5 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Good afternoon.
6 Welcome to the weekly Board of Police Commissioners
7 Meeting. My name is Lisa Carter, chair to the
8 commission and to my immediate left is Vice Chair Willie
9 Bell. At this time I'm going to ask that each
10 commissioner introduce themselves since we don't have a
11 rollcall. I'm sorry that Commissioner Vann do the
12 invocation and then we'll introduce. Thank you.

13 (Invocation given.)

14 COMMISSIONER CARTER: At this time I'm going
15 to ask that each commissioner introduce themselves
16 starting with Mr. Shelby.

17 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Commissioner Richard
18 Shelby, representing District 1.

19 COMMISSIONER VANN: Commissioner Edgar Vann,
20 District 2.

21 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Commissioner
22 Reginald Crawford, District 3.

23 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Commissioner Willie
24 Burton represent the mighty 5th District.

25 COMMISSIONER BELL: Commissioner Willie

1 Bell, District 4.

2 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Commissioner Ricardo
3 Moore, District 7.

4 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Commissioner Elizabeth
5 Brooks, appointee.

6 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: Commissioner Derek
7 Sanders, appointee.

8 COMMISSIONER CARTER: And again I'm Lisa
9 Carter, I represent District 6. Commissioner Eva
10 Dewaelesche has been asked to be excused. At this time
11 I'd like to introduce the -- we do have a quorum for the
12 record -- introduce the chief of the Detroit Police
13 Department Chief James Craig. Good afternoon, sir.

14 CHIEF CRAIG: Good afternoon. Thank you.
15 And my staff is with me. We could start.

16 COMMANDER BETTISON: Commander Todd
17 Bettison. Chief of staff.

18 ASSISTANT CHIEF STAIR: Good afternoon
19 everyone. I'm first Assistant Chief Lashinda Stair.
20 Stair.

21 MS. WASHINGTON: Good afternoon, Celia
22 Washington, legal adviser.

23 MR. OAKU: Good afternoon, my name is Felix
24 Oaku, financial officer.

25 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you so much.

1 CHIEF CRAIG: In the back a 40 year veteran
2 in the police department our sergeant.

3 SERGEANT PERRY: Sergeant Curtis Perry.

4 CHIEF CRAIG: 40 years, yes?

5 MR. OAKU: Yes, sir.

6 COMMISSIONER CARTER: At this time the rest
7 of the staff that's here are George Anthony, the board
8 secretary has asked to be excused. Director Gail
9 Oxendine has asked to be excused. Pamela Davis Drake
10 she is -- she's on her way down, okay. Linda Bernard
11 attorney to the board is coming to the microphone as we
12 speak.

13 MS. BERNARD: Thank you, Madam Chair.

14 COMMISSIONER CARTER: And Robert Brown is
15 the administrative assistant is here and the court
16 reporter for today is Caitlyn Mancini. At this time,
17 Commissioners, you have before you the agenda for
18 Thursday, February 18th. Is there a motion to approve
19 the agenda?

20 COMMISSIONER BELL: So moved.

21 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Support.

22 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Been moved and
23 supported that we approve the agenda for Thursday,
24 February 18th. Is there any discussion? Those in
25 favor?

1 ALL: Aye.

2 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Those opposed? Motion
3 carries. Before you, Commissioner you have the minutes
4 from Thursday, February 11th. Is there a motion to
5 approve the minutes?

6 COMMISSIONER MOORE: So moved.

7 COMMISSIONER VANN: I so move Madam Chair.

8 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Support.

9 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you. It's been
10 moved and supported that we adopt the minutes from
11 Thursday, February 11th, 2016. Is there any discussion?
12 Those in favor?

13 ALL: Aye.

14 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Those opposed? Motion
15 carries. At this time my report for the week includes
16 just the meeting that we had with the chief and his
17 staff regarding the budget so I'm going to, since that's
18 next on the agenda, turn the microphone over to Chief
19 Craig.

20 CHIEF CRAIG: Okay, thank you. I know part
21 of what I want to discuss is what we're referring to as
22 the ideal precinct structure and I don't know if it's
23 more appropriate to let Felix do his overall budget and
24 then break out this new model.

25 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Actually, I thought it

1 was going to be A.C. Stair for the budget. Which one?

2 CHIEF CRAIG: Well, whoever's going to do
3 the budget and then I'll talk specifically to the ideal
4 neighborhood precinct.

5 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Okay.

6 ASSISTANT CHIEF STAIR: First Assistant
7 Chief Stair, Lashinda, for the record. Yes, and I can
8 talk about the budget. Certainly, I'm not a budget
9 person, per se, but I understand our budget as it is
10 presented and ACFO Oaku did an incredible job with
11 balancing the budget. I think everybody has a copy of
12 the budget before them. And I'm going to look for --

13 MS. BERNARD: We need one extra.

14 ASSISTANT CHIEF STAIR: One extra? Page
15 three.

16 MS. BERNARD: Got it. Never mind.

17 ASSISTANT CHIEF STAIR: That's the budget
18 summary for fiscal year '17. So this is the highlight
19 of our budget the 301.8 million dollar budget, which is
20 the baseline budget, which was actually uploaded into
21 the system from the EM. So this is not something we put
22 together on our own; this was what was uploaded for
23 fiscal year '17 as the triannual budget that they
24 prepared when we were under the EM's watch.

25 So that 301.8 million dollars is there as a

1 baseline. Below that is the DPD human resources plan
2 that's 15 million dollars and that is the fringes and
3 the salaries for the promotions or I'm sorry, excuse me,
4 for the raises that the union members just received so
5 the 4 percent increase, 2 percent if you have college,
6 the tuition reimbursement and so on. So that's what
7 that came up to with the fringes.

8 Capital Equipment and major repairs in the
9 Jack Grant is what we have. The Jack Grant that we
10 generally get every single year is one of our larger
11 grants so that's what we use for technology. So the
12 intent is to have a million dollars there to certainly
13 use for technology for realtime crime center and things
14 like that.

15 And then those other incidentals are
16 everything from materials and supplies to run a police
17 department, training in certain areas, testing in
18 certain areas that we need. And so our department what
19 we came up with what Felix put together as presented was
20 320.3. And when we met last week with the mayor at
21 10:15 on Friday, the budget director downtown
22 recommendation was 321.1 million. So you see that we
23 weren't off by very much at all and that is exactly the
24 same budget that we presented to the budget committee of
25 the Board of Police Commissioners a few weeks ago.

1 And so mainly that is the explanation for
2 the budget. You'll notice that from A through D Felix
3 has set up an explanation for you down at the bottom.
4 One of the things that came out was, and I think this
5 will be a good time for the chief to talk about the
6 ideal precinct structure and we'll tell you how we were
7 able to budget it because we didn't get any additional
8 funding than what you see right here on this paper.

9 CHIEF CRAIG: Thank you and as it's pointed
10 out no additional funding but here's some good news and
11 I got to take you back in time just a bit because when I
12 was appointed back in July of 2013, in the Detroit
13 Police Department we had something called districts.
14 Because of the districts they had lost in my judgment
15 some connectivity to the neighbors. I know why it was
16 done: It was done I guess at the time to improve or cut
17 costs, precincts or districts were closed. So the
18 community did not have access.

19 So after I got here it was clear to me with
20 these districts we had an inordinate number of command
21 level officers and so one of the first things I did was
22 eliminate 12 command level positions. Of that number of
23 the 12, 9 of them were commander rank because the way it
24 was placed throughout the department, it seemed to not
25 have a real meaning. We had these districts so as I

1 began to look more at how we respond to the public: We
2 had a very high response time, there was no real -- it
3 was no investigative work being done out of the
4 districts as it relates to the neighborhoods it was
5 serving. Everything was pretty much centralized. So
6 that was a problem.

7 So after taking some initial looks at it,
8 one of the things that I really wanted was to bring in
9 what I call a detective rank, which we were able to
10 accomplish earlier in my tenure. But the idea of
11 bringing a detective rank was to bring detectives back
12 to the neighborhoods so they could do investigations at
13 the neighborhood level but that said, we had to have
14 someone supervise them so it was logical to put
15 lieutenants over as what we called First Lieutenants.

16 Unfortunately, one of the things I was
17 looking to do at that time because of the additional
18 responsibility of these particular lieutenants we were
19 going to give them a slight pay increase and the unions
20 at the time though weren't interested in creating a pay
21 level for patrol lieutenants as compare to what we
22 called First Lieutenants. So we aborted the idea and we
23 moved on with continuing to expand neighborhood precinct
24 operations along with the detective rank as you know we
25 created the neighborhood police officers, which are

1 throughout the city now. So we disbanded the whole
2 district model and went back to what many of you know as
3 the precincts. But as doing that it became increasingly
4 clear that we were lacking in management oversight.
5 Some of the board members I know who was on the
6 department when we had a commander and then a former, an
7 inspector who is now has been renamed captain leading in
8 those neighborhood precincts.

