4 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: All right. Good evening,
5 ladies and gentlemen, and welcome to the Board of
6 Police Commissioners Meeting. My name is Jerome
7 Warfield, Chairman of the Board of Police
8 Commissioners. We have serving with us tonight Vice
9 Chairperson, Board of Commissioners, Jessica Taylor, as
10 well as Commissioner Donnell White, and representing
11 the Chief's Office is Deputy Chief James Tolbert
12 sitting at the end of the table.

13 DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: Good evening.

14 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: And representing our
15 office is our Board Secretary, Mr. George Anthony.

16 I am going to ask if Mr. Anthony could
17 introduce our staff who is here.

18 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you, Mr. Chair.
19 For the record, George Anthony, Secretary to the Board.
20 We have present Mr. Robert Brown, who is our office
21 manager. Recording our proceedings is Sergeant Alan
22 Quinn. And Ms. Rhonda Foster from Hanson Court
23 Reporting Service. Thank you.

24 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you. And we know
25 that we should have someone coming right now from the

1 Office of Chief Investigator, Celia Washington will be
2 sitting in for Ms. Pamela Drake-Davis, chief
3 investigator. So if there are citizens complaints, we
4 certainly will be able to take care of those tonight.

5 Certainly, we are very, very happy to be here
6 at the Sacred Heart Activity Center. This center and
7 the church is just a stalwart of community activity,
8 and just history for this side of town in our city.
9 And so it is always great when we come here to be with
10 those in this area of the city. And so we want to give
11 thanks to the director of this center and the pastor of
12 the church for allowing us to come here tonight.

13 Before we read the Commissioners' duties and
14 responsibilities, I am going to ask that Commissioner
15 White would lead us in our invocation for tonight's
16 meeting.

17 COMMISSIONER WHITE: If we could pause
18 ourselves.

19 We come before you to give you words of
20 thanks for allowing us to be here at this place at this
21 time, for we know that it is you who have ordered our
22 steps to this point. We thank you for this beautiful
23 rainy day. For we know that it is rain that brings
24 back a new season, a season of new. And as we allow
25 your grace to reign upon this department, for new

1 change, for new growth, for new development, for
2 renewed commitment to the citizens of this department,
3 we ask that you bless us with like-mindedness during
4 this meeting. Bless those who have been called to
5 serve, and who serve each and every day. Be a hedge of
6 protection around our men and women of this department
7 who are commissioned to do your work here on earth as
8 it is in heaven. Bless all of those within the sound
9 of my voice as we come to and leave from this place.
10 In your name do we pray, amen.

11 AUDIENCE: Amen.

12 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, Commissioner
13 White. Appreciate that, sir.

14 I am going to ask if you could read for us
15 our duties and responsibilities.

16 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Certainly. The Board of
17 Police Commissioners was created by City Charter
18 July 1, 1974. Its composition currently is a
19 five-member appointed by the Mayor, confirmed by City
20 Council. The commissioners serve five-year terms, and
21 may not serve more than five years consecutively.
22 Commissioners meet once a week, 52 weeks out of the
23 year. All meetings are open to the public.

24 The duties of this body are to establish
25 policy, rules and regulations in consultation with the

1 Chief and the approval of the Mayor; to review and
2 approve the department budget; to review and approve
3 department promotions; to receive and resolve
4 complaints concerning the operation of the police
5 department; to serve as the final authority to impose
6 and/or review discipline of police department
7 employees; to appoint a civilian personnel director; to
8 prepare an annual report of department activities for
9 the public, the Mayor and the City Council.

10 Its staff includes an Executive Director who
11 serves as Secretary to the Board and attends all Board
12 meetings, a chief investigator, and additional
13 investigators as needed, and other staff as necessary
14 to provide support to the Board.

15 The Police Commission considers itself a
16 liaison between citizens of the City of Detroit and the
17 Detroit Police Department.

18 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, sir.
19 Certainly appreciate that.

20 At this time, I will entertain a motion to
21 approve today's agenda.

22 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: So moved.

23 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Support.

24 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Without objection, all
25 those in favor?

1 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

2 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: I will also entertain a
3 motion to approve the minutes of Thursday, April
4 the 4th, 2013.

5 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: So moved.

6 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Support.

7 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Without objection, all
8 those in favor?

9 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

10 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Motion carries.

11 As the Chairperson, I want to give an update
12 on where we are in our search for a new Chief of
13 Police. Also want to talk a little bit about the
14 towing issue that is still within the City and with the
15 City Council. And then want to talk later when we get
16 to the Chief's report about a proposed restructuring or
17 second phase of the first reorganization. And so I
18 want to take that in that order, if we can.

19 First of all, in regards to the search, I
20 want to update everyone about the contract to begin the
21 search was signed a few weeks ago. Immediately, when
22 that contract was signed, it was posted, the position
23 for Chief of Police locally as well as nationally. Our
24 recruiting firm has been in constant contact with their
25 network of affiliates throughout the country as relates

1 to the field of candidates not only locally but also
2 nationally. We do know that interviews are taking
3 place currently. The position was not posted -- it has
4 only been posted for a week. And so we are basically
5 waiting to hear back from that first firm. As they
6 drill down their candidates, they cast a wide net
7 first. And what they have done as part of their
8 process, to interview candidates, and they will
9 interview the appropriate number of times. An actual
10 candidate may only get one or two interviews depending
11 on how much they need to drill down. After they drill
12 down, they will provide a list for the Board to send on
13 to the second phase of the interviewing process.

14 Let me also say that prior to negotiating the
15 process is somewhat of an examination that each
16 candidate will go through testing their skills, testing
17 their leadership attributes, as well. And that data,
18 that information will be made available certainly to
19 the Mayor and to the Emergency Manager when they get
20 ready to make their decision.

21 The second phase of the interviewing process
22 will really be to assess and a drill down assessment.
23 We will have a number of Chiefs of Police,
24 currently-serving Chiefs of Police, that will come in
25 and actually test the candidates in very specific

1 duties and responsibilities and requisites as it
2 relates to asserting out the duties of a Chief of
3 Police.

4 I want to back up for a minute and say to the
5 citizens here, we included in the process the
6 information you gave us back in October to ask the
7 Chief of Police as it relates to how do they do culture
8 change in the department, whether there is a policy as
9 relates to developing aggressive drug strategy,
10 aggressive gang strategy, and how they motivate the
11 department. So those questions will all -- are also
12 part of the interviewing process in phase one and phase
13 two. Just so that you know.

14 Going back to the assessment portion of the
15 interview. The assessment, once it is completed, then
16 we will have a final list of candidates. We will just
17 turn that list over to the Mayor, to the Emergency
18 Manager. Of course, they will make a decision on who
19 the next Police Chief will be.

20 We do not have a timeline as far as when that
21 will be completed. Certainly, we are letting the
22 agency that we have hired do the work. And we are not
23 dictating to them the timeline. But when they are done
24 with their work and when that's completed, we are
25 certain to report back out to the community. We will

1 report statistical analysis, how many candidates
2 actually inquired, how many Chief interviews, you know,
3 what part of the country are they from, how many
4 internal candidates versus external candidates. We
5 will break it down, male versus female, and also
6 ethnicity demographics, as well. So we will have all
7 that information provided to the community when that
8 time arises.

9 And so certainly, during the oral
10 communication part of the meeting, if you have any
11 further questions about that, I will be more than happy
12 to answer your questions regarding that.

13 I will skip to restructuring and then come
14 back to towing.

15 I was informed today, received a call from
16 the Assistant Chief, that the Department is considering
17 another reorganization which will take place on the
18 29th of this month. And certainly, we understand the
19 need to put more boots on the ground, but we are hoping
20 and we are really expecting the department to go
21 through the proper process this time.

22 We do know that the reorganization we are
23 under right now violates the city charter because this
24 Board is supposed to approve any reorganizations before
25 they take effect. The city charter has not changed.

1 And we are asking the Department for a presentation on
2 any reorganization plans formally to this Board so that
3 this Board may be able to weigh in.

4 It is hard for us to buy in on the second
5 reorganization when we didn't buy in on the first
6 reorganization. And so we had to deal with that issue.
7 We are more than willing to sit down and talk about
8 that issue so that we can make sure that our citizens
9 are covered, because at the end of the day I think
10 that's what the Department wants, what the Board wants,
11 to make sure that we have enough boots on the ground
12 that our citizens are covered and protected in a very
13 safe environment, and we want to make sure that our
14 citizens' needs are covered in the community. And we
15 have to be very careful, the balance that is in the
16 various areas within the Department.

17 Certainly, as you all know by coming to these
18 meetings, we wear two hats. Not only do we wear the
19 hat that represents the Department, but we also wear
20 the hat that represents the citizenry of this city, and
21 so we take all of that into consideration when we look
22 at restructuring the Department and what an impact it
23 has on the citizens of the city of Detroit.

