- 5 I'd like to welcome you to the weekly meeting of
- 6 the Board of Police Commissioners. I am the
- 7 Vice-Chair Willie Bell from District 4.
- 8 Our Chair, Lisa Carter, could not
- 9 attend tonight due to family business, so we want
- to lift her up tonight as we go forward.
- I'm going to ask our own Bishop Edgar
- 12 Vann to prayer.
- 13 (INVOCATION WAS GIVEN).
- 14 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, Bishop
- Vann. At this time I'm going to ask starting
- with my left -- well, I'm going to start with my
- 17 right since our Rev. Vann just prayed.
- 18 Would the commissioners introduce
- 19 themselves please and we have a newly designated
- 20 commissioner and he's going to introduce himself
- 21 at this time.
- COMMISSIONER SANDERS: My name is
- 23 Commissioner Derrick Sanders.
- 24 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Commissioner
- 25 Elizabeth Brooks.



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1	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Good evening, my
2	name is Commissioner Ricardo Moore and this is my
3	host area. I'd just like to thank each and every
4	one of you for coming out today representing the
5	2nd Precinct, more specifically District 7; thank
6	you.
7	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, my name is
8	Reginald Crawford. I'm the commissioner for the
9	3rd District, the east side of Detroit; thank
10	you.
11	COMMISSIONER BISHOP VANN: My name is
12	Edgar Vann, I'm the commissioner for the 2nd
13	District in Northwest Detroit.
14	COMMISSIONER BELL: Mr. Anthony, our
15	Board Secretary, do we have a quorum?
16	SECRETARY ANTHONY: You do have a
17	quorum, Mr. Chair.
18	COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, sir. At
19	this time I would ask you to introduce before
20	I do that, I guess I'll introduce he needs no
21	introduction to us, but to you we should be well
22	aware Assistant Chief James White to my extreme
23	left representing Chief Craig.
24	ASST. CHIEF WHITE: Good evening,
25	everyone.



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1	COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you for your
2	attendance. Did you want to introduce any other
3	command officers? We've got quite a few officers
4	in the house.
5	ASST. CHIEF WHITE: Yes, I'll let them
6	introduce themselves, start with Dep. Chief
7	LeValley.
8	(MEMBERS OF COMMAND STAFF INTRODUCED
9	THEMSELVES).
10	ASST. CHIEF WHITE: Okay, I think
11	that's everybody now. I want to thank you all
12	for being here. You'll be hearing from the
13	Captain of the 2nd Precinct a little later with
14	his presentation, Capt. Rochon.
15	Also Officer Drury, an active member of
16	the 11 Precinct lost his battle with cancer
17	recently and funeral services were held today, so
18	obviously the department is operating with a very
19	heavy heart.
20	Captain from Number 11 Leach, do you
21	want to add anything to that? Okay, so
22	COMMISSIONER BELL: Let's have a moment
23	of silence for this officer and his family.
24	(MOMENT OF SILENCE).
25	COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you.



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1	Mr. George Anthony, Board Secretary, would you
2	introduce the staff, please?
3	SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you,
4	Mr. Chair. For the record, George Anthony,
5	Secretary to the Board. Before I introduce the
6	staff, Mr. Chair, I just want to note the
7	commissioners who are excused for the evening.
8	COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, sir.
9	SECRETARY ANTHONY: Commissioner Willie
10	Burton, Commissioner Eva Garza Dewaelsche,
11	Commissioner Conrad Mallett, Jr, Commissioner
12	Richard Shelby and I believe you've already
13	mentioned our Chair, Lisa Carter.
14	Our staff members present include
15	Ms. Pamela Davis-Drake who is our Chief
16	Investigator from the Office of the Chief
17	Investigator. Also here is our Supervising
18	Investigator from that office Ansley Cromwell.
19	We also have Ms. Linda Bernard seated
20	in front, she is our Secretary she is our
21	attorney to the Board.
22	Mr. Robert Brown who is our
23	administrative assistant seated next to me. Also
24	Sgt. Alan Quinn who is recording our proceedings



and Mr. Dale Rose from Hanson Court Reporting

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1	Service.
2	That completes the introductions, sir.
3	COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, sir. At
4	this time I'd like to give thanks to the Butzel
5	Center for accommodating us tonight and as always
6	it's a blessing to be in their building. This is
7	a great facility here. I was here during the
8	summer when they had the field day activities,
9	all the activities, and I got re-acquainted with
10	all activities at Butzel, so very appreciative.
11	Anyone here from the staff want to come
12	forward. If not, I would like to ask
13	Commissioner Moore to introduce some of our
14	officials that might be in attendance and others,
15	we can have you stand up also.
16	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you,
17	Mr. Chairman. Wayne County Commissioner Alicia
18	Bell, would you please stand? From State
19	Representative Coleman Young's, II's office,
20	Kennus Johnson El. Senator, I'm sorry.
21	From city councilman George
22	Cushingberry's office, Dr. Arthur Divers. And
23	from Mayor Duggan's office District 7 manager Ray
24	Solomon, II. Thank you all for attending.
25	COMMISSIONER BELL: Let's give District



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1	Manager Ray Solomon a round of applause. He just
2	recently got promoted. Thank you.
3	And thank all of you for your
4	attendance and I really if this is your first
5	meeting, could you just please stand up in
6	terms of attending the Board of Police
7	Commissioners, if this is your first meeting.
8	Give you a round of applause for coming
9	out. Thank you, thank you, thank you. We have a
10	heavy agenda this night as you can see by the
11	room, so the Chair would entertain a motion to
12	approve the agenda for tonight's meeting.
13	COMMISSIONER BISHOP VANN: So moved,
14	Mr. Chair.
15	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Support.
16	COMMISSIONER BELL: It's been properly
17	moved and supported. Discussion? Those in
18	favor?
19	COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
20	COMMISSIONER BELL: Those opposed?
21	Motion carries. And next item of business would
22	be approval of the minutes from Thursday,
23	December 3, 2015. The Chair would entertain a
24	motion to approve.



COMMISSIONER MOORE: So moved.

Page 9 COMMISSIONER BISHOP VANN: 1 Supported. 2 COMMISSIONER BELL: It's been properly 3 moved and supported. Discussion? Those in 4 favor, aye? 5 COMMISSIONERS: Aye. 6 COMMISSIONER BELL: Those opposed? Motion carries. As I stated, the Chair is not 7 8 here tonight, but she's been active with the 9 Board and also active with the DPD. I think she 10 attended the weigh-in just the other day in terms 11 of the healthy moment. I'm pretty sure Asst. 12 Chief White will be reporting out there, but the 13 Chair was in attendance at that activity, so I'm 14 pleased that she represented the Board and maybe, as Conrad Mallett stated -- Commissioner Mallett 15 16 stated, maybe we can do an unofficial weigh-in 17 after the holidays. 18 So as we move forward, next item of 19 business would be -- I guess I can lift up -- you 20 should have a newsletter. We have copies of the newsletter being circulated and this is a 21 22 historic night for the Board. This is the first 23 day of our full mandated Charter duties and 24 responsibilities being reinstated. I think we



should have a round of applause.

