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5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Good afternoon. I
6 should say good evening.

7 AUDIENCE: Good evening.

8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. It goes to show
9 you that we're on our toes. Good evening and welcome
10 to the evening meeting of the Board of Police
11 Commission. I am your Chair, Willie Bell. And we are
12 here at Jordan Missionary Baptist Church.

13 I'm going to have opening prayer invocation
14 by Bishop McCray, the minister of the house here, as
15 he comes forward. And any other remarks you want to
16 make after opening prayer we would appreciate it.

17 BISHOP McCRAY: Let us all bow our heads in
18 prayer.

19 Most kind and eternal God, our Father, as
20 we come at this hour of the afternoon we come, Father,
21 with heads bowed and hearts humbled thanking you,
22 Father, that you've allowed us one more day that we
23 might be able to greet one another and share with one
24 another, not view one another.

25 We thank you Heavenly Father for allowing

1 these leaders to be placed at this place that, Father,
2 the business of this commission can be shared. We
3 thank you, Lord, for our policemen, we thank you for
4 our commissioners, we thank you for the leaders of our
5 city. And we ask you, Heavenly Father, to watch over
6 them, guide them, Heavenly Father, for their work is
7 not a easy work, neither is their task always welcome,
8 but it is necessary, especially in times like these.

9 And so we ask you, Heavenly Father, to
10 touch the hearts of the residents of our city, Lord,
11 that they may be opened up to our policemen and they
12 might understand the work that they must do. And
13 bless the hearts of our policemen, Father, that they
14 might always understand, Lord, that the work that they
15 do is a diligent work and that the lives that they
16 save, Lord, are important. We ask, Lord, that you
17 bless all those, Lord, who are just standing in the
18 need of your help, in the need of your glory. Guide
19 us, Father, and keep us is our prayer, in Jesus name.
20 And the church said together amen.

21 AUDIENCE: Amen.

22 BISHOP McCRAY: On behalf of the officers
23 and members of the Jordan Missionary Baptist Church as
24 well as our Association Evangelistic Outreach Network
25 where I serve as Jurisdictional Prelate, we want to

1 welcome the Detroit Police Commission and all of the
2 members thereof here to our humble home. We want you
3 to know that you are welcome here any time and you --
4 our doors are always open to you. We applaud the work
5 that you do. And we know that it is a strenuous task,
6 but necessary task. And anything that we can do as
7 part of the faith-based community to assist you and
8 aid you, please feel free to contact us and let us
9 know, because we're all in this thing together
10 because at the end of the day we all are family.

11 God bless you.

12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, sir.
13 Appreciate it. Thank you for that warm hospitality.

14 In this evening meeting, I'm going to call
15 the meeting to order, and we're going to conduct a
16 roll call by the commissioners introducing themselves
17 and any brief remarks they want to make.

18 At this time, to my extreme left -- I can't
19 entirely see the floor there, but starting with the
20 commissioner to my extreme left should be Commissioner
21 Shelby.

22 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Commission Richard
23 Shelby representing District 1.

24 COMMISSIONER VANN: Bishop Edgar Vann
25 representing District 2, northwest Detroit.

1 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Commissioner
2 Reginald Crawford representing District 3.

3 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Police Commissioner
4 Willie Burton. I represent District 5.

5 VICE CHAIRPERSON MOORE: Good evening.
6 Police Commissioner Ricardo Moore, Vice Chair of the
7 Detroit Board of Police Commissioners representing
8 District 7, west side.

9 CHAIRPERSON BELL: And to my right?

10 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Good evening. Police
11 Commissioner Lisa Carter representing District 6.

12 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Commissioner
13 Elizabeth Brooks, appointed.

14 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: Commissioner Derrick
15 Sanders, appointed.

16 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Commissioner Eva
17 Garza Dewaelsche, appointed.

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: And I am once again
19 Commissioner Willie Bell of District 4. I represent
20 District 4 and I'm the Chair of the board, and you
21 just met my Vice Chair, Ricardo Moore, this evening.
22 And we're going to go forth by --

23 At this time sitting in for Chief Craig,
24 and he might be still celebrating his significant
25 birthday this week, and we wish him well, and that

1 would be Deputy Chief Renee Hall.

2 DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: Good evening.

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: And Mr. Gregory Hicks,
4 our board secretary, would you introduce the staff of
5 the Board of Police Commissioners.

6 MR. HICKS: Thank you, Commissioner.

7 Commissioner, you have 10 members present
8 and you do have a quorum.

9 I would like to introduce several of our
10 staff people who are here today. First we have Linda
11 Bernard who is sitting here, and she is the attorney
12 for the board.

13 We also have Pam Drake who is here. And
14 Pam will introduce the balance of her staff in just
15 one second.

16 We do have with us Sergeant Alan Quinn from
17 Media -- I mean Sergeant Alan Quinn who is taping the
18 meeting. We have Media Services that is taping the
19 meeting. And we have Sheila Rice who is the court
20 reporter for this evening who is seated over here.

21 Pam, if you can introduce your other ...

22 MS. DAVIS-DRAKE: I hope I can be heard.

23 Good afternoon -- good evening.

24 MR. QUINN: You have to stand at the
25 podium.

1 MS. DAVIS-DRAKE: Good evening, everyone.
2 Pamela Davis-Drake, Chief Investigator.

3 I have with me today Supervising
4 Investigator Abdullah Nelson.

5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Any other introduction?

6 MR. HICKS: No.

7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. Let the record
8 reflect that Commissioner Conrad Mallet is absent at
9 this time, but we do have a quorum. I think you
10 already made that determination.

11 Commissioners, I ask your approval of the
12 agenda for the meeting of August 11, which is this
13 evening?

14 COMMISSIONERS: Support.

15 COMMISSIONER: Move adoption, Mr. Chair.

16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: It's been properly moved
17 and supported.

18 Those in favor?

19 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Those opposed?

21 Motion carries.

22 The next item of business will be the
23 approval of the minutes from Thursday, August the 4th.
24 What's your pleasure?

25 COMMISSIONER: Support.

1 VICE CHAIRPERSON MOORE: So moved.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: It's been properly moved
3 and supported.

4 Discussion?

5 Those in favor, aye?

6 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Those opposed?

8 Motion carried.

9 I'm going to reserve my remarks, but I just
10 want to say that we are pleased to have the meeting
11 here in the heart of Jefferson and Chalmers area. The
12 Fifth Precinct embrace pretty significant organization
13 from the east side -- I mean East English Village to
14 Cornerstone borderline, I guess, and also
15 Jefferson-Chalmers and Morningside and other
16 organizations that make up the heart and soul of this
17 organization of the Fifth Precinct in terms of
18 community involvement. And I know Commanders Ewing is
19 going to elaborate in much more detail in reference to
20 the Fifth Precinct so we can move on.

21 I'm going to ask that -- the next item
22 would be Deputy Chief Hall representing the Chief of
23 Police, Chief Craig.

