-hop, you know, and those -- no one was offended when she recorded "Bootylicious" and "Put a Ring on It" and "Single Ladies" and all this controversy because of the Super Bowl, but the Black Panther Party was a group that as started at Oakland, California and it was really about self-defense.

As a matter of fact, they started the first breakfast program across the country, the school breakfast program. Matter of fact, the federal government picked up on that and still today they established school breakfast programs.

So that's just a few of the things and they were about protecting the community, about defending the community not only against police brutality, but also from those who were committing crimes in the community and ridding

1	the community of drugs at that time too.
2	I do know recently to note there was a
3	new Black Panther Party that started recently
4	here in the city of Detroit, but I believe that
5	individual may even work for the Mayor now, so
6	thank you.
7	COMMISSIONER BISHOP VANN: Madam Chair,
8	yes, with regards to the potential terrorist
9	attack on churches, I think it's very important
10	because all of our churches as you well know are
11	places where large numbers of people gather and I

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I do know that many of the larger churches are engaged in a number of security initiatives and we've also met with the FBI, we've met with Homeland Security previously with regard to some of those measures.

think it's -- I'm happy to see that the Chief is

very concerned and is taking a personal priority

towards the safety of those who are attending

worship services.

I would welcome the training and the measures that the Chief has suggested and I think -- I would offer myself of course as a member of this commission to help coordinate other pastors and churches towards that end so that worship

1	services can continue in this city no matter what
2	denomination, no matter what race, no matter what
3	faith, can continue to go on unimpeded.
4	So I think it's a very very serious
5	issue. One of the issues with regards to it will
6	be the policy of notification so that we are
7	aware and so that there is a common network among
8	the churches for the safety of the citizens of
9	the city. So I look forward to working with the
10	Chief with regards to that notification policy
11	and also look forward to the training that will
12	continue with that.
13	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you,
14	Commissioner Vann. Any other questions or
15	comments?
16	COMMISSIONER VANN: Madam Chair, just a
17	follow-up to the reference of the or the issue
18	of the social media posting.
19	Chief, if you could upon the completion
20	of the investigation just let us know the results
21	the Commission know the results of the
22	investigation and I guess in a sense of
23	accountability what I guess what has been done
24	after the investigation has been completed, sir.
25	Thank you.



1	CHIEF CRAIG: Through the Chair, we'll
2	keep you informed. You should also know that
3	there was an incident emanating out of the fire
4	department involving a post involving an EMS
5	employee. City Law had did some research with
6	some policy put in place on the city side.
7	And so we've already reached out to
8	City Law. One of the things that certainly was
9	not very clear is that when you are a police
10	officer we recognize First Amendment rights
11	certainly. You must maintain a certain level of
12	decorum if you will in terms of what you put into
13	social media.
14	What we have offered and we've done
15	prior to this incident is that part of our
16	in-service for the our police officers we have a
17	block of instructions on use of social media.
18	This has been an issue not just here in
19	Detroit, but in other jurisdictions, so we wanted
20	to be ahead of it and so we'll keep you informed.
21	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you, chief.
22	Any other questions, Commissioners? Capt.
23	Decker?
24	CAPT. DECKER: Good evening,
25	Commission, Chief. So I had a really nice speech

1	prepared, reading it back there and my AC said it
2	was too long, so we're going to paraphrase here.
3	Give you the general No. 9 basically
4	Eight Mile to 94, City Airport to Kelly Road,
5	about 75,000 people in No. 9. We've got about 18
6	schools, three high schools, 87 churches, 150
7	businesses.
8	Unfortunately No. 9 has a history of
9	being one of the most violent precincts in the
10	city. Zip code 48205 unfortunately is nationally
11	known for being one of the most violent zip codes
12	in the nation.
13	To that end we're making some great
14	reduction in the violence in the 9th Precinct to
15	make the 9th Precinct a better place to live,
16	work and worship.
17	September, 2015 I was transferred to
18	the 9th Precinct. Being the captain there,
19	commanding officer, very new to me, but 9th
20	Precinct is not new to me. I worked here for
21	eight years as a sergeant, went to TSS for a
22	couple of years working in No. 9 probably three,
23	four days a week and then as a lieutenant I came
24	back to No. 9 for about a year working Special



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Operations.

1	Felt like I'm home actually, was like
2	coming home. I know the people, I know the
3	officers, I know the good guys, I know the bad
4	guys and I know the crime in No. 9.
5	So in 2015 No. 9 had a 12 percent
6	reduction in Part 1 crime. Sounds great, however
7	our violent crime or gun-related crime and
8	homicides, shootings, were way up. Not
9	acceptable to the Chief, not acceptable to
10	myself.
11	So 2016 we're working on some things,
12	some things in place right now, things are
13	looking great. Got a 60 percent reduction on
14	both homicides and non-fatal shootings.
15	A couple of things we're doing,
16	response time is down under 14 minutes. We have
17	now bi-weekly or bi-monthly ComStat meetings to
18	identify those crimes and trends, patterns. Our
19	business special attentions are going way up. We
20	had over 400 in the month of January alone.
21	Weapons, it's one of my big focuses. A
22	39 percent reduction in our weapons arrests last
23	year. Currently we're sitting about 40 percent
24	up. ShotSpotter, I think everybody here is aware
25	of ShotSpotter. It's triangulation of

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1	microphones that pinpoints a gunshot within about
2	25 meters. Actually it's probably a lot closer.
3	Detroit Police Department was the first
4	in the nation to write a search warrant using
5	ShotSpotter as probable cause. We currently do
6	it was an officer assigned in from our west
7	side team, our CBRP, ATF certified officer, task
8	force officer.
9	Did a first one, turned it over to
10	Special Ops. We've done just two today, but I
11	think we're up to now about 11 warrants in the
12	last four months, recovered about 22 weapons just
13	off those warrants alone, about 500 rounds.
14	ShotSpotter itself, we've taken
15	probably another 50 weapons and 92 instances of
16	recovered casings which comes back to
17	investigative value. It's great technology, we
18	got a three square mile area in Number 9, great
19	technology.
20	Also got some embedded MDOC agents.
21	Guys are phenomenal. Sometimes I forget that
22	they work for MDOC and not me. They work hand in
23	hand with my Special Ops that do everything from
24	MDOC. Home checks, whatever I ask them to do,
25	follow up all their bad guys that are on



1	probation or parole.
2	Just created some new warrant teams to
3	go out and grab people that we know have
4	warrants, known offenders working on our
5	aggravated assaults. It's kind of at the
6	precinct level. A lot of things going into No. 9
7	that are more of together there's a little
8	theme I got in here, cooperation.
9	Cease fire, crease fire programs are a
10	cooperative effort between the community and law
11	enforcement to reduce gang and gun related
12	violence. There's more voice from the community
13	that the violence must stop as well as the
14	community social provided to ensure that
15	participants have the means necessary to leave
16	the gang lifestyle.
17	It's not just a message, they're
18	helping them getting jobs, licenses, all sorts of
19	different things.
20	And then there's law enforcement,
21	there's all of us coming together, local, state,
22	federal both in the law enforcement side and
23	prosecution. People that don't want to listen.
24	Probably it's been about a two-year program. The



last six months have been incredible.

