4 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Good afternoon,  
5 ladies and gentlemen, and Happy New Year to you all.  
6 Welcome to the Board of Detroit Police Commissioners  
7 meeting. My name is Jerome Warfield, Chairman of the  
8 Board of Police Commissioners. Serving with me today  
9 is the Vice-Chairperson of the Board, Commissioner  
10 Adelia Rivera, as well as Commissioner Reverend Michael  
11 Reeves, Commissioner Donnell White, and Commissioner  
12 Mr. Tony Stewart. We also have with us sitting in for  
13 the chief today Assistant Chief Mr. Chester Logan.  
14 Assistant Chief, good to see you.

15 ASSISTANT CHIEF LOGAN: Good to be here.

16 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: We also have with us  
17 at the table our Secretary to the Board of Police  
18 Commissioners Mr. George Anthony. I'm going to ask if  
19 Secretary Anthony could introduce the rest of our staff  
20 for today's meeting.

21 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you, Mr. Chair.  
22 George Anthony for the record and through the chair.  
23 The staff members present include Ms. Celia Banks  
24 Washington who is our Attorney/Supervising  
25 Investigator, Ms. Dalph Watson who is our Director of

1 Police Personnel, Ms. Leslie Griffen who is our  
2 Community Affairs Coordinator, Mr. Robert Brown who is  
3 our office manager, Sergeant Steven Plieth who is  
4 recording our proceedings, and Ms. Elizabeth Koller  
5 from Hanson Court Reporting Services. That completes  
6 the reading of the introduction of the staff.

7 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you,  
8 Mr. Secretary. At this time I'm going to ask if  
9 Chaplain Powell is here? Good afternoon, sir, good to  
10 see you again.

11 CHAPLAIN POWELL: Good to see you.

12 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: We're going to ask if  
13 you could come to the podium and state your name and if  
14 you could lead us to our invocation.

15 CHAPLAIN POWELL: Yes, my name is Chaplain  
16 Powell from Cornerstone Church on Wyoming near 8 Mile.  
17 Let us all bow our heads as we asked the Lord to bless  
18 this meeting. Lord God of Grace in the name of Jesus,  
19 we thank and praise you, Lord, for your keeping power  
20 and your blessing power. Lord God, how you blessed us  
21 today to come gather our minds, Lord God. And Lord,  
22 just help us, Lord, to bring our community together.

23 Lord, I ask you just to bless, Lord, this  
24 council, Lord God, and please bless our mayor. Look  
25 down upon our chief, Lord God, his assistants and those

1 that work, Lord God, to keep our streets safe. Lord  
2 God, bless everyone that is here asking you to just  
3 strengthen them. Lord God, just give them that that  
4 they need and help them, Lord God, and give them, Lord,  
5 the strength to know that you are our all in all.

6 We thank you, Lord, and we praise you. We  
7 magnify your name. In Jesus name, amen.

8 AUDIENCE: Amen. Beautiful.

9 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, Chaplain  
10 Powell. At this time we'll entertain a motion to  
11 approve the agenda for today.

12 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: So moved.

13 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Support.

14 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: It's been properly  
15 moved and supported that the agenda for today be  
16 approved. All those in favor?

17 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

18 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: All those opposed?  
19 Motion carries. We'll also entertain at this time a  
20 motion to approve the minutes from Tuesday, December  
21 the 28th, 2010 meeting.

22 COMMISSIONER STEWART: So moved.

23 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Second.

24 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: It's been properly  
25 moved and supported that we approve the minutes from

1 Tuesday's meeting, December the 28th. All those in  
2 favor?

3 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

4 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: All those opposed?  
5 Motion carries. There is no chairman's report or  
6 secretary's report today. So we'll move right down to  
7 the Chief of Police, Assistant Chief Logan?

8 ASSISTANT CHIEF LOGAN: Sir, there is no  
9 report from the chief today.

10 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, sir.  
11 Announcements: Our next meeting will be next week,  
12 Thursday, January 13th, 2011 at 6:30 p.m., New Prospect  
13 Missionary Baptist Church which is located at  
14 6330 Pembroke right at the corner of Livernois. And at  
15 that meeting we will have a public hearing on the  
16 budget for the police department and the Board of  
17 Police Commissioners. So we ask that you come out and  
18 visit with us that night. And we will have some  
19 summary sheets available for you where you will be able  
20 to discuss some line item issues as it relates to the  
21 budget as we move forward in our business.

22 And we will also, of course, take concerns or  
23 comments from the citizens after we are done with the  
24 budget hearing, as well, and we'll hear a report from  
25 the 12th Precinct as well at that meeting. At this

1 time we will open up the floor for oral comments. If  
2 there are individuals here who would like to address  
3 the Board of Police Commissioners you may --

4 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: Before we go there,  
5 through the chair, I asked for a report on --

6 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Sure. Absolutely.  
7 I'm going to turn the floor over to Commissioner Rivera  
8 at this time. Yes, ma'am.