1	APPLAUSE.)
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COMMISSIONER BELL: And we're looking
forward to we have really come a long way in
the last couple of months in this transition
period of working with Mayor Duggan and his staff
and also working with Chief Craig and this staff,
and so nothing has changed. It's just a matter
of our duties and responsibilities is now
mandated by Charter and is outlined

I'm not going to spend any time going over this document, but I commend our Board Secretary George Anthony for putting it together and you can read it as your leisure and also it's going to be online and I appreciate your support in terms of quite a few people have lobbied for us to get our powers back. It's democracy as you know by the City Charter, you voted it in in 2012. The elections took place in 2013, we were sworn in our elected commissioners in 2014 and now we have the opportunity for fulfill our duties and responsibilities that we raised our right hand for in terms of Charter duties and responsibilities, so you can read it at your leisure. If you have any questions or concerns, we appreciate it when you come to the open mic --

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1	We lost Ron Scott last week. We had a
2	silent prayer for Ron and his funeral as you well
3	know is going to be at the Historic Little Rock
4	Baptist Church this coming Saturday at 11
5	o'clock.
6	I'm going to ask for a silent prayer
7	for Ron when we have an open mic. That was his
8	opportunity to speak. We gave him two minutes,
9	but he always took seven and a half, so I think
10	we will have an open mic silent prayer for
11	Brother Ron Scott and you know his history.
12	If you didn't know, you should have
13	been tuned in to all the media because he was a
14	media person. He was a freedom fighter and he
15	definitely supported this Board. I'm glad that
16	he was still alive when the council voted.
17	He's not with us tonight, but he's with
18	us in spirit and like others, I'm going to lift
19	him up on Saturday morning because he's in a
20	better place, he's with the Good Lord for those
21	who believe in terms of the Christian concept; I
22	do, so I just
23	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, sir.
24	Mr. Vice-Chair, I'll reserve my comments for that

time.

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1	COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, sir. I'm just
2	speaking out in terms of the Chair speaking out
3	when we have a resolution to read. The next item
4	would be Asst. Chief White.
5	ASST. CHIEF WHITE: Good evening again
6	through the Chair. I would be remiss if I did
7	not and in trouble if I did not tell you that
8	the Chief had a previous engagement, but wanted
9	to be here tonight, but could not. He sends his
10	regrets.
11	Tonight, our reports are all positive.
12	Crime continues to trend in the right direction,
13	we're very excited about that. We have a new
14	program that we're launching called the Green
15	Light Initiative which is going to involve gas
16	stations. Where you see green lights, those will
17	be deemed to be gas stations that are connected
18	to the police department through our realtime
19	crime center which we're in the process of
20	developing now.
21	In addition to that keeping with the
22	trend of good news is we launched a very
23	important initiative in the police department
24	this week with our fitness program, a 90-day



fitness challenge with the officers.

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1	We had over 300 officers sign up to
2	participate and there will be a lot of activities
3	with that program in the next new weeks involving
4	various challenges that the officers will be
5	involved in through the team lead. So look
6	forward to hearing a lot of information on that
7	as we go forward.
8	We're going to blossom that program and
9	take it to the next level next year where we're
10	going to have challenges for the officers where
11	they can earn awards and things like that.
12	Also the 5th Precinct grand opening is
13	Wednesday, December 16 at 3 PM, long overdue for
14	the area. 3500 Connor is the building that we've
15	retrofitted into a new 5th Precinct.
16	Invite you all to come by. It's going
17	to be a beautiful facility and a great addition
18	to that community having the police back there.
19	We're also in the process of
20	negotiating well, actually negotiations have
21	completed. We're in the process of programming
22	now the 8th Precinct which is going to be at the
23	apron, at the end of the Meijer location at Grand
24	River and Lahser it's not really Lahser, what
25	is that, Grand River and Six Mile right at the



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1	bottom which puts it literally across the street
2	from the old 8th Precinct, one of the most
3	densely populated areas of the city. So we're
4	very excited about the opportunity to put police
5	back in that community.
6	And last, but certainly not least
7	excited to be here tonight to honor the men and
8	women of the Detroit Police Department that you
9	see at the back of the room that every day go
10	out, sunup, sundown, rain, snow, sleet and put
11	their lives on the line so that we can enjoy this
12	great city and the freedoms that we take for
13	granted, so let's give them a big hand for being
14	there.
15	(APPLAUSE.)
16	ASST. CHIEF WHITE: And that is my
17	report.
18	COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, sir.
19	Comments and questions for Asst. Chief?
20	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Through the Chair,
21	Asst. Chief White, we've heard a lot about pay
22	raises, police officers receiving pay raises.
23	When will that kick in for them? When will they
24	realize their pay raises as well as their command
25	officers?



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1	ASST. CHIEF WHITE: My understanding is
2	now that everything has been ratified that they
3	will kick in early part of the year.
4	COMMISSIONER MOORE: And do we know
5	exactly where the money came from from the
6	Detroit Police Department budget?
7	ASST. CHIEF WHITE: Yes. A couple of
8	places actually. Ironically part of the 8th
9	Precinct revealed some funding. We had some old
10	bonds that were secured a number of years ago and
11	were not used. We had secured approximately \$8
12	million for the 8th Precinct and they were able
13	to use some of the funding from the bond to fund
14	the 8th Precinct and use some of that money for
15	raises.
16	The Chief of Police identified an
17	additional \$5 million and I don't have all the
18	facts on the remaining dollars, but I know the
19	total \$41 million.
20	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you. Can
21	you somehow e-mail me where that additional \$5
22	million came from?
23	ASST. CHIEF WHITE: Yes, that's no
24	problem.



COMMISSIONER BISHOP VANN: I wanted to

1	ask the Chief tonight with regard of course to
2	the proliferation of the medical marijuana
3	dispensaries in our community. One of the
4	highest complaints in my area in Northwest
5	Detroit is, of course, the proliferation of these
6	establishments.
7	I know that there are some discussions
8	going on with City Council. We spoke with the
9	Mayor on last Thursday about it and mentioned it.
10	I think here's a hearing coming up in the
11	subsequent week with regard to this. I'm just
12	wondering, has any progress been made on this.
13	While we are yet deliberating on this,
14	these establishments are proliferating in the
15	community and bringing all kinds of problems to
16	the communities, so I just wondered was there
17	anything else new on this.
18	ASST. CHIEF WHITE: Through the Chair,
19	progress, yes, the fact that there's
20	conversation, there's some activity and
21	legislature over the issue. Have we resolved it
22	yet, no, we have not.
23	I agree it seems like almost every few
24	blocks there's a facility opening up. I know



that the city attorneys are working on it and we

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1	expect to have some resolution soon. I don't
2	really have a lot more at this point, sorry.
3	COMMISSIONER BELL: Any other comments,
4	commissioners?
5	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, sir.
6	Through the Chair, Chief, an FBI agent was shot
7	today. What is his condition? Do you have an
8	update on that agent?
9	ASST. CHIEF WHITE: Deputy Chief
10	Fitzgerald, can you come up and answer that,
11	please?
12	DEP. CHIEF FITZGERALD: Good evening.
13	Deputy Chief Charles Fitzgerald. Yes, he's doing
14	fine, he had surgery a little bit earlier. At
15	the time of the execution of the warrant he
16	didn't even realize he was shot, he thought he
17	had possibly broken his arm by swinging the ram
18	itself. But other than that broken arm he
19	is in stable condition now, he's recovering, and
20	he will be fine.
21	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Thank you.
22	MS. BERNARD: Linda Bernard.
23	Mr. Chairman, Commissioner Vann, if you look at
24	the very last page in your information pack there
25	is a "Just Say No" rally at the Spirit of Love