1	We're really seeing it right now. I
2	think it's coming to fruition. A lot of really
3	bad gang members have been taken off the street
4	in the last couple of months.
5	SMB, Seven Mile Bloods, Notorious Gang
6	No. 9. I think in the very near future people
7	refer to SMBs like Whitey Eye, a gang that used
8	to exist in Detroit.
9	City partnerships, I see Lt. Shaw
10	behind me. It's cooperation between DPD and MSP,
11	they're giving six MSP units a night in No. 9 or
12	five nights a week, it's been phenomenal.
13	The green light gas station, can't talk
14	about it enough. No. 9 is fortunate enough to
15	have two of them, Hoover Sunoco, Seven Mile and
16	Hoover at 11603 and then the BP gas station down
17	in 11601 East Outer Drive. This is going
18	phenomenal, a lot of good results already. We
19	have officers up there watching the cameras,
20	relaying it to my Special Ops or to other guys on
21	the streets and we've actually seen results.
22	I'd also like to thank Mr. Abe Bassy,
23	he's one of our green light gas stations, BP gas
24	station, provided some Subways for afterwards
25	tonight.

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1	The one man jury, big push for me. I'm
2	hoping to get it to No. 9 or for the east side, 9
3	and 5. It's been in No. 10, they've had
4	phenomenal results, crime really dropped, not
5	just their non-fatal shootings, but their overall
6	violent crime.
7	Hopefully by the end of the year
8	cooperation between us and Wayne County
9	prosecutors we'll have that in place in No. 9.
10	First Friday of the month I sit down with Wayne
11	State University, some community groups and they
12	really tell me about my crime, phenomenal they
13	have phenomenal information, great at identifying
14	patterns going into those specific years, Osborn,
15	and then all the community groups, the block
16	clubs, the CB patrols.
17	This is where it is, it's cooperation
18	between us, our citizens, our community groups.
19	This is what's going to continue to reduce crime.
20	I'd like to name a few of them.
21	We currently have 35 block clubs. The
22	number is continuing to grow. We have some
23	amazing community groups. The Wayne State
24	University Center for Urban Studies, the Black



Family Development, the Americorp's Urban Safety

1	Project, the Detroit Youth Violence Prevention,
2	the Detroit Public Schools, Osborn Neighborhood
3	Alliance, Neighborhood Service organization, The
4	Man Network, the Detroit Crime Commission, and
5	those are just a few.
6	We have some CB patrols out there,
7	there's a theme there, it's cooperation. I
8	personally know and I think everyone in the room
9	knows the precinct can't handle violence by
10	ourselves, we can't handle the crime, we have to
11	continue these relationships, these partnerships.
12	That's what's going to reduce our crime
13	in No. 9, make it a great place to live, work and
14	worship.
15	Also like to thank my NPOs, a couple of
16	them are back there, Officer Jay Dantzler, Aubrey
17	Wade is on furlough, Abraham Blue, Brad Hawkins.
18	The sergeant is not here, Heather Cameron,
19	working tireless hours coordinating all the
20	functions, the events and the meetings with the
21	community.
22	These guys, Derek Clapman, Americorps,
23	putting up vacant buildings, knocking them down,
24	peace marches, wherever I have a problem they are



more than willing to give their own time doing

1	it.
2	That's the future of No. 9, our
3	cooperative relationships. So that's about it.
4	It's not verbatim, but that is my spiel there.
5	Any questions?
6	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Questions for the
7	captain, commissioners?
8	COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Through the
9	Chair. You said our response time is down to 14
10	minutes. Is that the time the response unit gets
11	the call or the time it actually goes into 9-1-1?
12	CAPT. DECKER: That's the time it comes
13	to the officers en route or at scene actually.
14	CHIEF CRAIG: Through the Chair, just a
15	point of clarity. Response time so that everyone
16	is clear, as soon as the community member picks
17	up, dials 9-1-1 the clock starts. We include
18	travel time, we include queue time, and while as
19	Capt. Decker pointed out, phenomenal work in this
20	area with the 14 minute response time overall in
21	the city we have one of the lowest response
22	times. This week I think we're sitting at 13.5.
23	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Through the Chair.
24	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Commissioner
25	Moore.



1	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Captain, you
2	mentioned the term "one man jury."
3	CAPT. DECKER: One man grand jury.
4	COMMISSIONER MOORE: What exactly is
5	that.
6	CAPT. DECKER: The one man grand jury
7	is a jurist, it's a secret grand jury, person may
8	be compelled to give evidence, a victim or
9	witness, secret to go on to actually indicting a
10	person on a grand jury indictment.
11	COMMISSIONER MOORE: More like a
12	proffer type issue or
13	CAPT. DECKER: It's with a prosecutor,
14	it's with a jurist which I believe it's generally
15	a retired judge. The prosecutor asks questions.
16	The one man jury decides if there's evidence to
17	indict. The person may be compelled to give
18	testimony.
19	People absolutely have the right to
20	self-incrimination, but you can be compelled to
21	tell the truth.
22	COMMISSIONER MOORE: My last question
23	is police patrols, a lot of times citizens want
24	to see police cars just driving up and down the
25	side streets. Have you received that complaint



1	or issue in No. 9?
2	CAPT. DECKER: Not specifically. I
3	mean, our patrol units are very tied to patrol
4	runs. My neighborhood police officers are very
5	attentive in all the communities.
6	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you.
7	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Any other
8	questions, Commissioners?
9	COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, I just
10	want to say I haven't had an opportunity to work
11	with Capt. Decker, but basically my understanding
12	is that the community relations team at the 9th
13	Precinct is satisfied with your leadership and
14	with your interaction with them.
15	Had an opportunity with Capt. Cox and
16	
17	CAPT. DECKER: It's heart medicine
18	time, so
19	COMMISSIONER BELL: You continue that
20	type of leadership and that type of program so I
21	just want to commend you to keep up the good work
22	and we're looking forward to having that
23	interaction with you, but the team of people over
24	at the 9th Precinct is more than satisfied in
2.5	terms of the service that you have rendered



