5 COMMISSIONER BELL: Good evening. I extend a  
6 cool welcome to the monthly meeting of the Board of Police  
7 Commissioners. I said cool, right? I want you to maintain  
8 cool. We're going to move this little meeting right along.  
9 I am your Chair, Willie Bell. And to my immediate left is  
10 the Vice Chair, Ricardo Moore.

11 We're going to ask the good shepherd of this  
12 house to come forward for the invocation. That's  
13 Dr. Michael Cousin, please. Senior.

14 Sir, you can come to us in your own AME way. Do  
15 not hold back.

16 DR. COUSIN: Oh, what you say.

17 (INVOCATION GIVEN)

18 COMMISSIONER BELL: Sir, if you want to give your  
19 opening.

20 DR. COUSIN: On behalf of the officers and  
21 members of the St. Stephens AME Church we welcome you to  
22 our community center, and we're thankful that you were able  
23 to come out tonight. And we're blessed to be able to host  
24 you tonight. We have members, officers, that are here. If  
25 you have a question they would be more than happy to help

1 you with that. And again, we thank you for choosing St.  
2 Stephens to come out and to have this meeting, for truly we  
3 wish to be a beacon of hope within this community, of which  
4 we've been here since 1918. God bless you and keep you is  
5 our prayer.

6 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, sir. At this time  
7 I'm going to ask all of us to stand for some brief  
8 meditation and just silent meditation for the officers who  
9 lost their lives last week, and two bailiff officers who  
10 are retired officers. And all those who need a healing  
11 touch regardless of the circumstance we want to just  
12 reflect on that for one moment, please.

13 (MOMENT OF MEDITATION OBSERVED)

14 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you.

15 At this time we're going to start to my immediate  
16 left -- not my immediate, my far left and ask the  
17 commissioners to introduce themselves and any other remarks  
18 they might want to make briefly at this time. Thank you.

19 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Richard Shelby.  
20 Commissioner District 1. I also want to say hello. I see  
21 a lot of individuals here that when I was assigned to the  
22 10th precinct. I see them in the audience. I welcome you.  
23 I wave to you. Glad to be here.

24 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Reggie Crawford.  
25 District 3. Eastside of Detroit. Welcome.

1                   COMMISSIONER MOORE: Good evening. Police  
2 officer Ricardo Moore. District 7, representing the west  
3 side of Detroit. Of course the 10th Precinct is my home  
4 precinct. And to the family and friends of 10 I just want  
5 to say welcome and enjoy the meeting. And please come up  
6 at the end and ask questions. Thank you.

7                   COMMISSIONER BELL: And to my right.

8                   COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Elizabeth Brooks. Good  
9 evening. Appointed.

10                  COMMISSIONER MALLET: I'm Junior Conrad Mallett.  
11 There was a memorial service for Mr. Howard Sims. Some of  
12 the men and women in this room may know him as being one of  
13 the more important African American architects in this  
14 country. But I thought, Mr. Chairman, it would be very  
15 important also to be at this meeting.

16                  In my own view -- and I've expressed this  
17 publicly and privately -- the country is in a great deal of  
18 turmoil right now. We are having citizens in other  
19 jurisdictions lose their lives at the hand of police  
20 officers, and we have police officers in other  
21 jurisdictions who have lost their lives.

22                  I remain steadfastly proud of the fact that my  
23 father was a Detroit police officer for five years. And my  
24 god-father Frank Blount rose to be the deputy chief of  
25 police. So I just wanted to be here, Mr. Chairman, to

1 indicate to all of the men and women here that for all of  
2 the sometimes tension and stress that you may see that may  
3 exist amongst the Board the one thing that we are all  
4 committed to is service to this community, the betterment  
5 of the Detroit Police Department, and the safety of our  
6 citizens. I know that to be true of all of the  
7 commissioners. I know that to be true of the commission  
8 staff. And I thought it important, Mr. Chairman, to be  
9 here this evening so that everybody was clear that we  
10 recognize as public servants we have a responsibility to be  
11 where the people are and to indicate by our presence that  
12 we have the matter as best we can in hand. And whether we  
13 do or not we will do our best to carry out our duties and  
14 function. So I'm glad to be here, Mr. Chairman, with you  
15 this evening. And thank you for the opportunity to speak.

16 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, Commissioner  
17 Mallett.

18 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: Derrick Sanders.  
19 Appointed commissioner in District 2 -- in District 7.  
20 Precinct 2 is where I'm residing at. And just like with  
21 Conrad Mallett, I mean, personally we feel bad about what's  
22 happening to the police officers and citizens. And I just  
23 thank God that here in Detroit that we have a better  
24 relationship with our citizens and police officers.

25 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, sir. And

1 Commissioner Willie Burton is excused absent. Commissioner  
2 Eva Dewaelsche excused absent. And bishop Edgar Vann  
3 excused absent. And also Lisa Carter, our immediate past  
4 Chair excused absent. Thank you.

5 At this time we'll ask that -- no, we're supposed  
6 to introduce our Assistant Chief, Steve Dolunt, at this  
7 time.

8 Assistant Chief, good to see you.

9 ASST. CHIEF DOLUNT: Good evening. The chief  
10 couldn't be here because he had another engagement. A lot  
11 of people want to talk to the chief nationwide, and that's  
12 what he's doing tonight; so you got me again. Sorry.

13 COMMISSIONER BELL: Appreciate it. At this time  
14 would you like to introduce your commanding officers, any  
15 other officer in the room?

16 ASST. CHIEF DOLUNT: Well they're in the back, so  
17 I got to put my glasses on.

18 Why don't you stand up so I can see you.

19 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, sir.

20 ASST. CHIEF DOLUNT: No, not you. Oh, them?  
21 Okay.

22 (ASST. CHIEF DOLUNT INTRODUCED DEPARTMENT  
23 OFFICIALS PRESENT)

24 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, sir. At this time  
25 I'd like to introduce our Secretary to the Board,

1 Mr. Gregory Hicks, to my right. And Mr. Hicks is going to  
2 introduce the staff.

3 SECRETARY HICKS: Thank you. Commissioner, Gail  
4 Oxendine who is normally introduced at this period of time  
5 has an excused absence. Pam Drake -- Davis Drake -- who  
6 will in turn introduce any members of her staff. But just  
7 before she does that, Linda Bernard, who is the board  
8 attorney. Robert Brown. And of course tonight Donna  
9 Williams is acting as our court reporter.

10 Pam.

11 MS. DRAKE: Good evening. I have with me this  
12 evening Supervising Investigator Lawrence Akbar and  
13 Administrative Assistant Stephanie Phillips.

14 SECRETARY HICKS: Mr. Chair, as well, noted for  
15 the record you do have a quorum.

16 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, sir. That's an  
17 important part of this process that we have a quorum.

18 At this time I'd like to convey our sincere  
19 thanks to Reverend Dr. Michael Cousin for hosting this meet  
20 and all the St. Stephens family. And I met two or three on  
21 the way in.

22 Would you please stand, please. Church family  
23 here. Let's give them a round of applause for coming out.  
24 Thank you. Thank you.

25 Going to ask our Vice-Chair Ricardo Moore to



1 introduce other VIP -- all the VIP for others who might be  
2 elected or might be representing someone elected or might  
3 be representing yourself.

4 COMMISSIONER MOORE: I know in the house, Mr.  
5 Chairman, we have Commissioner Jewel Ware.

6 Could you please stand, Commissioner Ware?

7 Do we have any other elected officials and/or  
8 appointees being represented this evening?

9 Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

10 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you. At this time I'd  
11 like if the Board would entertain approving an agenda for  
12 this evening's meeting, Thursday, July 14th.

13 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: So moved.

14 COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Support.

15 COMMISSIONER BELL: It's been properly moved and  
16 supported. Discussion? Those in favor aye.

17 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

18 COMMISSIONER BELL: Those opposed? Motion  
19 carried.

20 We would postpone the meeting minutes from  
21 June 30th and July 7th of this year to our next meeting.

22 I'm going to reserve my remarks at this time.

23 I'm going to move on to AC Dolunt.

24 ASST. CHIEF DOLUNT: Really? Okay, thanks a lot,  
25 Willie.

1           It's been a tough week. Since we last met we had  
2 the incident in Dallas. We've buried Sergeant posthumously  
3 Lt. Kevin Miller. We've had the officers shot and killed  
4 in Berrien Springs.

5           We've had officers from this department, both  
6 black and white, abusing in my mind, my opinion, their  
7 official capacity on Facebook. They are being dealt with  
8 accordingly. The chief had internal investigations on, I  
9 believe, four different cases of people posted what I  
10 consider statements that are both offensive -- not just  
11 unprofessional but offensive to all races. And we're  
12 dealing with it. We've been criticized by some people for  
13 not releasing all of the posts. Our answer is we released  
14 none of the posts.

15           What people fail to realize the, the younger  
16 generation, is that whatever you post on the internet as a  
17 rule is open game. And when you post things you may share  
18 it with friends. You may share it with friends who are not  
19 your friends. And as we've learned throughout our lives  
20 there are people that will say things maybe in a state of  
21 depression, in a state of anger; and you can't retract  
22 those statements.

23           And while everyone has a right, freedom of  
24 speech, as we discussed earlier today with our legal  
25 advisor, Celia Washington, as an officer we're held to a

1 higher standard. You cannot create a hostile work  
2 environment. You cannot create the perception that you are  
3 against certain segments of the community.

4 There has been a reason why we have not had the  
5 unrest in this city so far as you have throughout the  
6 country. The chief has been very open with the citizens;  
7 and when we make a mistake he addresses it. And we are  
8 human, and we do make mistakes.

9 He has reached out to the pastors and talked to  
10 them. He's talked to activist groups. It's been very  
11 instrumental in reaching out to the groups. Our command  
12 officers, it's drilled into their heads, be open with the  
13 community, be receptive to the community. Our job is to  
14 maintain order and not violate people's rights.

15 We had on Friday a Black Lives Matter protest and  
16 march at Campus Martius. There were no arrest. None. Did  
17 people get mad at us? Yes. Were we professional? Yes.  
18 Were the protestors peaceful? Yes, they were. They were.  
19 They were respectful of the city. There was no looting.  
20 There was no violence. And I think the perception that all  
21 protests are violent is misconstrued. People need and have  
22 the right to protest in a peaceful manner. On the same  
23 token we have to respect that right. If you don't like me,  
24 okay, I have to deal with it. I don't like you, okay, you  
25 have to deal with it.

1 I had a reporter call me from Seattle, and she  
2 wanted to know what the problem was. And it is a former  
3 reporter from Detroit. It was a black female who I got  
4 along with quite well. And she said, it appears to be a  
5 racial problem. I said, there are racial problems. I  
6 said, as a black female has a white male ever offended you?  
7 She said, yes. Well did you shoot him? She said, of  
8 course not. So I said, as a white male do you think a  
9 black males has ever offended me? She goes, probably yes.  
10 I said, did I shoot them? Set myself up. She goes, I  
11 don't know. Well I didn't. But the point was that  
12 rational people do not shoot other people out of anger.

