4 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Let me say good
5 afternoon to everyone and welcome you to the
6 Board of Police Commissioners meeting dated for
7 Thursday, October 24, 2013.

8 My name is Commissioner Donnell White.
9 I have the pleasure of serving as your
10 Vice-Chair. I'm joined today with the Chair to
11 the Board of Police Commissioners Commissioner
12 Jessica Taylor and representing our staff is
13 Executive Secretary to the Board Mr. George
14 Anthony.

15 Mr. Anthony, can you please introduce
16 our staff present?

17 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you,
18 Mr. Chair. For the record, George Anthony,
19 Secretary to the Board. We have present
20 Mr. Robert Brown who is our office manager and
21 recorders for the day is Sgt. Alan Quinn, Officer
22 Kent Cooper and Mr. Dale Rose from Hanson Court
23 Reporting Service.

24 That completes the introductions, sir.

25 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you,

1 Mr. Secretary. I would certainly like to note
2 the presence of Commander Charles Wilson
3 representing the Office of the Chief.

4 Good to see you, sir.

5 COMMANDER WILSON: Thank you, sir.

6 COMMISSIONER WHITE: At this time we
7 would ask if Chaplain Penson will come forward
8 for the purpose of invocation.

9 (INVOCATION WAS GIVEN).

10 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you,
11 Chaplain Penson. Just a word of appreciation.
12 You come consistently to the meetings. For those
13 who are called to believe know that prayer
14 changes things and I'm certain that the men and
15 women of this department and certainly this body
16 appreciate your words of encouragement and prayer
17 over the proceedings of this meeting and over the
18 safety of our men and women of this great
19 department, so we appreciate you week in and week
20 out for coming.

21 I do believe Commissioner Warfield will
22 be joining us, so we should have quorum to move a
23 few of these motions that need to be moved, but
24 until such time let the record reflect that there
25 is not a quorum, so we will table the approval of

1 the agenda for Thursday, October 24.

2 Also we'll table the approval of the
3 minutes dated for September 26, October 3,
4 October 10 and October 17.

5 Madam Chair, is there an official
6 Chairperson's report?

7 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: No.

8 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you.
9 Mr. Secretary?

10 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you,
11 Mr. Chair. There is a Secretary's report.
12 Citizen complaints received September -- in the
13 month of September, 2013.

14 The monthly count of complaints for
15 September were 121 when compared with 2012 it was
16 103, so there is a 17 percent increase.

17 Year-to-date figures for citizen
18 complaints are 963 through the end of September
19 compared to 985 last year for the same period
20 which represents a 2 percent decrease.

21 At the end of September, 2013 the
22 Office of the Chief Investigator had open
23 investigations 297, cases filed 963, cases closed
24 881.

25 Of the 121 cases filed, 31 percent

1 involved unknown officers. The alleged known
2 units involved leading in complaints filled in
3 September, 2013, were the 8th Precinct at 10
4 percent, the Eastern District at 9 percent and
5 the Central District at 7 percent.

6 The 121 cases filed in September, 2013
7 involved 203 allegations where the leading areas
8 of concern were demeanor at 28 percent, procedure
9 at 26 percent, service at 17 percent and force at
10 9 percent and as usual, Mr. Chair and
11 Commissioner, we have the unknowns for your
12 perusal.

13 That completes my report.

14 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you,
15 Mr. Secretary. Any questions, Madam Chair?

16 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: No, I don't have
17 any questions.

18 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you,
19 Mr. Secretary.

20 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you.

21 COMMISSIONER WHITE: At this time we'll
22 have a report of presentation from the Office of
23 the Chief.

24 COMMANDER WILSON: Yes, sir. Thank you
25 for this opportunity. At this time we're not

1 going to have an official presentation for any of
2 our units, but keeping in mind with the Chief's
3 mandate to be transparent to our citizens and our
4 community I wanted to give out some stats, some
5 criminal stats right now.

6 Year to date our homicide total is 270
7 which is a reduction of 13.7 percent compared to
8 this time last year. Looking at our carjacking
9 numbers, we're finally starting to trend downward
10 on our carjackings. Year to date we're at 589
11 for a slight reduction of less than a point, .8.
12 This time last year we were at 594.

13 If we look at our non-fatal shootings
14 currently we're at 1,011 for a reduction of 2.6
15 percent compared to last year we were at 1,038.
16 I'm sorry, I should say that in reverse. We're
17 at 1,038, last year we were at 1,111.

