5	Southwest Detroit. Ricardo Moore, District 7,
6	Northwest Detroit, it is good to be back home in
7	Southwest.
8	COMMISSIONER SANDERS: Commissioner
9	Derrick Sanders appointed by Mayor Mike Duggan.
10	COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Eva Garza

12	born and raised here.

19	At this time I'd like to we do have
20	a quorum at this time and I'm going to introduce
21	the Assistant Chief Dolunt who's sitting in for
22	Chief Craig.
23	ASST. CHIEF DOLUNT: Good evening. The
24	Chief couldn't be here, he had another speaking
25	engagement he had to attend, and so you're stuck



1	with me.
2	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Okay, thank you.
3	Commissioner Elizabeth Brooks has asked to be
4	excused tonight and I'd like to also introduce
5	Attorney to the Board Linda Bernard who's going
6	to introduce the rest of the Board staff, please.
7	ATTORNEY BERNARD: Thank you, Madam
8	Chairperson. Ms. Gail Oxendine, the director of
9	Police Personnel is excused. Ms. Pamela
10	Davis-Drake is sitting to my left in the first
11	seat right there. She's the Chief Investigator
12	from the Office of the Chief Investigator.

Is there any discussion? Those in favor? 17 18 COMMISSIONERS: Aye. 19 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Those opposed? 20 The motion carries. Under Item 9, the 21 Chairperson's report, a couple of things. 2.2 The Vice-Chair and I met with Mayor Duggan and Chief Craig earlier this week and we 23 24 talked about some of the things, upcoming things 25 that are on the Mayor's agenda as far as the body



1	cams that were approved by City Council and
2	actually getting things to cooperate or to
3	getting the cameras to talk to the in-car
4	computer system, that's what they're working on.
5	And once that is achieved, they will be
6	rolling out with the body cams and that's pretty
7	much what the discussion was there anything
8	else, Vice-Chair?
9	COMMISSIONER BELL: No.
10	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Pretty much what
11	the discussion was about, and that's all I have
12	to report for this week. So we'll move on to
13	Asst. Chief Dolunt.
14	ASST. CHIEF DOLUNT: Thank you, ma'am.
15	Before we bring up Commander Walton just a couple
16	of things.
17	Some of the command officers are not
18	here because a fundraiser for Officer Hurrock El
19	Garaffe, Detective actually. He used to work in
20	the Southwest District. He had leukemia, he's in
21	remission right now, and so we're thankful for
22	that and everyone's prayers, so there's a
23	fundraiser, so any of you command officers when
24	we're done with the meeting if you want to go



over there, we'd appreciate it. There's a lot of

1	good things.
2	As far as the stats, it's been a rough
3	seems every time I come up here I say it's
4	been rough our homicides currently are up 13
5	percent from last year. We're up 15. As you all
6	know on Monday we had a triple in No. 6.
7	We've had several incidents where
8	there's been multiple complainants and unusually
9	we've had several stabbings which is unusual that
10	they become fatal.
11	Yesterday a nephew and his uncle who
12	had been drinking, they were just play-fighting
13	and the nephew body-slammed the uncle and the
14	uncle never recovered. So, you know, there's not
15	a whole lot I can do about that. It's still
16	unfortunate.
17	And the other night we had the 13 and
18	the 14 year old in that shooting and I think
19	we're trying to determine where that weapon came
20	from. No one seems to be wanting to take
21	responsibility for that.
22	Our non-fatal shootings on the flip
23	side are actually down 13 which is down or 14,
24	down 3 1/2 percent. You could say that's good,



you could say that's bad. Every potential

1	shooting every shooting is a potential
2	homicide.
3	Our robberies are down 12 percent, our
4	carjacking is down 33 percent. I feel carjacking
5	may be erroneously reported. We met with the
6	Mayor today and he remembers the days we used to
7	have an affidavit. You came in to file a police
8	report on a stolen car and you had to have an
9	affidavit because we found that there was a
10	percentage of people that were reporting their
11	cars stolen or they were carjacked just as their
12	lease which was over on their miles was about to
13	expire. I'm not saying that's always the case,
14	but that does happen.
15	Some of the robberies are not reported.
16	I think all of the shootings though and the
17	homicides are pretty well documented and actually
18	here in No. 4 they have the least amount of total
19	shootings in the city.
20	So Whitney Walton and her predecessor
21	Mike Chambers is doing a good job, the officers
22	do a good job and I want to thank them for that.
23	Is this the appropriate time for
24	Commander Walton to come up, ma'am?
2.5	COMMISSIONER CARTER. Yes, sir, it is



