4 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Good evening, ladies and
5 gentlemen.

6 AUDIENCE: Good evening.

7 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: My name is Jerome
8 Warfield, Chairman of the Board of Police
9 Commissioners. Serving me with this moment is also the
10 Vice Chair for the Police Commission, Vice Chairperson
11 Jessica Taylor. We also have sitting in on behalf of
12 the Chief's Office, Deputy Chief Tolbert. Sir, good to
13 see you. We also have Mr. George Anthony who is the
14 Board Secretary for our office.

15 I'm going to ask him if he could introduce
16 our staff at this particular time.

17 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you, Mr. Chair.
18 For the record George Anthony, Secretary to the Board.
19 We have present with us Lieutenant Loletha Porter
20 Coleman who is heading our Personnel Division. We have
21 just entering, our Attorney to the Board, Ms. Celia
22 Banks Washington, as well as our Chief Investigator
23 Ms. Pamela Davis Drake.

24 We have also recording our proceedings
25 Officer Dan Donakowski, Sergeant Alan Quinn,

1 Ms. Elizabeth Koller from Hanson Court Reporting
2 Service, and Mr. Robert Brown, our Office Manager. And
3 that completes the introductions.

4 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, Mr. Anthony.
5 At this time I'm going to ask if Pastor James Powell
6 could come up. He's Chaplain for the Detroit Police
7 Department, and lead us in our invocation for tonight.
8 Good to see you, Pastor.

9 PASTOR POWELL: Good to see you. God bless
10 you. Let us look to the Lord. Lord, God of Grace, in
11 the name of Jesus, we thank and praise you for your
12 keeping power and your blessing power.

13 Lord, as we draw our minds together we ask
14 you, Lord God, just to look upon us and bless us. Look
15 down upon this meeting, Lord God, help us to bring our
16 minds together, Lord God, and help us to be on one
17 accord.

18 Lord, I ask you to look down upon our Mayor.
19 Look down upon our Chief and his staff. Look down upon
20 this Commission Board. I ask you just to bless each
21 and every Officer that is on streets that is protecting
22 our life.

23 Lord, we ask you, Lord God, just to look down
24 upon the family of the Officer that was slain in
25 Bloomfield Hills. We ask you, Lord, just to bless his

1 family, bless that department. Let your blessings be
2 upon on them, Lord God, and strengthen them in Jesus'
3 name. Lord, we ask you to look down upon us and help
4 us to do your will.

5 Bless each and everyone of us in here, Lord
6 God, to know you and know your power. We thank you,
7 Lord. In Jesus' name. Amen.

8 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Amen. Thank you,
9 Chaplain. I want to say how happy and delighted we are
10 to be here at the Boy Scouts of America. I don't know
11 if we have a representative from Boy Scouts of American
12 here in the room tonight?

13 Could you come to the mic and just give us a
14 little information about the building and structure and
15 how long you've been here? And this is just a
16 wonderful facility. And most of the men in the
17 audience have been in Boy Scouts at one time. I know I
18 have and it was a great experience.

19 I'm sorry, your name?

20 MR. GRIFFN: William Griffn. I'm going to
21 forego this.

22 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: For our reporters, sorry.

23 MR. GRIFFN: All right. I will use it then.
24 I'm William Griffen. I'm the district executive that
25 covers the City of Detroit as well as all the Explorer

1 Programs in Wayne, Oakland, and Macomb counties.

2 So welcome to the center tonight. This
3 building has been here for getting close to fifteen
4 years now. It was funded largely by Dick Dauch and his
5 wife Sandy from American Axle.

6 We here at this council cover all again,
7 Wayne, Oakland, and Macomb counties. We have a good
8 relationship here with my friend Lieutenant Terry
9 Herbert. So he gave me a call and asked if we could
10 particularly host you guys tonight and we were
11 certainly happy to do so. So welcome and hope you guys
12 have a wonderful meeting this evening. Thank you.

13 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Mr. Griffn, one quick
14 question just for those who may be present. If someone
15 is interested in starting or wanting to start a Boy
16 Scout Troop how would they go about contacting someone
17 to get that moving?