13 The incident in Dallas was a man, he was upset.  
14 Okay. And maybe he was mad at some white people. However,  
15 there was a veteran. He may have suffered from PTSD.  
16 There are a lot of people that suffer from this mental  
17 illness. I believe that most hate crimes are based on  
18 people who deal with things, and something in there pops  
19 and they shoot for no reason but that they're angry. So I  
20 commend the people of the city of Detroit; I really do; and  
21 the outsiders who came in standing for Black Lives Matter.  
22 I commend our officers for being professional and  
23 maintaining their presence.

24 Something you didn't see here that they had in  
25 Minnesota and Memphis and other places is officers armed to

1 the teeth with helmets and shields and, you know, all  
2 swatted up. No. We make every effort to treat citizens  
3 like citizens, nonviolent and with respect. And I think  
4 that comes down from Chief Craig as the director. We are  
5 not supposed to be a military force. We're here to provide  
6 order for the citizens and let them be safe whether they  
7 protest or not.

8 We have merchants who respect to let people  
9 protest. Okay. They loot? No. It's a good thing. You  
10 know, championship parade where we go nuts because we  
11 finally won a championship, or a civil unrest from back in  
12 the day. Is there racial tension? Yes. But I think under  
13 the leadership of Chief Craig and the mayor and the  
14 citizens of Detroit and pastors who support we've all  
15 seemed to come together. It's intense. It's a powder keg,  
16 but I really want to applaud everyone involved. And that  
17 should be enough.

18 COMMISSIONER BELL: Commissioners, questions or  
19 concern to the AC at this time.

20 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, sir. Through the  
21 chair also I have a statement here.

22 First and foremost, I want to offer my  
23 condolences to all of those who were killed by the police  
24 across the country. And I want to officer my condolences  
25 to all police officers who were killed by others across the

1 country.

2 In reference to Facebook postings, 1.6 billion  
3 people utilize Facebook. So like you said Chief, or  
4 Assistant Chief, whatever you put out there is going to  
5 stay out there, and 1.6 billion people can access it.

6 Commissioner, since this issue came up last year  
7 about Facebook postings. It came up again this year about  
8 Facebook posting. I have a copy of the general -- I'm  
9 sorry -- the Detroit Police Manual on the issue of  
10 departmental internet usage, web pages, social network.  
11 It's only four pages. It was e-mailed to -- I know it was  
12 e-mailed to me. I believe it was e-mailed to all the  
13 commissioners last summer. I'll forward it to you. I  
14 always keep this copy readily available, especially since  
15 we've recently -- like I said, there was some -- since the  
16 Facebook posting back in February after the Super Bowl.  
17 And now we have a Facebook posting by Officer Weekley.

18 It was quite disturbing, that posting, in itself.  
19 And those who know me -- and I've said it time and time  
20 again at the table in reference to free speech. And I  
21 support even Officer Weekley's right to free speech. But  
22 the first part of that posting -- I'm paraphrasing -- said  
23 something to the effect, I'm contemplating whether or not I  
24 want to come to work today.

25 That's no surprise to me, because historically in

1 recent years officers have engaged in what I call  
2 depolicing where they just won't show up for work. The  
3 current in New Orleans during Katrina officers just  
4 abandoned the city and just left the citizens there to die.  
5 Years ago here in Detroit during the layoffs in the 80's it  
6 occurred deeply. And basically a lot of times the unions  
7 across the country advocate this and they're behind this.  
8 But I just want all the Commissioners to familiarize  
9 themselves with this Detroit Police Manual on this  
10 particular issue.

11 Also on the issue of Facebook posting I know now  
12 that for the citizen, particularly African American males,  
13 the FBI now going after those who post threats, threats, on  
14 the lives of police officers. And I notice the Chief  
15 states in the media that in California the State of  
16 California have a charge that's called terroristic threats.  
17 Same thing in Georgia when I worked in the Atlantic Police  
18 Department is the charge called terroristic threat. You  
19 could charge an individual who's making a threat on your  
20 life. Not only the police, but even just another citizen  
21 or organization.

22 I want to read into the record just for an  
23 educational piece so that everyone knows. Because I don't  
24 want, you know, the FBI going after individuals because  
25 they may not have the information as to -- you know, they

1 may be so careless as to post some direct threat online.

2 And it says here, "Feds..." it states "...hold  
3 your tongue. Threats are not free speech."

4 As we all know, we can't get off firing at a  
5 crowded theater. The bottom part of this and to the heart  
6 of this is, "Free speech, however, cannot be misconstrued  
7 to include direct threats toward another individual, group  
8 or location. The FBI said in a statement today; once  
9 threatening speech is directed toward a specific person, a  
10 group of people, including law enforcement agencies or  
11 ethnic communities or specified locations in the community  
12 it can be viewed as a credible threat. Individuals who  
13 communicate threats may be subject to prosecution."

14 So I just want to let everybody just have the  
15 information. I think the FBI probably needs to look at  
16 Donald Trump first and foremost too for his speech. You  
17 know, he wants to make America great again. I said make  
18 America hate again. But Donald Trump has said some things  
19 too, a Republican candidate. So perhaps along with  
20 investigating those in Detroit, but we can extend that to  
21 Mr. Trump. So that's my statement. Thank you.

22 COMMISSIONER BELL: Any other comments,  
23 references to AC Dolunt reporting out to us on behalf of  
24 the chief?

25 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Commissioner.



1 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, sir.

2 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Two issues, Chief. One  
3 deals with accident reports. Citizens are reporting to me  
4 that they're going to the precinct, filing an accident  
5 report and about an hour or two later they start getting  
6 phone calls from attorneys saying you have a case here.  
7 Have you heard anything like that?

8 ASST. CHIEF DOLUNT: I'm pretty sure. Yes, I  
9 have actually. Not within an hour or two. I had people  
10 call me and gotten letters. We've figured this out.  
11 Because at first I thought it was the courthouse because  
12 it's just a couple of days later, and I couldn't understand  
13 how people were getting that information.

14 Somehow they're getting information. And we are  
15 looking into it. I haven't done a deep dive into it, but  
16 it is a concern. Because if officers are delving into some  
17 type of secondary employment as in calling attorneys I have  
18 a problem with that. I have a huge problem with that. So  
19 I will address that with my command staff. And I  
20 appreciate all complaints, if you could, forwarded to me  
21 not to the respective commands, because I want to find out  
22 what's going on. I don't need anything of disrepute in my  
23 officers at this time, so if you have a problem with that  
24 please send them right to me. I'm easy to find, so have  
25 them sent to me.

1 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Okay, thank you Assistant  
2 Chief.

3 And I have another issue of Kevin Matthews.  
4 Kevin Matthews is the young man that was shot and killed by  
5 Dearborn Police. I know that case has gone back and forth  
6 between Detroit and Wayne County several times. And  
7 currently the Wayne County Prosecutor Kim worthy has the  
8 case right now. I was just curious how long was it since  
9 Detroit gave it back to Prosecutor Worthy? Are you  
10 familiar with it?

11 ASST. CHIEF DOLUNT: You know, I'm not sure.  
12 Is anyone here from Investigations?

13 Okay, I'm not sure. I believe -- Deputy Chief  
14 Fitzgerald, do you know if it was a couple weeks ago?

15 DEP. CHIEF FITZGERALD: I don't know.

16 ASST. CHIEF DOLUNT: Okay, so we're not sure  
17 offhand. We can check. I know it's an chronic complaint  
18 from the officers. They're understaffed, but I know this  
19 is a very important case. So I will try to -- well  
20 actually I can't. I think the Wayne County Prosecutor  
21 would need to have that matter addressed by the Board,  
22 because we have other issues we're going after too. So if  
23 you could direct those toward Maria Miller I believe she  
24 might be able to help us.

25 COMMISSIONER MOORE: All right, thank you,

1 assistant chief.

2 COMMISSIONER BELL: Any other questions or  
3 concerns?

4 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: To the chair.

5 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, sir.

6 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: I want to talk about body  
7 cameras. Just a question if Chief Dolunt knows.

8 Is patrol officers is the only ones going to have  
9 the body cameras on them? Is it going to be any body  
10 cameras worn by any gang squad or special response team  
11 that you would know?

12 ASST. CHIEF DOLUNT: We share the goal that  
13 everyone on the street is equipped. Right now it's just in  
14 the Fourth and Seventh Precincts. I believe Commander  
15 Walton and Commander Williams are here. And we're going  
16 through the glitches, like the testing ground and the  
17 sandbox. I'm told the quality is fantastic. The officers  
18 haven't had any complaints about it. The citizens do not  
19 find it intrusive to their rights. And the goal is that  
20 everyone -- once this period of adjustment goes through  
21 everyone needs to be equipped with that, and I think that's  
22 the goal.

23 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: Thank you.

24 ASST. CHIEF DOLUNT: Sure.

25 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Thank you. Through the

1 chair. Yes, sir, assistant chief. I have a question. I  
2 don't know if you were updated on it, or I don't know if  
3 you have an update. A couple weeks ago I asked Chief  
4 Craig, and he most definitely stated here at the table that  
5 -- and even in the media -- that they were going to move  
6 forward once things were I guess done in the prosecutor's  
7 office, but the case involving Deante Stanford [sic], the  
8 young man who spent eight years in prison for a quadruple  
9 murder that was in my district that he didn't commit.

10 As what was recently reported in the media, the  
11 statute of limitations expired yesterday. So political  
12 things going back and forth in the media as to whether or  
13 not Mr. Stanford was going to cooperate with the  
14 prosecutor's office. And I don't know anything about the  
15 back and forth, and really not concerned with it, but it's  
16 just evident now that it's going to be a real great  
17 injustice that those who put him there for eight years  
18 they're not going to be prosecuted. Also, the other  
19 injustice is we have four individuals who were murdered,  
20 and the families of those four individuals are never going  
21 to get any justice, or there won't be any closure to even  
22 bring those individuals responsible.

23 The individual confessed to it, Vincent Smothers;  
24 the so-called hit man. It was noted in the media and those  
25 in the community say he had more integrity than the

1 criminal justice here in Wayne County and the State of  
2 Michigan. So I don't know where we're going to go with  
3 this now. I will -- if you don't have any update  
4 information, sir, wait till Chief Craig comes back to the  
5 table.

6 Like I stated a couple weeks ago, he was very  
7 supportive and even stated somewhat on the media that he  
8 was going to go after the individuals responsible. And  
9 like I said, it's more than just -- well it's even larger  
10 than the young man being in prison for eight years, because  
11 you have a quadruple murderer that's still out there with  
12 individuals. So if you have any information on it I'll  
13 welcome it.