9 And then when it became a distinct, they
10 imbedded deputy chiefs in. So some of these buildings
11 had two deputy chiefs, if I'm correct. Well, no, one
12 deputy chief per district and two commanders. So there
13 was a lot of duplication of work but still no real
14 improved service to the community. So not only we went
15 back to the precinct model and looking at
16 accountability, it became clear that we need to
17 reestablish accountability at the precinct level by
18 having at least two management level people: One the
19 commander, who is the overall neighborhood precinct
20 commanding officer, and then a second ranking member
21 who's a commanding officer, the captain, which we have
22 now. And then build out from there. Certainly, each of
23 the shifts we have lieutenants leading and managing each
24 shift and then because we now have detectives back in
25 the precincts what we call PDU Lieutenant.

1 Again, lieutenants pay are the same. The
2 only difference is that we now instead of having the
3 captain, the lone salaried employee, would be a
4 commander and a captain. Again, this is being done not
5 with adding money to our budget; just looking at how we
6 structure the department to be more efficient in serving
7 the community.

8 One of the things that I pointed out early
9 in my remarks was that we're poised to fully complete
10 oversight by the federal government in March of this
11 year on the consent judgment. But what's as important
12 as that is that as a constitutional police department we
13 must, must maintain sustainability. In order to
14 continue sustainability, we to have appropriate
15 management level.

16 Now, and I don't think we have the existing
17 management chart, so we are moving some commander from 9
18 in central positions that they sit now and placing them
19 back at the helm of the precincts. Some of the existing
20 captains who are sitting in precinct seats now and
21 running the precincts will probably get promoted based
22 on what they've done in terms of managing their
23 respective commands. As it was brought out to earlier
24 meeting, one thing I'm very sensitive to is consistency
25 and sustainability as it relates to command

1 relationships in neighborhoods. I know that's been
2 something that was talked about early during my tenure
3 because it was a tremendous movement; captains were
4 being moved around but I remained committed in making
5 sure that we keep a consistent command level officer in
6 that.

7 So as we look at promotions there may be
8 some of the captains who are sitting in those seats who
9 will remain as a commanding officer; they just may be
10 given a promotion in response to that. So that's kind
11 of the short of this new structure, which really is not
12 a new structure; kind of going back to the way the
13 department was set up when we had individual
14 neighborhood precincts and so I don't know if there's
15 more to the budget or are you ready to take questions.

16 ASSISTANT CHIEF STAIR: Well, I just wanted
17 to make the point for the entire board that with that
18 said we had already been pretty much told that this is
19 the amount of money that you would be allotted to work
20 with and so because of that and because of some of the
21 changes they're making sure that we have the ideal
22 structure and have the commanders at the precinct, that
23 was cause for approximately six commanders, people to be
24 promoted to commander, and then an additional six to be
25 promoted to captain.

1 If you look at the staffing document that we
2 have up here and you have in your packet, you'll notice
3 that it indicates that it's an eight number as the
4 variance for both the commanders and the captains.
5 That's because for some reason last year we were only
6 budgeted for six commanders even though we actually had
7 eight so I think that was some kind of typo that nobody
8 caught. And so we wanted to fix that and add the,
9 certainly, the six commanders that the chief will
10 promote.

11 In addition to captains was the same thing
12 we're promoting six initially but there are two other
13 ones. We only have one captain assigned to night patrol
14 and so, you know, that's very difficult and what happens
15 is that person has to get a day or two off, get leave
16 days, get furloughs, has to go to training and that so
17 we wanted to increase the, what we call the 2400 to
18 another captain and certainly we need a captain-level
19 person at the range or at the training academy as well.

20 So with those two in addition to the six
21 that will be promoted based upon the ideal precinct
22 structure that's how we aligned it. You may notice,
23 too, that the number in the variance is a minus 48 for
24 the sergeant ranks. And as we indicated in an earlier
25 meeting, sergeants and police officers the ratio was 1

1 to 10 so we certainly don't have 4,000 police officers
2 on the police department now. We don't have 3600 but we
3 do have budgeted the recommendation is for 365 sergeants
4 and taking that number down is what we were able to do
5 in order to pay for some of the changes that we want to
6 do at the top of the organization.

7 So that's pretty much it as to how we got
8 there; we didn't take any numbers from the police
9 officer ranks. Certainly, we actually were able to add
10 some as we continue to hire with the new goal of trying
11 to hire actually 30 every month. So that's pretty much
12 our budget.

13 CHIEF CRAIG: And then I just wanted to also
14 add and kind of reinforce during this presentation when
15 we look at the ideal neighborhood precinct, this is
16 really bringing the precinct back into the
17 neighborhoods, reinforcing the importance of that
18 relationship, and we know under this structure we can
19 take it to the next level. It also allows us to flatten
20 the organization, cuts out the layer of bureaucracy that
21 kind of inhibits getting things done. The idea is
22 accountability because we talked about the consent
23 judgment but also continuing to build relationships in
24 the neighborhoods.

25 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Commissioners, do you

1 have any questions for the chief or?

2 COMMISSIONER VANN: I have one quick one
3 Madam Chair. With regard to miscellaneous income, is
4 that I thought I saw something that said miscellaneous
5 but I don't know what it was referring to.

6 MR. OAKU: You talking about income or
7 expenditure?

8 COMMISSIONER VANN: Well, I thought that
9 there possibly would be some income whether it's made or
10 whatever.

11 MR. OAKU: Oh forfeitures.

12 COMMISSIONER VANN: Forfeitures. Auctions.

13 MR. OAKU: Things like that the fees,
14 tickets, secondary income.

15 COMMISSIONER VANN: So this is the number.

16 MR. OAKU: Which number are you referring
17 to, sir?

18 COMMISSIONER VANN: I thought I saw 7, I'm
19 sorry. Yes, where it says miscellaneous receipts. Is
20 that it or?

21 MR. OAKU: You're looking at a detail? What
22 line item?

23 COMMISSIONER VANN: What do you have it
24 costing?

25 MR. OAKU: Cost 474,100, yes.

1 COMMISSIONER VANN: Okay.

2 MR. OAKU: Yes.

3 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Commissioner Vann was
4 your question answered?

5 MR. OAKU: Is that your question?

6 COMMISSIONER VANN: No, I'm just saying is
7 that where you have, that income costed out?

8 MR. OAKU: Those would be those things that
9 are not specifically listed here. Those incomes that
10 are not like the other incomes that are not specifically
11 listed.

12 COMMISSIONER VANN: Okay and so there's a
13 variance there?

14 MR. OAKU: Okay. Right. Well, actually
15 that is not -- so what is your question specifically,
16 sir?

17 COMMISSIONER VANN: Well, I'm just trying to
18 understand your figures here.

19 MR. OAKU: Okay there's a variance.

20 COMMISSIONER VANN: Yeah, explain that to
21 me.

22 ASSISTANT CHIEF STAIR: May I? Assistant
23 Chief Stair. So part of that variance is, and when
24 you're talking about all the different revenues that the
25 department would receive, prior to us having the alarm

1 system, the verified alarm systems, we anticipated that
2 we would receive a lot of money for false calls for
3 alarm systems but then somewhere down the line we
4 decided to go to the verified alarm system. So
5 generally speaking we don't charge for false alarms
6 because we don't go to any false alarms anymore.

7 So that part of the variances and then
8 income tax revenue, things like that that generally
9 would fund us, there was some change and so that's where
10 the variance came to but ultimately the 301.8 that was
11 initially in the baseline in addition to all the things
12 we talked about, like the 15 million for the pay for the
13 officers and that, so we got to, what, 320 point
14 whatever that is. That's still what we had to end up
15 with. And so we had to consider the fact that we don't
16 make money like we thought we would make money in the
17 past. And so that's where they pulled the money and
18 that's where the variance is.

19 COMMISSIONER VANN: So you're expecting half
20 of the -- in '17 you're expecting half of the revenue
21 basically?

22 ASSISTANT CHIEF STAIR: Yes, sir.

23 COMMISSIONER VANN: The alarm thing is that
24 much money?

25 ASSISTANT CHIEF STAIR: It would have been.

1 MR. OAKU: It would have been but we're not
2 going to get that.

3 COMMISSIONER VANN: That's a lot of alarms.
4 All right.

5 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Any other questions,
6 Commissioners? Commissioner Moore.

7 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Yes, ma'am, through the
8 chair. It was stated that the budget was already given
9 to us from the emergency manager.

10 MR. OAKU: The baseline.

11 ASSISTANT CHIEF STAIR: The baseline budget
12 was, yes.

13 COMMISSIONER MOORE: So what is your role,
14 sir, in the budget? What was your role?

15 MR. OAKU: Well, my role was to basically
16 review that budget. And --

17 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Use the microphone,
18 please.