9 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: I just wanted to remind  
10 Commander Lee that I had asked for a report on towing  
11 for the year with the abans separate. And I know it's  
12 only been about three weeks, and I know we've gone  
13 through a big holiday, so. I just want to remind him  
14 to keep that on his agenda.

15 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Do you have that  
16 report, sir?

17 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: You have it?

18 COMMANDER EWING: Commander Eric Ewing,  
19 Resource Management. Those stats that we need to  
20 compile the report are in. We just need a few more  
21 days to compile them for you in a report to present to  
22 you next week.

23 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: Very good. Thank you.

24 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Sir, just a question,  
25 and I don't know if Assistant Chief would know this or

1 not. At our last meeting we voted to immediately  
2 implement the new towing rotation understanding that  
3 there will be a lag time as it relates to the  
4 applications and having them ready and going through  
5 the legal process. Do you know if that new towing  
6 rotation is in place?

7           COMMANDER EWING: Right now the request went  
8 over to the law department, and at this particular time  
9 they're looking over that request. My understanding is  
10 we're waiting for an opinion back from the law  
11 department with regard to that. And that's probably  
12 more of an offline type item that I can speak to you  
13 later about. There's some things I'll probably let you  
14 know about offline.

15           COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: And I'm also going to  
16 ask if our Supervising/Attorney Celia Banks Washington  
17 will be in on that conversation as well? Because we  
18 did our initial due diligence in that as it relates to  
19 looking at any legal ramifications that that may or may  
20 not have as it relates to putting that rotation in  
21 process, and from our understanding that there was from  
22 a legal standpoint we were well within the spirit of  
23 our vote for voting that way. So we would love to talk  
24 to you offline about that, though, love to.

25           COMMANDER EWING: Yes, sir.



1 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you. I  
2 appreciated that.

3 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Excuse me, Mr. Chair.

4 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Yes, Commissioner  
5 White?

6 COMMISSIONER WHITE: There was, I believe the  
7 date was January 5 that we were expecting communication  
8 back from the law department in regards to review of  
9 the package. Do you know if we've received that to  
10 date?

11 COMMANDER EWING: As of right now I don't  
12 believe that we've received that. I just had a  
13 conversation with Deputy Chief Lee prior to this  
14 meeting. He is in current conversations with the law  
15 department in regard to that.

16 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Okay. Thank you.  
17 Attorney Washington, can you come to the podium for a  
18 minute, please?

19 ATTORNEY WASHINGTON: Yes, sir.

20 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: And I want this on  
21 the record only because I'm certainly not trying to be  
22 coy or anything like that, but we have for at least  
23 since I've been here talking about rule changes for  
24 towers, we finally had all of our meetings and we  
25 passed the rules, the mayor signed off on all the

1 rules, and this Board voted unanimously to implement  
2 the towing rotation. We've actually seen the new  
3 towing rotation. And, again, just from your due  
4 diligence and the calls that you made, do you believe  
5 from a legal standpoint that we are jeopardizing the  
6 spirit of that new move to put that rotation in in  
7 process?

8 ATTORNEY WASHINGTON: I am very concerned.  
9 Celia Washington for the record. I'm very concerned  
10 about conversations with the law department because we  
11 had members from the law department involved in the  
12 process of drafting those rules. We had a lawyer from  
13 the mayor's office involved in drafting those rules.  
14 And the chief actually signed off on the rules, as well  
15 as Mayor Bing. So I'm at a loss. The rotation,  
16 there's nothing that violates the spirit of any  
17 ordinance. I'm not sure what's going on.

18 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Is there something  
19 else needed by this Board in your humble opinion to  
20 make that effective immediately?

21 ATTORNEY WASHINGTON: No, sir. The charter  
22 makes it very clear with rule making. Section 2 of the  
23 charter gives the steps necessary for any rule to  
24 become effective. Notwithstanding all the public  
25 hearings and all the notices that were in the paper,

1 not withstanding any of that, there's a separate  
2 section that says in order for a rule to become  
3 effective, and it was actually the law department  
4 lawyer and I that worked together on the last  
5 publication in the Detroit Legal News with all the  
6 signed, with the signatures, that says after it is  
7 published it is effective, no further discussion.

8 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Okay. So I guess I'm  
9 saying this to the department, the rotation needs to be  
10 in effect now. And we'll let the chips fall as they  
11 may as it relates to the legal discussions we have.  
12 But this Board voted, this Board followed the city  
13 ordinances and the codes and posted the changes as we  
14 needed to do that. And so we need that rotation. As  
15 all of us have seen it, we need that rotation in effect  
16 right now, as we voted in our previous meeting for that  
17 to happen. And so certainly we can have more  
18 conversations offline, but that rotation needs to be in  
19 effect now. Thank you.