1	ASST. CHIEF DOLUNT: Okay.
2	COMMISSIONER MOORE: I do have a couple
3	of questions for the Assistant Chief. First
4	deals with fireworks protocol as relates to
5	fireworks around July 4. I understand for the
6	most part fireworks are legal. However, still
7	the issue with noise and families with pets and a
8	lot of times people have to medicate their pets
9	just so they can survive those fireworks at
10	night, so what's the protocol?
11	Typically the fireworks are going off
12	at night, the NPOs are not available. What
13	should a citizen do?
14	ASST. CHIEF DOLUNT: Well, obviously
15	they would call I would suggest what is it
16	3-1-1 as opposed to 9-1-1 because not
17	actually they could call 9-1-1. The problem is
18	this. You have some people with fireworks and
19	other people can't distinguish between a firework
20	and a real gunshot, so I would suggest that they
21	would call 9-1-1. We will get there when we can.
22	I'm not trying to be insensitive to
23	pet-owners, I am a pet-owner, but that's the time
24	you bring your pet in the house for several
25	hours. It is what it is they!re legal and it!s



1	not against the law to have fireworks.
2	However, I myself have gone out late at
3	night in my car and stopped by and very politely
4	asked people to put the things away and they were
5	very receptive to my suggestion because they lose
6	track of time. They want to make their kids
7	happy, but that's what I would suggest.
8	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you, sir,
9	and my final question deals with body cams. What
10	type of body camera will DPD get? Will they be
11	outfitted for the head because typically if an
12	officer hears or sees something, they turn their
13	head in that direction, whereas the torso where
14	the body cams that I did see are stationary.
15	Will we have a couple of different
16	models or types of body cams or will it just be
17	one type?
18	ASST. CHIEF DOLUNT: Quite honestly,
19	you're asking the wrong person. That's James
20	White's thing, he's really good, he's done all
21	the research and his group has done that. If you
22	would like, I can have him at the meeting next
23	Thursday. I am not well versed in body cams and
24	I apologize for that.
25	COMMISSIONER MOORE: No problem, sir,



thank you very much.

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2	COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Chief, let me
3	ask you a question. Last year there was a fair
4	amount of controversy over the protocol we as the
5	City was going to impose as relates to the
6	fireworks downtown and part of what we observed
7	last year was not so much the substance of a
8	curfew, but the fact that it came up kind of
9	quickly, we didn't give the citizen groups or the
10	citizens in general a lot of notice.

I'm just wondering, do we have a recommendation that we're going to be making to the City Council, when are we thinking that we might present it and -- because I do know that obviously the plans are being made to manage the occasion so I just wonder what steps are we taking to be in front of and informing the public of what our expectations are going to be?

ASST. CHIEF DOLUNT: Okay, Deputy Chief Hall who isn't here, who isn't present today, is in front of City Council and there's been some consternation by some members of City Council that a curfew is unfair towards the youth of the city, and there's other people saying we need the curfew because if we have so many officers

1	downtown we're running a bare minimum in the
2	precincts and the kids that don't go to fireworks
3	are still out on the street late at night,
4	someone could get hurt.
5	So we're kind of like it's a

Catch-22. If you come down and you get hurt and I don't have a curfew and enough officers down there, it makes national news. If I don't have enough officers in the precincts and some parent -- and I blame a lot of them on the parents just so you know, keep an eye on their kids, and the kids are out and they get shot, then shame on the police for having the police downtown and not in the neighborhoods.

So it's going back and forth. I don't think you're targeted at necessarily the youth of Detroit, I think it's targeted at youth in general that are disrespectful of families and I'm not saying all are.

I see a lot of young teenage couples down at the fireworks and they're holding hands and having a good time like it was when we were kids.