18 Total our violent crimes are down 5.6
19 percent, so with the help of our community we're
20 starting to see some steady declines in our
21 violent crime and we hope to take those down even
22 further.

23 Also one of the things we looked at and
24 we're continually looking at is our response
25 time. It's been reported in the media that our

1 response time has been upwards of 58 minutes.
2 With some of the new things that we put in place
3 we looked at our response time and overall it's
4 12 minutes. We're still trying to get that down
5 to the national average of about seven to eight
6 minutes, but we still have some work to do. We
7 think we'll be able to get that down.

8 And lastly I don't know if everyone is
9 aware, but for those who are, our Officer Patrick
10 Hill succumbed to his injuries. We're asking
11 that everyone keep him and his family in their
12 thoughts and prayers.

13 The funeral will be held this Monday at
14 Greater Grace Church located at Seven Mile and
15 Telegraph. Funeral services will start at 10 AM,
16 so again we ask for your prayers and your
17 sympathy at this time; thank you.

18 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you,
19 Commander Wilson. Any questions, Madam
20 Commissioner?

21 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: I have none.

22 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you for that
23 report, sir. At this time I would offer a moment
24 of silence in recognition of the service of
25 Officer Patrick Hill to this department and the

1 men and women of the city of Detroit.

2 (MOMENT OF SILENCE).

3 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you. There
4 are no standing committee reports under new
5 business. There is a resolution of PO Alfred
6 Thomas. Mr. Secretary, have we already read this
7 into the record?

8 SECRETARY ANTHONY: No, we haven't
9 read this one for Alfred Thomas into the record.
10 Others we have read into the record, but this
11 one, no.

12 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Shall we read it
13 into the record or should we wait until a quorum
14 has been established?

15 SECRETARY ANTHONY: The Board
16 generally, they may read the resolved clause and
17 that can be read into the record and a motion can
18 be cast later when the majority is present.

19 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Okay. I will read
20 the resolved clauses for Police Officer Alfred G.
21 Thomas and actually I'll read the entire piece,
22 it's not long and that way when we have quorum we
23 can read the resolved clauses and move it
24 forward.

25 Resolution honoring Retired Police

1 Officer Alfred G. Thomas.

2 WHEREAS, Alfred Thomas was appointed to
3 the Detroit Police Department on January 20,
4 1986. Upon graduating from the Metropolitan
5 Police Academy Officer Thomas began his career at
6 the 7th Precinct and

7 WHEREAS, Officer Thomas dutifully
8 served in the Law Department, Protective Services
9 Section, 10th Precinct, Western District and the
10 12th Precinct until his retirement and

11 WHEREAS, during his law enforcement
12 career Officer Thomas was the deserving recipient
13 of one Chief's Citation, a Major League Baseball
14 All-Star Recognition Award, the Rosa Parks
15 Funeral Recognition Award, the Super Bowl XL
16 Recognition Award and numerous letters of
17 commendation from citizens and superiors and

18 WHEREAS, Officer Thomas has tirelessly
19 served the Detroit Police Department, the
20 citizens of Detroit and its neighboring
21 communities for 27 years. His professionalism,
22 commitment to public service, integrity and
23 dedication has been a credit to the Detroit
24 Police Department. He is highly respected as a
25 consummate professional throughout the law

1 enforcement community.

2 NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the
3 Detroit Board of Police Commissioners speaking on
4 behalf of the citizens of the City of Detroit and
5 the Detroit Police Department award this
6 resolution in recognition of Police Officer
7 Alfred Thomas for his 27 years of dedicated and
8 diligent public service. His professionalism,
9 integrity and standard of commitment to the city
10 of Detroit and its citizens merit our highest
11 regards and best wishes for continued success.

12 We salute and congratulate you, Police
13 Officer Alfred G. Thomas.

14 Signed the Detroit Board of Police
15 Commissioners adopted this day October 24, 2013.

16 (APPLAUSE).

17 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Under old business
18 I would ask that, again, we table the directives
19 until we have a quorum to move those. Our
20 resolutions that need to be moved that have been
21 read into the record currently are for Police
22 Officer Rodney Jones posthumously, Retired DC
23 Morris Wells, Retired Investigator Audrey Thomas,
24 Retired DC James Tolbert and Mr. Jim Green.

25 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Mr. Chair, if I

1 may, the resolutions for Officer Rodney Jones,
2 Retired DC Morris Wells and Retired Investigator
3 Audrey Thomas have not been read into the record.

4 DC James Tolbert and Mr. Jim Green were
5 read into the record at the community meeting, so
6 the others will need to be read.