19 MR. OAKU: My role was to actually make
20 sense of what was given to us to validate that budget
21 and I did that and in the review with the mayor, I used
22 past history, for instance, that five year history of
23 expenditures for the City and to validate what was given
24 to us and using, for instance, the actual run rate for
25 the department year to date to make sure that the budget

1 that we are presenting made sense.

2 COMMISSIONER MOORE: So you didn't actually
3 create it; you just kind of...

4 MR. OAKU: Yes, I didn't create it; I tried
5 to validate but moving forward I will be taking on issue
6 of the budget for the police department.

7 COMMISSIONER MOORE: And this question is
8 more so for the chief or for the first assistant chief,
9 what is the role of the sergeant in today's Detroit
10 Police Department?

11 CHIEF CRAIG: The role of the sergeant,
12 sergeant first line supervisor that role has not
13 changed.

14 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Which is in the
15 neighborhoods?

16 CHIEF CRAIG: Well, not necessarily. One of
17 the things that was very odd for me coming in the door
18 and was not an efficient way of doing business, I think
19 sergeants make roughly 20 percent more than police
20 officers; that's the way things have shaken out but yet
21 only sergeants were working in investigations. Sergeant
22 supervisors and many of these sergeants in investigative
23 assignments were not supervising; they were doing line
24 investigative work and in comes now the proposal that
25 was adopted early in my tenure was to create the

1 detective rank because all of a sudden there were
2 detectives and police officers doing line work in terms
3 of investigations. I wanted supervisors supervising and
4 yes there are sergeants that still work in investigative
5 assignments but they're supervising detectives and
6 they're supervising investigators and police officers.

7 COMMISSIONER MOORE: And the reason why I
8 asked that, Chief, is because you've gone down 48
9 sergeants but you've increased the commanders by about
10 110 percent. So that's why I was looking at it if that
11 is the neighborhood budget.

12 CHIEF CRAIG: This is not, as it was pointed
13 by first assistant chief, we were staffing sergeants as
14 if we were a police department of 3500. We are not a
15 police department of 3500 and we're very keenly aware of
16 the supervisor-officer ratio. What's more important is
17 those management level positions in those individual
18 precincts because we have to consider accountability,
19 continue to reduce crime, our relationships in the
20 community, and best way to accomplish all those things
21 and sustainability beyond federal oversight, the best
22 way to do that is to ensure that we have the right
23 management staff in the seats.

24 Now one of the advantages and I didn't touch
25 on it, not in this meeting, certainly if we just had the

1 captain and the lieutenants, lieutenants who are doing
2 more work for no additional pay, we're talking about
3 individuals who are not salaried employees but who are
4 subject to overtime. Captains and above are salaried
5 and they don't earn overtime so in one sense it's a
6 savings because it's clear that some of the lieutenants
7 based on their role in the department and overtime will
8 make more money than the captains so that's...

9 COMMISSIONER MOORE: So that overtime budget
10 how is that compared from last year to -- anticipated
11 from this year?

12 CHIEF CRAIG: I'm sorry?

13 COMMISSIONER MOORE: The overtime budget,
14 how is that compared from last year as anticipated or
15 was there an anticipation done?

16 CHIEF CRAIG: Well I'll let the budget
17 analysts discuss that overtime issue.

18 MR. OAKU: Could you repeat that question,
19 please.

20 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Was there an analysis
21 done on overtime compared to last year?

22 MR. OAKU: Yes, there was but I don't have
23 the exact number now to give you but I can certainly
24 give you that number.

25 CHIEF CRAIG: Let me just address the

1 overtime in this sense: You know, one of the things
2 that drives a lot of our overtime is certainly staffing
3 so if we had -- and that's at the police officer level
4 as well and so if we're short police officers, we're
5 bringing police officers in on time and a half so that
6 drives -- so one of the things that we're trying to do
7 is push forward to ensure that we're filling those
8 vacant police officer positions along with
9 civilianization. Did you want to add something to that?

10 ASSISTANT CHIEF STAIR: Yeah, and just by
11 that number I think that's probably where you were
12 going, Commissioner.

13 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Yeah, specifically
14 sergeants rank, though, because I'm just concerned about
15 the decrease in the amount of sergeants but then
16 increase in the amount of commanders so that's just my
17 personal view. You can switch off to somebody else.

18 ASSISTANT CHIEF STAIR: So the actual number
19 of sergeants, this shows what we recommended as far as
20 the budgeted numbers but I think to date the actual
21 number of sergeants in the police department is 313 so
22 where you see that there's a decline in the budgeted
23 number, that is correct because we're trying to get in
24 better in line with where we need to be as a department
25 but we still have several vacancies in the sergeant's

1 budget to promote sergeants to that rank. So it's not
2 like we're, you know, pulling more. We don't even have
3 the ones that we're saying that we want out there. It's
4 365 that we recommend for the budget for 2017; however,
5 today we have only 313.

6 So as you all know also director is working
7 on pulling off a huge assessment center next week
8 because we are going through the promotional process and
9 so, you know, once we get that list, I'm sure the chief
10 will be hitting that to promote new lieutenants and
11 sergeants because right now for sure I know there are 13
12 positions in patrol alone where there is a need for
13 lieutenant and certainly for lieutenant, if someone
14 makes lieutenant, then we'll have to fill those sergeant
15 positions back, fill sergeant positions as well.

16 COMMISSIONER MOORE: And just for the
17 record, Madam Chair, I just received this budget five
18 minutes before the meeting started so I haven't even
19 looked through it thoroughly. Thank you.

20 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Yes. And you are
21 before the budget city council next week?

22 ASSISTANT CHIEF STAIR: Yes, ma'am, Friday
23 the 26th at 1:00.

24 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Madam Chair.

25 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Commissioner Crawford.

1 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, ma'am. First
2 Assistant Chief, you stated you weren't a budget person
3 but you seem to be doing a pretty good job.

4 ASSISTANT CHIEF STAIR: Thank you, sir.

5 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: I see you have an
6 increase of 31 officers from 1624 to 1655 I noted two
7 years ago when we came on to the commission it was 1666
8 so I -- it was still kind of a negative 11 and the
9 reason I said that, too, because in our budget, the
10 commission's budget, I received a communique, I guess in
11 the early in the week, in terms of what was proposed
12 that they're taking six police officers that were
13 budgeted in our budget and I guess returning the
14 positions to the department but the commission is
15 keeping the half million dollars or I guess that's
16 what's proposed. I'm totally opposed to that. And my
17 reasons is that: You know, if there's six police
18 officers with budgeted positions leaving, then the money
19 should follow them.

20 However, and I say that too because as we
21 need more police officers on the street thus they need
22 the backup and also, too, I need to talk about response
23 time. However, I did receive a communique on just,
24 actually, after this meeting started from chief
25 investigator's office that talks about the OCI and --

1 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Commissioner Crawford,
2 I'm sorry to interrupt you, I really am; we're going to
3 talk about that. That's regarding the office space?

4 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, ma'am, but I
5 was going to also state in terms of that happening maybe
6 some of the funding, some of the funding may be deeded
7 to for future unknowns in terms of where the OCI is
8 going to be housed, particularly in terms of it talks
9 about here number as to what the cost of the move is.

10 So you know, in stating what I said earlier
11 in terms of about a half million dollars, you know, I'm
12 opposed to keeping the money and sending the positions;
13 however, maybe some of that money may be needed since we
14 don't have space.

15 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Right.

16 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: At this time. Thank
17 you.

18 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you,
19 Commissioner Crawford.

20 ASSISTANT CHIEF STAIR: Through the chair.

21 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Yes, ma'am.

22 ASSISTANT CHIEF STAIR: Madam, so just to
23 clarify too with the police officer rank, the MPO rank
24 is actually a part of the police officer rank. Just
25 for, you know, so the numbers may appear that they're

1 lower but if we add the MPO number to the actual police
2 officer rank that's separated here today, that will
3 probably explain the variance for when you first came on
4 board.

5 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, ma'am, thank
6 you.

7 ASSISTANT CHIEF STAIR: And then also the
8 ranks that you talked about the six police officers or
9 whatever, that is a part I believe of your supplemental
10 request and certainly we don't have anything to do with
11 it, and I did find out today when we talked to them last
12 about ours to make sure that we were good, the only
13 thing they told us was that they weren't going to give
14 us any additional money, that they will have a report
15 out for you all tomorrow in regards to that supplemental
16 report. So that should be able to provide some clarity
17 as it relates to what the intent is with the budget
18 department downtown.

19 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, ma'am, thank
20 you.

21 ASSISTANT CHIEF STAIR: Yes, sir.

22 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Commissioners, any
23 other questions? Commissioner Shelby.