14 ASST. CHIEF DOLUNT: Community Chair, I'm a  
15 little confused. Sir, you're talking about an  
16 investigation into the actions or inactions of the  
17 attempted at the time or are you -- I mean, did he tell you  
18 at the time he was going to start an investigation? I'm  
19 not exactly sure.

20 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: He said that they were  
21 going to -- once the information -- they -- that Detroit  
22 Police Department obtained all the information from the  
23 prosecutor as to what direction -- I'm paraphrasing this --  
24 that they're moving in; that he would proceed with an  
25 investigation into what happened. Also to -- it was very

1 cooperative of -- we received the general -- I'm sorry --  
2 the Detroit Police Manual on custodial interviews of  
3 juveniles and persons in custody, which is something I  
4 requested, and also I forwarded the email to all the  
5 commissioners too. Because that was updated in I believe  
6 it was in 2014, which expresses and states that since the  
7 consent agreement -- and I mean and this is my statement --  
8 this is no longer the police department today that it was  
9 then. And of course that particular incident didn't occur  
10 under this current administration. So --

11 ASST. CHIEF DOLUNT: Well I'm glad you got it.  
12 Because I called him Thursday night and said you're asking  
13 for it, so someone must have been listening to me. I'm  
14 glad to hear that.

15 COMMISSIONER BELL: Commissioner Crawford, I can  
16 speak to Chief Craig indicated that the matter is still  
17 under investigation in reference to what transpired, as one  
18 officer was still on the department. All the other  
19 officers have retired. So the matter is ongoing. And I  
20 assume at some point in time once the investigation is  
21 completed the chief will report on it.

22 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, sir, I understand  
23 that. But in light of the recent developments as of  
24 yesterday I just -- I wonder where we're going, whether  
25 we're going to be able to deal with this. And that would

1 be a travesty of justice if -- you know, and I certainly  
2 hope -- well it's beyond that now because the statute of  
3 limitations has expired. And I don't know what went on  
4 between the prosecutor and the attorney of the young man as  
5 to why he wouldn't cooperate. And I'm not a legal mind,  
6 but one would think that definitely he would have been  
7 needed in court to pursue that. So, thank you.

8 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, sir. Let us move  
9 on in terms of the agenda.

10 There's another question? Sorry, commissioner.

11 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: To the Chair, right before  
12 our agenda, do we have any update on the medical marijuana  
13 facilities in terms of the number that's been closed in the  
14 city?

15 ASST. CHIEF DOLUNT: Honestly I don't.

16 COMMISSIONER BELL: I can give you an update.

17 ASST. CHIEF DOLUNT: Oh, good.

18 COMMISSIONER BELL: I can give you an update.

19 Corporation counsel indicated that they've taken all steps  
20 with caution in terms of the legal procedures in reference  
21 to the marijuana issues all involved. And they are really  
22 working their way through the legal process to make sure  
23 they dot the I's and cross the T's. They're dealing with  
24 the situation. They're not taking it very lightly. They  
25 don't want someone to face issues and knocking in doors and

1 all that, so they are taking their time in terms going  
2 through the process. That is the update on that.

3 At this time I'd like to pause to recognize the  
4 president of the Lieutenant and Sergeants Association.  
5 Lieutenant. I'm sorry, correction. Sergeant Mark Young  
6 the president of the LSA. Give him a round of applause.  
7 Mark, could you please stand? Thank you for your  
8 attendance tonight.

9 The next item will be the 10th Precinct.

10 ASST. CHIEF DOLUNT: Before you start can you  
11 introduce yourself as commander, okay, as opposed to  
12 captain?

13 COMMANDER KYRIACOU: Commander Nick Kyriacou,  
14 commanding officer of the 10th precinct. I have with me my  
15 partner in running the 10th Precinct, Captain Miles.  
16 Trying to hide there in the very rear of the room I have  
17 neighborhood Police Officer Della Brown. Neighborhood  
18 Police Officer Robert Barber. And neighborhood Police  
19 Officer Roberto Berry is presently helping out at City  
20 Camp, otherwise you know he would be here to support too.  
21 Sorry, I misspoke. I'm glad you're here. He's with the  
22 Explorers tonight.

23 These presentations typically start out with a  
24 little synopsis talking about the demographics of the  
25 precinct, the 10th Precinct, located at 12000 Livernois at



1 the corner Elmhurst. The rough borders are starting at the  
2 north by the Lodge and Wyoming; going east on the Lodge;  
3 forming the north boarder until the Lodge Freeway curves  
4 south and becomes pretty much a north and south  
5 thoroughfare; going all the way down to where it intersects  
6 with West Grand Boulevard. Then the boarder goes to the  
7 west along the Boulevard; drives a little south; catches  
8 Warren Avenue on the south; going over to Livernois; coming  
9 back north up Livernois as the western boarder; curving  
10 along the Jeffries Freeway, and then going up into Wyoming  
11 and back to that northwest corner where the Lodge and  
12 Wyoming intersect. That's where we're at.

13 We're comprised of about 56,00 residents as of  
14 the 2010 census for the City of Detroit. Along with the  
15 56,000 residence we have a number of churches businesses  
16 and schools located within the precinct.

17 I'm going to speak first about some issues having  
18 to do with crime. I'm going to defer to my partner,  
19 Captain Miles to talk about some free-related things.

20 Last year when I was up here I kind of had even a  
21 little bit fatter head than usual, because I was bragging  
22 about the part one violent crimes reduction that we had in  
23 the 10th Precinct. Year-to-date -- and we ended the year  
24 last year with a 22 percent reduction in violent crime,  
25 which was the highest reduction of violent crime of any

1 precinct in the city. So unfortunately I can't brag so  
2 loudly now. As of today we're right about exactly the same  
3 place we were within one violent crime as of when I left  
4 the precinct as we were last year. So I'm not able to brag  
5 about a continuing reduction. But for what it's worth  
6 we're holding on to those previous reductions from the  
7 previous years.

8 So despite some dimension of resources and some  
9 greater challenges we're holding ground on that. And as  
10 you talk about trying to maintain, you know, a reduction  
11 and do more with less you have to find some more tools in  
12 the toolbox in order to get done what you need to get done.

13 Fortunately, we were very privileged in the fact  
14 that the Wayne State University Center for Urban Studies  
15 along with AmeriCorps was able to find funding to be able  
16 to bring Community CompStat to the 10th Precinct. In fact,  
17 I think a number of other precincts. But I believe at this  
18 point everybody has a Community CompStat. So once a month  
19 at the mini station at 8675 Rosa Parks with the help of  
20 Wayne State and AmeriCorps we're able to do a  
21 community-based CompStat -- like I say, it's done in most  
22 if not all the precincts now -- that enables us to engage  
23 with the community, explain to them and give them some  
24 insight into the type of crime problems that we have. And  
25 the people who enabled us to have stakeholders for various

1 block clubs and community groups and businesses to be able  
2 come there to that meeting, understand what we're doing and  
3 then partner up with us in various solutions.

4 So even though I stand here not able to say that  
5 we've had an increase in reduction of violent crime there  
6 is a success story that I can brag about that the comes  
7 right out of this Community CompStat. And that is, last  
8 year we ended the year up about fourteen percent in  
9 larcenies. Okay?

10 Now we're challenged. We got a lot of things  
11 going on; and with our diminished resources larcenies are  
12 not something that I could devote a lot of attention to.  
13 But with this partnership with Wayne State identifying the  
14 patterns and locations where most of the larcenies  
15 occurred, and by virtue of their partnership with  
16 AmeriCorps and the students in AmeriCorps we're able to do  
17 some concentrated leaps with them based on targeted data  
18 throughout the precinct.

19 So far this year, despite the fact that -- you  
20 know, normally we're really good at taking the credit when  
21 good things happen in the police department. Well the  
22 credit really goes to Wayne State and AmeriCorps, because  
23 we have an eight percent reduction in larcenies based on  
24 that community engagement, target hardening, putting those  
25 pamphlets out on cars where people have left their, you

1 know, GPS, or their laptops, or whatever in view.

2 There have been several areas where we've had  
3 upswing in some car thefts. So we got out the idea of  
4 target hardening with parking in the garage and doing the  
5 club type of thing. There is an area where we had  
6 burglaries, and we did a leaflet in the area. So that  
7 partnership has yielded some good dividends.

8 And there might be a few people -- is there  
9 anybody here who's been to a 10th Precinct Community  
10 CompStat meeting? No? So that's been a wonderful thing.  
11 Ours is tomorrow at the mini station at 10:00 a.m.

12 Additionally, as we have this lack of resources  
13 you have to think a little bit outside the box and try to  
14 get a little help where you can. So the Chief brought his  
15 treatment patrols to focus on areas in a very conspicuous  
16 way where you have a problem like gas stations where  
17 robberies are occurring; anywhere where you've had an  
18 upswing in crime. We do that with our sworn members, but  
19 also because of our good partnerships with our reserves  
20 we've been able to engage them and get them to schedule  
21 some regular nights of the week, which I'm not going to  
22 tell you. But there's a regular schedule nights of the  
23 week where they'll come out, get our data as to where we're  
24 having problems and go to the treatment patrols and be  
25 visible in the neighborhood.

1           Additionally on that idea, using reserves and  
2           getting a little more bang for your buck where we can,  
3           we've also been able to find a couple of police reserves  
4           that have an extraordinary skill set. And we've had some  
5           challenges in our detective bureau. Speaking of when it  
6           comes to reaching out to people for the more minor crimes  
7           where we might not necessarily have a lot of solvability.  
8           But still when it comes to the surface and letting people  
9           know we care we'd like to be able to reach out to people,  
10          at least give them a little advice when they've been the  
11          victim of a crime.

12                 So we got two reserves that are very active in  
13          coming in the evening, and they reach out and contact  
14          victims of crime. And we call them our general assigned  
15          case where somebody didn't get hurt, and they'll advise  
16          them any way they can to help them out on their crime  
17          matter. We let them though we might not have the  
18          solvability here but we didn't forget about you. And  
19          that's paid a lot of dividends too.

20                 So with that aside I'm going to step aside and  
21          let Captain Miles come up here and talk about some  
22          community-based positions we got going on at number 10.

23                 CAPTAIN MILES: Hello. As the commander stated,  
24          I'm Captain Miles.

25                 One of the things that he hit on was the meetings

1 that we have at our precinct. We also host a lot of  
2 community meetings. We have approximately ten meetings a  
3 month between Rosa Parks and the 10th Precinct, and that's  
4 based on our community block clubs.

5 We have a strong established community block  
6 club, but what we'd like to do, of course, is increase  
7 those. That's one of our main goals. We have Boston  
8 Edison, Oakland Blvd. Community Association, Russel Woods  
9 Settlement and Virginia Park Citizens District Council.