24 DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: Good evening. First
25 I'd like to greet the board and also introduce several

1 command officers and executives who are present today.
2 As I look around, let me make sure I don't miss
3 anybody.

4 I think have Commander Eric Ewing from the
5 Fifth Precinct, Commander Todd Bettison from
6 Neighborhood Liaison, Commander Tim Leach from number
7 11, Commander Charles Mahone from number 9, Commander
8 Jacqueline Pritchett from number 8, Commander Tosqui
9 from number 6, I have Captain Holt from number 7,
10 Captain Gary Sroka from number 12, I have Captain
11 Petty from Downtown Services, Captain Russ Solano from
12 number 4. And I don't think I missed anybody. The
13 NPOs are going to be introduced by Commander Ewing
14 during his presentation.

15 Just a couple things from the Detroit
16 Police Department. I am so pleased today to talk
17 about how our numbers are down. We are sitting on
18 reductions, as much as 32 percent reduction in our
19 carjackings year-to-date, 14 percent in robbery, 14
20 percent in nonfatal shootings, 14 percent in
21 aggravated assaults. The only area that we are seeing
22 an increase is in our homicides, and we recognize that
23 we have a little bit more work to do.

24 We are in no way celebrating that we have a
25 total victory relative to crime, but we are making

1 strides. As you know, this is a smaller police
2 department. We're dealing with some of the same
3 issues, but the men and women in the city of Detroit
4 right now are doing a phenomenal job, and we recognize
5 there's so much more work to do, but we applaud the
6 success that we have right now.

7 Just one of the upcoming events that is
8 coming up on this weekend is going to be Cots
9 Community and Classic Cars. That is going to be a car
10 show along with our community. We recognize that most
11 of our individuals who have classic cars have really
12 nowhere to showcase them. So they came to us as an
13 organization and we put together an event for them.

14 Of course you know Chief Craig is a huge
15 car guy. So on Saturday -- this Saturday, the 13th,
16 from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Canfield between Cass and
17 Second there will be a classic car show. We're
18 inviting you to come on out, enjoy viewing some
19 classic cars and just spending some time with the city
20 of Detroit and our community as we fellowship
21 together. So we ask that you do that.

22 I do want to thank each one of the board
23 members who made it to the Chief's birthday party on
24 Wednesday as he celebrated his 60th birthday party.
25 We had a wonderful time. Thank you so much.

1 At this time from the police department we
2 will have Commander Eric Ewing from the Fifth Precinct
3 who will give us an overview of the Fifth Precinct.

4 VICE CHAIRPERSON MOORE: Through the Chair,
5 prior to Commander Ewing I have a question for the
6 deputy chief.

7 DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: Yes, sir.

8 VICE CHAIRPERSON MOORE: And it's really
9 not directly related to police. It's indirectly
10 related.

11 As I drove down Newport outside I noticed a
12 whole bunch of weeds that look like trees across the
13 street, a lot of blight. And I know indirectly that
14 attributes to crime. Can you put in a message to
15 someone in the City to see if they look into that so
16 they can clean up across the street?

17 DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: Absolutely. Our NPOs
18 are right here today, and they can take note of that
19 and make sure that we get that to the proper city
20 entity. We do work hand-in-hand with our district
21 managers. So we'll take care of that right away.

22 VICE CHAIRPERSON MOORE: Thank you, ma'am.

23 DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: You're welcome.

24 COMMANDER EWING: If it please the board,
25 Commander Ewing, Fifth Precinct. My partner in crime,

1 Mark Bliss, is on a furlough, a well-deserved furlough
2 I might say. I'd like to at this time introduce my
3 staff. If they would please stand up.

4 Sergeant McClure, Sharon McClure, Officer
5 Herman King NPO, Officer Audrey Curtis and Officer
6 Deandre Gaines. We have a fourth NPO, Officer Deborah
7 Gaines, again is on furlough, well-deserved.

8 As you know, the Fifth Precinct is a newer
9 building. It's located 3500 Conner Avenue. It's one
10 of the largest -- we are one of the largest police
11 precincts in the city. We currently encompass about
12 12.8 square miles. We border the interstate of I-94
13 to the north, the Detroit River to the south, Cadillac
14 Boulevard to the west and Kingsville Road to the east.
15 We border communities such as Grosse Pointe Farms,
16 Grosse Pointe Park and Harper Woods.

17 As the commissioner alluded to earlier, we
18 have several communities within the Fifth Precinct.
19 Some of the more notable ones are East English
20 Village, Cornerstone, Morningside and the Riverside
21 communities.

22 The city of Detroit properties and private
23 property within the Fifth Precinct consist of
24 Waterworks Park, Daimler-Chrysler Jefferson North
25 Complex extended from St. Jean to East Warren, Conner

1 to East Jefferson.

2 Right now the Fifth Precinct -- and we're
3 not boasting on this, but we currently answer about
4 18,000 calls for service in this past year, which
5 equates to about 600 calls per week and almost a
6 hundred calls per day. The Fifth Precinct also
7 averages about 40 felony arrests and over 42
8 misdemeanor arrests a month, which equates to an
9 average of about a thousand arrests per year. In that
10 the precinct also averages about 150 traffic stops,
11 misdemeanor citations every month, which equates to
12 about 1,800 citations issued per year.

13 As you just met my neighborhood police
14 officers who are assigned to quality of life issues,
15 and they really have been the heart and soul of the
16 precinct as they work with the communities that we
17 have within the Fifth Precinct.

18 Some of the family fun events that we have
19 within the Fifth Precinct includes the Chandler Park
20 Aquatic Center. This past week we had our National
21 Night Out. If any of you were available, we had over
22 1,100 kids who attended that particular event in which
23 again my NPOs were able to give out bookbags and
24 things at that event to those particular kids who came
25 to that event.

1 Also in the Fifth Precinct it houses St.
2 John Hospital Medical Center, which is a level trauma
3 2 center. It's one of the largest hospital campuses
4 in the city of Detroit. Most notably we have the
5 Fiat-Chrysler Jefferson North Assembly Plant, which is
6 about three million square feet plant wise, that is,
7 and rests on 283 acres.

8 And lastly, you know, the Fifth Precinct
9 moved into the building about December 16th, I
10 believe, of 2015 and since that time what's most
11 noticeable about that is that, you know, the community
12 has embraced the Fifth Precinct. We're able to now
13 have community concept at the precinct, community
14 meetings, which the community is starting to really
15 take ownership of. We have developed new citizen
16 radio patrols, and something new at a precinct I have
17 developed at the behest of the Chief, a community
18 advisory board along with a police advisory board.

19 Within the Fifth Precinct we have five
20 Green Light locations. One is the McDonald's located
21 at 10400 Gratiot Avenue, the Riverside Party Store
22 located at 12706 East Jefferson, Perry's Liquor
23 located at 14200 East Jefferson and two gas stations
24 on the corner of Jefferson and Alter Road, the Mobil
25 and the Marathon gas stations.