Page 25 1 Like you stated, you're familiar with 2 No. 9, so you understand the inner workings of No. 9 so I just want to say thank you. 3 4 CAPT. DECKER: Thank you, Commissioner 5 Bell. 18	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you, sir.
19	Are there any other representatives, elected
20	officers or elected officials?
21	MR. BYRD: State representative Wendell
22	Berg, District 3.
23	(OTHER OFFICIALS INTRODUCE THEMSELVES
24	FROM THE AUDIENCE).
25	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you. Thank



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1	you, Commissioner Vann. At this time are there
2	any standing committee reports?
3	COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Madam Chair,
4	if I may, I have a report from the Personnel
5	Committee. We received on January 22 and have
6	taken action to approve a letter of resignation
7	from our Board Secretary Mr. George Anthony. His
8	reason for leaving is the desire to spend more
9	time with his family and other pursuits.
10	Madam Chair, the Committee approved the
11	acceptance of the resignation and have asked that
12	the effective date be April 1, 2016, and so we
13	bring that before the full Board. If we need to
14	have a motion, ma'am, I so move.
15	COMMISSIONER BELL: I second the
16	motion.
17	COMMISSIONER CARTER: It's been moved
18	and supported that we accept the resignation for
19	Secretary to the Board George Anthony effective
20	April 1, 2016.
21	Is there any discussion?
22	COMMISSIONER MOORE: No discussion per
23	se about the particular issue. However, I think
24	we need to put together some sort of search for a



new attorney as soon as possible.

1	COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Yes, I was
2	going to indicate that we are going to be working
3	with Director Oxendine on the process immediately
4	and so we are going to put a plan together for
5	the search.
6	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Okay, thank you.
7	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Any other
8	discussion? Those in favor of the motion?
9	COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
10	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Those opposed?
11	The motion carries.
12	COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Thank you,
13	Madam Chair.
14	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you. And,
15	Commission Dewaelsche, last week I believe it
16	was last week that we did a resolution for 3rd
17	Deputy Chief George Chester and he is here, so I
18	assume that he has an effective retirement date,
19	is that correct?
20	That was the only stipulation.
21	COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, he has
22	met those requirements, we received a
23	communication to that effect, so we just want to
24	commend the 3rd Deputy Chief for his retirement
25	and also his new role as appointed 3rd Deputy



1	Chief Civilian.
2	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you.
3	Thank you, sir; congratulations.
4	At this time under new business we have
5	resolutions for a resolution for Mr. Andre
6	Walk.
7	(APPLAUSE).
8	COMMISSIONER CARTER: I'm going to ask
9	that Commissioner Crawford please read the
10	resolution.
11	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: We have a
12	resolution honoring Mr. Andre C. Walk.
13	WHEREAS, Mr. Andre C. Walk has been a
14	dedicated resident of the 9th Precinct for 21
15	years. He has been an active member of the 9th
16	Precinct Community Relations Board for the past
17	six years and was voted as President of the
18	Community Relations Board on March 4, 2015 and
19	WHEREAS Mr. Walk currently holds the
20	position of Vice-President of the Eden Gardens
21	Block Club. His main goal is to improve the
22	quality of life within the 9th Precinct and
23	WHEREAS Mr. Walk is a graduate of
24	Detroit's Kettering High School and continues his
25	studies at Ferris State University He is



1	married to his loving wife Lucy Avery-Walk.
2	Mr. Walk is currently employed with Allied Waste
3	Republic Service and has been with the company
4	for 26 years and has served as the union steward
5	for 22 of those years and
6	WHEREAS Mr. Walk is a committed
7	volunteer for community and citywide projects
8	including Angels Night, Motor City Makeover and
9	many other beautification and development
10	projects, forums and community advisory meetings.
11	NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the
12	Detroit Board of Police Commissioners speaking on
13	behalf of the 9th Precinct and citizens of the
14	city of Detroit acknowledge the dedication and
15	community spirit of Mr. Andre C. Walk. He is a
16	committed and hard working citizen who deeply
17	cares for his community. Mr. Walk is an
18	inspiration to all and a model of citizenship.
19	We thank you and congratulate you,
20	Mr. Andre Walk.
21	(APPLAUSE)
22	CHIEF CRAIG: I just want to say,
23	joining me is Capt. Decker from the 9th Precinct,
24	just want to acknowledge you, Mr. Walker, for a
25	job well done.



1	Your 21 years of selfless service to
2	this community and really making a difference, on
3	behalf of the Detroit Police Department we
4	present you a certificate of recognition.
5	And also on behalf of the Detroit City
6	Council, we present you with the Spirit of
7	Detroit Award signed by all council.
8	(APPLAUSE).
9	MR. WALK: Thank you, Chief. Thank
10	you, Captain.
11	Let me first thank God for being the
12	head of all of our lives and touching us in a way
13	that brings us all together. I give those awards
14	to Him.
15	Secondly, let me thank the Chief for
16	doing what he do to fight every single day to try
17	to make our city safe.
18	Third of all, let me thank the Board of
19	Commissioners for doing what they do all day
20	every day. Let me thank especially Commissioner
21	Bell for forcing me to take this position.
22	Whatever it was he saw in me, I asked him one
23	specific question. I said I would like to run
24	for vice-president and he says no, you need to be
25	president.



1	I had no intentions, but whatever it is
2	he saw in me, it had to be God. And let me be
3	brief for a moment and allow me to say this.
4	In 2013 we buried my father 89 years.
5	2014 I buried my second oldest sister. 2015 I
6	buried my oldest brother and all of them were
7	community and family oriented.
8	And so something drove me to a meeting
9	one day and I saw Commissioner Bell there and
10	that's when that question was raised, so it was
11	meant.
12	Fourthly, I'd like to say thank you to
13	our board members who do a fabulous job and last
14	but not least our NPOs. Our NPOs are out there
15	on the line every single day. All of our
16	officers are out there on the line every single
17	day. And our motto, our question that we have
18	to learn to ask each other is how do we change
19	lives while maintaining our own. That's a rough
20	task to fulfill.
21	Our kids have to grow to understand
22	what that truly means. And if I could say one
23	last thing, Chief, I would like to have a
24	conversation with you about our school system,
25	the patrols in our school system and some of the