24 Finally, I just want to report out on some
25 updated information regarding towing. There has been a

1 number of hearings that have been held in front of City
2 Council regarding establishing a new tow rate and
3 establishing -- what we just are dealing primarily
4 with, the tow rate. And the Tow Rate Commission is the
5 commission that is made up of members appointed by the
6 Mayor and City Council. It came up with a
7 recommendation of a tow fee structure. And there has
8 been a lot of negotiating going back and forth. I have
9 been part of those meetings. There have been two tow
10 representatives as part of those meetings. The
11 Director of Purchasing for the City of Detroit has been
12 there, as well as persons from the Tow Rate Commission.
13 And we had a meeting this week, and we have come to the
14 agreement that the tow rate should be raised for two
15 reasons. First of all, to make up for the lost time
16 that there has not been a tow rate increase. I think
17 it has been the last -- help me -- I think 15 years.

18 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: 17.

19 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: -- 17 years since the
20 last. Thank you. So the last 17 years there has not
21 been a tow rate increase. As a matter of fact, when we
22 look at the entire metropolitan area, and we look at
23 cities around the country, Detroit is at the very
24 bottom as it relates to tow rates for the country.

25 And so we did our research and looked at

1 other cities that surrounded Detroit and looked at
2 other major metropolitan areas. And we believe that we
3 came up with a plan that was fair, that would also
4 raise significant amount of revenue that pays for the
5 costs of the police officers who are on the scene that
6 have to deal with making sure that those cars are towed
7 properly.

8 And so I am going to ask this Board, and I
9 will ask guidance of you all who deal with it, we
10 might, you know, just go -- either to adopt those rates
11 or talk about it. And we can talk about it later,
12 maybe have one of the gentlemen come up to talk about
13 it. But the tow rate should -- their recommendation is
14 that the tow rate will rise to \$125 for a tow. And
15 that storage will go to \$15 a day. And then the City
16 will receive an administration fee of \$75 per tow that
17 will take care of the cost, what it takes to put an
18 officer there on the scene. Actually, it does not
19 cover the full cost. I am going to say that up front.
20 I think the City has been very generous because it
21 takes at least typically two officers there at minimum
22 on the scene when a tow is called in. And when you
23 look at their hourly rate, what they get paid, the 75
24 administration fee does not cover the full cost. That
25 would include the cost to dispatch that car, as well.

1 So I think the City has done a great job in keeping the
2 fee within reason as relates to the cost, what it costs
3 the City to tow that car.

4 These rates are consistent pretty much with
5 the communities around us, and we are still just below
6 the national average, what major cities charge to tow a
7 car. And so again, those rates -- write them down,
8 \$125 to tow the car, \$15 storage, and \$75 for City
9 administration fee. And part of that fee will also
10 include a new software system that helps to better
11 manage the towing operations so that we actually can
12 get more boots on the ground with that, as well.

13 Mr. Wild, Billy Wild, do you have anything
14 else, Tom Stidham, to add to that or is that --

15 MR. STIDHAM: Tom Stidham. I want to
16 summarize, just ask that all parties -- all the towers
17 have endorsed this proposal. We ask the Board to do
18 the same.

19 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Stay right there a
20 second.

21 Any questions to Mr. Stidham, from the Board
22 members to Mr. Stidham regarding this?

23 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Just a couple points of
24 clarification. The initial tow rate fee was what cost?

25 MR. STIDHAM: It is \$125 is the proposed

1 rate.

2 COMMISSIONER WHITE: The current rate?

3 MR. STIDHAM: The current rate is \$75.

4 COMMISSIONER WHITE: How does that \$75 break
5 down for the record?

6 MR. STIDHAM: How does it break down?

7 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Right. Is that storage?
8 Towing?

9 MR. STIDHAM: Currently the City is getting
10 zero administration fee. The City's administration fee
11 is new for the City. The City is going to allow the
12 City to realize and recognize a new revenue stream from
13 the towing of all vehicles.

14 COMMISSIONER WHITE: The last question. How
15 does this -- so this new fee will be implemented on all
16 cars that are towed within the City of Detroit?

17 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Police-authorized. They
18 have to be police-authorized tows in Detroit. And one
19 thing to point out, too, with these fees. These fees
20 are even less than what a private insurance tow. You
21 are looking at \$200 for a private tow, if you call your
22 insurance to have them do it, if your insurance bills,
23 but right now that is one of the issues that the City
24 is looking at across the board. Right now, again, you
25 are looking at, Commissioner, just \$75 is what a person

1 has to pay to get a car towed.

2 Now, here is the issue then, and we have done
3 studies, the towers have done studies where they have
4 actually looked and sat on the border of Eight Mile,
5 and it is interesting that when people cross the border
6 over Eight Mile, because the tow fee is a little bit
7 more hefty if they get caught and their car get taken,
8 they put their seat belts on, they put their feet off
9 the pedal, and they drive a little bit more safer
10 across Eight Mile when we sit there and watch this
11 behavior. And there is a difference.

12 And so we say that that same type of care
13 should be taken in the city of Detroit, as well. We
14 are not here to penalize those citizens certainly who
15 are following the law who are doing what they are
16 supposed to do. But these are certainly for those who
17 need a police at the scene for whatever reason to tow
18 those cars.

19 Right now the City is not collecting
20 anything, and there is only a \$75 fee that is being
21 incurred by the citizens. And again, that goes back
22 17 years. If you do the math on that, 17 years ago,
23 and you deal -- and you, let's say, did a cost of what
24 a shoe would cost 17 years ago, I mean, you will see
25 the appreciable difference there.

1 MR. STIDHAM: Did I answer your questions,
2 Commissioner White?

3 COMMISSIONER WHITE: I am good. And to be
4 clear, I would just reiterate some of my earlier
5 concern as relates to a tow rate increase. If my math
6 is correct, that's a 53 percent increase. And as we
7 look at challenges to individuals who reside within the
8 city of Detroit, with high cost of insurance and other
9 high costs of living, I would just caution us to
10 keeping in mind as rates increase, keeping in mind
11 other large municipalities' tow rates may be higher
12 than our rates. Detroit is a unique environment. It
13 is an environment that does not have yet a concrete
14 plan for regionalized transportation. And again, I
15 won't get on my soap box, but there is some very real
16 challenges that we have. And to me, this will continue
17 to perpetuate a situation if we try to apply and change
18 overnight to this magnitude. So I would just caution
19 this body and this commission to be sensitive to those
20 individuals who rely heavily on their transportation to
21 get to work, to effectuate childcare, to take care of
22 normal business throughout the city.

23 MR. STIDHAM: And may I just respond to that?
24 One thing I do want to point out to the public and to
25 you, Commissioner White, and all of the entire Board is

1 that, again, this process actually began with the Tow
2 Rate Commission convening for the first time in years
3 and years and years. And I believe they started in
4 March of 2012. So it has taken over a year to get
5 where we are right now. And I just want to really -- I
6 know I probably won't address entirely all your
7 concerns, but the Tow Rate Commission, because I was
8 at -- attended all of the meetings, there was a lot of
9 input from the citizens, from the community, from the
10 towers, from the police-authorized towers, from other
11 City agencies. There was a careful study deliberation
12 of best practices with respect to rates, the employment
13 of new revenue or opportunities for new revenue for the
14 City. So there was a lot of study and careful
15 deliberation on some of the very issues that you have
16 raised. They were raised, considered, deliberated by
17 the Tow Rate Commission. I am not part of the Tow Rate
18 Commission, but again, I attended those meetings, and
19 they did take all of those factors into account.

20 And while it may seem like an inordinate
21 increase, again, when you look back historically, there
22 has been no rate increase for nearly 17 years. And if
23 it's just been a couple dollars a year increase, we
24 would be about to where it is, the proposal is. So we
25 think that this rate increase, coupled with the

1 component of raising revenue for the City, is fair to
2 all the stakeholders, the citizens, the
3 police-authorized towers in the City of Detroit. And
4 we think it is in the best interest of the City.

5 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Any other questions of
6 Mr. Stidham?

7 Thank you, sir.

8 MR. STIDHAM: Thank you.

9 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: That is all I have from
10 my report this evening. And so I certainly want to
11 thank you for hearing out all those issues.

12 At this time, we will turn to the Chief's
13 Office and Chief Tolbert.

14 DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: Good evening. Through
15 the Chair, good evening everyone.

16 Today we have a presentation from the
17 Northeast District. Representing the Northeast
18 District is Inspector Allen. Turn it over to Inspector
19 Allen.

20 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, sir.

21 INSPECTOR ALLEN: Good evening. It's always
22 a pleasure to address this Board.

23 I am going to follow the four Bs of public
24 speaking as taught to me by Deputy Chief Ewing
25 Be Brief, Brother, Be Brief.

1 I will give you just a little bit of
2 demographics. We are located at 51 East Nevada. We
3 encompass approximately 28.16 square miles. And
4 according to the last census, we have in the
5 neighborhood of 126,000 residents.