20 ATTORNEY WASHINGTON: If I would ask through  
21 the chair any of the conversations that are the offline  
22 conversations if they could happen sooner rather than  
23 later?

24 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Yes, ma'am.

25 ATTORNEY WASHINGTON: Because I'm not sure --

1 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: And maybe we can set  
2 that today before this meeting or immediately after  
3 this meeting is over.

4 MS. BANKS WASHINGTON: Yes, sir.

5 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you. Any other  
6 comments from our commissioners on that topic? Thank  
7 you.

8 At this time, again, we will open up the  
9 floor for comments from the audience. We ask that you  
10 state your name for the record and you would please  
11 abide by our rules for four minutes per speaker. Thank  
12 you.

13 MS. SEMMA: Julie Semma from Seventies  
14 Towing. I just want to say thank you for everything  
15 you have done and Happy New Year to everybody here.

16 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Happy New Year to  
17 you.

18 MS. SEMMA: Something that was in 2007 as far  
19 as towing rotation, I just want to put this on the  
20 record, and I've submitted copies to you guys, as well.  
21 Back in 2007 the towing rotation changed overnight and  
22 from my understanding there was nothing that went to  
23 the law department and that was done through the deputy  
24 chief and Assistant Godbee from what I understand. It  
25 was John Clark and Assistant Chief Godbee at the time.

1           And for this to go on as long as it's been  
2 and I understand that you guys have to do your due  
3 diligence, but I don't think that it's fair for the  
4 small towers to keep going on like this. And I  
5 appreciate everything you guys are doing right now.  
6 But three years is too long. And it needs to happen  
7 like right now. Because small towers are really  
8 getting affected by this. And we've been waiting,  
9 patiently waiting. And it needs to happen immediately.

10           And I'd like you guys to let us know where we  
11 stand as far as today or tomorrow because I was told  
12 that the rotation is in place but, however, it's not  
13 sent out yet. So I'd appreciate that. Thank you.

14           COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: You will know  
15 immediately.

16           MS. SEMMA: Thank you.

17           COMMISSIONER WHITE: Mr. Chair?

18           COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: I'm sorry, can you  
19 come back to the mic, Julie. Commissioner White?

20           COMMISSIONER WHITE: Just for a matter of  
21 record, when you speak to some of the issues that  
22 smaller tow companies are having can you speak directly  
23 to some of what those issues are?

24           MS. SEMMA: Currently we're getting one tow  
25 to two tows a day. And what's happening right now is

1 since the new rotation has changed there has been a  
2 series of problems where we have to find our cars now  
3 and by 7:00 when we start calling the unit that we're  
4 calling through communication by 7:00, 7:15 says  
5 they're full. So, therefore, we can't get any tows.  
6 And by doing that the process has been affecting not  
7 only my company, but small companies as well. As you  
8 can see the towing rotation, I don't know if you've  
9 looked at it or not, but our company gets one tow  
10 amongst other companies that get twenty-one per our one  
11 because we're in one district.

12 We've been requesting for getting in other  
13 districts. We've been denied. We've been told we're a  
14 great company. We provide excellent service. However,  
15 our service is not needed right now because they have  
16 other members who are taking care of their services.  
17 So that's just one of the problems that we're having.  
18 The other thing is, again, the tows that we're not  
19 getting. It's been for a long time been challenged and  
20 has been awarded to which everybody knows who's getting  
21 it and who's been getting the majority of the tows  
22 right now. And it's been affecting not only my company  
23 but the small towers are only towing in one or two  
24 districts.

25 And the small towers have been trying to

1 fight for more than one or two tows a day. The other  
2 problem is we're to tow through TEU and TEU is calling  
3 us maybe once a month, maybe two or three times a  
4 month. We have adequate amount of tow trucks to  
5 substantiate whatever we need to do, and they haven't  
6 been calling us. So it's been a problem. We're able  
7 to provide the service, however, we're just not getting  
8 the calls. Thank you.

9 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you.

10 MS. THORINGTON: Good afternoon.

11 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Good afternoon.

12 MS. THORINGTON: My name is Marie Thorington,  
13 and I am a resident of the New Center area. On  
14 December the 16th around twelve noon I was mugged. And  
15 I live like at 60 West Virginia Park just right around  
16 the corner from the NACP office. And I'm asking, and  
17 let me just compliment the officer that showed up to  
18 take the information, except I didn't get the  
19 information where I could get a police report so I can  
20 get all my secured, all of my driver's license and  
21 everything. So I need to know if any of you know where  
22 I can go get that report? Do I get it down here or if  
23 you know or whatever?

24 But I want to compliment the officer. And  
25 then I want to say to you all that all of my life I've

1 been working with protecting education and youth. And  
2 these were youth. Wait until I'm sixty to mug me on  
3 December the 16th. I'm asking for more police cars  
4 going down Second between Virginia Park and West Grand  
5 Boulevard. Because there's no way at noon, and you got  
6 Barsemian Center there, you also have a Flip the Script  
7 program. And nobody -- senior citizen I'm almost  
8 should be mugged in the afternoon.

