4 COMMISSIONER BELL: Good afternoon  
5 and welcome to the weekly meeting of the Board of  
6 Police Commissioners. I am your Chair, Willie  
7 Bell and we're going to move forward and I think  
8 I'm going to open up with a prayer.

9 I normally ask Bishop Vann and he  
10 always blesses us, but let us pray.

11 (INVOCATION WAS GIVEN).

12 COMMISSIONER VANN: I make a motion, Mr.  
13 Chair, that you pray more often.

14 COMMISSIONER BELL: And it's always  
15 good to hear the Bishop's voice in terms of  
16 prayer and that type of spiritual blessing from a  
17 man of God.

18 I'm going to ask -- we're missing two  
19 or three Commissioners. I'm going to ask the  
20 Commissioners to introduce themselves starting to  
21 my left, please.

22 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Commissioner  
23 Reginald Crawford, Commissioner of the 3rd  
24 District.

25 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Commissioner

1 Richard Shelby, Commissioner of the 1st District.

2 COMMISSIONER VANN: Commissioner Vann,  
3 Commissioner of the 2nd District.

4 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: Commissioner  
5 Derrick Sanders, appointed.

6 COMMISSIONER DEWEALSCHE: Commissioner  
7 Eva Garza Dewaelsche, appointed.

8 COMMISSIONER BELL: I'm going to ask  
9 the Board Secretary to read into the record for  
10 the excused absences for this meeting.

11 SECRETARY HICKS: Thank you, Mr. Chair.  
12 Today's excused list includes Commissioner  
13 Brooks, Commissioner Burton, Commissioner Carter,  
14 Commissioner Mallett and Commissioner Moore.

15 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, sir. Do  
16 we have a quorum?

17 SECRETARY HICKS: You have a quorum.

18 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, and  
19 sitting in for Chief Craig is Deputy Chief David  
20 Levalley.

21 DEP. CHIEF LEVALLEY: Yes, sir, thank  
22 you for having me.

23 COMMISSIONER BELL: Good to see you.  
24 You are Deputy Chief --

25 DEP. CHIEF LEVALLEY: Detective Bureau.

1 COMMISSIONER BELL: Detective Bureau.  
2 Is that something like Columbo?

3 DEP. CHIEF LEVALLEY: Kind of.

4 COMMISSIONER BELL: One of my favorite  
5 detectives on TV outside of Gill Hill, the  
6 legendary Gill Hill.

7 DEP. CHIEF LEVALLEY: I don't smoke  
8 cigars or anything though.

9 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, sir. And,  
10 Mr. Hicks, our Board Secretary, Gregory Hicks,  
11 would you introduce the staff of the Board of  
12 Police Commissioners, please.

13 SECRETARY HICKS: Again, thank you,  
14 Mr. Chair. We have here with us today -- I don't  
15 see Gail Oxendine, but Gail would be here. I  
16 don't see her at least in this light.

17 Linda Bernard who is the attorney for  
18 the Board is sitting up in the front. Of course  
19 Robert Brown who is right next to me is  
20 administrative assistant to the Board.

21 And we have Chief Investigator Pamela  
22 Davis Drake who is sitting over here and Pam, as  
23 always, if you could introduce any of your staff  
24 who's here.

25 CHIEF INV. DAVIS-DRAKE: I have with me

1 Supervising Investigator Lawrence Akbar.

2 SECRETARY HICKS: Mr. Chair, I would  
3 also indicate that taping the meeting would be  
4 Sgt. Alan Quinn, we also have representatives  
5 from the Media Services and we have Dale Rose as  
6 the court reporter who is with us as well.

7 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, sir. At  
8 this time I'm going to ask Deputy Chief Levalley  
9 to introduce any other DPD staff, command staff,  
10 any others in attendance from DPD.

11 DEP. CHIEF LEVALLEY: All right, right  
12 now I see Deputy Chief Celia Washington, Legal  
13 Advisor; Comm. Deshaune Sims, Professional  
14 Accountability and Capt. Michael Chambers just  
15 walked in from Professional Accountability -- or  
16 Professional Standards I guess, sorry.

17 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you. And  
18 it's my pleasure to introduce -- and she don't  
19 really need introduction, but one of those  
20 legendary activists in the community for quite  
21 some time over the years, that would be Ms. Helen  
22 Moore. Would you please stand up?

23 Thank you, good to see you this evening  
24 -- I mean this afternoon.

25 And also Dr. Divers, pro tem George

1 Cushingberry's office there and good to see  
2 others. I know we'll hear from you in terms of  
3 the opportunity for the community to participate.  
4 It's good that you're in attendance this  
5 afternoon.

6 As we go forward I'm going to ask the  
7 Board to approve the agenda for this afternoon's  
8 meeting.

9 COMMISSIONER VANN: So moved,  
10 Mr. Chair.

11 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Support.

12 COMMISSIONER BELL: Properly moved and  
13 supported. Discussion? Those in favor aye?

14 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

15 COMMISSIONER BELL: Those opposed? The  
16 motion carries. The next item will be approval  
17 of minutes from Thursday, August 18, 2016.

18 COMMISSIONER VANN: Move for adoption,  
19 Mr. Chair.

20 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Support.

21 COMMISSIONER BELL: It's been properly  
22 moved and supported. Any discussion? Those in  
23 favor, aye?

24 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

25 COMMISSIONER BELL: Those opposed?

1 Motion carried. I don't really have a report at  
2 this time. I think things are moving right along  
3 as far as the Board activities and so we're  
4 looking forward to more interaction next month in  
5 terms of reporting out.

6 At this time I move to Deputy Chief  
7 David Levalley in terms of reporting out for the  
8 Chief of Police.

9 DEP. CHIEF LEVALLEY: Thank you, sir.  
10 I'll start with the crime report. Year to date  
11 we're at 197 homicides. Last year we were at  
12 183, we're up 14 in that category.

13 Non-fatal shootings, we're at 618, last  
14 year we were at 711, we're down 93 non-fatal  
15 shootings. Robberies, we are at 1,724 compared  
16 to 1,976 for last year, we're down 252 robberies,  
17 13 percent.

18 Carjackings this year are at 212. Last  
19 year at this date we were at 315, we're down 103  
20 or 33 percent.

21 Our Priority 1 response time for last  
22 week was 16 minutes average.

23 A few announcements or comments I  
24 guess. We had chief of the day yesterday, young  
25 man named Rodney Burton who's been battling some



1 illnesses and that was a very exciting day. We  
2 flew him in on a helicopter.

3 I think they took him from SRT Base  
4 over to Aviation in SRT's Bearcat and then flew  
5 him in here on a helicopter and the Chief swore  
6 him in, had a pizza party for him, signed a few  
7 documents, he met the Mayor, did some photographs  
8 with the Mayor, so it was a very nice event and a  
9 positive story.

10 The night prior we had some officers  
11 that were fired upon that occurred in the 2nd  
12 Precinct. They were investigating some shots  
13 fired in the area and as they bent the corner  
14 they were fired at 19 or 20 times from an assault  
15 rifle. At least three rounds hit the car.

16 Fortunately none of the officers were  
17 injured at all. They did return some fire. The  
18 suspect at that time escaped. We now have one  
19 person in custody who we're tying up the case  
20 right now, putting the loose ends together to see  
21 about charges with the Prosecutor's Office.

22 We had -- earlier this week we had an  
23 executive retreat for the captains and above in  
24 the department, an eight-hour training day, which  
25 turned out to be very informative for the command

1 staff. We like to do that every four months or  
2 so to get everybody together in the room and  
3 discuss some of the issues that we're seeing in  
4 the department, so we did that this week.

5 This weekend there's a softball game,  
6 it's DPD versus Detroit Fire Department and it's  
7 a charity fundraiser to raise some resources for  
8 the Capushin Soup Kitchen which operates in  
9 Detroit.

10 Deputy Chief Fitzgerald will be the  
11 team captain for the Detroit Police Department  
12 team, and he assures us that they're going to  
13 win. So that is at Kingborn Field which is at  
14 Greenfield and Michigan Avenue. If anybody is  
15 interested, Sunday, I believe the first game is  
16 at 11 AM and it's a best of three.

17 And so we have Resources? We're  
18 supposed to have a presentation from Resource  
19 Management. I don't know if you want me to  
20 introduce that, but apparently they're not in the  
21 room yet.