10 Through some of our community partners we are  
11 encouraging a lot of neighborhoods that may not have block  
12 clubs to try to start up their block club. Particularly  
13 I'm working with a Ms. Ragman. Is she here? Ms. Ragman.  
14 She was here. She stepped up and agreed to help us become  
15 a block club captain. And she's going to work closely with  
16 the neighborhood police officers and reach out to a lot of  
17 the members on the block so that we can try to reestablish  
18 and get our block club numbers up, because that's  
19 important. We got to make sure that we engage our  
20 community, and we want them involved. So we want to  
21 increase those numbers significantly.

22 We also -- as he stated, our neighborhood police  
23 officers; anybody that knows -- I'm sure you heard about  
24 the program. They are basically quality of life driven.  
25 They are the ones that you will call about the noise

1 complaints, the barking dogs, and that frees up the patrol  
2 officers to be able to go out and to answer runs. So the  
3 work they do is extremely important in the community.

4 They do problem solving processes and they deal  
5 with community concerns. They go to block club meetings.  
6 They work with the schools, the businesses. Some of the  
7 neighborhood police officers have been tremendous.

8 In addition to all of that they also do patrol in  
9 precinct detective unit by contacting victims of home  
10 invasions and B&Es off of home security surveys. They  
11 re-canvas the area after a violent crime as occurred  
12 afterwards. Because oftentimes, as you know, when it's  
13 happening people don't want to talk to the police. So  
14 you'll come back afterwards and try and get people to, you  
15 know, give you information, so they'll do a re-canvas after  
16 the fact maybe a day or two later. So they've been very  
17 helpful and instrumental in helping the patrol PDU with  
18 that effort. They also pass out crime stopper brochures.

19 As he stated, Officer Berry is right now up at  
20 camp with our Explorers. The 10th precinct has one of the  
21 largest Explorer groups in the city. We have up to  
22 seventeen children at a time ages 14 to 21. And the idea  
23 behind the Explorers program is to get the children  
24 interested in a career in law enforcement. So we teach  
25 them, you know, different things about the police

1 department. They go through several classes, and they get  
2 an opportunity to bond. They go up once a year to camp.  
3 So that's where they are this week.

4 We're also working with Detroit Job Corps in an  
5 effort to facilitate positive relationships between law  
6 enforcement and our youth, which we know is very important.  
7 So Job Corps has a tremendous amount of youth that are  
8 actually interested in law enforcement. So what we've done  
9 is we're in the process of creating a program for our  
10 neighborhood police officers where we can go in and we can  
11 do educational presentations.

12 We're also getting them to volunteer with us to  
13 go out in the neighborhood boarding up abandoned homes,  
14 cleaning up blighted areas. So we're working with that  
15 partnership.

16 And also in addition to that we've also forged a  
17 collaboration with our chief neighborhood liaison officer  
18 where we met with Job Corps, and we want to bring the Youth  
19 Citizens Academy to Job Corps. So we think that that's  
20 important, because what that would do is give them a  
21 preview of what to expect if they decide to go into law  
22 enforcement. I think it would actually give them more of  
23 an interest. Because when you talk to an officer  
24 one-on-one it's a little different than having interaction  
25 in the street.



1           So, you know, through these community efforts  
2           what we're hoping to do is bring some of the young men and  
3           women that represent our community; we want them to come  
4           and join the police department. So that's our goal.

5           We also have a strong partnership with Elmhurst  
6           Home Incorporated. It's a drug rehab facility in the  
7           precinct. Many of the residents there they have to do  
8           community service for various reasons, so they partner with  
9           us and they come into the building to fulfill community  
10          obligations. They work within the precinct, outside the  
11          precinct cleaning. And those relationships are huge too,  
12          because whenever we call them they're there. They help us  
13          with a lot of different efforts. So we appreciate them,  
14          and that's a good relationship.

15          We're working with Focus Hope. We're creating a  
16          domestic violence reduction initiative. Because as you  
17          know, aggravated assaults are up. And a lot of times those  
18          aggravated assaults are based on known family problems.  
19          That can't always be policed away, but sometimes if you can  
20          get a lot of these offenders or a lot of these victims into  
21          educational programs, create some type of trade, get them  
22          some jobs, offer different services for them you can  
23          possibly reduce the amount of aggravated assaults that we  
24          are seeing through domestic violence.

25          Focus Hope has a keep it 100 initiative where

1 they are basically focusing on a hundred footprint around  
2 Focus Hope's campus. So that's where we're collaborating  
3 with them to try to bring that issue to there. And we're  
4 going to work with them and bring in our resources and help  
5 with some of the educational pieces and, you know, try to  
6 get the youth involved as well. Because we know a lot of  
7 times if you're in a home where domestic violence occurs  
8 your chance of being an offender or having a crime  
9 perpetrated on you increases significantly. So that's part  
10 of our goal to work on that.

11 Also some of the initiatives that we had during  
12 the year, during police week we had a memorial service with  
13 clergy from different churches and religious denominations  
14 at our precinct. And the purpose of that was to honor the  
15 officers that gave the ultimate sacrifice by giving their  
16 lives in the line of duty.

17 Also during that week the citizens of 10th  
18 Precinct showed their appreciation to us by providing a  
19 lunch on all three shifts. And our community relations  
20 showed their appreciation to the officers on patrol by  
21 providing breakfast for them.

22 Every Wednesday, first Wednesday of the month,  
23 our neighborhood police officers take our seniors, between  
24 15 to 20, seniors to the movies. They provide  
25 transportation. And, of course, it's at the Bel Air

1 Theater. They offer a significant discount. And of course  
2 we know how important that is, because a lot of times they  
3 won't get out otherwise. So we want to make sure that we  
4 take them and give them an opportunity to fellowship  
5 themselves.

6 And also we are in the process of reestablishing  
7 our 10th Precinct Clergy Counsel. We're very excited about  
8 that. Mr. Allen Stokes, where are you? He's heading that  
9 effort. We want to get that back off the ground because we  
10 -- again, like we know our youth are very important, so we  
11 want to create some initiatives. We want to create some  
12 mentoring programs. We're looking at asking some pastors  
13 to open up their churches. The ones that have these gyms.  
14 We want to create a youth basketball league. So if we can  
15 get them off the street and into some type of program we  
16 think that we can -- and then have them actually, you know,  
17 interact with the police in a positive light I think that  
18 we can get some of these youth to look toward a career  
19 toward law enforcement. And if nothing else have a mutual  
20 respect with each another. So that's our biggest goal.

21 I'd also like to thank our 10th Precinct  
22 Community Relations Counsel. They came out on June 4th and  
23 planted flowers at the 10th Precinct. It was a  
24 beautification project. We appreciate them. We love it.  
25 It's beautiful. So thank you.

1 COMMISSIONER BELL: Before we entertain -- were  
2 you finished?

3 CAPTAIN MILES: Yes.

4 COMMISSIONER BELL: Any questions or concerns?

5 I want to ask Mr. Stokes from the 10th Precinct  
6 Police Information. He's the president, and also he's the  
7 president of City Wide. So I think this is an appropriate  
8 time to get him to make some brief remarks.

9 MR. STOKES: Thank you Brother Chair. First of  
10 all, those of you who don't know me my name is Alvin  
11 Stokes. I wear two hats. I'm the chairman of the 10th  
12 Precinct Citizens Community Relations and I'm also the  
13 chairman of City Wide.

14 Let me introduce the executive board, first of  
15 all, from the 10th Precinct. We have our financial  
16 secretary, Ms. Jackie McKurkin. We have our recording  
17 secretary in the back Ms. Connie Mitchell. We have Teddy  
18 Ragland is our financial secretary. She was here. And  
19 then our members at large, we have Joyce that's in the  
20 kitchen. She's getting prepared food. We have Eliya  
21 Schulman, who is one of the trustees here at this great  
22 church. We have Susan, who's also a member at large. And  
23 then I would just like to have the 10th Precinct as a whole  
24 just to stand.

25 Thank you. Brother Chair, we've been working

1 hard here in the 10th Precinct, as you've heard the good  
2 things that the commander and the captain have said. The  
3 citizen community relations has been working real hard with  
4 them to make these things happen.

5 I find out that a lot of people don't know about  
6 community relations, which every precinct has a community  
7 relations. They don't know about City Wide. And City Wide  
8 has been established since '68 right after the riots. And  
9 you've got people that's been on the battlefield for quite  
10 a long time. And we're here to help and assist in any and  
11 everything that we can do. And AC, you can take this back  
12 to the chief. I wouldn't trade our officers for nothing in  
13 the world.

14 ASST. CHIEF DOLUNT: Thank you.

15 MR. STOKES: We do have some great officers.  
16 They put their pants on one leg at a time like everybody  
17 else, but they do their job. They're some hardworking  
18 young men and women, and we support them in everything that  
19 they do.

20 Brother Chair, I thank you for this time in  
21 allowing me to say a few words. Thank you.

22 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you. Thank you, sir.

23 Commissioners, questions or concerns to the  
24 commander and the captain?

25 COMMISSIONER MOORE: First of all, I just want to

1 commend both of you for the job you're doing. I believe  
2 from January to present I've only received three  
3 complaints. I think I talked to Nick about one and Elaine  
4 about the other two just within the last month. That means  
5 I'm not getting any complaints, which is great. And I just  
6 want to say job well done. And if you ever need me reach  
7 out to me. But you're doing a good job. Because as long  
8 as they're happy I'm happy. Thank you.

9 COMMANDER KYRIACOU: Thank you.

10 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, sir. Through the  
11 Chair. Yes, commander and captain I want to thank both of  
12 you for something more than just crimes status; crime up  
13 and down. I want to thank you for the wholistic initiative  
14 you just mentioned on the record, okay. And the wholistic  
15 approach of doing things in the community other than  
16 just -- you know, a lot of times we just get, oh, the  
17 crime's up or the crime's down up; you know, the stats.  
18 But I do really do appreciate that. Thank you very much.

19 COMMISSIONER BELL: Commissioners.

20 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Thank you for a very good  
21 report. I also want to thank you for your outreach into  
22 the community. Community involvement is very important in  
23 law enforcement. With the help of the community the police  
24 department can have a much more effective police  
25 department. You guys are really doing a fantastic job in

1 reaching out to the community with all the different  
2 programs you have, so I thank you for that.

3 COMMANDER KYRIACOU: You might remember when I was a  
4 brand newly promoted inspector I had a seasoned commander  
5 that helped me out an awful lot. Thank you, sir.

6 COMMISSIONER BELL: Was that Selby?

7 Any other questions or concerns for the  
8 commander?

9 I just want to say thank you for an outstanding  
10 job. And you can see how the community reinforced all that  
11 you laid out to us this evening. So the 10th Precinct is  
12 right up there if not the top of their game in their  
13 involvement, so thank you. We appreciate it.