They don't have to come down everyone on a bus looking for a fight or looking to be



1	because they can. So the City Council is a
2	little divided. We're still pushing for some
3	type of curfew. We are going to open up I
4	believe the Riverfront again. Last year we had a
5	peaceful people right on the riverfront, right
6	on the river, and it went well. We didn't
7	advertise it a lot because it's more geared
8	towards families and I think the fireworks are
9	geared toward families, not to troublemakers, so
10	that's where we're at.
11	We're waiting for a definitive yes,
12	ma'am.
13	MS. WASHINGTON: Celia Washington. It
14	did make it out of sub-committee, it did make it
15	in front of the full Council and they're hoping
16	before the end of the meeting I will have the day
17	next week when it will be open for public
18	comment.
19	That was one of the criticisms of City
20	Council last year that it was last minute, rush,
21	rush, so we did appear before City Council. We
22	will make sure that you have that date before we
23	leave and River Days is not included, I think
24	that kind of a very significant issue last year
25	was trying to extend the fireworks curfew to

1	River Days and that is not the case this year.
2	COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Thank you.
3	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Commissioner
4	Crawford?
5	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Madam Chair,
6	through the chair to the Assistant Chief, I know
7	last year there wasn't enough time to put out the
8	massive or the call to try to get a great
9	number of volunteers and I certainly hope I
10	know the department is working on it this year.
11	I talked to recently Commander Todd about that.
12	I certainly hope that the City Council
13	members will participate in that call for
14	volunteers because that's right out of the
15	Honorable Coleman Alexander Young playbook is
16	when we mobilize volunteers there was thousands
17	for Angel's Night and as I've always said, if we
18	can mobilize people to protect property, we
19	certainly ought to be able to mobilize people to
20	protect people, particularly when it's pertaining
21	to children.
22	So I certainly hope that the council
23	members and everyone else who participated in
24	that call to try to get as many volunteers in the
25	downtown area to participate in the night of



1	fireworks.
2	Also too and respectfully through you,
3	Assistant Chief, to the captain of Homicide if in
4	a week or so if the Captain could come before us
5	or have someone from Homicide come before us and
6	bring forth information as to how juvenile
7	interrogations are done today.
8	I know it's been a lot of changes over
9	the years, particularly with the Consent Decree,
10	and also video interviews pertaining to juveniles
11	and videos in general pertaining to homicide
12	suspects, and the reason I ask this question is
13	because Mr. Dante Stafford was just released from
14	prison yesterday and of course the quadruple
15	homicide that he was charged with and falsely
16	convicted of one might say occurred in my
17	district, he did reside in my district at this
18	time.
19	And I'm sure many of us that remember
20	that quadruple homicide and at that time he was
21	14 years old and he served nine years in prison.
22	So thank God that he was freed
23	yesterday from prison and also to understanding
24	that there may be some charges from the



Prosecutor of some former DPD members, maybe two,

1	in terms of talking about perjury and I guess
2	it's fortunate they don't work for DPD today, but
3	and this was prior to Chief Craig.
4	ASST. CHIEF DOLUNT: Yes, sir, we can
5	probably do that. I believe our new procedures
6	are outlined and we can probably get that to you.
7	I don't foresee a problem.
8	There was a reason for the Consent
9	Decree and that was one of the reasons, and now
10	we're in compliance.
11	Oh, I can't hear you. Oh, Tuesday is
12	the public hearing on curfew. 10 o'clock, City
13	Council chambers at the auditorium on the
14	curfew issue? Thank you very much, ma'am.
15	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Any other
16	questions, commissioners? Capt. Walton?
17	ASST. CHIEF DOLUNT: It's Commander
18	now.
19	COMM. WALTON: Good evening and welcome
20	to the 4th Precinct. Our precinct presentation
21	is actually going to be made by Capt. Russ
22	Solano. However, before he comes up I just want
23	to let you know, commissioners, that the 4th
24	Precinct was selected as the pilot precinct along
25	with No. 7 for body cams, and Commissioner Moore,



1	the camera we were shown, it's going to be
2	it's a really heavy magnet, it's going to be on
3	the body. It can be on the body or worn on the
4	belt.
5	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Is it too late

COMMISSIONER MOORE: Is it too late -through the Chair, is it too late to try to
consider the head gear because if an officer
hears something or sees something, they're
looking in that direction whereas the torso stays
in a certain direction.

So that just concerns me about the body cam, but --

COMM. WALTON: I know that we're doing the risk mitigation period of 60 days where it's going to be evaluated, so it's not locked in is my understanding and that's one of the things that's going to be evaluated, how effective it is.