22 COMMISSIONER BELL: Okay, so when they  
23 come that will be fine. You mentioned a softball  
24 game. That means that AC Dolunt is not heading  
25 it up this year, you might have an opportunity to

1 win.

2 DEP. CHIEF LEVALLEY: I'll be sure to  
3 let him know.

4 COMMISSIONER BELL: That will get his  
5 attendance at the next meeting, right.

6 DEP. CHIEF LEVALLEY: Right. I think  
7 he will be doing some coaching from the  
8 sidelines.

9 COMMISSIONER BELL: First base or third  
10 base?

11 DEP. CHIEF LEVALLEY: I don't know that  
12 it matters, you'll probably hear him throughout  
13 the entire field no matter where he's standing.

14 COMMISSIONER BELL: I know he loves  
15 softball among other sports and activities, so  
16 just want to get that in there.

17 DEP. CHIEF LEVALLEY: That's all I have  
18 for right now, if there's any questions of me.

19 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, and  
20 Director Gail Oxendine has joined us also. Good  
21 to see you this afternoon.

22 Resource Management is not in place, we  
23 can move on. Any committee reports, standing  
24 committee reports or subcommittee reports?

25 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Through the

1 Chair. Citizens Complaint Committee met today,  
2 we had a very good meeting. We will be bringing  
3 something for the Board for their review as it  
4 relates to data and that will be brought forth  
5 probably at the next Board meeting.

6 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you,  
7 Commissioner Shelby.

8 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: I have a --  
9 it's not a report from the committee, the Policy  
10 Committee, but I did have concern about policy  
11 and Deputy Chief Levalley just spoke about shots  
12 fired and I'm so thankful and grateful that none  
13 of the officers were injured.

14 But what was reported in the media a  
15 couple of days ago on Fox 2 News and I know  
16 lawyers will sue police officers and they will  
17 sue this police department, but there was a very  
18 disturbing report of a lawsuit filed in Federal  
19 Court of an incident that occurred August 14,  
20 2015, involved a citizen Mr. Delmar Parker was  
21 his name, and it happened at Curtis and Mendota.

22 It allegedly involved three off-duty  
23 police officers who -- let me summarize this --  
24 allegedly I guess responded. There was a  
25 relationship between Mr. Delmar Parker's

1 ex-girlfriend who has a child by one of these  
2 off-duty police officers who responded to a  
3 domestic situation one might say and ultimately  
4 Mr. Parker's vehicle was shot up by I guess the  
5 officer or officers.

6 It was alleged in the media that some  
7 15 shots were fired as a result of this. And of  
8 course the Wayne County Prosecutor's Office  
9 denied a warrant against Mr. Parker who was a  
10 citizen, also denied warrants against the  
11 officers and as stated in the media it's been a  
12 year, but there's still a current investigation  
13 going on, Chief.

14 To the Commission, is there any  
15 Commissioners that had knowledge of this  
16 situation in these briefings that they have with  
17 the Mayor and the Chief because I consider this  
18 kind of egregious and stuff, I have citizens who  
19 call me and ask me did we know anything about  
20 this and I sit on the Commission; that's one.

21 Two is in terms of the policy and the  
22 DPD manual, I would like for all of us as  
23 Commissioners -- yet I know two years ago or  
24 three years, it's been two and a half years when  
25 we were seated on this Board, we all received a

1 CD with a copy of the manual. We have some  
2 Commissioners who came on, I don't know if they  
3 got that, but if we could be issued or reissued  
4 because it's been some amendments and updates to  
5 the manual, a copy -- I believe the then Board  
6 Secretary George Anthony I guess coordinated it  
7 with Mr. Brown and we got copies of that CD which  
8 has all the information on it, the manual and  
9 policies and particularly that section involving  
10 officers who may engage in a domestic family  
11 situation off duty. That is so important.

12 Also too so much for transparency and I  
13 say that, this happened more than a year ago and  
14 I didn't have any knowledge and I seriously doubt  
15 any other Commissioners had any knowledge of it  
16 and I guess transparency doesn't come into play  
17 if you don't know to ask, then perhaps the  
18 department doesn't have to tell so to speak.

19 But then it also brings into question  
20 as to whether or not this Police Commission is  
21 relevant and that's what some of the citizens  
22 conveyed to me over the last couple of days. I  
23 mean, are we really relevant if things are going  
24 on that we have no knowledge about.

25 So -- and to Attorney Bernard, I sent

1 you an e-mail on July 28 and I asked in that  
2 particular e-mail how much has DPD paid out in  
3 lawsuits and I wanted to know for the year 2016  
4 which is current, 2015, 2014 and 2013 and I do  
5 believe the information was covered at a meeting  
6 that I believe I was out of town in terms of the  
7 lawsuits, the amounts that DPD has paid out.

8 As was stated about a month or so ago  
9 the state of Michigan has paid out \$42 million,  
10 \$8 million dollars by the State Police, so just  
11 if -- I think the information is already  
12 gathered, but I wanted to know as to all the  
13 payouts Detroit Police Department has paid out in  
14 lawsuits for those particular years.

15 MS. BERNARD: Do you want a response?

16 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, ma'am,  
17 because I didn't get that information because I  
18 do recall I was out of town and this is just one  
19 of very few meetings that I missed.

20 COMMISSIONER BELL: You covered several  
21 different areas, you covered several different  
22 areas. The first part, the Chair, the Vice-Chair  
23 in the last year so no, we were not aware of any  
24 incidents. In fact, we're somewhat in the dark  
25 in terms of discipline and so maybe we need to

1 try to address that even though we might not be  
2 in the official loop, but somewhere along the  
3 line, but I like to have Linda Bernard go second.

4 I'd like to have Deputy Chief  
5 Washington come forward. We have pursued the  
6 matter about the cost of lawsuits with the  
7 corporation counsel and also the Mayor and the  
8 Chief. That discussion has taken place in the  
9 last six months or so. I don't know if Deputy  
10 Chief Washington -- and I apologize, I didn't ask  
11 for questions or comments of the Board or the  
12 Deputy Chief so you're right on target in terms  
13 of responding out, so if we could hear from  
14 Deputy Chief Washington first.

15 DEP. CHIEF WASHINGTON: Celia  
16 Washington, Legal Advisor. First, to address  
17 Commissioner Crawford's comments about the story  
18 that was on the news this week with the incident.  
19 Quite frankly, I wasn't aware that we had been  
20 served either, so if there's any inference that  
21 there's lack of transparency, it certainly isn't  
22 intended to be. I did not know that we had been  
23 served and Comm. Sims from Professional Standards  
24 said that the warrant -- and she could probably  
25 speak to it better -- there's recent activity.



1                   COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD:  Yes, ma'am.  
2                   Well, I just want to respond to that in terms of  
3                   I'm not talking about the lawsuit, I'm just  
4                   talking about the incident, just the information.  
5                   I'm not -- because whether you're served or not  
6                   or whether or not the department gets sued or  
7                   not, the issue I was talking about is just not  
8                   even having knowledge of an incident of that  
9                   magnitude or allegedly or that egregious that  
10                  occurred a year ago.

11                  And, I mean, it smacks of what happened  
12                  in Chicago where the video and incident happened  
13                  for over a year and you had a prosecutor, a mayor  
14                  and a police chief -- not -- that's here, I'm not  
15                  referencing that in terms of Detroit, but what I  
16                  am saying is -- and then as you well know some of  
17                  these other cities that have not even come forth.

18                  And I will say with all due respect  
19                  this chief has in passing and even Commissioner  
20                  Bell can attest to it, made reference to  
21                  situations that may come up and just a general  
22                  conversation because when people in the street  
23                  ask me, "Well, did you know about this?" or, "Why  
24                  do we even have a Police Commission if you don't  
25                  know about an incident of this magnitude".

1                   And it's not about the particulars  
2                   because I do know their investigation is going on  
3                   even though this one seems to be a quite lengthy  
4                   one since it's been a year, but at least I can  
5                   respond saying, "I know about it, there is an  
6                   investigation."

7                   DEP. CHIEF WASHINGTON: So to speak to  
8                   that point and perhaps, Mr. Hicks and I and the  
9                   Commander can talk, there is current not a  
10                  mechanism in place, Commissioners, for every  
11                  single incident that IA -- and I'm not speaking  
12                  for her -- to communicate every single incident  
13                  to the Board of Police Commissioners.

