4 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Let me say good
5 afternoon to everyone, welcome you to the Board
6 of Police Commissioners meeting dated for
7 Thursday, June 21, 2012.

8 My name is Commissioner Donnell White.
9 I have the distinct pleasure was serving as
10 chairman for the Board of Police Commissioners.
11 Today I'm joined by my colleagues, to my right
12 Commissioner Jerome Warfield, Commissioner
13 Jessica Taylor and representing our staff
14 Executive Secretary to the Board Mr. George
15 Anthony.

16 Mr. Anthony, for the record, could you
17 please introduce our staff today.

18 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you, sir.
19 Present we have Lt. Tim Leach for the Office of
20 the Chief Investigator, Lt. Rodney Sizemore
21 representing Police Personnel; Mr. Robert Brown,
22 our office manager; Officer Dan Donakowski who is
23 recording our proceeding and Mr. Dale Rose from
24 Hanson Court Reporting Service.

25 That completes the introductions, sir.

1 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you,
2 Mr. Secretary. We certainly would like to note
3 the presence of our Chief, Chief Ralph Godbee.
4 Thank you for being with us.

5 CHIEF GODBEE: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

6 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Good to definitely
7 see you again. At this time I'm going to ask if
8 Commissioner Warfield will lead us in our
9 invocation.

10 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Can we bow for
11 a word of prayer.

12 (INVOCATION WAS GIVEN.)

13 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you
14 Commissioner Warfield. Colleagues, at this time
15 the Chair will entertain a motion for the
16 approval of the agenda dated Thursday, June 21,
17 2012.

18 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: So moved.

19 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Second.

20 COMMISSIONER WHITE: It's been properly
21 moved and supported. Any discussion? Seeing
22 none, all those in favor?

23 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

24 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Opposed? Thank
25 you very much. Colleagues, at this time the

1 Chair will entertain a motion for the approval of
2 the minutes dated Thursday, June 7, 2012.

3 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: So moved.

4 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Second.

5 COMMISSIONER WHITE: It's been properly
6 moved and supported. Any discussion? Seeing
7 none, all those in favor?

8 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

9 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Opposed? Thank
10 you very much. Mr. Secretary, a point of
11 clarification, for the minutes was there a need
12 to approve minutes for June 14?

13 SECRETARY ANTHONY: For the record,
14 George Anthony, Secretary to the Board. No, it's
15 my understanding that because there was no agenda
16 -- or no quorum present there's no need to
17 approve them.

18 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Okay, so if we can
19 let the record reflect that minutes for June 14
20 will not be voted upon by the Board for the lack
21 of quorum on that date.

22 There is no official Chairperson's
23 report today. Mr. Secretary, is there a report
24 from the office of the Executive Secretary?

25 SECRETARY ANTHONY: No, sir, that

1 report will be next week.

2 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you,
3 Mr. Secretary. At this time we'll move for a
4 report from our Chief of Police, Chief Ralph
5 Godbee.

6 CHIEF GODBEE: Thank you, Mr. Chair.
7 Today on our schedule we have a presentation by
8 our Forfeiture Section. Commander John Serda, if
9 you want to come forward I guess to tee it up and
10 then he'll take it from there.

11 COMMANDER SERDA: Good afternoon,
12 Commissioners, the Chief, citizens. My name is
13 Commander John Serda from Management Services
14 Bureau. One of the many units under our umbrella
15 is the Forfeiture Section so I'm going to do a
16 brief presentation and I do have some of our
17 subject matter experts here, Sgt. Collins and
18 Officer Johnson who will assist me.

19 First of all, forfeiture funds are of
20 two types. There's the federal forfeiture fund
21 and then you have the state and that's also
22 considered the local forfeiture fund.

23 The federal forfeiture fund are
24 forfeited property or monies shared with local
25 agencies with the federal government.

1 And the way that happens generally is
2 through our task force participation. In other
3 words, we have officers assigned to several
4 direct federal task forces and when they seize
5 funds or property under federal mandate that can
6 be shared with the local agency that
7 participated.

8 Under our state and local forfeiture
9 funds those funds are gathered through
10 cooperation with the Wayne County Prosecutor's
11 Office through our department's enforcement
12 efforts through narcotics raids sometimes called
13 push-offs and street arrests that have a
14 narcotics nexus.