18 MR. GRIFFN: Sure. I'm your man. If you're
19 from the City of Detroit you would call William
20 Griffn. That number is going to be area code (313)
21 361-1287. So you call me if you're anywhere in the
22 cities of Detroit, Allen Park, Hamtramck, Hazel Park,
23 Southfield, Oak Park or Ferndale, I will be the one to
24 help you.

25 If you're in any other city in the tri-county

1 area I will put you in contact with the person that you
2 need to talk to.

3 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, Mr. Griffn,
4 appreciate it. Thank you. Again that number for
5 Mr. Griffn is (313) 361-1287.

6 For those of you who this may be your first
7 time to a Board of Police Commissioners Meeting, I just
8 want to give you a little background of who we are and
9 why we are. We were created by the Detroit City
10 Charter in 1974. We are a five member board soon to
11 expand to eleven.

12 We are appointees of the Mayor of the City of
13 Detroit and confirmed by the Detroit City Council. We
14 meet 52 weeks out of the year. Our term is five years
15 and not to exceed five years. All of our meetings are
16 open to the public. Our duties are to establish the
17 policies the rules and the regulations in consultation
18 with the Chief of Police and with the Mayor and the
19 Detroit Police Department.

20 We also are to review and approve the
21 Department's budget as well as review and approve all
22 of the Department's promotions. We also receive and
23 resolve complaints concerning the operation of the
24 Police Department. We have the final authority to
25 impose and/or review discipline of the Police

1 Department Employees.

2 We appoint a Civilian Personnel Director. We
3 prepare an annual budget -- I'm sorry, annual report of
4 the Department as relates to our activities for the
5 public, the Mayor and the City Council.

6 Our staff includes an Executive Secretary who
7 you met earlier, Mr. George Anthony to the Board. Our
8 Executive Secretary does attends all of our meetings.
9 We do also have a Chief Investigator who investigates
10 the complaints that the citizens have maybe against the
11 Department. We also have other staff as necessary to
12 provided support for the Board.

13 And certainly it's always good to have new
14 faces at our meetings. I'm going to ask just a point
15 of privilege right now, Mr. Anthony, would you
16 introduce your special guests tonight? I see some good
17 faces. I just want to give them recognition.

18 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you, Mr. Chair.
19 I'd just like to introduce my students from Wayne
20 County Community College LEA Law Enforcement Class 231
21 Wayne County. Why don't you stand up and just be
22 recognized?

23 (Applause.)

24 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Do they get an A for
25 coming? We'll work on it. We are short one member of

1 the quorum, so we will come back to our voting matters
2 and vote in a moment. Also Attorney Washington,
3 Attorney to the Board, your class is here, as well.
4 Could you recognize them and come to the mic and just
5 recognize them for us, as well?

6 ATTORNEY WASHINGTON: Thank you, Mr. Chair.
7 My Legal Research and Writing Class from the University
8 of Detroit Mercy is here. If they could stand, a
9 portion of them.

10 (Applause.)

11 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Excellent, excellent,
12 forming and shaping young minds in the legal field,
13 criminal justice field, just wonderful. Good to have
14 all of you here again.

15 Again, as I just mentioned we will actually
16 come back and handle our voting procedures and our
17 voting items on our agenda shortly after Commissioner
18 White is here. He is on his way.

19 At this time I do want to go to the Chief's
20 Office and ask Deputy Chief Tolbert for an update as
21 relates to the Central District.

22 D.C. TOLBERT: Thank you, sir. Today we have
23 Commander James White to address the Board.

24 COMMANDER WHITE: Good evening, Board.

25 COMMISSIONERS: Good evening.

1 COMMANDER WHITE: Guests. Welcome to the
2 Central District. I'm going to be giving a very brief
3 presentation on the Central District in just a moment
4 and I invite my Lieutenant to join me in the hot seat
5 here.

6 Lieutenant Gargalino and myself are recently
7 appointed to the Central District. We're assigned to
8 the Central District. It's been an absolute privilege
9 to serve there since we've been assigned and we've
10 actually made a lot of gains and had a lot of
11 compliments.

12 We're just going to highlight very briefly
13 some of things that are going at on at the Central
14 District. Inspector Houser is in charge of our Gaming
15 Operations. She had a family matter that she needed to
16 attend to tonight. She wanted to be here, but I pretty
17 much ordered her to stay away and deal with that family
18 matter.

