3 About 6:45 p.m.

4 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Good evening and welcome  
5 to the Board of Police Commissioners meeting.

6 I'm Commissioner Jessica Taylor. Joining me  
7 is Commissioner Vice Chair Donnell White. Commissioner  
8 Warfield may be enroute or he may not come. I'm not  
9 sure if he's going to be here or not. And also joining  
10 us from the Chief's Office is Assistant Chief  
11 Eric Ewing.

12 Mr. Secretary, will you introduce the rest of  
13 the staff, please.

14 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you, Madam Chair.  
15 For the record, George Anthony, Secretary to the Board.  
16 We have present Ms. Pamela Davis Drake seated in the  
17 front, she is our Chief Investigator. Inspector  
18 Lashinda Houser who's representing the Personnel  
19 Division. We also have Mr. Robert Brown, our Office  
20 Manager seated to the right. We have recording our  
21 proceedings Officer Kent Cooper, Sergeant Alan Quinn,  
22 and Ms. Beth Koller from Hanson Court Reporting  
23 Service. That completes the introduction of staff.

24 But if the Board would permit me, I would  
25 also like to introduce from Wayne County Community

1 College my law enforcement students, my law enforcement  
2 students from Criminal Law and Justice. They're in the  
3 audience. And would you stand so we can see you?

4 (Applause.)

5 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you, ma'am. That  
6 completes the introductions.

7 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Let me introduce at this  
8 time I would also like to introduce men from the Chance  
9 for Life Program, if you can stand. They're mediators  
10 for the Chance For Life Program.

11 (Applause.)

12 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Is Chaplain Powell here?  
13 Okay. Sir, if you could come and give us a word or  
14 prayer.

15 CHAPLAIN POWELL: Let's look to the Lord.  
16 Lord our Grace, in the name of Jesus, we thank and  
17 praise you, Lord, for just looking down upon us and  
18 blessing us, Lord God, this day.

19 Lord, this is the day that you have made and  
20 we'll rejoice and be glad in it. Asking you, Lord God,  
21 just to look down on our Mayor, Lord God, his staff,  
22 look down upon our Officers, Lord God, and our Chief,  
23 look down up this Commission, Lord God, and we ask you  
24 to bless and strengthen, bring their minds together and  
25 let your blessing be upon them. In Jesus name.

1 Lord God, we asking you to just look down  
2 upon our Officers, watch over them and protect them,  
3 Lord God, as they protect the citizens of this great  
4 City. Lord, we ask that you just bless each and  
5 everyone of us that are here today. Help us, Lord God,  
6 to draw our minds together, Lord, so that not only that  
7 we serve, but that we may serve, Lord God, the citizens  
8 of this great City.

9 Bless us and strengthen us. Give us that  
10 that we need and help us to do your blessed will, and  
11 Lord God, help us to come out with the victory. In  
12 Jesus name. Amen.

13 AUDIENCE: Amen.

14 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: We're happy to be here  
15 at the Boy Scouts of America. Is there a  
16 representative from the Boy Scouts? Okay. Well, we  
17 appreciate the hospitality.

18 At this time I'm going to ask the Vice Chair  
19 if he would read the duties and responsibilities of the  
20 Board.

21 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Good evening to  
22 everyone.

23 AUDIENCE: Good evening.

24 COMMISSIONER WHITE: The Board of Police  
25 Commissioners were created by City Charter July 1st,

1 1974. It's composition currently is comprised of five  
2 members which are appointed by the Mayor and confirmed  
3 by City Council.

4 The Commissioners serve five-year terms and  
5 may not serve more than five years consecutively. The  
6 Commissioners meet once a week. They have recess  
7 during Thanksgiving and Christmas and New Year's  
8 holidays. All meeting are open to the public.

9 The duties of the Board of the Police  
10 Commissioner are to establish policy, rules and  
11 regulations in consultation with the Chief and the  
12 approval of the Mayor, to review and approve the  
13 Department budget, to review and approve Department  
14 promotions, to receive and resolve complaints  
15 concerning the operation of the Police Department, and  
16 to act as the final authority to impose and review  
17 discipline of the Department employees.

18 Also to appoint Civilian Personnel Director  
19 and to prepare an annual report of Department  
20 activities for the public, the Mayor, and the City  
21 Council. Its staff consist of an Executive Secretary  
22 who serves as Secretary to the Board and attends all  
23 Board meetings, a Chief Investigator and additional  
24 Investigators, and other staff as necessary to provide  
25 support to the Board.

1           The Police Commission consider itself a  
2 liaison between the citizens of the City of Detroit and  
3 the Detroit Police Department.

4           CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Thank you. At this  
5 time, do you have a report, sir --

6           A.C. EWING: Yes.

7           CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: -- from the Chief's  
8 Office?

9           A.C. EWING: Currently right now I want to  
10 report that we are enjoying a slight decrease in  
11 overall crime all over. I'll give you some numbers.  
12 Outside currently right now were down ten percent  
13 homicides, six percent rapes, 11 percent reduction in  
14 aggravated assaults, 18 percent reduction breaking and  
15 enterings, one percent reduction in stolen vehicles.

16           We're currently up about three percent in  
17 robberies, and about eight percent in larcenies.  
18 However, if you look at the overall Department in  
19 crimes, we're enjoying a pretty good decrease at this  
20 particular point in time.

21           CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Thank you. Are there  
22 any questions, Commissioner?

23           COMMISSIONER WHITE: Just a couple quick  
24 questions, Assistant Chief. The number that's over  
25 from the previous week or?

1           A.C. EWING: This is year-to-date, this is  
2 year-to-date.

3           COMMISSIONER WHITE: Okay. In the part one  
4 crimes is carjacking fall in the Department?

5           A.C. EWING: Yes, they do.

6           COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you.

7           A.C. EWING: I think we have presentation  
8 from the Central District. Inspector Kyriacou will  
9 come up and introduce his staff.

10           INSPECTOR KYRIACOU: A.C. Ewing, Board. Like  
11 the A.C. said, the first thing I want to do is -- now  
12 that I've I broke it. First thing I want to do is  
13 recognize my staff. I have Lieutenant Shawn Gargalino,  
14 Acting Inspector for the 1st and 13th Precincts. I  
15 have Lieutenant Ilaseo Lewis, he's Acting Inspector for  
16 Gaming and Central Events, Lieutenant Darin Szilagy,  
17 who's in charge of our Special Ops Compuware Detail. I  
18 have Sergeant Lashanna Potts, she wears a couple hats.  
19 She's Admin Sergeant, the OJ Compliance Sergeant, the  
20 Community Relations and whatever we happen to throw at  
21 her on a given day to see that things get done.

22           And in back of the room I also have some very  
23 integral components of the operation at Central  
24 District. I have Officer Chris Gibson, a lot of you  
25 know him, he does a lot of our environmental

1 enforcement. He keeps a keen eye on the crime trends  
2 in the Midtown area. Officer Melvin Jones and John  
3 Pinchum they work our Central District 92 Homeless Car  
4 that takes care of a lot of the issues that we have  
5 with that group of people.

6 We also have Officer Larry Addison and  
7 Officer Thomas who works Special Ops. Also in Special  
8 Ops, Officer Garcia, Officer Greg Smith, and Officer  
9 Ray Hughes. Come on, show a little enthusiasm. A  
10 couple of them are going to get an award here in a  
11 minute.