15 For our federal fund we have the manual
16 -- then your Powerpoint if you have that -- and
17 it looks like this. This is kind of our guide to
18 how we process and distribute federal forfeiture
19 funds.

20 So what can they be expended on? We're
21 talking about federal forfeiture fund. They can
22 be expended on activities calculated to enhance
23 future investigations, law enforcement training,
24 equipment and operating expenses -- I'm sorry,
25 detention facilities which can be construction or

1 operation costs, law enforcement facilities and
2 equipment, drug education and awareness, pro-rata
3 funding, asset accounting and tracking and law
4 enforcement travel and transportation.

5 Some impermissible uses -- and again
6 we're talking about federal forfeiture funds, are
7 payment of salaries for existing positions, uses
8 of forfeited property by non-law enforcement
9 personnel, payment of non-law enforcement
10 expenses, uses not specified in the DAG-71.
11 Again, that's the manual that I showed you, and
12 uses contrary to the laws of the local or state
13 jurisdiction and non-official government use,
14 i.e., political or personal uses and extravagant
15 expenses.

16 Some of the things we have used federal
17 forfeiture funds on are travel and training, our
18 Explorer Program, surveillance cameras, copiers,
19 computers and printers, our gun buy-back program,
20 money counters for our Property Room, flashlights
21 and flashlight holders, operating supplies,
22 equipment, point-of-sale cashier system,
23 billboard signs for tips, cellblock painting and
24 PR-24s which are defensive batons.

25 State uses, the state use of forfeiture

1 funds has been dramatically changed by statute to
2 relax the requirements so that they can be
3 basically used for any kind of law enforcement
4 purposes.

5 Our internal and external review of the
6 funds. All expenditures are subject to prior
7 review by the Chief of Police or his designee so
8 the Chief makes the final call on how any of
9 these funds are expended.

10 And they're all subject to audit
11 through federal auditing, our Auditor General's
12 office for the City of Detroit and our Internal
13 Affairs also audits these funds.

14 Again, the sources of the funds are
15 local narcotics raids and enforcement and for
16 federal it's all partnerships through the DAG-71.
17 The basic process is for a person that is
18 arrested if there's a narcotic nexus there can be
19 a seizure of funds or property. There is an
20 administrative court proceeding and the owner has
21 21 days -- they're informed they have 21 days to
22 file to retrieve their property through this
23 court process and if they fail to do that, then
24 that property is forfeited.

25 Our current balances and we're talking

1 about as of May, 2012, are \$80,000 in federal
2 forfeiture funds, and \$3 million in local
3 forfeiture funds. Any questions?

4 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you,
5 Commander Serta. Commissioner Warfield, any
6 questions?

7 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you,
8 Mr. Chair; just a few. The Shot Stopper Program,
9 could these funds be used for that first of all,
10 and then second of all if so -- and you've got to
11 refresh my memory, I'm sorry, if that is what the
12 City Council deemed that we could not use the
13 funds for?

14 COMMANDER SERDA: I wasn't --

15 CHIEF GODBEE: Through the Chair,
16 Commissioner, you're absolutely right. We were
17 going to fund the Shot Spotter Program portion
18 which was through a JAG grant and the other
19 portion was federal forfeiture funds, but because
20 of the amount of the contract regardless of where
21 the pool of money comes from, it still has to be
22 approved by City Council, and they did not
23 approve the expenditure.

24 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Also about
25 overtime, I heard on radio this week that for

1 other agencies who may be helping with the
2 fireworks that we're using some of those funds to
3 help fund them or some grant.

4 Is it these funds or different grant
5 that we're using to help fund them helping out
6 with security?

7 CHIEF GODBEE: Again, through the
8 Chair, that's a different -- it's the JAG grant
9 we were able to get an adjustment on and JAG is
10 an acronym for Justice Assistance Grants that
11 come from the federal government. We get a
12 draw-down from the County who's the fiduciary
13 over the pot of money.

14 So a portion of what we were going to
15 utilize for Shot Spotter we asked for an
16 adjustment in a grant to compensate the outside
17 agencies that are assisting us with the
18 fireworks.

19 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Okay, great.
20 Thank you, sir; thank you, Mr. Chair.

