CHAIRPERSON BELL: Good afternoon. I'm going to call the weekly meeting of the Board of Police Commissioners to order. This is an afternoon meeting at 3:00. It's about 3:05, at the Public Safety Building. It's good to see all of you here. I want to say first of all, if I haven't had the opportunity to say happy new year, it's the last week; but happy new year. So, I want to say happy new year to all of you. And it's good to see you at our weekly meeting.

I'm Willie Bell. I am your Chair this year until June the 30th of 2015. And I'm looking forward to the rest of the months that I have to interact in this particular seat. So, it's a blessing to see the commissioners that's here. And we are going to call the meeting to order at this time. Look like we have a proper quorum.

Let us pray. Heavenly Father, we just thank you for this day. We thank you for a new year, a new opportunity, Heavenly Father. We just want to give you the honor and the glory and praise. And we thank you for your grace and mercy each and every day of our

1 lives.

2 Heavenly Father, as we go forth as  
3 commissioners, we ask your blessings on our  
4 commissioners, a blessing on our chief and our deputy  
5 chief who is here and others that are coming and those  
6 who cannot make it. Heavenly Father, we ask a blessing  
7 on our law enforcement family and our community,  
8 Heavenly Father. We just want for reach out to those  
9 who are hurting, Heavenly Father. We need a healing  
10 touch that you might touch their heart and touch their  
11 spirit as we need peace and tranquility in our community  
12 and in our lives.

13 So, once again, we are just thankful as we  
14 pause to give you the honor, give you the glory because  
15 we know that all of the above is about you in terms of  
16 your grace and mercy that we have this opportunity to  
17 serve. And surely we are servants of the Lord in some  
18 capacity, in some form. We just want to say thank you,  
19 thank you. We come to you in Jesus' name. Let us all  
20 say Amen.

21 I'm going to ask our Board secretary to  
22 acknowledge the commissioners that's seated, and that's  
23 Mr. George Anthony, our Board secretary.

24 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you, Mr. Chair.  
25 This is a role call for commissioners. Commissioner

1 Lisa Carter has asked to be excused today. Commissioner  
2 Willie B. Burton?

3 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Present.

4 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Commissioner Reginald  
5 Crawford?

6 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Present.

7 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Commissioner Conrad  
8 Mallett has asked to be excused today. Commissioner  
9 Ricardo R. Moore?

10 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Present.

11 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Commissioner Richard  
12 Shelby is just walking in, sir. So, he is here.  
13 Commissioner Jessica Taylor, I believe she is running  
14 late as well. And Bishop Edgar Vann?

15 COMMISSIONER VANN: Present.

16 SECRETARY ANTHONY: And Commissioner Donnell  
17 R. White?

18 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Present.

19 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Mr. Chair, you do have a  
20 quorum.

21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, sir. I'd like  
22 to introduce sitting in for Chief James E. Craig is our  
23 Deputy Chief Charles Fitzgerald to my far left.

24 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: Yes, sir.

25 CHAIRPERSON BELL: For us, we're going to get

1 to know him a little bit better, he is going to be known  
2 as Chuck. That's the formal introduction of him. And  
3 it's good see you this afternoon.

4 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: Thank you.

5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. And  
6 Mr. Secretary, would you introduce the staff for the  
7 Board of Police Commissioners?

8 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Thank you, sir. Miss  
9 Pamela Davis Drake, our chief investigator, her mom  
10 passed; and so, she is out today. And the funeral will  
11 be Saturday, and the viewing is tomorrow. That  
12 information went out to all the commissioners.

13 Miss Linda Bernard is out. She is -- she had  
14 surgery on her eyes. But we are blessed to have  
15 Mr. Lawrence Akbar from the chief investigator's office.  
16 He's our supervising investigator. We also have  
17 Mr. Robert Brown, our office manager. And Sergeant  
18 Allen Quinn is recording our proceedings, and Miss Wendy  
19 Boer from Hanson Court Reporting Service is taking a  
20 transcript. That completes the introductions, sir.

21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, sir. I want to  
22 add, if you need information or require information in  
23 reference to chief investigator's mother, you can see me  
24 after the meeting or our Board secretary as far the  
25 audience or any others, and we will provide information.

1 But the funeral is going to be Saturday morning in  
2 Westland. So, if you want specifics on that, we can  
3 share that with you or the chief investigator or I mean  
4 supervising investigator will have that information also  
5 in reference to --

6 And while we are on that note of sadness, I  
7 just want to acknowledge Commissioner Crawford in terms  
8 of his mother home going was last week, held at  
9 Ebenezer. Myself and Commissioner Moore and the  
10 presiding -- Bishop Vann was presiding bishop in terms  
11 of Ebenezer Church. It was a great service, filled with  
12 the Holy Spirit in the house because she was a mother of  
13 the church. And she served faithfully not only the Lord  
14 but her family and the community and her church.

15 So, it was a service that we celebrated. And  
16 I just wanted to acknowledge that. As Commissioner  
17 Moore seated here, her first time to hear him preach.  
18 But he didn't preach, he did the eulogy. But I'm  
19 familiar with his spirit in terms of bringing the word  
20 and sharing the Holy Spirit with us.

21 So, it was a good service. And I know that  
22 the Crawford family was blessed by that experience  
23 because this was her church. This is her family that  
24 come from the east side of Detroit. Just want to throw  
25 that in there. Blessings of 95 years. So, you was

1 truly blessed to have a mom -- and my understanding that  
2 I can see where you got your spirit from. She was a  
3 person to be reckoned with. But she had a loving touch.  
4 So, I just want the record to reflect that Willie B.  
5 Crawford made her transition. But she went to higher  
6 ground.

7 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Through the Chair, I  
8 just want to make a public acknowledgement, thank  
9 everyone for their support, prayers and the blessings.  
10 And it was a great homecoming. And I just want to thank  
11 everyone for all their kind words and support. Thank  
12 you.

13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commission, you have before  
14 you Item Number 7, approval of the agenda. So, the  
15 Chair would entertain a motion to that effect.

16 COMMISSIONER VANN: So moved.

17 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Second.

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Been properly moved and  
19 second. Ready for the question? All those in favor?

20 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Those opposed? Motion  
22 carries. In your packet and prior to, you have the  
23 minutes from Thursday, January 8, 2015. Commissioners,  
24 the Chair would entertain a motion to that effect.

25 COMMISSIONER WHITE: So moved.



1 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Support.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: It's been properly moved  
3 and second. Ready for the question? Those in favor,  
4 aye.

5 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Those opposed? Motion  
7 carried. First, my report is going to be brief and to  
8 the point. Basically, we held a press conference this  
9 past Tuesday at Pleasant Grove Missionary Baptist  
10 Church, Commissioner Shelby, myself and others.  
11 Michigan United Detroit Pastoral Alliance for Change.  
12 And Reverend Forsythe, the pastor, and that  
13 organization, Minister Alliance, hosted the press  
14 conference.

15 And it went forth in terms of media coverage  
16 reference to I think the Free Press and Channel 2 and  
17 the radio media and others in terms of their support for  
18 our position in terms of the lack of power we have, in  
19 terms of our standing with the City Charter.