12 With that we'll go into the report out here.  
13 The Central District encompasses roughly eleven square  
14 miles. The District is comprised of the 1st and 13th  
15 Precinct which is the patrol component of the  
16 operation. It's located at 7310 Woodward with Gaming  
17 Operations also now housed within 7310 Woodward for the  
18 last couple of years.

19 The Central Events component located at  
20 20 Atwater down right off the river. The District is  
21 bounded on the north with our border at Highland Park,  
22 roughly being Woodland Street to the east by Saint  
23 Aubin and the Chrysler Service Drive, on the west it's  
24 bounded roughly by John Lodge and West Grand Boulevard,  
25 and on the south by Michigan Avenue over to 14th East

1 to Atwater.

2 The population of the Central District swells  
3 to approximately 100,000 citizens during the day  
4 inclusive of persons traveling into the District for  
5 their employment and to various entertainment venues.

6 With the majestic resurgence of greater  
7 Downtown Detroit, the District handles numerous  
8 concerts, festivals, sporting events, games, and  
9 parades. The District is also the home of three  
10 casinos, Greek Town, MGM, and Motor City. An estimated  
11 100 to 150,000 people visit the casinos weekly.

12 In addition to all the activities Downtown,  
13 the District has a large residential area that we also  
14 serve. Downtown Detroit has become one of our premier  
15 neighborhoods with many new condominiums and apartments  
16 springing up. Within the District there are 23 schools  
17 including seven charter schools and two colleges within  
18 the borders of the Central District.

19 Some of our current initiatives underway  
20 within the Central District coming under Community  
21 Relations, they distribute crime alert bulletins to  
22 businesses in the District. Give a lot of safety  
23 reports and tips at block club meetings, security  
24 surveys for homeowners and businesses.

25 We have a summer youth program U-turn Program

1 that Officers Dorsey and Thomas, you know, administer  
2 that involves bringing kids in on Wednesdays for  
3 various programs, avoiding bullying, cybercrime safety,  
4 things like that, during the summer to keep them doing  
5 constructive things, and also that same group has Doing  
6 Good in the Neighborhood on Fridays for about eight  
7 weeks throughout the summer where they do different  
8 programs to help out in the community to keep them  
9 doing constructive things.

10 We've created a neighborhood walk every  
11 Friday night. The plan was for every Friday night  
12 during the summer to engage a neighborhood group and  
13 have a community walk. We were able to that three  
14 times at the north end of the Precinct.

15 But unfortunately as some people know in the  
16 room, Ms. Bridgett Vance passed away unexpectedly and  
17 untimely and surprisingly. It was a horrible loss to  
18 the community and to Focus Hope and to Vanguard Group  
19 where she worked as a community organizer. So that put  
20 a dent in our ability to that. And I just wanted to  
21 recognize all the wonderful things she did for the  
22 Police Department and City and her groups that she did  
23 organizing for.

24 As far as foot patrols, and that sort of  
25 thing, we've established foot patrols in Harmony Park,

1 Capital Park, New Center area, Greek Town, Financial  
2 District, and we've also newly created a Campus Martius  
3 beat to deal with all the various wonderful things that  
4 go on in the Campus Martius Park.

5 We have as I mentioned earlier as I was  
6 introducing Officers Pinchum and Jones, we have Central  
7 District 92 which is a car that is dedicated to support  
8 the placement of indigent citizens into shelters and  
9 deal with their various needs and services and also  
10 along with them they have a social worker from CAPPA  
11 the Citizens and Police Partnership Advocacy that rides  
12 with them and helps them with placements and social  
13 interaction action to get them whatever they happen to  
14 need at the moment to try to help them out.

15 We also recently created a Cork Town beat  
16 just to try to deal with some of the quality of life  
17 issues and engage the neighbors in Cork Town and get  
18 some of those issues shored up. We've partnered with  
19 the Central Business District Neighborhood Watch. It's  
20 a corporate block club that meets monthly; includes a  
21 lot of Downtown counterparts, Olympia Entertainment,  
22 Compuware, General Motors, Blue Cross, various people  
23 that have campuses downtown are part of the.

24 We've also been partnered with Midtown  
25 Neighborhood Watch. It's also a block club that

1 basically centers around the Midtown area. Wayne State  
2 University is highly involved and they have a program  
3 that we try to attend biweekly as much as possible and  
4 we share information with them.

5 As I stated before we have our thriving  
6 sports entertainment district which encompasses the two  
7 stadiums and all of the fun that that entails Downtown.  
8 And our Central Events Personnel under the tutelage of  
9 Lieutenant Lewis deals with all those various  
10 activities with very few people and do some amazing  
11 things Downtown.

12 So don't get too mad if they don't get you  
13 through those lights Downtown as quick as you'd like.  
14 They're doing the impossible with what they have. So  
15 we do our best with that. We've also increased our  
16 club detail in the Downtown district because of the  
17 number of bars that have popped up. We've had to deal  
18 with that issue.

19 We've created a strategy to try to deal with  
20 the parking issues and the larcenies that happen around  
21 those events Downtown. Quite awhile ago Lieutenant  
22 Szilagy came up with an advisory ticket that we would  
23 put on cars wherever we see them doing things that  
24 don't make a lot sense when they park their cars  
25 Downtown. Like putting a GPS in plane view or leaving

1 a laptop in plain sight inside a vehicle. It's kind of  
2 amazing that people will do that.

3 But what we found is it's kind of effective  
4 to fold that little piece of paper up. It looks like a  
5 ticket. They come up and they grab it thinking they  
6 got a parking ticket, and then it says, hey, sir,  
7 please, sir, or ma'am, please make sure you don't do  
8 this in the future. It's a little crime prevention  
9 tool that has great shock value and great relief value  
10 when they realize it's not a parking ticket. So we've  
11 been doing that for awhile to try to get people to  
12 understand that.

13 Another large problem that's been going on  
14 nationwide is the Apple picking phenomenon that's been  
15 going with the larcenies and robberies of people for  
16 their smart phones. Particularly Apple phones. And  
17 what we've been trying to combat that on a community  
18 relations front is to, we've got another flier that's  
19 Lieutenant Szilagy plagiarized from another Police  
20 Department. We're good at that, you know. And it  
21 explain why you shouldn't walk around with you iphone  
22 in your hand because you're basically walking around  
23 with the equivalent of five \$100 bills in your hand.  
24 And people wonder why people snatch them.

25 But there's a problem with the people who do

1 the thefts being able to get quick money for it and  
2 then as they go up online we're hearing that some of  
3 these are being shipped out of the country and worth a  
4 thousand or two by the time they get burned and  
5 reprogramed for use, you know, wherever they finally  
6 end up.

7           Also we found that it's been a very effective  
8 strategy to have those pamphlets and catch people in  
9 the Downtown area walking around like zombies hitting  
10 on their phone. You walk up to them and say, hey, you  
11 know, you don't want to do that, you could be a victim  
12 of crime. And it has a lot more shock value and  
13 learning value than just sending an email.

14           We've partnered up with a lot of corporate  
15 environments down there with their security, police and  
16 security together. And my wife particularly coming  
17 back from lunch like the last time we did it at Blue  
18 Cross Blue Shield we just caught all her employees  
19 coming back after the lunch hour in the environment of  
20 their campus and gave them those fliers. And it gets  
21 the word out better than a newsletter or something in  
22 the corporate, you know, email system.

23           So that has helped a lot and we've -- want to  
24 knock on wood, we've had a downtrend in that in the  
25 Downtown area because particularly was problematic in

1 the core Downtown area, so.