7 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Okay, thank you
8 for that, Mr. Secretary.

9 Resolution honoring Police Officer
10 Rodney W. Jones posthumously.

11 WHEREAS, Rodney Jones was appointed to
12 the Detroit Police Department on August 12, 1985.
13 Upon graduating from the Metropolitan Police
14 Academy, Officer Jones began his career at the
15 8th Precinct and

16 WHEREAS, Officer Jones dutifully served
17 in Gang Enforcement, the 2nd Precinct, Traffic
18 Enforcement and a member of the Detroit Police
19 Honor Guard. He also served on the Executive
20 Board of the Detroit Police Officers Association
21 (DPOA) as a union steward.

22 On Saturday, September 14, 2013 after
23 28 years of service Police Officer Rodney Jones,
24 Badge 5020 died while representing the Detroit
25 Police Department in the annual Bikes on Bricks

1 Police Motorcycle Competition held in Flint,
2 Michigan and

3 WHEREAS, during his law enforcement
4 career Officer Jones was the deserving recipient
5 of one Chief's Merit Award, one Chief's Unit
6 Award, three Chief's Citations, the Major League
7 Baseball All-Star Recognition Award, the Rosa
8 Parks Funeral Recognition Award and the Super
9 Bowl XL Recognition Award and numerous letters of
10 commendation from citizens and superiors and

11 WHEREAS, Officer Jones tirelessly
12 served the Detroit Police Department, the
13 citizens of Detroit and its neighboring
14 communities for 28 years. His professionalism,
15 commitment to public service, integrity and
16 dedication were a credit to the Detroit Police
17 Department. He was highly respected as a
18 consummate professional throughout the law
19 enforcement community. His life's combined
20 philosophy was, "What's understood doesn't need
21 to be said." He loved, he lived, he served and
22 savored all life's joys with fervor.

23 NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the
24 Detroit Board of Police Commissioners speaking
25 for the citizens of the city of Detroit and the

1 Detroit Police Department award this resolution
2 posthumously in recognition for Police Officer
3 Rodney Jones' 28 years of dedicated and diligent
4 public service. His professionalism, integrity
5 and standard of commitment to the city of Detroit
6 and its citizens merit our highest regards.

7 We salute you, Officer Rodney W. Jones
8 for a job well done.

9 Signed Detroit Board of Police
10 Commissioners, adopted October 15, 2013.

11 (APPLAUSE.)

12 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Madam
13 Commissioner, were you going to say something
14 there?

15 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: I guess I could
16 read it.

17 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, Madam.
18 How about for retired DC Morris Wells.

19 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR:

20 WHEREAS, Morris Wells, a life-long
21 resident of the city of Detroit was appointed to
22 the Detroit Police Department on June 30, 1975.
23 Upon graduating from the Detroit Metropolitan
24 Police Academy Officer Wells was assigned to the
25 1st Precinct and

1 WHEREAS, Officer Wells was also
2 assigned as a police officer to the 13th, 14th
3 and 16th Precincts, Special Events and Internal
4 Affairs, and

5 WHEREAS, Officer Wells showed
6 tremendous knowledge and dedication and was
7 appointed to the rank of sergeant on September
8 26, 1986. In this role Sgt. Wells was assigned
9 to the Internal Controls Bureau.

10 On December 30, 1994 Sgt. Wells was
11 promoted to the rank of lieutenant where his
12 assignments included the Internal Controls
13 Bureau, the Office of the Executive Chief of
14 Staff and the Personnel Bureau and

15 WHEREAS, Lt. Wells continued to
16 progress in his career and was promoted to the
17 rank of inspector where his assignments included
18 the Personnel Recruiting Section and later became
19 the commanding officer of Internal Controls
20 Division and

21 WHEREAS, Insp. Wells was appointed to
22 the rank of commander on March 17, 2005 where his
23 assignments included Internal Controls, Force
24 Investigation, Homeland Security, the Western
25 District and the 10th Precinct and

1 WHEREAS, Comm. Wells was appointed to
2 the rank of Deputy Chief on August 26, 2011 and
3 was assigned to the Patrol Operations Bureau and
4 the Criminal Investigations Bureau where he
5 remained until his retirement on June 29, 2013
6 and

7 WHEREAS, Deputy Chief Wells dutifully
8 served the citizens of Detroit for more than 38
9 years. During this time he was the deserving
10 recipient of one GOP Commemorative Award, three
11 Chief's Unit Award, one Departmental Citation,
12 two Breaking and Entering Awards, three Perfect
13 Attendance Awards, one Chief's Merit Award and
14 numerous letters of commendation from citizens
15 and superiors and

16 WHEREAS, Deputy Chief Wells has made
17 public service his life's mission and has
18 devotedly served the citizens of Detroit with
19 loyalty, professionalism and integrity. He is
20 highly respected throughout the law enforcement
21 community, by numerous churches, businesses,
22 schools and community organizations as the
23 consummate professional.