19 Okay. The Central District Management Team
20 consists of Deputy Chief Benjamin Lee, myself,
21 Commander James White, Inspector Houser as I mentioned
22 earlier who is responsible for our Gaming Operations
23 and our Central Events, Lieutenant Gargalino, our
24 Commanding Officer is in charge of the 1st Precinct and
25 the 13th Precinct.

1 The Central District encompasses roughly
2 eleven square miles. The population is roughly
3 100,000. We get a lot of business traffic Monday
4 through Friday, so give or take.

5 The Central District is comprised of the 1st
6 and 13th Precinct and is located, the physical building
7 is at 7310 Woodward. Gaming Operations is also housed
8 at 7310 Woodward and recently Central Investigation is
9 housed there also. Central Events base, however, is
10 located at 20 Atwater.

11 The Central District is bounded on the north
12 by Woodland boarding Highland Park, it's bounded on the
13 east by Saint Aubin and Chrysler Service Drive, on the
14 west it's bounded by the J.C. Lodge and West Grand
15 Boulevard, the south is bounded by Michigan Avenue and
16 14th to East Atwater. So as you can see that's a
17 pretty large patrol area.

18 We're responsible for a lot of things. As I
19 indicated earlier we have the Boston Edison District.
20 Obviously we have a lot of the things that are going on
21 Downtown at Joe Louis Arena, Comerica Park, Cobo Hall,
22 Greektown.

23 We have Wayne State University. We enjoy an
24 excellent working relationship with Wayne State
25 University. They assist us in just a number of

1 different enforcement strategies. Wayne County
2 Community College is also in our district. Ford Field.
3 And obviously most importantly our residents and
4 residential homes.

5 Central Events provides community service and
6 security for a thriving sports and entertainment
7 industry. This includes 81 home Tiger games, which
8 will probably be only 81 home Tiger games this year
9 unfortunately, fifty home Detroit Red Wings games and
10 ten home Detroit Lions games.

11 With the resurgence of the Downtown Detroit
12 area we handle a number of festivals, events, sporting
13 events, parades. The River Walk District is also the
14 home of three casinos, Greektown, MGM, and Motor City.
15 An estimated 100 to 150,000 people visit each casino
16 weekly.

17 In addition to all the activities Downtown,
18 the district has a large residential community and it's
19 thriving. There are a lot of condos and things like
20 that that are being built.

21 We have a lot of established foot patrols
22 with the assistance of Lieutenant Gargalino and prior
23 to him Retired Commander Williams and Inspector
24 Fitzgerald. They put together a lot of old school foot
25 beat for the City Officers walking up and down the

1 street. And that's been very impactful helping us to
2 eradicate a larceny problem that we were having
3 Downtown.

4 Most recently we realized an approximate six
5 percent reduction in larcenies which is very
6 significant for us seeing that we haven't had a
7 reduction in a number of years.

8 The foot patrols right now concentrate on
9 Harmony Park, Capital Park, New Center area, Greektown,
10 our financial district, Campus Martius and those areas.
11 It's a fluid process. We look at the statistical data
12 and we make a determination on how we want to deploy.
13 Right now we're keeping them, but they're subject to
14 change.

15 We partner with the Midtown Neighborhood
16 Block Club. It's a corporate block club that meets
17 biweekly and discusses strategies to further enhance
18 public safety. As I indicated earlier our
19 relationships with neighborhood agencies, we
20 participate with the Wayne State University Police with
21 that, the Midtown Group, Wayne State Urban Studies
22 Program, and the Michigan Department of Corrections as
23 well as Focus Hope.

24 We enjoy a number of community partnerships.
25 Our Community Relations Officers work diligently and

1 tirelessly for us. At the low level they distribute
2 crime alert bulletins, safety reports, tips provided to
3 block clubs at block club meetings, security surveys
4 for homeowners and business, and use safety programs.

5 They also put together programs such as where
6 we are today. In fact, I like to thank Sergeant Travis
7 and his staff. I don't know where they're at, but
8 Officer Foxhall and Officer Dorsey for assisting us in
9 putting this program together here today.