1	Church, 15635 Mack Avenue. It's about the
2	marijuana dispensaries and there's some
3	information there on the very last page, the
4	marijuana. Thank you.
5	COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, ma'am.
6	DR. IVERSON: There's going to be a
7	public hearing on medical marijuana December 17,
8	1 PM in the Irma Henderson Auditorium in the
9	Coleman A. Young Center.
10	And one of the things that's important
11	is that we get many residents from Detroit out.
12	In the past there have been many persons from the
13	other areas outside the city who have come down
14	there and spoke against it because of the
15	restrictions that are in this is the second
16	part.
17	The first part was on they have to have
18	a business license. The second part is zoning
19	B-2, B-4 and industrial areas. And no
20	drive-through, have to be 1,000 feet from schools
21	and churches and that is what is important.
22	They do not want these restrictions in
23	place, so what I'm really saying is that the
24	Detroit residents in particular should come out



to that hearing and the Council will hear them

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1	and they most likely will not vote at that time.
2	By procedure they have to have another
3	hearing prior to the voting, but the bill has
4	restrictions in it and we need to get out as many
5	many residents to come out for that hearing.
6	It's going to be crowded. I would
7	suggest if they say 1 o'clock, I would say if
8	you're coming you should be there at 12 o'clock
9	because the fire marshals will not allow anyone
10	to stand in the auditorium in the back.
11	If you don't be seated, you got to go
12	outside. But again, December 17, 1 PM, Irma
13	Henderson Auditorium, Coleman A. Young Municipal
14	Center.
15	COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you. Before
16	we move to the 2nd Precinct I'd like to introduce
17	Linda Westly from Council President Brenda Jones'
18	office. Thank you for your attendance.
19	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Through the Chair,
20	also Joy Lewis from Councilman Jay Leland's
21	office is in the house as well.
22	COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you. Any
23	others? Okay, 2nd Precinct I guess.
24	CAPTAIN ROCHON: Good evening. The 2nd
25	Precinct is located at 13530 Leisure, city of



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1	Detroit 48227. It encompasses 10.29 square miles
2	and bound on the north by McNichols, the south
3	Warren, the west Greenfield and the east
4	Livernois.
5	The 2nd Precinct borders the
6	neighboring communities in Dearborn. The notable
7	locations, businesses, organizations within the
8	2nd Precinct are, of course, Adam Butzel
9	Recreation Center, Xfinity which is also Comcast,
10	Uncle Ray's Potato Chips and Bay's English
11	Muffins.
12	According to the 2010 U.S. Census, the
13	precinct has a total population of about 60,000
14	citizens. We have no high schools, but I think
15	we have about four or five middle schools and
16	junior high schools.
17	The 2nd Precinct has undertaken the
18	following: On average we answer about 1,800
19	9-1-1 calls every week. We also issue between
20	400 and 500 tickets on a weekly basis.
21	The 2nd Precinct has now deployed an 80
22	series which works between shifts so we always
23	good coverage even though they're rotating
24	shifts. We have good coverage in-between those



shifts. We have a supervisor and two units at

They answer runs and right now by far
they're leading our precinct in the number of
citizen contacts they have outside of regular
police runs.

We have an incident that takes place within the precinct. We do what we call a wrap-around which usually involves when there's a shooting or many burglaries that take place we usually have the officers do what we call a wrap-around.

What we started with our community relations, our NPOs, is that when there's a B&E that takes place and there's a lot of them in a particular area the NPOs will go to the residents on that block and talk to them about what they can do to help us, we can work with them in reducing the number of B&Es we have.

One think that's not listed here is the 2nd Precinct is consistently in the top three in terms of our response time. Right now I think Platoon 2 is leading in response time, I think they just told me 6.2 minutes is our response time which is leading the city all around on that particular precinct.

1	Lastly, what we've done is we've
2	established a very, very, very positive
3	relationship with our gas stations. We're
4	currently in some and I won't call them
5	negotiations, but we're currently meeting with
6	them on a regular basis to try to get them to
7	close the gas stations down early and not be 24
8	hours, so that's probably one of my I won't
9	say biggest challenges, but we had two meetings
10	so far and we have right now 99 percent agreement
11	to do that, so we're still in the process of
12	working out some of the kinks and that is my
13	presentation.
14	COMMISSIONER BELL: Commissioners, any
15	questions, concerns from the good captain here
16	from the 2nd Precinct?
17	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Through the Chair,
18	I just want to commend Captain Harold Rochon and
19	his leadership team, Sgt. Vanessa Wyatt. You
20	guys do a great service to our district and to
21	the precinct as well and I'm happy that Capt.
22	Walton from the 6th Precinct is here, Captain
23	Nick Kyriacou from the 10th Precinct and I'm very
24	proud to work with you; thank you.
25	(APPLAUSE.)



1	COMMISSIONER BELL: Any other
2	questions?
3	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, sir,
4	Mr. Chair. Capt. Rochon, you talk about closing
5	gas stations down early. How are they
6	receptive to that?
7	CAPT. ROCHON: They're very receptive.
8	The biggest concern that we had with them was
9	having patrols available when they close so they
10	don't break into the stations. Another concern
11	that they had why they're willing to close is
12	because they don't make any money on midnights
13	and what they told us is that they have employees
14	that they have to pay, they have a light bill and
15	pay some other bills that they wouldn't have to
16	incur if they shut down.
17	And we talked about crime being reduced
18	when our service stations shut down. I will say
19	this. Our service stations in the 2nd Precinct,
20	we have a very good relationship with them. Most
21	of them come to the meetings I won't say come
22	to the meetings most of them we communicate
23	with them on a regular basis and they seem to be
24	cleaning up a lot of their issues that they had
25	prior to me coming there.



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1	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Thank you.
2	COMMISSIONER BELL: Okay, Captain, if
3	there are no other questions, thank you for your
4	ongoing commitment to the 2nd Precinct.
5	ASST. CHIEF WHITE: Do you want to do
6	the presentation now or
7	COMMISSIONER BELL: I think it would be
8	appropriate since most of these officers standing
9	on their feet, they're accustomed to standing on
10	their feet, but we want to go forth if the Board
11	will allow me to alter the agenda to address the
12	officers of the quarter that would be proper.
13	ASST. CHIEF WHITE: Thank you very
14	much. If I could ask Deputy Chief LeValley and
15	Deputy Chief Fitzgerald to join me at the front,
16	please, for the presentation and the captain from
17	the 2nd Precinct, please:
18	Police Officer Timothy Evans. What
19	we're going to do is we're going to acknowledge
20	our officers of the quarter, the hard work that
21	they have done for us. We're not going to read
22	the entire bio of what the officers have done.
23	Officer Evans, however, is not here
24	tonight so the captain from the 2nd Precinct will
25	accept on his behalf.