COMMISSIONER MOORE: Okay. Please take that under consideration.

COMM. WALTON: We'll pass that along. It's scheduled to start June 30th if everything goes as planned and with that I'll introduce Capt. Russ Solano.

ASST. CHIEF DOLUNT: And through the

1	Board, before he starts, I want to publicly
2	recognize you, Solano, because I understand you
3	locked up an individual for armed robbery two
4	armed robberies on West Vernor, one of a drug
5	store, right?
6	CAPT. SOLANO: Yes, CVS and a
7	(APPLAUSE).
8	COMM. WALTON: He may not brag about
9	it, but the guy was charged today with two counts
10	of RA and
11	ASST. CHIEF DOLUNT: And he had a
12	needle at one point at one of the armed
13	robberies.
14	CAPT. SOLANO: That was one of the
15	threats he made.
16	ASST. CHIEF DOLUNT: One of the threats
17	he was going to inject them with AIDS. So Solano
18	was on patrol because he used to be the police
19	and he seen this guy and he made just great
20	work the command, you lead by example, thank
21	you very much and you should be recognized.
22	(APPLAUSE).
23	CAPT. SOLANO: AC, commissioners,
24	before I begin, I want to recognize the NPOs,
25	Officer Denmark, Officer Labrun for that

1	fantastic spread you see back there. They went
2	out, worked hard.
3	(APPLAUSE).
4	So 4th Precinct is located here at 4700
5	West Fort encompasses 15 square miles and
6	contains the largest perimeter of all of the
7	precincts within the city.
8	4th Precinct borders the cities of
9	Melvindale, Lincoln Park, Dearborn and River
10	Rouge, as well as the 3rd Precinct, 2nd Precinct
11	and the 10th Precinct.
12	And according to the 2010 U.S. Census
13	the 4th Precinct has a population of 71,000
14	people consisting of 56.3 percent Latino, 21.5
15	percent African-American, and 19.6 Caucasian.
16	4th Precinct is home to a variety of
17	businesses including Marathon Petroleum, Detroit
18	Salt Company, Ideal Group, Southwest Solutions,
19	LaSid, Chaz Center, Detroit Public Lighting, the
20	Masterski Power Station, the James Group,
21	Detroit-Wayne County Port Authority, Detroit
22	Produce, Detroit Iron and Metal and the Sotke
23	Automotive.
24	Some of the landmarks within our
25	boundaries include Patton Park, Clark Park,



1	Romanowsky	Park	and	Riverside	Park	as	well	as	the
2	Historic Fo	ort Wa	ayne.						

As of June 9, today's date, the 4th Precinct showed an overall 11 percent drop in violent crimes as compared to 2015, a drop of 17 percent in property crimes and a 15 percent drop in Part 1 offenses overall compared to the 2015 numbers.

This reduction in crime can only be accomplished through a combination of hard work and dedication on the part of police officers and supervisors assigned to the 4th Precinct as well as our law enforcement partners, U.S. Attorney's office, U.S. Customs and Border Protection, Michigan Department of Corrections, Michigan State Police, Detroit Transit Authority, and the Detroit Public School Safety as well as our academic partners Wayne State University, Center for Urban Studies and the Americore Urban Safety Project.

But most importantly, the citizens
living within the 4th Precinct community and at
this time I would like to recognize some of these
community groups that have contributed to
strengthening the bond between community and

1	police.
2	We have the 4th Precinct Community
3	Relations, President Mrs. Josephine Smith; the
4	Original Citizens of Southwest Detroit, President
5	Tyrone Carter; Congress of Communities Urban
6	Neighborhood Initiative, President Elizabeth
7	Valdez; Springdale-Woodmere Block Club, President
8	Tom Fayz; Southwest Detroit Improvement
9	Association, President Maria Avila; Michigan
10	Avenue Business Association, President Joe Gappe;
11	the West Vernor Civic Patrol, President Linda
12	Cortez, and the Mexican Patriotic Committee of
13	Metro Detroit, President Alecio Juarez.
14	Working alongside these community
15	groups events in the 4th Precinct such as the
16	52nd Annual Cinco de Mayo parade which was held
17	on Sunday, May 1; Police Week 4th Precinct
18	memorial service held on May 10; the Urban
19	Neighborhood Initiative, Heros of the
20	Neighborhood held on May 20, and the opening of
21	Congress of the Communities Safety Hub which was
22	opened this past June 1 were among the great
23	successes.
24	Moving forward, we at the 4th Precinct
25	are committed to providing excellence in policing