10 With that, as I said, it was a very brief
11 presentation. Are there any questions?

12 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Just a couple. If
13 someone, a resident wanted to get ahold of the
14 Community Relations Office at Central District what
15 number can they call?

16 COMMANDER WHITE: 596-5114.

17 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: That number for those of
18 you who were taking it down, 596-5114. Is that the
19 number they would call if they are interested in trying
20 to form a block club?

21 COMMANDER WHITE: Yes, sir.

22 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you so very much.

23 COMMANDER WHITE: Thank you, very much, sir.

24 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you. At this time
25 for the record we want to acknowledge Commissioner

1 White, Donnell White, who is fresh from the Democratic
2 Convention. Amen. I saw him on TV raising the flag
3 representing Detroit well.

4 At this time we're going to -- Chief, is
5 there anything else?

6 D.C. TOLBERT: No, that's all.

7 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, sir. At this
8 time we're going to back up in the agenda just for a
9 moment so that we may take care of some administrative
10 things. At this time I will entertain a motion to
11 approve the agenda for today, Thursday, September 13th,
12 2012.

13 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: So move.

14 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Support.

15 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: All those in favor?

16 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

17 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: All those opposed?
18 Motion carries. We also will entertain a motion to
19 approve the minutes from Thursday, September 6th, 2012.

20 COMMISSIONER WHITE: So move.

21 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Support.

22 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: All those in favor?

23 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

24 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Motion carries. At this
25 point I just want to give an indication of where we're

1 going tonight in our meeting. Our meeting is going to
2 be split up into two separate parts. This is pretty
3 much our normal administrative part of the agenda, but
4 we have something special coming up right after we get
5 through our business and we're going to hear from other
6 public safety agencies, other police agencies as
7 relates to how we can come together as a city and even
8 from an interagency perspective to make sure that we
9 provide the necessary protection of the citizens of the
10 City because we know that our resources are limited and
11 we know that everybody's budget is somewhat challenged.

12 But we're going to know from their
13 perspective what agreements might be in place and what
14 that means for us and how we can be involved. So if
15 you have any questions that you would like to ask, we
16 ask that you begin to think about those. We certainly
17 will take those hopefully in about seven to ten more
18 minutes after we run through the rest of our business.

19 But we are looking forward to that discussion
20 because we think it's a discussion that needs to take
21 place especially in light of the environment that we
22 are in in the City of Detroit.

23 At this time we want to bring a matter that's
24 before us as relates to our new of Director Personnel,
25 and there is a resolution and I will ask Commissioner

1 Taylor if she will read the resolution as relates to
2 the new Director of Police Personnel appointment.

3 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Director of Personnel
4 Appointment. Whereas, the Charter for the City of
5 Detroit was ordained and established by the citizens of
6 Detroit for the governance of the City; and

7 Whereas, the Charter established the Board of
8 Police Commissioners to exercise and control authority
9 over the Detroit Police Department; and

10 Whereas, the Board is authorized by the
11 Charter in Section 7-810 to appoint point the Director
12 of Police Personnel who must be a civilian and serve at
13 the pleasure of Board; and

14 Whereas, the Director of Police Personnel
15 position is currently vacant; and

16 Whereas, the Board conducted a nationwide
17 search for qualified applicants and interviewed several
18 individuals for the Director of Police Personnel
19 position; and

20 Whereas, through the interview process and
21 background investigation, the Board determined that
22 Detroit Police Lieutenant Loletha Porter Coleman best
23 demonstrates the skills and experience necessary to
24 assume the position; and

25 Whereas, in making this appointment the Board

1 considered Section 2-106.5 of the Charter which
2 provides that:

3 Subject to state law for one year after
4 employment with the City a public servant shall not
5 lobby or appear before the City Council or any City
6 department, agency, board, commission or body or
7 receive compensation for any services in connection
8 with any matter in which he or she was directly
9 concerned, personally participated, actively considered
10 or acquire knowledge while what working for City.