6 Inspector Gary Sroka and myself, Inspector
7 Daniel Allen, are assigned to the district as
8 commanding officers of the 11th and 7th precinct,
9 respectively. The 11th precinct also is commonly
10 referred to as the North End of the district. And the
11 7th precinct as the South End. Miller Road through Van
12 Dyke is the dividing area.

13 I would just like to briefly talk about some
14 of our goals and initiatives, which -- it is listed as
15 number 3 here, but I am going to bump it up to
16 number 1. And that's to accelerate compliance with the
17 two federal consent decrees. We have just had an
18 inspection. Preliminarily, I am told we did well on
19 the inspection. We are going to continue to implement
20 plans to increase police visibility. We have opened up
21 three mini stations, and I will let you know where
22 those are at. Butzel Center, 7737 Kercheval, which is
23 staffed by Officer Labrie McClendon. The Belmont at
24 20500 Conant, staffed by Officer Chambers. And the
25 Belaire at 9560 East Eight Mile which is staffed by

1 Officer Doug Nichols.

2 I would also like to introduce Sergeant
3 Charles Spruce. He was our Community Relations
4 Sergeant. And he is in charge of those mini stations.
5 As well, I would be remiss if I did not do this. We
6 have several very ardent community supporters in the
7 audience with us. And they are as much on staff as any
8 of us that wear a uniform. At any function, they are
9 always there. That would be Mr. and Mrs. McCants,
10 Mr. Russo, Ms. Kim Jackson, I don't know if Ms. Jackson
11 is here, and Ms. Dora Hatcher, and I don't -- Anna? So
12 we have a very active staff.

13 (Applause).

14 INSPECTOR ALLEN: We can't operate without
15 them. And then we have Romano. My apologies there.

16 A few things, business development wise, the
17 Gateway Shopping Complex is going to be located in our
18 district. It is going to be at Eight Mile and
19 Woodward. The cornerstone of that is going to be a
20 Meijer store with a gas station. Various other vendors
21 will share this complex. We recently met with the
22 individuals in charge of Meijer and addressing security
23 concerns. And I think it is going to be a very healthy
24 development for the City.

25 Our Eastern Market Business District will be

1 holding its Annual Flower Day event on May 11th.
2 Several community events and programs we have had, and
3 I won't go over them all, but some of my favorites,
4 November is our Veterans Day Luncheon. We held that.
5 It had approximately 200 participants. And we pay
6 homage to those that serve us overseas.

7 In February, we had our Senior Valentine's
8 Day Dance and Luncheon, and it was attended by
9 approximately 100 senior citizens.

10 Just this last March, March 30th, we had my
11 favorite event, which is the Easter Egg Hunt with the
12 children. It is all about the kids. And that's what
13 makes it such a great event.

14 In conclusion, it is my hope this report
15 gives the Board of Police Commissioners and the
16 citizens of the Northeastern District a brief synopsis
17 of the Missions and Directives as mandated by Interim
18 Chief of Police Chester Logan. The members assigned to
19 the Northeastern District are police officers dedicated
20 and committed to providing safety and stability.

21 I would add one thing to that. It is a
22 citywide initiative, so it is not strictly at the
23 Northeastern District. But it is called Detroit One.
24 It is a collaborative effort. Many of you have heard
25 of it with the federal prosecutor's office. We are all

1 on board at the Northeastern District. What it does is
2 targets individuals who carry guns illegally. And to
3 date, we have two individuals sitting in federal
4 custody looking at very long prison terms for carrying
5 illegal guns. So we are all on that.

6 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, sir.
7 Appreciate, Inspector. Any questions?

8 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: I don't have a
9 question, but I would just like to congratulate you.
10 You seem to be doing a fine job.

11 INSPECTOR ALLEN: Thank you so much,
12 Commissioner. I appreciate that.

13 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, Mr. Chair.
14 Thank you, Inspector.

15 Previously when we had a conversation about
16 Northeastern there was a conversation centered around
17 the prevalence of violence at gas stations. Have we
18 seen that fluctuate up or down?

19 INSPECTOR ALLEN: Well, now I am going to
20 have to knock wood here. We have seen it fluctuate
21 down. And we are going to drive it down some more
22 because a lot of these individuals carrying these
23 illegal guns are hanging around these gas stations, and
24 they are causing a great deal of that issue at the gas
25 stations, as well as party stores and other 24-hour

1 establishments. We have had some success there. We
2 are going to continue to have some success as we ramp
3 up this Detroit One project. And word of that is
4 getting out, slowly but surely. I think that's going
5 to have a real dampening effect on some of these
6 individuals that are out there carrying guns.

7 The one individual that we just placed into
8 federal custody last Friday is looking at 10 to
9 12 years of federal incarceration. That's based upon
10 his past record; in fact, that he was a felon in
11 possession of a firearm. So the sentences are
12 extremely stiff. And there is no probation in the
13 federal system. So when you get the time, you do it.

14 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, sir.

15 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: A couple questions. The
16 mini stations, are they being staffed by community
17 officers or regular police officers?

18 INSPECTOR ALLEN: They are being staffed by
19 community police officers.

20 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Great. And I also want
21 to say, I have known you announced some members here
22 from the Northeast District. And I wanted to highlight
23 Ms. McCants who was featured in the news for helping to
24 catch a dumpster (phonetic) -- Ms. McCants referred for
25 helping catch a dumpster.

1 We thank you for telling what's going on.

2 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Amen.

3 (Applause).

4 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Awesome job. Awesome
5 job. Thank you, sir.

6 DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: Thank you.

7 Through the Chair, I know Chief Logan has
8 been giving you updates on Operation Nip-It. I am
9 going to give you figures for week five.

10 For week five, which is, again, I want to
11 remind the Board that is Thursday, Friday, Saturday,
12 the numbers are as such. Seventy-four arrests, 1,180
13 persons investigated, 886 vehicles investigated, of
14 which 177 vehicles were towed. There were 25 weapons
15 confiscated. There were over -- street value of over
16 \$2.7 million of drugs. And over \$34,000 in cash money
17 confiscated. And that was just for week five.

18 So the Nip-It is a resource brought to bear.
19 Focus currently is on the Eastern and Northwestern
20 areas, and we are -- that's one of the reasons why we
21 are seeing a reduction in some of the crime in these
22 areas, because what we are doing is we are putting
23 pressure to bear on the areas that are constantly
24 causing this trouble. And when you look at the
25 deployment and you say in an area is constantly a

1 problem, well, if it is constantly a problem, we have
2 to have a strategy that constantly addresses that and
3 nips it, and we are doing that at this point. And I
4 think it is a great program.

5 And that is all I have, sir.

6 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Any questions for Deputy
7 Chief?

8 Thank you, sir. Appreciate it.

9 At this time, we want to honor someone who
10 has been very diligent and very active here with the
11 Northeast District, and that is Mrs. Ruth Parker. We
12 are going to ask her to come forth and ask Commissioner
13 Taylor -- is she here? Ms. Parker?

14 MS. GRANT: She is not here.

15 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Not here?

16 MS. GRANT: She is not here.

17 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Are you representing
18 Ms. Parker?

19 MS. GRANT: No.

20 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Okay. Well, here is what
21 I am going to ask. I am going to ask if Commissioner
22 Taylor would read the resolution. If she comes in
23 later, please let us know.

24 MS. GRANT: She won't be here.

25 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: She won't be here?

1 MS. GRANT: No.

2 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Okay. So can somebody
3 make sure she gets the resolution?

4 Okay. Great. We will make sure she gets the
5 resolution.

6 Ms. Taylor, if you could read the resolution
7 for us.

8 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Resolution Honoring
9 Mrs. Ruth Parker.

10 Whereas, Mrs. Ruth Parker is a dedicated and
11 committed supporter of the City of Detroit's
12 Northeastern District. Her commitment to business,
13 service and leadership is exemplified throughout the
14 community; and

15 Whereas, Mrs. Parker is a --

16 SERGEANT SPRUCE: Excuse me, this is
17 Ms. Parker's daughter. Ms. Parker is in the hospital.
18 She came to accept the award for Ms. Parker.

19 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Okay. Do me a favor,
20 Ms. Parker. Could you take that mic off the stand and
21 come stand right here? Thank you so much.

22 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: I will start over with
23 the Resolution for Mrs. Ruth Parker.