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1	We'll move on to the 3rd Precinct,
2	Police Officer Unice Hunter.
3	(APPLAUSE.)
4	ASST. CHIEF WHITE: And if I could have
5	the 3rd Precinct captain come up. Officer Hunter
6	joined the police department November 28, 1994.
7	(APPLAUSE.)
8	ASST. CHIEF WHITE: Police Officer
9	Nigel Villarreal and the captain of the 4th
10	Precinct, please.
11	(APPLAUSE).
12	ASST. CHIEF WHITE: Officer Villarreal
13	joined the police department in 1998.
14	(APPLAUSE.)
15	ASST. CHIEF WHITE: 5th Precinct
16	captain and Police Officer Jeremy Moreland.
17	(APPLAUSE.)
18	ASST. CHIEF WHITE: 6th Precinct,
19	Police Officer Matthew Kurek and the 6th Precinct
20	captain, please.
21	(APPLAUSE.)
22	ASST. CHIEF WHITE: This officer was
23	joining in 2014.
24	The 7th Precinct captain and Police
25	Officer Willie Robinson.



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1	COMMISSIONER BELL: I'm standing with
2	him. I started my career in 1971 with the 7th
3	Precinct.
4	(APPLAUSE).
5	ASST. CHIEF WHITE: He joined the
6	department in 2008. 10th Precinct Police Officer
7	Steven Townsend and the 10th Precinct captain,
8	please.
9	(APPLAUSE).
10	ASST. CHIEF WHITE: Another one of our
11	fine 2008 police officers.
12	11th Precinct captain and Police
13	Officer Jana Greeno.
14	(APPLAUSE).
15	ASST. CHIEF WHITE: That 2008 class was
16	a great class, another 2008 police officer.
17	Congratulations.
18	(APPLAUSE).
19	ASST. CHIEF WHITE: 12th Precinct
20	captain and Police Officer Katherine Price.
21	(APPLAUSE).
22	ASST. CHIEF WHITE: Officer Price
23	joined the department 10 years ago and spent her
24	entire career at the 12th Precinct.
25	Congratulations.



1	(APPLAUSE.)
2	ASST. CHIEF WHITE: And last but not
3	least of the Metro Division Police Officer Adnan
4	Balija.
5	(APPLAUSE).
6	ASST. CHIEF WHITE: These officers will
7	be allowed to park in the captain's parking space
8	for the next quarter.
9	COMMISSIONER BELL: I just want to say
10	on behalf of the Board I'm glad that this came
11	back to the Board of Police Commissioners where
12	we honor these officers at our community meeting.
13	And you can see the hard work you
14	can't give enough recognition for these officers
15	who work $24/7/365$ with all the issues throughout
16	the country, let's give them another round of
17	applause.
18	(APPLAUSE).
19	ASST. CHIEF WHITE: I did not go
20	through the bios in the interest of time because
21	we have such a heavy agenda. I don't want to
22	slight any of the officers. Each bio contains
23	the number of arrests, the number of guns they've
24	gotten off the streets, number of tickets written
25	and what's consistent across the board with every



1	officer in this room is that these are some of
2	the hardest working men and women across the
3	country. They're out there every day for us.
4	(APPLAUSE).
5	COMMISSIONER BELL: So on behalf of the
6	Chief's Office and everyone in the command staff
7	we thank you for doing the work that you do every
8	day; thank you.
9	(APPLAUSE).
10	COMMISSIONER BELL: I want to give
11	recognition to our reservists; come forward,
12	DPRs. You are the backbone, you give so much
13	support to the reserves. Let's give these
14	reservists, the leadership team, a round of
15	applause.
16	(APPLAUSE.)
17	COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you,
18	appreciate it.
19	The young gal on the right, I went to
20	high school with back in 1902. If we move
21	forward, standing committee reports?
22	New business? We're really privileged
23	to honor Mr. Ron Scott and I'm going to ask
24	Commissioner Bishop Vann to the last picture
25	I mean, one of the few pictures I had the



1	opportunity to take with Bishop Vann standing
2	alongside Ron Scott and we utilized in the
3	newsletter that was really a happy occasion.
4	This is a nice picture, I'm so appreciative of
5	our Board Secretary to include that photo, so
6	Bishop Vann, you got the honors.
7	COMMISSIONER BISHOP VANN: Thank you,
8	Mr. Chairman. This is a resolution in tribute
9	and honor of Ron Scott, a warrior for justice and
10	WHEREAS, Ron Scott was raised in the
11	Jeffries Projects by an astute single mother of
12	four who eventually earned her degree and became
13	a teacher and
14	WHEREAS Ron Scott attended the
15	University of Michigan in 1965, later graduated
16	before affirmative action was in place to ensure
17	educational equity and
18	WHEREAS Ron Scott referred to himself
19	as a transformational anthropologist working to
20	change human and social behavior toward peace and
21	reconciliation and
22	WHEREAS Ron Scott co-founded the
23	Detroit Chapter of the Black Panther Party and
24	later founded the Detroit Coalition against
25	Police Brutality and



1	WHEREAS Ron Scott in his quest for
2	social and economic justice for blacks,
3	Hispanics, minorities, women and the poor and
4	disenfranchised, dedicated his life and God-given
5	talents to advocacy using the most powerful tool
6	of all, print and broadcast media and
7	WHEREAS the producer and host of
8	Detroit Black Journal, one of the longest running
9	African-American focus shows in the USA and a
10	spokesman for the Detroit Coalition against
11	Police Brutality Ron Scott took political,
12	business and government leaders to task on
13	matters of importance to disenfranchised
14	communities and especially abuses of police power
15	against community residents and
16	WHEREAS as a result of Ron Scott's
17	advocacy and taking it to the streets in 2003 the
18	coalition was successful in initiating a
19	Department of Justice investigation of the
20	Detroit Police Department which culminated in
21	federal oversight of the police department for 13
22	years and the Federal Consent Decree and
23	WHEREAS in 2013 Ron Scott advocated for
24	changes in the Detroit City Charter expanding and
25	strengthening the Board of Police Commissioners



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1	and making it more accountable to the community
2	through the electoral process and
3	WHEREAS Ron Scott challenged and was an
4	outspoken critic of the emergency manager's
5	decision to limit the Board of Police
6	Commissioners' powers during and after the
7	conclusion of the City's bankruptcy and
8	WHEREAS Ron Scott viewed the Board of
9	Police Commissioners not only as the oversight
10	body of the police department and as the final
11	arbiter to ensure fairness and transparency in
12	police operations, but also as a forum where
13	persons aggrieved by police actions could seek
14	redress and
15	WHEREAS Ron Scott attended virtually
16	every Board of Police Commissioners meeting and
17	spoke as a statesman and as the conscious of the
18	Commission on matters raised at the Board of
19	Police Commissioners meetings to ensure that the
20	Board of Police Commissioners would stay focused
21	on the non-discriminatory exercise of police
22	power, human rights and justice and
23	WHEREAS Ron Scott worked on the streets
24	for youth and with area gangs to stop the
25	violence, create peace zones, an initiative he