11 Subject to state law, for a period of one
12 year after employment with the City, a pubic servant
13 shall not accept employment with any person or company
14 that did business with the City during the former
15 public servant's tenure if that public servant was in
16 anyway involved in the award or management of that
17 contract or the employment which required sharing of
18 confidential information; and

19 Whereas, based on it's understanding of the
20 these provisions the Board determined that appointment
21 of Ms. Porter Coleman constitutes a rehire and is not
22 in conflict with Section 2-106.5 which prohibits
23 contracting with retirees where the anticipated
24 services concern matters with which they were directly
25 concerned, personally participated, actively considered

1 or acquired knowledge "for one year following their
2 employment with the City of Detroit"; and

3 Whereas, the Board desires to fill the
4 Director of Police Personnel position for the Detroit
5 Police Department by appointing Ms. Loletha Porter
6 Coleman as the Director at a salary appropriate for
7 that appointment.

8 Now, therefore be it resolved that the Board
9 appoints Ms. Loletha Porter Coleman to the position of
10 Director of Police Personnel for the Detroit Police
11 Department with the effective start date of September
12 17th, 2012.

13 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Mr. Chair, according to
14 this resolution for the new appointment of the Director
15 of Police Personnel I move that we accept this
16 resolution and appoint Ms. Porter Coleman as effective
17 date September 17th, 2012 to the position of Director
18 of Police Personnel.

19 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Support.

20 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: It's been properly moved
21 and supported. Any discussion?

22 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Other than I wish
23 Ms. Porter Coleman well. She served the Department
24 well, and served the Department of Police Personnel
25 well, as well. It's an honor to be working together as

1 we move forward.

2 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Ms. Porter Coleman, could
3 you just stand up and wave so everyone can see who you
4 are?

5 (Applause.)

6 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Certainly she competed
7 with literally people throughout the county and
8 throughout the region and certainly came out to be the
9 top person for the job. We're very pleased and very
10 happy to have her on board. Any other discussion
11 regarding the resolution? Hearing and seeing none, all
12 those in favor of the resolution.

13 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

14 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: All those opposed.
15 Motion carries. Congratulations again, Ms. Porter
16 Coleman.

17 At this time we have a couple resolutions for
18 those who have been very involved in Central District,
19 and we will present those at this time. I'm going to
20 ask if Commissioner White will read the first one for
21 us. And then I'm going to ask if Commissioner Taylor
22 would do the same.

23 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Is Mr. John Bulat here?
24 Did I say your last name right?

25 MR. BULAT: Yeah.

1 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, sir. And if
2 you could please join us. This resolution is honoring
3 Mr. John Bulat. Whereas Mr. John Bulat has been a
4 dedicated and committed supporter of the City of
5 Detroit's Central District. His partnership with the
6 Detroit Police Department has significantly impacted
7 the fight against crime and has proven to improve the
8 quality of living for Detroit citizens; and

9 Whereas Mr. Bulat believes that community
10 involvement and engagement are the most powerful tools
11 that can be utilized to educate residents about change.
12 After pursuing his Master's Degree from Wayne State
13 University, Mr. Bulat was resolute to become an
14 activist focusing on efforts to improve the quality of
15 life for citizens within the City of Detroit; and

16 Whereas Mr. Bulat is known for his outreach
17 efforts, through working in the Center for Urban
18 Studies where he worked on urban safety initiatives for
19 the City of Detroit. While working with the Center,
20 Mr. Bulat assisted in developing crime data and crime
21 prevention strategies to reduce criminal activity
22 within targeted areas in Detroit. Mr. Bulat also
23 partnered with AmeriCorps Urban Safety Project where he
24 assisted citizens in Detroit neighborhoods to form
25 strong, viable block clubs and create cohesive

1 communities that focused on public safety and crime
2 prevention. Through this project, Mr. Bulat became
3 very active in cleaning up neighborhoods and securing
4 abandoned homes; and

5 Whereas Mr. Bulat has extended his community
6 outreach efforts to include facilitating health
7 awareness presentations and seminars on issues such as
8 lead poisoning and asthma. Mr. Bulat also serves his
9 community as part of the leadership team at Citadel of
10 Faith Covenant Church where he is involved with
11 leadership programs, mentoring and the music ministry;
12 and

13 Whereas Mr. Bulat regularly attends the
14 Central District Community Council and the Midtown
15 Alliance meetings, serving as an advocate for the
16 community to ensure that projects and resources are
17 directed where they are needed most.