14                  And we can talk about what changes  
15                  might look like. You guys are aware you have a  
16                  Citizens Complaint Committee different from what  
17                  is referred to at IA and we can talk about the --

18                  COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: But I'm not  
19                  referencing every single one, just when it's  
20                  something that's egregious as this that has the  
21                  potential, you know, that perhaps the public may  
22                  want to respond.

23                  DEP. CHIEF WASHINGTON: We can talk  
24                  about what that threshold looks like.

25                  COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, ma'am,

1 that would be appropriate, thank you.

2 COMM. SIMS: Deshaune Sims, Commander,  
3 Professional Standards Bureau. I just wanted to  
4 touch upon the incident happening last year in  
5 August, was submitted in September of last year.  
6 We didn't get the declination back for the  
7 officer until June 10 of this year which is why  
8 -- it's been closed and turned in and it's under  
9 review in my office, but it has not been approved  
10 by me as yet, but that's why it's been open for  
11 so long because we didn't get the declination  
12 back until June of this year.

13 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, ma'am,  
14 okay, thank you.

15 COMMISSIONER BELL: Commissioner  
16 Crawford, are you referring to if we have a  
17 shooting involving police officers, especially  
18 when someone is shot by a police officer, the  
19 Board should be notified, would that be a  
20 discussion we might have with the DC?

21 In this case the young man said he was  
22 shot?

23 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: He wasn't shot,  
24 his car was shot.

25 COMMISSIONER BELL: I'm just going by

1 --

2 DEP. CHIEF WASHINGTON: So  
3 police-involving shootings.

4 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, we can have  
5 that type of discussion that we all get on the  
6 same page and it's something that perhaps we can  
7 have that type of discussion leading to other  
8 issues, but we have that type of discussion.

9 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Commissioner,  
10 I have a question, Mr. Chair. We get a  
11 communication operations report that talks about  
12 shootings and I'm just wondering would that be  
13 there? We get this every week.

14 COMMISSIONER BELL: That is true, that  
15 is true.

16 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: I read those  
17 and also I read the 24-hour that's in our  
18 department mail every -- well, 24 hours we get  
19 that, that's constant, so any instance like that,  
20 shots fired or something like that would be in  
21 there.

22 COMMISSIONER BELL: So there's some  
23 form of communication going on now that we just  
24 have to take -- be aware of and take notice of.  
25 We might be on the same page I think, a little

1 bit more communication.

2 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: But this is off  
3 duty. I know it's supposed to be in there even  
4 if it's off duty.

5 COMMISSIONER BELL: On duty or off duty  
6 we want to be notified.

7 MS. BERNARD: Linda Bernard, attorney  
8 to the Board. Commissioner Crawford, I think  
9 that in order to define better what it is in  
10 particular are interested in, we might work with  
11 the department and work with the Law Department  
12 with corporation counsel's office to determine  
13 when claims are made if you will or significant  
14 claims are made against the department that are  
15 legal in nature because that would encompass what  
16 you're talking about in terms of the higher  
17 threshold than the reports that you get about  
18 shots being fired, etc.

19 So I can certainly inquire to Butch  
20 about that, but on the question of the amount of  
21 dollars that have been spent in lawsuits, I've  
22 sent two memos to the office of corporation  
23 counsel and the chairman is aware of them and  
24 they were forwarded to the Board requesting that  
25 information and we haven't received it.

1           At the budget meeting that the Chairman  
2 attended before City Council. Butch Hollowell  
3 went before us, the corporation counsel's audit  
4 questions were before the Police Commission's  
5 audit questions and that was one of the questions  
6 that they had prepared for the City Council and I  
7 took notes during that meeting.

8           And what you're referring to I think  
9 are the notes that Commissioner Bell referred to  
10 in terms of his report in terms of what was  
11 happening with the Law Department in terms of  
12 litigation. Litigation was way down, but I will  
13 request it again and I will also request that  
14 when they receive a claim above the \$25,000 or  
15 \$50,000 threshold which would be either a claim  
16 or litigation that they notify us of that, so at  
17 least you'll have no information about -- and the  
18 lawsuit of course tells you what the claim is  
19 about, but the -- or if there's been a formal  
20 claim that's been made.

21           COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, ma'am.

22           MS. BERNARD: Would that be sufficient?  
23 What dollar threshold, because there could be a  
24 \$5,000 claim or something like that and you're  
25 not interested in those I'm sure.

1                   COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: No, ma'am, but  
2                   -- and I just wanted to know the amount that has  
3                   been paid out in litigation in these previous  
4                   years and I might add that years ago when  
5                   Councilwoman Sheila Cockrel was seated on the  
6                   Detroit City Council there was an annual report  
7                   and I used to participate and I attended those  
8                   council meeting, happened to be a Detroit police  
9                   officer, as to an annual report was released as  
10                  to how much the DPD had paid out and I used to  
11                  track this.

12                  One year it was \$40 million, etc. so I  
13                  used to track it every year as to how much we  
14                  were paying out in litigation. It was an annual  
15                  report that was released, yes, ma'am.

16                  MS. BERNARD: We not only requested  
17                  information on the annual payout in terms of  
18                  litigation, we requested information on the fees  
19                  that we paid outside counsel and there is a  
20                  Litigation Unit within the office of corporate  
21                  counsel that deals with police issues all the  
22                  time.

23                  So to me it was a holistic question  
24                  regarding how much, not just the dollars paid  
25                  out, but the whole system that we've built around

1 protecting the legal rights of the City and of  
2 the Detroit Police Department.

3 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, ma'am,  
4 thank you very much. I look forward to receiving  
5 your information. Thank you.

6 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you. Yes,  
7 sir, Deputy Chief.

8 DEP. CHIEF LEVALLEY: There was one  
9 other issue that was brought up and that was a  
10 current copy of the manual and I'll make sure  
11 that Planning gets you a current copy.

12 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, sir, thank  
13 you very much.

14 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you. Good  
15 discussion and are we ready now for Resource  
16 Management?

17 I'd like to revisit that issue. Scott  
18 Benson on behalf of the Council chaired a Public  
19 Safety Committee, perhaps he could be a contact  
20 person. I assume that it can go through this  
21 committee in terms of issues dealing with police  
22 and fire and EMS, so that might be another source  
23 because once they hit the council desk, I guess  
24 they work up the settlement to approve or  
25 disapprove the settlement, so that would be



1 another contact person.

2 SECRETARY HICKS: Excuse me, Mr. Chair,  
3 if I can just remind the Commission in terms of  
4 the thrust of the reorganization and the other  
5 activity which we're looking at in terms of the  
6 enhanced oversight.

7 One of the items in which we have of  
8 course is hiring a fiscal manager. As we have  
9 read-only access to data with inside the  
10 department or really the City's financial data,  
11 once we're able to identify, for example, the  
12 line items, the codes and so forth, we presumably  
13 would be able to deliver that information  
14 ourselves, because at some point where we're  
15 concerned about asking people for things and so  
16 forth there is a way in which normal oversight  
17 organizations operate where they simply go into  
18 these -- and again on a read-only basis, we're  
19 not trying to change the data that the department  
20 operates -- any department operates with -- but  
21 on a fiscal standpoint we can locate these  
22 particular items, we can clearly spin off reports  
23 that gives you the year-end totals over time on  
24 the issues in which you're concerned with.

25 That's the way in which we're moving as

1 an oversight agency, so I would just simply want  
2 to put that on the table just for your future  
3 consideration.

4 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you. It  
5 would be very very helpful.

6 MR. HOLLINS: Good evening. I'm  
7 executive manager Don Hollins and I'm also in  
8 charge of Resource Management. I'm just going to  
9 go over a brief PowerPoint explaining what we do  
10 and then I'll take questions.

11 Basically Resource Management is  
12 responsible for the procurement and distribution  
13 of uniforms and equipment and we also procure and  
14 manage the identifying and repairing of  
15 department facilities.

16 The unit is responsible for the uniform  
17 store, the tow desk which is our precinct towing  
18 operations and facilities. That's where we go  
19 out and identify and manage the facilities that  
20 we use in the police department.

