5 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Welcome to the  
6 Board of Police Commission. My name is Lisa  
7 Carter and I represent District 6. At this time  
8 I'm going to ask that Deacon Adams will come and  
9 do the invocation for us, please, sir. Thank  
10 you.

11 (Whereupon Deacon Adams offered the  
12 Invocation.)

13 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, Deacon  
14 Adams. At this time I'm going to ask that each  
15 commissioner introduce themselves beginning with  
16 Commissioner Shelby.

17 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Richard Shelby,  
18 District 1.

19 COMMISSIONER MALLETT: Commissioner  
20 Conrad Mallett.

21 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Commissioner  
22 Reggie Crawford, District 3.

23 COMMISSIONER BELL: Commissioner Willie  
24 Bell, Vice Chair, District 4.

25 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Good evening.

1 Commissioner Ricardo Moore, District 7.

2 COMMISSIONER Dewaelsche: Good  
3 evening. Commissioner Eva Garza Dewaelsche.

4 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: Commissioner  
5 Derrick Sanders, appointed.

6 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner  
7 Elizabeth Brooks has asked to be excused.  
8 Commissioner Bishop Edgar Vann has asked to be  
9 excused and Commissioner Willie E. Burton has  
10 asked to be excused. At this time I would like  
11 to introduce Assistant Chief Dolunt who is  
12 standing in for the Chief.

13 ASSISTANT CHIEF DOLUNT: Good evening,  
14 ma'am.

15 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Would you  
16 introduce, please, any of your staff that you  
17 have with you, sir.

18 ASSISTANT CHIEF DOLUNT: Okay. Deputy  
19 Chief Hall, Deputy Chief LeValle (ph). A lot of  
20 the officers are getting awards today so I will  
21 introduce them a little later. Captain Baliski  
22 (ph) is here. Captain Petty (ph). I know  
23 Commander Pettus (ph) is here. Captain Leach  
24 (ph) is here. Captain Slappy (ph) is here and  
25 both Waltons are here and I think I see Chambers

1 here. We have a lot of people here. Again, when  
2 we give the officers their awards I'll introduce  
3 them then. Is that fair?

4 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: That's fair.

5 ASSISTANT CHIEF DOLUNT: Thank you,  
6 ma'am.

7 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. At this  
8 time I'd like to introduce the rest of the Board  
9 of Police Commissioner's staff. Chief  
10 Investigator Drake. And I'm going to ask, Chief  
11 Investigator, that you come up and take the seat  
12 up here until Attorney Bernard gets here, please.  
13 Thank you. And then we have Senior Investigator  
14 Supervisor Lawrence Akbar (ph). Robert Brown,  
15 Administrative Assistant is somewhere here. Okay  
16 right here. And Sergeant Allen Quinn (ph) is  
17 recording today. And then we have the court  
18 reporter, Shay Coleman, here today.

19 At this time I'd like to acknowledge any  
20 elected officials that are here or  
21 representatives. So I know that we have a couple  
22 of commissioners. Former Commissioner Jessica  
23 Taylor is here today. Thank you. And former  
24 Commissioner Mimi Rimerez (ph). Thank you for  
25 coming out. And then we have Mr. Kenneth Johnson

1 who is here on behalf of Senator Coleman Young.

2 At this time I'd like to turn the  
3 microphone over to Commissioner Dewaelsche and  
4 she's going to give us a warm welcome.

5 COMMISSIONER DEWAEELSCHE: Well, if you  
6 know anything about Southwest Detroit, we're  
7 very, very proud of our community. We love to  
8 have people come visit. And I know you had a  
9 hard time getting down here because we have a lot  
10 of traffic on Vernor. We're a growing community.  
11 We're very diverse. We have excellent  
12 restaurants. We have stores. Please come down  
13 and shop. We're always promoting our business  
14 district, and I do want to give you a warm  
15 welcome.

16 We have several people that are actually  
17 working for the Board of Police Commissioners who  
18 are Southwest Detroiters. We have Ms.--I think  
19 you already introduced them from the Office of  
20 the Chief Investigator. Would you, please.