14 COMMANDER KYRIACOU: Thank you.

15 COMMISSIONER BELL: The next item will be  
16 Mr. Hicks, our Secretary to the Board.

17 SECRETARY HICKS: Thank you, Commissioner.

18 Mr. Chair, there's just one item I wanted to  
19 report to. That you have -- the Board has on its way to  
20 the Detroit City Council an expedited request in order to  
21 continue, if you will, the build out of the offices so that  
22 we can accommodate the staff that we have as well as the  
23 needs of the Board. And hopefully the City Council will  
24 take up this item prior to going on recess.

25 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you for that report.

1 That will be time-related because I think they're going to  
2 go on recess shortly, in the next week or so.

3 Any questions or concerns to the Board Secretary?

4 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, sir. With all due  
5 respect, it's not for the board secretary, but it's in  
6 reference to something I mentioned earlier about the social  
7 media. And Assistant Chief, your name is on there. You're  
8 probably so busy.

9 It was a teletype issued yesterday, July 13.  
10 Teletype number 16-0566. And teletypes are supposed to be  
11 read for seven consecutive days. And in this teletype  
12 seven consecutive days at roll call it's supposed to be  
13 read to the officers. It just -- in short it advises them  
14 to adhere to the following directives of the DPD Manual.  
15 102.8: Department internet usage, web pages, social  
16 networking. That was what I referenced earlier. So there  
17 is a teletype issued, and the officers should here about it  
18 for the next seven days at roll call. Thank you.

19 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, Commissioner  
20 Crawford.

21 I just want to indicate that the chief reassured  
22 me that they are addressing the issue of the social media.  
23 They're pretty much going to, as you indicated by the  
24 teletype, any personal commitment to addressing the issues.  
25 And he understands and make sure the officers understand



1 the consequences and issues that is before the media and  
2 before the nation at this particular time. So I'm glad you  
3 shared that with us and the community.

4 At this time the next item of new business would  
5 be a resolution for Mr. Eric Miller.

6 If Mr. Miller would come forward. Commissioner  
7 vice President Ricardo Moore is going to recognize  
8 Mr. Miller.

9 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Resolution honoring Mr. Eric  
10 Miller.

11 WHEREAS Mr. Eric Miller moved to Detroit along  
12 with his wife Maureen and their three children, Kyla,  
13 Aarika, and Eric Jr. in 2012. In the summer of 2013 he  
14 started his Detroit Chapter of the Lawn Academy on 7 Mile  
15 at Evergreen with his son and one had volunteer; and.

16 Whereas Mr. Miller was residing in Frisco, Texas  
17 in 2009 when he started the Lawn Academy. The Lawn Academy  
18 was created in the memory and celebration of his of his  
19 mother, Dr. Deloris Miller who was a career educator that  
20 believed all youth had the capacity to learn, and often  
21 encouraged them with positive words and prayers. The Lawn  
22 Academy is a non-profit organization that provides  
23 mentoring and leadership training to young men ages 12 to  
24 17 through community service; and.

25 WHEREAS Mr. Miller studied Mechanical Engineering

1 and received his Bachelor of Science degree from Christian  
2 Brothers University and received his Masters of Arts in  
3 Management from Lindenwood University. He currently works  
4 at Chrysler Corporation as Head of Customer Service and  
5 Order Manager; and.

6 WHEREAS Mr. Miller's Lawn Academy has grown  
7 rapidly as youth in the neighborhoods of want to the  
8 participate. Currently there are 36 youth volunteers.  
9 Mr. Miller focuses on young men that may not otherwise have  
10 a positive male role model in their life. The program  
11 provides an avenue for young men to contribute to their  
12 communities by taking care of the elderly, handicapped, and  
13 disabled by providing free lawn services; and.

14 WHEREAS Mr. Miller's Lawn Academy has willingly  
15 participated in the Motor City Makeover in making Detroit  
16 beautiful again. The Lawn Academy is currently helping the  
17 Collingwood Street community and the surrounding areas with  
18 cutting grass, planting flowers, and picking up debris from  
19 May through August of 2016. His motto is "Leadership - The  
20 Leader in Me."

21 NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Detroit  
22 Board of Police Commissioners; speaking for the citizens of  
23 the City of Detroit and the Detroit Police Department,  
24 acknowledge the generous spirit of Mr. Eric Miller. His  
25 unselfishness, leadership, and dedication to improving the

1 quality of life for children as well as all citizens in his  
2 community and throughout the city of Detroit, merits our  
3 highest regard.

4 We thank and congratulate you, Mr. Miller.

5 (APPLAUSE)

6 COMMANDER KYRIACOU: Mr. Miller, it's a privilege  
7 for me to present to you -- it's a privilege to present to  
8 you, Mr. Miller, the Spirit of Detroit Award. It is  
9 presented herewith in the expression of the gratitude and  
10 esteem of the citizens of Detroit to you Mr. Eric Miller in  
11 recognition of exceptional achievement, outstanding  
12 leadership, and dedication to improving the quality of  
13 life. It's signed about all the city members of the City  
14 Council of the City of Detroit, dated July 14, 2016.  
15 Congratulations.

16 ASST. CHIEF DOLUNT: Is it working? Okay. This  
17 is from Chief Craig and the Detroit Police Department.

18 Certificate of Recognition to Mr. Eric Miller in  
19 appreciation for the following outstanding service and  
20 cooperation; for your involvement in the community services  
21 to the City of Detroit, demonstrated spirit and commitment  
22 as worthy of recognition.

23 The chief signed it. I'm sorry he couldn't be  
24 here. You going to have to get a picture with me, but it  
25 is what it is.

1 (APPLAUSE)

2 MR. MILLER: I would truly like to thank  
3 Commander Kyriacou, and Captain Miles also, and also the  
4 neighborhood police officers.

5 They're out there with us every weekend, Officers  
6 Berry and Brown. And one thing I must say about the youth  
7 of Detroit -- and this is the purpose of this city -- youth  
8 ages 11 to 19, the purpose of this program is to say, youth  
9 have the opportunity to contribute to their communities by  
10 taking care of those that are most in need. That's the  
11 disabled, elderly, and handicapped. So what we teach the  
12 youth is a very valuable lesson; life is sometimes bigger  
13 than you, and you win in life sometimes by what you can do  
14 for others.

15 So Lawn Academy is very simple LAWN. Leading.  
16 You lead in life by assisting others. WN. You win in life  
17 by nurturing those that are most in need of nurturing.  
18 That's our elderly, handicapped, and disabled. So I truly  
19 believe the internal fortitude in character of young men  
20 will be greater developed as they're out on a weekly basis  
21 doing what they do.

22 The second thing about this though is that we  
23 said character is one thing but we have to combine that  
24 with education. We work with Wayne County Community  
25 College as of yesterday. Each one of the young men from

1 the ages 11 to 19 attended their first day of college  
2 yesterday.

3 (APPLAUSE)

4 MR. MILLER: It's a leadership program whereby --  
5 it's a leadership class where by we're teaching young men  
6 to be average is not acceptable. To graduate from high  
7 school is not acceptable. Your responsibility is to go to  
8 college and finish college; The only thing I ask of these  
9 young men. I said, you don't even have to tell me thank  
10 you. That's not my concern. What I want you to do is once  
11 you become a freshman in college, I need you to come back  
12 and I want you to work with that 11 and 12-year old and  
13 say, listen, I was where you were. Come with me. That's  
14 what it's about.

15 I thank God for my wife, for my kids. And once  
16 again, I really thank -- I'm thankful for the 10th Precinct  
17 that's out here every weekend making sure that these young  
18 men are protected. So thank you Detroit. And you're going  
19 to have a city of young men of character. That's what  
20 we're doing. Thank you.

21 (APPLAUSE)

22 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, Mr. Miller.  
23 Congratulations.

24 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Mr. Chairman, I'd like to  
25 make a motion to accept the resolution for everyone.

1 COMMISSIONER BELL: It's been properly moved and  
2 supported. Discussion? Those in favor aye.

3 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

4 COMMISSIONER BELL: Those opposed? Motion  
5 carried.

6 You want to get a picture with his family?

7 COMMANDER KYRIACOU: We were thinking about  
8 getting a picture up there with the family.

9 COMMISSIONER BELL: Come on back up. We'll pause  
10 for that.

11 MR. MILLER: My son on day one was with me on  
12 Seven Mile and Evergreen. He was the first person, along  
13 with another person with the Lawn Academy. He just  
14 graduated from Cass, and now he's a mentor for the program  
15 this year. Going to Western University.

16 (APPLAUSE)

17 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you Mr. Miller and  
18 family. That's what it's all about.

19 Let's give them another round of applause. That  
20 was his family.

21 (APPLAUSE)

22 COMMISSIONER BELL: The next item is old  
23 business. And do we have any old business?

24 If not, I would take liberty at this time to  
25 acknowledge the board participation in the graduation

1 ceremony last week on Friday at Second Ebenezer Church. I  
2 think we had outstanding -- eighteen officers have joined  
3 this family of the Detroit Police Department. So we really  
4 appreciate them. Let's applaud them. That's the effort of  
5 recruiting. Eighteen officers.

6 (APPLAUSE)

7 COMMISSIONER BELL: And also myself and Chief  
8 Investigator Drake, Pam Drake, had an opportunity to  
9 interact with the newly promoted Sergeant Lieutenant at the  
10 Academy, and it was really worthwhile to interact with  
11 them. Perhaps Chief Drake wants to make some brief remarks  
12 in reference to -- because you stayed for really the nuts  
13 and bolts of the program.

14 CHIEF INVESTIGATOR DRAKE: No pressure. For  
15 the record, Pamela Davis Drake, Chief Investigator.

16 Yes, we had the opportunity to go and speak with the  
17 newly promoted lieutenants and sergeants. Good group of  
18 people. It was nice to see some folks that were well  
19 deserving of the promotions. Very engaged. Folks that I  
20 have worked with for a long time. So it was really a  
21 pleasure to see them promoted and willing to get out  
22 there and do their jobs. They're very eager to start.  
23 So it was a wonderful experience for me. It's always a  
24 great experience when I have interaction with officers in  
25 that regard. Thank you, sir.

1                   COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you. And finally, we  
2 had -- and I forgot, the graduation ceremony was attended  
3 by Commissioner Crawford, and Commissioner Brooks, and  
4 Commissioner Sanders, and our Board Secretary. And it was  
5 great to participate in that process. And on that same --  
6 on Thursday we had the opportunity, Commissioner Moore and  
7 Crawford and myself, had the opportunity to interact with  
8 the 35 to 40 interns.