20 So, that moved forth. And on that note, I  
21 just want to further elaborate, on January 20th, next  
22 Tuesday, at 7:00 p.m., at the same church, Pleasant  
23 Grove Missionary Baptist Church, there's going to be a  
24 prayer rally initially. And then we're going to have a  
25 social justice forum afterwards. And that timeframe, if

1 we go a little bit late, we'll probably stay to hear our  
2 president. But you don't really have to you. But I  
3 just want ocirculate the information out.

4 I know it was somewhat short notice. But the  
5 Minister Alliance have a tight schedule. And they was  
6 trying to work this in to kick it off for January of  
7 2015. So, we was pleased in terms of the PR. And as we  
8 know, we wanted to have something in terms of the church  
9 foundation in terms of prayer and the rally and deal  
10 with the issues at hand. You know the issues at hand.

11 It just surfaced again in terms of the Grosse  
12 Pointe officer and Highland Park. So, I think  
13 announcing this would be right on time. And we invite  
14 the commissioners and the public to attend if your  
15 schedule permit and others who might want to come out  
16 next Tuesday at 7:00 p.m., and that we would welcome  
17 that type of support.

18 If not, you keep us in your prayers as we move  
19 forward in terms of an agenda for 2015 in reference to  
20 our Charter-mandated duties and responsibilities that we  
21 are advocating. And I know that's going to happen this  
22 year. So, I'm a man of faith and you are too. So, we  
23 have to do work to achieve that purpose. So, on that  
24 note, that is my brief report.

25 Now, the next item would be Number 10.

1 Sitting in for the Chief as I mentioned earlier would be  
2 Deputy Chief Fitzgerald. You have the mic and you have  
3 the floor.

4 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: Yes, sir. Through  
5 the Chair, the Chief does send his regrets. I know the  
6 folks in the audience want to come see the Chief. But  
7 unfortunately today you're stuck with me shortly. I'll  
8 go through the stats real quickly.

9 Year-to-date stats as of this morning,  
10 everything is looking really good. When I look at it, I  
11 look at those green arrows. If the green arrows are  
12 good, they're going down. Every statistical category is  
13 going down with the exception of homicide. We have seen  
14 a slight uptick since the beginning of the year. We are  
15 up at about 66 percent over this same time last year.  
16 But it's a number of ten versus four. So, it's -- we  
17 are working on it. We are truly working on that.

18 Robbery, sexual assault, everything is a  
19 double-digit reduction. Those are the numbers we really  
20 want to see, even the Part 1 property crimes, 37 percent  
21 decrease, 25 percent decrease. So, the numbers are  
22 looking good as of this morning.

23 The other thing I want to talk about is the  
24 Auto Show. Tomorrow night is the Charity Preview which  
25 kind of kicks everything off. I know there's been media

1 previews and industry previews this week. But we will  
2 be open to the public starting January 17, Saturday,  
3 running through January 25th on a Sunday. So, it's  
4 going to be congested downtown, which is good. It's  
5 good for everything downtown.

6 Lastly, the Chief wanted me to talk about next  
7 Friday, January 23rd, we have a promotion class coming  
8 out of the Academy. And we also have graduation. There  
9 will be a graduation ceremony plus promotional  
10 ceremonies for lieutenants, sergeants, captains,  
11 commanders. That will start at about 10:30 a.m., at  
12 Greater Grace. So, we'd love to have everyone come out  
13 and attend. That would be great. That's about it, sir.

14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioners, any  
15 questions or concerns in reference to Deputy Chief's  
16 report on behalf of the Chief?

17 COMMISSIONER VANN: Mr. Chair, I think that  
18 you've already missed a very relevant situation. I  
19 don't know if we have it agendized (sic) or not. But  
20 maybe the Deputy Chief would like to give us some  
21 background on the incident that occurred with regard to  
22 the Highland Park Police and the Grosse Pointe Police  
23 and just exactly -- we understand there were no DPD  
24 involved in that. And, I think we are all happy to hear  
25 that.

1                   But we know it did happen within our  
2 jurisdiction. So, could you just address that for us?

3                   DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: Yes, sir. Through  
4 the Chair, without going into too much because it is an  
5 active investigation. It is going to be investigated  
6 through Grosse Pointe Park. The task force that was  
7 assigned to this investigation -- well, for the  
8 carjacking investigation was the Action Team that takes  
9 place out of Grosse Pointe Park, led by Grosse Pointe  
10 Park. We do have a sergeant and one police officer  
11 assigned to that task force. The sergeant was on  
12 vacation.

13                   And for those that actually watched the video,  
14 we had -- after everything was done, we had our officer  
15 actually did walk up, and then he walked back out of the  
16 scene. That's the only involvement that he had. It's  
17 my understanding he didn't witness anything. He pulled  
18 up after the fact. But that investigation will have to  
19 play itself out.

20                   COMMISSIONER MOORE: Through the Chair, are  
21 there any Memorandums of Understanding when you put  
22 together a task force such as that?

23                   DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: Yes.

24                   COMMISSIONER MOORE: Is it a cookie cutter or  
25 certain dynamics -- I understand some of those different

1 jurisdictions have tasers, whereas we don't in Detroit.  
2 How does that go into play or can we see a copy of the  
3 Memorandum of Understanding?

4 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: Absolutely. I'm  
5 sure that can be forwarded to you. Every MOU is set up  
6 differently, based on the sponsoring task force. That  
7 was put together by Grosse Pointe Park. The MOU was  
8 drafted by Grosse Pointe Park and agreed upon by all the  
9 parties. We have the task force with the DEA, FBI, all  
10 separate, all individual -- individually drafted for  
11 whatever specification they see fit in the MOU. But a  
12 copy could be forwarded.

13 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Okay. Thank you.

14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Any other questions,  
15 concerns?

16 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Through the Chair,  
17 point of clarification. It's my understanding the  
18 investigation is being conducted by the state police.  
19 Wayne County Prosecutor, they wanted her to do the  
20 investigation, and she handed it over to the state  
21 police.

22 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: That's very  
23 possible. The last I heard, it was going back to Grosse  
24 Pointe.

25 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Well, that's possible.

1 But the state police, last I understood, the state  
2 police was supposed be the ones conducting that  
3 investigation. I think that's appropriate that the  
4 state police conduct the investigation because the  
5 organization, be it Grosse Pointe or any police  
6 department, to investigate such an incident of their own  
7 officers is like asking a fox to investigate the hen  
8 house.

9 But look forward to, you know, once the  
10 investigation is terminated as to what really happened  
11 out there. And I just want to add on the comment that  
12 this is further evidence that police -- that personal  
13 body cams are important not only for Detroit but all  
14 officers to be wearing body cams. And you have a  
15 different look.

16 There hasn't been a news media outlet that I  
17 have ever been interviewed by that didn't have two  
18 cameras. Every TV station has two, three or four  
19 cameras in the studio so you get a different -- it's  
20 like us being able to show -- one can say the police can  
21 tell their side or show their side of the story.

22 And also, the citizen had the cell phone and  
23 put it on Facebook you know. That's how it went viral  
24 so to speak. But we don't in Detroit. And, you know,  
25 it's been stated that we weren't involved in it. But

1 also those officers out there, they didn't have --  
2 there's no video, you know, for them to present their  
3 side. So, look forward to the completion of the  
4 investigation and, you know, let the chips fall where  
5 they may.