24 Whereas, Mrs. Ruth Parker is a dedicated and
25 committed supporter of the City of Detroit's

1 Northeastern District. Her commitment to business,
2 service and leadership is exemplified throughout the
3 community; and

4 Whereas, Mrs. Parker is a woman dedicated to
5 education, and a graduate of Dunbar High School in
6 Lexington, Kentucky. She earned a Bachelor of Arts
7 Degree from Kentucky State College. In 1958 she moved
8 to Detroit where she continued her education at Wayne
9 State University, earning a Master's degree in Social
10 Work. Mrs. Parker worked for the State of Michigan as
11 a social worker from 1967 until her retirement in 1997;
12 and

13 Whereas, Mrs. Parker is the treasurer of the
14 Dean Street Block Club, and member of the Farwell
15 Recreation Center Advisory Council, the M.O.R.S. Radio
16 Patrol, the Gamma Phi Delta Sorority, and the Wayne
17 State Alumni Precinct Delegate, and Secretary of the
18 Krainzwood Association;

19 Whereas, Mrs. Parker is currently a member of
20 the Pleasant Grove Baptist Church. She has spent many
21 volunteer hours assisting with church events. She is a
22 member of the Willing Workers, Senior Usher Board, and
23 Co-Chair of the Membership Committee;

24 Whereas, Mrs. Parker has proven through her
25 actions that she remains a dedicated and committed

1 supporter of the City of Detroit and the Northeastern
2 District. She has volunteered for numerous activities
3 such as the Northeastern District's Annual Senior
4 Valentine's Day Dance, Annual Easter Egg Hunt, Police
5 Week, National Night Out, Veterans Day Luncheon and the
6 Annual Senior Turkey Bingo.

7 Therefore be it resolved:

8 That the Detroit Board of Police
9 Commissioners, speaking on behalf of the citizens of
10 the City of Detroit and the Detroit Police Department
11 acknowledge the giving spirit and community service of
12 Mrs. Ruth Parker. Her vision for Detroit and its
13 citizens is unmatched and highly respected.

14 We thank and congratulate you, Mrs. Parker.

15 Now, on behalf of the Detroit Board of Police
16 Commissioners, we would like to present you with this.

17 MS. GRANT: Thank you.

18 (Applause).

19 (Photograph taken).

20 DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: Ms. Grant, this is for
21 your mother, Ruth. This is a Certificate of
22 Recognition from Detroit Police Department, to
23 Mrs. Ruth Parker, resident of the city of Detroit in
24 appreciation for the following outstanding service:
25 Cooperation, for your involvement in community, and the

1 services to the City of Detroit, demonstrating a spirit
2 and commitment that is worthy of recognition, and is
3 dated today, signed by Chief Chester Logan.

4 Congratulations. Tell your mom she is doing
5 a great job.

6 One more.

7 INSPECTOR ALLEN: We have here a Spirit of
8 Detroit Award. It is presented as an expression of the
9 gratitude and esteem of the citizens of Detroit, to
10 Mrs. Ruth Parker. It is presented and signed by all
11 members of the City Council dated April 11, 2013.

12 MS. GRANT: Thank you.

13 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Do you have something to
14 add?

15 MS. GRANT: On behalf of my mother, I would
16 like to thank the Board, Deputy Chief, well, everyone,
17 for honoring my mother. She had surgery so she wasn't
18 able to be here. And I wasn't expecting this. She
19 didn't tell me all of this was going on. She told
20 me ask for Sergeant Spruce, and that was it. I didn't
21 know all of this. I would have had something prepared.
22 But I appreciate what you all are doing to make our
23 community safer, you know, for all of us to, you know,
24 feel comfortable, and I appreciate everyone backs up
25 the City of Detroit, you know, I just appreciate

1 everybody, and the audience, those that work and hard
2 work, you know, it takes time out of your schedule to
3 do this, and the sacrifice, you all have families, so
4 it is a sacrifice for everybody getting involved. So I
5 want to thank you all again for honoring my mother.
6 And that's it.

7 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you.

8 (Applause).

9 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Certainly it is always a
10 pleasure to be able to honor those in our city who just
11 do an excellent job in assisting officers day in and
12 day out. It really takes a combined effort to make
13 sure they keep our neighborhoods safe and our streets
14 clean. So once again, the work of Mrs. Ruth Parker and
15 her family for all they do in the city of Detroit.

16 At this time, I ask if Commander Romeo could
17 come on down to the mic so that we can look at
18 Directives and approve some Directives.

19 Commander Jeff Romeo.

20 COMMANDER JEFF ROMEO: Thank you, sir.

21 Commander Jeff Romeo.

22 I just wanted to revisit four policies
23 previously presented to this Board. Additionally,
24 there's three that we want to present to the Board this
25 evening.

1 The first ones that were presented
2 approximately six weeks ago were posted on the
3 Internet. Just so if you want to open up to that too.
4 The policies we discussed that have been presented
5 before this Board have been posted on the Internet. At
6 the previous meeting, they were distributed at the
7 meeting so the public could have a chance to review the
8 policies and give any input. To date we haven't
9 received any response on any of the posted policies on
10 the Internet or any feedback through telephone calls or
11 fax or e-mails. So we also currently have the other
12 policies that we are going to discuss posted on the
13 Internet for public review and comment, as well.

14 And I will start out with Patrol Related
15 Reports. I will just briefly go over a couple of the
16 changes that were made to it. This is what we are
17 seeking approval on. It is Directive 201.2, Patrol
18 Related Reports.

19 Some of the major changes were incorporated
20 in the process of CRISNET reports, how it is routed.
21 As opposed to having paper copies routed, there is a
22 routing feature in the system, so it explains more in
23 detail. If there is a certain crime like a sex crime,
24 it can be routed to Sex Crimes so they get to pull it
25 up and review the report. So that's incorporated into

1 the policy.

2 We also added information in there related to
3 documenting evidence within the CRISNET report more
4 effectively. Also, the activity log, the daily
5 activities logs that officers prepare on a daily basis,
6 it gives more detail about stopping, proper
7 documentation related to the consent decree is used,
8 and documenting reasonable suspicion for traffic -- for
9 traffic stops, a reason to stop and/or frisk someone.

10 And those are -- some of those were -- like
11 the stop frisk requirement is a policy related to the
12 Department. We just thought it important to put it in
13 this policy, as well.

14 The next directive, 204.8, Environmental
15 Ordinances. Changes in there was the addition of
16 Blight Ordinances and Blight Violation Notices. And
17 how to issue those. And the Department administrative
18 blight code, and also we incorporated -- someone that's
19 been in the Department as long as I know too or going
20 back in the '90s, B tickets, they are tickets that's
21 been processed through the department through 36th
22 District Court for many years. It has not been in our
23 policy, per se. There were other documents summarized
24 it. We got -- we did a very good job, we got with the
25 Law Department, as well as the court, 36th District

1 Court, to make sure we got the policy more effectively.

2 Moving on to Detroit 302.1, Detroit Police
3 Reserves. This policy was revised. It also addresses
4 when Reserves discontinue service for the City, when
5 they no longer are going to provide reserve duty, it is
6 a volunteer effort, obviously. They are also given the
7 option of requesting and receiving a retirement badge
8 and I.D. And there is documentation in there on how
9 that's handled. And we also incorporated what's in our
10 other policies, the very critical issue of firing at or
11 from a moving vehicle. That is incorporated into the
12 policy. Same way we do on that issue, we just wanted
13 to make sure it was in their policy related to that, as
14 well.

15 The next directive, 302.3, Licenses and
16 Permits. This was revised to incorporate procedures,
17 more details about processing and requesting party --
18 block party event requests, as well as registration
19 requirements. And another -- we had this in another
20 procedure. We thought it important also to incorporate
21 some of the precious metal and gem dealers, there is
22 certain city ordinances that had to be filed, so we
23 incorporated that information into this policy to make
24 sure it was followed, followed properly, had to get a
25 certificate from the City Police Department

1 specifically, when they do artisan-type work. And also
2 incorporates the concealed pistol license procedure.
3 Basically, people have to go to the County to seek
4 that, and seek a permit through that process.

5 So those are the four we are seeking approval
6 on from this Board, currently. And I will go into the
7 other policies if there are no questions, I will maybe
8 entertain questions possibly before I go into the next
9 policies, if that's okay.

10 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Sure. Any questions of
11 the Commissioners?

12 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Yes, I have a couple
13 questions. 201.2, the Directives for the CRISNET, is
14 that, in your estimation, review time for officers
15 inputting -- I know stop and frisk, so after each kind
16 of investigation, is that going to be a new process
17 they have to go to report at that moment or --

18 DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: No, for investigatory,
19 handle frisk, they just have a check box now. They
20 check the box, if there is a frisk, they check the
21 frisk. They just have to document within the
22 circumstances of the note portion the reasonable
23 suspicion for the stop or the reason for the stop. It
24 could be they ran a red light. We have seen times
25 officers don't write the original, they wouldn't note

1 the registration form, so they put the reason so we
2 make it more very clear, they have got to write down
3 reason for stop, as well as if there is a frisk, they
4 have to document reasonable suspicion, they thought the
5 person was armed, possibly a danger, so they have to
6 document that information in there, as well.

7 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, sir.

8 And also under 302.3, License and Permits, so
9 in effect, particularly with the safety inspection of
10 handguns, could we be in the position to approve the
11 licensing of individuals that purchase firearms or
12 register firearms but, in fact, they have an unsafe
13 firearm in their possession? Who would be charged with
14 the safety inspection if not DPD?