21 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you.
22 Commissioner Taylor, any questions?

23 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: No questions.

24 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Commander, I just
25 have two questions. The amounts that are shown

1 here, is that Detroit's share or is that what was
2 totally seized?

3 COMMANDER SERDA: No, what's currently
4 the balance.

5 COMMISSIONER WHITE: In the accounts?

6 COMMANDER SERDA: Yes.

7 COMMISSIONER WHITE: And you also
8 referenced a number of audits that are
9 transpired. Is there an audit available for
10 2011?

11 COMMANDER SERDA: Yes, I'm sure there
12 is, yes.

13 COMMISSIONER WHITE: And if so, if you
14 could just share that with this Board it would be
15 greatly appreciated.

16 COMMANDER SERDA: Okay.

17 Chief GODBEE: And also through the
18 Chair, those audits are on the City's website in
19 PDF format. If you go through the Auditor
20 General every audit they do, our towing
21 processes, forfeiture reconciliation, those
22 audits are also on the website.

23 And again, if I can say also so very
24 quickly, the balances may not be reflective also
25 of what's in the pipeline, so there have been

1 seizures that we have made that are going through
2 the civil process and it could take up to 18
3 months before we're actually awarded a civil
4 judgment that says that the City will get the
5 money.

6 So we do have something in pipeline so
7 you'll see some of these major seizures on
8 television, but they don't just automatically go
9 into just the account. There's a process that it
10 has to go through.

11 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Sure. Chief, you
12 said those audits were on in the City's website.

13 CHIEF GODBEE: Yes, City of Detroit
14 website. Auditor General, then their most recent
15 audits are in PDF format on the City's website.

16 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, sir.
17 Thank you, Commander.

18 Anything further, Chief?

19 CHIEF GODBEE: No, sir. And thank you,
20 Commander Serta.

21 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Chief, I would ask
22 for the benefit of those who are here and
23 certainly for the benefit of the Board if you
24 could articulate -- I believe there was a press
25 conference today about a new investigations

1 strategy?

2 CHIEF GODBEE: Yes. What we're doing
3 is we're centralizing our Investigative
4 Operations Unit. We have found that if you go
5 over the course of six districts with about five
6 or six district buildings you have administrative
7 staff for each of those investigative entities,
8 we just don't have the personnel any more and we
9 don't have the opportunity to promote anytime in
10 the near future, so it was recommended and was
11 presented to me by Deputy Chief Paul Wells and
12 Commander Ennis was a construct where we
13 centralized and we start to leverage that and get
14 rid of a lot of the administrative folks.

15 So by doing that, we're able to
16 increase our capacity for what we call detectives
17 in the pits, people that can actually take an
18 investigative task, so it increases our
19 efficiency. It is a different construct, but if
20 you look across the country people are
21 centralized, they're decentralized.

22 But for purposes of our IOU we found
23 that doing some analysis centralization for our
24 investigative entity was the best course of
25 action for a couple of reasons.

1 If I look at balancing the workload
2 across the city, some IOUs or Investigative
3 Operations Units, have lower caseloads than
4 others, and absent them being centralized and us
5 doing something to remarkably move those folks
6 back and forth, there is not a balance of the
7 caseload.

8 By this group being centralized and
9 then adding some different efficiencies, Number 1
10 we're going to get longer coverage during the day
11 and we're going to get more people that are
12 actually doing investigative work.

13 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, Chief.
14 At this time under standing committee reports
15 colleagues, I do have a resolution that I would
16 like to read in for adoption and this is a
17 resolution as it pertains to the Chief
18 Investigator appointment.

19 Whereas, the Charter for the City of
20 Detroit was ordained and established by the
21 citizens of Detroit for the governance of The
22 City; and

23 Whereas, the Charter established the
24 Board of Police Commissioners (Board) to exercise
25 supervisory control and authority over the

1 Detroit Police Department; and

2 Whereas, the Board is required by
3 Charter in Section 7-804 to appoint a Chief
4 Investigator to manage the operations of the
5 Office of the Chief Investigator (OCI), the
6 Board's investigative staff; and

7 Whereas, the Chief Investigator's
8 position is currently vacant; and

9 Whereas, the Board conducted a
10 nationwide search for qualified applicants and
11 has interviewed a number of individuals for the
12 Chief Investigator's position; and

13 Whereas through the interview process
14 and background investigation the Board determined
15 that Ms. Pamela L. Davis-Drake best demonstrates
16 the skills and experience necessary to assume the
17 position; and

18 Whereas Ms. Davis-Drake has not been an
19 employee or elective or appointive officer of the
20 City of Detroit within three years prior to this
21 appointment; and

22 Whereas, the Board desires to fill the
23 position of Chief Investigator for the OCI by
24 appointing Ms. Davis-Drake as Chief Investigator
25 at a salary appropriate for that appointment.