9 But if you can compliment the officer that  
10 did come and take the information because I never seen  
11 that done when I lived on Fenkell and Schaefer. So  
12 that was something different. So I do want to  
13 compliment the guy but it should be in every  
14 neighborhood. This should be in every neighborhood.  
15 Why is it in some neighborhoods? But in the secured  
16 neighborhoods, Mr. White, right around the corner I got  
17 mugged. Oh, I don't want two minutes. Have a blessed  
18 day. Happy Holidays.

19 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Stay right there  
20 Ms. Thorington. I may ask if the Assistant Chief can  
21 comment. Welcome, sir. Let the record reflect that  
22 our chief has joined us, Chief of Police Ralph Godbee.  
23 Good to have you, sir.

24 CHIEF GODBEE: Good to be here, sir.

25 MS. THORINGTON: Hi, Chief, and happy



1 Holidays.

2 CHIEF GODBEE: How are you, ma'am? Happy New  
3 Year.

4 MS. THORINGTON: I was just explaining to  
5 them, you know, all my life I have stood up for youth  
6 in the City of Detroit and public education. And I got  
7 mugged on the 16th. I'd like to compliment the officer  
8 that took the report, but I need to know where to get  
9 the report because I need to get ID and the whole bit  
10 and if someone can tell me where I can get that report  
11 I'll be more than grateful.

12 CHIEF GODBEE: Deputy Chief Paul Welles, he's  
13 going to talk to you as soon as you leave the podium.

14 MS. THORINGTON: Okay, and thank you, and  
15 it's good to see you there.

16 CHIEF GODBEE: Good to see you, too.

17 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Ms. Thorington, there  
18 was another question you had as it relates to maybe  
19 increasing patrols in that area, as well.

20 MS. THORINGTON: Yeah, I think -- you know,  
21 the reason you need to increase the patrol because I  
22 notice when I was walking in the afternoon there's  
23 youth or young folks right there on Delaware and  
24 Second. They congregate on the corner. It'd be  
25 twenty-five or thirty because they have lunch. And

1 they stand out there smoking and whatever and that is  
2 where it happened. So you need to drive around there  
3 at noontime, somebody, when there's twenty or thirty  
4 folks standing on the corner at lunchtime from Flip the  
5 Script or from Barsemian just hanging out on that  
6 corner. I'm not blaming them.

7 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Okay. And certainly  
8 Deputy Chief Tolbert has taken that information down,  
9 too. Thank you. Yes, sir. Ms. Thorington, your  
10 glasses.

11 MS. THORINGTON: Oh, I'm coming back.

12 MR. BERNARD: Good afternoon.

13 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Good afternoon, sir.

14 MR. BERNARD: Wadsworth Community Block Club,  
15 Wayne Bernard speaking representing. I live on the  
16 westside --

17 MR. SECRETARY: Could you repeat your name  
18 slowly for our court reporter.

19 MR. BERNARD: Wadsworth Community Block Club,  
20 Wayne Bernard speaking. I'm coming to represent my  
21 block area. Chrysler just pulled out of their big  
22 plant right there on Plymouth and it's a lot going on  
23 in that building. And I don't want it burnt up. I  
24 would like to have that building preserved. We need  
25 more police to come and police that area because people

1 are going in and out of that building and I don't want  
2 a fire there.

3 They already have vandalized our park there.  
4 They went in there last night and the guy showed me on  
5 the camera the guy was there in the building and he  
6 scrolls through the wood part of the revolving doors.  
7 Now, how is all this going on in a neighborhood? And  
8 then Chrysler I'm upset with them because they pulled  
9 out and went out to Auburn Hills and took the jobs with  
10 them. We need jobs in that area. People need jobs.

11 And that's a big beautiful building with  
12 underground tunnels that are heated. Why did they pull  
13 out of there? And then why are we looking at a big  
14 ghost, a big giant ghost in that area? That building  
15 has never been empty. But I'm asking for more police  
16 in the area because I pay my taxes. Everyone around  
17 there pays their taxes. We need that in that area.  
18 Thank you.

19 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, sir.

20 CHIEF GODBEE: Mr. Bernard, if I could  
21 address that. I want you to work with Deputy Chief  
22 Tolbert. I'm not going to promise you increased  
23 patrols. I'll tell you why. That property belongs to  
24 Chrysler. What we need to do is engage Chrysler in  
25 securing that location. Because I don't want to be

1 disingenuous with you to say that we can provide more  
2 patrols at a vacant building. I don't want to give the  
3 impression, I don't want you to leave the podium with  
4 the impression that's what we're going to do. But what  
5 we can do is facilitate a meeting between a block club,  
6 Chrysler Security, and find out what they need to do to  
7 secure their property better to ensure we don't have  
8 those systemic issues that come from it.