15 COMMANDER JEFF ROMEO: That type of thing --
16 well, for them to be able to be able to carry a weapon,
17 under the concealed pistol license, they have to go
18 through the County on that. They still do have to
19 register the firearm with the City though the Police
20 Department, so we still would be responsible for that
21 function.

22 COMMISSIONER WHITE: But on the page that I
23 have, it states, This subsection was deleted per
24 Sergeant Lightfoot, states DPD no longer
25 conducts safety inspections.

1 COMMANDER JEFF ROMEO: The function, yeah,
2 the safety inspections, we no longer do that. I am
3 sorry. I misunderstood the question.

4 COMMISSIONER WHITE: So are you aware of what
5 transpires when an individual comes to DPD to register
6 that firearm? What does happen?

7 COMMANDER JEFF ROMEO: You know, I couldn't
8 go into detail. We have our subject matter experts
9 review this when they do review it. I couldn't tell
10 you the exact, you know, hands-on detail how they
11 proceed, process it, but I know we did have them review
12 this and give us the information about the policy on
13 it.

14 COMMISSIONER WHITE: The secretary had stated
15 the need for safety inspections before. I guess that
16 was why my concern. We just weren't in that position
17 of liability. That in effect we would have licenses
18 for equipment that was faulty, to begin with.

19 COMMANDER JEFF ROMEO: Oh, okay.

20 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, Chair.

21 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: I want to go back to
22 201.2 for a minute. If the system is down, do they
23 pick it back up?

24 THE WITNESS: Yes, sir. We have the old PCR,
25 we call it, preliminary complaint report, we utilize in

1 those instances.

2 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Okay. And the License
3 and Permits, for 302.3, again, that's being done away
4 with as relates to dances for teenagers and special
5 dances?

6 COMMANDER JEFF ROMEO: Could you refer to
7 the --

8 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: 302.3.

9 COMMANDER JEFF ROMEO: Okay.

10 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: It says teenage dances
11 especially has been deleted in its entirety. 302.3.

12 The rationale that we see on paper, I am just
13 verifying that the permits or the paper for permits are
14 not -- we haven't --

15 COMMANDER JEFF ROMEO: Yeah, what we learned
16 was that nobody was using that process. It was like an
17 extinct process nobody was utilizing. It has been
18 10 years since the form was last used, and that nobody
19 had been processing any of those throughout the City.
20 And at least that time evidently, and possibly longer.
21 And I know I never saw one of these. Sergeants do the
22 bulk of the work, and I was a community relations
23 sergeant for a little while before back in 1990's, and
24 I never saw one of those come through, and usually you
25 see that type of thing. And we did -- we do know

1 sometimes there are some things in our policy, we try
2 and identify them through these review processes to
3 identify processes that no longer exist. This one was
4 one, obviously.

5 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Okay. Then under that
6 same section, keep going down, regarding street closing
7 permits. I am trying to see what the exact change is
8 there on the street closing. It says revised approving
9 the application process for obtaining a special event
10 and application process guidelines and restrictions for
11 block parties. So are you saying that there is more --
12 a different application or paperwork or --

13 COMMANDER JEFF ROMEO: Yeah, one thing that
14 we noticed, too, in this procedure was that in the
15 guidelines, that was pretty extensive. They start on
16 page 3 and go on through page 5. We know that
17 sometimes the policy didn't have enough information in
18 there, and then we updated guidelines, as well. And a
19 lot of times, we have paper forms that were not posted
20 on the Intranet within the Department for access, so we
21 are trying to get as many policies or forms up on the
22 Intranet as possible to make sure they are updated and
23 the guidelines are updated, as well. So we updated the
24 guidelines, as well as the policy, and just to make
25 sure it is thoroughly explained what the process is.

1 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Now, you may not know the
2 answer to this question today, but if you don't, if you
3 get back to us, we would appreciate it. I know that
4 some groups and organizations have to pay for the
5 barricades. We own the barricades that are up, if the
6 streets are blocked off. Is that still true or --

7 COMMANDER JEFF ROMEO: Yes, it is.

8 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Is that a deposit? Or is
9 that a --

10 MS. McCANTS: It's a \$5 deposit. I am sorry.

11 COMMANDER JEFF ROMEO: Yeah, I believe it is
12 refundable, isn't it?

13 MS. McCANTS: They pick it up after the
14 barricaded party.

15 COMMANDER JEFF ROMEO: Yeah, it is. Okay. I
16 think she knows more about it than me.

17 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Okay. Any other
18 questions for Commander Romeo?

19 COMMANDER JEFF ROMEO: I can move into the
20 new Directives, try to get through these quickly
21 hopefully.

22 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Yes, sir.

23 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Chair, if I could,
24 before you proceed. Commander, is there a need for a
25 motion to approve those Directives at this point?

1 COMMANDER JEFF ROMEO: I would love to hear
2 that, if possible.

3 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Through the Chair, if it
4 be appropriate, I would move to accept the Directives
5 202.2, 203.7, and -- I am sorry, is it the four, it is
6 four? I apologize. I will make a motion, Mr. Chair,
7 to approve written Directives, Directive 201.2, 204.8,
8 302.1, and 302.3 as presented.

9 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Support.

10 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: It has been properly
11 moved and supported that we approve those Directives.
12 Is there anymore discussion?

13 Hearing and seeing none, all those in favor
14 of approving the Directives.

15 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

16 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: All those opposed?
17 Motion carries.

18 Thank you, sir.

19 COMMANDER JEFF ROMEO: All right. Okay. The
20 other Directives that I am here for is Directive -- I
21 will start out with Directive 401.2, which is a very
22 short policy, two-page policy on transfers.

23 We updated the language in the policy with
24 the help of Sergeant Henning, thankfully,
25 police personnel, and also -- there weren't very

1 significant changes. One of the things that the policy
2 did require was the officers to be notified
3 specifically if their transfer was processed and
4 approved. You know, first police personnel maintains
5 transfer lists for all these, and they update on a
6 regular basis, so that was taken out. The officers
7 need to check once their transfer is approved, whether
8 it is on the list or not.

9 One of the other significant changes we had,
10 this was an initial policy also, for our Management
11 Awareness System. It requires that a patrol supervisor
12 within seven days of them being transferred into that
13 entity, say someone actually works where I work, my
14 sergeant gets assigned to that police officer, has to
15 review that member's profile within the Management
16 Awareness System to look at their training issues,
17 training needs, whether they have had any support
18 issues or citizen complaints. Look at their record
19 related to any type of work performance issues so that
20 they're aware of what type of worker they are going to
21 have coming. So it is not going to tell them the whole
22 story. It is going to give them a slice of what that
23 person is about. So we incorporated that into this
24 policy. It is in the Management Awareness Policy, as
25 well.

1 And then the next directive is 203.7,
2 Organized Crime, Vice and Narcotics. The policy was
3 updated, too, similar to the other policy we talked
4 about, about routing reports. It was updated clearly
5 to delineate the personnel reports related to illegal
6 gambling, liquor activities routed to vice, via this
7 process. There weren't a whole lot of changes in this
8 policy. Sometimes it is just language, made up a
9 little bit of modification to the language issues.
10 There weren't any other significant change in that
11 policy.

12 One other of the other policies, Lieutenant
13 Bliss wishes he could be here too, but
14 202.2, the search and seizure policy, there were a lot
15 of changes made to this policy. Second Deputy Chief
16 Falvo and Lieutenant Bliss
17 collaborated on this policy to update it to make sure
18 that it met all the standards for constitutionality
19 issues, and issues related to the consent decree, as
20 well. And they expanded the policy. It was about
21 10 pages, it's 16 pages now. They expanded the issues
22 related to consent searches significantly. Some of the
23 issues are trained by our legal instructor, who was
24 Second Deputy Chief Falvo, are incorporated in here.
25 You will see on certain aspects that he teaches is

1 about tier one encounters with citizens, which are
2 informational encounters. You have got tier two
3 encounters with citizens, which are investigative
4 detentions of citizens. And then tier three, which are
5 arrests. And he goes into detail what all those mean.
6 What you can do. What you can't do. He goes into
7 information about stops and frisks, as well as
8 consensual pat downs, information like that. And also
9 here we had information on routing and frisk reports --
10 or no, I am sorry, I am looking at the other policy for
11 a second. But it covers a lot of information. They
12 collaborated for months on this, so the last time they
13 finally sent e-mails, communications about this, Second
14 Deputy Chief Falvo said this was about 20 -- updated
15 revision they had between them trying to get this thing
16 to fruition. So they are very proud of this work. And
17 I am, as well.

18 So like I said, we have posted this policy on
19 the Internet and made it available for the public to
20 review and for any input. And we will keep it posted
21 until the next time the Board entertains it for
22 approval. Hopefully in the next few weeks or so.