1 With that, that concludes my report. I
2 would like to also add, as the deputy chief says, we
3 have enjoyed in the Fifth Precinct a slight reduction
4 in Part 1 crimes. We're down approximately five
5 percent in overall Part 1 crimes this particular year.
6 What's most notable about that is, as she alluded to,
7 the manpower last year was considerably more than we
8 have this year. And that just gives you an idea of
9 the great job the officers in the Fifth Precinct are
10 doing on a daily basis.

11 We are down about 28 percent in nonfatal
12 shootings. We're slightly up in homicides. However,
13 our homicides are more or less domestic related.
14 Unfortunately, that is the case. But the Chief has
15 mandated, along with the Mayor, that we're going to be
16 getting domestic violence counselors in the Fifth
17 Precinct to help us out with that.

18 That concludes my report. Any questions?

19 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioners, questions
20 or concerns of the commander?

21 COMMISSIONER VANN: Mr. Chair?

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir.

23 COMMISSIONER VANN: To the fine, Commander,
24 thank you for a great report. Just sort of wondering
25 about the population. I know that you spoke about it

1 a bit, but the population here in the precinct I mean
2 it's -- the blight is very obvious block by block by
3 block, and how is the population holding?

4 COMMANDER EWING: We have about 75,000
5 residents within the Fifth Precinct. We are currently
6 fighting that blight every day. We've issued a number
7 of tickets. We work closely with the community. As I
8 said, East English Village, Morningside, they have
9 myself on speed dial, the captain on speed dial and
10 quite certainly all my NPOs. So we're fighting that
11 every day to try to curve that.

12 COMMISSIONER VANN: Yeah. I have the
13 privilege of serving as Chair of Habitat For Humanity.
14 We've built 120 houses in Morningside right near here.
15 And there's still a lot of blight, a lot of dumping
16 and a lot of things going on, even in the area where
17 we're building homes there. So I'm not saying that
18 the police department has anything to do with people.
19 Although, there's an enforcement piece to that, but
20 I'm just thinking that this ought to be one of the
21 areas. Is this in the hardest hit fund area?

22 COMMANDER EWING: This is --

23 COMMISSIONER VANN: Do you know?

24 COMMANDER EWING: This is our most densely
25 populated area within the Fifth Precinct. Deandre

1 Gaines, Officer Deandre Gaines, this is his area out
2 here.

3 What we rely on with regard to dumping is
4 the citizens themselves. We cannot be all over the
5 precinct, but if someone calls, get a license plate
6 number. I tell people in the community now that I
7 have just recently, thanks to the deputy Chief and the
8 Chief, I recently received some new supervisors out of
9 this last promotional class. I have a supervisor out
10 on the street every day. And I tell the community now
11 if you have an issue just don't dial 911, call the
12 precinct. The lieutenant's on the desk, sergeants,
13 whoever's in charge has been mandated to answer those
14 complaints immediately. And there's always someone we
15 can reach out to to have them respond in an
16 expeditious manner.

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioners, any other
18 comments, questions?

19 Yes.

20 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes, through the
21 Chair. Did I hear correctly that the Fifth Precinct
22 is down what, five percent in total reduction in
23 crime?

24 COMMANDER EWING: Four to five percent
25 total, Part 1 crimes, Part 1 crimes. That's mostly

1 assaultive crimes.

2 COMMISSIONER BURTON: That's pretty good.
3 Thank you.

4 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioners, any other
5 comments or questions?

6 I just want to attest to the Fifth Precinct
7 in terms of being involved with the Ninth Precinct and
8 the Fifth Precinct. They at one time merged. So the
9 NPOs are really working extremely hard, because those
10 four or five organizations you named they are very,
11 very active from Jefferson-Chalmers all the way to
12 East English Village, to Cornerstone, Morningside.
13 They definitely engage the community, and they have
14 highly attended meetings. And either you or your
15 staff have been active in those areas.

16 And I live in East English Village and I
17 have witnessed the concerns of the community and how
18 we have responded to those concerns. I just want to
19 thank you for your leadership and the team and Captain
20 Bliss and others in terms of that type of engagement
21 and that type of support system involved.

22 COMMANDER EWING: Thank you, sir. As you
23 say, it's a team effort here at the Fifth Precinct.

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir. Yes, sir.

25 DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: Through the Chair.

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes.

2 DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: I just wanted to
3 acknowledge there were a couple more command officers
4 that came in. Captain Steve Walton, Commander Wilson
5 came in as well as D.C. Washington who just came in.
6 I'm sorry, Lieutenant Hahn (ph) is back there as well.

7 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.

8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir.

9 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I do have a question.
10 Commander, I have -- in District 5 I know
11 the Fifth Precinct makes up like District 5 and also
12 District 4, but my constituents over in Morgan
13 Estates, which is like Jefferson and St. Jean area,
14 will that be coming from the Fifth Precinct or will
15 calls be coming from -- being dispatched out of number
16 9?

17 COMMANDER EWING: No, that's the Fifth
18 Precinct.

19 COMMISSIONER BURTON: That's Fifth Precinct
20 as well?

21 COMMANDER EWING: Yes, it is.

22 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Great. I will
23 definitely share that with them. Thank you so much.

24 VICE CHAIRPERSON MOORE: Through the Chair.

25 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir.

1 VICE CHAIRPERSON MOORE: Commander, is
2 there a number that citizens can contact your NPOs or
3 you if they have any questions, comments or concerns
4 as it relates to the Fifth Precinct?

5 COMMANDER EWING: If anyone has questions
6 for the NPOs -- what is the number directly to the
7 NPO?

8 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: 313 ...

9 UNIDENTIFIED OFFICER: 596-5511.

10 VICE CHAIRPERSON MOORE: 596-5511?

11 COMMANDER EWING: 5511.

12 VICE CHAIRPERSON MOORE: Thank you, sir.

13 COMMANDER EWING: And to my office is
14 596-5510.

15 VICE CHAIRPERSON MOORE: Thank you, sir.

16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commander, could you
17 elaborate a little bit further in reference to what
18 took place on August 2nd at Chandler Park Water Park?
19 I know we had in attendance over 800 last year, and
20 there was some concern about some of the kids. You
21 increased the numbers this year. What is that number
22 again?

23 COMMANDER EWING: Approximately 1,100
24 children.

25 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Kids --

1 COMMANDER EWING: That's correct.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: And my understanding --
3 in some instance this was the first time, even though
4 this is their backyard, for young people to visit the
5 water park, and I just want to commend that type of
6 unique effort, especially it's been a hot summer.

7 COMMANDER EWING: Yes, sir.

8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I know it really makes a
9 difference in terms of kids having an opportunity to
10 participate. So that's the type of involvement they
11 have with our young people in this particular
12 precinct.