24 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Yeah, through the
25 chair. I concur with the chief with respect to the

1 commanders position, having sat in that seat. You know,
2 commanders have a tremendous amount of work. When you
3 have a second individual working in the shop who can
4 take on some of the lesser duties, it does afford the
5 commander more time to go out and interact with the
6 community.

7 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you, sir.

8 CHIEF CRAIG: And through the chair I just
9 want to also echo that but this ideal structure can
10 support as can the department continues to grow, this
11 will stabilize the precinct model. Again, we didn't
12 have a precinct model two and half years ago. We had
13 districts and it wasn't set up appropriately so it was
14 wise to eliminate a lot of positions. So this is a
15 restoration of kind of a model that existed that made
16 sense it's just now moving forward we really need to go
17 in that direction.

18 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you, Chief. Any
19 other -- Commissioner Sanders?

20 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: Through the chair I
21 mean that we approve the budget for the Detroit Police
22 Department.

23 COMMISSIONER BELL: Second.

24 COMMISSIONER CARTER: It's been moved and
25 supported that we approve the budget for the Detroit

1 Police Department.

2 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: 2017 Detroit Police
3 Department budget.

4 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Is there any
5 discussion? Those in favor of the motion?

6 All: Aye.

7 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Those opposed?

8 COMMISSIONER MOORE: No.

9 COMMISSIONER CARTER: The motion carries.
10 The budget is approve. Thank you.

11 ASSISTANT CHIEF STAIR: Thank you very much.

12 CHIEF CRAIG: Am I still on my report? I
13 just want to address one additional issue, Madam Chair,
14 in I guess your informational packet the attorney placed
15 some information that's a dated article, in case the
16 question comes up, I want to address it in a transparent
17 way, October 24th, 2013 I don't know why it's in here
18 now but title of the article: Chief Craig can't make an
19 arrest. He's not certified as a cop. Inaccurate,
20 untrue. There's been no requirement of a Detroit police
21 officer one, to be MCOLE certified.

22 In fact, one example that comes to mind is
23 former police chief Ike McKinnon. So that said one of
24 the things I began to look at was having police powers
25 having been in the business now 38 years I became

1 deputized as a Wayne County sheriff probably well over a
2 year so I in fact do have police hours -- powers. I can
3 make arrests throughout the county, not the city of
4 Detroit, but the county. In terms of carrying a firearm
5 I have a retired Los Angeles Police Department CCW.
6 That's good for five years. It's renewed every five
7 years. I also have a Michigan CPL that's current and in
8 addition to being deputized as a Wayne County sheriff so
9 I just want to put on the record since this was included
10 in the packet dated from October 24th, 2013.

11 MS. BERNARD: It was just given to me.

12 CHIEF CRAIG: I'll take any questions anyone
13 might have.

14 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Questions for the --

15 COMMISSIONER VANN: Madam Chair.

16 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Yes, Commissioner
17 Vann.

18 COMMISSIONER VANN: And I may not be in
19 order for saying this but I think something like of this
20 nature that may or may not cast an aspersion on someone
21 in leadership from so long ago is not germane to this
22 packet that we should receive it -- we should be
23 receiving. And I don't think I think that if there is
24 an issue with regard to the chief's ability to arrest or
25 to carry a firearm, that commissioners are aware of and

1 he's sitting right here in the meeting we can ask him.

2 But I think that an article it's kind of
3 dubious to me that an article from three or four years
4 ago is placed in our packet today in 2016 for us to take
5 a look at, which has already been addressed by the chief
6 as well, and it just doesn't seem germane to what we
7 ought to be receiving and I'm just pointing that out for
8 whatever it's worth.

9 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Appreciate your
10 comments and I don't think chief that you owed us any
11 explanation as you are very capable of doing the job
12 that you're doing.

13 CHIEF CRAIG: And I thank you Madam Chair
14 and I just felt obligated.

15 COMMISSIONER CARTER: I understand.

16 CHIEF CRAIG: To answer that question.

17 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Madam --

18 COMMISSIONER CARTER: I'm sorry.

19 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: I'm sorry Madam
20 Chair. Also to in reference to CCW, CPLs there is
21 federal law that anyone who's a retired police officer
22 who retires from the department in good standing -- as a
23 matter of fact, George Bush was one of the few things
24 that I agree with who was the president at the time
25 signed into law and I think President Obama updated it,

1 if one is retired in good standing from a police
2 department, all you need -- you can go anywhere in the
3 country working, I mean, being in any city or state any
4 jurisdiction whereas you don't need a CPO as long as you
5 have ID and a badge that shows that you've retired in
6 good standing from that department.

7 Also to in reference to Wayne County I'm
8 sworn deputy, I work for the Wayne County sheriff's
9 department and that arrest powers, et cetera are good
10 within the county, which the city of Detroit is in Wayne
11 County and historically, Chief Ike McKinnon, Chief Jerry
12 Oliver also was not MCOLES certified so to speak. So
13 just wanted to put that on the record.

14 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you Commissioner
15 Crawford.

16 COMMISSIONER MOORE: I have a question ma'am
17 through the chair. So is it proper to ask where that
18 came from?

19 MS. BERNARD: Yes, that's no problem.
20 Commissioner, a member of the chief's staff gave it to
21 me. I didn't know -- I didn't even pay attention; I
22 just put it in the packet, but a member of your staff
23 gave it to me. I had no knowledge of it whatsoever.
24 But it didn't matter because you were still a certified
25 chief whether you could do that or not is not the issue.

1 CHIEF CRAIG: A member -- through the chair,
2 a member of my staff?

3 MS. BERNARD: That's correct. I did not
4 have this article until this week. No it wasn't -- no
5 member of our staff gave it to me. In color just like
6 you see it.

7 CHIEF CRAIG: I understand that. So
8 worth -- anyway I'll let that go.

9 MS. BERNARD: I apologize for it being
10 inserted. I didn't even pay attention to the date
11 because it was just given to me so I assumed it was
12 contemporaneous but I knew it was irrelevant to the
13 position because you are the chief and you're not
14 certainly not been challenged in that regard.

15 CHIEF CRAIG: And just so you know, I mean,
16 I understand that why the article was written when it
17 was written; there's probably not a lot of individuals
18 that know I'm deputized as a deputy sheriff.

19 MS. BERNARD: Okay.

20 CHIEF CRAIG: But I just want to get it on
21 the record but I just find it interesting as it's been
22 already pointed out that this would show up from a 2013
23 article and just for the record my staff, most of them
24 maybe some exceptions, they do support the work that
25 we're doing today in the Detroit Police Department.

1 MS. BERNARD: Okay thank you.

2 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you, Chief. At
3 this time are there any questions, I'm sorry, for the
4 chief? No. Okay. Standing committee reports? Any
5 standing committee reports? Chief Investigator Drake
6 has an update for us and we'll take that at this time.
7 Regarding the office.

8 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: Madam Chair, through
9 the chair. I just wanted to make a small announcement
10 for what I see about the Detroit Police Department how
11 they are helping them and helping OCI to move; they've
12 been there from the beginning to help out with space,
13 and they've been a great team for us at OCI to move
14 forward and helping us out to keep them where we need
15 them at.

16 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you Commissioner
17 Sanders. Chief Investigator Drake.

18 CHIEF INVESTIGATOR DRAKE: Yes, thank you
19 Madam Chair. Thank you Commissioner Sanders. For the
20 record, Pamela Davis Drake, Chief Investigator. Forgive
21 my, first of all, tardiness for being here; this
22 literally the memo that I gave you is hot off the press;
23 had about 20 minutes to put it together. So overlook
24 any typos if there are any. But I just wanted to give
25 you an update on the move. As you recall I proposed a

1 plan to the board probably three months ago when we
2 first moved into the board's space and into headquarters
3 with regard to a suite that is directly across from the
4 board's office where the office, the investigators would
5 be moving over into. At that time it would free up
6 actually several cubicles in the board's office.

7 It was also determined at that time that the
8 city would continue to look for space for us. I was
9 informed yesterday actually of the fact that the move
10 that was supposed to happen, the move into the suite
11 across from the board's office, was going to come to
12 about 30,000 dollars and that the DBA or I'm sorry the
13 General Services Division, which was originally the
14 department went to the General Service Division to ask
15 for that money because quite frankly they have been, the
16 DPD has been absorbing a lot of the cost -- thank you,
17 sir -- for the OCI to be where we are now and to move;
18 and that was just justified given the fact that GSD
19 really was the one that dropped the ball here.

20 So I was told that as a result of that, that
21 request, the GSD did come up with an alternate plan.
22 The alternate plan was to move us out of the
23 headquarters into a temporary location of the water
24 board. We did go over to the water board today to take
25 a look at it and DPD did go with us and we looked at the

1 space; the space is not conducive to our needs
2 unfortunately. There's some restrictions there and, of
3 course, there is no additional money to put into that
4 location.