18	presented to the Mayor and it was approved.
19	All command staff throughout the
20	Detroit Police Department has received it. There
21	is no limitation on the distribution, but we are
22	controlling the distribution.
23	ASST. CHIEF DOLUNT: For obvious
24	reasons.
25	COMM. WILLIAMS: For obvious reasons,



1	yeah. So there have been some tweaks. The
2	actual evacuation plan is not by district, it's
3	just a regular plan that they push down at a
4	precinct level but it's city-wide for all
5	precincts to cover how we're going to do a pretty
6	much city-wide if we had to do a city-wide
7	evacuation how we would accomplish that.
8	So that's like a general overview of it
9	and there are some tweaks that have to be made
10	because it was the local planning team was
11	made up of members from the police department,
12	fire department, other city departments and we
13	all came together to actually provide input for
14	that project.
15	COMMISSIONER CARTER: But is it
16	something that will be provided to the residents
17	because
18	COMM. WILLIAMS: No, it's nothing that
19	we will provide for the residents.
20	COMMISSIONER CARTER: I just mean the
21	plan, I mean something that's not confidential
22	that can be provided to the residents because as
23	you know, the bridge can be cut off, we can be
24	cut off down to 48217 from the rest of the city.

And so the police might not get to our

1	area, that area, in a timely fashion, so I'm just
2	wondering is there something that the residents
3	can receive so that they will have knowledge of
4	what they need to do?
5	COMM. WILLIAMS: I'm pretty sure the
6	answer to that would be yes, but we don't have a
7	product right now that we would say we're going
8	to send out to the residents.
9	So that would be something that I would
10	have to push back towards Comm. Barren and Capt.
11	Patterson to get with the local planning team to
12	see if they can work something through there.
13	COMMISSIONER CARTER: That would be
14	great because we've been waiting for three years
15	since we've been commissioners on something from
16	the Homeland Security.
17	COMM. WILLIAMS: And I can say this.
18	The part that we do have, of course we can make
19	sure that the Board of Police Commissioners
20	receive it, but it will be something that will be
21	law enforcement driven and, like you said,
22	initially it will be amidst chaos and we'll have
23	to go through a mobilization process for the
24	department as well as other city departments, but
25	it's something that we will eventually guide



1	throughout that process if it came to that.
2	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Any plans for
3	exercises?
4	COMM. WILLIAMS: I have to say I don't
5	know.
6	ASST. CHIEF DOLUNT: Madam
7	Commissioner, we've had some exercises. I think
8	we were hindered by the bridge. Is it fully open
9	now on Ford Street?
10	COMM. WALTON: Yes.
11	ASST. CHIEF DOLUNT: It's fully open
12	no, I didn't think so.
13	See, and that's part of the problem
14	with the residents in No. 4. 75 needs repair,
15	Fort Street yes, it's up, yes, it's down.
16	Jefferson is supposed to be done next
17	year. God forbid something happened and 75 got
18	closed and we seen that when the tanker exploded
19	or whatever, you're basically the only way out
20	of downtown Detroit is Michigan Avenue.
21	So, you know, I'm part of that. I'm
22	going to get on that, commissioner.
23	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you.
24	ASST. CHIEF DOLUNT: You know what,
25	I've been frustrated by this whole bridge thing



1	for years and they worry about the money, but how
2	about the lives, so I will personally address
3	that, okay.
4	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you.
5	ASST. CHIEF DOLUNT: Yes, ma'am.
6	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Madam Chair, if
7	I recall three years ago as a matter of fact
8	we were in the 4th Precinct, we had our meeting,
9	the commission meeting, and the discussion was
10	something to the effect if there was a
11	cataclysmic event involving such as a fire or
12	something involving Marathon as to what was the
13	evac plan for the residents of Southwest Detroit.
14	And we weren't talking about anything
15	that was highly confidential or elaborate, just
16	something on a piece of paper that they could
17	post on their refrigerator as to what route to
18	take to avoid that particular area or to escape
19	the area.
20	And so I ask that perhaps we could have
21	someone from Homeland Security come before us and
22	someone from Marathon come before us because we
23	were talking about a distribution of just
24	something real simple with instructions as to
25	what to do if something occurs in that particular