13 COMMANDER EWING: And we plan to do a lot
14 more.

15 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

16 Any other comments?

17 Thank you, sir, and thank you, NPOs, and
18 Captain Bliss.

19 COMMANDER EWING: Thank you.

20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I'd like to recognize
21 from the Wayne County Commissioner's office would be
22 representing the commissioner, Tim Killeen (ph), also
23 the Beverly Kindle-Walker who is really a mainstay in
24 this particular -- in the Ninth and the Fifth
25 Precinct. She's been involved in so many activities.

1 Thank you for your attendance. And also from the CB
2 parole and former officer of the Ninth and Fifth, and
3 that's Beverly Brown. Thank you for your involvement.

4 If there's any others that I might have
5 overlooked and I don't see you. So I want to -- any
6 other officials or elected representing elective
7 officials that need to be acknowledged at this time?

8 VICE CHAIRPERSON MOORE: Mr. Chair, I just
9 want to thank the residents of District 7 for
10 traveling across the city. You know who you are.
11 Thank you very much.

12 AUDIENCE MEMBER: We here.

13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: And thank you. You
14 didn't get lost.

15 I need to acknowledge -- i don't know. I
16 think we might have Media Service for the recording
17 tonight.

18 MR. HICKS: We acknowledged.

19 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. Thank you.

20 The next item of business would be Homeland
21 Security is going to be postponed to next week. We do
22 not have the equipment. And I apologize, but it's on
23 the agenda. But that will be rescheduled for next
24 week at three o'clock in the Public Safety Building.
25 So if you want to attend a very, very important forum

1 that would be next week at three o'clock at our
2 regular afternoon meeting.

3 Standing committee reports. Any standing
4 committee reports?

5 If not, we're going to hear from our
6 secretary to the board, Mr. Gregory Hicks.

7 MR. HICKS: Thank you, Mr. Chair. I just
8 wanted to indicate two things. One, the budget
9 committee is scheduled to meet Monday at ten o'clock.
10 And the policy committee is scheduled to meet on the
11 18th at one o'clock.

12 And I have nothing further.

13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, sir.

14 Any other --

15 Now, in new business we're going to have
16 Mr. Donald Foster, Sr., would you come forward, and
17 Vice Chair Ricardo Moore is going to read a resolution
18 to recognize you for your involvement.

19 VICE CHAIRPERSON MOORE: Thank you,
20 Mr. Chair.

21 "Resolution honoring Mr. Donald Foster, Sr.
22 Whereas Mr. Donald Foster, Sr. has been an active
23 volunteer in the Fifth Precinct for the last 22 years.
24 He has been married over 18 years to his wife, Duray
25 (ph), and is the proud parent of five children and two

1 grandchildren.

2 "And whereas Mr. Foster attended Wayne
3 State University, labor law studies and Henry Ford
4 Community College, applied science culinary arts.
5 Mr. Foster has a military background and served in the
6 U.S. Navy from January 3, 1988 through June 16, 1992.
7 He is currently the UAW Local 7 president of the
8 Jefferson North Assembly Plant, Fiat Chrysler
9 Automotive LLC and has been with this organization for
10 22 years.

11 "And whereas Mr. Foster has previous
12 experience serving as a member of organizations,
13 including APRI, NAACP, BMIU, LUCA, Feed the Homeless,
14 Gleaners, UAW, Make a Wish Foundation, UAW Local 7 and
15 FCA Jefferson North, Put a Smile on a Child's Face,
16 United Way and the Fifth Precinct National Night Out.
17 He has received various awards and recognition from
18 the NAACP as well as the Coalition of Black Trades
19 Union, CBTU.

20 "And whereas Mr. Foster has an excellent
21 rapport with the Fifth Precinct neighborhood police
22 officers. He has always been interested in
23 police-community relations, and has contributed in
24 efforts to improve neighborhood safety and quality of
25 life. He is an enthusiastic contributor to National

1 Night Out, active in community clean-up, flower
2 planting, Angels Night and many other community events
3 where citizens are called upon to serve the community.

4 "And whereas Mr. Foster enjoys such hobbies
5 as golfing, cooking and basketball. He loves to
6 volunteer and help wherever he is needed. He is what
7 every community leader hopes for and more.

8 "And now, therefore, be it resolved that
9 the Detroit Board of Police Commissioners, speaking
10 for the citizens of the city of Detroit and the
11 Detroit Police Department, acknowledge the generous
12 spirit of Mr. Donald Foster. His unselfishness and
13 dedication to improving the quality of life for all
14 citizens in his community and throughout the city of
15 Detroit merit our highest regards. We thank and
16 congratulate you, Mr. Foster. Detroit Board of Police
17 Commissioners."

18 (APPLAUSE.)

19 VICE CHAIRPERSON MOORE: Mr. Chair, I'd
20 like to move for adoption of this resolution.

21 COMMISSIONER: Supported.

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: It's been properly moved
23 and adopted.

24 Discussion?

25 Those in favor, aye?

1 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Those opposed?

3 Motion carried.

4 I think there's more coming from Deputy
5 Chief Hall also.

6 DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: I'm going to read mine
7 on that side.

8 Mr. Foster, on behalf of the Chief of
9 Police and the City of Detroit Detroit Police
10 Department, we want to acknowledge you, thank you for
11 all of your work that you do. It's citizens like you
12 that make being the police a wonderful, wonderful job.

13 We have a Recognition Award as well as a
14 Spirit of Detroit Award, and I'm going to read the
15 Recognition Award first.

16 "The Detroit Police Department Certificate
17 of Recognition to Mr. Donald A. Foster, Sr., resident
18 of the city of Detroit, in appreciation for the
19 following outstanding service and cooperation, for
20 your involvement in the community and services to the
21 city of Detroit demonstrate a spirit and a commitment
22 that is worthy of recognition."

23 Signed on this day, August 11, 2016 by
24 James E. Craig. This is one.

25 (APPLAUSE.)

1 DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: Hold that a second and
2 I'll read your Spirit of Detroit Award.

3 "In presenting herewith as an expression of
4 gratitude and esteem of the citizens of the city of
5 Detroit to Mr. Donald A. Foster, Sr. in recognition of
6 exceptional achievement, outstanding leadership and
7 dedication, improving the quality of life."

8 By the City Council of the City of Detroit
9 and the State of Michigan, and it's signed by all City
10 Council members.

11 (APPLAUSE.)

12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Mr. Foster, you have the
13 opportunity, you have the mike.

14 MR. FOSTER: I'm not much for words. I
15 want to say thank you. I accept this award on behalf
16 of not just myself, but my members of UAW Local 7. We
17 have over 4,500 members. And it's not just me that do
18 the contributions and everything when it comes to the
19 community service. I do have to push a little bit,
20 but for the most part it's not much push, right.

21 So I want to thank you on behalf of UAW
22 Local 7 membership.

23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: And thank you, sir.
24 Appreciate it.