5 The other caveat is that the DBA has chosen
6 to complete the Merrill Plaisance building. So that
7 building they're going to go forward with but there may
8 not -- the building may not be completed for about a
9 year. So given that the move would be very temporary;
10 it would be for a year, approximately a year. We would
11 have to move there and then leave that facility and move
12 to the permanent location.

13 So I met with the board, the subcommittee,
14 the budget committee this afternoon and I can --
15 Commissioner Sanders and Commissioner Brooks, you
16 certainly can elaborate on your findings, but basically
17 I've requested that 30,000 dollars come out of the
18 board's budget. It looks like the money is there but I
19 will let Commissioner Sanders speak to that.

20 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the chair I
21 just want to say, you know if the --

22 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Commissioner Burton.
23 Commissioner Sanders is going to speak first and then
24 you can speak.

25 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: Thank you.

1 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you.

2 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: The money is there to
3 be allocated for that move and I think the move is a
4 great move because for what we'd be paying to keep
5 moving them from space to space to space, which we will
6 be getting four of our old offices back so if a
7 commissioner need to be there, he'd have his own office
8 there.

9 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Office space cubical.

10 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: Yeah, office space
11 cubical I'm sorry. So I look forward, and all the
12 commissioners looking forward to approving this.
13 Because it's a great help for all of us and it takes
14 away the situation that we've been dealing with for a
15 long period of time.

16 CHIEF INVESTIGATOR DRAKE: Thank you, sir.

17 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Any other comments?
18 Commissioner.

19 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the chair I'd
20 just like to address that, you know, the budget
21 meeting -- the budget committee met and I was not
22 notified regarding the budget meeting, didn't receive an
23 e-mail or anything and here it is we're making a
24 decision today that I think we should be able to as
25 commissioners we should entertain this at a later time

1 so we can all look at the, you know, look at this, you
2 know, what's in front of us.

3 Once again this has not been presented to me
4 within this board meeting. So I haven't had time to
5 look at this or to get, you know, have any hands on this
6 but, you know, and why the budget committee has met, I'm
7 a member of the budget committee and didn't even --
8 didn't receive any notice that the budget committee was
9 meeting or any notification. So how's all of this is
10 being worked out and I'm a member of this committee and
11 I haven't had any indication or any notification.

12 COMMISSIONER CARTER: I don't know how the
13 meeting -- I'm sorry did you have to say something?

14 CHIEF INVESTIGATOR DRAKE: Yes, I can
15 address that Madam Chair if you'll allow and certainly
16 if you will allow. I left messages for all of the
17 budget committee members with the exception of
18 Commissioner Dewaelsche. I don't know if you received
19 it or not; apparently, it sounds like you did not but I
20 left messages for everyone involved per Commissioner
21 Brooks.

22 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the chair.

23 CHIEF INVESTIGATOR DRAKE: And I'm sorry,
24 Commissioner, may I continue?

25 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Yes.

1 CHIEF INVESTIGATOR DRAKE: Okay. I also
2 want to interject the fact that delaying the vote would
3 basically be delaying a couple of things: The space
4 that is currently occupied by one of the teams is in the
5 fire side of the 7th floor. Delaying that would cause
6 them to stress. They have several departments or a
7 newly established department, my understanding is, that
8 they need that space for. We were only supposed to be
9 in there for a temporary period of time. March we were
10 supposed to be moving on and we have now prolonged our
11 stay. So it's like that family member that just won't
12 go away.

13 So we don't want to continue to impose on
14 them and that's why I brought this to the board because
15 there is an urgency in the matter. And this was an
16 original proposal; this is not new. It is nothing new.
17 It is just now the hands have changed as to who actually
18 is going to fund it.

19 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Okay.

20 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair.

21 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Yes.

22 COMMISSIONER BELL: I just want to say that
23 this matter's been before us since they have moved out
24 of the building six months ago where they were. At this
25 the particular time the chair and vice chair and

1 Commissioner Sanders and Linda Bernard attended this
2 forum this morning, I mean, this afternoon to address
3 this issue. So it is something that we need to do
4 timely. We know the issues; we cannot continue to
5 prolong this because they have to start the process. So
6 I move that we accept the proposal that's presented to
7 this board as this particular time.

8 COMMISSIONER VANN: Supported.

9 COMMISSIONER BURTON: We can --

10 COMMISSIONER CARTER: It's been moved and
11 supported.

12 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the chair,
13 there was still a discussion.

14 COMMISSIONER CARTER: We can have discussion
15 after the motion. Just a minute; you'll have your
16 chance to have discussion. It's been moved and
17 supported that we approve the proposal for OCI to have
18 their build out; is that what's going to happen?

19 CHIEF INVESTIGATOR DRAKE: 30,000 dollars,
20 yes, ma'am.

21 COMMISSIONER CARTER: 30,000 dollars
22 expenditure.

23 CHIEF INVESTIGATOR DRAKE: From the board's
24 budget, yes, ma'am.

25 COMMISSIONER CARTER: From the board's

1 budget. Is there any discussion?

2 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes Commissioner --
3 Madam Chair.

4 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Commissioner Burton.

5 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You know, the
6 discussion that I have here: If we just now as
7 commissioners just receive this, how can we entertain
8 this right now today without really looking into this.
9 We're making a quick decision here, retaining from our
10 budget, from the board's budget to make a move right
11 away. I wasn't present at the budget meeting. I wasn't
12 notified. Chief Drake you mentioned you notified all
13 the commissioners except for one. How do you go about
14 notifying the commissioners?

15 CHIEF INVESTIGATOR DRAKE: As I stated, sir.

16 COMMISSIONER BURTON: How was the
17 commissioners notified?

18 CHIEF INVESTIGATOR DRAKE: As I stated
19 earlier, sir. I made calls to every single commissioner
20 on the committee with the exception of Commissioner
21 Dewaelsche per the instruction of the chair of the
22 committee.

23 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Here's my phone log
24 here. I have nothing from the department, not from your
25 office, not from our office.

1 CHIEF INVESTIGATOR DRAKE: I'm sorry that
2 you did not receive it --

3 COMMISSIONER BURTON: This is my phone log.

4 CHIEF INVESTIGATOR DRAKE: -- but I did make
5 the call.

6 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Okay. Why wasn't that
7 sent through e-mail?

8 CHIEF INVESTIGATOR DRAKE: Because it was an
9 urgent matter. I don't know how often people check
10 e-mails and that's the direction I was given from the
11 chair of the committee.

12 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Commissioners, right
13 here what we have before us we have commissioners that
14 are being left out of the loop and we're making a
15 decision right now today where we each commissioner has
16 not been properly notified regarding this. Remind you,
17 Commissioners, that there was a budget meeting at -- a
18 budget committee meeting that took place, I was not
19 aware. I wasn't notified. When did we ever start just
20 picking up the phone and saying, hey, calling each
21 commissioners and hey we have a meeting. We all been
22 properly notified in the past through e-mail or prior to
23 a previous board meeting.

24 I was out of the loop on this. We making a
25 decision today. I think we as commissioners I think we

1 should not entertain this today but we should table this
2 at a later date. I think we should -- any
3 commissioners?

4 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Commissioner Crawford.

5 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Through the chair.
6 Chief Drake, it was not on you to notify commissioner
7 even though I do understand and it's okay for you to
8 call us and e-mail us and all that but it's really on us
9 as commissioners, particularly the chair of the
10 commission and those who are on that particular
11 committee. I want to say the chair of the budget
12 committee and those who were on that budget committee.

13 However, you can have budget meetings even
14 all those committees don't have to be in attendance.
15 You know, that's okay too. I do understand this. And
16 it's stated in here that it would be probably at least a
17 year before you can move so.

18 CHIEF INVESTIGATOR DRAKE: Correct.

19 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: I guess you can
20 continue to squat. You can still have my cubicle. Is
21 that going to be adequate enough space to move because
22 in other words, is there enough space for the
23 individuals to do their work and the ones in the move
24 that are, I guess, only so many are moving, correct?

25 CHIEF INVESTIGATOR DRAKE: Right. That is

1 correct. I will remain in the board's office, the
2 clerical staff will remain in the board's office. So
3 that will just be the team and it should be adequate.
4 It's a pretty large space and it should be adequate.
5 We've mapped out this space and we've really taken a
6 good look at how staff would be positioned and so forth
7 so a lot of thought has gone into it and I think it
8 would be quite adequate.

9 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, ma'am. Is
10 there a projected you said one year, is there a
11 projected not date but month even?

12 CHIEF INVESTIGATOR DRAKE: For the
13 completion of the building?

14 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes ma'am. And the
15 move.