21 MS. DAVIS-DRAKE: It would be a  
22 pleasure. Pamela Davis-Drake, for the record.  
23 Senior Investigator Adela Rivera (ph) and also  
24 Senior Investigator Rosalea Mondigal (ph).

25 COMMISSIONER DEWAEELSCHE: So if we have

1 any individuals tonight who would like to  
2 have translations done, we do have the staff to  
3 do that. And I'm really proud of that; that the  
4 Detroit Police Department has bilingual staff.  
5 And, also, I do want to mention that the  
6 organization that I work for, Fair Metro Detroit,  
7 is currently a Work Force Development  
8 Organization and we've been in Detroit for 45  
9 years this year.

10 We're very excited about working with--  
11 we're very excited about working with the Police  
12 Department and trying to help recruit people to  
13 become police officers. We have Fair Metro staff  
14 at this table behind the crowd here. Please  
15 raise your hand. We have several staff that  
16 are here to help with recruiting police officers.  
17 And then today we run the One Steps for the City  
18 of Detroit. We had a huge fair at the Northwest  
19 Activities Center and it was very well attended  
20 and we had a nice crowd of individuals who were  
21 interested in becoming police officers. So I  
22 welcome everyone. I want to thank Mary Carmen  
23 who is here from LaSed and thank LaSed for  
24 hosting this meeting.

25 And then finally, I do want to say that

1 there is some food, Mexican food, so if you get a  
2 chance, help yourself either now or after the  
3 meeting. Thank you so much and welcome.

4 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you,  
5 Commissioner Dewaelsche. Commissioners, you have  
6 before you the Agenda for Thursday, March 10th.  
7 Is there a Motion to Approve the Agenda?

8 (Moved and supported.)

9 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Its been moved and  
10 supported that we accept the Agenda--approve  
11 the Agenda. Is there any discussion?

12 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, I think  
13 we need to go on record that we have a quorum for  
14 this meeting.

15 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you,  
16 Commissioner Bell. Is there any discussion?

17 (None responded.)

18 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those in favor?

19 (Several responded by indicating  
20 aye.)

21 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed?

22 (None responded.)

23 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Motion carries. At  
24 this time, Commissioners, you have before you the  
25 Minutes from Thursday, March 3rd. Is there a



1 Motion to Approve the Minutes?

2 (Moved and supported.)

3 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Its been moved and  
4 supported that we approve the Minutes from  
5 Thursday, March 3rd. Is there any discussion?

6 (None responded.)

7 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those in favor?

8 (Several responded by indicating  
9 aye.)

10 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed?

11 (None responded.)

12 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: The Motion carries.

13 At this time for the Chairperson's Report. This  
14 week was a busy week for me and for the  
15 Commission. On Monday we were before City  
16 Council and it was myself along with Vice-Chair  
17 Bell, Commissioner Sanders and Attorney Linda  
18 Bernard and I think that things went well at the  
19 meeting. There was a lot of discussion about a  
20 lot of different things and mainly there were  
21 council persons that suggested that we have more  
22 meetings in the community, to have more community  
23 involvement. There was a lot of discussion  
24 around community involvement and our roles as  
25 commissioners and our duties and

1 responsibilities.

2 So another thing that happened at the  
3 commission--at the Council meeting, we wanted  
4 to--there was 500 thousand dollars that was  
5 removed from our budget. I think that we have a  
6 chance of getting that back. One of the things  
7 that was brought up was during our--our powers  
8 were restored in December. Councilwoman--Council  
9 President Brenda Jones asked the question about  
10 our budget, and she at the time was told that  
11 there was money in the budget for us to do the  
12 things we needed to do in order to carry out our  
13 duties and responsibilities within the community.  
14 And she wondered why the money was not there; was  
15 being taken away. So I think that there's a good  
16 chance that our budget will be restored to the  
17 amount that we requested and I'm happy to report  
18 that. Commissioner Bell, is there anything you'd  
19 like to add to that?