1	violence that's happening in our school system.
2	We had a meeting and we wanted to
3	discuss a project we call Operation Push, Parents
4	Under Serious Heat. It is the ownership in which
5	our parents become more involved in our kids'
6	lives. I'm not going to take this meeting
7	hostage because if you allow me, I will.
8	COMMISSIONER CARTER: No, you won't.
9	MR. WALK: But let me thank everybody
10	for recognizing me, I appreciate you and God
11	bless you.
12	(APPLAUSE.)
13	COMMISSIONER BELL: At this time, I
14	would like the leadership team that supports
15	Mr. Walk to come forward if you are here. His
16	vice-president, his secretary and treasurer.
17	(APPLAUSE).
18	COMMISSIONER BELL: What we have here
19	is his secretary Michelle West, she's part of the
20	leadership team. And our host this evening with
21	the pastor administrator here Ms. Felicia Taylor
22	and others, we will get their awards at the time
23	of their meeting next month.
24	They're on somewhat of a break, but the



leadership team continues to work. Mr. Walk is

1	right, I volunteered him for this job and he's
2	doing an excellent job with this team he put
3	together. They're averaging 75 to 100 members at
4	their 9th Precinct meetings and they do due
5	diligence during the year. We were all merged at
6	one time to the Eastern District or the
7	Northeastern District, one of those districts,
8	but now we have the 9th Precinct and the 5th
9	Precinct.
10	As we go forward I think it's ideal
11	that we recognize the community people who work
12	with the officers and who represent the community
13	and as the Chief states, the community is very
14	key to policing as we all know.
15	And as Capt. Decker reported out, we
16	move forward as part of the whole effort in terms
17	with dealing with public safety, so I just want
18	to thank Brother Walk and these young ladies here
19	for their excellent jobs.
20	This is a further commitment to keep on
21	working hard. Thank you.
22	(APPLAUSE.)
23	COMMISSIONER BELL: At this time we
24	wanted to initiate in 2016 to recognize the NPOs



in the precinct and would they come forward,

1	please?
2	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: NPO Brad
3	Hawkins and NPO Jay Dantzler.
4	COMMISSIONER CARTER: And NPO Aubrey
5	Wade, he's not here?
6	COMMISSIONER BELL: Wade is on
7	furlough.
8	Now, I know these officers extremely
9	well. We have been working together almost two
10	years and once the Chief initiated the NPO
11	program. I had my doubts and I stated that
12	before, but without a doubt they are really the
13	life blood of the precinct in terms of
14	interacting with the community and they're on
15	call almost like you, Chief.
16	They get texts, they get calls on all
17	types of matters that are non-emergencies,
18	sometimes emergencies, but basically they are the
19	lifeline of community, so I thought the Board
20	with their approval we need to recognize as we go
21	forward this year the NPOs and then in the future
22	we'll be recognizing officers who work the street
23	in terms of that type of recognition.
24	But we wanted to start with the NPOs.
25	I want to thank them for their ongoing commitment



1	and service because this is beyond the call of
2	duty. It takes a unique person to be an
3	community serve in the public service sense,
4	so I just want to commend you guys for doing an
5	outstanding job and I know one of my favorite
6	officers, Officer Blue, we worked together when I
7	was at No. 9 and he also assisted me at Dominican
8	High School Academy and if you're talking about
9	someone who can cook some fish, this brother
10	here, we worked.
11	And the rest of these guys I got to
12	know in the last couple of years and I just want
13	to thank you. I have worked closely with the 9th
14	Precinct. I mean, we can't say enough in terms
15	of the work that they do.
16	So, Chief, if there's any reward in
17	terms of a paycheck they get a paycheck
18	anyway, right? Okay, thank you.
19	(APPLAUSE).
20	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Retired police
21	officer Moses Baldwin here?
22	COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, he's here.
23	COMMISSIONER CARTER: And retired
24	Deputy Chief Mary Jarrett-Jackson.
25	COMMISSIONER BELL: As you well know,



1	this is Black History Month, and we wanted to
2	really focus in on Black History Month as far as
3	DPD personnel.
4	These two individuals came on and I'm
5	not going to talk about their age, but I would
6	say at least the '50s?
7	MS. JARRETT-JACKSON: '58.
8	COMMISSIONER BELL: 1958, and what year?
9	MR. BALDWIN: '52.
10	COMMISSIONER CARTER: 1952.
11	(APPLAUSE).
12	COMMISSIONER BELL: And if you know
13	your history in the '50s it was very difficult to
14	became a police officers, especially if you were
15	a person of color, a black officer, and that sort
16	of reminded me of the late Deputy Chief Richard
17	Dungy when he retired on the police department
18	from his funeral last year and it was outlined on
19	his obituary how he was a military person and
20	when he applied for the police department they
21	said you don't really have a job, come back in
22	six months, so he came back in six months and
23	then they told him that you live in the wrong
24	neighborhood, you need to come back and re-apply.
25	So he moved and reapplied and then I



think there was some other issues that he had to
deal with, but he stayed the course and he
applied, got a job and met the criteria. He was
No. 1 in his class and as you well know he had a
great career with the police department becoming
a deputy chief and he also I didn't know,
years later at my church that he was also the
uncle of the famous Tony Dungy, the football
coach

But Deputy Chief Dungy was a quiet spirit, but he was a very meaningful person in terms of the police department, so that reminded me that we should recognize if we don't tell our story, we don't lift up our history for those who came on in the '70s, they came in when Deputy Chief Mary Jarrett didn't have a college degree, you had to go certain criteria being a female.

They were very very strict in terms of that requirement, so -- but she went on -- my first encounter that she went to the Black
Officer Experience. She was the president of the Guardian Police Association, first female, and so I was serving as a secretary-treasurer and when we merged the two, we were young brothers who wanted to get out here and take the streets and



1	blah, blah, blah and she was a quiet force, so we
2	merged and I went forward in terms of her
3	leadership team as a young officer.
4	And thereafter she got promoted, but
5	when she served her term I became president and
6	we met and we talked and she's sort of what
7	groomed me. These are the things you need to do,
8	how to you know how that goes you're going
9	to be under a microscope, you need to respond in
10	a certain manner.
11	She also was a role model for so many
12	female officers on this job, but my mentor Deputy
13	Chief Mary Jarrett, she's really been a blessing
14	to this department, went on to a higher rank of
15	Deputy Chief, you know, I think Western
16	Operations.
17	But we have always stayed in contact
18	over the years and I look up to her in terms of
19	always want to see you on a positive note.
20	And Moses Baldwin, he's from Miller
21	High School, am I right, one of most prominent
22	black high schools in the city of Detroit at that
23	time, and he went on to join the police
24	department, had a distinguished career.