1	started and successfully implemented in Detroit's
2	neighborhoods and
3	WHEREAS before there was an
4	organization called Black Lives Matter Ron Scott
5	fought for black lives and for minorities in
6	Detroit and across America, to stop police
7	brutality against people of color and
8	WHEREAS Ron Scott was a decent gentle
9	man, a savant, who's extremely articulate probing
10	in thought and action, courageous, sensitive and
11	kind even when receiving no recognition or reward
12	he always did the right thing in supporting
13	numerous justice initiatives and the Detroit
14	Board of Police Commissioners.
15	NOW THEREFORE BE IT UNANIMOUSLY
16	RESOLVED by the Detroit Board of Police
17	Commissioners that the Board recognizes and pays
18	tribute to Ron Scott as a drum major for justice
19	and his legacy by establishing in his honor the
20	Ron Scott Award for justice and transparency in
21	police community relations.
22	And further may Ron Scott also be
23	remembered as the one man who made Detroit a

5	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Support.	
6	COMMISSIONER BELL: It's been properl	- Y
7	moved and supported. Any discussion? Those in	
8	favor?	
9	COMMISSIONERS: Aye.	
10	COMMISSIONER BELL: Those opposed?	
11	Motion carries. I think Commissioner Crawford	
12	wants to speak to Mr. Scott.	
13	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, sir.	
14	Thank you, Bishop Vann for	
15	Mr. Chair for a number of years I've	
16	known Ron Scott yes, sir, Mr. Chair. For a	ì
17	number of years I've known Ron Scott long befor	îe
18	the days of the group that he founded, the	
19	Coalition Against Police Brutality. We engaged	ŀ
20	in activism across this city, particularly	
21	most of it is not even noted by those in the	
22	police department over the years, but I talked	to
23	Ron Scott literally every well, not every da	ìУ,
24	but often, quite often, during the week and of	
25	course we always met at the meetings here	



1	And Ron I liken Ron to the oversight
2	over the oversight. I say that because that's
3	what this board is about. This is the civilian
4	oversight of the Detroit Police Department.
5	And Ron was more or less the civilian
6	oversight of us because commissioners, as you
7	well know, when Ron stood at the podium he held
8	us to task quite often, took us to task quite
9	often. Ron in his last days, one thing he was
10	very adamant about and that was about the
11	Commission being restored to full power.
12	And the truth is that well, I guess
13	one needs to really go back and understand the
14	real history because it was all about Emergency
15	Manager Order 42 which I considered unlawful and
16	was a violation of the State Constitution, the
17	City Charter and disenfranchised the voters in
18	the city of Detroit.
19	And I know in terms of reconciliation I
20	know what Ron would want me to do and that is he
21	would want me to reconcile that. So for the
22	Governor, I forgive the Governor for taking power
23	from the Commission. I forgive those who
24	conspired with Kevyn Orr to take power from the
25	Commission This is truth in fact



1	It also needs to be known too that the
2	last year I believe when it was a motion on
3	the table that we go to court and fight this in
4	court because you disenfranchised the voters in
5	my district and all the voters in the city of
6	Detroit when you took this and there was no
7	reason to take power from the Commission because
8	it had nothing to do with the bankruptcy.
9	So we have to tell the truth here, and
10	Ron fought that all the way. And I put the
11	motion on the table to go to court, but some of
12	the commissioners, and we all approved it,
13	because I thought, you know, it was this would
14	be best suited to go to litigation because
15	there's no doubt we would have prevailed, but Ron
16	sought the activity of activism and he engaged in
17	activism every single day.
18	And the commissioners who've met with
19	Michigan United see, you have to understand
20	how we really get this power so to speak back. I
21	say we never lost it, but it was an activist, it
22	was the citizens of this city, it was Michigan
23	United and some of the commissioners here who



really were a part of participating with Michigan

24

United.

1	I made a few of the meetings, but some
2	of you were really made all the meetings and
3	engaged with the people in the community.
4	So it wasn't and it was that
5	activism from Michigan United who went to the
6	City Council because they circulated petitions
7	around the city and told the Council members if
8	you didn't sign it to restore power they were
9	going to recall the council members. See, I got
10	to tell the truth up here, I have to tell the
11	truth.
12	Of course, they're the ones that signed
13	that took away the power. I forgive them too.
14	This is reconciliation. I forgive those to took
15	the power, but I'll never forget and I'll say
16	never never again.
17	So that's why we're here today because
18	of Ron Scott, because of Michigan United and
19	those who engaged in that activism and that fight
20	to bring this to restore this commission back
21	to power.
22	So yeah, I forgive all those who are
23	part of this which was unlawful, but we're here
24	today so this is reconciliation. So I'm
25	personally ready to move on.



1	So Governor Snyder, those that
2	conspired with Kevyn Orr behind doors violating
3	the Open Meetings Act and couldn't even find
4	minutes to the meeting that they had, members of
5	the City Council who signed to take the power,
6	who signed supposedly to give it back, I forgive
7	all of you.
8	I know that's what Ron would want me
9	probably to say in reconciliation. Thank you.
10	COMMISSIONER BELL: Thanks,
11	Commissioner Crawford.
12	(APPLAUSE.)
13	COMMISSIONER BELL: Commissioner Moore,
14	resolution for Ms. Sandra Pickens, please.
15	COMMISSIONER MOORE: Yes, sir.
16	Ms. Pickens couldn't be here this evening, but I
17	will read the, "Now therefore".
18	Resolution honoring Ms. Sandra Pickens.
19	NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Detroit
20	Board of Police Commissioners speaking for the
21	citizens of the city of Detroit and the Detroit
22	Police Department acknowledges the generous
23	spirit of Ms. Sandra Pickens. Her commitment to
24	community service is exemplary and her devotion
25	to improving the quality of life for all citizens



1	in her community and throughout the city of
2	Detroit merit our highest regards.
3	We thank and congratulate you,
4	Ms. Sandra Pickens, the Detroit Board of Police
5	Commissioners.
6	Move for adoption.
7	COMMISSIONER BISHOP VANN: Supported.
8	COMMISSIONER BELL: Properly moved and
9	supported. Discussion? Those in favor, aye?
10	COMMISSIONERS: Aye.
11	COMMISSIONER BELL: Opposed? Motion
12	carries. Thank you, Commissioner Moore.
13	At this time any old business before
14	this board.
15	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Mr. Chair,
16	under old business and the reason I bring this
17	back to the table is that last week we were it
18	was kind of a debate, it wasn't even heated, but
19	a statement was made to me that I guess they
20	didn't know the people didn't know what I want
21	and I'm kind of cleaning that statement up.
22	And I'm speaking to the Commission or
23	us as a Commission. I did some research. I've
24	read the Open Meetings Act, I just thought I
25	would do a refresher. I read the City Charter