2 With that, that ends my portion of it. But I  
3 want up bring Lieutenant Gargalino up here to recognize  
4 a couple of Officers that have an done outstanding job  
5 with some problems we had at the Rosa Park Transit  
6 Center.

7 (Applause.)

8 LIEUTENANT GARGALINO: Good evening, Board,  
9 good evening everyone.

10 COMMISSIONERS: Good evening.

11 LIEUTENANT GARGALINO: I'm Lieutenant Shawn  
12 Gargalino, currently assigned as the Commanding Officer  
13 of the 1st and 13 Precincts; have been directed by  
14 Inspector Nick Kyriacou of the Central District to  
15 present the Commendation for outstanding police service  
16 for members assigned to the Central District Transit  
17 Beat.

18 In April of 2013, the Transit Center was  
19 identified through crime analysis as a hot spot because  
20 of the crime associated in and around the location.  
21 The area was experiencing numerous armed robberies,  
22 larcenies and assaults. Additionally, various  
23 complaints regarding the illegal sale of narcotics were  
24 filed with the District.

25 Officers Gregory Smith, Raymond Hughes, and

1 Office Noe Garcia were handpicked to alleviate the problems  
2 associated with the area. The Officers were to apply  
3 direct police enforcement to the area and focus on the  
4 elements driving the crime and enforce all local and  
5 state laws. In essence, the operations was to  
6 strategically take back the area identified.

7 Accomplishing these responsibilities entailed  
8 performing at a level which exemplifies the highest  
9 standard of professionalism and exercising a great deal  
10 of expertise and knowledge of the Department policy  
11 procedures and local state and federal laws and  
12 guidelines.

13 The members assigned to this operation  
14 certainly displayed these qualities. In addressing  
15 personal attributes members have proven to be  
16 compassionate, respectful, conscientious, and  
17 dependable, and dedicated to the task at hand. Since  
18 the beats inception each of the members assigned to  
19 Transit Beat has dedicated themselves to the mission.

20 They've willingly served this Department and  
21 most importantly the citizens of Detroit. Their  
22 determination to the mission significantly reduced  
23 crime at the Transit Center and resulted in the follow  
24 statistics: 65 felony arrests, ten misdemeanor arrests,  
25 822 tickets or ordinance issued, 1,640 persons

1 investigated, assisting 63 homeless, 30 police runs,  
2 and five vehicles impounded -- recommends that the  
3 above Officers be recognized for their outstanding  
4 service and receive a commendation.

5 They are commended for their outstanding  
6 service to the Detroit Police Department.  
7 Additionally, they are to be commended for their  
8 dedication to serving the citizens, and businesses,  
9 visitors, and other Department members with the highest  
10 degree of respect and professionalism, thereby,  
11 representing the Department in an exemplary manner.  
12 The Officers.

13 (Applause, and photos were taken.)

14 SPEAKER: Congratulations. They're in  
15 Midtown, too. How 'bout that?

16 INSPECTOR KYRIACOU: While we're taking the  
17 photo, I have to admit that I did neglect  
18 Officer Dorsey and Office Thomas when I was doing my  
19 recognitions. Thank you for what you do, too.

20 (Applause.)

21 A.C. EWING: That ends the report for the  
22 Central District.

23 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Inspector, before you  
24 leave --

25 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: There's some questions

1 for you here.

2 COMMISSIONER WHITE: First and foremost,  
3 again, congratulations to the men and women who were  
4 just honored for the outstanding work they have done,  
5 to all of the men and woman I know of the Central  
6 District who are doing outstanding jobs whose names may  
7 not have not been called today.

8 Inspector, you mentioned a couple of things  
9 particularly the Campus Martius beat and the Cork Town  
10 beat. What exactly does that consist of?

11 INSPECTOR KYRIACOU: Yes. The Cork Town beat  
12 is two Officers who work 11:00 a.m., to 7:00 p.m., and  
13 basically in a community relations type of mode they  
14 respond to calls for service, but they also make sure  
15 they engage with the block clubs, keep aware of crime  
16 trends and basically do what the traditional Beat  
17 Officer always did, you know, in order to make sure  
18 that quality of life issues are addressed.

19 And also, you know, we don't just pay  
20 attention to that. They're also aware of shootings and  
21 other, you know, more felony crimes also. It's the  
22 whole gambit of police issues that might occur in Cork  
23 Town. We recognized shortly after I got there Cork  
24 Town is kind of on the west end of the Precinct and  
25 maybe needs a little extra attention and a little extra

1 community engagement.

2 And if those Officers were available they  
3 would have been here, too. Officer Thorb and Roberson,  
4 some of you may know them. They used to be the Greek  
5 Town beat. And I think according to most people in  
6 Cork Town they believe they can probably walk on water.  
7 They're very well liked there. They baked them a cake  
8 at the last community meeting, so they're very happy  
9 with them.

10 COMMISSIONER WHITE: The Campus Martius Beat?

11 INSPECTOR KYRIACOU: Campus Martius Beat  
12 again because of, you know, the number of activities  
13 that go on there it's two Officers depending on our  
14 manpower. But usually days we'll put one Officer there  
15 eleven to seven, depending on if there any further  
16 activities like on nights, you know, when they have the  
17 movies or if there's some musical act going on which is  
18 occurring more we might put two Officers on seven to  
19 three. It really varies a little bit according to  
20 need.

21 COMMISSIONER WHITE: And for Comerica Park  
22 activity, what is the extent of the beat presence?

23 INSPECTOR KYRIACOU: Central Events under  
24 Lieutenant Lewis is the contingent of personnel under  
25 Central District that follow the various sporting

1 events. They have the more fluid schedule depending on  
2 the Tigers and Lions and whatnot. Right now that's  
3 approximately thirty people. I don't remember the  
4 exact numbers, but about twenty of them are assigned-in  
5 personnel. Because typically in the past we've had the  
6 baseball detail for the summer where to augment the  
7 contingent of personnel to handle the ball games people  
8 get assigned in. And currently we still do have  
9 several of those people assigned in. So it's a mix of  
10 permanent people that are assigned to Central Events  
11 year-round, and a number of people that come into  
12 predominately for summer.

13 Well, and I don't want to mention it today.  
14 I'm trying to talk the A.C. into letting me keep them  
15 longer. But after the Tiger season they usually go  
16 back to their commands.

17 COMMISSIONER WHITE: That's both inside the  
18 park and outside?

19 INSPECTOR KYRIACOU: Yes, both inside and  
20 out. The details for the interior and exterior are  
21 handled by Central Events. Unless you get into a  
22 circumstance where it's like playoffs or Super Bowl  
23 then we bring people in from all commands.

24 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, Madam Chair.

25 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Thank you.

1 INSPECTOR KYRIACOU: Thank you.

2 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: At this time we're going  
3 to honor the outstanding citizen from the Central  
4 District and I'm going to ask Commissioner White to  
5 read the Resolution.

6 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Mr. Richard Etue.

7 (Applause.)

8 COMMISSIONER WHITE: In my hands I have a  
9 Resolution honoring Mr. Richard T. Etue.

10 Whereas, Mr. Richard Etue, has been a  
11 resident in the Central District for more than twenty  
12 years and remain a pillar in his neighborhood. His  
13 commitment to service and leadership is exemplified  
14 throughout the community.

15 And, whereas, Mr. Etue has been instrumental  
16 in building bridges between the community and the  
17 Detroit Police Department always contributing with  
18 efforts to improve neighborhood safety and quality of  
19 life. He had been an active member of the Central  
20 District Community Relations Council for four years and  
21 currently serves as a member of the Cass Park group.