24 NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the
25 Detroit Board of Police Commissioners speaking on

1 behalf of the citizens of the city of Detroit and
2 the Detroit Police Department recognize the
3 commitment and life's work of Deputy Chief Morris
4 C. Wells.

5 Your commitment to public service and
6 improving the quality of life for the citizens of
7 the city of Detroit merits our highest regards.
8 We thank you for your leadership and congratulate
9 you, Deputy Chief Morris C. Wells.

10 (APPLAUSE.)

11 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Resolution
12 honoring Investigator Audrey A. Thomas.

13 WHEREAS, Ms. Audrey A. Thomas was
14 appointed to the Detroit Police Department on
15 April 13, 1987. Upon graduating from the Detroit
16 Metropolitan Police Academy Officer Thomas was
17 assigned to the 2nd Precinct and

18 WHEREAS, Officer Thomas faithfully and
19 dutifully worked in numerous areas of the
20 department which included Domestic Violence and

21 WHEREAS, Officer Thomas' love for the
22 city and its citizens was reflected in her career
23 advancement in law enforcement. She was promoted
24 to the rank of investigator on July 24, 1998 and
25 assigned to the Armed Robbery/Home Invasion Unit,

1 the Sex Crimes Unit and later to Internal Affairs
2 where she remained until retirement and

3 WHEREAS, Inv. Thomas was the deserving
4 recipient of one Chief's Merit Award, one Chief's
5 Unit Award, four perfect attendance Awards and
6 numerous letters of commendation from citizens
7 and superiors.

8 WHEREAS, Inv. Thomas has proven to be
9 selfless and giving to the cause of public
10 safety. She retired from the department on April
11 17, 2012 after 25 years of dedicated service to
12 the citizens of Detroit.

13 NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the
14 Detroit Board of Police Commissioners speaking on
15 behalf of the citizens of the city of Detroit and
16 the Detroit Police Department recognize and honor
17 the life-long commitment of Inv. Audrey Thomas.
18 She has devoted her life to public service and
19 safety and has executed the duties of a
20 remarkable police officer. Your extraordinary
21 efforts and selfless giving merits our highest
22 regards.

23 We thank and congratulate you, Inv.
24 Audrey A. Thomas.

25 (APPLAUSE.)

1 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you, Madam
2 Chair and we certainly again congratulate each
3 and all of our retired officers, posthumously and
4 those who have retired for their exemplary
5 service to this department and we will officially
6 move those resolutions at a later date.

7 Let the record reflect that I did
8 receive a message from Commissioner Warfield who
9 sends his regrets that he cannot be here due to
10 his pastoral duties. He's with a member of his
11 congregation who is going to make their
12 transition, so he will not be with us today so we
13 certainly send our prayers to Commissioner
14 Warfield and his church family in his absence.

15 Under announcements our next meeting
16 will be held Thursday, October 31, 2013 at 3 PM
17 here at Detroit Public Safety Headquarters, 1301
18 Third Avenue here in the Michigan Room, Detroit,
19 Michigan 48226.

20 At this time we will have oral
21 communications from the audience. If you wish to
22 address the Board of Police Commissioners we
23 would ask that you come forward. For the purpose
24 of the record please state and spell your first
25 and last name and also please be mindful of the

1 allotted two-minute time period that everyone may
2 have an opportunity to address the Board today.

3 Are there any communications?

4 MS. CRUMP-GIBSON: Good afternoon. My
5 name is Jehan Crump-Gibson. I came before you
6 last week on behalf of one of my clients who is a
7 Detroit police authorized tower and expressed
8 some concerns relative to towing with abans and
9 we were asked to reduce those concerns to writing
10 which I have done this week and I'm going to
11 submit them now.

12 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you very
13 much. Ms. Crump-Gibson, just so you are aware,
14 you are familiar with the conversation that we
15 had last week and upon our next meeting when
16 there is a quorum you can expect a few motions to
17 be made and how we will proceed with that going
18 forward so we certainly appreciate your
19 communication to this body.