6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Commissioners.  
7 I just might want to add that when they had the homeless  
8 situation in Grosse Pointe on Mack, there was an effort  
9 to communicate concerns. And they somewhat addressed it  
10 at Commissioner Killeen, Tim Killeen of Wayne County  
11 which is his district and my district, District 4. And  
12 Councilman Spivy, who was just District 4 also and State  
13 Rep Alberta Tinsley-Talabi. We somewhat met in  
14 reference to that issue.

15 Commissioner Killeen suggested that we need to  
16 have some ongoing dialog with reference to Grosse Pointe  
17 Park and the issues at hand, and he wanted to initiate  
18 that. And I said I'm willing to participate because  
19 it's one thing to demonstrate but it's another thing to  
20 have some followup dialog, you know, in reference to --  
21 because I think those are plainclothes officers. Body  
22 cams would not be applicable to plainclothes officers  
23 wearing those at all. But it was on videotape. And the  
24 media been going after it for the past two, three days.  
25 And it's been ongoing.



1                   So, we hope to initiate that. And I'll report  
2 back to you how soon that takes place. But we not going  
3 to be rushing in on this issue. We're looking at  
4 overall concerning, you know -- I don't know about  
5 Highland Park, but I'd say Grosse Pointe Park and DPD,  
6 either issue about the area. So, it's going to be  
7 ongoing. And I was pleased that the Mayor weighed in on  
8 it right off the top in terms of contacting the  
9 Prosecutor Worthy. And she suggested state police. I  
10 think they will probably do a better job with the  
11 investigating because they have an expertise and they  
12 would be somewhat impartial. But I'm pretty sure Grosse  
13 Pointe Park, because they obligated as officers, their  
14 officer is involved too. They would have their own  
15 in-house investigation like we would have too if we was  
16 involved, internal affairs, whatever details. But I'm  
17 pretty sure it will work out.

18                   But it's been out there in terms of media  
19 concerns. So, I'm glad you raised those questions,  
20 concerns, at this meeting here. Any other comments or  
21 concerns in reference to the Deputy Chief's report?

22                   COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Through the Chair,  
23 recently, there's been a surge in Family Dollars being  
24 victimized too. I just had one victimized in my area on  
25 Grand River. Any effort by the Detroit Police

1 Department to put together a task force to address the  
2 Family Dollar Stores being robbed?

3 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: Yes, sir. The  
4 Family Dollar Store investigation was sent over to our  
5 violent crimes task force. I can say we have brought  
6 many of them to closure. I don't want to go into too  
7 much because now we are going into a Federal Grand Jury  
8 and whatnot. But they have two adults, one juvenile.  
9 The two adults will be charged. They are looking at  
10 lengthy, lengthy federal prison time.

11 So, I think there was 22 or 20 at one point.  
12 It's -- I think they are going to lock up probably 16 or  
13 17 of them in the closure of getting these three  
14 individuals. The other -- the youth was taken to the  
15 youth home. He's being held at the youth home.

16 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Through the Chair, what  
17 is the federal nexus to those cases?

18 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: A weapon used in a  
19 robbery of a business in multiple -- I would say the  
20 minimum sentencing on two of them are the 80 years. So,  
21 it's a nice little hammer to take. That's the kind of  
22 thing you like to get out and put that up in the Family  
23 Dollar Stores that the last person that robbed this  
24 place is now looking at 80 years in prison or received  
25 80 years in prison. So, very very happy with the

1 outcome of that investigation.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, sir. Any other  
3 comments? We can move to the next item of business  
4 would be standing committee reports. Subcommittees, I  
5 just wanted to share with the commissioners, we have an  
6 opportunity that we must revisit the committee  
7 assignments due to the fact that we have added two  
8 commissioners.

9 So, if you have a desire -- I've already  
10 received one concern with reference to serving on a  
11 committee -- would you send me an e-mail or send it to  
12 the Board secretary, and we will take a look at it and  
13 try to get it finalized by the end of the month.

14 We had a meeting scheduled. But due to Chief  
15 Investigator Drake's mom passing, we had to cancel that  
16 meeting, scratch the meeting this evening. We'll  
17 reconvene as soon as possible. But I don't think it's  
18 going to be next week, probably a couple weeks from now.  
19 Give her time to get herself back together and we back  
20 on schedule. But if you have a committee concern,  
21 please let me know right away, myself directly or the  
22 Board secretary.

23 New business. We have a Resolution. I don't  
24 want to do in injustice to the officer's last name, but  
25 that is Officer Edgardo Aponte. Okay. I think the

1 Resolution is in your package. Would one of the  
2 commissioners be kind to not read the entire Resolution  
3 but read the Now, therefore be it resolved? Do I have a  
4 volunteer?

5 Commissioner Jessica Taylor is now joining us.  
6 Good to see you.

7 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Thank you, sir.

8 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Mr. Chair, I'd be happy  
9 to read the Resolution.

10

11 Resolution Honoring Retiring

12 Police Officer Edgardo Aponte.

13 WHEREAS Edgardo Aponte was appointed to the Detroit Police  
14 Department on April 20, 1987. Upon graduating from the  
15 Detroit Metropolitan Police Academy, Officer Aponte  
16 began his career at the Third Precinct; and

17 WHEREAS Officer Aponte dutifully served the Court Section  
18 for the Eastern District, and Firearms Inventory where  
19 he remained until his retirement; and

20 WHEREAS During his law enforcement career, Officer Aponte  
21 was the deserving recipient of a Major League Baseball  
22 All-Star Recognition Award, the Rosa Parks Funeral  
23 Recognition Award, and the Super Bowl XL Recognition  
24 Award, one (1) Lifesaving Citation and Medal, two (2)  
25 Perfect Attendance Awards, as well as numerous letters

1 of commendation from citizens and superiors; and  
2 WHEREAS Officer Aponte has tirelessly served the Detroit  
3 Police Department, the citizens of Detroit and its  
4 neighboring communities for 27 years. His  
5 professionalism, commitment to public service,  
6 integrity, and dedication has been a credit to the  
7 Detroit Police Department. He is highly respected as a  
8 consummate professional throughout the law enforcement  
9 community.

10 NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED That the Detroit Board of  
11 Police Commissioners, speaking for the citizens of  
12 Detroit and the Detroit Police Department, award this  
13 resolution in recognition of Police Officer Edgardo  
14 Aponte's 27 years of dedicated and diligent public  
15 service. His professionalism, integrity and standard of  
16 commitment to the city of Detroit and its citizens merit  
17 our highest regards and best wishes for continued  
18 success.

19 We salute and congratulate you, Police Officer  
20 Edgardo Aponte. Signed, The Detroit Board of Police  
21 Commissioners.

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Commissioner  
23 White. The Chair would entertain a motion to receive  
24 this Resolution into our archives in terms of formal  
25 records.

1 COMMISSIONER MOORE: So moved.

2 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Second.

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: It's been properly moved an  
4 second. Ready for the question? All those in favor?

5 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: All those opposed? The  
7 motion carries. Thank you, sir. 27 years of  
8 outstanding service. So, that's why we have a class  
9 graduating to fill these shoes of that type of  
10 experience. And I'm pretty sure we always going to see  
11 retirement. And I know as a retiree, we're happy to  
12 look forward to that. But we are concerned about  
13 recruitment and retention and hiring police officer,  
14 good officer for the job.