22 And, whereas, Mr. Etue's passion and  
23 participation in the Central District events has been a  
24 positive force. He is active with Angels Night and  
25 many other community events where citizens are called

1 upon to serve the community.

2           Whereas, Mr. Etue has proven through his  
3 actions that he remains a dedicated and committed  
4 supporter of the City of Detroit and the Central  
5 District. His commitment to business, service, and  
6 leadership is demonstration throughout the entire  
7 district.

8           Now, therefore, be it resolved that the  
9 Detroit Board of Police Commissioners speaking on  
10 behalf of the citizens of the City of Detroit and the  
11 Detroit Police Department recognize the life's work and  
12 dedication to service of Mr. Richard Etue.

13           His commitment to community mission outreach  
14 and his spirit of giving back is felt and shared  
15 throughout Central District and the entire City of  
16 Detroit.

17           We thank and congratulate you, Mr. Richard T.  
18 Etue. Signed the Detroit Board of Police  
19 Commissioners, adopted this day September 12th, 2013.

20           Please join me in congratulating Mr. Etue.

21           (Applause, and photos were taken.)

22           A.C. EWING: You're not done yet, Mr. Etue.  
23 A couple of awards. We have the Spirit of Detroit  
24 Award which is presented to you today with expression  
25 of gratitude from the citizens of the City of Detroit

1 for recognition for exceptional achievement and  
2 outstanding leadership and dedication to improving the  
3 quality of life of the citizens of Detroit. Signed by  
4 all the City Council Members, dated September 12th,  
5 2013. Congratulations.

6 (Applause.)

7 A.C. EWING: Certificate of Recognition from  
8 the Detroit Police Department presented to Mr. Richard  
9 T. Etue in appreciation for your involvement in  
10 community services and demonstrating spirit of  
11 commitment to the City of Detroit which is worthy of  
12 recognition. Signed, Chief of Police, James E. Craig.  
13 Congratulations.

14 (Applause.)

15 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: One more.

16 A.C. EWING: But wait, there's more.

17 INSPECTOR KYRIACOU: When we were talking  
18 about who we were going honor, Officer Dorsey informed  
19 me of the fact that Mr. Etue's grandfather had served  
20 as a member of the Detroit Police Department way back.  
21 It was Mr. Richard Edward Etue from March 1st of 1929,  
22 through October 1st, 1954.

23 So we have a special certificate for him for  
24 all he's done from the Central District. But that's  
25 being used to hide something he doesn't even know

1 about. We were able to go to Personnel and we got him  
2 a picture of his grandfather.

3 (Applause.)

4 INSPECTOR KYRIACOU: Personnel found a  
5 picture that was on file with Graphic Arts.

6 MR. ETUE: Thank you.

7 SPEAKER: That's wonderful.

8 (Applause, and pictures were taken.)

9 MR. ETUE: I'd just like to thank the  
10 Inspector and the Commission and everyone. I'm not a  
11 big fan of public speaking. When I usually do speak  
12 publicly it's usually in a community meeting, and I'm  
13 probably being a pain in the butt to these people and  
14 everybody else.

15 But I was born in the City. I love the City.  
16 I lived here most of my life. I've had relatives or  
17 ancestors here since 1704. When I moved to my current  
18 residence in South Cass Corridor, a lot of the people  
19 down there had given up on the Detroit Police  
20 Department.

21 But through works of organizations like  
22 Midtown Alliance and Central District and everything  
23 else and with the outstanding help of people like  
24 Officer Chris Gibson and Officer Dorsey and Officer  
25 Thomas, those people actually believe that somebody's

1 going to doing something.

2 We were in an area where Mike Ilitch had  
3 bought up a bunch of buildings and left them open to  
4 trespass. Officer Dorsey wrote tickets, Officer Gibson  
5 wrote blight tickets, and those building have been  
6 sealed up for years. I'm just, you know, I'm not a fan  
7 of giving up. A lot of people in the City have given  
8 up. I just don't believe that. With the help of  
9 members of the City Council and their staff like Linda  
10 Wesley from Brenda Jones' office with people like Kim  
11 Twider and others in the Alliance it's just -- I don't  
12 believe in letting people, you know, live like that.

13 So with the help of a lot of people a lot of  
14 things have gotten done to help make it safer for  
15 people to go around that neighbor which a few years  
16 back it really wasn't. So I appreciate it.

17 SPEAKER: Right.

18 MR. ETUE: Thank you.

19 INSPECTOR KYRIACOU: I was wrong. There is  
20 one more. We were originally we were going to present  
21 this to Mrs. Bohanan who's in charge of the building.  
22 But we have Walt Atkins is going to come and accept our  
23 congratulatory certificate for all the help they've  
24 given us.

25 (Applause.)

1 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Thank you, sir.

2 Since we don't have a quorum tonight, we  
3 won't be able to deal the two Directives on the agenda,  
4 but Assistant Chief you're welcome to make the mark, if  
5 you'd like? Okay.

6 Our next meeting will be held Thursday,  
7 September 19th at 3:00 and will be at the Detroit  
8 Public Safety Headquarters and that's located at  
9 1301 Third Avenue, in the Media Room.

10 At this time we'll have our oral  
11 communications from the audience. And we are asking  
12 you limit your comments to two minutes and also address  
13 your concerns to the Board.

14 But before we start that I want to read -- we  
15 have last week the Board of Police Commissioners  
16 scheduled a public forum for tonight's meeting to hear  
17 community concerns regarding the Board's relationship  
18 to the Detroit Police Department. News accounts have  
19 questioned the Board's authority in light of Emergency  
20 Manager Order 11, which gives the Chief of Police the  
21 ability to exercise certain prerogatives of the Board.

22 The Detroit City Charter regards the Board as  
23 the voice of the people. That's why it's vitally  
24 important for your voice to be heard. Today begins the  
25 discussion. The discussion will be continued as long

1 as necessary. And now in the days and weeks ahead  
2 we're going to continue to record those comments. And  
3 if we need to bring in City Officials, other people  
4 from the public, to discuss these matters we'll  
5 continue to do that.

6 So please note that this Board is committed  
7 to helping the Police Department deliver quality and  
8 responsive service which is the kind of service you  
9 deserve as citizens.

10 At this time we're going to open the floor  
11 for that discussion.

12 MR. SCOTT: I'm sorry to get up first. I saw  
13 you standing up, but. Ron Scott, Detroit Coalition  
14 Against Police Brutality. I want to say the reason why  
15 I wanted to get up first, is I wanted to thank the  
16 Board for responding to the request that I made on, not  
17 just myself, on the behalf of the citizens who come  
18 each week. I know Ms. Smith, Ms. Pannell, sitting here  
19 and a lot of other people come each week. We have a  
20 certain focus on this Board and its importance to this  
21 community.

22 I was around when the Board was established.  
23 We fought for it's establishment as part of the  
24 outgrowth of anti-stress activity. And we know the  
25 significance of this Board and the Office of the Chief

1 Investigator which is a compendium to it. So I just  
2 want to thank you for responding to that, Commissioner  
3 Taylor, White and Warfield, and others. I want to  
4 thank you for being cognizant of the desires of the  
5 City.

6 Executive Order 11 is a challenge to the  
7 direct responsibility that the Charter has given you.  
8 We feel that it is abhorrent. We feel that it is  
9 suppressive. We feel that it is undemocratic to say  
10 the least to move in a fashion where this Board has  
11 little or no oversight or little oversight over certain  
12 issues.