23 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Okay. All right. Any
24 other questions for Commandeer Romeo?

25 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Just for the record,

1 what portion of the website are those Directives posted
2 on?

3 COMMANDER JEFF ROMEO: If anybody goes to the
4 Detroit Police Website, www.detroitmi.gov, once you are
5 on that website, you click on -- off to the right,
6 there is a tab on the left side, left-hand side of the
7 Web page, there is a list of a couple different
8 commands there. Office of Civil Rights is listed.
9 Once you click on that tab, it is going to be right
10 front and center on the top, on that page.

11 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Any other questions?

12 Thank you. Appreciate it.

13 DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: Through the Chair,
14 Commander Romeo, can we share with the Board at this
15 point the latest -- is that out yet?

16 COMMANDER JEFF ROMEO: Oh.

17 DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: Can we share that?

18 COMMANDER JEFF ROMEO: Yes.

19 DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: Will you do that?

20 COMMANDER JEFF ROMEO: Yes. Commissioners,
21 related to the consent decree, the last report just
22 came out Monday, the compliance rate is 90 percent,
23 currently, we are in compliance with 157 of the 175
24 paragraphs. And we are 95 percent compliance rate with
25 the conditions of the final consent judgment. There

1 are only three paragraphs that are not in compliance.

2 And then use of force in the consent
3 judgment, we are in compliance with approximately
4 96 percent of -- or 86 percent of the paragraphs. So
5 we are very -- progressing very well with this. And
6 the Board support with every -- all the efforts we have
7 had with the consent decree, we appreciate. As well as
8 OCI's, tremendous work related to efforts towards the
9 plans, as well. It has been a very long, long modern
10 use of the word "slog" is a summary. I made sure that
11 I looked at the definition. It said it is a long,
12 hardworking process, so it is like people are working
13 hard to get through this process, and definitely have.

14 DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: And if I may, what's
15 significant about achieving the 95 percent in the
16 district? That means we have achieved better than
17 94 percent, so we have actually satisfied that
18 conditions of compliance. However, we talked about
19 fatality, that's totality, that's why we are in the 90s
20 uses forward, moving forward with all processes, our
21 policy. What it shows is that we are doing things
22 right. And again, we are at a point where it is just
23 crossing Ts and dotting Is. There is a lot of
24 documenting issues, but we are definitely working on
25 policy, organization, culture change, about the way

1 they do business, and people should know that your
2 police, Detroit Police Department, are doing things the
3 right way. All of the things that cause us to have
4 this change in policy, is now becoming ingrained as
5 department culture. So I think all -- especially
6 Commander Romeo and all the people over at fullner crib
7 (phonetic) now, Office of Civil Rights, OCI, everybody
8 who has drilled down to the minutia to achieve this
9 rating, they have been doing this for a long time, I
10 think about 10 years, and I think they deserve a round
11 of applause and/or acclimation for a good job.

12 (Applause).

13 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Certainly we join in that
14 congratulations. I think most notable is the progress
15 that's been made in the last three years. It has been
16 almost like lightening speed, if you consider the
17 significant amount of progress that's been made in that
18 time period. I certainly want to thank the Chief's
19 staff and command staff and all of the officers,
20 certainly, so it has been a collective for which is
21 again, this is not a consent decree thing, these are
22 new policies, and you are actually right, Chief, tells
23 the new culture, new culture in the Department, Police
24 Department. Thank you.

25 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you.

1 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: One second.

2 At this point, I wanted to make an
3 announcement that our next meeting will be Thursday,
4 April 11, 3:00 p.m., Police Headquarters,
5 1300 Beaubien, Room 328-A. Certainly look forward to
6 seeing you all there.

7 I want to go back to the agenda for just
8 one minute. And we want to adopt a resolution that
9 will be read for Mrs. Parker at this time.

10 COMMISSIONER WHITE: I move we acknowledge
11 Mrs. Ruth Parker for her giving spirit of community
12 service to the Northeastern District by adopting the
13 resolution herein.

14 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Support.

15 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: It has been properly
16 moved and supported that we adopt Mrs. Parker's
17 resolution. And will be part of our permanent
18 archives. All those in favor?

19 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

20 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: All those opposed?
21 Motion carries.

22 I also want to make a correction with the
23 date I just announced. It should be Thursday,
24 April 18, 2013, is our next meeting.

25 At this time the floor is open for oral

1 communications. If you wish to address the Board of
2 Police Commissioners, you can come to the mic right
3 now.

4 Please come to the mic and give us your full
5 name for the record, and we ask that you would abide by
6 our two-minute time limit. And Mr. Brown at the table
7 will close your time.

8 BARBARA HARDING: Good evening.

9 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Good evening.

10 BARBARA HARDING: My name is Barbara Harding.
11 And I am out of Northwest Detroit, over there,
12 Greenfield, Grandmont, and my precinct is 6th and 8th
13 precinct.

14 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Yes, ma'am.

15 BARBARA HARDING: And I just want to know,
16 because I don't understand a lot that's going on now,
17 it don't matter, or does it? what you decide to do with
18 whatever. Doesn't it have to go before that -- what is
19 that man, the Emergency Manager, he is over the Mayor
20 and City Council, and these people have nothing to do
21 with what you are doing?

22 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Ma'am, I will answer your
23 question. The Detroit City Charter was not suspended
24 when the Emergency Manager came, so we are going to
25 still carry out our duties as part of this democratic

1 process. And so we will do what we need to do and pass
2 that work forward. What happens to it after we pass it
3 forward is certainly up to the administration and the
4 Emergency Manager working together. So we are going to
5 do everything that we need to do on our end. And then
6 we will let the chips at that level fall where they
7 may.

8 BARBARA HARDING: I need to know one more
9 thing. What's wrong with the Chief you got here? Why
10 would you need to go all over the country to find
11 somebody else? Ain't he capable of, you know, doing
12 the job here?

13 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Yes, ma'am --

14 BARBARA HARDING: Wouldn't it be much more
15 reasonable to have -- instead of going -- Florida or
16 wherever you go to find somebody else?

17 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: I think you bring up an
18 excellent question, ma'am, absolutely. I mean, what we
19 have to do, the city charter voted on by the residents
20 of the city says when there is a vacancy, we have to
21 conduct a search. And so certainly as this Police
22 Chief applies for that job, he would be considered. At
23 the end of the day, the Mayor makes that decision on
24 who the Police Chief is going to be. But we are
25 mandated by the Detroit City Charter to conduct a

1 search, as the citizens have voted for us to do so.
2 But he is absolutely eligible to apply for that
3 position, yes, ma'am.

4 BARBARA HARDING: Oh, he haven't applied for
5 it?

6 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: I am not sure if he has
7 applied for it or not because we don't get those.
8 Those go straight to the search company.

9 BARBARA HARDING: Okay. Thank you.

10 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you. Appreciate
11 you coming in.

12 MS. CAMPBELL: Good evening.

13 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Good evening.

14 MS. CAMPBELL: My name is Misha (phonetic)
15 Campbell. I am coming to give you an update. I am
16 still having the same exact problem that I brought to
17 you all in the last two, three sessions. It has not
18 improved.

19 I am also letting you know that in these last
20 two-and-a-half, going on three weeks, I have
21 experienced the most disrespectful behavior from your
22 telephone crime report line dealing with either
23 officers not wanting to identify themselves, and a
24 sergeant that defends that type of action, as well as
25 not even having respect and getting help in a matter

1 where two gentlemen is committing illegal crimes of
2 solicitation. I had to watch one on opening day make
3 over 475,000 after selling heroin and cocaine. And it
4 is like, the officer that should have been assigned to
5 the case didn't care. I was lied to by a gentleman
6 that is here, was going to call and try to get someone
7 to work with me, and he did not keep his word.

8 So I am very much so disappointed that I have
9 to keep coming back here, and not having any good news
10 to give you all, that I am still yet being threatened
11 and harassed. But yet, deal with exceedingly ghettofy,
12 indignant unprofessionalism when trying to make a
13 police report by phone, something that should be the
14 right of any citizen and taxpayer within this
15 particular city; that that is not being done, because
16 you have operators that quick to get on a ghettofied
17 attitude when you ask them if you're -- if you're
18 operator nine, and you just give your name, why
19 wouldn't you want to give your badge number? If you
20 are not going to identify yourself by operator number,
21 you should operate you should identify yourself at
22 least by a badge number, and that is not taking place.

23 So I just wanted to make sure that I made you
24 all aware that I am still not getting the help. And I
25 am still am being played by these two gentlemen that

1 are illegally soliciting right now as we are in this
2 meeting, at Motor City Casino, which is a Joe Perry and
3 an Eric Sykes, and it has not stopped. I am still yet
4 being threatened. I have went and took the advice from
5 City Council and took pictures and showing how this
6 gentleman approaches me, and threatening coming up to
7 me. And I have pictures to show any of you that might
8 be concerned. Looking at the faces, I don't see that
9 it would be a care whether I live or die.