25 Yes, sir.

1 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: I'd like to thank
2 him personally on the board for all the work that he
3 have done, because I know it's a hard job being -- as
4 a union, because I'm in a union, too, as a union
5 representative. So you did an incredible job to get
6 people together and to do the work that you do and
7 still go to work, you know. So I commend you for
8 that.

9 MR. FOSTER: Thank you.

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you for that union
11 plug.

12 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: Union buddy. We
13 stick together. Build America.

14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: We appreciate it. We
15 appreciate it. We really do.

16 Any old business?

17 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, sir.

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir.

19 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Through the Chair.
20 Or it's old business, but it's also new.

21 As you may well know or you may not know,
22 the Justice Department yesterday found that the City
23 of Baltimore police practices are racially bias. It's
24 a pretty damming report. I mention that because there
25 are those who sometimes wanting to say Detroit is

1 similar in population and Baltimore was the same, and
2 sometimes they would also reference Baltimore Police
3 Department in terms of Detroit. Detroit is far
4 different than Baltimore.

5 As stated in this report, there was over
6 300,000 pedestrian stops roughly in a five-year
7 period. Also, too, one black men in his mid 50s was
8 stopped 30 times in the last four years.

9 Also, too, something that came up,
10 something that's new from the Justice Department,
11 which in January of 2015 I asked -- or mentioned this
12 at the table at a community meeting at the commission
13 table. This reference is the Justice Department wants
14 to track all arrest-related thefts by the police
15 department. And also, too, I wanted to further expand
16 that to assaults on police officers that we track --
17 start tracking all of the assaults that are made on
18 police officers by citizens and also, too, all of the
19 arrests that are related to deaths.

20 The Justice Department is calling on all
21 the 19,450 law enforcement agencies in America to
22 bring forth this data. And also that includes some
23 685 medical examiners, too. So those are two issues.

24 And last week there was a poll. It was
25 some polling of the commissioners as to whether or not

1 it supported the use -- or supported the Detroit
2 Police Department getting Tasers. I would like to
3 note there is a policy, or a drafted policy, with the
4 police department are working on drafting a policy for
5 the use of Tasers. I haven't seen any information to
6 that effect, and I don't know if any other
7 commissioners have such a policy. I know I haven't
8 received it.

9 DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: Through the Chair.

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, ma'am.

11 DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: We do not currently
12 have a policy on Tasers, because we don't have Tasers.
13 There are industry standards across the country that
14 once we are approved for the use of Tasers that we
15 will have a policy in place. We will definitely draft
16 one prior to that and that you can look at that will
17 cover all bases, and it will definitely be based on
18 industry standards from other agencies across the
19 country.

20 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Okay. Thank you,
21 Assistant Chief. That further states that my vote
22 last week was not a vote of ignorance, or not one
23 might say a decision based on ignorance, because I had
24 no knowledge and I didn't think anyone else had here
25 at the table, too.

1 Also, too, could I get a copy of the body
2 cam policy, especially in light of what occurred in
3 Chicago over the weekend where officers unfortunately
4 were involved in the use of deadly force?

5 And it's obvious that periodically that the
6 body cams were cut off, and I do know Detroit on what
7 was in the drafted policy, which I have from last year
8 or two years ago that officers could manually turn
9 them on and off.

10 DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: The policy is not
11 finalized. We are still in our testing phases in the
12 Fourth Precinct and the Seventh Precinct. The drafted
13 policy that you have is currently being updated as we
14 continue to pilot through the process. And as soon as
15 that is available we can get that to you. But the
16 drafted policy that you have is what we have, and
17 we're working on every day as we continue to pilot
18 through the pilot process for the body cams.

19 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, ma'am. Okay.
20 Thank you.

21 And can we have someone come before us in
22 the next few weeks just to give us an update on the
23 body cam?

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Crawford,
25 we are in process of drafting a letter to the Chief of

1 Police in reference to that particular issue. So I
2 would inform you and I will share that communication
3 with you. We're just in process of approving that
4 process from the Chair and the secretary.

5 So we're working on that. We have a formal
6 letter going to the Chief on the body camera issue.

7 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Okay, sir. What I
8 was asking for is just an update as to --

9 Is that what the letter is pertaining to?

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes. We have a process.
11 We drafted the letter, a formal letter to the Chief of
12 Police in reference to that particular item. I will
13 share that communication with you.

14 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, sir. All
15 right. Thank you.

16 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir.

18 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You know, in relation
19 to the body cameras about the policy, you know, my
20 understanding is, you know, the Police Board of
21 Commissioners is responsible for the rules, the
22 regulations and the policies for the department. And
23 I think we should be included when it comes to
24 revising or approving or looking into the policy for
25 body cameras as well as for Tasers when they're -- you

1 know, when the department gets those. I mean, several
2 of us has been advocating for Tasers from day for this
3 department, including myself. So I'd like for we to
4 have a seat at the table when we're talking about the
5 policy issues as well.

6 VICE CHAIRPERSON MOORE: Through the Chair.

7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir.

8 VICE CHAIRPERSON MOORE: Yeah. I just want
9 to make a reference. A lot of times we call the item
10 a Taser. Actually what it's called is an electric
11 rifle. Taser is an acronym that stands for Thomas A.
12 Swift Electric Rifle. So the proper name of it is an
13 electric rifle, not that that takes away anything from
14 it. I hear that they can be effective, but it's an
15 electric rifle.

16 And just to ask Commissioner Crawford, I
17 know you've done some research on this issue, if a
18 Taser is used does that company back that product or
19 do they kind of leave it on the department once it's
20 used?

21 And, if you can't answer that, that's fine.
22 I can research it.

23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Well, once again,
24 Commissioner, we addressed that issue two weeks ago.
25 It's now in the hands of the policy committee. We are

1 working on that. I think that's one of the meetings
2 that you missed. But we are in the process of
3 addressing both issues, from a legal issue, from a
4 policy issue. So we are working on those. And that's
5 why we indicated that the committee will be meeting
6 this coming Monday --

7 MR. HICKS: Thursday. Policy is Thursday.

8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thursday.

9 VICE CHAIRPERSON MOORE: And through the
10 Chair. Yeah. That question was for Commissioner
11 Crawford to see if he knew. It had nothing to do with
12 policy committee. I'm on the policy committee.

13 So do you have that answer? If not, we
14 can move forward as far as --

15 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Through the Chair.

16 I am the Chair for the policy committee,
17 yes. Commissioner Burton just stated something in
18 terms of policy. The department writes policy. We
19 review policy. We make recommendations to policy. We
20 can call for changes in policy. So let me kind of set
21 the record straight on that.

22 Also, too, Commissioner Moore, in reference
23 to the question, yes, the company, Taser
24 International, no, they don't back their product.
25 That is a fact.

1 VICE CHAIRPERSON MOORE: They do not.

2 Okay. Thank you, sir.

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: The next item,
4 announcements. Thursday, which is next week, August
5 18, will be the 3 p.m. meeting at the Public Safety
6 Headquarters. And we already mentioned the highlights
7 of the meeting would be dealing with Homeland Security
8 that we moved to next week. So that will be at three
9 o'clock in the afternoon.