20 MS. CRUMP-GIBSON: Thank you.

21 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Good afternoon.

22 MS. GARCIA: Buenos tardes. My name is
23 Jane Garcia. I'm the chair of the board of
24 directors of LA SED which is the oldest Hispanic
25 organization in Southwest Detroit and I've come

1 before you many times in the past and we've had
2 representation on the Commission.

3 I hope that you look forward to
4 replacing Ms. Rivera because we've been waiting a
5 while, we haven't seen that happen and I really
6 do believe we need to have representation because
7 diversity does arrive with everyone at the table.

8 I come before you today because we're
9 very concerned. I sent you a letter,
10 Mr. Vice-Chairman. I wasn't sure if you got it,
11 but I did send you a letter through the e-mail.
12 My concern was with Comm. Serda who was able to
13 be set in Southwest Detroit and he had been there
14 several months, did a lot of work for us. Then
15 they moved him.

16 Stability is something that we're
17 looking forward to. He was able to come forward
18 and do a lot of the things that we needed to be
19 done including we've been under siege the last
20 several -- during the summer where the vandalism
21 that happened in our community, the attacks that
22 happen on the seniors, but he was able to come in
23 and really wrap his arms around -- because he is
24 from -- he is from that area, he knew it well.

25 And I'm just real concerned that they

1 moved him and he had only been there a couple of
2 months and this is the second time he's been
3 moved from there, and I just want you to please
4 look at it.

5 We really would like to appeal to you
6 to please bring back Serda because he does
7 understand the community very well. He speaks
8 the language, he is from there and he knows and
9 basically has a lot of respect.

10 I don't know what was in the process,
11 but I come before you as someone who volunteers
12 and wants to make sure that you know how we feel;
13 gracias.

14 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Ms. Garcia, I
15 think we might have a few questions.

16 MS. GARCIA: And I do have the letter
17 that I did send to you, a copy of the letter that
18 I sent to the emergency manager.

19 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Just one
20 question. And I think that --

21 COMMANDER WILSON: I certainly don't
22 want to speak for Chief Craig, but I will say
23 this. Most of the movements for our new captains
24 were based on -- I'll speak with Serda -- very
25 experienced, very long serving captain. We

1 thought that he was more beneficial in the area
2 that we moved him to because it's going to be a
3 more crime-ridden area.

4 You have a new captain by the name of
5 Steve Waldon who actually used to be at Homicide,
6 very strong investigative background and I'm
7 pretty sure he's going to be --

8 MS. GARCIA: He doesn't speak the
9 language though.

10 COMMANDER WILSON: He does not, but I'm
11 pretty sure you will help him learn some of it,
12 but I'm going to make sure that I have --

13 MS. GARCIA: I think that's why I came
14 before you and I think in fact the minute we had
15 those meetings I sent the letter right away to
16 the emergency manager because we knew that
17 changes were coming and we just weren't ready to
18 be prepared.

19 I mean, we've been under a lot of siege
20 lately. I mean, you have no idea what we --
21 personally LA SED suffered over \$300,000 worth of
22 damages, so we really are under the lot of siege
23 in our community. So to have someone there
24 representing us because he knew it best, it's
25 just a little bit of a change and the new Chief,

1 I don't know him, but I do know Serda, so that's
2 why I wanted to make sure that I came before you
3 all and you're the commissioners.

4 COMMANDER WILSON: I'll make sure that
5 Capt. Waldon partners with Capt. Serda and gets a
6 background on all the issues that's going on in
7 that area and, like the Chief said, we're all a
8 team, so they're just a phone call away.

9 MS. GARCIA: I'll give you an example.
10 Our senior citizens walk around Patton Park. He
11 made sure that officers walked with them because
12 they thought they were at risk. That says that
13 he understood what was going on, so that's why we
14 come before you today; gracias.

15 MS. KOPACK: My name is Laura Kopack
16 and I serve also as the president and legal
17 counsel of LA SED and throughout the summer as
18 Ms. Garcia indicated not only was LA SED under
19 siege, but various other constituencies from our
20 Senior center, from our Youth Center, personal
21 property being vandalized and also people being
22 attacked, and they were not just normal attacks,
23 they were vicious attacks.

24 We've had relationships with the police
25 department before, but prior to that it was a

1 distant relationship. There weren't boots on the
2 ground and there was not a continuing
3 relationship and that's one thing we valued.

4 And as I explained to our Commissioner
5 Taylor it was -- recently it's more been like
6 speed dating and you don't really form a
7 relationship if people come in and out of your
8 community.