9           So we're committed to work with you on that.  
10 We do have a relationship with Chrysler Security. They  
11 just came to meet with my assistant chief maybe two  
12 weeks ago on some issues of mutual concern. So if they  
13 need our help, we're going to ask them to step up to  
14 the plate to do what they're supposed to do.

15           MR. BERNARD: I'll just say this, sir, that  
16 building they said Chrysler doesn't own it. Someone  
17 name Sam Fadel owns it and he had some jackleg security  
18 going in and out of there.

19           CHIEF GODBEE: Okay.

20           MR. BERNARD: And no one's watching that  
21 building. But that building has never been empty.  
22 They sold the lot across the street to someone that's  
23 doing trucking.

24           CHIEF GODBEE: Yes, sir.

25           MR. BERNARD: They need to do more of that,

1 bring businesses back.

2 CHIEF GODBEE: I want to indicated to you we  
3 want to help facilitate sitting down with whoever owns  
4 the building to find out how we can assess --

5 MR. BERNARD: Because the children are  
6 getting on the train tracks. Someone's going to get  
7 hurt.

8 CHIEF GODBEE: Yes, sir.

9 MR. BERNARD: Thank you.

10 CHIEF GODBEE: Deputy Chief Tolbert's going  
11 to see you.

12 MR. REED: Hello. For the record, my name is  
13 Dwayne Anthony Reed, Junior. I'm a former resident of  
14 the New Center area and I now reside in the eastside of  
15 Detroit. I'm here today to bring to you all, I'm  
16 here --

17 SPEAKER: It's all right. Take your time.

18 MR. REED: I'm here to talk about a situation  
19 that happened to me on the 7th of July of last year. I  
20 was sitting at a red light on the Boulevard and Third.  
21 I was approached -- I wasn't approached. I was sitting  
22 in traffic at a red light. A narcotics van traveling  
23 westbound on the Boulevard blocks traffic off. I  
24 looked at it but I paid no attention because I'm  
25 listening to my radio.

1           Next thing, you know, I hear a scream. I  
2 looked to my left. It's another narcotics van here.  
3 It's six or seven officers all with guns in their hands  
4 pointing at me screaming cut the car off, show me your  
5 hands. I rolled the window down. I said, what? They  
6 said, show me your hands. Cut the car off. I put my  
7 hands up. He -- the guy, the guy comes up to my car.  
8 He reaches -- no, I went to turn my engine off and put  
9 my car in park because I'm in the intersection.

10           The officers I guess from the first van is at  
11 this door now. He's got a gun through my passenger  
12 window. He said, put your fucking hands where I can  
13 see them. I put my hands back up and told him I'm  
14 trying to put the truck in park. I put it in park.  
15 The other guy reaches through my window, turns off my  
16 car, opens my door, snatches me out.

17           Then he say -- I say, what did I do? He say,  
18 put your hands behind your back. I said, for what?  
19 What did I do? He said, put your hands behind your  
20 back. So I put my hands behind my back. He cuffed me.  
21 Then he pushed me to another officer. He was walking  
22 me to the back of the van that just pulled around the  
23 back of me. I asked him, what did I do? He honestly  
24 said, I don't know. Then he said, do you have anything  
25 on you I should know about? I said, I ain't got

1 nothing. I said, what did I do? He said, I don't  
2 know. I said, what you all pull me over for?

3 Maybe they just checking you out. He puts me  
4 on the floor of the narcotics van in handcuffs. I'm  
5 sitting on the floor of the narcotics van. All this  
6 time I guess they searching my vehicle. I can't really  
7 see because I'm on the floor. So they searching my  
8 vehicle, and I was later told that they had dogs and  
9 everything that searched my vehicle. They didn't find  
10 anything.

11 Then they came back to me to ask me my name,  
12 where I was going, my place of employment. I furnished  
13 them with all of that. Then after that they left.  
14 They came back again. Another guy he opens the door.  
15 He asked me to move to the other side of the van. He  
16 climbs in the van. He shuts the door. He tells me to  
17 get on my knees while I was in handcuffs. He tells me  
18 to get on my knees. He unbuttons my pants. He unzips  
19 my pants.

20 MR. SCOTT: Excuse me, can I intercede? I  
21 don't want him, because we asked him to come, I don't  
22 want him to go into the details. I think you can get  
23 it from my aide. I ask him to come because the matter  
24 that was before IA that he was not satisfied with. So  
25 I asked him to come. Ron Scott, for the record. If he

1 could in effect talk to the commission to see if they  
2 could get a reconsideration of what the IA decision was  
3 made so that they could look at it again. Now, the  
4 reason why I interceded is that he has some emotional  
5 issues related to that, and I don't want to go any  
6 further if he will allow me to intercede, and then  
7 maybe he can talk to you.