1	area, Southwest Detroit around Marathon.
2	I mean, they still talk about what to
3	do and when to go in your basement if there's a
4	tornado, so I mean simply can we have something
5	if, God forbid, if there's a fire or something
6	like that involving Marathon and even as
7	Assistant Chief just talked about a tanker fire
8	on the freeway, just certain routes to take or
9	something like that.
10	COMMISSIONER CARTER: And actually,
11	commissioner, my thing is Marathon is a company
12	that it's not their responsibility, it's the
13	government's responsibility to take care of the
14	residents. So although we can bring Marathon in,
15	it's our responsibility to the citizens to have
16	something in place I think in my opinion.
17	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, ma'am, I
18	concur, but also too Marathon is a business and
19	they're the ones who have that facility there, so
20	some of the responsibility is on Marathon and one
21	would hope that Marathon would work with the
22	government
23	COMMISSIONER CARTER: I'm sure they
24	will.



COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: -- to make sure

1	that the citizens in that area are safe.
2	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Commander?
3	COMM. BARREN: Through the Chair,
4	Commander Elvin Barren. I do have Deputy
5	Director Kincaid on the phone. I did ask him the
6	question that was posted tonight. He said yes,
7	they do have a plan for the citizens and right
8	now they're working with City Council, they're
9	presenting their product to City Council.
10	If the Board would like, he would come
11	and do a presentation at the Board's direction,
12	so I'll share his contact information with your
13	staff and then we can work out some kind of
14	demonstration from Homeland Security.
15	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you. Is
16	there any more questions?
17	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Through the Chair,
18	I did have a quick question. Do you have any
19	concerns as relates to resources here at the 4th
20	Precinct that you might need?
21	COMM. WALTER: Well, like anywhere else
22	for the department manpower. I mean we but
23	that's everywhere, so other than that we have
24	actually we're very lucky, we have a great
25	building. Other than that, our resources are



1	quite good, it's manpower, but that's across the
2	city and I know they're working hard trying to
3	get us more people.
4	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you.
5	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you. Any
6	other questions, commissioners?
7	COMMISSIONER SANDERS: Through the
8	Chair, I have a question maybe for Chief Dolunt.
9	The people that graduate from the recruitment
10	class, where do they go? I mean, this is for
11	Chief Dolunt.
12	ASST. CHIEF DOLUNT: They go to the
13	precincts.
14	COMMISSIONER SANDERS: But from what my
15	understanding is, listening to some of the
16	lieutenants and the commanders, they always short
17	of manpower.
18	ASST. CHIEF DOLUNT: We are always
19	short on manpower because we have attrition. In
20	the summer we have unfortunately this summer
21	we have the Park Detail because we've had so many
22	problems in Rouge Park and on the east side
23	Chandler Park, and we're trying to be proactive
24	so we have a Park Detail to cut down the
25	shootings and then we've got the Tiger games,



we've got everything going on downtown from the
concerts to the shows and unfortunately and
we're not just pulling from the precincts, we're
pulling from the Detective Bureau.

The bottom line is I believe we're down 200 and some bodies and we're trying to get them, but we're losing people on a monthly basis. We try to get them through the academy and then, quite honestly, we got some good looking people in uniforms, look very very professional, which you all should at all times, it's a battle, we try to put on the best face for Detroit.

And sometimes we'll have them doing traffic because they're new, they're energetic, they can do eight hours in the sun and all that stuff. However, we actually suspended our career enrichment program for the summer because we don't have the bodies to do that, and we're going to start it again in the fall, so we are definitely short in every precinct and every bureau, but we're trying and we're recruiting —

I think we have three classes in right now, don't we.

COMM. WALTON: I believe today at the meeting they said there's over 100 in the academy



1	right now.
2	ASST. CHIEF DOLUNT: So we're trying to
3	push them out before we lose everybody, but we're
4	trying.
5	COMMISSIONER SANDERS: Thank you.
6	ASST. CHIEF DOLUNT: Yes, sir.
7	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Any other
8	questions, commissioners? Thank you. Are there
9	any standing committee reports at this time,
10	commissioners?
11	Under new business, we have a
12	resolution for Thomas Frederick Fayz and
13	Commissioner Mallett is going to present that
14	resolution.
15	COMMISSIONER MALLETT: I'll read it and

24	1961 from Western and later attended Henry Ford
25	Community College for two years.