20 COMMISSIONER BELL: I just want to say  
21 that primarily this was our first opportunity in  
22 2016 to really weigh in on our budget, and  
23 Council was very responsible in terms of the  
24 budget issues that we raised. And, as  
25 Commissioner Carter indicated, I think we need to

1 take up the issues of having more community  
2 meetings after 6:30 in the evening to embrace  
3 more people; that type of interaction. And we  
4 also just had a very healthy discussion in  
5 reference to the role and responsibility as we  
6 move forward.

7 I might add on Monday also at 9 o'clock  
8 I had to represent the Board at the Chief's staff  
9 meeting and that was very informative in terms of  
10 the process of how the executives come together  
11 to address public safety issues, the weekly  
12 report. So that was very enlightening in terms  
13 of the Chief offered that. So hopefully, perhaps  
14 not every meeting, but every opportunity we can  
15 attend those meetings. I think it was very  
16 informative in terms of including the Board to  
17 get first-hand knowledge in terms of the issues  
18 they are dealing with, and I can appreciate those  
19 concerns and the issues they are dealing with  
20 because it is crucial in terms of public safety  
21 that we go forward; that this commission work  
22 with the Chief and the mayor in terms of dealing  
23 with day-to-day overall responsibility. Thank  
24 you.

25 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you,

1 Commissioner Bell. Commissioner Sanders,  
2 anything you'd like to add?

3 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: The only thing I  
4 can say, I was at the meeting and I guaranteed  
5 the Board its going to be totally different.  
6 We're going to have mostly everything together.  
7 We won't have to go through this again what we're  
8 going through now. So I appreciate the chance to  
9 serve the Board. As to the budget, I appreciate  
10 the Board for the chance to serve in the budget  
11 committee to try to get some things back and try  
12 to get it in a situation where it will be better  
13 for all of us; for the public and for the Board.  
14 Thank you.

15 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. I would  
16 also at this time like to acknowledge all of  
17 the--here she comes now. Attorney Linda Bernard  
18 really did an awesome job before City Council  
19 this week, and I just wanted to acknowledge her  
20 and all the work that she did. She was on point  
21 and she had everything together for us and she  
22 represented us well. So, thank you, Attorney  
23 Linda Bernard.

24 COMMISSIONER MALLETT: I don't mean to  
25 ask an indelicate question, but I noticed in the

1 budget information that was transmitted it was an  
2 item for 14 laptops, and I just wondered what are  
3 those for? Who are those for?

4 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: I believe that  
5 those are for the eleven commissioners and the  
6 Attorney to the Board, Secretary to the Board and  
7 the Chief Investigator.

8 COMMISSIONER MALLET: So, Madam  
9 Chairperson, two things, one, and again, I don't  
10 mean to put my fellow commissioners on the spot.  
11 I understand why staff would need it. Their work  
12 is critically important. They ought to be  
13 technically proficient and connected as best they  
14 can to the latest technology so they can do their  
15 work. We are a volunteer organization. Our  
16 duties and responsibilities are supervisory. We  
17 have investigatory responsibilities, and I  
18 guarantee, Madam Chairperson, that every person  
19 on this commission right now has computer access.  
20 Every single person, although I don't know the  
21 quality of their computer access, I guarantee you  
22 everybody here is connected.

23 I would say this. I would like to opt  
24 out and I would encourage those persons rather  
25 than do it formally, but I would just ask my

1 fellow commissioners, as much as we want to do  
2 our jobs correctly, the City of Detroit is this  
3 far from escaping the financial chaos that  
4 resulted in an emergency manager, and then  
5 someone imposed on us by the bankruptcy Judge.  
6 We are far, far, far away from being out of the  
7 financial woods. And so I would hope that we  
8 would pay close attention to that and let that be  
9 a guiding principle.

10 So instead of ordering a 14 laptops,  
11 Madam Chairperson, please just order thirteen. I  
12 do not want one.

13 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you,  
14 Commissioner Mallett. And any other  
15 commissioners that does not want a computer,  
16 including myself, we will not order a total of 14  
17 computers. Anyone else that wants to opt out can  
18 opt out; absolutely.