16 CHIEF INVESTIGATOR DRAKE: No, sir, I cannot
17 give you that at this time, no.

18 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: All right, then well
19 a year from now or something, I'll serve you with an
20 eviction notice. Okay, thank you.

21 CHIEF INVESTIGATOR DRAKE: Thank you.

22 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Commissioner Burton.

23 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the chair.

24 You know, there are several locations along Jefferson.

25 Just, you know, the Ross building it has a -- it has --

1 they have I think the Chief Investigator Drake mentioned
2 she was looking for 10,000 square feet for your staff?

3 CHIEF INVESTIGATOR DRAKE: I did not give a
4 specific amount of square footage, sir, I'm looking for,
5 no.

6 COMMISSIONER BURTON: In the past I think
7 you mentioned 10,000 square feet. How much square feet
8 do you need?

9 CHIEF INVESTIGATOR DRAKE: I've actually
10 never mentioned it and I would have to calculate exactly
11 how much square footage. We have had up to 10,000
12 square feet but that does not necessarily mean we need
13 that much. I cannot give you those figures.

14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the chair.
15 There are several buildings along Jefferson that will
16 work for OCI. That is ready for them to move in. I
17 have presented something before regarding some different
18 locations. I think if the board can look at this, I
19 think we can find not only a temporary solution but a
20 long-term solution and it wouldn't cost nearly what the
21 board has spent over at the Cadillac Building, which was
22 97,000 before and approximately 30,000 with utilities.

23 You're looking for a gated community, I
24 mean, a gated parking lot facility, off of a bus line,
25 there are quite a few buildings along Jefferson that are

1 ready. You know, have a space you looking for right off
2 of a bus line you mentioned before. Gated parking. And
3 I think we should look at those locations so we wouldn't
4 be coming back before here looking for a temporary
5 solution, long-term solution. I think we should just go
6 ahead and just look at those buildings that is currently
7 available and ready and I think as far as the motion on
8 the floor, I think if we can hold off on this so we can
9 really look at this right here thoroughly, I think that
10 would be the best thing for the board.

11 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you,
12 Commissioner Burton.

13 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, since we've
14 heard the pro and con and Commissioner Burton has spoke
15 quite clearly in opposition to, I call for proposal that
16 the question be moved for a vote.

17 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Those in favor of the
18 motion?

19 All: Aye.

20 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Those opposed?

21 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Opposed.

22 COMMISSIONER CARTER: The motion carries.

23 CHIEF INVESTIGATOR DRAKE: Thank you, Madam
24 Chair. Thank you board.

25 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you and we don't

1 want to keep you moving around.

2 CHIEF INVESTIGATOR DRAKE: Thank you.

3 COMMISSIONER CARTER: We want to keep you in
4 one location until the building wherever you going to
5 move, wherever it is, is done.

6 CHIEF INVESTIGATOR DRAKE: Thank you. I do
7 appreciate that.

8 COMMISSIONER CARTER: So thank you. Thank
9 you for your patience as well.

10 CHIEF INVESTIGATOR DRAKE: Thank you and
11 thank you board.

12 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair.

13 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Yes, sir.

14 COMMISSIONER BELL: Are we still on the
15 standing committee?

16 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Yes.

17 COMMISSIONER BELL: I think in terms of the
18 policy that we should look at page... staffing for DPD.
19 Since we have two years ago, I'm sorry, Chief Craig
20 created new ranks for the department, assistant chief,
21 captains, investigators, detectives and corporals, NPOs
22 that we should approve that in terms of restructuring
23 the department. I think this board needs to weigh in on
24 this and approve the chief proposal that's been in place
25 for a couple years now that we should really make this a

1 actual item at this particular time to approve this
2 process in terms of transitions for these ranks. So
3 it's part of the policy for two years, is that right,
4 Chief?

5 CHIEF CRAIG: Yes, a little bit more but.

6 COMMISSIONER BELL: So I would so move that
7 we approve this policy of staffing in the police
8 department, designated staffing.

9 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: Madam Chair I second
10 that.

11 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Been moved and
12 supported that we approve the ranking structure as the
13 staffing ranking structure as proposed through the
14 chief's office. Is there any question or I'm sorry is
15 there any discussion? Those in favor?

16 All: Aye.

17 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Those opposed?
18 Motion -- I'm sorry the motion carries thank you.
19 Thank you.

20 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam chair, I have one
21 more item on the committee report. Conrad Mallett,
22 Commissioner Mallett has brought before us two weeks ago
23 the bylaws amendments and we all received copies of that
24 bylaws so I would ask that this board review those
25 bylaws and they become an actual item for our next board

1 meeting and give everybody the opportunity to vote that
2 up or down in reference to that particular item.

3 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Okay.

4 COMMISSIONER BELL: I was hoping that -- I
5 haven't spoken to Commissioner Mallett in reference to
6 that but I'm pretty sure he wanted this to go forward.
7 It's been two weeks now. To be an actual item next week.

8 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Okay. Thank you.

9 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you.

10 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Any other standing
11 committee reports? Under new business we have a
12 resolution for retired police officer Eric L. House. Is
13 he here? Do we have it? Commissioner Moore, can you
14 read the resolve, please. He's not here.

15 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Yes Madam Chair, I'll
16 read the resolve. Resolution honoring retired police
17 officer Eric L. House. Now therefore be it resolved
18 that the Detroit Board of Police Commissioners speaking
19 for the citizens of Detroit and the Detroit Police
20 Department award this resolution to police officer Eric
21 L. House in recognition of his 41 plus years of
22 committed service.

23 We solute and congratulate you, police
24 officer Eric L. House for your fidelity to law
25 enforcement. The Detroit Board of Police Commissioners

1 move for adoption.

2 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Support?

3 ALL: Support.

4 COMMISSIONER CARTER: It's been moved and
5 supported that we adopt the resolution for retired
6 police officer Eric L. House. Is there any discussion?
7 Those in favor?

8 All: Aye.

9 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Those opposed? Motion
10 carries.

11 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Madam Chair?

12 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Yes.

13 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, ma'am, through
14 the chair and through the chief to his legal counsel,
15 Attorney Washington, are you aware of the I guess this
16 was in today's paper the controversy surrounding the
17 animal control ordinance and talks judge, federal U.S.
18 district judge Nancy Edmunds on Wednesday they struck
19 down the section of the ordinance that deals with city
20 animal control officers in the Detroit Police Department
21 the authority to enter private property without a
22 warrant to seize any animals or any suspected violation
23 of animal control ordinances.

24 MS. WASHINGTON: Through the chair Celia
25 Washington. Just for the record animal control and that

1 opinion may be born out of the decision to move animal
2 control from the Detroit Police Department.

3 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, ma'am.

4 MS. WASHINGTON: To the health department.
5 I can contact Dr. Saad, Al Saad and get input for you
6 but that function is no longer with the Detroit Police
7 Department.

8 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: I was aware that
9 they had moved because I think you told us a few months
10 back but the issue --

11 MS. WASHINGTON: I understand your concern.

12 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: -- going -- right,
13 if they're going to seize a animal, they call the
14 Detroit Police Department to assists in some kind of
15 way.

16 MS. WASHINGTON: What I will do is share the
17 protocol because as I'm aware right now Dr. Al Saad is
18 handling it exclusively.

19 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, ma'am.

20 MS. WASHINGTON: And it may be part of the,
21 I don't want to say problem but part of the concern so
22 I'll dig into that and get you the protocol.

23 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Thank you very much,
24 ma'am, appreciate it.

25 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Is there any new

1 business? Old business? Under announcement our next
2 meeting will be Thursday, February 25th at 3 p.m. here
3 at the Detroit Public Safety Headquarters located at
4 1301 Third Street in the Michigan Room.

5 At this time we'll take oral communications
6 from the audience. Please give your name for the record
7 and limit your comments to two minutes, please.

8 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Madam Chair, I have
9 a comment. Oh I can wait till after. Some stats.

10 MR. WELBORNE: Good afternoon board, chief.
11 Bill Welborne. The other day Tuskegee Airmen had, since
12 it's black history month, they went to Cooke school and
13 had a black history ceremony or whatever you want to
14 call it and it came out pretty good but there's a lot of
15 dignitaries I think that wasn't invited there. But I
16 just want to give props to Captain Hope there. She was
17 invited and she wrote out a story.

18 Well, she -- what she did she wrote out this
19 program and she was going to read it to the kids as a
20 story. It involved black women in the police
21 department. And I thought she did an excellent job.
22 Only she read it to the kids like she was reading Peter
23 Pan or what's the, I forgot what they are. I forgot
24 it's been so long ago. I forget what they are. But she
25 read these things to these kids and she talked about the

1 first one got hired from the Detroit Police Department
2 and talks about how they worked their way up and some of
3 the things they used to wear a long time ago: Skirts
4 and things like that. They didn't wear a regular
5 uniform and they didn't go out on regular patrol with
6 the men. And I didn't know that; I was surprised.