4	his country Mr. Fayz took a job at A&P where he
5	worked for 15 years, R&L Transfer for another 10
6	and worked 10 more years as a dispatch terminal

18	much. Thank you, Ms. Pannell.
19	MS. PANNELL: Okay, thank you.

23	thank you, 2nd Precinct.

1	My name is Jennifer, Jennifer Gomez, and although
2	I may not have been born here in Detroit I've
3	been raised in Detroit my whole life and the
4	reason why I'm up here is actually I don't
5	believe in coincidences. I was here for
6	something else, but I bumped into this and I'm
7	really happy that I did. Why? Because things
8	are not as pretty as they look out here, they're
9	definitely not.

I'm going to let you guys know the people are afraid. No one wants to speak up, nobody wants to. There's no communication with the police officers and with the actual people, the people that really do matter, not us that are there, the people that are out there.

The people that want to help, but they're afraid inside their homes because they don't feel protected. I'm the oldest of nine children and within the last four weeks I've actually experienced -- I've had to come here at least four times, four times, and it's not a complaint, but some of the police officers that you do have and some of the people that are here don't put so much effort and care into what we're doing.



1	And it's not the youth, it's not the
2	little ones, it's the people that are already out
3	there, people that know better. So the
4	communication between everyone, where is it at?
5	That's the communication that we really do need
6	to break the barriers that are between the people
7	and us. If we can actually develop relationships
8	with people out here, we can help solve a lot
9	more things.
10	People aren't feeling protected, people
11	don't want to speak up any more and the crazies
12	are getting even more crazy. Why? Because
13	they're feeling more oh, they're not doing
14	anything or we're getting away with these kinds
15	of things and it's getting worse and worse and
16	worse and worse.
17	It's making me want to come up here and
18	be an officer myself because hey, man, if no one
19	is going to really do something
20	ASST. CHIEF DOLUNT: We need you.
21	MS. GOMEZ: Like come on, you know.
22	COMMISSIONER CARTER: So what are you
23	doing. Recruiting I'm sure is open tomorrow
24	morning, so
25	MS. GOMEZ: I'm actually I actually



1	have two businesses right now. I'm a financial
2	coach with the State of Michigan as well, I work
3	with groups, not just with prayer groups, I work
4	with groups of young people that need advice from
5	men and women and things like that.

I take interviews from people.

Relationship-wise I try to work with the youth, I try to work with people.

COMMISSIONER CARTER: It sounds like all the things that police officers do.

MS. GOMEZ: Definitely. You know what, people these days don't have any more respect, there is no shame and, you know what, without shame and respect what are you going to do when your people are afraid? They're going to take over.

I have people that I hear that are already saying if cops are -- they're going to shoot them right there on the spot. There's no respect any more, so ladies and gentlemen, what are we doing to re-establish that respect that we need in our city to help our citizens feel much protected like we're supposed to feel and actually want to make people stand up and stand up for the truth.

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
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1	Where is the motivation? But I want to

police officers as our safety team, we're a team
of three. We are small, but we are mighty.

We have -- two of us are here present, the other lady, she's not here, she's out doing civilian patrol. We work closely with the West Vernor Civilian Patrol and right now we're doing a pilot patrol at Urban Neighborhood Initiative and we are targeting the Spanish-speaking population.

We are having a series of four community forums. The first one was about building block clubs, you know, being the street captain on your block. Then we have one on environmental. Just yesterday we had a community forum on self-defense, crime prevention and our wonderful neighborhood police officer Alphonso Reese and NPO from the 3rd, Officer Menyo, they came and they did a presentation on self-defense and victim prevention and we are targeting the Spanish-speaking population. We are engaging

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1	them, involving them to step up to be more active
2	and proactive in civilian patrolling.
3	Our next community forum will be next
4	week and that is the call being the eyes and ears
5	of your block, of your neighborhood, and again,
6	we're going to have our neighborhood police
7	officers present and the Commander Walton, she's
8	also coming as well.
9	So what are we doing as organizations
10	in Southwest Detroit, so we're reaching out,
11	we're building a network and we're inviting folks
12	to come in. So the language barrier, we're
13	working at shifting it away and bringing them up,
14	lifting them up, removing the fear, the barrier
15	of police, whatever it is, police we've had
16	good experience with the BUWOY Program, the
17	Businesses United With Officers and Youth and our
18	neighborhood police officers we have partnered
19	with them as non-profit organizations to break
20	that barrier.
21	So by inviting children on these field
22	trips, these outings, so we're working through
23	the kids up to the adults and so we have
24	established connections there where the Latino