10 The next community meeting will be
11 September the 8th in the Third Precinct. The location
12 is forthcoming.

13 Now it's time for oral communication from
14 the audience. You have two minutes to speak. Just
15 please identify yourself and be respectful. And keep
16 in mind you're speaking to the Board of Police
17 Commission.

18 Ms. Brown.

19 MS. BROWN: Hi. How is everybody? I just
20 wanted to thank -- my name is Beverly Brown. I live
21 in Morningside with the MEC patrol. And I'd just like
22 to thank you guys for coming through our area. I know
23 you come every year, but we appreciate it. And thank
24 the police officers.

25 What I came up here for is I have an

1 announcement. Gary Peters is giving out -- Senator
2 Gary Peters. If you know any Vietnam veterans that
3 served in Vietnam, they have label pins that he wants
4 to present to them, to the Michigan Vietnam veterans.
5 So if you know somebody that actively served in
6 Vietnam they can get a pin. They can call his office
7 or I can give you that information, the E-mail.

8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I'll see you after the
9 meeting. I'm a candidate. Thank you.

10 MS. BROWN: Okay. All right. Thank you.

11 MS. BROUGHTON: Happy Thursday to everyone.
12 My name is Theo Broughton, co-founder of Hood
13 Research. And two things I want to say. One, I was
14 at the meeting in June when you had the election, and
15 it seemed that the appointees were upset that they
16 didn't have an opportunity to when to chair the
17 meeting.

18 My opinion is that if you're going to chair
19 the meeting of being an official capacity, you need to
20 run for election, because appointees are put in by the
21 Mayor. And while people may be satisfied with the
22 current Mayor, life is not promised. He could drop
23 dead tomorrow and we end up with somebody like
24 Governor Snyder as Mayor of the city of Detroit. So I
25 think that we should not have appointees, because if

1 appointees are in charge that puts a block between the
2 community and the police commissioners and the
3 administration of the city of Detroit.

4 As it relates to the body cameras, my
5 concern is once they are installed -- we were told
6 they would be installed by last December. That has
7 not happened. Now you've moved from zip code 05 to 04
8 and 07.

9 If an officer -- well, first of all, the
10 equipment should be inspected before it leaves the
11 precinct for that particular tour of duty. It should
12 be working properly, be it on the car or be it on the
13 body of the officer, checked when they come back. If
14 for some reason the equipment does not work, the
15 officer should get a stiff fine. The second time if
16 it does not work, they should be suspended for a week.
17 Third time if it does not work, then they are not
18 working in the police department for the benefit of
19 the community.

20 And we do hear some strange things like
21 folks being shot in the back and all of that. So I
22 think the policy needs to be very strict for those who
23 are going to wear the body cameras and those who have
24 the cameras on the vehicle, because we hear too often
25 that, oh, it just didn't work, oh, I forgot to turn it

1 on. That is unacceptable behavior.

2 And I would like to submit that, hopefully
3 it's in your minutes, to the policy Chair and the
4 committee.

5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, ma'am.

6 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Through the Chair.

7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir.

8 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes. Ms.

9 Broughton, the policy committee chair heard and I
10 understand. I'll tell you what did work recently in
11 New Orleans. The New Orleans Police Department three
12 officers were fired. They had their body cams on, an
13 individual was assaulted, they lied about it. And it
14 was discovered through a audit or review by a
15 supervisor, not that there was a complaint filed or
16 anything like that, but just the supervisor following
17 policy periodically audits and reviews the video
18 footage and saw the assault. And those officers were
19 brought up on charges and fired.

20 So it does work. But most importantly, you
21 know, body cams are not videotape or not -- there
22 needs to be accountability that goes beyond, which is
23 what happened in New Orleans, so ...

24 MS. BROUGHTON: Thank you.

25 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Ms. Beverly

1 Kindle-Walker.

2 MR. KINDLE-WALKER: Good evening. My name
3 is Beverly Kindle-Walker, and I would like us to take
4 a pause to remember a valiant community activist in
5 our community, Mr. Joy Haas, who passed away last
6 Monday. And those of us who know Mr. Haas or knew him
7 he was a no nonsense kind of guy. So I was asked by
8 Beverly Brown to put some thoughts together about him.
9 And so I'm going to read them, but I might get too
10 emotional but I did write it down. I have to take off
11 my glasses, because I'm at that age, you know.

12 "In memory of Mr. Joe Haas. Mr. Joseph F.
13 Haas was born on October 4, 1931 and passed away on
14 August the 1st, 2016. Mr. Haas was married to Betty
15 Haas for 57 years and had four children and seven
16 grandchildren.

17 "He served his country in the military. He
18 was faithful to his church, St. Raymond, Our Lady of
19 Counsel Catholic Church. He was also an active member
20 of the Detroit Police Department, Ninth Precinct and
21 the Eastern District Police and Community Relations
22 Board where he was a treasurer for a number of years.
23 He could be counted on to raise funds for the
24 fifty-fifty raffles. Joe Haas was not one to waste
25 time on matters that wasn't germane to the subject at

1 hand. He was a straight shooter.

2 "In addition, Mr. Haas was a pilot who
3 loved aviation and was passionate about young people
4 who had a interest in aviation. He would volunteer
5 his plane and his airplane to participate with the
6 Tuskegee Airmen International Museum and the Young
7 Eagles program to fly youngsters at the Coleman A.
8 Young International Airport, a/k/a Detroit City
9 Airport, every second Sunday from April to October
10 until his health prevented him.

11 "He got a lot of joy in taking someone up
12 for their first plane ride. On one occasion I was
13 able to go up with him and was seated in the co-pilot
14 seat. After some coaching and direction, he was
15 comfortable enough to let me fly solo for a moment.
16 Lots of praying and calling on the Lord was made by
17 the backseat passengers, Patrice Lambert and Katrina
18 Lovely (ph). It was an awesome experience, and Joe
19 was delighted. Over the years we would laugh about
20 that day. This community is going to miss Mr. Joe
21 Haas.

22 "Submitted by Beverly Kindle-Walker."

23 Thank you.

24 VICE CHAIRPERSON MOORE: Through the Chair,
25 how do you spell Mr. Haas' last name?

1 MS. KINDLE-WALKER: H-A-A-S.

2 VICE CHAIRPERSON MOORE: Thank you.

3 MS. KINDLE-WALKER: And I have --

4 CHAIRPERSON BELL: It's been requested that
5 we pause for a moment of silence for Mr. Joe Haas.

6 (A moment of silence was observed.)

7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Ms. Walker,
8 he served as treasurer, is that correct, for many,
9 many years?

10 MS. KINDLE-WALKER: Yes.

11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, I know the young
12 man. Thank you for bringing this to our attention.
13 Appreciate it.