10 So let me not take up any of your time. I
11 appreciate each of you all allowing me to speak.

12 Thank you, Mr. White, for attempting to be
13 courteous enough to return a call to me. I am sorry
14 that apparently, he wasn't able to get any of these
15 people here to help me. All I have been treated is
16 lied to, with false promises, I will call you back in
17 15 minutes. And then the same person that tell me that
18 they are going to call me back in 15 minutes ducks and
19 dodges and lies for an officer that won't even return
20 my call. And I am starting to take it personal.
21 Either this is happening because I am black. Or it is
22 happening because I am a woman. Either way it go, I
23 deserve to be treated with proper respect. When you
24 are being threatened by a man that's 350 pounds,
25 carries a 9-millimeter on him and keeps a bulletproof

1 vest, that's something to be concerned with, when all
2 you trying to do is make a living.

3 I am not trying to take up anybody's time,
4 but I am speaking because you never know, my time may
5 be up, or I might be assassinated. I may be just one
6 of the drivers you happen to hear on a regular basis
7 being assassinated. And I want my voice to be heard
8 that I have come to you all multiple times, and you all
9 can't seem to help me.

10 I also wanted it to be noted in the last
11 session when I came to 1300 Beaubien, when Chief Lester
12 Logan -- not -- Logan was here, I was given a phone
13 number for the owner of Checker Cab where he proceeded
14 in making me aware that he has never been contacted by
15 no officer, no sergeant, no commander, no inspector,
16 that this kind of behavior is going on with his
17 drivers. Had he been contacted, he would have
18 immediately sought disciplinary action. And
19 disciplinary action, according to him, dismissal. And
20 that has not happened.

21 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Okay. Ms. Campbell, if
22 you can stay right there. You don't have to sit down.
23 Commissioner White also wants to address you.

24 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, Ms. Campbell,
25 for coming yet again. I do want to first of all once

1 again apologize, as I have done before, that you
2 believe that this body or this department has not done
3 something or everything within its power to address
4 your concerns. But I do want to reiterate a couple of
5 things and shed some light on another few things.

6 I know you have been in consultation with a
7 few members of City Council. We have been in
8 discussion with them, as well, as relates to your case.
9 From your initial call, or your initial arrival to this
10 body, we referred your matter over to our Office of
11 Chief Investigator, who has began an investigation into
12 everything that you have shared with us. Currently
13 Investigator White is still moving that process
14 forward.

15 On the Department side, you were matched with
16 Inspector Carey Ackoo (phonetic), who also sent members
17 of his team to Motor City Casino to do a thorough
18 investigation. That investigation since that time has
19 been completed and forwarded to the Wayne County
20 Prosecutor's Office.

21 When I followed up with you at that time, you
22 had some concerns that we had not approached Checker
23 Cab to have this particular individual fired or
24 terminated from his job. I attempted to share with you
25 that that would not be within the purview of this

1 organization, as a department. The role, the function
2 that members of this department would serve is to
3 collect the information, put together the
4 investigation, and deliver that to the Wayne County
5 Prosecutor's Office, who it will be up to her purview
6 to decide if she would press charges, and what kind of
7 ramifications would come from that.

8 So as a recommendation, you have been placed
9 as a priority to make sure that individuals are
10 addressing your concerns. We do take your concerns
11 extremely serious in nature, as you have stated
12 multiple occasions, you are in effect fearful of this
13 individual, who you seem to come across on a regular
14 basis.

15 My recommendation to you at this point would
16 be to follow up with your Wayne County Prosecutor's
17 Office to see where that investigation is so they can
18 hear your concerns. And you would be able to keep
19 apprised as that investigation goes through their
20 office.

21 But this -- I would assure you that this --
22 not only this Board, but this Department has done
23 everything within its purview to move. And it might
24 not be to your satisfaction, as I can tell by your
25 face. But unfortunately, it is not within our power to

1 go and remove someone from their job at Checker Cab.

2 MS. CAMPBELL: That's common sense. I
3 respect that. I can tell you I have already been in
4 contact with the Prosecutor's Office, just in giving a
5 follow-up to you. And I still feel that nothing is
6 being done because it is difficult to get in touch with
7 Carey Ackoo many times, as he is here now to my right,
8 has not even returned my calls.

9 That's why I am disappointed because I hate a
10 liar. And I call a spade a spade.

11 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Ms. Campbell --

12 THE WITNESS: I am so sorry, Mr. Warfield,
13 but I just wanted to make that known because I have to
14 keep coming every week. So if I have to keep coming
15 every week until maybe you all get it straightened out,
16 I will.

17 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Well, ma'am --

18 MS. CAMPBELL: I won't take up anybody's
19 time. I was talking while I am still alive because I
20 may not be alive tomorrow.

21 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: All right, ma'am. Thank
22 you.

23 MR. WILD: Good afternoon, Board.

24 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Good afternoon, sir.

25 MR. WILD: Billy Wild, CEO of City Auto

1 Storage and Independent Brokers, authorized police
2 towers.

3 Authorized police towing is a 24/7, 365 a
4 year job.

5 On the surface, 53 percent increase in the
6 tow rate may sound high. But in 1996, 17 years ago, a
7 tow truck cost 80 -- excuse me, cost 20 some thousand
8 dollars. And in 2013 that same tow truck is \$94,000.
9 Diesel fuel in '96 was about a buck a gallon. Today it
10 is \$4 a gallon. Truck insurance back then was about
11 \$600. Today it is almost \$5,000.

12 Under our towing rules that we operate on, or
13 by, we have to indemnify the City of Detroit on
14 liability issues and whatnot. In 1996, that liability
15 insurance was like \$5,000. Today it is over \$20,000.

16 So the tow rates really are fair. And the
17 common citizen isn't affected by these tow rates. It
18 is -- if you are breaking the law, the police will have
19 your vehicle towed. And that's the bottom line on
20 that. And again, I support the increase. Thank you.

21 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, sir.

22 SALEM MERAM: Good afternoon, everybody.

23 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Good afternoon, sir.

24 SALEIM MERAM: My name is Salem Meram. I am
25 retired. I spent 25 years in Detroit as a teacher.

1 And I know I went to eight to ten schools. I was here,
2 not in this building, a week, last week, and I
3 suggested that we should have -- we should meet with
4 parents, to listen to their needs and wants, and to
5 work with police, can help them. At the same time, in
6 what way they can help police also.

7 I had a long talk with -- I am from Sacred
8 Heart Church that's on Seven Mile between Woodward and
9 John R. I talked to Father Sameem Balius. He was
10 supposed to come with me. He apologized and just
11 mention that every -- if it is possible to send a
12 police car every Sunday between 11:00 and 1:00. We
13 don't have -- right now we don't have any problem. I
14 was there. I serve in church for 12 years. And I quit
15 for one week. Then I came back. We do not have any
16 problem.

17 But I tell you we have people who can help.
18 People can do drywall, electricity, roofing, if you
19 need them, they are ready.

20 At the same time, we suggested that you
21 conduct meeting in our church, because police can --
22 used to go to the church, Chaldean Community Center.
23 That's close. And it is huge, and everything is
24 available. We can be -- we will be more than happy if
25 you come there. And I suggest we will start from Eight

1 Mile, Seven Mile, Six Mile, calling parents to come and
2 attend, the first meeting. Then we will go from Seven
3 to Five, Four, every month as possible.

4 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you.

5 SALEM MERAM: Thank you.

6 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: I am going to ask, sir,
7 if you can get with Deputy Chief Turner as well as with
8 Mr. Robert Brown and they can help you as relates to
9 trying to plan a meeting there at the church. And we
10 can go from there. Right after the meeting.

11 SALEM MERAM: Thank you very much.

12 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Good to see you again,
13 sir.

14 MR. ERRIGO: Chief, how are you doing? Greg
15 Errigo, E-r-r-i-g-o, Michigan Auto Recovery Service,
16 Incorporated, City of Detroit Police Pound Yard. I am
17 a little late to the meeting. I apologize. I was told
18 that 53 percent was too much of an increase possibly,
19 if I remember.

20 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Could you address your
21 comments to me, sir?