6	non-profits organizations, we are out there. I'd

9	other's pillars, we are each other's hands, so

14	I am over Congress of Communities in Southwest
15	Detroit and most of everything I was about to
16	say, Manina, my superpower partner over here,
17	said it, but I have to say that a couple of weeks
18	ago with a grand opening of the first ever
19	Community Driven Partnership Safety Hub was very
20	much a success and it's so awesome to see people,
21	residents, regular people who would not
22	necessarily come to the 4th Precinct for whatever

1	very great job at it so far and it's only been a

3	it like we did it last year. We're going to just
4	decide or others have decided I know I haven't


COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Madam Chair,

I'm not one to engage in any political chicanery.

Last year -- as a matter of fact I have a

document here that's dated 7-23-15 last year and
this was the policy and procedure for election of
officers which was amendment to the bylaws that
was passed. Also too, Tuesday as we do every

1	week commissioners receive e-mails as to what's
2	on the agenda.
3	So I believe that we should move
4	forward with the elections today. Also in these
5	bylaws it states that Commission will hold the
6	election for Chair and Vice-Chair on the second
7	Thursday of June commencing calendar year 2016

17	have bylaws that are the rules of what how you
18	conduct business, but we also when we have our
19	meetings plan them in advance, we send out
20	notices, we advise our audience, in this case the
21	public, of what we're going to do that week.

2	we don't do that.					

Yes, it's in the bylaws; yes, we say we're going to do it, but when do we announce it to the public. Why don't we follow a procedure that allows the public to be a participant or at least engage in the act itself, the election.

So not having mentioned a thing last week, I really didn't think we were having elections until the end of June. I had to check — I had to call the office and I got an e-mail from Mr. Brown saying we were having elections Thursday, that was Tuesday, two-day notice that we're having elections.

I'm sorry, even if they are in the bylaws and we approved them because I found out when we approved them, March of last year -- of this year.

I understand that, but it's every procedure -- every board that I belong to we announce elections, they're on the agenda, the audience knows, the community knows, the people that are involved know well in advance.

In fact, in almost every board that I sit on we have to give about a 30-day notice that



1	we're having elections so that whose who want to
2	run for office are allowed to do as the
3	commissioner indicated, indicate their interest
4	and speak about their background to the public or
5	to the community.
6	So I agree wholeheartedly with Bishop
7	Vann, I think we ought to postpone the election
8	and not only that, we don't have a board
9	secretary right now, so we are missing the
10	primary staff person of the Board of Police
11	Commissioners office.
12	We did hire someone and they're going
13	to start, my understanding, June 14 so I would
14	even suggest that we wait until the board
15	secretary is hired and that we hold elections so
16	that he could help coordinate and notify the
17	community.
18	COMMISSIONER BURTON: Madam Chair,
19	could we motion to postpone it to next week due
20	to the fact that we haven't been we haven't
21	had a board secretary for quite a while?
22	COMMISSIONER CARTER: Ms. Bernard
23	COMMISSIONER BURTON: There's a motion
24	on the floor. Do I get a second from anybody?

In terms of the notice of the board meetings itself, the notice is posted at City Council. Perhaps Robert can speak to all of the organization that the agenda is sent to. I -- in fact I get two copies of the agenda, one from Robert and of course one from Sharon Pannell. She sends it out to a whole list of people. The agenda is sent electronically throughout the community and it is sent -- Robert, can you speak to who you sent it to if you don't mind.

MR. BROWN: Robert Brown. I think what Commissioner Dewaelsche is alluding to is I sent this out on Tuesday stating that the election -- as a matter of fact, I sent the e-mail first because I wanted to make sure before I put it on the agenda that anybody had a problem with me putting it on the agenda or holding it off. I didn't get any response.

So then I just went forward and so okay because of the memo that you guys have that say the second week in June, so the second week is today. So based on that, I immediately just put it on the agenda.

6	We tried to meet all the criteria so we
7	would not have that type of discussion and really

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


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