8 CHIEF GODBEE: Mr. Reed, Lieutenant Charles  
9 Wilson who serves as my Chief of Staff, if you could  
10 give him your information and if will Board would allow  
11 me seven days to come back to you to report what my  
12 findings are relative to IA's investigation?

13 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Sure.

14 CHIEF GODBEE: Mr. Reed, is that fine with  
15 you, sir? Lieutenant Wilson who is my Chief of Staff  
16 is going to get information from you that way we can  
17 report back.

18 MR. SCOTT: And for the record, if the  
19 commission needs to know anything else I would prefer  
20 just because of the sensitivity of this matter that,  
21 you know, I can convey it to you. We have a report.  
22 There's a report. You should have it with the office  
23 of the chief investigator, and you can look at.

24 MR. REED: Can I also add the reason I'm not  
25 satisfied with internal affairs and their investigation



1 is they never, they always denied me the right to go  
2 down and file a rightful report because I felt I was  
3 sexually assaulted. And my thing is I told them that.  
4 And they keep -- okay, but listen. Wait a minute.

5 CHIEF GODBEE: Mr. Reed, I don't want you --

6 MR. REED: Okay. I'm not going to go into  
7 that. But what I'm saying is they took twelve days to  
8 interview me.

9 CHIEF GODBEE: Mr. Reed, I'm going to have  
10 the report myself.

11 MR. SCOTT: We'll take care of it, okay. You  
12 can have a seat.

13 MR. REED: Thank you, very much.

14 MR. SCOTT: Thank you, Commissioners, for  
15 allowing me to do that.

16 MR. MOORE: Good afternoon, my name is Edward  
17 Moore. I am the liaison of the Honorable Kwame  
18 Kenyatta of the Detroit City Councilman. I want to say  
19 to the Board, to our Chief, to Detroit's finest, and to  
20 our families, the position of the Councilman, as long  
21 as the commissioners, our chief, our Detroit's finest,  
22 and our families stay within the law you got the  
23 support of the councilman.

24 I've said that before and I'm saying it  
25 again. To the chief, the Councilman is a team player.

1 You are the quarterback. Our CEO is our Mayor Dave  
2 Bing. Whatever position the councilman can be on the  
3 team because we got enough work for everyone to be on  
4 the team. His door is open. Thank you.

5 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, Mr. Moore.

6 MS. MORRIS: Good afternoon.

7 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Good afternoon.

8 MS. MORRIS: Chief Godbee. Tijuana Morris,  
9 Fight for Your Rights Investigations, and investigator  
10 for the Detroit Coalition Against Police Brutality.  
11 I'm looking forward to a much better year, a much safer  
12 year. And that this commission group has made major  
13 transformation for our city. I appreciate the fact  
14 that you stand up to your word. I especially know as a  
15 side observer about the towing situation. And it's  
16 been a progress in working. It's a good thing.

17 Like I said, most of the time we're up here  
18 and we got our guns up and we ready to go to battle.  
19 But I feel very confident. And also I had the pleasure  
20 of meeting with the Detroit 300 and they were very  
21 effective. And I would ask them, which they did,  
22 include women because I feel that they're trying and  
23 rightfully so trying to guard the masculinism in the  
24 community for them and training and teaching them how  
25 to stand up.

1 I visited the home that was burned out and my  
2 sincerities go out to the family. But it was  
3 effective. It was peaceful. And, you know, I'm an  
4 investigator. I'm coming and I'm going to see. What I  
5 saw was a good thing and if we can multiply that 300 in  
6 every community I believe we'll be moving forward.

7 Detroit is going to be all right. So far the sincere  
8 hurts that only I think real police officers have been  
9 through it know what sexual harassment is or whatever.

10 And I applaud like I said the commission and  
11 the board. When people have problems we bring them  
12 here. So I'm looking forward to working for a better  
13 community. Thank you.

14 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you,  
15 Ms. Morris.

16 MS. SMITH: Good afternoon. Bernice Smith, a  
17 member of the 300. I just want to let you know, chief,  
18 welcome back.

19 CHIEF GODBEE: Thank you, ma'am.

20 MS. SMITH: It's good seeing you again. Of  
21 course, the chief did a good job sitting in. So we  
22 don't have no complaints. He was good. I don't know  
23 whether most of you are aware of what has happened in  
24 regards to the chief. This is good news. It's not bad  
25 news. The chief made a report to the daily newspaper

1 in regards to crime increase and the decrease. I don't  
2 know whether you were aware of it or not. But I  
3 thought it was very informative. I didn't know whether  
4 you were going to be here. So you can carry on from  
5 where I'm leaving off. I want the audience to know  
6 that you have started something that has not been done  
7 since the seventies. When the former Mayor Kwame  
8 Kenyatta came into office he stopped it. In other  
9 words -- oh, I'm sorry. Kilpatrick. Excuse me. I'm  
10 going too fast.