21 I'd like to start with the uniform  
22 store. Basically our staffing now consists of  
23 one police assistant and one administrative  
24 specialist. The uniform store basically supplies  
25 the department with soft goods as opposed to hard

1 goods. That would be uniforms, leather goods and  
2 bullet-resistant vests.

3 This year so far we've issued uniforms,  
4 sets of uniforms, 230 new department members and  
5 68 replacement vests to existing department  
6 members. So you can add to the 230 because we  
7 also issue new members replacement vests also in  
8 the best category.

9 Challenges for the upcoming year. The  
10 challenges that the uniform store will face in  
11 the upcoming year will be providing replacement  
12 shirts to new recruits and to existing members.  
13 We recently had an instance when we changed over  
14 the uniforms and all of our existing officers  
15 didn't receive a full supply of uniforms. I'll  
16 be increasing our budget request to accommodate  
17 them and make them whole.

18 The tow desk. Once again, our staffing  
19 for the tow desk, we have one part-time officer  
20 who assists us with a dual role. He helps us  
21 both with the towing operations, but also the  
22 facilities issues of repair and maintenance. The  
23 tow desk handles citizen complaints which I have  
24 a star there.

25 Telephone crime reporting also handles

1 straightforward type of towing complaints from  
2 citizens, but so basically he also handles towing  
3 complaints that had been escalated so to speak.

4 He also processes the payments for the  
5 departmental tows, ensures that our 24 I believe  
6 it is at the last count tow companies are  
7 operating in compliance with the department's  
8 guidelines. I've listed here for the audience  
9 where the tow desk can be reached and I've also  
10 listed TCRU which also can assist with towing  
11 complaints.

12 I did make sure that everyone is aware  
13 of the new tow fees that were instituted recently  
14 back in 2013. Basically to pick up a car it's  
15 going to be \$125. That is not going to the  
16 police department, that goes to the actual tower.  
17 \$75 city administration fee, I believe we had  
18 questions last year when we spoke about this.  
19 That goes to the City general budget, not the  
20 police department.

21 The \$15 per day storage fee is, once  
22 again, a fee that goes to the tow yard based on  
23 how long it takes for the citizen to pick up  
24 their vehicle. Once again, the minimum charge  
25 would be \$225 -- \$215, okay.

1           Facilities, once again, we start with  
2           our staffing. We have one sergeant, one  
3           restricted duty officer and one police assistant.  
4           It's not listed here, but I also just told you on  
5           the tow side we have one officer assisting.

6           We're responsible for the acquisition,  
7           cleaning and maintenance of department  
8           facilities. We basically use two entities to  
9           help us achieve those goals. The first one is  
10          the City's General Services Department, sometimes  
11          we'll call it GSD. They handle the repairs and  
12          maintenance of facilities -- and cleaning.

13          The DBA or the Detroit Building  
14          Authority, they assist us with more complex  
15          projects like building out or major remodels.

16          Last year we completed construction of  
17          the new 5th Precinct, I believe a few members of  
18          the Board were there. I think the Chairman was  
19          there. Located at 3500 Conner.

20          This year we broke ground, we also had  
21          some Board members present over at the 8th  
22          Precinct where we're building a new 8th Precinct  
23          complex where it's going to have both a precinct,  
24          integrated auditorium and a community room where  
25          we can handle small community gatherings. Also

1 is slated for NPOs to be housed there,  
2 neighborhood police officers.

3 We hope to begin breaking ground on the  
4 8th Precinct by the end of the month and the 3rd  
5 Precinct by mid September. I've got September 8,  
6 but after today's budget we may be delayed a  
7 little bit.

8 Projects in progress, once again we  
9 have the 3rd Precinct buildout. If any of you  
10 have been by there, you've noticed that we've  
11 already done the lot, we've had it graded and  
12 rolled. We opened it up a couple of days ago.

13 The 8th Precinct, demolition once again  
14 is slated to begin by the end of the month of the  
15 interior. I don't know if I mentioned it, it also  
16 has an auditorium. Did I mention that the 8th  
17 Precinct is going to have an auditorium where  
18 this body might want to hold some community  
19 meetings.

20 And one I know is of particular  
21 interest to this board is 900 Merrill Plaisance.  
22 That particular case, last year we had a default  
23 by the contractor. Right now we were up in  
24 budget meetings earlier, it is on the agenda for  
25 budget. Right now we're waiting on funding for

1 that particular project to be completed. Numbers  
2 are coming in higher, roughly 10 to 15 percent  
3 more. We're talking about something on the order  
4 of magnitude to finish the project of \$1,400,000.  
5 Any questions?

6 COMMISSIONER BELL: Commissioners,  
7 questions and concerns?

8 COMMISSIONER VANN: Can you let us know  
9 what actions have been taken against the  
10 contractor?

11 MR. HOLLINS: I've contacted the Law  
12 Department and -- no, I contacted General  
13 Services who gave me a number at the Law  
14 Department which I haven't received a response  
15 yet.

16 But the project scope expanded over  
17 time and right now I don't have any information  
18 on what remedies the City is seeking against the  
19 former contractor.

20 COMMISSIONER VANN: Because it looks as  
21 if we got this same report this time last year,  
22 we were at a stand-still, we don't know where  
23 things are going, we don't owe the money is gone,  
24 we don't know what action is being taken against  
25 the contractor, just stuck in the mud.

1 MR. HOLLINS: Well, I can say that this  
2 project has been included in our five-year  
3 capital plan, so we are moving forward to  
4 complete the project. I do know that the  
5 investigation preliminarily revealed that the  
6 project scope was originally much smaller and the  
7 project grew over time.

8 So as far as I don't believe there was  
9 much the City had in leverage including  
10 insurance, bonding, on that particular project.

11 COMMISSIONER VANN: Is there any way  
12 for us to get some definitive information about  
13 this? I mean, this has been a long-standing  
14 issue ever since I've been on the Commission and  
15 I think by now we ought to have some real  
16 clear-cut answer and a direction in which this is  
17 going with regards to this particular piece of  
18 property.

19 MR. HOLLINS: Well, first of all, if  
20 you notice, I mentioned earlier that the police  
21 department itself does not attempt to manage  
22 these complex jobs.

23 In this particular instance the General  
24 Services Department and Purchasing hired the  
25 contractor and the DBA as -- the project has been



1 turned over to the DBA because it obviously was  
2 too big of a job for General Services to handle.

3 Right now our real estate attorney at  
4 City Law is Scott Brinkman. He could give us  
5 more clarity for the Board if we wanted to  
6 inquire.

7 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Through the  
8 Chair, yes, sir, Mr. Executive Manager Donald  
9 Hollins. I'm certainly glad for your sake  
10 Commission Burton isn't here today. He's been  
11 adamant about the fact that we've been out of our  
12 office over a year. I will pass this information  
13 along to him, but Bishop Vann has somewhat  
14 eloquently echoed Commissioner Burton's  
15 sentiments about the fact that the Commission is  
16 out of their office because of being occupied by  
17 OCI.

18 They've been squatting in our office as  
19 squatters for over a year now, so I echo the same  
20 sentiments as Commissioner Vann. If we can get  
21 something more definitive as to some kind of  
22 projected date and I do realize -- I know that's  
23 difficult with this issue and construction.

24 Chief Drake doesn't mind speaking today  
25 because Commissioner Burton isn't here.

1 COMMISSIONER BELL: Let's pause for one  
2 second. Mr. Hicks wanted to speak.

3 MR. HICKS: Thank you, Commissioner.  
4 The gentleman has indicated that a report is  
5 forthcoming. On behalf of the Commission I would  
6 just like to ask the Commission to put on the  
7 record that we would like a copy of that report  
8 as it comes in to him because he has indicated he  
9 is awaiting a report.

10 COMMISSIONER BELL: Okay, thank you.  
11 Chief Drake?

12 CHIEF INV. DAVIS-DRAKE: Thank you,  
13 sir. For the record, Pamela Davis-Drake. I've  
14 been in communication with the Detroit Building  
15 Authority.

16 A couple of points, Commissioner Vann,  
17 that you made. One is that yes, we have been  
18 kind of in limbo for a while as to what's going  
19 to happen. About three months ago the DBA did  
20 meet, they assumed the position of taking over  
21 the project with -- the DBA's Board did vote on  
22 the additional funding which at the time was \$1.2  
23 million. They agreed to take on that task of  
24 completing the building at that time.