14 Okay. Mother Bernice.

15 MS. SMITH: Good evening. My name is
16 Bernice Smith, political activist, to our Chief and to
17 the Commissioner.

18 Last night I got some upsetting news
19 watching CNN. I don't know if most of you watch Don
20 Lemon. He made admission and gave statistics in
21 regards to the Baltimore incident.

22 I know our representative Crawford stated a
23 lot of statistics, but I just want to let you know
24 we're very fortunate to be here in the city of Detroit
25 when we read and hear about so many tragedies that

1 befalls the black male and other males. I think we
2 should just give a good prayer to say thank you, good
3 Lord, that we live in the city of Detroit. I'm proud
4 of my department of police. And until they do the
5 opposite of what we hear every night or every day
6 about killing, I give them all the praises.

7 Now, one of the statistics was he stated
8 over 80 percent of blacks compared to whites were
9 killed or have been stopped. And I think that's a
10 heck of a good record for us, because I don't think we
11 have nearly, nearly as many of that caliber. And then
12 they say they use their Tasers as we have said, but I
13 have doubts about these Tasers.

14 Now, my thoughts are this. I'd rather have
15 those weapons than have a gun where you may be able to
16 stop the felon instead of shooting him like the young
17 man was shot in the back in Chicago. That is my
18 hometown, and believe me I am very, very upset with
19 the fact of what's going on there and they can't get
20 it under control. But then again, we have to say
21 thank you goodness that it's not us.

22 And I do praise, again I state, my police
23 department. And I'm proud of my women. They do a
24 good job. Like I gave kudos to two last week, but now
25 I'm afraid I have to come and tell you about a

1 incident that happened at the Ninth Precinct.

2 Chief of staff for one of the council
3 people his car was stolen in front of his house. He's
4 down there by Elmwood Cemetery, in that area. It was
5 around three o'clock in the morning he surmised. In
6 the meantime, when he woke up around 9:00, he saw his
7 car was missing.

8 He went to the Ninth Precinct to make a
9 report. There were two women on the desk there around
10 about nine o'clock, and they didn't treat him too
11 wisely, with his ID being in the car and he didn't
12 have it on him to tell them all the particulars that
13 they want to find out about him. They were not in
14 accord to the way I thought our police should treat
15 one of the citizens. So he left.

16 In the meantime, I do hope this won't
17 happen again and we won't get another complaint about
18 how we treat our citizens when we come in and make a
19 complaint. He didn't have his ID, because his
20 paperwork and everything was in the car.

21 But he did call me today to tell me they
22 found the car license on another car. So we don't
23 know where the car is as of yet, but still I say the
24 police is doing a good job because they did notice the
25 license plate.

1 And I thank you very much for your time.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

3 DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: Through the Chair.

4 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, ma'am.

5 DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: Mother Bernice, if you
6 could see the commander of number 9.

7 MS. SMITH: Okay.

8 DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: It is unacceptable for
9 us to treat anyone other than with the utmost respect.
10 And the accolades that you gave the women on this
11 police department, the men on this police department
12 deserve as well. And we do a great job and we want to
13 make sure that those who are not doing a great job are
14 noted and were taken care of.

15 So if you would see the commander and get
16 those names and tell him who they were, what time they
17 were working, and we will be able to investigate and
18 find out who that was that did not treat --

19 MS. SMITH: He was supposed to be here
20 tonight, but I see he's not present so --

21 DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: That's fine. We'll
22 find out.

23 MS. SMITH: -- I just took it by myself to
24 report it.

25 DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: Thank you.

1 MS. SMITH: All right. Thank you.

2 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Through the Chair.

3 Ms. Bernice?

4 MS. SMITH: Yes, sir.

5 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Would you pass that
6 information over to our chief investigator here, the
7 contact information for that individual, so we can
8 talk to them.

9 MS. SMITH: For the what?

10 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: The contact
11 information for that individual who wasn't treated
12 properly at the precinct.

13 MS. SMITH: All right.

14 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Can you pass that on
15 to our Chief Investigator, Ms. Pamela Drake.

16 MS. SMITH: Okay. All right. Thank you.

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Commissioner
18 Shelby.

19 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Through the Chair.

20 Also to Ms. Smith, the Department of
21 Justice report that you referenced it can be found
22 online. It's 164 pages. So you can go to the
23 Department of Justice website and you can download it,
24 or anyone can and they can read it.

25 MS. LESTER: Hello. My name is Minnie

1 Lester. I'm the president of Southeast Waterfront
2 Neighborhood Association. And what I come for, I just
3 want to thank you for us having the NPOs that we have.
4 Officer Gaines has been very, very wonderful. All of
5 our NPOs over here is very good. So this is what I'm
6 coming for. I want to thank you for letting us have
7 these NPOs that we have.

8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

9 DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: Thank you so much.

10 (APPLAUSE.)

11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Any other --

12 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHÉ: Mr. Chair, can I
13 make a comment?

14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes. Go ahead.

15 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you. At
16 every one of our community meetings it's very -- I'm
17 very pleased to hear positive comments about our NPOs.
18 It never fails. We go -- you know, we'll have
19 meetings all over the city, and some two or three
20 people will get up and say if it weren't for the NPOs,
21 you know, they're really out there in our
22 neighborhood, they're doing a great job. I mean, all
23 the officers are doing a great job, but I really think
24 that that's a best practice that we have in our
25 department and is one of the reasons why we are not in

1 the news the way other cities are.

2 So I want to thank the NPOs. I want to
3 thank all the officers, you know. We should be doing
4 this at every meeting, thanking our officers for the
5 jobs that they're doing, because you're doing a
6 tremendous job. And we do hear about what's happening
7 in other departments. And we have a conference that's
8 coming up in September where we will get together with
9 all of the other oversight boards and commissions and
10 we will talk about these issues. And we're going to
11 be very proud to say we don't have those problems
12 because we have some fantastic officers.

13 So thank you very much.

14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Commissioner
15 Dewaelsche.

16 Yes, sir:

17 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Praise the Lord.
18 Jesus loves you.

19 On behalf of Jordan Missionary Baptist
20 Church, I want to thank you guys for not only your
21 services and what you do, but thank you for coming
22 here. And I apologize for the AC.

23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: No problem. We
24 appreciate the hospitality, and notwithstanding we're
25 doing okay.

1 Any other audience participation at this
2 time?

3 I do want to recognize the commander and
4 captain of the Eleventh -- I'm sorry. I see the
5 Seventh Precinct. Would you stand up and introduce
6 yourself again for the Seventh Precinct.

7 DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: Captain Holt.

8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Captain Holt. And is
9 that the commander?

10 DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: No, the commander is
11 not here.

12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Oh, okay.

13 Captain Holt, introduce yourself.

14 CAPTAIN HOLT: Captain Holt, Seventh
15 Precinct.

16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. Thank you. Any
17 time you're engaging in a precinct you know that's
18 24/7. That's really a blessing. And Captain Holt is
19 involved in that our entire three years on this board
20 and I just want to recognize your effort.