19 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Madam Chair, I  
20 would concur with Commissioner Mallett. I have a  
21 Smart phone. I have a tablet of my own, and I do  
22 understand, I believe, we're some four hundred  
23 million dollars close to going back into some  
24 financial distress, one may say, so I too really  
25 don't have a need for a laptop. Thank you.

1 COMMISSIONER MALLETT: And may I also  
2 point out, that this will be City of Detroit  
3 property; thus it will be, Commissioners, please  
4 hear me, thus it will be subject to the Freedom  
5 of Information Act. That laptop does not belong  
6 to you. It belongs to the citizens of the City  
7 of Detroit. So, if someone wants to see what's  
8 on it, you turn the thing back in and they see  
9 what's on it.

10 Now, if you want to keep your private  
11 communications private, ask Secretary Clinton,  
12 you ought to use your own email and your own  
13 computer. So, you know, if you're in the habit  
14 of shopping at Macy's and you use your Detroit  
15 City laptop we're going to know what you bought.

16 COMMISSIONER BELL: Well, Madam Chair,  
17 I just want to say we can take into consideration  
18 any commissioner that wants to opt out, but our  
19 budget was clearly reviewed by several  
20 individuals, including the Chief Financial  
21 Officer of the City of Detroit in terms of the  
22 duty and responsibility of this Commission; and  
23 it was clear that we presented that they want us  
24 to be more engaging with the community.

25 The commissioners represent seven

1 districts and also at large. There's a  
2 tremendous obligation to communicate, to interact  
3 and we understand the responsibility of a  
4 computer and that it's the Department--as you  
5 well know, I think we all come from a business  
6 background. That's an awesome responsibility,  
7 but we did not take this lightly. We have been  
8 functioning for two years without the basic  
9 necessity of functioning as a Board or as a  
10 Commissioner.

11 So all of that was brought to the table  
12 with the Council, with the Mayor and with the  
13 Chief Financial Officer and all of that. So we  
14 did not take our budget matter lightly. We weigh  
15 in all of that. And we take into consideration  
16 that some of our commissioners are in a different  
17 position and they can function. Some of us are  
18 purely engaged in terms of our community that we  
19 represent and interact with. I can't tell you  
20 that as far as the Chair and other commissioners  
21 on this Board are totally out there in the  
22 community and the community expects more of us;  
23 especially since commissioners are now elected.

24 When we were appointed, commissioners  
25 had really no obligation to interact with the



1 City no more than in their meetings, basically.  
2 But it's a different day and age. As we look  
3 across this country, we did not have to lobby in  
4 terms of the issues we're dealing with. The  
5 Council understands that. That's why they're  
6 making their council staff whole. That's why the  
7 Department functions in a certain manner in terms  
8 of technology. People want to you respond.

9 So we don't take this lightly, sir, at  
10 all. I take it very seriously. I can't tell you  
11 how many hours I have added up in terms of  
12 engaging the community. And I can speak for  
13 other commissioners, because we spent just in  
14 this last two weeks, three, four or five  
15 different meetings. Some of us really don't have  
16 to engage, but others are obligated. So we can  
17 move on and have that discussion in terms of an  
18 in-house discussion on those issues. Thank you.

19 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. At this  
20 time we're going to have the OCI Complaint  
21 Process by Chief Investigator Drake.

22 MS. DRAKE: Thank you. Many of you  
23 already know that the Office of the Chief  
24 Investigator handles allegations of police  
25 misconduct that are of a non-criminal nature.

1           What you may not know is our process. So that's  
2           what I'm going to tell you about this evening.  
3           We receive the cases from you. You file the  
4           complaint in several different ways. You can go  
5           on-line to the City of Detroit website. You can  
6           log into the City of Detroit website. You can  
7           also go to DPD website or the Police Department  
8           website or the Board's website. So there are a  
9           number of ways in which you can file a complaint.  
10          You can also call us directly; that's probably  
11          the easiest way. Our number is area code  
12          313-596-2499.