25 I think what Mr. Hollins is talking

1 about, and it is true -- they are now waiting  
2 because additional monies have been requested for  
3 the completion of the build-out. It is in Budget  
4 right now, I know it's going through the process,  
5 City Council process, to ensure that that funding  
6 is -- it happens, so we're waiting on that.

7 We're also waiting on the build-out  
8 internally of the office and this was something  
9 that I'm sure Commissioner Burton would be happy  
10 to hear, within the next few days we're going to  
11 be hearing something about receiving more  
12 cubicles in the suite that is adjacent to the  
13 Board's suite so that will be freeing up some  
14 additional space in the Board.

15 Also within probably the next few  
16 months we'll get more information about exactly  
17 when those dates will be so that we can better  
18 plan for our move for next year.

19 At this time they're talking about the  
20 completion of the Merrill Plaisance Building  
21 sometime next year. That was the last that I  
22 heard. Of course that can change depending on  
23 the funding.

24 MR. HOLLINS: I do have one thing to  
25 add and that is that the building is 75 percent

1 complete, so the building -- it won't be a long  
2 construction schedule once we can get the funding  
3 approved to begin, so I would say 90 days once we  
4 can get funding approved, but the problem is  
5 we've got to get those approvals first.

6 CHIEF INV. DAVIS-DRAKE: And I do want  
7 too that this is not the fault of DBA. It is a  
8 bureaucratic kind of issue that we're dealing  
9 with at this point and it's a matter of going  
10 through the proper channels and making sure that  
11 all of the different departments that have to  
12 actually sign off have signed off on the approval  
13 for that money to be pulled down from one account  
14 to the other. That's been our whole holdup.

15 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you.

16 CHIEF INV. DAVIS-DRAKE: Are there any  
17 other questions?

18 COMMISSIONER BELL: Not on this issue.  
19 At the highest level we have been privileged to  
20 the conversation, it was on, off, on and off, so  
21 this is ongoing matter and so hopefully it  
22 happens next year, sometime next year, but the  
23 powers that be say it was off the table, then it  
24 was on the table, so we just have to wait and see  
25 what happens.

1 CHIEF INV. DAVIS-DRAKE: I know that  
2 the Mayor, sir, is very interested in this  
3 project and he's dedicated to getting it done, so  
4 I know that it is going to happen, I believe it's  
5 going to happen, I'm praying that it's going to  
6 happen and as soon as possible.

7 So when I get an update, I will let you  
8 know, but DBA is keeping me abreast of the  
9 progress as best they can when they hear what's  
10 going on as well, when they get new updates.

11 COMMISSIONER BELL: Maybe we just need  
12 solid information, not speculation.

13 CHIEF INV. DAVIS-DRAKE: We would all  
14 love that, sir.

15 COMMISSIONER BELL: It's enough of  
16 that, so we don't know what's going to happen.

17 CHIEF INV. DAVIS-DRAKE: I agree.

18 COMMISSIONER BELL: Let's move forward.  
19 Any other questions, comments in reference to  
20 Resource Management? Mr. Hollins, thank you for  
21 the update, thank you for your attendance and  
22 look forward to concrete work.

23 We covered committee reports, standing  
24 committee. Mr. Hicks, any other comments you  
25 might want to make at this time?

1                   SECRETARY HICKS: Thank you, Mr. Chair.  
2                   There is a note in your packet that is an update  
3                   to the Board for the Thursday, September 8  
4                   community forum. This is the community forum  
5                   that the subject matter is less than lethal  
6                   weapons.

7                   If you recall what we had indicated to  
8                   the Commission and what we were trying to do is  
9                   to put together a panel discussion. We have  
10                  confirmed five individuals who would sit on the  
11                  panel. The update is in your packet, but they  
12                  are -- just so that the general audience and  
13                  people who are viewing the broadcast here would  
14                  know, Mark Sancher, he's a staff attorney for  
15                  racial justice with the ACLU; Mark Young who is  
16                  the president of the Detroit Police Lieutenants  
17                  and Sergeants Association, Christopher White who  
18                  is with the Coalition Against Police Brutality,  
19                  former DPD Chief and former Deputy Mayor Ike  
20                  McKinnon.

21                  And as you know in the last  
22                  conversation one of the things in which we  
23                  indicated that we were very concerned about was  
24                  having some aspect of the medical discussion of  
25                  this particular issue included. We now have a

1 Robert Dunn who is an M.D. and he is the vice-  
2 chief of emergency medicine at St. John Hospital  
3 and DMC.

4 All five of those individuals will be  
5 available, they will address the Commission. The  
6 commission in turn would be able to address  
7 questions to the Panel and of course if the  
8 Commission is desirous to open it up for public  
9 question and answer.

10 That would take place, again, in our  
11 community meeting starting at 6:30 on September 6  
12 [sic] We're going to be at the Detroit --  
13 September 8, 2016 at 6:30 PM and we'll be at the  
14 Boy Scouts Headquarters located at 1776 Warren  
15 Avenue. And the immediate community in that area  
16 we think we're going to get a very good turnout  
17 will be the Woodbridge and the Wayne State  
18 University community.

19 In addition to that, Commissioners,  
20 what I'd like to report is that we've had a lot  
21 of very good cooperation from Media Services. If  
22 you were to go to our website now you will find  
23 populated on our website, you go to City of  
24 Detroit's website, go to Boards and then you go  
25 to Meetings section on there, you open that up,

1 there is some 40 of your previous meetings that  
2 are available for citizens to view or they can  
3 download those meetings.

4 But we now have a public record that  
5 has immediate access by citizens of essentially  
6 all of the tapings that Media Services has  
7 provided since you entered into an arrangement  
8 with them in order to cover your meetings.

9 So, that combined with the posting of  
10 transcripts and so forth, we again believe that  
11 we're meeting our responsibility probably at one  
12 of the highest levels of showing the kind of  
13 transparency and meeting other kind of statutory  
14 things like the Open Meetings Act and things of  
15 that sort.

16 With those two items, those are the  
17 only things which I wanted to bring to the  
18 attention of the Commission this evening.

19 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Through the  
20 Chair, yes, sir, Mr. Hicks, I want to thank you  
21 and everyone else who helped facilitate that I  
22 observed that on the website today, the City's  
23 website, in terms of our meetings that are up in  
24 addition to -- they've always been in terms of  
25 the minutes of the meetings from the



1 stenographer, the court reporting.

2 And I thank you because there are a lot  
3 of people that basically deal with visualization,  
4 they watch things as opposed to reading things in  
5 terms of the stack of notes or the transcript one  
6 might say of our meetings.

7 So I want to thank you and also for all  
8 of the other work you've done recently and one  
9 might say has brought change to this Commission.  
10 Thank you, sir.

11 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you,  
12 Commissioner Crawford. I'm trying to look over  
13 this podium. Do I see Comm. Todd Bettison there?

14 COMM. BETTISON: Yes, you do, sir.

15 COMMISSIONER BELL: Could you come to  
16 the mic, please, be so kind. Chief Craig always  
17 commends Comm. Bettison in terms of the PR and  
18 along with the staff, Sgt. Woody.

19 Mr. Hicks, I would like to request  
20 Comm. Bettison to be -- help us in terms of  
21 getting the public out and I know you know the  
22 public. I would make a plea to you to try -- we  
23 don't want more participants on the panel, we  
24 have the general audience and we definitely want  
25 feedback from the public in addition to the panel

1 questions, but we want feedback because this is  
2 an opportunity.

3 Could you assist us in that endeavor?

4 COMM. BETTISON: Absolutely, sir, and  
5 just prior to this meeting I was at a meeting  
6 with some young folks from the community and they  
7 had a lot of questions as far as policy and the  
8 youth involvement into the process of just policy  
9 of the DPD. They even asked about the Board of  
10 Police Commissioners.

11 I informed them of all the exciting  
12 things that you're doing as far as getting it out  
13 to the public, with it being on TV now as well,  
14 so I will have them there for you and utilize  
15 their network because one of the young ladies  
16 told me that they have a group of like 1,000 kids  
17 there they're able to reach out to.