He's one of the founding members of the

1	Guardians in 1963 and it wasn't popular, Chief,
2	to be a member of a black organization at that
3	time.

He went on to become president and then he moved on to the National Black Police Officers Association. He was the founding chairman of the National Black Police Officers Association, and there was some bad brothers all over this country that Chicago was the main, but they selected this young man to be the chairman of a black police association, and that was his unique experience.

I could go on and on, but he retired from the police department, went to the board of education, worked in that 11 years or more and he retired from there, but we're going to give them opportunities to speak.

I just can't say enough, we're talking about Black History Month, we kicked off Black History Month at the Charles Wright Museum just the other day.

You'll get the opportunity -- I haven't seen the video yet, but we had a Hispanic officer, we had a female officer and a black male and I had opportunity to say some words, they going to put it together and hopefully if you

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1	have an opportunity to come back to the Public
2	Safety Building, the third floor, there's a
3	display giving you the profile of what took place
4	with the Guardians and the other black
5	organizations, so at this time I'm going to pause
6	and give Deputy Chief Mary Jarrett
7	(APPLAUSE).
8	MS. JARRETT-JACKSON: I just wanted to
9	say that's the Guardians were formed out of a
10	need for two black officers accused of stealing
11	money when they made an arrest and the union,
12	even though we paid our dues, the union attorney
13	would not represent them.
14	And so we raised money so that these
15	two officers would get their due justice because
16	everybody deserves that, and we kept the
17	organization together because when you are a
18	large body with one vote you get heard; thank
19	you.
20	COMMISSIONER BALL: Thank you and
21	that's the history of it and they continue on
22	with Detroit PD, Ecorse, Wayne County Sheriff's
23	Deputies and others in terms of departments.
24	That's why they became Guardians of Michigan



yes, all ranks at that time.

1	MR. BALDWIN: I won't take too much
2	time because it takes too long to it's been a
3	long journey, and I'm just happy to be here, but
4	if anyone wants to know what it was like back
5	then, I'll be glad to talk to you anytime
6	anywhere.
7	So thanks for having us in and we and
8	Mary worked together for a long time, but thanks
9	anyway and you all have a good evening.
10	(APPLAUSE).
11	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, sir.
12	Deputy Chief Jackson, I worked for you when I
13	came on the 7th Precinct, so it's been yes,
14	ma'am, it's an honor for me to stand right here.
15	And, Mr. Baldwin, I will have to sit
16	with you one day, but I hear your history all the
17	time from Lt. Roosevelt Lawrence.
18	We talk often and it's not a time that
19	he doesn't mention your name and the history and
20	as a matter of fact just what you just said, we
21	need to sit and talk because Lt. Lawrence has
22	expressed that, yes, sir.
23	It's an honor to meet you too, sir and,
24	ma'am, it's an honor to see you.
25	COMMISSIONER BELL: I just want to



1	close I think it's sort of crucial that perhaps
2	we can take time to do a video piece. The
3	uniqueness about the UAW, I just went to the
4	celebration of Horace Sheffield, Jr 100th
5	birthday and his son and Mary Sheffield and
6	others.
7	Before a whole lot of those old guys

Before a whole lot of those old guys went off the scene they did a historic piece on those individuals so we need to do the same thing for these individuals and lead up to today, but basically the '40s and '50s.

Even Conrad Mallett's father was a former officer for a short period of time. Some of them did not -- they said we got to move on.

So basically I just think we need to take time to record that because young officers need to know that we didn't get here by accident and we're talking about the whole issue of -- issues of policing in America.

And that's why I sort of appreciate
Chief Craig because he went through the black
officer movement or the OJB in the LAPD and I'm
familiar with them.

Most people that went on, they did not get involved because they were afraid that this



1	would hamper their career, but as you can see,
2	Chief Craig went through his process. I think
3	it's necessary that we are lifted up and today we
4	have NOBLE which is for black executives, but we
5	also have the National Black Police Association
6	that's still existing in terms of that whole rank
7	and file and from the executive viewpoint, so as
8	we close out I just want to thank you again for
9	coming out tonight and we love you and we're
10	going to do more.
11	We have certificates of appreciation
12	for you. At this time Commissioner Crawford is
13	going to present it and read it.
14	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Board of Police
15	Commissioners certificate of recognition
16	presented to retired Deputy Chief Mary
17	Jarrett-Jackson.
18	On behalf of the Board of Police
19	Commissioners speaking for the citizens of
20	Detroit awards this certificate of recognition to
21	retired Deputy Chief Mary Jarrett-Jackson became
22	the first female to be promoted to the rank of
23	Commander and in 1986 was promoted to the rank of
24	Deputy Chief which made her the highest ranking
25	female officer since the department

1	reorganization in 1974.
2	(APPLAUSE).
3	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Board of Police
4	Commissioners, certificate of recognition,
5	presented to retired Police Officer Moses Baldwin
6	on behalf of the Board of Police Commissioners
7	speaking for the citizens of Detroit awards this
8	certificate of recognition to retired officer
9	Moses Baldwin as the first president of the
10	National Black Police Officers Association
11	chartered in 1971 to create an effective voice or
12	behalf of all black law enforcement officers.
13	(APPLAUSE).
14	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Madam Chair, I'd
15	like to make a motion to accept the resolution
16	presented to Mr. Andre Walk as well as the
17	certificate of recognition presented to Mr. Mose
18	Primus, Ms. Michelle West, Ms. Ebony Hunt as well
19	as Ms. Felicia Taylor and then to the NPOs, NPO
20	Abraham Blue, Jay Dantzler, Aubrey Wade as well
21	as Brad Hawkins and in addition to retired PO
22	Moses Baldwin and retired Deputy Chief Mary
23	Jarrett-Jackson.
24	COMMISSIONER VANN: Support.
25	COMMISSIONED CAPTED. It's been moved



1	and supported that we adopt the resolution for
2	Mr. Andre Walk, certificates of recognition for
3	Mose Primus, Michelle West, Ebony Hunt, Felicia
4	Taylor, Abraham Blue NPO Abraham Blue, Jay
5	Dantzler, Aubrey Wade, Bad Hawkins, retired PO
6	Moses Baldwin, retired Deputy Chief Mary
7	Jarrett-Jackson.
8	Is there any discussion? Those in
9	favor?
10	COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
11	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Those opposed?
12	The motion carries.
13	COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, I'd
14	just like to close this out by recognizing the
15	two or three individuals who helped put this
16	together, retired Lt. Alvin Bowman in the
17	audience, Felicia Jones, civilian retired from
18	DPD and Mr. Baldwin's daughter Rochelle Mitchell.
19	Thank you for coming out with your dad
20	and thank all of you in terms of helping us put
21	this together. This is the kick-off for Black
22	History Month and we're looking forward to doing
23	more of this and lifting up others who have
24	served in that capacity.
25	We just really appreciate it, thank



1	you, and I want to thank this Board for allowed
2	me to speak on this issue, pull this together and
3	thank you, Madam Chair.