1	numerous times, I just thought I would refresh on
2	reading the City Charter and I've done that.
3	Also I've read our bylaws, the
4	Commission bylaws, and I just want to say on the
5	record that as a Commission as I stated last week
6	there is a procedure where things are supposed to
7	come out of the committee, come before the full
8	board and the full board is supposed to vote for
9	it.
10	And so that my suggestion is that
11	and everyone I'm sure on the board has this
12	material and maybe they want to be inclined
13	sometimes to just do as I did, even though I was
14	on point last week, and like I said when I sit
15	here on the Board it's my intention to do
16	everything aboveboard, so thank you, sir.
17	COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, sir,
18	duly noted. Any other old business?
19	Announcements. Our next meeting will
20	be Thursday, December 17, 2015 at 3 PM at the
21	Public Safety Headquarters and in fact that would
22	be our last meeting for the year. We will be
23	taking a two-week break and we will be
24	reconvening next year.
25	Our next community meeting is going to



1	be in the 12th Precinct on January 14, the
2	Arab-American & Chaldean Council, 62 E. Seven
3	Mile Road and it's listed hopefully in the
4	material that you have.
5	So at this time I'm going to ask
6	could we stand for a moment of silence as we open
7	up the mic for Ron Scott.
8	(MOMENT OF SILENCE - STANDING) .
9	COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, oral
10	communication from the audience. Please give
11	your name, you have two minutes, be respectful
12	and the time frame and we appreciate you coming
13	to the mic.
14	MR. WILSON: Mr. Bell, Vice-Chair and
15	to the honorable body of commissioners, good
16	evening, and fellow citizens. My name is Tom
17	Wilson and I'd like to take part of that seven
18	minutes that Ron would take in terms of
19	addressing the body and my concerns.
20	It's about the equipment, the military
21	equipment that the police departments and I
22	say departments are going to have to send back
23	to DC. I heard the comment about, you know, it
24	makes the police department seem too militarized.
25	I mean, excuse me?



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1	They are a military body. I don't see
2	how it's going to make them too militarized and
3	believe me, I believe this too. In terms of the
4	job that you all do, there's not enough money in
5	this world for me to do what you all do and that
6	is put on that blue uniform and that badge and
7	take that vow to protect and serve.
8	My hat is off to you. Anytime I have a
9	chance to stand before a mic and say that, I will
10	say that. My hat is off to Detroit's finest.
11	And also in terms of you all need as
12	much help as you can get. There's less than
13	1,500 police officers on force. That's the
14	lowest it's been since, what, 1920 or whatever.
15	I mean my myself personally, I don't think
16	anybody needs should have a gun except the
17	police and the military, but that's a mute point.
18	But the way it's going, we got all of
19	these bad guys, to use that for lack of a better
20	word, out there on the street. You all go out
21	there every day to do what you got to do. And
22	just like with that shootout with those two
23	terrorists, if they didn't have the kind of

24

equipment that they had to roll up on that car,

it might have been some police officers injured

1	as well.
2	And I mean I love the President. If he
3	ran a third time I would vote for him again, but
4	I think to use the word, I'm not going to say he
5	was wrong, I'll blame it on his head, not his
6	heart in terms of him asking that that equipment
7	be brought back because what it's going to do, go
8	to some yard, sit there and rust when it could be
9	here and all around the country and elsewhere.
10	But anyway, thanks for letting me
11	speak.
12	COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you. Yes,
13	ma'am.
14	MS. BROWN: My name is Theo Brown,
15	co-founder of research and I came this evening to
16	ask two things. One maybe a third anyway,
17	one, has there been any change in the powers, the
18	policies for this commission, yes or no?
19	COMMISSIONER BELL: The answer is no.
20	It's mandated by Charter and that was signed off
21	by the Council and implemented on the date
22	December 10.
23	MS. BROWN: So you receive your full
24	powers back?
25	COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, ma'am.



1	MS. BROWN: The Charter was not
2	changed?
3	COMMISSIONER BELL: No, ma'am. We
4	cannot change the Charter. The only way the
5	Charter can be changed is with the amendment by
6	the people of the city of Detroit.
7	MS. BROWN: Well, you know
8	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: No compromise.
9	MS. BROWN: Kevyn Orr did some
10	scurrilous things.
11	COMMISSIONER BELL: That's over with.
12	MS. BROWN: I just thought I would ask
13	while he was here. The other question has to do
14	with the body cameras. I strongly support the
15	use of body cameras.
16	There was a report that there was an
17	experiment I guess you would say in one zip code
18	and it was very successful.
19	So the question is why would it take 2
20	to 20 years in order to have body cameras
21	city-wide. I know you didn't do it, but
22	COMMISSIONER BELL: My understanding,
23	ma'am, if you want a reply, is that we will have
24	body cameras in 2016. We stood with the Mayor
25	and Chief of Police it's just now happening in



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1	2016, that would be the start of the process.
2	MS. BROWN: I know you supported them,
3	but he was the one who started talking about how
4	long it's going to take.
5	COMMISSIONER BELL: No, he didn't say
6	that. He said 2016. Am I right, Assistant chief
7	White?
8	ASST. CHIEF WHITE: Yeah, we're going
9	to launch the project in 2016. The vendor that
10	we had was unable to fulfill the orders, so we
11	are still now in the process of finding a new
12	vendor.
13	MS. BROWN: That's what the problem
14	was, okay. But we are told 2016, before December
15	31, 2016?
16	COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, ma'am,
17	hopefully, yes. That's my understanding.
18	MS. BROWN: We'll be watching, thank
19	you.
20	COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, ma'am, thank
21	you.
22	MS. MORRIS: Good evening,
23	commissioners. My name is Tawana Morris, I'm a
24	retired police officer and investigator. I used



to be the investigator for the Detroit Coalition

1	Against Police Brutality and 90 percent of the
2	time when Ron was up here doing what he does it
3	was because of the investigations that we at the
4	coalition did.
5	I'm happy to see that your powers are
6	restored at 101 percent I hope. My question, can
7	the people that was up under this illegal
8	emergency manager come back if they had issues
9	that were unresolved according to the Police
10	Commissioner bylaws.
11	COMMISSIONER BELL: My understanding
12	that that's an issue we're not properly prepared
13	my understanding is it's over with as far as
14	the Board of Police Commissioners, we have our
15	power back. If you have any other issue with
16	Mr. Orr, that probably would be another forum.
17	MS. MORRIS: No, no. What I was saying
18	was if you had an issue up under this, up under
19	the past administration and things were not done
20	properly
21	COMMISSIONER BELL: I assume as a
22	citizen you always have recourse to voice those
23	concerns before the proper authority, yes.
24	MS. MORRIS: Okay and are you still in



up under the DOJ consent agreement?