18 So I will definitely assist.

19 COMMISSIONER BELL: And I met some of  
20 the young people in the hallway after -- probably  
21 after your meeting. Comm. Ewing introduced them,  
22 we met briefly. So I just think this is a  
23 crucial issue that we somehow make sure the  
24 public is aware and especially young people and  
25 all concerned parties to take advantage.

1           Because this is a great facility that's  
2           hosting it so we can accommodate people. I just  
3           want to make sure that we're doing everything  
4           necessary to get communication out prior to this  
5           date. If we have to do some talk shows or  
6           whatever, then perhaps Commissioner Crawford and  
7           Moore and others could contact maybe Helen Moore,  
8           Dr. Divers.

9           We just really need to work it up  
10          because this is what makes Detroit separate from  
11          other cities. We want to include everything. As  
12          Ron Scott would say, who's not at the table. We  
13          want to bring people to the table to have this  
14          type of condition and we go forward this fall.

15          I know you had over 8,000 young people  
16          at Chene Park and among other things. I just  
17          want to thank you for your involvement as we go  
18          forward and thank you, Mr. Hicks, for putting  
19          this together.

20                 SECRETARY HICKS: Commissioner, if I  
21          can just indicate I have reported on this in the  
22          past, but in addition to what we've talked about  
23          there is a promotional effort and we're more than  
24          happy to join with whatever. You can never  
25          over-promote in this sense, but the Media

1 Services people and essentially people through  
2 the -- really through an operation that sits in  
3 the Mayor's office, they're making a 50 contact  
4 what they call an e-mail blast which is going  
5 out.

6 We suspect between now and this period  
7 we will get two or three of those 50,000 e-mail  
8 blasts. We will also blast to all of the  
9 employees of the City of Detroit which is another  
10 roughly 9,000 individuals.

11 We then are preparing press statements  
12 and prepared to go around and will be calling  
13 upon Commissioners as their time permits to  
14 attend talk shows and things like that in order  
15 to promote this.

16 What we did not do at this point is to  
17 give you a list because within the period of time  
18 in which we're trying to promote -- you know, we  
19 don't know how much we're going to get in that  
20 regard, but we are mindful of the fact that an  
21 actual promotional effort has to go into not only  
22 this event, but all of our activity and so forth  
23 and I would be remiss to say that individuals  
24 like Rose Love who is an institution here in the  
25 city of Detroit in terms of promoting city

1 activity is working with us in this regard.

2 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you,  
3 Mr. Hicks, you're on top of it.

4 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Mr. Chair, I  
5 just want too make sure we get the information to  
6 all the activist groups as we discussed at the  
7 last meeting, most notably New Era and Black  
8 Lives Matter and any other activist organizations  
9 because it's so important to get this to the  
10 people in the street.

11 MR. HICKS: And, Commissioners, again  
12 and not to keep interrupting, but in a lot of  
13 cases -- and I'm one of those kind of like  
14 activists in terms of my background. We didn't  
15 always have addresses, so if anybody has an  
16 address that can be added to this, particularly  
17 of some of the activist organizations that may  
18 not have a permanent address, we would appreciate  
19 it and would be adding them to the promotional  
20 effort.

21 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you.  
22 Ms. Bernard?

23 MS. BERNARD: MR. Chairman and  
24 Commissioners, first of all I think as we  
25 advocate for this event which I'm really excited

1 about, the subject of course of "less than lethal  
2 weapons", but I think people just know the word  
3 "Taser", so the conversation is really about  
4 Tasers and maybe other things, so maybe if we  
5 just refer to it that way it will not sound so  
6 formal.

7 But I came up to notify you that I just  
8 received a text from Corp. Marvin Sanders from  
9 the Dearborn Police Department.

10 "Dear Ms. Bernard --" he had called  
11 me a few weeks ago about the chief wanting to  
12 come to one of our meetings, Chief Haddad.

13 "Dear Ms. Bernard.

14 The Dearborn Police Department  
15 will be present at the September 8, 3rd  
16 Precinct meeting. The essence of our  
17 presence will be to convey our  
18 commitment to work in concert with  
19 Detroit DPD along with providing crime  
20 stats of those areas in the city of  
21 Dearborn which border the city of  
22 Detroit. As I am awaiting confirmation  
23 as to the persons from my agency that  
24 will be attending, when is the latest  
25 that you need the information."

1                   The Chief, Chief Haddad is coming, but  
2 he wanted you to know that in advance so Chief  
3 Levalley and to you as well.

4                   MR. HICKS: The instructions which you  
5 gave us was to essentially strip all items off of  
6 the agenda on the 8th and to handle this  
7 particular item. Where I obviously am not a  
8 member of the Board, I don't speak for the Board  
9 in any particular way, but you have essentially a  
10 closed agenda on the 8th and I'm sure that what  
11 we should be working to is another date in order  
12 for the individual to come to us.

13                   COMMISSIONER BELL: That would be in  
14 order, that should be the focal point and perhaps  
15 we can work those logistics out, but we can talk  
16 about it afterwards in terms of -- I think that  
17 issue with Dearborn PD, the race and ongoing with  
18 the Grosse Pointe PD and all that, that's another  
19 subject matter about Eight mile Road.

20                   We know, maybe we can focus in on these  
21 interactions and not confuse the issue, but we  
22 appreciate the dialog.

23                   COMMISSIONER VANN: A different date,  
24 another meeting, a different date.

25                   MS, BERNARD: All right, thank you.

1                   COMMISSIONER BELL: Any new business?  
2                   Perhaps we can -- any other Commissioner might  
3                   want to speak just in general if they have  
4                   anything they want to share with us at this time  
5                   because sometimes we wait until we have the  
6                   audience participation, but any dialog, anything  
7                   you might want to share, any other Commissioners,  
8                   comments or anything? You all good?

9                   Okay, old business? Announcements, our  
10                  next meeting will be Thursday, September 1 at 3  
11                  PM Public Safety Headquarters right here and we  
12                  already talked about the September 8 meeting, so  
13                  we don't have to -- we know the location and it's  
14                  going to be high profile at the Boy Scouts of  
15                  America, 1776 West Warren and that's the 3rd  
16                  Precinct.

17                  And let's move on to Item 15, oral  
18                  communication from the audience. You have two  
19                  minutes and please identify yourself and if  
20                  you're going to speak, just come forward and be  
21                  ready.

22                  MS. BUTLER: Good afternoon. My name  
23                  is Celia Butler and I'm the community activist  
24                  and I want to address -- I had to think about it,  
25                  but Chief Craig said last week about not



1 identifying an officer that has been involved  
2 in a shooting or what have you, but because of  
3 their family being exposed, but what I can recall  
4 about justice, that justice is blind. There's a  
5 scale that's equal.

6 And I'm thinking in terms of when we  
7 have a person who has committed a crime all of  
8 that person's family hasn't been involved in  
9 whatever that person out of that family  
10 committed, therefore I think that would be fair  
11 if that would keep down confusion in the  
12 community when an officer does commit a shooting  
13 that whatever it is, that it be handled so that  
14 there would be less confusion.

15 I feel if the officer is identified the  
16 same as if a person does the same thing. I know  
17 the Chief isn't here to answer for that, but I  
18 wanted to think about it before I addressed that  
19 at the time that he was talking about that.

20 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, ma'am.

21 MS. MOORE: My name is Helen Moore.

22 COMMISSIONER BELL: How do you do,  
23 Ms. Moore?

24 MS. MOORE: I know the Lord knows I got  
25 enough on my plate with the school system, but

1 I'm here today because it deals with one of our  
2 youth. I am the youth director at my church, and  
3 I did not know that this had happened to one of  
4 our children because I hear you all the time  
5 talking about we need police people and we need  
6 all this going on and this is a great person to  
7 be a police.

8 He's always wanted to be a police, his  
9 father just retired as a police, and I just found  
10 out the other day that he was turned down because  
11 of something that happened when he was 15 years  
12 old. It was supposed to be erased from the  
13 record, expunged and all that, and now we have a  
14 young, that's all he ever wanted to be, that's  
15 all he talked to me about as the young person.  
16 I've known him all his life. I thought he had  
17 been hired.

18 He joined the Army Reserves, he  
19 graduated from Cass, brilliant student and I was  
20 his choir director, beautiful voice, but that's  
21 beyond what we're talking about.