5	Commissioner Bell for putting it together and for
6	having the foresight to honor those who paved the
7	way for a lot of the people, and we don't realize
8	sometimes the path that people have traveled in
9	order for us to sit in these seats and in order
10	for a lot of people to enjoy the comforts that
11	they do in the police department.
12	We take it for granted a lot, so thank
13	you for putting it together.
14	At this time is there any old business?

and that's the Community Advisory Council and
we're re-igniting a petition drive to get 1,400
signatures in District 3 so that we can have
that.

COMMISSIONER CARTER: Commissioner 22 Crawford, did you have --23



COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, that was

prior to the speaking, but what I wanted to do

24

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was thank Capt. Leach on behalf of the me
being the commissioner of the 3rd District and
even the Commission and citizens in 11th Precinct
because 11 is in the 3rd District so thank you
for that work the citizen expressed was
successful.

MS. CURRY: Board of Commissioners, officers, members of the community, my name is Alberta Curry and I'm a resident of the 9th Precinct. I've been a resident for 34 years.

I'm here to let you know that on behalf of the Spice of Life Seniors at the Shield of Faith Church where our pastor is the Bishop James Alvin Jenkins we would like to thank the officers of the 9th Precinct for all that they do in the community.

They provide transportation for the seniors to get to the community events and a lot of them would not be able to make it if it were not for the fact that they provide a prison bus for us to ride and on behalf of the Spice of Life Seniors, our President, she's 96 and she couldn't make it this evening. Our oldest member we had her homegoing celebration last week and she was 105.

1	I'm their facilitator and we just like
2	to say thank you. We really love the help that
3	they give us. They provide the transportation,
4	we have several community events that they inform
5	us of and people need to know that they are
6	welcome.
7	We'd like to thank the NPOs, Officer
8	Hawkins, Officer Blue and Officer Davis, I don't
9	think she's here, also Capt. Decker and last but
10	not least Comm. Barron, this thank you is long
11	overdue, but we deeply appreciate your heart-felt
12	kindness for providing transportation and we just
13	want the community to know that even though
14	they're out for our protection, they also provide
15	an opportunity for those some who are not
16	thought about, some of them their children have
17	gone on before them, but the officers are
18	available to us and we really thank you.
19	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Ms. Curry,
20	did you state prison bus?
21	MS. CURRY: Yes, sir.
22	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: I'm glad it has
23	a dual purpose.
24	MS. CURRY: We ride the Detroit Police



Department bus, the blue bus, and the people take

1	pictures of it.
2	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: I'm so glad
3	it's being used as a dual purpose vehicle and put
4	it into some community service. Thank you.
5	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you, ma'am.
6	(APPLAUSE.)
7	PASTOR HUNTER: Board of Commissioners
8	and all these fine officers, good to see some of
9	them on TV, officers, see them in person.
10	I've been the pastor here 37 years and
11	I didn't know what was going on, but now I know
12	the visible police force, the control of the
13	speeding on Brainard, the community help that we
14	receive when we want to close off the streets,
15	just it's been a phenomenal change in the 9th
16	Precinct in the last six or seven months.
17	So I just want to say I appreciate the
18	9th Precinct for working with the church and the
19	extra attention that we get, it's just a blessing
20	to see the improvement in our community.
21	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you, Pastor
22	Hunter.
23	(APPLAUSE.)
24	MR. BRAMCHEK: Madam Chair, Honorable
25	Commissioners, thank you for coming to our



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1	neighborhood. My name is Robert Bramchek, I live
2	across the street, three blocks over and one
3	block south of here.
4	I do want to particularly thank Police
5	Chief James Craig. I've been living in this
6	neighborhood for 26 years and by far he has done
7	more on the city than the previous chiefs
8	combined, incredible improvement in our crime
9	situation.
10	Now, for a little problem, we've had an
11	ongoing problem of my street. Only four houses
12	down there's been an active drug house. I
13	brought this up with the Councilman Benson's
14	office through Mr. Feaster as well as the NPO you
15	call them.
16	And these guys are very flagrant, very
17	bold and I'm very disappointed, it's seems to be
18	no response. I know you can't disclose an
19	ongoing operation, you can't blow your cover, but
20	I can see these guys without my trying at least
21	four times a day doing deals.
22	The Saturday before the Super Bowl it
23	was like a turkey shoot for lack of a better
24	term, hundreds of people coming by, broad
25	daylight, no attempt to hide it, and I think you



1	have to understand what this does to the
2	neighborhood.
3	It makes us feel like they are the law
4	and they have impunity there. I don't see any
5	squad cars. This is the first time I'm seen
6	squad cars in this neighborhood in a long time.
7	I know a lot of people were saying good
8	things about the 9th Precinct, but in this
9	particular situation I know we've just recently
10	broken up the Seven Mile Bloods, it was on the
11	news today.
12	It's been a on the west side there
13	was a rolling 60 Crips breaking up. Last year
14	there was Tappert Street auto stealing ring that
15	was broken out.
16	And when that happened last year I had
17	some hope that something would happen here, but I
18	have most of my people, my friends and my family
19	live in the burbs.
20	If I ever say anything about what's
21	going on they have a stock response, "Why don't
22	you move?" and I always have a stock answer,
23	"Detroit can't get any better if the good people
24	leave," all right.