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1	COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, we have a
2	monitoring process for a period of time. Is that
3	going to end?
4	MS. MORRIS: The DOJ does it?
5	COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, they are
6	monitoring for a period of time. When they ended
7	was 15 months. I think the clock is still
8	ticking on that, am I right?
9	ASST. CHIEF WHITE: That's correct.
10	Through the Chair, it's scheduled to end March of
11	2016.
12	MS. MORRIS: I would encourage everyone
13	that was not satisfied up under this past process
14	to come to the Board and I'd like to adhere that
15	my 7th District commissioner has done a stellar
16	job and I appreciate you.
17	COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, ma'am.
18	Yes, sir.
19	MR. REED: Through the Chair I wanted
20	to my name is Kenneth Reed by the way. I
21	wanted to thank you all for the resolution that
22	you did for Ron. Ron and I were very close, we
23	worked together for many years. I will be sure
24	to convey what was communicated this evening back
25	to both Sandra and to the family as well because



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1	as we all know, his home-going service is this
2	upcoming Saturday.
3	There's been a lot of talk concerning,
4	you know, where his coalition goes and stuff like
5	that now that Ron has made his physical
6	transition from this planet, but however that
7	being said, the coalition will continue on, we
8	will all come together collectively as a
9	community to make sure that it goes on.
10	And when there's something that has
11	happened that is questionable, we will deal with
12	that. I'm happy to know that you all have your
13	powers back now and that does my heart good.
14	But, again, like I said, just because
15	Ron has made his physical transition does not
16	mean that the coalition has made a transition out
17	of here just like he has, but we will continue to
18	work in his memory and in his spirit and we will
19	do what needs to be done to make sure that people
20	of the city of Detroit and those who visit the
21	city of Detroit are treated fairly by officers in
22	this department, and that things don't revert
23	back to the way that they once were.
24	COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, sir.
25	(APPLAUSE.)



1	Ms. McKISSEY: My name is Mary MaKissey
2	and I'm the president of the Detroit Citizens
3	Police Academy Alumni Association and we're here
4	first I want to thank all of you who attended
5	our holiday get-together last night. We always
6	are very happy to see police. We would like to
7	see more even because we're here to support you
8	and our organization has grown, and I'm saying
9	all that to say that I have shirts in the back of
10	the room that I'm selling as a fund raiser for
11	our organization and so far not one police has
12	bought not one shirt so that's not helping our
13	organization. They're different prices.
14	And I'm glad to be here and thank you
15	for allowing me, especially you, you are in my
16	district so thank you so much for allowing me to
17	sell the shirts and I'm glad to be here.
18	COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, ma'am.
19	MR. ROSS: Good evening. Have you
20	smiled today up there, gentlemen? You're free.
21	Back my name is Barry Ross from the
22	Detroit Coalition Against Violence after the
23	actual name of the brutality organization and I
24	also go out avidly with Minister Maleek Shabaz in
25	a peaceful manner where murders and violence have



1	occurred. I've been thinking a lot lately,
2	watched about 90 hours on CNN about ISIL and I
3	feel there's a lot to learn on their methodology.
4	But also what really gets me, I've been
5	out here for about five years, grew up, born in
6	Detroit, went to Mumford, had a clothing store
7	downtown Detroit, my family, for 96 years.
8	So I love Detroit. Whether people love
9	it or not that are not getting involved, that's
10	okay too. But we don't have a I know this is
11	not this is probably not of protocol because
12	you are not police officers technically, you're
13	commissioners, right? I came in a little late.
14	I catch up sort of quick.
15	Violence is not our issue. What are we
16	going to do I just want to throw this out to
17	the room what about the babies coming up?
18	What about junior high and high school and
19	college students, young men, young women, with
20	unhealthy households that are walking to school
21	past thousands, hundreds of abandoned houses,
22	walking into a system that could really care less
23	any more about educating them unfortunately.
24	What's to say they don't turn out



exactly with what we're dealing with now? I'm on

1	the streets all the time, but I submit that
2	anybody, any man or woman that wants to get ahold
3	of me and start mentoring literally people
4	have been talking about mentoring but I'm
5	talking about teaching children the value of life
6	so maybe they don't want to take out somebody.
7	Help them to see that they could work
8	with disabled people, animal shelters and I know
9	you guys, maybe you'll just think about this, but
10	unless we start reaching our children growing up,
11	it's all over. We've already lost okay, I'll
12	stop, but thank you for listening to me. My name
13	is Barry Ross and I want to do something and get
14	involved with the kids.
15	COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, sir.
16	MR. ROSS: Thank you.
17	(APPLAUSE.)
18	MS. SHAROBI: Good evening, everyone.
19	I also wanted to thank the Commission my name
20	is Kimberly Sharobi. I also wanted to thank the
21	Commission for the resolution that you gave for
22	Ron Scott and I wanted to emphasize that Ron was
23	not against police, he was against police
24	brutality.



And I just want to emphasize this

1	because a lot of people would get that
2	misconstrued that they would say he was against
3	the police. He had many friends who was police,
4	had a lot of respect for police officers, so
5	again, not against police, but against police
6	brutality and just wanted fair treatment for
7	everybody on both sides, and I agree with him.
8	Couple more things, he was one of the
9	most principled people that I knew, extremely
10	principled, I appreciated that about him.
11	And lastly, look forward to anybody
12	who's thinking about continuing his efforts with
13	peace zones, that includes the coalition and
14	anyone who's interested in that concept. It's a
15	wonderful concept which does include restorative
16	justice, talking to your neighbors, doing the
17	neighborhood policing not policing and some of
18	the things that's already implemented. Thank
19	you.
20	COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, ma'am.
21	(APPLAUSE).
22	COMMISSIONER BELL: Any others?
23	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, sir,
24	Mr. Chair. You're absolutely correct, Ron was



about peace zones for life, that was one of his

1	projects, and something that he held dear and he
2	often talked about, so
3	COMMISSIONER BELL: I'm going to ask
4	the Commander to come forward. An issue came up
5	about militarization of the police department in
6	terms of equipment, but as you will know it's a
7	hot issue in the country.
8	And I guess that order came from the
9	White House, the President of the United States,
10	but I think when you look at barricaded gunmen,
11	etc, etc in terms of helping the people of
12	Detroit, this is the commanding officer that you
13	don't really see all the time, but all those
14	issues that come before his team goes out and
15	they respond to it, so I think he could enlighten
16	us in terms of hearing from the commander.
17	COMMANDER BARREN: Through the Board,
18	again Comm. Elvin Barren of Metropolitan
19	Division. So I did have an opportunity to listen
20	to the comment as relates to the military
21	vehicles that the President did recall.
22	Those vehicles were actually the tanks
23	if you will for better visual. What we have in
24	Detroit Police Department are industry standard



law enforcement vehicles designed to do the same

1	protection as those military vehicles, but
2	without the mindset that it's a war machine, so
3	we did have one at one time. It's since been
4	returned back. It actually broke down.
5	We did purchase what's called a Bear.
6	Again, it's an up-armored vehicle, it allows us
7	that protection. So the gentleman will know, we
8	do still have two vehicles designed to help us ir
9	crisis situations.
10	A lot of the problems that we're seeing
11	across the country was police institutions that
12	were bringing those militarized vehicles to
13	peaceful protests. And here the Detroit Police
14	Department we do not do that. Even the vehicles
15	that we have are brought only to our armed
16	barricaded gunman situations and we would never
17	bring those vehicles to a peaceful protest.
18	As this body knows Captain Williams and
19	I Captain Williams, please stand.
20	Captain Williams and I are the
21	Metropolitan Division response for not only
22	active shooters, we also handle all the protests
23	in the city.
24	COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, sir,
25	through the Chair. Commander, thank you for



that. The truth is the President recalled that
equipment because of other departments that
abused that equipment. Also too there was no
training. The equipment, army surplus equipment,
the militarization of police department and stuff
like that, the equipment was just given to them,
there was no training.