21 Anyone from the Eleventh Precinct?

22 Okay. There you go. And you are ...

23 COMMANDER LEACH: Commander Timothy Leach.

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commander Leach. He was
25 also formerly captain there, doing a outstanding job

1 in northeast --

2 MR. HICKS: Commander at number 9 is here.

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Number 9. Well, we know
4 commander of number 9 we heard from.

5 Oh. He's engaging. Commander?

6 He's no stranger to the east side also.

7 So any other east side precincts? Any west
8 side precincts?

9 I see Commander --

10 VICE CHAIRPERSON MOORE: I want to
11 acknowledge Commander Tosqui in the back from the far,
12 far west side, Sixth Precinct.

13 COMMANDER TOSQUI: Okay. Appreciate it.

14 DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: Far west.

15 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Okay. Commander
16 Pritchett.

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. And all the
18 support staff, you are very important. And that's why
19 when we think about what's happening in this country
20 we have a great department working together with the
21 community and that's why we're here.

22 I just want to just clarify one thing. The
23 charter indicates their reference to policy it's the
24 Board of Police Commissioners consulting with the
25 Chief and the Mayor. That's how policy is shaped up

1 with those three heads. The Board of Police
2 Commission and the Chief of Police naturally and the
3 Mayor. That's how policy is shaped in terms of how we
4 move the police department. That's been the case
5 since 1974 with the City Charter in 1973. So we
6 should be clear, I think it's on the back of our
7 agenda. And, if not, if you go to the City Charter it
8 is clear.

9 And another issue that came up in the board
10 and we're not responding to, but I just want to set
11 the record straight, that this is a 11-person body,
12 appointees and elected, but we come together to
13 represent the people and we deal with accountability.
14 There is no division. Election or election, that's
15 what it is, but once we move from that then we move
16 on. But the bottom line is there's no division,
17 there's no in fight or whatever. We are one body. We
18 are one body. I want that clarity for you to
19 understand there's no revision in reference to
20 appointed or elected can be chair of this body.

21 We have election every year. And that
22 election now will take place in June, and that person
23 can only serve one year as of July the 1st. That is
24 charter mandate, okay, but that's in the charter. So
25 you can read that it's in black and white. We don't

1 make up rules as we go along, okay.

2 In my closing remarks about the body
3 camera, this is the third pilot program, but there was
4 some issue. The Chief had spoken to it, the Mayor had
5 spoken to it. So those issues are being worked out
6 now, and there's no policy. It's a pilot program.
7 The Chief has spoken to that issue, the Deputy Chief
8 has spoken to that issue -- I mean Assistant Chief has
9 spoken and this body here.

10 And also the community should be aware
11 there is no Taser policy as of yet. We as a board
12 addressed that issue. We get a did a little survey of
13 the commission. We want to go forward in terms of
14 study. There will be community involvement probably
15 in the month of September to have a community forum
16 give you an opportunity to weigh on it so you can
17 start that discussion on how you want to shape a
18 question, answer once we announce a date and time.
19 We'll probably have a panel of experts to come forth
20 to address those issues, but you the people have the
21 opportunity to participate.

22 Okay. So we are clear in terms of what we
23 are trying to do as a board. We're elected or we're
24 appointed, we want to move in terms of accountability
25 of the Detroit Police Department.

1 I think by person here we are satisfied in
2 terms of the direction we are moving in -- under for
3 the last three years sitting on this board under Chief
4 Craig and his team and the police officer rank and
5 file. But the bottom line, we hear your concerns.

6 We handle all non-criminal complaints, our
7 chief investigator and staff. So you can go online,
8 you can call, you can do it through DPD process. It's
9 a open process. But we also want to hear the good
10 news, what's good happening in this department, not --
11 but you have a formal process. That's rather unique.

12 And you can come to our meeting. We do not
13 restrict you. As long as you're respectful, you get
14 two to three minutes to speak your concern. We might
15 not always respond, but it is your mike. It is your
16 opportunity, okay.

17 So that is the uniqueness of the Board of
18 Police Commission in the city of Detroit. When you
19 look at it nationally, we are doing a great job.
20 We've got a long way to go, but there's nothing
21 perfect.

22 We have two sitting commissioners who have
23 served on this board before, Commissioner Vann and
24 Commissioner Dewaelsche. They know the inner workings
25 of it in terms of past experience.

1 So we have law enforcement personnel, but
2 we have people from all walks of life. That's the
3 composition of this board. So as we go forward if we
4 can tweak it or any concerns you might have you can
5 address us any time through our board secretary or
6 talk to a commissioner or our staff.

7 So are we clear on that?

8 And I just want to thank the Bishop and the
9 church. If you would have came out here a month, say
10 six weeks ago, from Jefferson all the way to this
11 block it was knee-high grass. This church was
12 involved along with others in terms of mowing the
13 grass. They discovered there was sidewalks under that
14 grass. I said why would you think that. There was
15 houses here at one time. This was a viable block.

16 And I just want to close on that note.
17 Let's lift up DPD, lift up the city of Detroit as
18 often as we possibly -- we don't tell our story. We
19 don't applaud ourselves. There's some great things
20 happening. We have Jefferson and Dickerson -- is that
21 Golightly Tech School, Tuskegee Airmen -- doing some
22 great things there. We have Southeastern High School
23 in this area, and there's some middle schools and
24 elementary schools. There are some great things
25 happening throughout the city. They don't always get

1 the media attention on 7, 4, 2. But we know that's
2 why we're here. We have a great department and we
3 have great people here. Sure, we have some issues.
4 We are trying to deal with those issues and we are
5 dealing with those issues.

6 Thank you.

7 VICE CHAIRPERSON MOORE: Through the Chair,
8 just a quick acknowledgement of Lieutenant Jeff Hahn.
9 I forgot you earlier. Sorry, sir.

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. Any other
11 acknowledgements?

12 Yes, ma'am. Commissioner Brooks.

13 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: I would just like you
14 all to know that we have a recruitment committee, and
15 I will be checking you all out. I will be coming to
16 the NPO meetings. I will be talking I think to
17 Beverly Brown and some other names I wrote down. I'm
18 looking forward to meeting with you.

19 We have a lot of young people who reached
20 the point where they could be policemen or
21 policewomen, but because of everything that's going on
22 now they're backing down. We really need policemen
23 and women.

24 And we're working hard as police
25 commissioners. We have a committee and we're doing

1 our best. So I will be out in all the communities
2 that we go into. I will come back again and talk with
3 you all about setting up recruiting fairs, whatever
4 else we have to set up in order to recruit.

5 Thank you.

6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioners, any other
7 comments? If not, we stand adjourned with a motion.

8 VICE CHAIRPERSON MOORE: So moved.

9 COMMISSIONERS: Supported.

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: It's been properly moved
11 and supported.

12 Those in favor, aye?

13 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Those opposed?

15 Motion carried.

16 And thank you. Thank you for your
17 attendance and your involvement.