11           Anyway, he stopped making the reports to the  
12 public. So I think it was a good idea for you to start  
13 it up again. In other words, crime blotter, is that  
14 what you call it?

15           CHIEF GODBEE: Yes, ma'am.

16           MS. SMITH: And I've taken some notes before  
17 I came and I wanted to let the audience know that crime  
18 has dropped. We're glad of that compared to what  
19 happened in 2009 and it was a decrease in 2010. Also,  
20 you'll give them the figures. I'm just giving a  
21 summary of it. And we need more of this. And now  
22 Angelo Henderson is doing reports in regards to the  
23 crime daily on his radio program.

24           So we're aware of two outlets to be given to  
25 the public. Not only you, and we have it on radio

1 also. So I think that's a good thing. And I want you  
2 to keep up the good work. But I do wish that we will  
3 consider each other and stop molesting, pulling out  
4 guns, and just doing things that are not necessary for  
5 human beings to be afraid to come out in the street.

6 A man was taking his groceries out of the car  
7 this week and he was assaulted taking his groceries.  
8 Can you imagine something like that? But I'm just  
9 saying these are reports that we need to know in the  
10 various neighborhoods where they're happening so we can  
11 be on our guard and not be aware of not happening in  
12 your neighborhood, in other words.

13 It can happen in your neighborhood. So let  
14 us all be diligent and be on our guard and figure out  
15 what we can do to stop the crime. And with you, Chief,  
16 at the head we're going to do all right I'm sure  
17 because you are very sincere in what you're doing. I  
18 truly believe that.

19 CHIEF GODBEE: Thank you.

20 MS. SMITH: And I hope that the Board takes  
21 into consideration that we are -- you're going to  
22 cooperate with the chief. I know you will do this and  
23 we won't be disappointed in what you're going to do.  
24 And keep up the good work about the towing because  
25 those people they need those jobs. Because I know it's

1 been messed up for the last ten years really. So I  
2 hope you do take care of that and get it taken care of.

3 Mr. Brown, am I through? I didn't look over  
4 there, but I just want to know if I'm through?

5 MR. BROWN: One more minute.

6 MS. SMITH: But anyway, Happy New Year to all  
7 of you and may you be blessed for the rest of the year.  
8 I know I'm blessed to be here, that's all I can say.  
9 Most of us haven't come along this far. So I'm just  
10 blessed to be here again and look forward to another  
11 year being with you. Take care.

12 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, Ms. Smith.  
13 Are there any other comments? Any other comments for  
14 the Board of Police Commissioners? Just one question  
15 to the Chief.

16 CHIEF GODBEE: Yes.

17 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: I know a couple years  
18 ago there was a system that was in place where  
19 residents can log in on a website and type in a zip  
20 code and be able to look at some statistics. Is that  
21 coming back online?

22 CHIEF GODBEE: No, that system is still in  
23 place.

24 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: It's still in place.

25 CHIEF GODBEE: What it allows you to do is

1 within I think the maximum of a 28-day period within a  
2 square mile of your home to see every crime that has  
3 happened within that square mile. That's just one  
4 tool. And what Ms. Smith was referring to, we used to  
5 release what's called a 24-hour major crime summary.  
6 It was routinely done. It was given to the media.

7 I thought it was very important from a  
8 transparency standpoint for us to set a tone that the  
9 mayor has set that we have nothing to hide and to arm  
10 our citizens with the appropriate information for us to  
11 substantively engage them in the conversation of  
12 community policing and asked them to trust us. It's  
13 counterintuitive not to trust them with the information  
14 that they need to give us information back.

15 So that information is available via the  
16 citizen observer which it will provide an email blast  
17 to community groups and individuals. And they'll get  
18 the same information that I get. There is some  
19 information that will be redacted because we don't want  
20 victims, witnesses or persons reporting offenses to  
21 inadvertently be targets of perpetrators.

22 But the perpetrator information, vehicle  
23 information, modus operandi, all those things I think  
24 they're critical to trust our citizens to have that  
25 information because for me it's a force multiplier to

1 have 700, 800,000 citizens armed with the information  
2 as opposed to us operating in a vacuum.

3 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you. Is there  
4 a way where citizens or community groups can sign up  
5 for that email blast?

6 CHIEF GODBEE: Yes, if they would call  
7 596-2200, that's our Office of Public Information.  
8 They are facilitating getting that information out.  
9 Then there's another important component for folks that  
10 need that information everyday, and that's my police  
11 officers. So it's on the internet also so they can  
12 access it more readily than it has been before.

13 So to be totally honest there are detractors  
14 who have a concern that by us giving the information  
15 out that the media is going to sensationalize it to  
16 make Detroit appear it's more violent than it is. But  
17 I think from a risk reward standpoint I think it's more  
18 important to gain the public's confidence to report  
19 crime to us.

20 And I'll fight that fight publicly with the  
21 Board's help if the media tries to pervert what we're  
22 trying to do.