15 Any old business?

16 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Through the Chair, just  
17 as a question, during our strategic planning session,  
18 there was a conversation -- and I was not present at the  
19 following meeting. But there was a conversation about  
20 the Board starting a fund for incidental things that we  
21 have in our office, i.e., refreshments and the like and  
22 water. And I am not clear if that motion was put forth.

23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: No, no motion. We were  
24 waiting on you to get back to address that motion. I  
25 thought we thought it was a great idea. And we thought

1 that Commissioners would be supportive of that because  
2 we need that type of miscellaneous --

3 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Sir, if I could, before I  
4 put the motion forward, just in terms of context,  
5 Commissioners, it's been past practice that  
6 Commissioners have provided funds that allowed this  
7 office to have refreshments, snacks and things when we  
8 are running in and out of the office. And during our  
9 strategic planning session, a recommendation was put  
10 forth that Commissioners would put forth \$100 a year  
11 each. That would allow this pot to the office, that our  
12 refreshments would continue to be stocked.

13 Historically, we have provided one of our  
14 stipend checks back. But I think we just rounded it off  
15 at a hundred dollars each. There was conversations  
16 about each member taking one month versus another month.  
17 And I think the cleanest way to do it would be that each  
18 Commissioner just put forth a hundred dollars between  
19 now and the end of February. And I'll put that into the  
20 form of a motion, Mr. Chair.

21 COMMISSIONER VANN: I second it.

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: It's been properly moved  
23 and second. You ready for the question? Those in  
24 favor?

25 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Those opposed? Motion  
2 carries. And if Commissioner White recalls, I  
3 volunteered to initiate the first check of a hundred  
4 dollars. And I will do that forthwith, next meeting,  
5 the month of January. You do not have to wait. You can  
6 initiate that as soon as possible if you want to dispose  
7 of that item. You can do that or you can wait until  
8 whatever it is. But we want to establish that fund  
9 right away because we have some instances that we can  
10 utilize in terms of miscellaneous issues. Thank you,  
11 Commissioner White.

12 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Mr. Chair, just through  
13 the motion, I believe it was referenced that by the end  
14 of February. And so, through the Chair, if we could ask  
15 our secretary to memorialize that in the memo to all  
16 commissioners that before February 28th, our commitment  
17 of a hundred dollars be fulfilled.

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I'm glad you clarified that  
19 motion. So, you heard the deadline. And we want you to  
20 be in good spirit, to surrender your funds as soon as  
21 possible by that deadline. Thank you, sir. Thank you,  
22 sir. That was timely.

23 Any other discussion as far as old business?  
24 Announcement. Our next community meeting will be the  
25 second Thursday in February, February 12th, Matrix Human



1 Service Center, 13560 East McNichols, in the area of  
2 Gratiot and 6 Mile, for you westsiders. That's at  
3 6:30 p.m.

4 So, we should be -- if you get a copy of the  
5 agenda, you have time to look it up and share it with  
6 others on how to find that location. Some of you know,  
7 District 3. Whose district is that?

8 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: That's mine.

9 CHAIRPERSON BELL: The host Commissioner is  
10 going to be Commissioner Crawford. And that's  
11 Councilman Scott Benson also in that area. So, I know  
12 we are going to have a great turnout over there. And  
13 so, I'm looking forward to Gratiot and 6 Mile. And that  
14 center, they do a whole lot of activities there ongoing,  
15 you know, you used to work in that building too, right?

16 COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: I am there now.

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: So, that's the next  
18 location. We follow the script to make sure we  
19 communicate that meeting notice early enough for people  
20 to do some pre-planning. Thank you, Robert Brown, in  
21 terms of working out the logistics on that.

22 Our next meeting would be next week on  
23 Thursday, January 22nd, right here at the Detroit Public  
24 Safety Headquarters at 3:00. So, that's the timeframe  
25 for our next meeting and any of our community meetings.

1 So, mark your calendar. Mother Bernice, did you get  
2 that?

3 MS. SMITH: Yes, sir.

4 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay, good. Item  
5 Number 15, oral communication from the audience. At  
6 this time, you have two minutes. We are somewhat  
7 flexible with that. But we ask you to give your name  
8 and be respectful to make your comments of question or  
9 concern.

10 I want to note for the record, Chief Craig is  
11 not here, but Deputy Chief is sitting here because  
12 sometimes people will state, well, he should be here.  
13 But he's not here. So, we have the Deputy Chief  
14 representing the Chief. So, I don't see anyone have  
15 that concern. But I just think that sometimes we need  
16 to say that off the top so people won't go there. But  
17 he is not here. But we have a highly paid deputy chief.

18 The mic is yours. Please come forward.

19 MR. WELBORNE: Good evening to the Board,  
20 Deputy Chief. Bill Welborne, City Wide. I got a  
21 question. It was brought up, it was talking about the  
22 Dollar Stores. And I was wondering why they're the ones  
23 always getting robbed all the time. When I'm out  
24 patrolling, we tell the Dollar Stores in my area, when  
25 it's time for them to close, we will come around and

1 wait around until their people get out.

2 That is, we will give them a window of  
3 15 minutes. And the one on 8 Mile and Schaefer, we go  
4 around there, we wait 15 minutes, half an hour,  
5 45 minutes. They are still not out of there. And I  
6 tell them, I said, I'm sorry, I can't wait, you know,  
7 half an hour. I'm not going to wait a half an hour for  
8 you. And I have noticed, I go time and time, I go on 7  
9 Mile, you know, Wyoming, 8 Mile and Schaefer. And the  
10 clerks there, they don't pay attention to what's going  
11 on.

12 They're doing this (indicating) all the time.  
13 They never look up to see who is coming into the store.  
14 And I wonder if that's one of the problems or is it  
15 because the cash register is right near the door? You  
16 go in Meijer's, the cash register is all the way down  
17 from the door. And I was wondering if that's the  
18 problem, if it can be solved by moving the cash  
19 registers away from the door or anything else. I'm not  
20 sure. I just been looking at it. And it always comes  
21 up every time I look around, your hear Dollar Castle,  
22 Dollar Store getting robbed.

23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Sir, are you offering that  
24 DPD, Detroit Police Department, can offer them some  
25 crime prevention tips in terms of the do's and don'ts in

1 terms of operating their business, closing and cash  
2 registers, that type of activity? Would that be a  
3 suggestion.

4 MR. WELBORNE: Well, that might be helpful  
5 because, you know, the one on 8 Mile, they got one  
6 little girl there, I think she is about 17. She's by  
7 herself counting money at night. That's ridiculous to  
8 me. And the owners, all they worry about is money you  
9 know. Sometimes you got to cut back a little bit.

10 I been in business myself. And you got to  
11 have people there all the time to watch the place. And  
12 you got to forget making that extra dollar. You make a  
13 hundred, you want to make two hundred, that extra  
14 hundred.

15 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I don't think we can tell  
16 them how to run their business, but I think we can  
17 perhaps offer some crime prevention tips in terms of --

18 MR. WELBORNE: That might help, anything,  
19 because --

20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Maybe the Deputy Chief --  
21 maybe the neighborhood officer or the crime prevention  
22 could go out and do some surveying and offer that type  
23 of service you're suggesting perhaps.