13                       There are a number of brochures, also,  
14                       that are sitting on the back table there so  
15                       please feel free to pick up one and review it and  
16                       it will familiarize you with the different ways  
17                       that you can contact us. You can go directly to  
18                       the office if you choose to. We are currently at  
19                       1301 Third Street, and that is the Department  
20                       Headquarters. We are on the 7th Floor. If you  
21                       come to the third floor you can ring us at the  
22                       security desk and they will be happy to give us a  
23                       call and let us know that you're there.

24                       Once I receive your report, or once it  
25                       has been filed, we have approximately two days to

1 review that. The supervisors do that. They  
2 review the complaints and then they assign it to  
3 an investigator. The investigator has up to  
4 ninety days to complete that investigation and it  
5 doesn't always take that long, but you gotta give  
6 us that 90-day period of time. Within that  
7 90 days the supervisor at the end of the  
8 investigation that's completed by the  
9 investigator, the supervisor reviews it for  
10 accuracy to make sure that the findings are  
11 succinct and for the quality of the report. They  
12 do that within that same 90-day period of time.

13 After that they pass it off to me. I  
14 review it. I have 7 days in which to do so, and  
15 I look for the same things. I look at the  
16 quality of the report, the findings to make sure  
17 that they are consistent, and to make sure that  
18 the complaint and all the allegations are being  
19 addressed. Once I complete it, then I pass it on  
20 to the Board. There's a sub-committee of the  
21 Board that involves three Board of Commissioner  
22 members. Please, raise your hand. Commissioner  
23 Shelby, Commissioner Crawford and also  
24 Commissioner Brooks who is not present this  
25 afternoon. They review all of the cases along

1 with myself to make sure, again, that they are  
2 quality reports, that the information and all the  
3 allegations are covered and that the findings  
4 support; whatever is in the body of the  
5 complaint.

6 Once that happens then the materials are  
7 returned to us. We review it once again for  
8 accuracy. It goes into the database as being  
9 closed and you receive a letter as to the  
10 complainant. The findings letter, again, after  
11 four folks have reviewed that complaint to make  
12 sure that it is accurate, that the findings are  
13 substantiated, four folks review that complaint.  
14 That would be the investigator, the supervising  
15 investigator, myself and a Board member.

16 Once you receive that letter, if the  
17 findings are sustained; meaning that whatever you  
18 alleged that the officer did, did indeed occur  
19 and it was against police policy, then those  
20 reports go to the Chief of Police or his designee  
21 for review. They then go to disciplinary action.  
22 So that whole process takes quite a while as you  
23 can imagine. The Board has up to 45 days to  
24 review the findings. They never take that long.  
25 Usually within one or two weeks they complete it.

1 But once it is complete you do receive a letter  
2 in the mail and it will--you can review your  
3 findings.

4 If you are not satisfied with your  
5 findings you always have the option to appeal the  
6 case. You do that by sending us a letter. You  
7 send it to the address that is on the back of the  
8 flyer. You send that to us requesting to have an  
9 appeal. We need very specific information in  
10 that letter. We need your BPC or Board of Police  
11 Commission Number. We need your CCR Number,  
12 which is the Citizen Complaint Report Number.  
13 You will have all of that in your findings  
14 letter. You also get the CCR Number right over  
15 the phone when you file your complaint.

16 Once we have that letter in your request  
17 for an appeal then we give it to the Board. The  
18 Board makes the determination if they are going  
19 to review it formally or informally. At that  
20 point, once they make that decision, then we  
21 contact you and we let you know one way or the  
22 other. Then of course that process is continued.  
23 So I think that pretty much sums it up. If there  
24 are any questions, would you like me, Board, to  
25 entertain questions at this time? I will say

1 this. If you do have questions that are  
2 specific to cases that you either currently have  
3 with the Office of the Chief Investigator or  
4 cases that have been closed, please see; and  
5 raise your hand again all of the staff that are  
6 here. Please see one of the staff people and  
7 they can further assist you. They will take your  
8 name and your phone number and we can follow up  
9 with the cases to answer your questions.