7 And it just fascinated me. And those kids
8 really listened. They were enthused and, you know, kids
9 always got some questions. They got some questions they
10 asked and they really impressed me with some of the
11 questions they asked. I just wanted to personally thank
12 her for that. I think she did one heck of a job on
13 that. Thank you.

14 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you,
15 Mr. Welborne. Any other oral communications from the
16 audience?

17 MS. SMITH: Good afternoon, chief,
18 commissioners. This afternoon I had the pleasure of
19 attending the Soul Food Luncheon for Judge Keith. And
20 your member was there also. What I and it's strange
21 that the conversation came up about you at your meeting
22 here and we were talking about you, at least I brought
23 it up, in regards to this particular magazine I'm
24 affiliated with I'm a PR person; it started a month ago.
25 And my suggestions was to be -- let the public be aware

1 of what the police department is doing and also the
2 commission.

3 I suggested at our meeting the other day
4 that we would interview you, and I know most of you seen
5 the magazine and in the pictures there are portraits and
6 when I was at the meeting the other night sitting next
7 to the state police I asked Shaw would he be interested
8 in letting us to take a picture. My idea was to have a
9 picture on the page with you on one section of the page
10 and the state police on the other. He gave me his
11 permission so what I would like to know if you would be
12 interested in having Mr. Eaton make appointment with
13 your scheduler and we can do a rebuttal, in other words,
14 and let them know your history of being on the police
15 department.

16 Next, I would like very much for the police
17 commission to be interviewed also and a background on
18 you, each one of you, so we can write an article for you.
19 The book will be coming out in May. So if it's all
20 right with you, I would like for you to give me your
21 time schedule or whatever it is you're available for us
22 to do an article on each one of you and let the public
23 know that you are the police commissioners. That I
24 would like for each one of you to think about. All
25 right. And the staff also. We don't want to leave the

1 staff out. We just want the public to know about the
2 police department and I want you to have this, Chief.

3 CHIEF CRAIG: I have one.

4 MS. SMITH: If anyone need a magazine, I
5 have one.

6 CHIEF CRAIG: Through the chair, I'd like to
7 make one moment.

8 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Yes.

9 CHIEF CRAIG: I would offer a suggestion you
10 may know that we have several ranking members African
11 American female members in the police department: First
12 Assistant Chief Stair, certainly Deputy Chief Hall,
13 Commander DeShawn Sims, Third Deputy Chief, Second
14 Deputy Chief Celia Washington as an example be a great
15 story to showcase African American women in leadership
16 positions in the Detroit Police Department. Given that
17 when you look across the country we do not see the
18 number of African American women in leadership positions
19 in major city police departments. I thought I would
20 just share that.

21 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Great suggestion,
22 Chief.

23 CHIEF CRAIG: Thank you.

24 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you. Any other
25 oral communications from the audience?

1 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Through the chair I
2 would just like to acknowledge Ms. Bernice. Every event
3 I attend, she's there. She's talking about the police
4 department, what they're talk doing. She's talking
5 about the police commissioners, what they're doing. I
6 was at the event today: Judge Damon Keith's Soul Food
7 Luncheon and she was working. She was working on behalf
8 of the police department so Ms. Bernice thank you very
9 much.

10 MS. SMITH: You're welcome, Dear, it's a
11 pleasure.

12 MR. REED: Good afternoon through the chair.
13 Name's Kenneth Reed, Detroit Coalition Against Police
14 Brutality. Please excuse my voice; just got over a
15 little bought of strep throat a few weeks ago. Still
16 kind of not quite there but at any rate I want to bring
17 a greeting to you, say good afternoon to you all and to
18 the chief as well. I notice that there's a program I
19 guess it's not new but it's somewhat new the Green Light
20 Program. And I think that it is something that is
21 needed in the community. One of the gas stations that I
22 frequent, the Marathon on West McNichols and Wyoming is
23 one of the participants; and I think, you know, I feel a
24 lot better when I go into the station actually.

25 And I saw a feature on it I think they

1 interviewed the chief on one of the news -- on one of
2 the news stations concerning it. Like I said it's good
3 that it's there. I think a lot of people feel a lot
4 more comfortable going into gas stations that's
5 participating in that.

6 I guess my question I have because I'm not
7 fully versed on it, although and maybe some of the
8 commissioner or even you can address it, Chief, is in
9 the event that there's an incident in a station, you
10 know, I guess one of the concerns is the transparency in
11 terms of by it being on video be it if it's something
12 that's going on between a customer and the station
13 employee or even officers, customers or whatever, is
14 that footage transparent where the community will know
15 what's going on? And that's my concern.

16 CHIEF CRAIG: Through the chair I would say
17 it is transparent. In fact, if there's any allegations
18 of misconduct, say, in the instance or the example you
19 used a police officer, certainly that video can be made
20 available. We're in a public space. Certainly, we see
21 great promise with this public private partnership. We
22 have 8 stations online currently. We have 30 additional
23 in the pipeline. We've got a commitment from MacDonald
24 corporation, they want in. There's several parties
25 slash liquor stores that want in and so it's continuing

1 to grow.

2 In addition to that we've had visits one
3 from Cincinnati, Mexico, police officials from Mexico
4 came to see it. While there are other realtime crime
5 centers in other police departments in some of the major
6 cities, I know of none that are doing it like this. As
7 you may know gas stations was something I talked
8 extensively about coming in. We know that at one time
9 25 percent of violent crime occurred in and within 500
10 feet of gas stations.

11 I will tell you early, and I don't have the
12 data yet, but primarily that it appears that crime in
13 and around gas stations is beginning to decline. Now
14 there was one image that we had with two individuals; we
15 were watching from our console in our realtime crime
16 center. Two individuals were involved in what would
17 have become a physical altercation. They noticed the
18 green light, the signage; we could see that they were
19 making reference to it and decided it probably wasn't a
20 good idea to engage in this dispute and they left. So
21 that was a win.

22 The minor issue and so we think we're still
23 in the testing phase. We should be out of it probably
24 in the next several weeks and then we'll really start to
25 evaluate the effectiveness of this tool.

1 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you, Chief. Any
2 other comments, Commissioners?

3 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, Madam Chair. I
4 have some stats on CPO holders and the reason I'm
5 bringing this to light is in Mlive there was something
6 published online a couple days ago in terms of there's
7 an increase in offensive crimes pertaining to CPO
8 holders and just to note some numbers here: The number
9 of CPO holders in the state of Michigan increased from
10 1,177 in June of 2004 to four hundred thousand forty
11 zero zero six in June of 2014. That was a -- this is
12 just those who were obtaining CPOs. That is a 297
13 percent increase.

14 Also, too, total number of CPO holders
15 charged in 2003, 2004 were 398. The number has risen
16 more than 11 times to 4,421, four thousand four hundred
17 and twenty one charges in 2013 to 2014. Also, too, they
18 have stats when it comes down to each county so you can
19 access that online too at Mlive. For Wayne County in
20 2003, 2004 there were 128 CPO holders who were charged
21 with various offenses pertaining to weapons such as
22 banishing (sic) a gun in a crime. I'll take that back.
23 Those were the -- that was, yeah, those were the ones
24 charged. The ones charged were zero. There were I'm
25 sorry 128 CPO issued in Wayne County that year.

1 Issued in 2013, 14 was 1,203 issued that
2 year. Using a gun in a crime or banishing (sic) a gun
3 105. So there is an increase in terms of that. I make
4 reference to that, too, because I believe it was a year
5 and a half ago we had someone come before us who was a
6 CPO holder and she had concerns too because she was
7 criminally charged with something. So I will in the
8 future check with the Wayne County prosecutor friend of
9 mine and see just where we are in terms of who's been
10 charged.

11 I've read some incidents in the media as
12 what was reported about a CPO holder taking action that
13 was in violation or even shooting one or two shootings.
14 I haven't really followed up on in terms of actually
15 getting the actual information from the prosecutor's
16 office and doing that, but the issue is there's a number
17 of individuals, particularly young African American
18 males on probation sitting in the Wayne County jail for
19 carrying a gun without a license, which is a felony
20 without, you know, a CPO holder.

21 And what's pending now and being pushed
22 forward in the state legislature or one of the state
23 legislatures is that they want to do away with CPOs all
24 together. Just the individual buys a gun, and registers
25 a gun or whatever and he or she will be able to carry

1 it. So that's a bill that's pending, you know without
2 any getting a CPO and I don't even know if there will be
3 any training. So I don't believe that will pass. I
4 certainly hope it doesn't. Thank you.

5 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you,
6 Commissioner Crawford. Please do keep us updated.

7 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, ma'am, I will.