24 MR. WELBORNE: Go by there and talk to them or  
25 something like that. I've talked to Officer Crauter

1 (phonetic) over at the 12th over there. And I told them  
2 about it. And I think he's went by the one on Schaefer  
3 and 8 Mile and talked with them. But maybe we might  
4 have to do it all around the city. I'm not sure. I'm  
5 just trying to come up with some kind of solution  
6 because you hear it every day, every day. They get  
7 tired of hearing it, you know. So, I just thought I'd  
8 bring that up.

9 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: Just for the Chair,  
10 we have met with the Family Dollar loss prevention team  
11 numerous times. We had just not even six months ago we  
12 had the senior vice president for Family Dollar upstairs  
13 on the fourth floor. We discussed all these matters  
14 with them. They have changed their policy quite a bit  
15 to keep some of their money unfortunately. And I say  
16 unfortunately because they are not willing to bend on  
17 how they have their setup right now.

18 Some of the things they have changed is  
19 that -- it's unfortunate for their employees that if you  
20 get robbed for more than \$250, the employee is fired  
21 because they think it's an inside job. So, they have  
22 protocol. They have to drop money so often. It's a  
23 cash business unfortunately. So, they do become a  
24 target unfortunately, especially --

25 MR. WELBORNE: They want to lose money, is

1 that the deal?

2 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: We have talked to  
3 them numerous times, sir. We have pushed that for years  
4 now.

5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: That's all we can do, sir.  
6 Like I said, it's a cash business. And they got  
7 criteria on how they operate. But we can still  
8 constantly suggest. But if you providing the service,  
9 then I would just give it my best shot, move on to  
10 another Dollar Store, could be more helpful in terms of  
11 that wait period that you might appreciate. I don't  
12 know. But we appreciate it.

13 MR. WELBORNE: Most of them about the same.  
14 They tell you they're going to be out in the fifteen  
15 minutes. I can say fifteen minutes, we out there with  
16 the light going around. And people see the light, they  
17 have to keep on going. So, we try to make sure people  
18 get out and they'll be safe. And after that, I can't  
19 wait a half hour. I got to patrol my area.

20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I understand, sir. Thank  
21 you. Thank you. Any others?

22 MR. MAYFIELD: Good afternoon. My name is  
23 Roscoe Mayfield. I'd just like to make a comment. This  
24 happened, incident happened, in the Eighth Precinct on  
25 Grand River and Southfield at the Power House Gym.

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Excuse me.

2 MR. MAYFIELD: And it was an incident that  
3 could have turned out bad but turned out good because of  
4 the response to the scene by the scout car. What  
5 happened was that two gentlemen that was in there  
6 working out. They see another gentleman that had  
7 committed a crime against them. And they wanted to get  
8 into a fight, altercation. The owner of -- the mother,  
9 goes out to try to quell the situation.

10 And like they was getting ready to go out to  
11 the car to get some type of weapons. And one of the  
12 other members in the gym called the police. And the  
13 police responded in a good time to quell anything that  
14 might have got out of hand.

15 So, I just wanted to put that out there that,  
16 you know, lot of times I get on about the department not  
17 responding in good time. But this time they did a good  
18 job. And just wanted to mention that.

19 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, sir. Appreciate  
20 it.

21 MS. SMITH: Good afternoon. Bernice Smith. I  
22 know I can't -- to the Commissioners, I know I can't  
23 speak to my favorite dinner partner over there. But  
24 welcome to our meeting. Let me explain it to you. Now,  
25 we were at an affair, and he was substituting for the

1 chief. And we sat next to each other at the dinner.  
2 And it was very informative. That was my first time  
3 meeting him. So, he is a nice young man. So, I  
4 appreciate him.

5 The only thing I want to tell you today is  
6 that Commissioner Bell made a very good presentation on  
7 the air yesterday on Mildred Gatis' show. He explained  
8 what the Commissioner committee is going through with  
9 all this trying to take away your power. And I think he  
10 made a good presentation in regards to that.

11 Also, I am so glad that it wasn't the Detroit  
12 Police Department that was out there in this situation.  
13 And I had a meeting with the Mayor. I was at a meeting  
14 that he was in attendance to Tuesday. And I mentioned  
15 it to him also. And he said, Miss Smith, we are going  
16 to take care of it. But the fact is I just told him I  
17 was elated because I feel as though the Detroit Police  
18 Department, they know what they have to do. They know  
19 how to take a prisoner into captivity.

20 And also, first thing I believe that what they  
21 should have did to avoid all this was search the man.  
22 This way before you handcuff him, I think you should  
23 search all the criminals.

24 I'm going to get through in a minute. But  
25 anyway, I'm just glad that the police department was not



1 involved. And I understand that Kim Worthy, she's  
2 passed it on to the state police. And I think the state  
3 police will do a good job. They know what they can do.  
4 In other words, they have a good reputation, and they  
5 will take care of it. I'm through, Brown. Thank you so  
6 much.

7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Mother Bernice, anything  
8 else you want to say? I thought I'd surprise you with  
9 that.

10 MS. SMITH: Well, another thing, it kind of  
11 bothers me -- I would think -- I know you got a lot --  
12 most of you have a lot to do. And times when we lose  
13 one of our loved ones -- but I think it's nice to know  
14 that you should show up to one of you -- each one of  
15 you's service of your relatives. I was there and had a  
16 nice time meeting his family with Crawford and Bell. I  
17 missed your speech.

18 But the Reverend, you guys, you all missed  
19 something. The Reverend can really lay it out. He is a  
20 good -- I know him way back in the 70's when he was --  
21 do you still have the task of music like you did?

22 COMMISSIONER VANN: I still --

23 MS. SMITH: He has talent on top of talent.  
24 He was a director of a choir. We used to go to Joe  
25 Lewis Arena. And when he get up there with his choir to

1 sing, everybody was silent. And it was just a wonderful  
2 presentation that he did. And he is -- he gets happy  
3 too along with his singers and jumps up and down and  
4 going on. But I just want to let him know he's come a  
5 long way. And I'm very proud to know that he is still  
6 here doing the Lord's work. And we are very proud of  
7 you. And I just want to let you guys know, it's nice  
8 when you come to attend one of your members' services.  
9 See, I been in the funeral business for so long. And it  
10 makes you feel good when you know that your members care  
11 about you and come and give their condolences. So,  
12 that's all I got to say. I'm not fussing now. I'm just  
13 telling you to remind you to come whenever you have a  
14 service for one of you. It's nice to see when you come  
15 and hug us you know. It really feel good. I'm through.  
16 Thanks, Brown.

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Any other comments from the  
18 audience? I just want to say that the last most  
19 pressing matter from 2014, we are concerned about the  
20 cab driver situation. And they was at our last meeting,  
21 and the Chief was there. And I just hope that  
22 Commissioner Crawford and others, that we can weigh in  
23 to see how we can assist to resolve this issue in  
24 reference to the cab drivers in the city of Detroit  
25 that's trying to conduct their business in a safe

1 manner. When I heard -- I think this young man -- are  
2 you a cab driver?

3 MR. JONES: Yes, sir, I'm a cab driver.

4 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I just want to say -- I'm  
5 going to give you the mic in one minute. I just think  
6 that if we can try to weigh in on it, to see how can we  
7 work some type of conclusion to that. I know the Chief  
8 -- hopefully the staff is going to meet with them from  
9 last week. I don't know if that took place.