1 Now, therefore be it resolved that the
2 Board appoints Ms. Pamela L. Davis-Drake to the
3 position of Chief Investigator for the OCI this
4 date, June 21, 2012.

5 Is there a motion in that order?

6 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Sir, I move to
7 adopt the resolution.

8 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Support.

9 COMMISSIONER WHITE: It's been properly
10 moved and supported. Any discussion? Seeing
11 none, all those in favor?

12 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

13 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Opposed? Thank
14 you very much. I don't believe we have any new
15 business before us.

16 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Yes, sir. Just
17 one item. It's come to my attention that I think
18 the Southwest District is about to branch off and
19 split into two precincts and so for towing
20 processes, I think we need to discuss if we keep
21 the same for right row the rotation in place
22 right now and we can address splitting up the
23 district later after we have completed doing the
24 rules, but I got a couple of calls on that this
25 week.

1 COMMISSIONER WHITE: So Commissioner,
2 do you have questions you want to impose or --

3 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Just through
4 the Chair to the Chief, what is the actual timing
5 of the splitting off of the two precincts and are
6 they going to be in separate buildings or is it
7 going to be like 6 and 8?

8 CHIEF GODBEE: No, they're going to be
9 in separate buildings. The Southwest District
10 will essentially just be the 4th Precinct and the
11 Schaefer Station will be the reinstated 2nd
12 Precinct.

13 Operationally initially it should not
14 have any effect on the towing rotation because it
15 is still the Southwest District which will be
16 headed by a commander, so from that standpoint
17 operationally there should not be a difference on
18 the ground.

19 Structurally from a deployment
20 standpoint that's going to be the real how the
21 rubber meets the road is having two separate
22 distinct buildings.

23 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Through the
24 Chair again to the Chief. Would it be okay or
25 would you advise that we just for right now keep

1 that rotation in that particular Southwest
2 District --

3 CHIEF GODBEE: Yes, sir.

4 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: -- as is until
5 we're able to sort out the rules?

6 CHIEF GODBEE: Absolutely. I think
7 that would be appropriate, sir.

8 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Okay, thank
9 you. Thank you, Mr. Chair.

10 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you,
11 Commissioner. Any other new business? Seeing
12 none, under old business we have two grants and
13 one resolution that I would like to have read
14 into the record and I would ask if Commissioner
15 Taylor would lead us in the reading of the grant
16 to request to apply for the data driven
17 approaches to crime and traffic safety, Byrne
18 Justice Assistance Grant, fiscal year 2013
19 program for the Michigan State Police.

20 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: The Michigan
21 State Police is accepting applications for the
22 high-crime cities prosecution efforts Byrne
23 Justice Assistance Grant for fiscal year 2013.

24 The Detroit Police Department is
25 eligible to apply for \$250,000 with no cash

1 match. Within the application applicants must
2 identify and support with data specifically
3 identified problems that are impeding
4 prosecutorial resources needed to reduce the
5 violent crime rate within their jurisdiction.

6 All projects must address current
7 proactive violence reduction activities within
8 their community and outline how this funding
9 request will assist in achieving the reduction of
10 violence.

11 Additionally, this program is designed
12 to provide support to the prosecuting attorneys.
13 Prosecution plays a vital role in community
14 restoration. Increased police resources must be
15 supported by increased prosecution services.

16 Multiagency task forces to reduce
17 violence need additional prosecutorial assistance
18 with legal support, criminal enterprise case
19 management and witness statements and protection.

20 Business and community partnerships
21 require the assistance of the Prosecutor's Office
22 for long term problem solving initiatives.