23 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Excellent. We'll  
24 fight with you on that end. The 596-2200 is that the  
25 number --



1 CHIEF GODBEE: That's the number to the  
2 Office of Public Information, yes, sir.

3 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: For the website  
4 information, too?

5 CHIEF GODBEE: Yes, and the general website  
6 is [www.detroitmi.gov](http://www.detroitmi.gov), and then if you go to Departments  
7 and then go to Detroit Police Department it will  
8 instruct you how to sign up for citizen observer.

9 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Okay. Thank you,  
10 sir.

11 CHIEF GODBEE: Thank you.

12 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Are there any more  
13 comments for the Board of Police Commissioners? Any  
14 more public comments? That section of our agenda will  
15 be closed. At this time I want to turn the floor over  
16 to Commissioner Adela Rivera who wants to make some  
17 comments.

18 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: I just have a couple  
19 things. I got a call from Jane Garcia. D.C. Tolbert,  
20 she said that you promised to arrange a crime  
21 prevention seminar at the southwest meeting. Okay.  
22 News to you?

23 DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: I haven't had a chance  
24 to talk to her.

25 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: I'm sorry, could you

1 come to the podium, Deputy Chief, thank you, for the  
2 record.

3 DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: Deputy Chief James  
4 Tolbert. The crime prevention, I haven't have a chance  
5 to solidify, but that would go through Deputy Melvin  
6 Turner. So that's why I want to make sure that it goes  
7 through him. So I'm not arranging it. I'm just going  
8 to put her touch with the Deputy Chief.

9 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: Okay. Would you make  
10 sure that someone gives her a call back because she has  
11 called me about that a couple times.

12 DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: Yes, ma'am.

13 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: The other thing was  
14 I've been getting calls from the Southwest Community  
15 about their commander. And they seem to like one  
16 particular commander that they have right now and  
17 they'd like to keep them. I understand that you're  
18 going to be redeploying manpower in the near future.  
19 And they want to start a letter-writing campaign to  
20 keep the commander that they want to keep.

21 Rather than have them go through a futile  
22 effort if one of you would mind calling Jane Garcia and  
23 Mr. Cordova and explain to them how it works. Would  
24 you do that for me? Okay. I'll give you her number.  
25 Because I know we had another -- northeast wanted to

1 keep a commander, as well. It's hard when you get,  
2 like they were saying when you get a commander that  
3 responds to the community and they want to keep them  
4 that when we turn around and take them away it's hard  
5 for them to understand, you know, why we do that. Why  
6 you do it? I'm not taking that blame. Why you do it?  
7 But as long as someone explains to them.

8 CHIEF GODBEE: Yes, ma'am.

9 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: At least they'll know  
10 that we know we have heard them and we are getting back  
11 with them.

12 CHIEF GODBEE: And if I could address it for  
13 the benefit of those that are here in a very general  
14 sense. Due to some MERC decisions, Michigan Employment  
15 Relations Commission, we inherited a span of control  
16 issue that's not correct. We have fewer inspectors  
17 than we do commanders which is a subordinate rank. At  
18 any span of control as you go up the chain there should  
19 be fewer and fewer. So that's an anomaly we have to  
20 correct.

21 In correcting that we will not be able to  
22 leave all the commanders in place where they are at.  
23 Furthermore, as a matter to correct it through  
24 attrition I have not asked this commission to approve  
25 any elevations to the rank of commander. As they

1 vacate we're going to take those commander positions  
2 and translate them to inspector positions.

3 It helps with two things. It helps us right  
4 size the span of control, number one, and then number  
5 two, it's a savings of about \$10,000.00 per employee to  
6 have that subordinate rank. Once we have those persons  
7 in place we will be presenting a plan first of all to  
8 the deputy mayor for his review and approval, and then  
9 we will be addressing this Board as to how we propose  
10 to reconfigure the command staff to right size the span  
11 of the control.

12 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you, Chief.  
13 One final comment from myself if there's no others from  
14 the Board. I want to thank Deputy Chief Tolbert and  
15 your officers. There was a request that went out for a  
16 motorcade. And I have to say this because there was,  
17 we call them home goings or funeral last week that I  
18 happen to be a part of and the outpouring of the  
19 community was huge. And without your support from your  
20 division I think it could have lent itself to a  
21 dangerous situation.

22 And your men and women who showed up they  
23 were very professional. They were very efficient. And  
24 we got to our points of destination without any  
25 incident. I don't think that would have been the case

1 had not your men and women showed up. So I want to  
2 thank you and them for that outstanding show of work  
3 that they did. Thank you, sir.

4 Any other comments from our Board? At this  
5 time I'll entertain a motion to adjourn the meeting.

6 COMMISSIONER RIVERA: So moved.

7 COMMISSIONER REEVES: Second.

8 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: All those in favor?

9 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

10 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: See you next week,  
11 ladies and gentlemen.