10 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: I don't either. I  
11 can find out though.

12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I would hope that you could  
13 indicate that we are concerned and perhaps report back  
14 at the next meeting in terms of where we are, you know,  
15 where we at with that particular matter.

16 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: Yes, sir.

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I just think that it's a  
18 hazardous job. In most cities, cabs are -- really do  
19 extremely well. They provide a service. We was in  
20 Kansas City, you know. It was just really a plus plus  
21 to have that type of accommodation. And it's  
22 unfortunate it's not the case here when I hear about a  
23 cab driver receiving, you know, 15, 20 tickets you know.  
24 I don't know all about the bottom line. But I do know  
25 that we need to have some more dialog to see can we

1 resolve that to some type of resolution.

2 So, I know they have been before Council. I  
3 suggested if they can't get it resolved at that level,  
4 they need to take it to the top. And that would be the  
5 Mayor of the city of Detroit, Mayor Duggan in terms of  
6 weighing in on it. But when I hear the other businesses  
7 trying to -- you know, when I hear the pushback, that  
8 other black businesses are trying to stay downtown or  
9 mid town and they get pushed out of Detroit downtown,  
10 you know, that's a division right there. And we should  
11 be conscious about, you know, people that were  
12 established at Cobo Hall for a long time, and they was  
13 moved out of that building there.

14 So, you should know, that we should be  
15 concerned in a city with 80 percent African-Americans in  
16 terms of trying to do business in the city of Detroit,  
17 it's a challenge. And that's the feedback I have been  
18 getting. How can we address that? I just -- I am not  
19 on a soapbox. I think we need to look at this  
20 particular matter that falls --

21 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, sir. Through the  
22 Chair, I haven't had any recent communication with the  
23 president of the cab company which come before us and  
24 was at our last meeting. I had -- after that meeting,  
25 we communicated twice within a week. And I told him to

1 make sure that he calls me and communicates, you know,  
2 with me in terms of whenever there's a meeting or the  
3 next meeting with the Chief or anyone so that we could  
4 get some kind of -- resolve some of these issues. And  
5 it's really a very critical time because this is the  
6 Auto Show. It's the International Auto Show at this  
7 time which starts -- actually tomorrow is the actual  
8 Black Tie Night.

9 And this is the busiest time of the year for a  
10 cab this week, the week of the Auto Show. So, it's not  
11 only this year but also too, you know, it's the way that  
12 you provide a living for yourself and your family. So,  
13 I will reach out to him again sometime this evening or  
14 tomorrow. But he hasn't informed me of any meeting or  
15 any movement so to speak on that issue.

16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, sir. I know  
17 you're going to do a followup on that.

18 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: I'm sorry. Through  
19 the Chair, Sergeant Carter, once the gentleman is  
20 finished, she can follow up as well. She has  
21 information.

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: You want to speak now?

23 MR. JONES: I'm part of the Cab Association.  
24 Our next meeting is on the --

25 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Your name?

1 MR. JONES: Daniel Jones. Our next meeting is  
2 the 28th at the Whole Foods, second floor. That's our  
3 next meeting. I am coming here to let you guys know  
4 that. This is nine tickets in less than two weeks. I  
5 was given the ticket from a police officer because he  
6 said that I was standing in the wrong spot. Okay.  
7 Well, I accepted that that week.

8 Well, he stopped me the following week and had  
9 my cab towed and had me arrested. Well, now he had me  
10 arrested, they said I had a warrant for my arrest in  
11 Flint. Well, we checked it. The warrant wasn't for  
12 Daniel Jones. The warrant was for Daniel Martin Jones.  
13 He knew that I was not that guy. So, I got my cab  
14 towed.

15 I been out of work ever since then. I'm  
16 trying to get my -- I drive a CDL -- I have a CDL  
17 license that he know I have. That's how I make my  
18 living, driving. I'm a driver. I can't get a job right  
19 now because -- until I get rid of these tickets.

20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Sir, why don't we do this?  
21 We're going to allow the Sergeant to speak if you would  
22 take your seat because you were at our last meeting you  
23 raised your concerns. And perhaps you can talk -- once  
24 again, I know you was going to meet with the Chief's  
25 staff at that meeting. I don't know if it took place.

1 Perhaps the Deputy Chief can talk to you one on one  
2 after the meeting. But we are going do a followup in  
3 reference to Commissioner Crawford is going to take the  
4 lead. I know Deputy Chief Washington was involved. But  
5 you made it clear, two or three individuals spoke to  
6 that matter last week. So, we are going to follow up.  
7 That's why I made the remarks in reference to this  
8 issue. We are going to try to work it out or get some  
9 type of resolution to it. So, would you entertain --

10 MR. JONES: Well, I also attended a meeting of  
11 the City Council. I hear one thing. They -- City  
12 Council say one thing. I hear the police officer say  
13 another thing you know. My life depends on me driving.

14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir.

15 MR. JONES: At the present time, I am not  
16 employed. I have to wait until March before I can even  
17 apply for a job.

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: We hear you, sir. We hear  
19 you loud and clear. Thank you, sir.

20 SERGEANT CARTER: Good afternoon, Sergeant  
21 Carter, Downtown Services. In relation to your  
22 complaints as far as the cabs, we have been working  
23 diligently with the Cab Association. October 3rd, we  
24 issued a teletype for a relaxed enforcement with the cab  
25 drivers. And then we went back in on November the 3rd

1 and we extended it until February 3rd.

2 We passed over 35 complaints of a cab driver  
3 saying they were issued ORDS that were unfair. Those  
4 ORDS, we went through and we did our investigation. The  
5 ORDS were legitimately issued. The issue is that  
6 downtown Detroit doesn't provide a whole lot of cab  
7 stands. But what we have done since this ORD was  
8 issued, the teletype was issued back in October, we have  
9 made accommodations to afford them ample space for them  
10 to stage.

11 If you look over here at Washington Boulevard  
12 in front of the Book Cadillac, that side -- on the side,  
13 on the north side next to the Federal Collateral  
14 Building, there's a spot there. It's a curb cutout.  
15 And it allows at least seven to eight cabs that stands  
16 there. But what a lot of cab drivers will do, they will  
17 park their cab and stand across the street. They will  
18 run into the hotel. So now they are obscuring the  
19 rotation of the cabs.

20 So, if you're not there with your cab and a  
21 police officer rolls up and see that, then unfortunately  
22 the violation is there. As far as like their trip  
23 sheets, our officers downtown really haven't been  
24 issuing those unless there was a clear violation on it.  
25 What a lot of cab drivers are -- maybe they don't



1 understand correctly that their trip sheet have to be  
2 filled out correctly. I believe they are under the  
3 assumption that officers cannot write trip tickets. But  
4 an officer can write a trip ticket ORD if that trip  
5 ticket is not filled out correctly.

6 We really haven't been writing their ORDS for  
7 their location. If they're at MGM, we're not writing  
8 the ORDS if they don't have the correct address. We  
9 have been going along with the MGM. For the Auto Show,  
10 we're providing four different staging areas for them  
11 because we know this is their season. This is their  
12 time to make money. We are not here to prevent anybody  
13 from making their money.