9                   Perhaps Commissioner Moore wanted to make some  
10 brief remarks in terms of that interaction.

11                   COMMISSIONER MOORE: Mr. Chairman, internship  
12 program has been going on for about a year and a half now.  
13 And it's for people who might have an interest in the  
14 Detroit Police Department. I thought it was very  
15 well-organized. You had approximately 35 interns who  
16 showed an interest. They showed dedication and asked great  
17 questions to show that they want to learn more about the  
18 Detroit Police Department.

19                   That was headed up by Ms. Lippo as well as  
20 Ms. Hobbs. And I just thought it was a good time. They  
21 have a winter class and they have a summer class. And  
22 this, of course, was the summer class. So I look forward  
23 to the winter class.

24                   COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you. Commissioner  
25 Mallett already spoke to the issue concerning what we are



1 facing, what we are dealing with across this country, so we  
2 prepared a press statement that was issued on July 8th.  
3 I'd like to share it with you at this particular time.

4 It is with deep sadness that I express the  
5 concerns of the Detroit Police commission in connection  
6 with the events that occurred over the next 48 hours. I am  
7 reminded that these and other related events are still in  
8 play and therefore our concerns are tempered by events that  
9 have yet to unfold.

10 The Detroit Board of Police Commissioners is a  
11 civilian oversight board representing the interest of the  
12 citizens of Detroit. The Chief of Police and other  
13 representatives of the city are in operational control over  
14 the resources of DPD, Detroit Police Department. They will  
15 make appropriate decisions as they determine that resources  
16 are required to address the current situation.

17 In Detroit, we are pleased the civilian oversight  
18 is part of the mix of consideration in responding to events  
19 within the city. We would like to express our support of  
20 fallen officers in any jurisdiction where police action is  
21 required. We'd like to also extend our support to the  
22 families of these fallen officers.

23 Equally, we express our concerns for the events  
24 leading up to the situation in Dallas. The events that are  
25 behind the police shootings in the Baton Rouge and

1 Minnesota are of critical importance and must be addressed  
2 by all citizens, para-military and civilian. The lives of  
3 all citizens are equally important to us. As a retired  
4 police officer, I am and have always been concerned about  
5 the heavy weight carried by citizens in marginalized  
6 communities along with the tremendous responsibility and  
7 risk that first responders must face. As Chair of the  
8 Board of Police Commissioners, we stand ready to provide  
9 our assistance as we address the events over the coming  
10 weeks.

11 And we would hope that you would keep our  
12 officers in prayers as we move forward. As I spoke at the  
13 graduation on that Friday it was a sad day, but that was  
14 day of celebration with eighteen officers joining our  
15 ranks. And without a doubt public safety; police, and  
16 fire, and EMS and others are on the front line serving our  
17 community throughout this city, throughout this country.  
18 So we really thank them for their service. I know the  
19 community appreciates their efforts. And it's been really  
20 active condolence and concern about all lives matter.

21 But we recognize the concerns in terms of the  
22 Black Lives Matter in terms of how it will materialize. I  
23 recognized that in the early days of my career. But  
24 basically the President is convening on national forum. I  
25 assume it's taking place in fifteen minutes. So they are

1 addressing issues from the White House on down as we move  
2 forward.

3 The mayor has already met with you Aaron and  
4 others concerning the right to demonstrate peacefully. And  
5 as you well know, law enforcement has a very very  
6 meaningful role in that process. And I have witnessed up  
7 front in terms of our units responding very patiently with  
8 all of the concerns of the people. But basically we are a  
9 peace-keeping operation, and we must have law and order and  
10 peace and tranquility in our community. That's the role  
11 that we play and we continue to play. Because without law  
12 and order, without police officers, without firemen,  
13 without the EMS I think we would have chaos and we do not  
14 want that.

15 I'm just pleased that, as Commissioner Conrad  
16 Mallett stated, that this is a tremendous turnout this  
17 evening from the community. And I just want to appreciate  
18 your involvement and your attendance from the police  
19 commission, from the church, and from our staff and  
20 command. They're always there to support us in terms of  
21 Chief Craig and AC Dolunt and others. So we're one family.  
22 We're striving for peace and tranquility in our community.  
23 We want everybody to be safe, but we also understand that  
24 people have the right to demonstrate. But make sure it's  
25 in a safe manner. But we know some people take advantage

1 of the situation, so that is what it is. But as we move  
2 forward let's pray for peace and tranquility; and thank you  
3 for your attendance.

4 Any other -- I'd like to recognize our one and  
5 only Linda Wesley from Counsel Brenda Jones, our counsel  
6 presidents office. She always keep us informed and keep us  
7 engaged. And Officer Dr. Divers from pro tem George  
8 Cushingberry's office.

9 Any others that might have missed or have come in  
10 late?

11 UNKNOWN SPEAKER: Cecile Ware.

12 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Also I'd like to acknowledge  
13 from the Mayor's Office Aaron Harris, deputy from District  
14 5. I know that's ya'll favorite Aaron Harris in the back.

15 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you. No other old  
16 business, so announcements.

17 Our next meeting will be Thursday, July 21, 2016,  
18 at 3:00 p.m. at Public Safety Headquarters at 1301 Third  
19 Street, Michigan room. And our next community meeting is  
20 going to be -- we have the date -- August 11th, to be  
21 determined at a later time. You will hear definitely in a  
22 timely manner where that location is going to be. We're  
23 looking at Jefferson and Chalmers area. We haven't been  
24 there in quite some time. That's in the 5th Precinct, and  
25 that's in the lower eastside. So that's what we're looking

1 and trying to get accommodation on that. For all you  
2 west-siders we are going east next time. Commissioner  
3 Mallett. But I always love to come to the west side.

4 At this time we're going to ask for oral  
5 communication from the audience. Is this the mic here? We  
6 ask if you come to this side all who want to speak. If  
7 you're able to stand please stand and we will give you the  
8 mic.

9 One final note before we go forward, is that the  
10 Citizen Advisory Counsel had their annual picnic out to  
11 Belle Isle. Is Sharon Pannell here?

12 UNKNOWN SPEAKER: No.

13 COMMISSIONER BELL: She worked so hard. It was a  
14 great event for police and for community involvement. And  
15 I had an opportunity to drop by. The Chief had an  
16 opportunity to drop by earlier. I just want to thank her.  
17 They even had a jazz band with barbecue chicken and fried  
18 fish, so it was rather impressive.

19 Any other members part of that group? Thank you  
20 for that type of involvement.

21 Ma'am, would you please -- you have two minutes.  
22 Please give your name, and you have the mic. Any others  
23 coming forward to speak? Thank you.

24 MS. BURRIS: Yes, my name is Valerie Burris, and  
25 I'm the president of the Stahelin Street Tigers Block Club.

1 I'm also an alumni from the Citizens Police Academy,  
2 November 2011.

3 I'm here today because I am concerned about  
4 Officer Weekley's comments. I'm the aunt of 55. Half of  
5 those are black males, and most of them live in this city.  
6 Most of them are supporters and activist in the Black Lives  
7 Matter movement. I am a supporter of the Black Lives  
8 Matter movement. And I took Officer Weekley's comments as  
9 a personal threat, not only to myself but to my nieces and  
10 nephews. And I would like this commission to use your  
11 power, all of your power, investigative power, subpoena  
12 powers, all of those powers to investigate this to the  
13 fullest. Because I don't think an officer who can make  
14 those types of statements should be policing the city of  
15 85 percent African Americans.

16 I'm also concerned about the Chief's comment. We  
17 all have a constitutional right to voice our opinion  
18 against police brutality. I think the Chief's tone was  
19 saying that he would arrest people. And I agree that you  
20 shouldn't -- you shouldn't yell fire in a crowded room. I  
21 agree that we shouldn't be making threats against citizens  
22 or police officers, but I don't like his tone to squash our  
23 voices against police brutality. And that's what I heard  
24 from the Chief, and I didn't like it. I did not like it.

25 And I -- like I said, I am -- I'm not

1 anti-police, I'm anti-police brutality; and we need to  
2 snuff it out wherever it is.

3 I know we like to say that in Detroit we're not  
4 having some of the problems that other cities have, but we  
5 are. We are having those problems.

6 Just last week on my block a young man was just  
7 going into his house. Police officer came around the  
8 corner; excuse me, let me talk to you. Let me talk to you.  
9 The young man just continued to walk in his house. He  
10 said, I just want to talk to him. I said, well I've been  
11 sitting out here for an hour on my porch. I might have saw  
12 something. That man didn't see anything. He's just going  
13 into his house. So we need to address that, yes, our young  
14 people are still be harassed by police just for being  
15 young. Thank you.

16 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, ma'am. And the  
17 chief is not here to respond. And I just want to say it's  
18 been dually noted on the record your concerns. And as you  
19 well know, we've already spoken to the issue of the other  
20 officer involved, and we are taking the proper step in  
21 terms of due process. Thank you.

22 Anyone else? Yes, ma'am.

23 MS. WESLEY: Good evening.

24 COMMISSIONERS: Good evening.

25 MS. WESLEY: I'm Linda from Council President

1 Brenda Jones' office. Good evening Commissioners.

2 Just wanted to let you all know that the City  
3 Council will be on recess. Their last day is July 22nd.  
4 The last formal session will be Tuesday, July 19th. They  
5 will be returning the first Tuesday. That will be  
6 September 6th. September 6th. But most of the offices --  
7 I can tell you that council president's office will be  
8 open. And so if you need our assistance we will definitely  
9 be there. Council president will be most likely in the  
10 community a lot more. This will be her opportunity to get  
11 out a little bit more.

12 The Skill Trades Task Force meeting is going to  
13 be Tuesday, July 26th from 4:00 to 6:00 p.m. at the Joseph  
14 Walker Williams Center at 8431 Rosa Parks Blvd. near  
15 Euclid.

16 The Seventh Annual Senior Citizens Informational  
17 Summit that council president hosts will be Thursday,  
18 August 4th from 10:00 to 2:00 p.m. at Irma Henderson Park.  
19 This is a great time for our seniors to come out. If you  
20 are interested in coming we do ask if you will please call  
21 us to RSVP at 224-1245. We would love to have you come out  
22 and have a wonderful time. Thank you so much for allowing  
23 me to speak.

24 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, Ms. Wesley.

25 MR. REED: Good evening to the Chair. Honorable



1 Commissioner, my name is Kenneth Reed, and I'm a spokesman  
2 for the Detroit Coalition Against Police Brutality.

3 I have not had an opportunity to address you guys  
4 in awhile, because I've been busy out in the community,  
5 carrying on the vision of Ron Scott with the Peace On Life  
6 program. Particularly our summer youth program dealing  
7 with the youth from the ages of 14 through 18 this summer.