9 And the special issues that surround
10 Southwest Detroit with respect to language, with
11 respect to immigration issues, with respect to
12 the ordinance and the Border Patrol and ICE, and
13 quite frankly, our commander that had left the
14 post did have that -- those issues under control.
15 He was boots on the ground.

16 He did have one-on-one relationships
17 with the community. When we called on him, he
18 had special meetings not only with the business
19 associations, but with the community
20 organizations and with the citizens, and while it
21 may not be possible to have him return, however
22 we do expect that whoever is assigned to that
23 post have the same type of relationship and
24 cultural understanding and language understanding
25 and be a boots-on-the-ground police officer.

1 And today we saw one of the Ford cars
2 pass by LA SED that was given by Ford Motor
3 Company and we're very pleased to see that
4 they're back on the street and the police
5 officers were very friendly and we need presence
6 in Southwest Detroit because if you don't work
7 there and if you don't live there you have no
8 idea what the citizens are undergoing right now.

9 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you.
10 Commissioner Taylor?

11 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Yes. I'm hearing
12 a lot about the culture. Are you saying that you
13 would refer to have a Latino in that -- there?

14 MS. KOPACK: Our preference would be
15 because a lot of people do not speak English and
16 some of them that do speak English, it's not very
17 fluent and a lot of times issues with respect to
18 communications arise and rather than have a
19 translator it would be beneficial for an
20 individual to have that type of background and
21 certainly the cultural issue is one that as in
22 all societies there's nuances in everyone's
23 individual cultural group.

24 And if a person is familiar with it
25 sometimes that cements the relationship much

1 better than somebody that does not have that
2 understanding.

3 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Thank you.

4 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Again, Ms. Kopack
5 and certainly, Ms. Garcia, thank you both for
6 coming and certainly LA SED as an anchor
7 institution for this city has served Southwest
8 Detroit and Detroit for that matter extremely
9 well, and I say it is the Chief's prerogative to
10 move members at his pleasure and certainly Comm.
11 Serda is one of the shining stars of this
12 department, and I'm certain individuals will be
13 excited to have him to say the least wherever he
14 lands, but I think this particular moment is in
15 essence what this board has pushed for.

16 For those of you who come weekly know
17 that this is the important part of civilian
18 oversight for law enforcement agencies, not that
19 the board has the ability to weigh in or say who
20 goes where, but the community has a voice through
21 this process.

22 And so we really appreciate you coming
23 to share that sentiment. I'm certain that Comm.
24 Wilson will take that sentiment back to the Chief
25 and we as well will formalize your concerns

1 through our concern to the Chief as well in
2 writing, that if there's anything that can be
3 done we'll ask that it will be done so that there
4 can, at minimum, be a smooth transition between
5 Comm. Serda and -- is it still Comm. Serda?

6 COMMANDER WILSON: Captain.

7 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Capt. Serda and
8 Capt. Steve Waldon. We'll make sure that at
9 minimum there is a smooth transition and that he
10 understands your concerns in your community.

11 MS. KOPACK: Thank you.

12 MS. PANSELL: Good afternoon, Sharon
13 Pannell. I just want to tell the ladies about
14 the captains meet and greet Friday over at
15 Triumph Church. You know about it?

16 It's at Triumph Church on the Boulevard
17 and 75. I don't know the address, but you can go
18 over there and you can meet your captain and the
19 Chief is going to be there.

20 COMMANDER WILSON: It's at 5 PM. Let
21 me see if I can find that address for you.

22 MS. PANSELL: It's 5 to 6, only an
23 hour.

24 COMMISSIONER WHITE: While Comm. Wilson
25 looks for that address, are there others that

1 wish to address the Board of Police
2 Commissioners? Good afternoon, sir.

3 MR. PERELLI: Good afternoon. I am
4 Perelli. I am basically a gentleman who guys --
5 I say in my own opinion as well as the streets
6 need to know. I have a show, a hip-hop show,
7 that's been on the last 13 years in our community
8 and everybody -- as you know, the problem we're
9 having now is the hood is going crazy.

10 And no offense, I love -- I go to
11 church every Sunday, but the church is not going
12 to help, 2-4-7 is not going to help. Shows like
13 myself which is MTV based and hip-hop based.
14 I've been -- I had initiative three years ago
15 that I unfortunately told Channel 2 so when that
16 young man got shot on Warren and Southfield they
17 stole my idea and you guys used Reggie Reg to do
18 the old buy the guns back program and all that,
19 which I initiated should be on my program.