13 This Board has been identified throughout the  
14 county as one of the hallmark Boards for this for kind  
15 of activity. And to see it going back and moon walking  
16 into the past is not what we'd like to see. So we  
17 stand with you and support you. And to that end I ask  
18 a couple members of the Charter Commission to come  
19 today so they can express their desires and intent when  
20 they set up the new Commission which is going to be  
21 elected for the first time which many in our  
22 organization called for in 1999.

23 So I'd like to thank you once again. I have  
24 many other points to raise but because of brevity of  
25 time and because of the individuals who obviously want

1 to speak I'd like to do that. You see a letter  
2 regarding the search and seizer policy we're involved  
3 in that. And we want to speak to that. Because one of  
4 the things I leave on your mind before I go is that the  
5 question of vehicles stops. The question is which unit  
6 can do stops. Because I've seen now that non-marked  
7 cars and marked cars doing thirty series and others  
8 doing it. I think we need to clarify that. We need to  
9 clarify who does what stops where. We need to see some  
10 policy relation to that. Because it can get quite  
11 fussy and challenging.

12 But to the point of the night, I think we  
13 need to hold another meeting. I think it needs to be  
14 twice or three times the amount of people in this room  
15 because we're fighting for democracy in this City.

16 We've lost it and we going to get it again.  
17 Just like the person, my friend from Midtown said that  
18 he doesn't give up. We won't give us. Mr. Orr's going  
19 to leave. We'll either make him leave on he'll leave  
20 on his own. But democracy will be reestablished.

21 SPEAKER: All right.

22 MR. BOMAN: I have a packet for the  
23 Commissioners and for the Chief. I'm Scott Boman, and  
24 I have a brief statement to make here. Honorable Board  
25 of Police Commissioners, thank you for this

1 opportunity. I'm here tonight because I'm a violent  
2 crime victim whose efforts to get justice have been met  
3 with nothing but indifference by Detroit Police  
4 Officers.

5 On July 30th, I was intimidated and injured  
6 for attempting to document illegal practices. After  
7 taking pictures and recording video, physical force was  
8 used against me to prevent me from handing out campaign  
9 literature at a location where people who look  
10 different than I were permitted to do the same.

11 This force was sever enough to cause  
12 scarring. After this my arms were twisted and locked  
13 in position to maximize pain and long-term injury. My  
14 left hand remains partially numb and my right wrist is  
15 partially not completely usable. And the assailant  
16 broke my camera.

17 I made a police report the next day,  
18 July 31st. Since that day I've made multiple attempts  
19 to have an investigator follow up on my case. None  
20 have contacted me. Upon receiving my police report I  
21 realized it was woefully incomplete and my efforts to  
22 have an addendum put on the report have been repeatedly  
23 rebuffed.

24 I have additional information that would be  
25 useful including the identity of my primary assailant.

1 I can't help but think this is the result of favoritism  
2 toward my assailants. You see the people who did this  
3 were DWCC Police Officers. The primary assailant was  
4 also serving as a poller. While I understand this  
5 sense of solidarity people may feel for members of the  
6 same profession, such loyalty takes a back seat in the  
7 fair application of the law when one is a Police  
8 Officer.

9 Police who turn a blind eye to criminal acts  
10 by their brethren risk being regarded in the same light  
11 as the bad apples they tolerate. It's legal to arrest  
12 a person for allege crimes. But even guilt would not  
13 justify deliberately injuring the suspect, destroying  
14 his property or using ones authority to deny a person's  
15 First Amendment Rights before he becomes a suspect.

16 A badge is not a license to obstruct justice.  
17 The incident was in eye shot of surveillance cameras.  
18 But Detroit Police Department negligence gave my  
19 assailants time to destroy the surveillance video.  
20 This has been expected since they also deleted four  
21 videos from my video card and I can prove it.

22 All I ask is that the police do their job.

23 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Sir, he wants to talk to  
24 you. Can you go with our Chief Investor, sir?

25 MS. PANNELL: Good evening, Sharon Pannell.

1 My question does not reflect Second Precinct. My  
2 question is about the mini stations and when are they  
3 going to open and if they're going to open?

4 A.C. EWING: Ma'am, the mini stations are  
5 still in review by the Chief of Police. We do  
6 currently have some mini stations open. We are looking  
7 in the future to decide whether the manpower is going  
8 to allow us to do that.

9 There's a couple new initiatives the Chief  
10 wants to roll out. We started looking at the overall  
11 manpower issue. We have allocation of manpower at  
12 different precincts. I don't have the firm answers for  
13 you right now. The Chief will make a decision at the  
14 later time.

15 MS. PANNELL: Okay. I'll be back next  
16 Thursday.

17 MS. McCANTS: Good afternoon to this Board.

18 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Good afternoon, ma'am.

19 MS. McCANTS: My name is Yolanda McCants, and  
20 I'm from the Northeastern District. I have a question  
21 to ask this Board, and maybe some answers. We had a  
22 situation where there was a group, the 300 that was out  
23 looking for some rapists that we had on the far  
24 eastside and then again there was a incidents that  
25 happened on the westside, okay, in result of something

1 going on at one of our Districts.

2 And yesterday I looked at the news and they  
3 were back out there along with our Officers. Isn't --  
4 I guess I'm kind of concerned because there should be  
5 or maybe and I'm not sure an open suit against the City  
6 for an incident that happened at one of our Districts?  
7 Now the Police Department and this group is back in  
8 arms again.

9 And my personal opinion is we should not open  
10 our doors to this group. If they want to go out and  
11 search and do whatever so be it. But so that we will  
12 not be involved in that meaning the Police Department  
13 so that we will not be involved in any type of lawsuits  
14 or goings on.

15 So if there's some corrections that I need to  
16 understand, would you please help me?

17 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Commissioner White?

18 COMMISSIONER WHITE: The organization Detroit  
19 300 and I'm note sure the specific instances that you  
20 were referencing towards what degree the Detroit Police  
21 is working with them, if at all. But as it relates to  
22 a lawsuit that's pending that matter would be with the  
23 City. Not this body. And unless there is a complaint  
24 against citizens' wrongdoing by Detroit 300 or Detroit  
25 Police Department then it would come before this Body.

1 MS. McCANTS: That's why I guess I'm --

2 COMMISSIONER WHITE: I guess previous  
3 instances. And that may have been an isolated event or  
4 not. But I do believe whether it's neighborhood  
5 associations or any group that is trying to organize to  
6 work on behalf of the citizens of the city. And A.C.,  
7 please chime in. But I do believe it has been the  
8 posture of the City and posture of the Department to  
9 try to foster good relationships with those individuals  
10 to prevent circumstances like what have occurred in the  
11 past. Assistant Chief?

12 A.C. EWING: That's correct. Any citizens  
13 who are willing to go out to the public to prevent  
14 crime we welcome as long as they understand they have  
15 to do it within the confines of the law. That's with  
16 any organization that we may partnership with to try to  
17 stop crime which includes the 300.

18 MS. McCANTS: Okay. All right. Thank you.

19 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Thank you, Ms. McCantz.

20 MS. MORRIS: Good evening, everyone. My name  
21 is Tijuana Morris, and have -- I was the investigator  
22 for the Detroit Coalition against Police Brutality.  
23 And hopefully I'm looking forward to be sitting on your  
24 Board in November.