23 Therefore, within this proposal DPD
24 will partner with the Wayne County Prosecutor's
25 Office to develop a data driven program in the

1 Eastern and Northeastern District areas. A
2 strategy to reduce violent offenses will be
3 implemented in conjunction with the police, task
4 forces, courts and community partners.

5 If awarded, the grant period will run
6 from October 1, 2012 through September 30, 2013.
7 In the event that approval is granted to apply
8 and the award is received Lt. Harold Rochon of
9 Narcotics would serve as the project director.

10 The deadline for this application is
11 June 26, 2012. I am requesting the Board's
12 permission to apply for this funding and seek
13 approval of the Honorable Detroit City Council.

14 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you,
15 Commissioner Taylor. Colleagues, before us is
16 the request to apply for the high-crime cities
17 prosecution efforts Byrne Justice Assistance
18 Grant for fiscal year 2013 program from the
19 Michigan State Police.

20 What is your pleasure?

21 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Sir, I move
22 that we grant the request of the department
23 concerning this grant.

24 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Support.

25 COMMISSIONER WHITE: It's properly

1 moved and supported. Any discussion? Seeing
2 none, all those in favor.

3 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

4 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Opposed? Thank
5 you very much. Commissioner Taylor, I would also
6 ask if you would lead us in the reading of the
7 request to apply for the data driven approaches
8 to crime and traffic safety, the Byrne Justice
9 Assistance Grant for fiscal year 2013 program
10 from the Michigan State Police, please.

11 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: The Michigan
12 State Police is accepting applications for the
13 data driven approaches to crime and traffic
14 safety, Byrne Justice Assistance Grant for fiscal
15 year 2013. The Detroit Police Department is
16 eligible to apply for \$50,000 with a 10 percent
17 match. The match will come in the form of
18 officer's time devoted towards the project.

19 DDACTS integrates location-based crime
20 and traffic crash data to establish effective and
21 efficient methods for developing law enforcement
22 and other resources. Using geo-mapping to
23 identify areas through temporal and spatial
24 analysis that has high incidents of crime and
25 crashes. DDACTS employs targeted traffic

1 enforcement strategies. By saturation locations
2 of high crime and crash incidences rates with
3 highly visible traffic enforcement, DDACTS
4 communities play a simultaneous dual role,
5 fighting crime and reducing traffic crashes and
6 traffic violations. Drawing on the deterrent
7 value of highly visible law enforcement presence
8 through increased patrol and the knowledge that
9 crimes often involve the use of motor vehicles,
10 the goal of the DDACTS is to reduce the incidence
11 of crime, crashes and traffic violations in
12 Michigan communities.

13 The model's focus on collaboration with
14 law enforcement, community members and
15 organizations reinforce the crucial role that
16 partnerships play in reducing social harm and
17 improving quality of life. Building on this
18 collaboration DDACTS positions traffic
19 enforcement as a logical rationale for a highly
20 visible law enforcement presence in a community.
21 Within this proposal DPD will partner with Wayne
22 State University to develop a program that fits
23 the grant guidelines.

24 If awarded, the grant period would run
25 from October 1, 2012 through September 30, 2013.

1 In the event that approval is granted to apply
2 and the award is received, Sgt. Opa F. Craighead
3 of Traffic Enforcement will serve as the project
4 director. The deadline for this application is
5 June 26, 2012.

6 I am requesting the Board's permission
7 to apply for this funding and seek approval of
8 the Honorable Detroit City Council.

9 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you,
10 Commissioner Taylor. Colleagues, as relates to
11 the request to apply for the data driven
12 approaches to crime and traffic safety Byrne
13 Justice Assistance Grant for fiscal year 2013
14 program from the Michigan State Police what is
15 your pleasure?

16 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Sir, I move
17 that we grant permission to apply -- for the
18 department to apply for the funding as outlined
19 in the reading of the grant.

20 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Support.

21 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Properly moved and
22 supported. Any discussion? Seeing none, all
23 those in favor?

24 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

25 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Opposed? Thank

1 you very much. Commissioner Warfield, I would
2 ask if you would lead us in the resolution
3 honoring Mr. Arthur Simons.

4 It's been brought to my attention it's
5 already been read into the record, so we would
6 just move for adoption.

7 If you would, please, read the first
8 whereas and the resolved clause.

9 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Thank you,
10 Mr. Chair.