22 I want to know why a 15-year-old child  
23 who wants to be a police who lives in this city  
24 of Detroit has been turned down after he took all  
25 your exams and everything and then up jumps the

1 Devil saying oh, you did something when you were  
2 15 years old, you can't be a police, it's a  
3 felony, but it was supposed to be expunged.

4 So when I heard them talking, I decided  
5 I'm going to take this battle to you because all  
6 of us in here want to save our children just like  
7 I do and this child, I guarantee you, put my  
8 reputation on the line, he's done everything  
9 right except when he was bullied at 15 and did  
10 something he regrets to this day.

11 So can you all help me find out how I  
12 can save this child, how I can make him join the  
13 police department and make us proud? Can you  
14 just tell me what to do?

15 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, ma'am. I  
16 think HR director Gail Oxendine is going to speak  
17 to you, if you give her the mic she's going to  
18 respond to you now.

19 MS. OXENDINE: Yes. With respect to  
20 this applicant -- Gail Oxendine, Human Resources  
21 director for the record.

22 What I can do is I can take his name.  
23 I would not be able to share any information with  
24 you because that information is confidential with  
25 the applicant.

1                   We can pull his record, we can  
2                   determine why he was disqualified and have the  
3                   lieutenant over the Recruiting Division have a  
4                   conversation with him about that, okay?

5                   MS. MOORE: Okay, that sounds good.  
6                   You'll love him, he's a great person.

7                   MS. OXENDINE: We'll check him out.

8                   COMMISSIONER MOORE: Through the Chair,  
9                   Queen Mother Helen Moore, I'm so glad to see you,  
10                  it's been years and --

11                  MS. MOORE: All of you, I guess I know  
12                  everybody here. We've all worked together in the  
13                  past, thank you.

14                  COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: I just want to  
15                  go on record I received this letter from Queen  
16                  Mother Helen Moore prior to this meeting, I've  
17                  read it seated here at the table. I will give  
18                  this information to our Personnel director. Yes,  
19                  ma'am, I have a letter.

20                  Also to Attorney Linda Bernard a copy,  
21                  if someone could make copies and the Board  
22                  Secretary, Mr. Hicks. I'm so glad, I mean,  
23                  you've advocated for our children for years.

24                  MS. MOORE: Yes and he's the only one  
25                  that ever wanted to be a police officer and I

1 think that's great.

2 All the other children I deal with are  
3 actors and lawyers and engineers. I don't lose  
4 any, I cannot believe that he is not with the  
5 police department.

6 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: I can assume  
7 you the Director Oxendine is going to look into  
8 it. Also, there is an appeals process too and  
9 we'll get you that information, Attorney Bernard  
10 will get you that information in terms of an  
11 appeal, but Director Oxendine is probably first  
12 going to look into this, but I'm thankful that  
13 you came down.

14 We go back years and in protests, keep  
15 the vote, no takeover against the board of  
16 education, that takeover back then, emergency  
17 manager, long before this one came to the city.

18 MS. MOORE: We just filed another  
19 lawsuit too. We're not stopping.

20 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: I been keeping  
21 up with it, but thank you and we'll be in touch.

22 MS. MOORE: All right, thank you.

23 MS. PANSELL: Good afternoon, Board.  
24 Sharon Pannell. First, if you need something  
25 blasted out, if you e-mail me I'll blast it out.

1 COMMISSIONER BELL: We'll share the  
2 information with you.

3 MS. PANSELL: You know, I'll handle --  
4 you know, I wanted to let you know that people  
5 that watch this on the next day, they cannot hear  
6 you. People -- I have lunch at St. Pat's  
7 every day and the seniors, they told me they  
8 cannot hear the program.

9 COMMISSIONER BELL: So we need to speak  
10 more direct --

11 MS. PANSELL: No, it's the volume  
12 system somewhere. I don't know what it is, so I  
13 just wanted to let you know.

14 COMMISSIONER BELL: Okay, thank you for  
15 the information. I know that's a work in  
16 progress, they're trying to resolve those issues.

17 MS. SMITH: Good afternoon, Bernice  
18 Smith. AC, good to see you. Commissioners, good  
19 afternoon again. I'm so glad that my cousin came  
20 here, you think I'm a fighter -- she's a fighter  
21 right there. I'm glad that you got a chance to  
22 meet her in person because she don't bite her  
23 tongue about anything. She loves her children  
24 that she deals with and the board of education  
25 loves her, even though some things that they wish

1 she wouldn't say.

2 But anyway, what I come to tell you  
3 again on Livernois and Puritan there a drug  
4 outlet there. Young man went through the  
5 drive-in to purchase the goods and he didn't have  
6 the legal card and he got his -- the goods and  
7 then when he pulled out and he went about two  
8 blocks and he was stopped by the police.

9 And when they questioned him, they  
10 confiscated the goods plus the fact he didn't  
11 have a driver's license and he was -- the car was  
12 totaled -- not totaled, I'm sorry, confiscated.

13 So in the meantime I was told there was  
14 seven arrests in a matter of time during that  
15 evening of cars. Now, I would like to know if  
16 this place is legal, can you investigate to find  
17 out why the police is constantly stopping the  
18 cars when they come out at a certain two or three  
19 blocks down the street, that's Number 1.

20 The main thing I want -- and I forget  
21 last week -- my church, Tabernacle Baptist Church  
22 located there on West Grand Boulevard and --  
23 Grand River and the Boulevard right there on the  
24 corner, several weeks they have been annoyed with  
25 racetrack going up and down the street there,

1 they are drag racing as they call it. They stop  
2 at Buchanan and they start at the Boulevard.

3 And when church is beginning in the  
4 morning, the maintenance people have to go out  
5 there and clean up the garbage and the beer cans  
6 and so forth, whatever is out there before church  
7 starts at 8 o'clock.

8 I've been told that this has been going  
9 on for the last three or four weeks. The police  
10 do come, but what they do, they're smart enough  
11 to see the cars which is blue and white and you  
12 can see it and then they scatter.

13 So therefore I have a suggestion.  
14 Maybe we can have the task force with their black  
15 cars come and if it's possible and be at the end  
16 of the street at the corner and when they come  
17 that way they can come right on out and get them.

18 Now, that was my suggestion. I don't  
19 know if it's feasible are not, but the fact is we  
20 have to stop this drag racing in front of the  
21 church because it's terrible. The people when  
22 they come to church early, they see the remains  
23 of what happened at night.

24 So that's what I want to tell you and I  
25 don't know what else I can tell you today, that's



1 all mine. I thank you for listening to me.

2 Oh, one more thing. The young lady --  
3 I mean, I know it's a police matter and I realize  
4 that certain things you cannot tell the public, I  
5 know that, and I realize that parents and  
6 families are worried about what happened to their  
7 children and so forth when they're being killed,  
8 but we can't continue to come each week and blame  
9 the police department for not letting, you know,  
10 certain information that we cannot have. It is a  
11 matter for the police department and the --  
12 what's her name up there -- I can't think of  
13 everybody, but that's what I wanted to say. We  
14 have to stop.

15 Let the police take care of the agenda  
16 and they're going to do a good job, I have faith  
17 on them. I don't have no problem with them  
18 taking care of things. When I do a complaint,  
19 they take care of what I do, but the fact is we  
20 as the public, we have to let the police do their  
21 job and not continue to go over the same thing  
22 over again.

23 Yes, we are worried, we want it to  
24 stop, but we have to remember one thing. You're  
25 not shooting us in the back and that's what I

1 love about this police department.

2 I do take time to realize and use  
3 judgment in killing people if you do it  
4 necessarily, but we must let the people know  
5 we're doing a good job. Reggie, quit laughing at  
6 me.

7 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: I'm not  
8 laughing at you, I'm just laughing at the  
9 statement.

10 DEP. CHIEF LEVALLEY: Get the drag  
11 racing location.

12 MS. SMITH: Livernois and Puritan by  
13 the gas station.

14 DEP. CHIEF LEVALLEY: We do have a drag  
15 racing detail.

16 MS. SMITH: No, drag racing is on Grand  
17 River and the Boulevard by my church.

18 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Grand River and  
19 the Boulevard on the drag racing.

20 MS. SMITH: The drive-through is where  
21 the drugs are being sold. Supposed to be an  
22 outlet or something, I don't know, with the green  
23 lights and everything.