8 But the reason why I'm here this evening is  
9 two-fold. One, the comments that were made by Detective,  
10 now Officer Weekley. Like I said before, and when I was  
11 asked about it by the media, that was a good start.  
12 However, if you have an officer, a sworn officer, whose  
13 duty is to protect and serve, and if he has the audacity to  
14 make these type of comments concerning an organization who  
15 is simply exercising their first amendment rights. And if  
16 he feels that way about black people in a city that's 80  
17 percent black, well, you know, maybe he should have him a  
18 job somewhere else. As a matter of fact, he should not be  
19 on this department anymore.

20 Second, we have read this morning about an  
21 incident involving the organization New Mayor of Detroit.  
22 And it appears that based on what I've red that some of the  
23 people in the organization while out doing patrols, or  
24 whatever was in their community were roughed up allegedly  
25 by some officers.

1                   Now, if officers must arrest someone, place  
2 someone under arrest, they should not have to yank a  
3 woman's hair out their head. You know, we don't need to be  
4 going backwards. We don't want to go back into the period  
5 where we were under a consent decree in this city. I  
6 thought we were moving forward in terms of community  
7 police, and I want to see it continue that way.

8                   And one last thing. On the corner of Rosa Parks  
9 Blvd. and Elmhurst, adjacent to the Job Corps center over  
10 there, there is a dispensary operating. And the Job Corps  
11 center, as we well know, is an educational facility. And  
12 according to the statute, the ordinances, that place should  
13 not be in access of a thousand feet of their facility. So  
14 I think that is something that needs to be done with, be  
15 dealt with. That is inside the 10th precinct. And I am a  
16 resident of the 10th precinct, and that is approximately  
17 two streets over from where I live.

18                   COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, sir. Your time is  
19 up. And all those issues have been dually noted, and we  
20 appreciate it.

21                   Anyone others? Would you please come forward?

22                   MR. SHAKIR: Good evening, commissioners.

23                   COMMISSIONERS: Good evening.

24                   MR. SHAKIR: My name is Rasul Ali Shakir. I'm an  
25 ex-member of this church. I converted to Islam in '82,

1 '83, but I still participate.

2 First thing I'd like to do is thank the  
3 commissioners for coming out and taking on the position,  
4 first of all. You get all the flack that comes with the  
5 job. And I appreciate you and just want you to know it's  
6 coming from me personally.

7 But, you know, we've had issues in this city  
8 going deep back from the day I was born with the police. I  
9 was blessed to hit 66 my last birthday. And I'm not a  
10 street person but I'm in the street. I been in jail. I  
11 been in -- everywhere you can think of I've been there, so  
12 what I'm talking about is firsthand experience. We've  
13 always had an issue with police that are on the job for  
14 other issues. And everybody's got a motive for what they  
15 do.

16 You know, I wasn't here to hear any statements,  
17 but I just want to reflect. You know this is Detroit. We  
18 had stress. We had all these different agencies. I  
19 remember a shootout between two police groups and they were  
20 both after-hour joints. So we have a lot of -- it's  
21 criminal activity somewhere. So, you know, don't think  
22 we're living in a Eutopia; you know, because things go on.

23 Now we got this thing going on with the black and  
24 white issue with these officers abusing our youth and our  
25 young men, and killing them and walking. That's the

1 problem that I have.

2 We have a problem with our city officials that  
3 were duly elected by the public doing things, killing a  
4 whole town up in Flint, pumping bad water into a city, and  
5 nobody's paying the cost.

6 You know, 80 percent of the prison population is  
7 African American. Some ethnicities and Europeans get to  
8 walk. So these youth are not buying it. The problem that  
9 we have with the youth is they're not taking what we took  
10 as youths and they're ready for a change.

11 I represent a group called Black Men United.  
12 We're changing the name of that group from black Men United  
13 to Positive Change in the World. We represent a lot of  
14 young guys that want something to happen other than what's  
15 going on. So I just want to let people know.

16 I've been trying to acquire property to do  
17 something with these youth and start clubs; ping pong,  
18 planting. Same thing that saved me coming up.

19 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you sir.

20 MR. SHAKIR: And I'm having some difficulties,  
21 and I'd like to get some help on acquiring some of this  
22 property --

23 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, sir.

24 MR. SHAKIR: -- like Ilitch.

25 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you.

1 Yes, ma'am?

2 MS. SMITH: I'm the good news bearer. I'm here  
3 to invite you all to the James Park and Russel Woods party.  
4 We've had it for forty plus years and nothing has ever gone  
5 wrong.

6 COMMISSIONER BELL: Say your name.

7 MS. SMITH: Oh, forgive me. I'm Norma Smith.

8 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you.

9 MS. SMITH: Sorry. But nothing's ever gone wrong  
10 with our magic tent. It's always not -- they don't make an  
11 appearance that they're there. They're always there, but  
12 we don't ever need them. So there are good things going on  
13 in Detroit and I'd like to tell some of them. So please  
14 come out and join us with Jazz in the Park. Straight Ahead  
15 will be the musicians this year. But do join us. Come and  
16 see five to seven hundred people, black folks mostly, in  
17 the community having fun and everything is all right.

18 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, ma'am.

19 SECRETARY HICKS: Ma'am, what's the date?

20 MS. SMITH: Sunday, the 17th. It's always the  
21 third Sunday, in case I don't get to the meeting before  
22 that. But mark it on your calendar and be sure you join us  
23 so you'll have something wonderful to talk about.

24 AUDIENCE: The time?

25 COMMISSIONER BELL: Any other speakers please

1           come forward.

2                       MS. SMITH: I can tell you all haven't been.  
3           Almost everybody's been before. It's from 6:00 to 8:00 in  
4           the park. In our park that the city keeps beautifully for  
5           us.

6                       COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, ma'am.

7                       MS. SMITH: You don't hear those good things.  
8           But drive around our park sometimes and see how lovely it  
9           is. The city keeps it for us. The park is at Fullerton  
10          and Broad Street. Okay?

11                      COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, ma'am.

12                      MS. SMITH: See you there.

13  
14                      MR. GLENON: Yes, my name is the Douglas Glenon.  
15          I just moved to the neighborhood about seven months ago,  
16          and I'm a part of the block party. And since I've been  
17          here I've seen a lot of things happen. And there's a lot  
18          of things I sit there and I've been trying to do for the  
19          neighborhood. And I think that the police officers have  
20          been doing great, and for quite awhile. And considering to  
21          the past ten years, yeah, they improved a whole lot. They  
22          do show respect to the neighborhood. But they do got some  
23          bad officers too also. So we can't judge the bad ones for  
24          the good ones.

25                      I remember Mayor Young used to tell me, there's

1 always a good apple and there's a bad apple. And if you  
2 remember, the bad apple will make the good apples look  
3 rotten. So ya'll officers need to take care of yourselves,  
4 and God bless you.

5 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, sir.

6 MS. FAITH: I want to greet each and every one of  
7 you with a lot of love, with a lot of peace, and a lot of  
8 gratitude. My name is Faith. Some know it, some don't. I  
9 was raised in this community. I went to Samson Northwest.  
10 Graduated from McMichael Northwest. I went to Wayne blah,  
11 blah, blah.

12 God spoke to me in 1978 and told me to open a  
13 residential facility for families who did not have a  
14 support. So we opened the first one in 1980 and they  
15 spread it out across the United States. Now God spoke  
16 again. He told me to come back and build to school for  
17 abused and exploited children. So I'm basically here  
18 introducing myself. I'm not the new kid on the beat, but  
19 it's the kid that's returning home to do some more work.

20 Our whole purpose is that all the things that  
21 we're addressing here, laying the foundation for our  
22 children. And our families will be able to come together  
23 and be God's family. You know, we never think about God  
24 got a family. We never think about that God might have a  
25 few tears. We never think about God heart might ache,

1 we're just busy doing our things. Well I'm one of these  
2 foolish people that think that God -- let's wipe away God's  
3 tears. So that's why I'm back here, to build a school for  
4 abused and exploited children where there's not a single  
5 one in the United States of America for low socioeconomic  
6 people.

7 Thank you for letting me introduce myself.

8 Peace.

9 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, ma'am. Appreciate  
10 it.

11 MS. SMITH: Good afternoon. Berniece Smith,  
12 political activist. Chief, Commissioner, very good meeting  
13 tonight. And welcome to my neighborhood. You're not  
14 directly in it but you're on the other side of us. We're  
15 on past Warren and West Grand Boulevard. Maybe you'll get  
16 a chance to come and meet some of my neighbors over there  
17 that I formerly knew.

18 What I come today for. I'm proud, as I stated  
19 last week, of our police department. The Chief is doing a  
20 wonderful job. The Commissioners, you're following through  
21 on some of the things that I think you should be doing.  
22 I'm proud of your secretary who's doing a good job. So I  
23 just want to give you kudos to whatever that you feel as  
24 though that we're going to be doing.

25 Due to the fact that we've had such a devastating



1 week, and we've heard so many commentaries stating this and  
2 that about the police department -- as most of you know I  
3 was a former police commissioner so I know just about what  
4 entails. I'm not going to look at you Brown.

5 So anyway, I just want to let the public know  
6 that the police department here in Detroit, you have the  
7 best. When they do right I give them all the kudos in the  
8 world. When they do wrong I jack them up like a mother do.  
9 But the fact is I want you to appreciate them. Tell your  
10 children -- and I know this has been told so many times on  
11 the air and on CNN. Tell your children whenever they're  
12 being stopped do not hesitate to do the right thing by  
13 putting your hands, or their hands on the steering wheel.  
14 I taught my son that when he first come out of Southwestern  
15 High School. So I want you all to know it is a dangerous  
16 time in these years.

17 COMMISSIONER BELL: Excuse me. You're speaking  
18 to the Board of Police Commissioners, not to the audience.  
19 So your time is almost up.

20 MS. SMITH: Can you let me finish?

21 COMMISSIONER BELL: You're speaking to the Board.

22 MS. SMITH: All right. All right, Bell. Let me  
23 finish. I just don't want to look at Brown.

24 COMMISSIONER BELL: You're speaking to the Board.

25 MS. SMITH: You know I'm speaking to you whenever

1 I talk. I just don't want to look at Brown, that's all.  
2 But anyway, I'm going to stop.

3 But I just want the public to know we do have a  
4 good police department, and they try to maintain their  
5 professionalism at all time. I'm crazy about Chief Steve  
6 over there. He gets angry. Every time we do something  
7 wrong on the TV he shows to impress about it. So I will  
8 stop.

9 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you.

10 MS. SMITH: Because Mr. Bell and I, we always go  
11 head-up here.

12 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you.

13 MS. SMITH: Thank you for coming tonight. Come  
14 down to headquarters. We'd like to have you down there  
15 also.

16 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you.