These people are not paying your taxes,

1	my taxes are paying for your salaries, okay. A
2	drug dealer doesn't pay taxes. I know they're
3	not paying taxes on the house. It's due to go
4	into tax foreclosure next month, so that still
5	gives them six more months of summertime to do
6	their dirty work.
7	And although there haven't been any
8	incidents yet, there have been close calls, I've
9	seen people come around my garage.
10	COMMISSIONER CARTER: I'm going to let
11	the Chief respond.
12	Chief, if you would like to respond at
13	this time.
14	CHIEF CRAIG: Yes. Sir, what I would
15	like you to do, I have Comm. John Thomas right
16	behind you standing up, Capt. Decker.
17	I'd like both of them to talk to you
18	off to the back, give you some information and
19	then if we're not moving quick enough, certainly
20	contact my office.
21	If so if we can, Johnny, make sure that
22	or George, if you could get the information as
23	well.
24	MR. BRAMCHEK: And with respect to



Capt. Decker I hope -- I'm a military man and I

1	don't want you to think I'm going over your head
2	because this is just this is the first
3	opportunity that we had a public forum and since
4	you're here.
5	CHIEF CRAIG: No problem.
6	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you, sir.
7	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Through the
8	Chair, sir, I understand your activity because I
9	live in the neighborhood too and I've seen some
10	activities that's kind of been stepped up lately.
11	And prior to this meeting I notified
12	Capt. Decker of that, but I will say last summer
13	there was some activity in the neighborhood, as a
14	matter of fact on my street, and I went to the
15	9th Precinct and of course I coordinated some
16	I'll just say coordinated some stuff with the
17	neighbors and we had information such as license
18	plates and descriptions and basically who was
19	doing whatever and within a couple of days it was
20	resolved.
21	But I will say this too, that it is an
22	ongoing task. I mean one group you get rid of
23	and there's another group. That I know because
24	I've seen activities also too and I get phone
25	calls from the neighbors and they stop me.



1	And every time I get the information I
2	forward it and even calling Narcotics too, so
3	they have responded and I do understand, I know
4	how you feel because I've seen some activity in
5	the neighborhood and even on my street.
6	MR. BRAMCHEK: And I know a lot of
7	people say how come no one says anything. Well,
8	sometimes we feel when we do say something we
9	don't get a response. Sometimes the response
10	isn't visible. Like I say, I understand you
11	can't tip your hand, but like I say, these guys
12	are very very bold.
13	I haven't seen anything like it in the
14	whole time I've been living here and I've never
15	felt scared in my own house prior to this.
16	That's what it all comes down to.
17	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you, sir.
18	Any other comments?
19	JUDGE LYNISE BRYANT-WEEKES: Good
20	evening. I am Judge Lynise Bryant-Weekes, former
21	director of personnel for the Detroit Police
22	Department and I am standing here to ask I
23	don't know what your policy is with respect to
24	taking a stand or writing the legislation, but I
25	think that the police department is doing a great



1	job, the officers are doing an awesome job.
2	And there's a bill in the house in the
3	senate to remove another seat from the 36th
4	District Court. I am the presiding judge of the
5	Traffic and Criminal Division and I think it's
6	just an atrocity that they are trying to take
7	another one of our seats from the 36th District
8	Court.
9	So I'm asking if it is possible that
10	the Commission write some sort of letter of
11	support on our behalf to the legislature.
12	We have written a letter on behalf of
13	the bench, we have the Wolverine Bar have
14	written a letter, the Association of Black Judges
15	of Michigan have written a letter to ask not only
16	that they do not remove another seat from the
17	city of Detroit where our officers already have
18	to sit all day on cases, but that they add back
19	the seat that they took when they weren't
20	supposed to take a seat.
21	So they already took a seat from us
22	last year, they took us down to 30 and now
23	they're trying to take our seats down to 29 and

I'm just asking for the support of the Board to

ask the legislature not to do that because we are

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1	fighting crime in the city and or citizens have a
2	right not to come to a place where the courtrooms
3	are clogged and that they have to wait all day.
4	Thank you for your time and your
5	attention.
6	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you, Judge
7	Weekes, thank you for coming.
8	COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, I move
9	that we draft such a letter, direct the Board's
10	attorney to draft such a letter with the judge to
11	send to Lansing in reference to the issue that we
12	just raised. I think that would be appropriate.
13	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Support.
14	COMMISSIONER CARTER: It's been moved
15	and supported that Attorney Bernard draft a
16	letter with Judge Weekes.
17	JUDGE BRYANT-WEEKES: Thank you so much
18	and I do have that information for that contact.
19	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Is there any
20	discussion?
21	COMMISSIONER MOORE: I was just going
22	to add, who shall we send the letter to?
23	JUDGE BRYANT-WEEKES: I have the
24	information an e-mail representative sent us with
25	all of the legislature and the contact



1	information, so I'll get that to Ms. Bernard.
2	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Any further
3	discussion? Those in favor of the motion?
4	COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
5	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Those opposed?
6	Motion carries. Thank you, Judge Weekes, for
7	bringing that to our attention. Is there any
8	other oral communication, any other oral
9	communication.
10	COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Madam Chair,
11	before everybody leaves, I just wanted to make a
12	couple of announcements just to remind the
13	community that the Detroit Police Department is
14	actively recruiting for police officers and
15	information can be obtained by going to the city
16	website.
17	And in addition, the Mayor has an
18	initiative for summer youth employment and we
19	have a goal of employing 8,000 youth this summer.
20	The Detroit Police Department is
21	actively involved with this program as well, it's
22	called Grow Detroit's Young Talent and we're also
23	accepting applications for those positions right
24	now.



So please spread the word to the

1	community, to your relatives, your friends and
2	your children. Thank you so much.
3	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Okay, thank you
4	Commissioner Dewaelsche. I'm sorry, Councilman
5	Benson?
6	COUNCILMAN BENSON: Thank you, good
7	evening. Thank you all for coming to the 3rd
8	District, it's an honor to have you all here
9	today and to see all the fine Commissioners,
10	especially our 3rd District Commissioner
11	Mr. Crawford here this evening.
12	Just wanted to say and the
13	Commissioner stole my thunder, about Grow
14	Detroit's Young Talent.
15	Very excited to have that program this
16	year and we're going to increase the number of
17	jobs from 5,500 to 8,000, so last year we were
18	able to hire just under 50 percent of the
19	applicants. This year we should be at about 70
20	percent of the applicants should be able to be
21	hired this summer.
22	And so next Tuesday we're having our
23	evening 3rd District Council meeting, so at that
24	meeting we're going to have the Detroit
25	Employment Solutions job van will be there and so



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the van will be on site and they will be able to
actually apply for those jobs online via that van
and that was something that we had at Bishop
Vann's church last year during our job fair.

We had about 1,000 people show up and apply for jobs and those jobs are for the youth from the ages of 14 through 24 and there are several different tiers for different levels of experience.

I'm hoping to see as many students and I'm going to be selfish, I like to see 3rd

District youth into those job, so I'm hoping that we see a number of 3rd District youth at this

Tuesday's evening Council meeting at Galilee

Missionary Baptist Church just up the street on

Outer Drive just across the street from Randazo, and the van will be there from 6:30 to 8:30 PM

with the actual Council meeting being from 7 PM to 9 PM.