20 Next time we get funding for this grant
21 for buy the guns back program it needs to be
22 publicized on television programs like myself,
23 not -- again, thugs don't watch 2, 4 and 7.

24 But today I came because -- I'm out of
25 breath because I ran because I thought I was

1 late, sorry guys. It's to initiate me and you
2 guys working together.

3 Unfortunately my past brother-in-law
4 was Rodney, Hot Rod, and I ran into Chief Craig
5 at the wake and he asked me one thing. He said,
6 "Do you think you could put together a meeting
7 together with the hood basically and us", the
8 first ever, and I told him yes, because my name
9 is Perelli, I've been on TV and these guys look
10 up to me. I started a lot of people's careers
11 off, so as far as my show is to get the guys who
12 think they're all this on the streets or
13 whatever, whatever God put into them so far as a
14 business, get that out of them so some of them
15 rap some of those things, etc.

16 That's what my show does. Well, today
17 I just came just to introduce myself, let you
18 guys know I'd be willing to work with you so we
19 can set up a program, one short one is just like
20 we do the prostitute and john sting. It needs to
21 be Gang Squad going to one of those cars you all
22 confiscated, ride to all these hot gas stations
23 between 1 AM and 5 AM and you guys will catch a
24 real carjacker. Same way y'all jump out of these
25 dudes paying for these young ladies is y'all

1 could jump out for real killers.

2 So I haven't seen that. I've offered
3 this many times and me and Capt. Roche I believe
4 it is, we started to do more talking so I know I
5 have a short time, so hopefully I would like to
6 talk to you guys again and get this going because
7 without us -- between us two, the city is not
8 going to be cleaned up.

9 My name is Perelli Baker and if you
10 guys have any questions, I am going to be here.
11 I know I have just so much time at the mic.

12 COMMISSIONER WHITE: We appreciate your
13 passion, we look forward to working with you.
14 There's possibly something we can do in one of
15 our community meetings where we can maybe share
16 your ideas with a larger format, so certainly we
17 can talk offline how we can be more strategic in
18 a holistic partnership and I'm sure both from the
19 department's side and the Board's side we've
20 always had an open door to new innovative ideas,
21 particularly coming from the community.

22 MS. PERELLI: I heard there's a Cease
23 Fire program going on or something like right
24 right now?

25 COMMANDER WILSON: There's a Cease Fire

1 program going in the Eastern District right now.
2 I don't know if you're familiar with the premise,
3 but basically it's kind of what you're saying.
4 You take somebody -- the worst of the worst, your
5 trigger pullers, bring them in the room, you sit
6 them down, tell them this is no longer tolerated.
7 We need to have them stop. Then we offer them
8 help to move, trade, help, that so we're in the
9 same -- we're on the same page.

10 Capt. Roche, he's the community
11 liaison, so he's definitely the right person for
12 you to be talking with and I'll make sure that
13 I'm there too.

14 MR. PERELLI: I really appreciate it.
15 Thank you.

16 COMMISSIONER WHITE: What channel is
17 your show on?

18 MR. PERELLI: Right now I'm not trying
19 to promote anything that they're doing right now,
20 so I'm trying to bring it back on with the help
21 of you guys, bringing on positive TV.

22 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Good luck with
23 that. Are there others? Are there others? We
24 can only give you three times.

25 MS. SMITH: Good afternoon. Bernice

1 Smith, political activist. Ladies from LA SED, I
2 will tell you one thing about LA SED. My
3 children went to Western High School --

4 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Direct your
5 comments to the Board.

6 MS. SMITH: I'm letting the Board know.
7 My children attended Western High School before
8 it was international, so that was in the '80s,
9 all right, and the '70s, so I know of LA SED. It
10 is a very prominent active organization there on
11 Scotten and Vernor, so I do praise you in what
12 you do in regards to the area because they went
13 from Earhart Mayberry so I'm familiar with that
14 area.

15 Now, for more serious announcement,
16 most of you know that I do radio commentary on
17 1200. This morning I'm not going to go into all
18 the details and everything, but most of you -- I
19 don't know whether you read the paper today or
20 not.

21 The Chief was a guest -- well, no, he
22 wasn't a guest, he was supposed to be a guest on
23 our show at 10 o'clock, but something developed
24 earlier in the other station, same station, but
25 the other host. It was something that was not

1 nice that was in the paper and spoke about the
2 Chief.