18 Now therefore be it resolved that the Detroit
19 Board of Police Commissioners, speaking on behalf of
20 the citizens of the City of Detroit and the Detroit
21 Police Department acknowledge the unmistakable spirit
22 of community service of Mr. John Bulat. His
23 willingness to volunteer his time and impact the fight
24 against crime has been an invaluable asset to the
25 Central District and to the entire City.

1 like to say, sir?

2 MR. BULAT: Thank you very much for this
3 award. I'm humbled by it. I'd also like to say I work
4 for a great group at AmeriCorp Center for Urban Studies
5 that are doing great work and I accept this on behalf
6 of their great work, as well. Thank you, very much.

7 (Applause.)

8 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: I'm going to ask if
9 Commissioner Taylor will read our next Honoree's
10 resolution.

11 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Resolution Honoring
12 Reverend Dr. Ray McGee.

13 Whereas Reverend Ray McGee is a dedicated and
14 committed supporter of the City of Detroit's Central
15 District. Reverend Dr. McGee serves as the Senior
16 Pastor of Metropolitan United Methodist Church in
17 Detroit. Reverend Dr. McGee is an urban pastor and
18 native "east side" Detroiter, whose commitment to
19 business, service and leadership is exemplified
20 throughout the entire District; and

21 Whereas Reverend Dr. McGee is very familiar
22 with Detroit's history and identity. For 20 years
23 prior to ministry, Reverend Dr. McGee worked as an
24 engineer at General Motors Power Train Plant in Willow
25 Run; and

1 Whereas when he received his call to
2 ministry, Reverend Dr. McGee entered a United Methodist
3 Course of Study at Emory University's Candler School of
4 Theology in Atlanta, receiving his Doctorate in
5 Ministry in May 2010, and

6 Whereas prior to serving at Metropolitan,
7 Reverend Dr. McGee served as Pastor of Calvary United
8 Methodist Church in Flint, Michigan; and

9 Whereas Reverend Dr. McGee has been married
10 to his wife Darlene for many years and is the proud
11 father of one daughter and three grandchildren. He has
12 instilled the same Christian and familial values of
13 diversity and giving back to the community in his
14 daughter and in his grandchildren; and

15 Whereas as a pillar in this community,
16 Reverend Dr. McGee opened up his church in December
17 2011 to assist in the efforts to locate Bianca Jones, a
18 missing two-year old female from Detroit. As a strong
19 and committed supporter of the Detroit Police
20 Department, Reverend Dr. McGee did not hesitate to
21 respond to the Department's call to citizens to help
22 search for little Bianca. Each day, an invocation and
23 blessing was offered to the 75 to 100 volunteers who
24 assembled at his church during the search efforts. The
25 church also provided the use of the church van and

1 LIEUTENANT HERBERT: Good evening. For the
2 record, I'm Lieutenant Terry Herbert assigned to Police
3 Community Services. I would like to present a Spirit
4 of Detroit Award to Dr. McGee. But if I would be
5 allowed, can I take about 45 seconds to tell you how
6 Dr. Ray McGee and I met when little Bianca first went
7 missing on December the 2nd. It was an overwhelming
8 response from the community that wanted to help.

9 They actually showed up at the Command Post
10 about 100 people two days later wanting to get
11 involved. So the Police Department we didn't have any
12 plans for a 100 people. They wanted to search. They
13 wanted to do whatever they could. So D.C. Turner and I
14 we got the phone call asking us to organize a community
15 effort.

16 So what we did was as soon as we left Central
17 District we stopped at the first church and when we
18 walked into the lobby Dr. Ray McGee was there and I
19 introduced myself and I told him what the situation
20 was, and about thirty second later he said you don't
21 have to tell me anymore, the church is yours.

22 And he actually organized the community
23 search for about seven days, not only did he give us
24 use of the church van and he did a daily invocation but
25 he did a lot more than that. Whatever we asked for he

1 gave it to us. And this has been a long time coming.