So hope to see everybody there and thank you all for coming out this evening, thanks for all the fine job that you do.

COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you. Any other oral communication? Any other oral communication.



1	MS. SMITH: Good evening. Chief, good
2	evening. To the Commissioners. My name is
3	Bernice Smith, political activist and I happen to
4	be on Chief Craig's Advisory Committee. We've
5	been very busy. I didn't get a chance to get all
6	the information, but I know we are going to be
7	doing great things.

I just want to report to the Commission Monday there was a group of people that was parading in front of the hotel, the Motor City Hotel and I was invited to participate. Of course I wasn't going to be out there marching, but anyway they were marching against the Governor because he was expected for an affair there to he honored and Malique and his group were out there, were parading in front of the hotel -- well, they were across the street and I would like to say when I pulled in Commander Barren, he was there and things were orderly, there was no problem whatsoever.

He spoke to them and they went across the street and they proceeded to do what they were doing in the beginning. Again, I want to commend the commander. Yesterday he was on TV and he was under the gun. You guys don't know



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what he has to go through when he goes through
the City Council. Most all the police, they take
care of themselves and they know how to control
their anger or whatever the case may be, but they
throwed some very hard questions at him in
regards to the cab driver situation and I think
he did a wonderful job by him and two other
police, I didn't have their names, but they gave
a good complete answer to the questions in
regards to this particular police having to give
out tickets to the cab drivers more so than any
other police and they want to know why that he
had this authority.

So that was explained and the commander did a wonderful job on that. So I just want to let the public know we have a wonderful police force. I have been associated with them since 1974 and I haven't found any kind of -- oh, let's say any disturbance that would make us want to say get rid of them, not like other cities.

So I want them to continue to do what they're doing and under your guidance, Chief, I know we're going to do a hell of a good job for the city here in Detroit.

So that's what I wanted to tell you

2	CHIEF CRAIG: Thank you.
3	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you, ma'am.
4	MS. SMITH: Oh, we have in our midst
5	State Police Chief Shaw and Shaw was working on a
6	case out in Inkster last night that I noticed and
7	he's doing a good job in what he does also.
8	So we have good authorities in our
9	midst, so we just have to appreciate them
10	whenever they come before us or have a problem.
11	I don't know, did you get a chance to
12	go to Dearborn yet because you were going to
13	Dearborn, you and the Chairperson?
14	COMMISSIONER BELL: That's on my
15	schedule for 2016, yeah.
16	MS. SMITH: I don't know if the Chief
17	knows about it, but he wants to you should
18	give him
19	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Dearborn needs
20	to come to Detroit.
21	MS. SMITH: Well, you got to do what
22	you got to do.
23	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you.
24	MS. HILL: Good evening, your honor
25	most hody of Commissioners Chief and everyone



1	who is here tonight. My name is Tonya Hill and
2	I'm also Osborn community liaison, I represent
3	Seven Mile and Hoover Block Club here on the east
4	side.
5	My question is, yesterday my husband
6	was in a car accident with a driver that hit him
7	head on going 80 miles and he just left a
8	marijuana clinic and I wanted to find out what
9	are the City or the police department going to do
10	about all these illegal marijuana clinics that
11	are still established here that is out here in
12	our district having men to go in and sell these
13	drugs outside of the marijuana clinics.
14	So I wanted to find out what is their
15	initiative that's going to be able to help us as
16	citizens to combat these illegal marijuana
17	clinics.
18	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Chief?
19	CHIEF CRAIG: Through the Chair, right
20	now we have roughly 211 what they call marijuana
21	care centers in the city of Detroit. Letters
22	have been sent out, there's been an ordinance
23	that was introduced and passed by City Council.

Effective March 1 these centers will

have to be licensed and they will have to operate

1	in a drug-free zone. There's a map, if you go to
2	the City's website that shows what constitutes a
3	drug-free zone. We think based on where those
4	zones are situated that there may be anywhere
5	remaining 40 such centers, so there will be
6	regulations, they must be licensed, the letters
7	have been sent out. There will be some training
8	provided to those who pass through the licensing,
9	so they know how to operate in a legal manner and
10	so that's in progress as we speak.
11	MS. HILL: Thank you so much.
12	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Ma'am, through
13	the Chair, also too that regulation doesn't speak
14	to or it prohibits people from getting their
15	medical marijuana, smoking it in the car in the
16	parking lot, smoking it there on the premises,
17	then getting in their car and driving, okay.
18	So in that legislation it doesn't
19	they're not supposed to be smoking, you know,
20	getting high in the parking lot after they just
21	purchased it or on the business premises.
22	MS. HILL: Well, the gentleman that was
23	high, he went through the stop sign going 80
24	miles and he hit and he kept on going, so
25	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, ma'am.



1	Well, how is your husband?
2	MS. HILL: I'm glad he's doing pretty
3	good, but I'm just saying he just left the
4	marijuana clinic, so
5	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, ma'am.
6	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you, ma'am.
7	MS. ROMANO: Good evening and I'm here
8	to speak about the nice officers that we have at
9	the 9th Precinct and also throughout the city.
10	We truly appreciate all their hard job and
11	dedication and, Chief, thank you very much for
12	your hard work and dedication to the city of
13	Detroit and to the citizens and not only the
14	residents but those who work and visit this great
15	city.
16	At the 9th Precinct we have numerous
17	community events. We reach out to the community
18	in more ways than one. The NPOs reach out to the
19	different organizations, also the different
20	pastors that's in the community. In the 9th
21	Precinct there's assistance to St. Vincent de
22	Paul, DTE for assistance with their utility
23	bills, also we have the different food banks.
24	We worked with Father Pena from Holy
25	Family Church, and the UAW. At Christmas we



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of	

delivered 50 boxes of food which consisted of	
turkeys and all the sides and trimmings with	
dessert, also 200 hot meals to residents within	
the neighborhoods of the city of Detroit.	

The officers went out to their locations and delivered them. At Thanksgiving there was another 200 meals, complete meals, that were delivered to them with turkeys with all the dressing and the sides.

And we welcome everyone to come over because the 9th Precinct is the people's precinct, it's everyone's precinct, and everyone is welcome to come in.

And there's numerous programs that are available in the community and as residents all they have to do is just reach out to the NPOs and they can point them in the right direction when it comes to all types of assistance from food to utilities and services and help with home repair.

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
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