14 So, I can give you my number. You can have  
15 your association give me a call or they can call down to  
16 our office and myself or Captain Paty (phonetic) will  
17 work it out along with Lieutenant Lewis to make sure  
18 they know exactly where those staging areas are. We  
19 don't mind making sure that they know exactly what it is  
20 the officers are looking for when they are pulled over.

21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Sergeant Carter, spacing.  
22 Are you talking about official designated signs for cab  
23 drivers to park or stand?

24 SERGEANT CARTER: Well, we have allotted extra  
25 spaces for them because we know there's not a lot.

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: How do we resolve to have  
2 official -- this is above your pay grade I know. I want  
3 to pose the question. How do we resolve to have  
4 official signs where cabs can stand together without --

5 SERGEANT CARTER: We've been working with City  
6 Council for the new realignment for cab standing areas.  
7 So, we -- Captain Paty have been working with City  
8 Council to resolve -- the issue haven't been resolved as  
9 of yet. But, I mean like I said, we are allotting them  
10 additional space. Like if you go up in front of the  
11 Renaissance Center on Renaissance Drive, normally it's  
12 two cabs. But we have been allotting four cabs.

13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: That's an informal process.  
14 But at some point in time, you're going to -- I mean,  
15 Council, the Mayor and the police department going to  
16 get to you say by a certain timeframe for official cab  
17 designation signs like no standing, whatever.

18 SERGEANT CARTER: Actually, if you look over  
19 here on Washington Boulevard, there is a sign that is  
20 posted. Most of the places where I'm telling you, there  
21 are official signs that have been stamped in place by  
22 the city of Detroit. The only thing I'm saying is if  
23 it says three, we have been allotting five.

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Five would be more  
25 appropriate then?

1 SERGEANT CARTER: Exactly.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: We'll get to the bottom of  
3 it then. It's not enough space for the cab drivers who  
4 are trying to post themselves to get a fare.

5 SERGEANT CARTER: Exactly.

6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. So, that would be  
7 something that we should really assist --

8 SECRETARY ANTHONY: Mr. Chair, Deputy Chief  
9 Washington called me prior to coming to the meeting.  
10 One of the things is that they are -- an ordinance has  
11 been drafted. A vehicle for hire ordinance has been  
12 drafted. On the 28th, the city, the department, they  
13 are going to City Council; and they are going to talk  
14 about the drafted ordinance. I think some of these  
15 concerns are -- might be part of this new ordinance.  
16 But overcrowding was one of the issues. And I know that  
17 this moratorium that's on right now -- I think that's  
18 what they call it -- goes through February, deals with  
19 overcrowded cab stands as well as the trip sheet  
20 addresses.

21 So, some of the cab drivers were concerned  
22 that when they go to MGM or so, they just put MGM and  
23 not the address. Well, those things have been relaxed  
24 for the moratorium. And they will be covered more so in  
25 this new drafted ordinance that the city is trying to

1 get through.

2 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thanks for that  
3 clarification because that was what my line of  
4 questioning was about.

5 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: That was also too to  
6 further expound on that, I read both your teletypes, and  
7 I do know about the moratorium also. I was in touch and  
8 went to the one meeting at the church. And the Chief  
9 was there and also the president of the Cab Association,  
10 the gentleman in the back and a number of cab drivers.  
11 And that was all discussed and even as you just stated,  
12 there's four additional spaces now because that was the  
13 concern. I mean, so you have done that, I mean, because  
14 basically this week or next week, this Auto Show, you  
15 know, sometimes that's -- I mean a cab driver I mean  
16 makes a lot of money I mean during that period.

17 SERGEANT CARTER: We are doing our best to  
18 assist them understanding that it's nothing in place as  
19 of now for additional. But, I mean, our officers are  
20 aware for the spots that we have designated, these are  
21 designated cab stands.

22 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Okay. And I will need  
23 your number. And if it's okay with you, I will pass it  
24 along to the president of the Cab Association because  
25 I'll call him and see if there's any -- well, there were

1 concerns last week. Like I said, I didn't talk. He was  
2 at our last meeting. I talked to him a couple times.  
3 But my last conversation, they hadn't had a meeting as  
4 of my last conversation with the Chief or anybody. He  
5 said he was going to reach out to Attorney Washington  
6 though. So, I will talk with him, and I will take your  
7 number too because like I said, it's a very critical  
8 time for them. But I do appreciate the temporary spots  
9 because that was a real concern back a few months ago as  
10 to where the staging area -- you know.

11 SERGEANT CARTER: 313 --

12 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: I will get it later.

13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Sergeant Carter, I have one  
14 more final question before we -- tolerate me. Cab  
15 drivers in the Association and independent cab drivers,  
16 how do we get both of them on the same page? I imagine  
17 the association does not embrace all the cab drivers.  
18 Am I right or wrong?

19 SERGEANT CARTER: Pretty much, yes.

20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: How do we communicate and  
21 are the officers totally up to date in terms of how to  
22 post this because MGM -- you know, give the cab drivers  
23 the address you know. Somewhere along the line, to me,  
24 you know, come on now. We need to reach some type of  
25 understanding that we fair. And I know DPD, you're

1 bending over backwards. You're in a tough position to  
2 have to resolve it. So, I'm glad I'm getting this  
3 update from the concerned parties. But I would think  
4 somewhere along the line -- I know the association is  
5 one thing. But another, we probably got quite a few out  
6 there that's not part of the association. Some of them  
7 that have come down here is not part of it. So, can we  
8 reach out to them independent ones?

9 SERGEANT CARTER: What we can do, we can  
10 compile a list, go through our list to make sure that we  
11 have all our cabs that is listed under the association  
12 and compare it to those that are not. And we can reach  
13 out with them you know. We'll do our best just to reach  
14 out to them for, you know, to make sure they have the  
15 correct information just as well as the association have  
16 the correct information.

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. You have been  
18 very very helpful.

19 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Mr. Chair, before you  
20 leave, Sergeant, I'm not sure if we have done any  
21 education directly with the drivers and/or the  
22 association. But I do believe I heard a meeting being  
23 held at Whole Foods on the 28th which could serve as a  
24 potential opportunity to share a lot of the information  
25 that was discussed here today.

1                   And also, Mr. Chair, something very similar to  
2                   the tower situation where we have held special hearings  
3                   to share information and also hear the concerns, that  
4                   potentially this body could entertain such a special  
5                   hearing to be held. And to that degree, I would make a  
6                   motion, since Commissioner Crawford is overseeing this  
7                   process with the taxicab drivers, that we commission him  
8                   to solidify a date that would be most appropriate for  
9                   the Commission, members of the department as well as the  
10                  cab driver leadership and members to come so we can have  
11                  a wholistic conversation from both sides and maybe we  
12                  can get some better understanding from all parties in  
13                  that context and not go meeting to meeting belaboring  
14                  the issue.

15                   CHAIRPERSON BELL: Second to that to motion?

16                   COMMISSIONER MOORE: Second.

17                   CHAIRPERSON BELL: Properly moved and second.

18                   Those in favor?

19                   COMMISSIONER: Aye.

20                   CHAIRPERSON BELL: Those opposed? Motion  
21                  carried. See what happened. Thank you again, Sergeant.  
22                  Are you on the promotional list?