17 Any other speakers, please? Thank you.

18 MR. DIVERS: Good afternoon.

19 COMMISSIONERS: Good afternoon.

20 MR. DIVERS: My name is Arthur Divers. I'm the  
21 liaison for the Alma George Cushingberry. And I come to  
22 your meetings on a regular basis, so I'm not a new face.  
23 But I do see something here. I've spoken on this issue  
24 before.

25 You have a citizen here who was recognized for

1 outstanding work in the community, exceptional contribution  
2 of leadership. And we see so much in the paper about  
3 violence and negative things. Here is a positive thing; a  
4 man who has given of his time working with youth. Where is  
5 the media? They ought to be here. Nevertheless they  
6 should have been notified. We ought to have them here and  
7 publicize this work, because it shows that we have people  
8 who care and people who will use their skills. And I'm  
9 hopeful that in the future you will get much better  
10 recognition in the media, the newspaper, the radio and  
11 social media. This is an important event and it ought to  
12 be seen by as many people as possible. Because it shows  
13 demonstration and it shows leadership, male leadership.  
14 And that's what we have not had in a long time. And so I'm  
15 saying to you, Chief, and Mr. Chairman, and other members  
16 of the board, we need to get that sort of recognition  
17 reported widely in the newspapers.

18 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you.

19 MS. SMITH: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

20 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, sir.

21 MR. STOKES: Good evening again. Alvin Stokes,  
22 CHAIRMAN of the 10th Precinct.

23 I want to thank the Board of Police Commissioners  
24 for allowing us to host your meeting again. We truly  
25 appreciate you. The thing that I ask is that we use the

1 Board and the police to encourage the citizens to get  
2 involved with their community relations of their precinct.  
3 Every precinct has a meeting once a month. The 10th  
4 Precinct meets the first Thursday of the month at the mini  
5 station on Virginia Park and 12th at 6:30. We'd like to  
6 have anyone who wants to come and speak at the meeting to  
7 come out and speak at our meeting. But every community  
8 precinct has a community relations meeting, and we ask that  
9 all citizens get involved.

10 And once you conclude your meeting we'd like you  
11 to know that we have refreshments in the back. Thank you  
12 again for allowing us.

13 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, sir.

14 MS. JACKSON: Hi, Commissioner. My name is  
15 Kathleen Jackson. I'm the daughter of retired Lieutenant  
16 George Powell. I'm here unfortunately with an unfortunate  
17 event that occurred on June 25th, and I was advised that I  
18 should let the Detroit Police Commission know.

19 So on June 25th -- which is what he handed out.  
20 It's a copy I would like everyone to keep -- at  
21 approximately 12:45 I, Kathleen Jackson, pulled up right  
22 behind my friend Allen Martin's car to drop he and his son  
23 off at their car which was parked on Larned Street, I-375,  
24 just down from the driveway entrance of the gas station.

25 As I was sitting in my car preparing to leave I

1 noticed a black young man, approximately 18 to 22 years  
2 old, running fast down the sidewalk with dark hair on his  
3 face. His eyes were big, etc. I pushed the locks on the  
4 doors as he started passing my car. I proceeded to back up  
5 to create space so I could pull off. But when I checked my  
6 mirrors I caught the man in my passenger side-view mirror  
7 bent down sneaking to the rear of my passenger side. I  
8 realized at that point my passenger window was down. I  
9 locked the doors. I tried to put the window up, and  
10 honking my horns to get my friend's attention. And the  
11 perpetrator stuck his hand through the window, opened the  
12 door, unlocked the door, opened it and got into my car and  
13 locked the doors. I started honking and trying to get him  
14 to leave.

15 While in the car he started repositioning  
16 himself, looked into the glove box, closed it, and then  
17 glanced in the back seat. And then I saw a gun, of which I  
18 hadn't remembered when the police asked me because I was in  
19 shock. I was in shock and I was traumatized.

20 He saw my reaction to him and I remember now  
21 calling on the Lord for help; and he said, I'm not going  
22 to hurt you. I remember saying to God, I just have to  
23 trust you that he's not going to hurt me. After he  
24 scuffled around his leg he leaned up, and then there was  
25 Allen at the window. The perpetrator immediately locked

1 the doors, and I immediately unlocked it. And then Allen  
2 pulled him; basically punched him, held him, retained him  
3 until the police came. The police was already out because  
4 there was a lot going on in Detroit that night. He tried  
5 resisting, but to no avail. So then Allen -- so I told you  
6 that part.

7 After I saw the police come -- it was a white  
8 woman police officers first to the scene -- I jumped out so  
9 she would know which one was the bad person. And then they  
10 got our report and said a detective would call me.

11 The next day around 7:30 while cleaning my car I  
12 saw a gun under the passenger seat mat. And no one else  
13 had been in my car. And then I had a flashback of what had  
14 occurred when he was repositioning himself, because I was  
15 in shock.

16 So I took it to the Southfield Police. They said  
17 I'd have to take it to Detroit Police. I drive a company  
18 car. With a gun in it -- I couldn't do that. So Allen  
19 came and got it. We transferred it to the 12th Precinct.  
20 After an hour of looking for a report, there was no report  
21 made by the police who had come on duty. There was no  
22 search of my car for any type of evidence or anything. The  
23 guy did say that he was stooping down and he was trying to  
24 hide -- He told Allen too -- he was trying to hide from the  
25 police. I also mentioned to you what happened. A

1 detective never called me.

2 So my complaint is that the Detroit Police did  
3 not do his job in this case. I was put at high risk, and  
4 it's a lot of what-ifs that could have happened. I would  
5 like a resolution to this. Signed Kathleen Jackson.

6 COMMISSIONER BELL: Ma'am, would you -- Chief  
7 Investigator Pamela Davis Drake is right behind you. If  
8 you would speak to her she will take your complaint and  
9 concern.

10 CAPTAIN MILES: We have it.

11 COMMISSIONER BELL: You have it already?

12 Okay, we are going to conduct a thorough and a  
13 fair investigation.

14 MS. SMITH: Thank you.

15 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you for bringing this  
16 to our attention at this particular forum.

17 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Through the Chair, I have a  
18 question for Chief Investigator Drake. When was the report  
19 filed? Today or --

20 CHIEF INVESTIGATOR DRAKE: Again Pamela Davis  
21 Drake for the record. Sir, I believe it was last week  
22 when the couple came to the office and filed the report.  
23 She saw a supervisor and she saw an investigator at that  
24 time.

25 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you.

1 CHIEF INVESTIGATOR DRAKE: We did take it. I'm  
2 sure it's been assigned. I'm not sure who it's assigned  
3 to but I know we have it, and we will do a thorough  
4 investigation.

5 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, sir.

6 MR. MARTIN: Hi, my name is Allen Martin. I just  
7 want to reiterate something. I'm the former violence  
8 prevention coordinator for the city of Detroit.

9 AUDIENCE: We can't hear you.

10 MR. MARTIN: I said I'm Allen Martin. I just  
11 wanted to reiterate just a couple of things. I'm the VPC,  
12 or violence prevention coordinator, for the city of Detroit  
13 serving the city of Detroit in a few different spots.

14 At that time there were five officers that  
15 actually came. I shared with the officers that not only  
16 did I pull the guy out the car, but he said to me, man I'm  
17 just trying to get away from the police. I wasn't trying  
18 to hurt her; I just need to get out here. So I shared with  
19 the police when I held the guy of what he's saying.

20 I do training for officers, as many of you know,  
21 across the country. And it was police 101 to raid the  
22 area. He was running from a scene. He was running from  
23 the scene. He snuck up in a car, he jumped in the car. He  
24 didn't have an opportunity to say, hey, I'm going to rape  
25 you. He didn't have an opportunity to say, pull off. When



1 I saw him running up to the side of the car I immediately  
2 jumped out of my car and went to her car to snatch him out.  
3 So he didn't have the opportunity to give the kind of  
4 statements that would normally be seen as prosecutable  
5 statements. I wasn't going to give him that opportunity.  
6 I wasn't going to let him drive off so that he can do  
7 whatever he wanted to do.

8 And so when I shared with the officers not only  
9 that he said that he was running from the police, they said  
10 that they were going to arrest him and that they were going  
11 the pull him in. They said they were going to arrest him  
12 and they were going to hold him. They let him go.

13 So this young lady found a glock 917 fully  
14 cocked -- seventeen in the clip, one in the barrel -- fully  
15 cocked in her vehicle. When we took it over to the 12th  
16 Precinct we were then told -- I simply asked a couple of  
17 questions. Are you going to snatch the fingerprints off of  
18 it? We were told, most likely not. They said that's not  
19 what we normally do. When we called down -- I called down  
20 to the 3rd. It was said, well do you know what officers  
21 were there? I said, no. At that particular point -- at  
22 that point I was more interested in how she was feeling at  
23 that particular time. We had one officers name.

24 We still to this day have not even been told the  
25 five officers that responded. And so I guess it was

1 important that I reiterated this. Because this young lady  
2 could have been assassinated with this perp. We were told  
3 three times they were going to arrest him and he would be  
4 booked. He was let go. The officers --

5 COMMISSIONER BELL: Sir, sir, sir.

6 MS. SMITH: As I sit down. I'm just going to say  
7 this and I'm going to sit down.

8 The last thing that the officer said to me; he  
9 said, we will arrest him. We will book him. And he said,  
10 we would like for you all to leave the scene. Now when he  
11 said that, I asked him, why should we leave? I wanted to  
12 see him be put in the police car. Again, I do these  
13 trainings. He said, I need you all to leave. So the  
14 officer himself knew at that particular time when he told  
15 us he was going to arrest him he wasn't going to do a  
16 thing.

17 So I appreciate your time. And in all of the  
18 wonderful accolades of the police department -- which I  
19 know they do phenomenal things -- these five officers did  
20 not search the area, did not look in her car. And the  
21 officer took a report and didn't even take her phone  
22 number. So we need to do something about this.

23 COMMISSIONER BELL: Sir, we have the complaint.  
24 It's already been filed. Give us opportunities, Office of  
25 the Chief Investigator, to investigate the complaint. I

1 assume you're a complainant or a witness involved in that  
2 process.

3 MS. SMITH: Absolutely.

4 COMMISSIONER BELL: And thank you. Thank you.  
5 Appreciate it.

6 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Mr. Chairman, I would like  
7 to acknowledge another part of District 7, which is Captain  
8 Bilil Muhammad of the 2nd Precinct and Captain Tiffany  
9 Stewart from the 6th Precinct.

10 COMMISSIONER BELL: If there's no other business  
11 before this body at this time the Chair may entertain a  
12 motion for adjournment.

13 COMMISSIONER MOORE: So moved.

14 COMMISSIONER BELL: It's been properly moved.  
15 Those in favor aye.

16 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

17 COMMISSIONER BELL: Opposed? Motion carried.  
18 And thank you for your attendance.