22 MR. ERRIGO: I was told 53 percent was a
23 little bit of an outrageous percentage of an increase
24 for the City of Detroit towers to get. The way it came
25 to the price of 125, and 15 after the first day, \$50 a

1 car was through collaboration with the Reverend and the
2 Tow Rate Commission, who absolutely 110 percent turned
3 every stone over, looked at every opportunity to do
4 everything for the citizens, the City of Detroit, the
5 towers, and everybody involved, with our increases that
6 we are faced with every day. As Mr. Wild said, the
7 increases are more than 53 percent across the board.
8 We haven't got an increase since '96. What would put
9 us back in line is if we went back to 125, \$15 after
10 the first day, and \$50 a car to the City of Detroit.
11 Because 53 percent increase comes out, the City is
12 asking for \$75 per car increase. The City deservingly
13 should get money. But at the expense of the towers,
14 what we have to put out to operate our daily business
15 shouldn't get penalized for the City wanting \$2,500 a
16 car. I was very happy with giving them the \$50 a car,
17 plus they took our ABANs, which they are getting the
18 scrap from. That's a big, big, big, big cut into our
19 pie. The scrap is what we were making our living on.
20 Now the biggest percentage of our scrap which is your
21 ABANs, we don't have anymore. The City of Detroit has
22 it. So what I feel would be fair is that 23 percent
23 increase of 125 for the towers, \$15 after the first
24 day, \$50 to the City. Plus they have our ABANs. If
25 you want to look at it that way, that's 400 percent

1 they took.

2 And again, I am not here to have a complaint.
3 I am here to voice my opinion. And I am trying to get
4 this problem resolved. It was corrected once. It was
5 agreed once. And we opened up the door again. I never
6 see nothing like this in my life, Reverend.

7 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, sir. Thank
8 you, sir.

9 BRENDA HILL: Good evening.

10 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: I'm sorry. Can we have
11 your name?

12 BRENDA HILL: Oh, my name is Brenda Hill.

13 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you.

14 BRENDA HILL: I don't care about the towers.

15 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Will you pull the
16 microphone closer?

17 BRENDA HILL: I can tell him his co-workers
18 move out.

19 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Could we have your name?

20 BRENDA HILL: My name is Brenda Hill,
21 H-i-l-l.

22 I don't care about him.

23 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Put the mic close.

24 BARBARA HARDING: My name is Brenda Hill.

25 And April the 9th, 2009, it was four years since my son

1 Brandon Rogers, he was 22, and his friend Melinda
2 Goodwin, she was 19, was murdered on the streets of
3 Detroit. He was walking her and her friends to her
4 car. He received a bullet in back of the head for it.
5 She received three in the chest.

6 Since then, we have had four police chiefs.
7 Chief Barren lied to me to my face. Chief Warren lied
8 to me to my face. Godbee was the worst. And I am sad
9 to say that I haven't even bothered Interim Chief
10 Logan.

11 It is a shame that I have done everything to
12 keep this case relevant. And I can't even go to the
13 Police Chief.

14 These were two college students. And nobody
15 is trying to find these killers. We are all unsafe
16 right now. And because I have to spend every day
17 keeping this case relevant, while more babies, more
18 people, are losing their lives in the city, it is a sad
19 shame.

20 These guys standing here talking about towing
21 fees. We don't ever have to tow a car again. Go
22 across Eight Mile, if you don't think you getting
23 enough money from us here.

24 My son does not breathe while they stand here
25 with this garbage.

1 We are doing something wrong. If nobody
2 believes that I deserve resolution, if nobody believes
3 that almost 2,000 people that have died since then
4 deserves some resolution, we can stop this farce right
5 now.

6 And I can say I will help anybody, anybody,
7 if we can stop the loss of life. I am not getting the
8 help from the people who should be helping me.

9 MS. CAMPBELL: That's right.

10 BRENDA HILL: And we need to change that. If
11 anybody has any information about that crime or any
12 other crime, I would hope you have the courage to
13 contact the police, it's important to do that, but if
14 you cannot, please call 1-800-SpeakUp.

15 Thank you.

16 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, Ms. Hill.

17 I am going to ask, Ms. Hill, that Deputy
18 Chief Tolbert after the meeting --

19 THE WITNESS: He knows the case very well.

20 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Exactly. Yes, ma'am. If
21 he can have someone get with her so that she can be
22 provided an update next week, if the Board can be
23 provided an update, as well, as to status of the case.
24 And if it has to be sealed to protect her son's
25 identity -- not his identity but, you know, information

1 surrounding, it certainly can be sealed, but she needs
2 an update and we do too. Thank you.

3 BRENDA HILL: I would like to say there are
4 three witnesses that were there, and the last time I
5 spoke to useless Wayne Blackman, he told me he legally
6 could not ask them, subpoena them to come in and
7 reinterview. But I said, you can ask them. He said to
8 me to my face he would not do that.

9 MS. CAMPBELL: Thank you. That's what they
10 all do.

11 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, Ms. Hill.

12 MR. SCOTT: My name is Ron Scott. I am with
13 the Detroit Coalition Against Police Brutality.

14 To Ms. Hill's point, I am also -- major
15 project is Peace Zones for Life, and we are focusing on
16 deescalation, violence reduction, and trying to stop
17 people from killing one another also.

18 To that end, I would like to start, I know I
19 have several things to mention, try to make it brief.

20 I would like to thank the Commission, and I
21 would like to also thank visiting -- both Chair
22 Warfield, and all of you for stepping up more so than
23 many other previous Boards have on various fronts. So
24 if people tell you that you are not doing your job, I
25 think you are trying to do the job on very difficult

1 circumstances.

2 And that includes the towing fees. And I
3 appreciate your stand in relationship to that.

4 To Deputy Chief Tolbert, mentioned a change
5 in culture. I know you and I have talked prior many
6 times. And some points we have disagreed on. Most of
7 them, we agree on. And I think the true measure of the
8 culture changing is to render a consequence for those
9 who do not follow. And you have been consistent with
10 making sure that that happens. And I would encourage
11 you to continue that.

12 Finally, what I want to say is perhaps I have
13 been remiss and some have been remiss, in terms of
14 following the online presence about the Directives.
15 Because I am concerned about the ones which focus on
16 the interface between probable cause and reasonable
17 suspicion. I think that's where we get into trouble in
18 terms of the Fourth Amendment. I would ask the body if
19 you would consider a discussion, a larger discussion
20 with the community, about probable cause and reasonable
21 suspicion, so that we can talk about that. And also
22 voluntary searches. We have had many people come to
23 our office who are voluntary, may not have been as
24 voluntary as one might expect.

25 So within that context, the final thing I

1 want to say as I talk to the public safety public
2 information officer, Sergeant Stephens, about 8300 Grand
3 River, the shooting, I would like to encourage
4 everybody in the city to really make a special effort
5 to see if at that site, we can figure out what really
6 happened and why. Because this speaks just like what
7 she was talking about. Why are these kinds of things
8 happening? What motivates that?

9 A very good friend of mine had an office at
10 that place, Dr. Kirschenbaum. Dr. Kirschenbaum had one
11 of the largest collections of boxing memorabilia, Joe
12 Louis memorabilia. He gave free service to many people
13 who could not afford it. And I would like to find out
14 if any of that memorabilia is retained. It is as
15 important to the history of the City of Detroit as the
16 pavement. And I would like to hope that we -- if we
17 interface with the fire department, that you try to
18 retrieve some of that, and see if we can trade some
19 information, not just about the fact that two people
20 died, fire, several people are left without jobs, but
21 why did that particular circumstance happen, and what
22 we can do to deal with it in the future. Because I
23 think it is not enough just to solve a murder. We have
24 to know why they happened and why people get to that
25 point of stress.

1 So with that having been said, have a good
2 evening.

3 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Mr. Scott, here is what
4 we will do. I am going to ask if you can get with
5 Mr. Brown because I think that is an excellent
6 discussion to have regarding probable cause and
7 reasonable searches. And we definitely need to do
8 that. So if you all can get together, schedule a
9 proper day so we can have proper form, we would love to
10 do what.

11 MR. SCOTT: Okay. So thank you all again for
12 putting in an effort, for all of the money that you
13 made, \$50 that you get.

14 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Anybody else? He was
15 being sarcastic, by the way.

16 Yes, sir?

17 MR. STIDHAM: Good afternoon, Board. Thomas
18 Stidham, appearing because as I said previously, I
19 reference police-authorized towers, I am not going to
20 belabor, restate what's already been said. But I do
21 want to join Ron's appreciation as far as his
22 leadership on several key issues that are facing the
23 City. One of which, while it may not be as important
24 obviously to certain people, with respect to the
25 increase in the towing rates, and I know that this

1 Board does have a role to play as part of the
2 recommendation of those rates, and I would certainly
3 just ask that this body consider a resolution
4 supporting the recommendation of the Towing Rate
5 Commission and other stakeholders that have weighed in
6 on that at one of its regular meetings.

7 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Thank you, sir. I will
8 ask that's added to the paragraphs.

9 MR. STIDHAM: Thank you.

10 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Anyone else?

11 Hearing, seeing none, we will close that
12 section of our meeting.

13 Are there any announcements, sir, from the
14 department side?

15 If you were here earlier, there is a
16 fundraiser going on for the one officer that was
17 wounded. Do we have any idea when that fundraiser is
18 going to take place?

19 DEPUTY CHIEF TOLBERT: Give me one second.

20 CHAIRMAN WARFIELD: Sure.

21 DEPUTY CHIEF TURNER: Thank you very much.