And like you said, in terms of peaceful protests that a lot of that equipment was used and deployed, and that's the reason why because it was -- again there was this rise in activism across the country and the protests, pressure on the White House, President, Justice Department, that's why they took back that equipment.

COMM. BARREN: Correct.

ASST. CHIEF WHITE: If I may through the Chair, one of the most, I guess, specific identifiers is the fact that those vehicles that were taken back were the tracked vehicles. Can you talk a little bit about that?

COMM. BARREN: Correct, so again just so the citizens understand, the government has what's called a 1033 program, so that program allows law enforcement agencies to gain these tanks if you will for up-armored protection for



1	high crisis situations.
2	Again, when a citizen looks at that
3	vehicle, you're thinking a war machine, but there
4	are vehicles designed again for law enforcement
5	purposes and that's what you see when you watch a
6	barricaded gunman with Detroit Police Department.

That would be the vehicle that you see in the background, a law enforcement industry standard so that you, the citizens, look at that will understand this is not a war machine, but it's actually a vehicle used for our protection and the protection of the citizens.

So in a situation that we use for -- if we have a shooter, we may have offices or citizens pinned down, this vehicle will be driven into that hot atmosphere and we have a door that can open either from the bottom or from the side that can extract those officers or those citizens out of that harms way and deliver them to safety.

ASST. CHIEF WHITE: Thank you,

Commander, and this is not to debate the validity

of any decision made by the President, this is

simply giving you the information necessary to

make an informed decision or opinion on the

circumstances.



1	If we're in a crisis situation
2	certainly we want to make sure that our officers
3	have the equipment and, again, our equipment is
4	not military equipment, it's police equipment for
5	the purpose of keeping you safe and keeping our
6	officers safe, so we just want to make sure you
7	have the right information.
8	COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you,
9	Commander and Assistant Chief because in forums
10	like this we want to make sure you get informed
11	information where you can somewhat counter some
12	of the negative information that might be out
13	there with no foundation and also we are this
14	program, like most programs of the board is now
15	going to be aired 10 AM on Friday morning and 7
16	PM that evening following our meeting on a Friday
17	and that would be if have U-verse I mean AT&T
18	or Comcast you just look it up in terms of the
19	public access channel when you get an opportunity
20	and I just want to thank you for coming out
21	tonight, it's been very rewarding.
22	We were looking at some type of
23	celebration tonight, but due to the holiday
24	season so many things going on we will perhaps



postpone that until January or February in terms

1	of recognize those who really helped us and
2	assisted us and recognizing you in terms of that
3	type of recognition.
4	But basically as we go forward it's all
5	about working together. Mother Bernice, you
6	almost missed your opportunity because when I
7	start speaking, it's closed.
8	MS. SMITH: I was waiting for you to
9	finish, young man. Bernice Smith, activist. I
10	only have one announcement to make and that I
11	believe the commissioner made it last week in
12	regards to the Christmas party that's going to be
13	held for our dear Captain Hope is back here
14	it's going to be held for Precinct 7 and we would
15	love very much for everyone to come.
16	It's going to be at the church
17	Sacred Heart not Sacred Heart, but anyway Mack
18	and behind the McDonald's, that's all I know.
19	COMMISSIONER BELL: Rivard.
20	MS. SMITH: Rivard and we're going to
21	be having
22	COMMISSIONER BELL: 5:30, 6.
23	MS. SMITH: 6 o'clock. I'm helping
24	coordinate it and I'm trying to do you want
25	her to come up?



1	COMMISSIONER BELL: No, no, you're
2	doing a great job. We want to close this out.
3	You're going a great job.
4	MS. SMITH: And we're asking for
5	donations and if you can't give any money, we
6	would like for you to bring a toy for the
7	youngsters that are homeless and whoever needs
8	the toy.
9	But in the meantime we want you to come
10	and I don't know whether the audience on the 18th
11	which is next Friday, I don't know whether the
12	audience I'm just so proud of that young man,
13	I just can't help it because every time I see him
14	I want everybody to know we're going to lose him,
15	that is our dear AC White.
16	He is leaving us to go to Ann Arbor to
17	deal with the people up there and we wish him the
18	best and the most success for him because we
19	really need him here, but if it's for his
20	advantage for him to leave us, we give him all
21	the kudos in the world.
22	So, again, I want the public to know
23	we're losing a good man.
24	ASST. CHIEF WHITE: I haven't announced



it yet, but thank you.

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1	MS. SMITH: I put it in the so it
2	will be. I will tell you what I need to tell you
3	next week in regards to the police situation.
4	I want to make it in house, all right.
5	COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you.
6	MS. SMITH: Have a good holiday.
7	COMMISSIONER BELL: If there's no other
8	remarks to be made by this body, I want to
9	MS. SMITH: The young man that was
10	mauled, his service is going to be Saturday. I
11	hate to even ask, when it was told to me, but
12	anyway his services are Saturday and Carvelle,
13	that's the funeral home that's going to be
14	handling it, and you can see the viewing
15	tomorrow.
16	And also we all know about Ron, I don't
17	even have to tell you that. He was a very good
18	adversary of mine and we fought and fought, I'm
19	telling you.
20	COMMISSIONER BELL: Mother Bernice, we
21	already spoke to that.
22	MS. SMITH: Not my thing.
23	COMMISSIONER BELL: We want to close
24	out, thank you.



MS. SMITH: You always do me that way.

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1	COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, I love
2	you.
3	MS. SMITH: I love you too.
4	COMMISSIONER BELL: Okay. Once again,
5	I want to thank you for coming out tonight. It
6	was good to recognize these officers and I
7	appreciate their service and recognition.
8	I want to thank Commissioner Sanders
9	for his first community meeting. I hope this was
10	more enjoyable versus our last meeting and I want
11	to thank all the commissioners and AC White.
12	If I don't see you between now and
13	Christmas, have a safe and blessed Christmas and
14	holiday and kind in mind why we celebrate the
15	season.
16	Commissioners, I will entertain a
17	motion.
18	COMMISSIONER MOORE: So moved.
19	COMMISSIONER BISHOP VANN: Second.
20	COMMISSIONER BELL: Properly moved and
21	seconded. Ready for the question? Those in
22	favor, aye?
23	COMMISSONERS: Aye.
24	COMMISSIONER BELL: Those opposed?
25	Motion carries. Thank you, there's refreshments





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
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