25 I've tried to contact the Chief of Police to

1 have a meeting with him and see where he's coming from  
2 and let him know where I'm coming from on several  
3 occasions and I haven't been able to contact him. But  
4 on this stop and frisk we all know that stop and frisk  
5 is legal. But they have the implications, it has to be  
6 reasonable search. And I would ask this Board to look  
7 into it. As we are, you are directed by laws which is  
8 governed by the state. Be cognizant of the situation  
9 and this stop and frisk, the new law is already ruled  
10 unconstitutional. It needs to be looked at and  
11 revisited.

12 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Yes, ma'am.

13 MS. McCANTS: Is there a way that I can  
14 leave --

15 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: That would be addressed  
16 I believe at -- there's plans that the Chief, that's  
17 something that the Chief will probably be able to  
18 address when he can get that set up.

19 MS. McCANTS: Okay.

20 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Oh, I just learned he's  
21 going to have a Community CAM meeting on the 24th of  
22 this month --

23 MS. McCANTS: Location?

24 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Ten o'clock.

25 SECRETARY ANTHONY: 1301 Third Street.

1 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: At the headquarters.

2 MS. McCANTS: Okay. Thank you.

3 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: You're welcome.

4 MR. SIMPSON: Good evening.

5 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Good evening.

6 MR. SIMPSON: I'm Ralph Simpson. I'm a  
7 resident of Detroit, the immediate past president of  
8 the American Civil Liberties Union of Michigan, and I  
9 remain an attorney on their lawyer committee. I hope  
10 all of you had an opportunity to pick up a letter that  
11 the ACLU had directed to Police Chief Craig regarding  
12 the stop and frisk program that has been publicized  
13 recently as something that the Detroit Police were  
14 going to receive training in regard to despite the fact  
15 that it's recently been found to be illegal and  
16 improper in New York.

17 The letter sets out a number of objections of  
18 the American Civil Liberties Union. I won't go over  
19 all of those other than to say that the idea that  
20 because it's a largely minority city that somehow that  
21 that justifies improper illegal practices, just doesn't  
22 make a lot of sense.

23 But I would want to make another point that's  
24 not in the letter which is in I think it was pointed  
25 out by the Central District's Commander that the racial

1 makeup of Detroit is quite different in the daytime.  
2 It's quite different at particular events at particular  
3 locations such as sporting venues and entertainment  
4 venues is quite different in particular neighborhoods.

5 So the idea that even that idea that because  
6 the racial makeup is largely minority that there's no  
7 possible issues instituting aggressive and again  
8 recently found to be illegal and improper practice has  
9 no ramifications.

10 So I'd ask you to look at that very  
11 carefully. Thank you.

12 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Yes, sir. Thank you.

13 COMMISSIONER WHITE: If I could, through the  
14 Chair, Mr. Simpson before you leave, first of all thank  
15 you and the ACLU for the great work you continue to do  
16 in the community. Through the Chair, A.C., I do have a  
17 copy of that communication and I'd be happy to share a  
18 copy with you. But if I could read a couple excerpts.

19 It's says, the ACLU is interested to know  
20 more about the Department's training and use of the  
21 stop and frisk techniques and related practice. To  
22 that end pursuant to Michigan Freedom of Information  
23 Act, MFOIA MCL 15.321 we request as that term is  
24 defined to the fullest extent under FOIA that set forth  
25 policies and guidelines for stop and frisk practices

1 used by Detroit Police.

2           Additionally, we request all training  
3 materials related in any way to these practices,  
4 specifically material related to training provided to  
5 the traffic unit officers regarding the prevention of  
6 street crime through the use of traffic stops, and  
7 which is referenced in the enclosed article. Please  
8 provide as well as all documents that memorialize the  
9 agreements between your department and the Manhattan  
10 Institute and the Bratton Group, along with documents  
11 that reflect fees, f-e-e-s, that have been and will be  
12 paid to these organizations.

13           The ACLU requests limitation and waiver of  
14 fees pursuant to FOIA which provides for such  
15 limitation and waiver where searching for or furnishing  
16 the records can be considered as primarily benefiting  
17 the general public because it is likely to contribute  
18 to public understanding and is not in the commercial  
19 interest of the ACLU.

20           So Assistant Chief, to the Chief, if you  
21 could for our next meeting provide the Board a status  
22 of this FOIA request --

23           A.C. EWING: Sure.

24           COMMISSIONER WHITE: -- so we may be  
25 responsive to the ACLU and the community in this

1 information? And also Attorney Simpson, if you're able  
2 to make it to the Chief's Meeting the CAM meeting on  
3 the 24th at the new Detroit Public Safety Headquarters  
4 certainly that will be an opportunity for you to gain  
5 more insight and information.

6 MR. SIMPSON: Appreciate that. Thank you.

7 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Thank you.

8 MR. HARRIS: Good afternoon. My name is  
9 Kevin Harris, long-time citizen of Detroit. I want to  
10 say hello to everyone, all the police officers. I know  
11 you all job is hard. I know it's hard.

12 SPEAKER: You supposed to talk to the Board.

13 MR. HARRIS: Oh, I know. Talk to the board.  
14 I just want to thank all the Police Officers  
15 personally. I know what you all dealing with. Crazy  
16 people out here. But to the Board, I suggest that the  
17 stop and frisk is only going to agitate the crazies.  
18 It's going to make the crazy people more crazy because  
19 it's like you just -- not all Police Officers are like  
20 this, but majority of them have like a bully kind of  
21 persona, because I know with the violence in the  
22 street, but it's also psychological.

23 But it's just a suggestion in high crime  
24 areas that's where the cops need to be more visible at  
25 because a criminal can't commit a crime if the cops are

1 there. I know you all can't be there all the time. I  
2 know I'm using street slang but I'm going to keep it as  
3 real as I can because I hear the youth talking.

4 And I got pulled over in the driveway. I  
5 don't know in the driveway. I didn't know you could  
6 get pull over in the driveway. But I know what you all  
7 dealing with. But what I'm saying is the stop and  
8 frisk thing I think and pulling over it's like  
9 victimizing or putting everybody in the same bag, you  
10 know. We got good citizens here.

11 And if police is visible, like I said, where  
12 the most crime is in the city just being visible that  
13 will cut down on some of the crime. Thank you.

14 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Thank you.

15 MS. ALLISON: Good evening.

16 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Good evening.

17 MS. ALLISON: My name is Karen Allison and I  
18 was invited here by Brother Ron Scott. I'm a victim of  
19 carjacking. And when I went to pick up my car from the  
20 towing company I had to pay \$385. And I don't think it  
21 was fair to me to have to pay when my car was stolen.  
22 Now any other time if it was just an accident or  
23 whatever like that I would pay it, but by it being  
24 stolen.

25 I was carjacked at a gas station, I'm talking

1 about I called the police reporting, crime reporting  
2 section at least three times each day from the day my  
3 car was stolen August 10th to August 25th when it was  
4 restored to me.

5 And I don't think it was fair for me to have  
6 to call them to find out that my car had been  
7 recovered. Also because they never called me to let me  
8 know that, okay, Mrs. Allison, your car been recovered.  
9 They never told me that.

10 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: How much was it,  
11 Ms. Allison?

12 MS. ALLISON: \$385 for me to get the car out  
13 of impound. I had it towed to my house. Mind you, I  
14 can't drive the car no more because it was totaled.  
15 They was in an accident. I don't know if it was a  
16 police chase or -- but when I got the police report it  
17 doesn't say that.

18 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: A.C.?

19 A.C. EWING: Ms. Allison, what was the dates?

20 MS. ALLISON: August the 10th, when it was  
21 stolen from the gas station on Lahser and Fenkell. And  
22 Sunday night, August 25th, 2:00, in the morning it was  
23 recovered. The 26th -- I called on the 25th, that  
24 Sunday, and I called on the 26th, and they told me my  
25 car was recovered. I called them. They never called

1 me.