8 COMMISSIONER VANN: Madam Chair, I don't
9 mean to prolong the meeting but since the chief is here,
10 is there any kind of update on the medical marijuana
11 facilities? Thought I'd wake him up.

12 CHIEF CRAIG: Very attentive. At any rate
13 the only update, we're still moving forward. I know
14 Celia has been intimately involved with crafting how we
15 move forward after the first of March when the ordinance
16 goes into effect. We're sitting at roughly 211 medical
17 marijuana, they call them medical marijuana care
18 centers. We think based on the map and what the
19 ordinance restricts in terms of drug free zones, you're
20 looking at about 40 locations that could operate
21 lawfully in a drug free zone or outside of a drug free
22 zone.

23 So there's education letters have gone out
24 to the existing businesses. They'll be training so when
25 March 2nd hits, we're not going to go out and start

1 closing locations. We certainly want to give folks an
2 opportunity to become aware and educated; however, we
3 will continue our enforcement actions that we have done.
4 What many may not know we have since all of last year
5 from last year to date I think we have gone into and
6 made arrests in roughly 33 locations I think the number
7 is. And so we do respond to complaints, community
8 member complaints when individuals are coming into a
9 location purchasing medicinal marijuana without a card.

10 Now those who are familiar with the
11 ordinance is highly restrictive. It really comes down
12 to the patient caregiver relationship. Under the
13 ordinance caregivers are only allowed five patients and
14 so it's going to be restrictive in terms of, or as I
15 like to refer to no retail sale of medical marijuana.
16 So just because you have a card you cannot just go up to
17 one of these care centers and make a purchase. It has
18 to be a specific relationship between caregiver and
19 patient and the ordinance and the state law only allows
20 up to five patients.

21 And so, and then there's how do you store
22 it, how the medicinal marijuana is maintained in these
23 centers. So it's going to be there are some
24 restrictions in place that will change the look of the
25 centers that are currently located throughout Detroit.

1 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Commissioner Brooks.

2 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Yes. I'd just like to
3 make note for Pamela our chief investigator. I'm glad
4 that she's here. I'm glad that the staff is here. It
5 makes us closer. We can work better together. I'm a
6 new commissioner and when I started and was placed on
7 the committee of the citizens complaint, Pamela took
8 time, took me to lunch and taught me all I needed to
9 know about how to read the complaints; what do you do
10 after you read them. And I just want to say I'm happy
11 that you're here. I'm happy that we all can work
12 together. We should be a team because that's just the
13 way it is. We are police commissioners and you all are
14 OCI and we're like this. So thank you. Very much.
15 Thank you.

16 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you.

17 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Madam Chair, with
18 all due respect and I love Commissioner Brooks, Chief
19 Drake didn't take me to lunch.

20 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Well, she did not
21 because I'm new.

22 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: But at one time I
23 was new. But I just want to add, though, and I respect
24 your comments but actually their office of the chief
25 investigator and the investigators should not be in

1 headquarters. I mean, they should be separate, in a
2 separate building away from headquarters and that's due
3 to the fact of, you know, citizens that want to come in
4 and file complaints and perhaps interview or whatever
5 that needs to be done outside of police headquarters.

6 I do you know for right now it's temporary
7 for maybe even another year but, you know, they should
8 be in a separate building and that's because of the
9 nature of the work that they do and also the image of
10 citizens coming in to conduct their business with the
11 chief investigator's office but it is fiscally
12 responsible at this time to utilize, and thanking the
13 police department in their assistance in all the ways
14 and the chief and everyone that has assisted us, you
15 know, with space and even monies or whatever so thank
16 you.

17 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair.

18 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Commissioner Moore and
19 then you, Commissioner.

20 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you Madam Chair.
21 I was just wondering about the enforcement of the
22 medical marijuana. Will that be a task force, Chief or
23 will that be all officers that will be trained and how
24 would that go?

25 CHIEF CRAIG: We're going to focus on

1 training NPOs that will go into buildings safely. When
2 it comes time to do an inspection, we will continue to
3 enforce, you know, the illegal sell of marijuana like we
4 have because it has a medical marijuana sign on it
5 doesn't necessarily mean it's operating within the frame
6 work of the law. So we will continue to do enforcement
7 like we have traditionally.

8 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you.

9 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, I just want
10 to say I'd like to do a follow up in terms of
11 Mr. Welborne speaking to Captain Kyra Hope. I would
12 like to, through the chief, make a request for Captain
13 Hope to come before this board to present what she
14 presented out in the community and that would be part of
15 black history I think it's last Thursday of the month.
16 So I think that would be great. And we had former
17 retired deputy chief Jarrett Jackson at the last meeting
18 and now we're going to get more background and some of
19 that background is in the museum.

20 So I'm hoping that next week when we meet
21 that we would take time to see the display in that and
22 I'll meet with Sergeant Woody, I don't know if the video
23 is probably not ready because I know the video -- we're
24 going on vacation but basically we need to lift up, you
25 know, that whole piece somewhat in terms of it took time

1 to put together the display and I want to make sure the
2 commissioner and some of the public is able to see it.

3 And I'll also acknowledge, I didn't
4 acknowledge Robert Brown in terms of putting together
5 the piece for the retired officer and NPOs and I
6 appreciate his effort to put that together.

7 MR. BROWN: Thank you.

8 COMMISSIONER BELL: So and we move forward
9 in the spirit of black history I think is important that
10 we continue to lift up the history and the chief is
11 correct, I would hope Mother Bernice before you do the
12 Michigan State Police, that you look at some of our
13 sisters in the department in terms of that. I love my
14 Michigan State Police but I think this neighborhood of
15 Detroit, it should reflect the Detroiters first of all.
16 Thank you. I just want to through that out there.

17 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Commissioner Crawford,
18 did you have a comment?

19 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, ma'am, elected
20 school board member, she was seated back there. I don't
21 know if she wanted to say anything but she was an
22 official to the Detroit Public Schools.

23 COMMISSIONER BURTON: District 1.

24 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Step up and state
25 your name.

1 MS. SIMPSON: Okay. Good afternoon everyone
2 my name is Tawanna Simpson. I'm a member of the Detroit
3 Board of Education and I represent the first district.
4 And I was just here as a citizen and as a member of the
5 Coalition Against Police Brutality. Thank you.

6 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, ma'am, and also
7 too we're not going to wait eight years for the school
8 board --

9 MS. SIMPSON: No. No, I can give a quick
10 report if you want to know but, no, we don't want to
11 wait either. Thank you.

12 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, ma'am, thank
13 you.

14 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Ms. Washington, you
15 have...

16 MS. WASHINGTON: Very quickly. As you all
17 know the chief's DPD fit health initiative is ongoing
18 and because we are on TV and because the community is
19 here, we're having huge successes partnering with the
20 community and this Wednesday I'm inviting the
21 commissioners to reach out to your constituents. We're
22 having The American Heart Association is coming this
23 Wednesday. It's going to be hosted by our chief and by
24 Roop Raj and we're going to talk about heart health and
25 the last few have been just phenomenal and the idea of

1 partnering with the community in these discussions has
2 been very helpful. So it's this coming Wednesday at
3 11:30 in this room.

4 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you.

5 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Do you have a flyer?

6 MS. WASHINGTON: I'll make sure that you get
7 them.

8 CHIEF CRAIG: Through the chair I want to
9 publically acknowledge Celia Washington for her
10 leadership. This effort has really gone a long way. I
11 had a chance to attend the American Heart Association
12 luncheon recognizing women's heart health I think it is.
13 Very well attended so just want to give a public
14 acknowledgment for her efforts.

15 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you. Thank you,
16 Chief. Thank you, Ms. Washington. Any other comments?
17 Any other comments?

18 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes through the chair.

19 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Commissioner Burton.

20 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You know also when we
21 talking about what we're going to do for black history
22 month and for the last Board of Police Commissioner's
23 meeting for the month of February, I'd like it if we
24 could acknowledge, you know, the first to be appointed
25 police commissioners from 1974. I mean, I think that

1 would be great, too. I mean, because, you know, they
2 was appointed by Mayor Coleman Young and he put this
3 police commission body in place and for civilian
4 oversight of the department. I think it's very
5 important we acknowledge him as well. As well as the
6 other members of DPD.

7 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you,
8 Commissioner Burton that's a great idea. We can look
9 into that. Yes, ma'am?

10 MS. MOORS: Hello everyone, my name is
11 Tawana Moors. I'm a retired Detroit police officer
12 former investigator for the Detroit Coalition Against
13 Police Brutality. I'd like to acknowledge the group
14 about the President Barack Obama's initiative. I have
15 formed a group and we are in collaboration with the
16 Department of Justice for building bridges and finding a
17 continuum of resources for up under his direct order
18 finding solutions with the Dearborn Police Department,
19 which is going along and I will be informing the group
20 of the success that we're doing. Thank you.