11 Whereas, Mr. Arthur Simons is a proud
12 lifelong resident of the City of Detroit who
13 resides within the Southwestern District
14 Mr. Simons is a member of Detroit Unity Temple
15 where his life is enriched with Christian
16 teaching.

17 Now, therefore be it resolved that the
18 Detroit Board of Police Commissioners speaking on
19 behalf of the citizens of the City of Detroit and
20 the Detroit Police Department acknowledge the
21 dedication and persistence of Mr. Arthur Simons,
22 his highly displayed commitment to community
23 service and his ability to build sustainable
24 community partnerships merit our highest regards.

25 And this is signed by all of the

1 members of the Board of Police Commissioners.

2 Sir, I move for the adoption of this
3 resolution.

4 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Support.

5 COMMISSIONER WHITE: It's properly
6 moved and supported for the resolution honoring
7 Mr. Arthur Simons. Colleagues, what is your
8 pleasure.

9 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: Sir, I move
10 that the resolution be adopted and that it will
11 be a part of our permanent archives.

12 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Support.

13 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Properly moved and
14 supported. All those in favor signal by saying
15 "aye"?

16 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

17 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Opposed? Thank
18 you very much. Colleagues, before us on our old
19 business is a motion that we said we would deal
20 with as relates to towing.

21 For the benefit of those who are with
22 us today, members of this body as well as the
23 City and the department have been served with a
24 temporary restraining order from dealing with
25 this issue, so I would ask that this issue be

1 tabled until such time as it can be properly
2 disposed of in this meeting.

3 Under announcements, please be advised
4 that the next meeting will be held Thursday, June
5 28 at 3 PM at police headquarters, 1300 Beaubien,
6 Room 328-A and, again, that's Thursday, June 28,
7 2012 at 3 PM.

8 At this time the Board will move for
9 oral communications from the audience. If you
10 wish to address the Board of Police
11 Commissioners, we would ask that you come
12 forward, clearly state your first and last name
13 and please spell it for the benefit of the record
14 and be mindful of the two minutes allotted as
15 displayed by our office manager, Mr. Robert
16 Brown.

17 Are there any communications? Any
18 communications? Good afternoon.

19 MR. MOORE: To the Commissioners, to
20 our Chief, Detroit's finest my name is Edward
21 Moore. I am the liaison of the Honorable Kwame
22 Kenyatta, our Detroit City Councilman.

23 For those who have heard, one of the
24 volunteers of Detroit 300 has fallen, he was
25 killed this week. I'm not going to go into too

1 many details because I'm saddened today because I
2 knew him personally and him and others had tried
3 so much to make a difference in our city.

4 The position of the Councilman which I
5 said time and time again as long as the Detroit
6 300 stays within the laws, federal, state and
7 city, the Councilman Kenyatta stands with Detroit
8 300. Thank you.

9 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you.

10 MS. SEMMA: Julie Semma from 7 D's
11 Towing. Just a couple of weeks ago I had asked a
12 question, you guys we're going to check into it.
13 Whatever happened to the finalization of the
14 towing rules and putting those in place because I
15 went back and looked in my notes and it's been
16 over three months now.

17 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Is that your last
18 question?

19 MS. SEMMA: That's the only question I
20 have.

21 COMMISSIONER WHITE: I believe it was
22 maybe three weeks ago where we stated our
23 anticipation was to dispose of that process
24 before month's end, so we are still in the
25 process of finalizing that.

1 However, there are some implications as
2 of late that may prevent us from having some of
3 those discussions, so it is very much likely at
4 our next meeting Thursday, the 28th of June,
5 we'll have further discussion to finalizing that
6 conversation.

7 MS. SEMMA: Thank you:

8 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Any other
9 communications? Any other communications? Any
10 other communications?

11 Seeing none, again please be reminded
12 the next Board of Police Commissioners meeting
13 will be Thursday, June 28 at 3 PM at police
14 headquarters.

15 At this time there's no further
16 business before us and a motion for adjournment
17 is in order.

18 COMMISSIONER WARFIELD: So moved.

19 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Second.

20 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Properly moved and
21 supported. Any discussion? Seeing none, all
22 those in favor?

23 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

24 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Opposed? Have a
25 wonderful weekend.