2 For me it was a pleasure meeting you. It was
3 meant for us to meet because we've become friends now.
4 So I'll take the great pleasure in introducing or least
5 giving you the Spirit of Detroit Award is presented
6 herewith as an expression of the gratitude and esteem
7 of the citizens of Detroit to Reverend Dr. Ray McGee in
8 recognition of exceptional achievement, outstanding
9 leadership, and dedication to improving the quality of
10 life. It is signed on September 13th, 2012 by all the
11 members of the City Council. It's a pleasure and good
12 to see again. Thank you.

13 (Applause and photos were taken.)

14 REVEREND DR. MCGEE: Thank you. You said a
15 lot of nice things about Reverend Dr. Ray McGee, but
16 really it's the people in these front two rows that did
17 all the work. This one gentleman took a week off work
18 vacation time so he could be there every day. All I
19 did was have a coffee and visit with some gentlemen.
20 It's easy to lead people like that. So on behalf of
21 Metropolitan Church, I thank you.

22 We are discovering churches across the City
23 are figuring out that we can partner together, and
24 churches are our resources to make our communities more
25 livable. Metropolitan is committed to that. So

1 Lieutenant Herbert, you're a good man. I appreciate
2 your work so well. Thank you.

3 I did tell Chief Godbee this and I told
4 Mayor Bing this. I think because the Commissioners
5 hear about griping and complaining, it might be nice to
6 hear some of -- to the persons of the Detroit Police
7 Department who conduct themselves professionally and in
8 the highest standard. It was an honor to work with
9 them. Maybe we need to hear something good once in
10 awhile.

11 It starts with our leadership and goes down
12 to every person. So I appreciate your work
13 particularly this week as we mourn the loss of a Police
14 Officer from our suburbs. We're reminded that the
15 black band across that badge means something. So as
16 citizens we thank you for the work you've done and
17 continue to do. And I think we need to recognize you
18 folks more than you recognize us. Amen.

19 (Applause.)

20 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Just outstanding work.
21 As we said it before that's what the City of Detroit is
22 about is about the men and women who roll up their
23 sleeves and who get involved and stay involved at any
24 and all costs. So we thank you for your example and
25 your leadership.

1 At this time we want announce that or next
2 meeting will be held Thursday, September 20th,
3 3:00 p.m., at 1300 -- I'm sorry, at 7310 Woodward. I
4 believe there's a ball game that day. So instead of
5 meeting at Beaubien we will be at 7310 Woodward.

6 Finally, if you wish to address the Board of
7 Police Commissioners regarding an issue and if it's
8 regarding our special panel that's coming up next I'm
9 going to ask if you hold off on those questions.

10 But if it's regarding anything else you may
11 come to the mic, the podium in the center, give us your
12 first name and last name and spell it for us. We're
13 going to stick very strictly to one minute, limit your
14 comments to one minute. We greatly appreciate it so
15 that we can get to as many comments as possible and so
16 that we also maybe able to get to our panel. Good
17 evening, sir.

18 MR. DORSEY: Good evening, Mr. Warfield. My
19 comments today are directed toward you and Chief
20 Tolbert. Chief Tolbert I've know you over 20 years.
21 Even to this day I still don't call you Chief. I still
22 call you Big James.

23 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: I'm sorry, what's your
24 name for the record, please?

25 MR. ANTHONY: Louie Anthony Dorsey. I came

1 to you to awhile ago in regards to a problem that we
2 had primarily with one of your Inspectors, Inspector
3 Allen. Somehow it became an issue where we began to
4 beef. That became a situation where I became
5 blackballed. Somehow your attorney, Ms.
6 Celia Washington, I believe is to my left, every time a
7 crime is committed against me or somebody I associate
8 with, a member of my family, the person is never
9 prosecuted or one of us are arrested.

10 Primarily we have, the most two recent
11 incidents I'm going to give is one August 21st, 2010, a
12 car accident, drunk driver, can't even get out of it,
13 rear-ended my car. Your counsel representative
14 prevented him from being arrested, no ticket was
15 written. He was not arrested or anything because of
16 your Counsel Celia Washington. That's a conflict of
17 interest.