3 But my thing is, being a commentary and
4 knowing what's going on out here in the street
5 and how people will talk, they did say some
6 things that was not pleasant about the Chief and
7 the Chief was quite upset about it.

8 Matter of fact, he was in his car when
9 he called in and I feel as though that he
10 shouldn't have never called into that radio
11 station because it was a trap for him.

12 And I want you, Chief Wilson, when you
13 speak to him when you leave here tell him I said
14 -- Mother Bernice said do not -- whatever they
15 say on the radio or in the paper about him, do
16 not make a scene the way he did and embarrass
17 himself because I was most embarrassed for him
18 because he was angry and he showed it and that
19 was just what the host wanted.

20 It was so bad that he didn't show up on
21 our program and I was quite upset about that, but
22 anyway I just want you to let him know this is a
23 tough world out here. People will talk about
24 you. They did the same to me, but I let it go
25 off my shoulder because the fact I'm too old to

1 be arguing and going on out here.

2 But in the meantime I want him to hold
3 his head up because it's all over the city and I
4 don't want his character to be brought down as
5 far as the police department is concerned because
6 we don't want the morale to drop, we want it to
7 continue to rise, all right.

8 So therefore I just want him to be
9 strong and do not display that character any
10 more. Now they're going to be after him because
11 they found out that he don't carry a gun. I
12 thought that was the worst thing that could have
13 came out of it, but anyway regardless I just want
14 him to be the Chief that he has intended to be
15 and not let people on the air bring him down.

16 Because that's what happened this
17 morning and I was very upset about it and I was
18 going to get him today and jack him up in the
19 corner, but in the meantime you deliver to him my
20 message, don't let it happen again, he's too
21 smart for that.

22 I thank you for your time.

23 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Thank you.

24 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Good afternoon.

25 MR. SCOTT: Good afternoon, Ron Scott,

1 Detroit Coalition Against Police Brutality.

2 I wanted to say to Jane Garcia, I agree
3 with you. I think -- I'm glad that you took the
4 initiative to send to the emergency manager that
5 issue because I've been raising the issues about
6 the executive orders which have stifled
7 essentially the functioning of this body and I
8 think post haste. It's long overdue that that
9 situation be addressed.

10 There may be some reason to address it
11 from a legal definition or clarification, but I
12 hope that this will once again push us to that
13 point where that happens.

14 I would like to say I feel strongly
15 like my brother Perelli. I've worked with a
16 friend of mine who's been publishing a hip-hop
17 magazine for a long time called The Promoter,
18 promoter.com and many of the people who come
19 through our doors are involved.

20 We have a focus program called Peace
21 Zones for Life, much of which is focusing on
22 changing the flow of music and others.

23 As strongly as we push things out, what
24 I'm encouraging us not to do is to set up a
25 scenario and a strategy that makes it a

1 them-against-us scenario.

2 Everybody in the gas station between 1
3 and 5 is not a criminal and everybody that's
4 there between 5 and 7 is not a good guy, so
5 essentially I think what we have to do is talk
6 about community building as opposed to
7 identifying people because of their association.

8 You know, there was an issue here with
9 the whole stop and frisk issue and I want to make
10 sure that that does not occur because when you
11 put certain strategies out, culture develops on
12 both sides of the issue and I think we need to
13 have resolution and mediation as opposed to
14 confrontation and consternation.

15 That is the best way to resolve this.
16 Young people in this city, especially young
17 males, African-Americans, Latinos and so forth,
18 do not need to become the pariah that we build
19 something on. They need to become the anchor for
20 the rebuilding of the city.

21 And so I urge you in the desire to move
22 forward that we not isolate, that we communicate
23 the process and there are many many people who
24 work here. I note that Operation Second Chance
25 and many others that the meetings and the

1 discussions need to be comprehensive, not
2 selective.

3 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Are there others
4 that wish to address the Board of Police
5 Commissioners? Are there others that wish to
6 address the Board of Police Commissioners. Are
7 there others that wish to address the Board of
8 Police Commissioners?

9 Seeing none, we will close that portion
10 of our meeting. Comm. Wilson has that address
11 for those that were wishing to have the date for
12 the captains meet and greet at Triumph Church.

13 COMMANDER WILSON: Again, that's this
14 Friday from 5 to 6 PM, Triumph Church address is
15 2760 East Grand Boulevard, that's Detroit,
16 Michigan 48211. 2760 East Grand Boulevard.

17 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Thank you. Seeing
18 no other announcements and no other business
19 before this body at the time this body will stand
20 adjourned. Thank you.