2 A.C. EWING: So it's one day later you found  
3 out that your car had been recovered?

4 MS. ALLISON: One day later, but I still  
5 called them on the 25th.

6 A.C. EWING: Okay. Ma'am, what tow company  
7 was that?

8 MS. ALLISON: A.C. Towing.

9 A.C. EWING: If you give your information to  
10 Deputy Chief Tolbert here, we'll take a look at it.  
11 We'll see if there's any impropriety on our part.

12 MS. ALLISON: Thank you.

13 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Thank you, Ms. Allison.  
14 Just a minute, Ms. Allison.

15 MR. COLEMAN: Good evening, Chairwoman  
16 Taylor, Commissioner White, Police staff, members of  
17 the community. I'm Ken Coleman. As some of you know  
18 I'm a former member of the Charter Revision Commission.  
19 First, I wanted to say I couldn't agree more with the  
20 comments offered by Mr. Scott and Mr. Simpson.

21 I believe they're right on point. Probably  
22 said it more eloquently than I can. I will just say  
23 this, we had great pleasure, nine of us had great  
24 pleasure serving as elected members of the Charter  
25 Revision Commission.

1           We had dozens of meetings throughout the City  
2 as you do in your function, talking to hundreds of  
3 residents getting more than 600 recommendations. And  
4 one of the most adamant recommendations from the  
5 community and you saw it affirmed in the  
6 November election of 11 was keeping a citizen review  
7 board a fully functional and empowered citizen review  
8 commission for the City of Detroit.

9           We know the history all of us do here. Ron  
10 stated it very, very clearly. I was a five-year-old  
11 tagging along with my mom going to from the ground up  
12 meeting an organization that was dedicated to  
13 eradicating stress. So it is very, very important to  
14 me as a Detroiter. We all have a sort of a personal  
15 story about what the Police Department was or what it  
16 wasn't in the past.

17           I believe that the voters were very clear  
18 they want a citizen review board to perform the  
19 functions that you have. So I'm very happy to hear  
20 that that is something that this Commission clearly  
21 wants to do. I recognize that we have an Emergency  
22 Manager.

23           But the people have been very clear. And so  
24 I wanted to take this opportunity publicly to lift up  
25 not only the great work that I think we did as a

1 committee and affirming the role of a citizen police  
2 commission. But making sure that people understand  
3 that in order to keep this type of what Ron called  
4 really a concept that many cities look at. It's a best  
5 practice to be sure. We have to fight to keep it.

6 And so I'm here tonight to lift my words to  
7 that effect. Thank you, ma'am.

8 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Thank you, sir.

9 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you.

10 MR. DAVIS: Good evening, Board. My name is  
11 Reggie Reg Davis. Thank you to Mr. Ron Scott for the  
12 invitation. Very good friend of mine. For those of  
13 you who made not know I lost my baby brother to gun  
14 violence in 2001. It seems like just yesterday. And I  
15 still want to say thank you to the Detroit Police  
16 Department for helping me and my family to find,  
17 capture the assailants responsible for my brother's  
18 death in a record time; less than 48 hours. So I'll  
19 always say thank you to the Detroit Police Department.

20 But as a member of the Detroit Charter  
21 Revision Commission when I sat there everyday as I cast  
22 my vote at that table I was a voice for, of course, us  
23 sleeping giants, the young people of our community, but  
24 for the people at large. It's all about the people.  
25 When we talk about a democracy of the people, by the

1 people, this Charter represents that.

2           When you look at situations like Aiyana  
3 Jones, some may remember that. And you look at stop  
4 and frisk. Just the names there alone have oversight  
5 written all over it. So on this copy of the newly  
6 revised language of City's Charter and Section 7-802  
7 Board of Police Commissioners it simply starts out by  
8 saying the Board of Police Commissioners has  
9 supervisory control and oversight of the Police  
10 Department. Key words, oversight.

11           So in my effort to be sure that the  
12 citizenry, the people of the City of Detroit have  
13 oversight over this paramilitary organization called  
14 the Detroit Police Department. That was the entire  
15 angle. That's what it's all about.

16           So I wanted to reassure everyone that my  
17 point in sitting at that table and Ken mentioned what  
18 he had to say but when I sat there at that table as  
19 Reggie Reg Davis my idea to vote for this language was  
20 to be sure that the people remain in control of their  
21 city. Thank you.

22           COMMISSION DONNELL: Thank you.

23           MS. PILLICIOTTI: Good evening. My name is  
24 Marsha Pilliciotti. I am a lifetime Detroiter.

25           COMMISSIONER WHITE: Through the Chair, would

1 you mind spelling your last name for the record?

2 MSS. PILLICIOTTI: P-I-L-L-I-C-I-O-T-T-I,  
3 Pilliciotti. Thank you. So I've lived -- I bought a  
4 house in the Boston Edison area almost forty years ago  
5 when I was a kid, and since then my neighborhood had  
6 gone through many different Precinct changes.

7 Now I'm happy to say we're in Central. I  
8 can't tell you much love and admiration I have for  
9 Inspector Kyriacou and the entire staff. They are  
10 wonderful. The Inspector actually answers his phone  
11 and answer emails, which is really unusual. I can't  
12 even get my mother to do that. So for an Inspector,  
13 that's really great.

14 I'm working right now with Community  
15 Relations. We've started a block club and they've  
16 helped us with that. And one of the things that I've  
17 noticed is no Police Officers know what's going to  
18 happen next. I've been told, oh, well, we're going  
19 with ten, thirteen is going to cut off from Central.  
20 And nobody has any idea. So there's this feeling with  
21 the Officers of sort of uncomfortableness and, you  
22 know, uncertainty.

23 So do you have any idea what's going to  
24 happen or who is going to make the decisions?

25 A.C. EWING: First of all, the decision will

1 be made by the Chief of Police.

2 MS. PILLICIOTTI: It will be. Okay.

3 A.C. EWING: But I will tell you this, the  
4 Chief is looking at the City as whole. We know that  
5 there's some area of the City that are densely  
6 population and we know we have areas such as the  
7 Eastern District and Northwestern District who have our  
8 heaviest call volumes. To alleviate some of the stress  
9 on these Officers over there, the Chief is looking at  
10 the whole City and redoing the boundary line.

11 We're not saying that's actually going to  
12 happen but that's something he's looking at at this  
13 particular point. And it's down the road. Nothing's  
14 going to be real soon.

15 MS. PILLICIOTTI: Well, I guess I just don't  
16 want to be forgotten because we pay for security.  
17 We're all on security committee, you know, I'm out  
18 patrolling every other week with the rest of the  
19 citizens and if we have a low crime rate, you know, and  
20 if we're not going to get the wonderful Precinct that  
21 we have now, I'm going to stop patrolling, you know,  
22 because I want the Officers we have now.

23 A.C. EWING: It's our firm commitment to make  
24 all our Precincts just like the one you're talking  
25 about right now.

1 MS. PILLICIOTTI: All right. Thank you.

2 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Thank you, ma'am.

3 MR. BACHAND: My name is Nichols Bachand.  
4 I've now been coming to your meetings about six or  
5 seven of them now. And I'm counsel for several  
6 different towing companies. And tonight I represent  
7 Gene's Towing. If you notice Mr. Ott is here tonight.