18 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Here's what I'm going to
19 ask you, Mr. Dorsey, we have a short time, there is a
20 Chief Investigator who handles --

21 MR. DORSEY: We have done that.

22 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: So you did fill out
23 the --

24 MR. DORSEY: No response from that.

25 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: It's currently being

1 investigated? What happens, let me just give you the
2 process how that works. And first of all, we thank you
3 for coming, that's first of all. We received all your
4 inquiries. But the way it happens is that they take
5 your complaint, they sign it out to an Investigator,
6 you receive a call or communication about when to come
7 in and give your taped interview and then they will
8 move forward and do their investigation. The window of
9 that investigation is about 80 to 90 days and then they
10 will make a determination and then you will be notified
11 of that determination.

12 Now, if there is something that you wish or
13 if you're unsatisfied with that investigation you can
14 come and talk to us and we can go forward from there.
15 But you have started I guess the right way.

16 MR. DORSEY: Two years.

17 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: That is to go -- well,
18 things that happened two years ago we don't --

19 MR. DORSEY: Exactly, and that's my point.

20 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Those cases have been
21 investigated and findings have been made.

22 MR. DORSEY: The one that was filed against
23 her after we found out from my lawyers after that did
24 the civil case that Ms. Washington represented the
25 family from the point of the accident all the way.

1 That's not the only incident I'm here for.

2 We had another incident happen almost a month
3 ago. Your Investigators said they're not going to
4 investigate. It's on three different videos. I
5 receive 21 stitches for something I had nothing to do
6 with.

7 Your Investigators told us deal with it in
8 the street. Because of that little coward back there.
9 We have no problem with that. My thing is if this is
10 how you all going to address it, I mean, keep one
11 hundred --

12 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Here's what we're going
13 to do, Mr. Dorsey, again, and I don't know if we have
14 all your complaints or not, if we don't have them all,
15 I'm going to ask that you see the Chief Investigator
16 right there --

17 MR. DORSEY: We have no problem speaking with
18 anybody.

19 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Hold on one second, sir.
20 She will get you all the information you need, take
21 down all the information and I promise you we'll get
22 back with you, and I will also follow up to make sure
23 that that happens and takes place. So I mean the buck
24 will stop here.

25 MR. DORSEY: You said that before.

1 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: But, sir, for any
2 complaint that you file not only was there an
3 investigation but there was a finding. You might have
4 had a grievance with the finding, but there was
5 certainly a finding. So, you know, we've done, again,
6 what we're call to do and that is to investigate the
7 complaints on behalf of the citizen and to make sure
8 that we do it in a fair and balanced way.

9 Unfortunately there are times when the
10 investigation does not go the way that the citizen
11 wishes that it does. But it does not mean that it was
12 something wrong with the investigation or complaint,
13 okay. Again, if there's something else, we can talk
14 after the meeting, go off line. But I do want to give
15 other people an opportunity to address the Board.

16 MR. DORSEY: I have no problem with that.
17 However, I'm not going to sit here and allow myself to
18 be spent because it's the same thing you said before
19 and it's the same thing. You had Lieutenant Allen who
20 was a Lieutenant at the time the so-called investigator
21 of the situation and all he did was create a street
22 situation.

23 Every time we seeing each other we're going
24 at it, and it's not going to stop until one of you all
25 step up, man, and be a man about it and put that man in

1 check. We're not going to sit there and allow this man
2 back there to threaten a five-year old child. That's a
3 coward, man. We don't fear no jail, man.

4 So if you all want to talk about it we can
5 talk about it, but we not going to sit here. We not no
6 gang members. This guy's -- terrorist, man.

7 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Mr. Dorsey, with all due
8 respect you've gone way over.

9 MR. DORSEY: I have no problem with that.

10 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Okay. We need to move
11 on. We can talk off line.

12 MR. DORSEY: I appreciate it.

13 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Are there others who wish
14 to address the Board of Police Commission? If so,
15 again, you can come right to podium in the center. Are
16 there others?

17 Hearing and seeing none, we will close, I
18 will entertain a motion to adjourn, but prior to doing
19 that I just also wanted to remind you next week we have
20 our public towing hearing on the adjustments to the
21 rules of police authorized towing. Again, that will
22 take place next week at our regularly scheduled
23 meeting.

24 At this time, I will entertain a motion to
25 adjourn the meeting.

1 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: So move.

2 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Support.

3 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: It's been properly moved
4 and supported. All those in favor.

5 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

6 (The hearing adjourned at 6:52 p.m.)