24 DEP. CHIEF LEVALLEY: Thank you.

25 DEP. CHIEF WASHINGTON: Ms. Bernice

1 mentioned the medical marijuana caregiver  
2 centers. I just wanted to report out and I asked  
3 the Law Department to come, with your permission  
4 I'll work that out with Mr. Hicks.

5 So we had a meeting 11 -- so there's  
6 been 11 lawsuits against medical marijuana  
7 caregiver centers that were operating illegally  
8 and in drug-free zones.

9 Those 11 were taken to court and court  
10 orders were issued for them to cease and desist,  
11 so this past week the VC investigators together  
12 with DPD went out -- I appreciate Comm. Bettison  
13 providing the NPOs, every one of those locations  
14 were closed already before we got there.

15 And when I say "closed", I asked was it  
16 just dark or were they gone, and so apparently  
17 they had packed up and left.

18 The next phase is what I've asked the  
19 Law Department to come and talk to this Board  
20 about because I know Bishop Vann had mentioned  
21 some concern about what appeared to be a kinder,  
22 gentler approach to this topic.

23 So the next round within the next week  
24 or so there's 14 other locations that have been  
25 identified that are up and running and it

1 reminded me when Ms. Bernice mentioned Puritan,  
2 I'm not saying they're in a drug-free zone, but I  
3 know there are some in that area that are not  
4 supposed to be there.

5 So I've asked them if it's okay to come  
6 and report out to you in terms of what the status  
7 is for the enforcement.

8 COMMISSIONER VANN: And, Mr. Chair, if  
9 you don't mind if you could kindly bring back to  
10 us, you know, the current number of facilities as  
11 opposed to the number that was first reported so  
12 that we can see just exactly the effect of your  
13 enforcement efforts?

14 DEP. CHIEF WASHINGTON: Absolutely, and  
15 what we can do -- because we meet every Monday  
16 and they've got it broken down -- because not  
17 everybody is operating in a drug-free zone. They  
18 can break it down to the numbers who have applied  
19 in locations where they can be legitimately and  
20 those who have been denied and appeal, so we can  
21 have VC with your permission and the Law  
22 Department make a presentation as to the status.

23 DEP. CHIEF LEVALLEY: Through the Chair  
24 if I may. I just want to comment that aside from  
25 what's taken place with the Law Department in an

1 attempt to shut down the dispensaries that are in  
2 drug free zones, the police department continues  
3 to investigate complaints of dispensaries where  
4 we receive information or tips that they're  
5 selling to people without medical marijuana  
6 cards. Last work we raided three locations and  
7 shut those down and charged the operators,  
8 confiscated all of the marijuana and the proceeds  
9 that were on the premises.

10 So that may be the instance at  
11 Livernois and Puritan. Without checking, I don't  
12 know, but a lot of times they will receive tips,  
13 they will set up on the location, make  
14 observations of purchases and then investigate to  
15 see if they have a card and if they have enough  
16 of those instances, then that gives them the  
17 probable cause for a search warrant.

18 So we continue to do that while this  
19 process is going on at the Law Department.

20 COMMISSIONER VANN: And, Mr. Chair,  
21 just from a regulatory standpoint, you know, we  
22 want to make sure that those facilities that have  
23 been in violation of the law are not allowed to  
24 go find another location that is not in the  
25 drug-free zone and operate as well, so from a

1 regulatory standpoint who's watching that?

2 DEP. CHIEF LEVALLEY: Well, that's why  
3 the prosecution piece of it would be important to  
4 charge the operators so they have a criminal  
5 record of distributing illegally and then when  
6 they make their application, their background is  
7 checked as to whether or not they have a history  
8 of illegal distribution before they're granted a  
9 license.

10 COMMISSIONERS DEWAELSCHÉ: So, Mr.  
11 Chair, I just have a comment. So that would  
12 explain -- and I know Bishop Vann is kind of --  
13 has mentioned it. There are some that appear to  
14 be opening and closing and so if you're raiding  
15 them, are they suspended, are their operations  
16 suspended temporarily and then are they able to  
17 open again in some cases, because it appears in  
18 the Seven Mile Woodward area there are three on  
19 one block it almost appears and sometimes they  
20 look they're closed and I'm thinking okay, they  
21 finally closed them down, and then a few weeks  
22 later they're open again, so I was just wondering  
23 what --

24 DEP. CHIEF LEVALLEY: When we raid the  
25 location or execute search warrants and we shut

1           them down, they may open back up, but they're not  
2           doing it legally, but we have to get back to the  
3           location again, but they're definitely closed  
4           once we execute the search warrant and make  
5           confiscations.

6                        COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE:    So,  
7           Mr. Chair, I would like to receive a report on --  
8           like an update report maybe on a quarterly basis  
9           on what is happening in terms of openings and  
10          closings, permanent closings.  That would be  
11          helpful.

12                      COMMISSIONER BELL:  Write a note and  
13          work it out with DC Washington and we're hear in  
14          terms of next months in terns of that reporting  
15          out.

16                      COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD:  Through the  
17          Chair, Deputy Chief and also 3rd Deputy Chief  
18          Attorney, Washington I want to think you for the  
19          information, the transparency in empowering  
20          myself and this Commission with the information  
21          so when I'm out and about in the city along with  
22          the other Commissioners and people ask us what's  
23          going on with the medical marijuana, we know and  
24          also too, a couple of days ago there will not the  
25          legalization of marijuana on the ballot in

1 November, the State has moved to not put that on  
2 the ballot, so those who want to participate in  
3 the presidential election don't look for that  
4 issue of legalization of marijuana on the ballot,  
5 it's not there. Thank you.

6 COMMISSIONER BELL: I just have one  
7 other request, that as we face the school year  
8 with the young people returning to school if the  
9 Deputy Chief Levalley would make a note, I know  
10 the board of education have their own police  
11 department, you know, but I think to and from if  
12 we can some point in time get a reporting out in  
13 terms of steps that DPD might be engaging in to  
14 ensure the safety -- I know it's ongoing, but the  
15 school year is after Labor Day, if you could  
16 report out and have a responsible party give us  
17 an update in terms of those issues, that I think  
18 would be timely.

19 DEP. CHIEF LEVALLEY: We absolutely  
20 will and we do still every year activate the Safe  
21 Route to Schools Programs. It's been around for  
22 a long time and every available member of the  
23 department patrol certain routes during key times  
24 of the day when children are walking to and from  
25 schools.



1                   So we take all the administrative  
2                   personnel from inside and put them out from 6 to  
3                   8 AM or whatever that time frame is, but yes,  
4                   we'll get that to you.

5                   COMMISSIONER BELL: Are we going to  
6                   have safety patrols? There was some rumor they  
7                   might be bringing them back.

8                   DEP. CHIEF LEVALLEY: I don't. Tod  
9                   Bettison, he's probably the person to answer.

10                  COMMISSIONER BELL: There was some  
11                  dialog that you're going to bring back safety  
12                  patrol.

13                  Are you saying yes? Oh, okay.

14                  DEP. CHIEF LEVALLEY: I'm just not up  
15                  to speed on it, sorry.

16                  COMMISSIONER BELL: You don't know what  
17                  I'm talking about, do you?

18                  DEP. CHIEF LEVALLEY: I try to keep as  
19                  much as I can, but in the Detective Bureau I have  
20                  my hands full there.

21                  COMMISSIONER BELL: Commissioner  
22                  Crawford know what I'm talking about. I used to  
23                  be a --

24                  COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yeah, the  
25                  safety patrol, as a matter of fact I was a

1 lieutenant in the safety patrol. We're not going  
2 to talk about what year that was. But Deputy  
3 Chief, I can assure you if there's any issues with  
4 the school Queen Mother Moore were definitely  
5 come back, journey back down here in front of the  
6 podium to ask questions of what's going on with  
7 our children, make sure they get to and from  
8 school safely.

9 COMMISSIONER BELL: Is there any other  
10 business before this body? If not, the Chair  
11 would entertain a motion for adjournment.

12 COMMISSIONER VANN: So moved,  
13 Mr. Chair.

14 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: Support.

15 COMMISSIONER BELL: Properly moved and  
16 supported. Discussion? Those in favor, aye?

17 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

18 COMMISSIONER BELL: Those opposed?  
19 Motion carried. We'll see you next week, thank  
20 you for your attendance.