8 I've come here for a couple of reasons.  
9 Number one, from my research and being brought up to  
10 speed this Body spent about two years creating towing  
11 rules and creating Detroit Police Authorizing Towing.  
12 Mr. Ott controls the evidence garage which he's been  
13 doing for sixteen years.

14 According to the tow rules which I have found  
15 the only towers that are supposed to be bringing  
16 evidence to the evidence garage are your police  
17 authorized towers. We are seeing that you're having  
18 out of town, out of the city towers bringing evidence.  
19 And we don't understand why that's happened. And  
20 that's something you'll have to look into.

21 For instance, today at 6:15 we had a towing  
22 company from Warren, Michigan bring evidence to  
23 7800 Dix. That's a long way to come for evidence. And  
24 I've got a picture of it. So that's a problem that  
25 we're having.

1           The second problem we have with the evidence  
2 garage is that these Detroit Authorized Towers we're  
3 used to for the last fifteen years dropping off their  
4 tow and getting paid immediately by this man. And  
5 Mr. Ott always fronted the money when an evidence tow  
6 was dropped off. The problem is the City has not paid  
7 him since February. He can't front the money to the  
8 other tow companies. So then the other tow companies  
9 call you and call the Chief and called everyone else  
10 and say why am I'm not getting paid? And now it looks  
11 as Mr. Ott is the bad guy, which he isn't, because he's  
12 not getting paid.

13           We want to continue to operate a very  
14 successful evidence garage. But we need this Board to  
15 look into things. We don't know why these things are  
16 happening. And if there's any other information you  
17 need, I'm here like I will be every week.

18           CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Commissioner White is  
19 going to comment.

20           COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you for  
21 stepping -- through the Chair, since the Chief is  
22 currently --

23           A.C. EWING: That would be Inspector  
24 Montgomery.

25           COMMISSIONER WHITE: Is the Inspector here?

1 A.C. EWING: No, he is not.

2 COMMISSIONER WHITE: What I would ask, Madam  
3 Chair, if appropriate is that maybe we can ask the  
4 Inspector to the next meeting and this issue might be  
5 addressed.

6 MR. BACHAND: I'll be here.

7 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Next Thursday.

8 MR. BACHAND: No problem.

9 COMMISSIONER WHITE: And have some of the  
10 things that you referenced or any other information  
11 will be helpful to this Board, if you could present  
12 that at that time.

13 MR. BACHAND: Absolutely. Thank you.

14 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Are there anymore  
15 comments? Are there anymore comments?

16 MS. SMITH: Good evening. Bernice Smith,  
17 political activist. I came tonight because of the fact  
18 that Midtown is my home. And any time Central comes to  
19 any meeting I have to give them all the kudos in the  
20 world because they good Officers. All of them. I'm  
21 still fighting for their raise and to get their medical  
22 back on ground, so. But it's a good fight. So I'm not  
23 going to give up.

24 In the meantime, I would like to tell Deputy  
25 Chief Tolbert he did a wonderful job with the rest of

1 the Officers the other night. They were, matter of  
2 fact, met across the street from my house when I pulled  
3 up and I saw all of the Officers from all forces. And  
4 I spoke with Tolbert and told him he did a good job out  
5 there with the rest of them. And I think we need a lot  
6 Officers to give them a lot of praises. And I just  
7 truly tell them all the time whenever I see them be  
8 careful out here because it's your life out here on the  
9 front.

10 Now, after all those good words. The young  
11 lady that came up here and stated her discontentment  
12 about the 300. I'm one of the original 300s of the  
13 women. So my thing is I don't know what her problem  
14 with the 300. I'm not going to go into it. But I know  
15 there was problem with two ladies that cause themselves  
16 suing the 300 because of the fact they were brought  
17 into the Warwick Police Station without our knowledge  
18 and Police had no business taking them in the garage  
19 for one thing to question them about some robbery.

20 So that's where this all stems from as far as  
21 I know. And that's why the 300 relaxed a while and  
22 didn't come out in neighborhoods because they wanted to  
23 settle the court case because we're being sued.

24 In the meantime, with the two seniors that  
25 was assaulted the other day we would not be silent any

1 longer. So, therefore, Angelo appealed again to the  
2 300 and those that were interested in coming out so we  
3 can help the Police. Not overcome what they're doing.  
4 We're only to there to help and get information.  
5 Because previously there was rapist that raped a  
6 93-year-old woman that started us in existence. We got  
7 information from the people in the street where they  
8 didn't tell the Police.

9 And this is the main objective that we do is  
10 get information from people who will not go to the  
11 Police because for one reason or another they're scared  
12 to talk to them. So we get information. Matter of  
13 fact, we did get information in regards to the senior  
14 women that were assaulted the other day. So we  
15 transferred that to the Police Department.

16 The Police is appreciative of our help.  
17 We're not taking over the Police Department. We're  
18 only helping out as best we can. If more people would  
19 give information to the Police we wouldn't have as much  
20 crime as we have out here and the Police wouldn't have  
21 to suffer the way that they're suffering in regards to  
22 trying to get out here and help the citizens get these  
23 criminals off the street.

24 Because you know and I know highjacking is  
25 on -- a rape that we can't go to gas stations anymore

1 before -- we might fear we're going to be highjacked,  
2 the cars. I tell people all the time even when I see  
3 them at gas stations, be careful when you get in your  
4 car. Lock your door. You got your door locked? So I  
5 tell people this and I don't even know them. So we  
6 have to look out for each other and not feel as though  
7 that we're interfering with the Police's job because  
8 they're doing a hell of a of good job.

9 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Can you just kind of  
10 talked about what happened to those members of 300?  
11 How many was involved?

12 MS. SMITH: There were only two that we did  
13 not even know about. Two men had taken it upon  
14 themselves. We didn't know anything about what they  
15 were doing. They knew person who was robbed the way I  
16 understand it, and they were friends to this senior man  
17 or whoever he was. And the people next door we're  
18 supposed to be neighbors and watching out for the man  
19 and when they went to the house the two men that went  
20 to the house and they claim that they were friends of  
21 the man or whatever the case may be and these two women  
22 who lived next door, whatever, they claimed that men  
23 was trying to take things out of the house, whatever.

24 The problem that I have is, why didn't you  
25 investigate what the men were doing? Go to the police.

1 Why you going to feel as thought the 300 had something  
2 to do with it?

3 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: This was nothing that  
4 was endorsed by 300?

5 MS. SMITH: No, by no means. You do not take  
6 anybody to no police station and open the garage. I  
7 don't even know how come the Police Station opened the  
8 garage door for them to come in there so they can  
9 question the women. That was out of order.

10 And I still maintain they had no business  
11 going in the Police Station and going in the garage.  
12 Who's going in the garage and have the door open and  
13 then you going to question two people? That's the  
14 Police's job. Not our job.

15 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: They're no longer part  
16 of 300?

17 MS. SMITH: No, by no means. But the fact is  
18 they're suing the head people of the 300, so. And  
19 that's wrong, that's wrong. We're out here to help and  
20 maintain crime and get it under control. So I don't  
21 even understand the reasoning. And why you want to  
22 sue? So to me it means you want money. That's all I  
23 can say.

24 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: We'll continue talking  
25 about talk.

1 MS. SMITH: Oh, yes, we will. It will be on  
2 the air tomorrow because I will bring it on the station  
3 tomorrow.

4 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: All right. Thank you.

5 MS. SMITH: I thank you so much for listening  
6 to me.

7 CHAIRPERSON TAYLOR: Are there any more  
8 comments? If not, thank you, and we'll see you next  
9 week.

10 (The hearing concluded at 7:56 p.m.)