23                   SERGEANT CARTER: Recently promoted a year  
24                  ago.

25                   CHAIRPERSON BELL: You're going good work.

1 MR. SCOTT: Good afternoon, Ron Scott. And  
2 I'm standing with Miss Dora Hatcher. She is a friend of  
3 the family, and I know her well from the community. I  
4 wanted to -- I'm glad you're still here. You're not  
5 powerless. And the power or prayer is strong. And I  
6 understand ministers actually elicited that. And so,  
7 when men or women of faith come together, the devil  
8 flees. So, let's hope that that is the case.

9 And so, within that context, I wanted to bring  
10 this to you in a framework. The reason why she's  
11 standing here with me today is that she had a vehicle  
12 that was taken, and it was towed and did not -- was not  
13 able to find out where it was for a long period of time.  
14 And ultimately when she found it, she was able to find  
15 out where the vehicle was, it cost her \$600.

16 And so, she is going to bring information back  
17 to you. And she feels basically she had been working in  
18 conjunction and relationship to the towing, that there  
19 should be some remuneration of these fees or  
20 consideration given the circumstances. And I don't want  
21 to go on all of it. She is willing to give it to  
22 whoever. But I just wanted to have her come, and she  
23 asked me to speak on her behalf relative to that.

24 But she feels that the \$600 was a little bit  
25 exorbitant under the circumstances, given the fact that



1 she did everything she thought she should do to report  
2 that the vehicle had been taken.

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. So, you want to  
4 confer with the Board secretary at the end of the  
5 meeting, the information?

6 MR. SCOTT: Okay.

7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I mean, it's not a  
8 complaint, it's just a concern?

9 MR. SCOTT: She needs to see what can be done  
10 in terms of the consideration in relationship to the  
11 fees. That's what she needs to know.

12 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Mr. Chair, just a point  
13 of clarity. If I heard you correctly, the vehicle was  
14 stolen?

15 MR. SCOTT: Well, it wasn't stolen. There was  
16 a misunderstanding at the building at a meeting that she  
17 attended. And the individuals in the building allegedly  
18 filed a complaint which was subsequently -- the  
19 complaint was dismissed. And as a result of that, the  
20 vehicle was removed from the premises. And so, there  
21 was no culpability on her part in relationship to it.  
22 So, that's the issue.

23 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Through the Chair, was  
24 it private property, private tow or city?

25 MR. SCOTT: It was private property, yes.

1 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: By a private tow  
2 company?

3 DEPUYTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: Through the Chair,  
4 I will talk to you afterwards. I will give you my  
5 contact information. If you can get it to me, I will  
6 get it to the right person to see where we can go from  
7 here.

8 MR. SCOTT: Theoretically a civil matter in  
9 terms of private. I know what you're saying. I just  
10 wanted to bring her here in case there was anything DPD  
11 could do in relation to this matter.

12 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: I'd be happy to talk  
13 to her.

14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Deputy Chief is willing to  
15 step forward too.

16 MR. SCOTT: I just wanted to say in final  
17 thing, I am glad that some of us were able to go out to  
18 Grosse Pointe Park yesterday relative to the matter of  
19 potential excessive force and the recent case that has  
20 been in the headlines and so forth. The video was  
21 presented. And I would like to know if the Board of  
22 Police Commissioners could do some -- I don't want to  
23 say investigation, but could -- whether it be for you or  
24 whether it be through your own devices, to find out who  
25 are the members of that particular task force and try to

1 ascertain to the best of your ability members of the  
2 other task forces because I believe that some of the  
3 special task forces breed a particular culture that is  
4 essentially supportive of some of the behavior that we  
5 saw yesterday.

6 I'm not only speaking about that, but there's  
7 another matter which I haven't brought before you that  
8 relates to the Fugitive Apprehension Task Force. And  
9 so, there are some qualities, some cultural issues, that  
10 exist because even after the alleged excessive force  
11 took place, there was statements that were made which  
12 essentially reinforced that.

13 So, I think it would be within the purview of  
14 this Board to try to find out and to take a look. And I  
15 had asked once before to have a hearing about  
16 multi-jurisdictional task forces, given the fact that  
17 there are federal dollars involved and so on.

18 And I think it would still be salient to try  
19 to do that again, to look at those task forces, who is a  
20 part of it, what is the cultural content, what is the  
21 oversight and so on. And I think that speaks more to  
22 the need for oversight in terms of this body and others  
23 than just about anything I can think of. So, I just  
24 wanted to at least put that on the record and ask that  
25 you consider that.

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Crawford?

2 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Through the Chair,  
3 Mr. Scott, Chairperson Bell expounded on the fact that,  
4 you know, about, well, the commission in Grosse Pointe  
5 and these other jurisdictions that border Detroit in  
6 terms of, you know, perhaps -- and I might further  
7 expound, perhaps in the future, we may need to or me  
8 personally even, I'd like to meet with some of those  
9 police chiefs in some of those other jurisdictions about  
10 those concerns because they often times, task force or  
11 not, there's some enforcement issues sometimes that  
12 cross the border, you know, from suburbia into Detroit  
13 and from Detroit into suburbia.

14 And so, yeah, you're absolutely correct, and I  
15 agree with you. And, of course, deferring to the  
16 department, it's Chief Craig and now we have Deputy  
17 Chief Fitzgerald here in terms of the names of the  
18 individuals that's -- you know. And of course the  
19 department operates on transparency, you know. So, that  
20 will be something probably in the future.

21 But I would just state that there is an  
22 investigation going on now by the state police. And I  
23 don't know if any -- it's obvious, I don't believe any  
24 names have been released of the officers.

25 MR. SCOTT: Just one.

1                   COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: There is one. So, I  
2 will defer to the deputy chief on that issue. But like  
3 I said, there is an investigation that's being done by  
4 the state police.

5                   MR. SCOTT: I want to say that not all of the  
6 commissioners, but I did send a text to some of you. I  
7 sent it to you, Commissioner Bell. So -- and  
8 Commissioner White was there in his role with the NAACP.  
9 And so, whenever these things happen, I try to  
10 communicate with you, all of you, as much as possible  
11 and let you know about what's going on so that we can  
12 have transparency too.

13                   CHAIRPERSON BELL: Prior to, Commissioner  
14 Moore weighed in on that to get a Memorandum of  
15 Understanding in reference to these task forces. So,  
16 there was a discussion prior to your arrival, looking at  
17 it to see where we are with that. And thank you for  
18 bringing it to our attention.

19                   MR. SCOTT: Thank you. Thank you.

20                   CHAIRPERSON BELL: Any other comments from the  
21 audience? If not, I just wanted to acknowledge  
22 Dr. Divers (phonetic) from council.

23                   DR. DIVERS: Thank you.

24                   CHAIRPERSON BELL: Good to see you in  
25 attendance, appreciate your attendance and awareness.

1 And hopefully you can say some good things to the  
2 commission -- I mean to the council. Thank you,  
3 Dr. Divers, long-time educator, activist in the  
4 community.

5 If there's no other business before this body,  
6 and I assume that we can stand adjourned and the Chair  
7 would entertain a motion.

8 COMMISSIONER MOORE: So moved.

9 COMMISSIONER WHITE: Support.

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Ready for the question?  
11 Those in favor?

12 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Those opposed? Motion  
14 carried. Good afternoon, and have a great Auto Show  
15 weekend. I hope to see you next week.