10 But if there are questions that are in  
11 general that the entire community needs to be  
12 aware of, please by all means, I will entertain  
13 them.

14 UNKNOWN AUDIENCE MEMBER: Yes. I would  
15 like to know to file a complaint does it include  
16 any area of--(inaudible.)

17 MS. DRAKE: The only allegations that  
18 have to do with--that are misconduct that are not  
19 criminal. So anything--like you felt like you  
20 were falsely arrested or you didn't like the  
21 demeanor of the officer; there is a procedural  
22 issue. Anything like that we can handle. But if  
23 it's of a criminal nature we don't handle those.  
24 That would be handled by Internal Affairs. Does  
25 that answer your question or not?

1 (Speaker is inaudible.)

2 MS. DRAKE: It has to be a member of the  
3 Police Department or a staff person within the  
4 Police Department.

5 UNKNOWN AUDIENCE MEMBER: How do you go  
6 about filing a complaint against a particular  
7 officer where there's something taking place in  
8 the Department?

9 MS. DRAKE: But it doesn't have anything  
10 to do with a specific member?

11 UNKNOWN AUDIENCE MEMBER: Yes, it does,  
12 but it's not like a criminal act so you wouldn't  
13 have anything to do with that?

14 MS. DRAKE: Well, if it's a criminal  
15 act, no, but if you have an allegation against  
16 the police officer then we would want to hear  
17 that. We want to entertain that. So you could  
18 see any one of our staff if you have something  
19 today that you'd like to discuss with them.

20 (Speaker is inaudible.)

21 MS. DRAKE: Why don't you speak with  
22 them anyway just to be on the safe side, because  
23 we may be able to handle it. I'm not quite sure  
24 of the question, but I think we can better handle  
25 it maybe on the sideline. Any other questions?

1 UNKNOWN AUDIENCE MEMBER: Is it  
2 something that comes to the community groups at  
3 large versus several complaints against specific  
4 officers for sexually harassing victims of crimes  
5 as well as--(inaudible)--its come up too many  
6 times. So is it possible for a representative or  
7 community group form a complaint about being a  
8 victim?

9 MS. DRAKE: I think that actually is--it  
10 could result in criminal prosecution, so I think  
11 that is something that the Internal Affairs Unit  
12 would have to address. But yes, your question is  
13 kind of two part. Yes, that is something that  
14 the community member could pose to the Police  
15 Department. I don't know of any officers that  
16 would be willing to hear that. Thank you so  
17 much. Any other questions?

18 (None responded.)

19 MS. DRAKE: There being none, thank you.

20 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: At this time we're  
21 going to have the report by Assistant Chief  
22 Dolunt and we can also do the Officer of the  
23 Quarter Awards at that time.

24 ASSISTANT CHIEF DOLUNT: Thank you,  
25 ma'am. Couple things; this week we had



1 graduation on Friday. We're hoping for more  
2 officers to be confirmed--excuse me--to graduate,  
3 so if you know anyone out there who wants to be a  
4 police officer, please have them come down and  
5 apply. I know our standards are a little higher  
6 than they were in the past and some people can't  
7 get through, whether it's psychological or drug  
8 testing or past history, but I urge them to  
9 apply. First apply to the Department. If you  
10 know anyone else there and if they're bilingual  
11 that helps too. We could use them.

12 Also, I was with the Commission  
13 President on Tuesday.

14 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Monday.

15 ASSISTANT CHIEF DOLUNT: Monday. With  
16 Congressman Brenda Lawrence and County Sheriff  
17 Benny Napoleon and Chief of Oak Park and  
18 Southfield and we talked about the violence in  
19 the area. I think one of the biggest problems we  
20 agreed was conflict resolution. If you look at  
21 our crime, there's been enough; six in non-fatal  
22 shootings and homicides in the last month or so.  
23 Some of it is the weather, but a lot of it is  
24 people don't know how to talk and they think they  
25 can carry a gun, and that's not the way to have

1 conflict resolution. You can agree to disagree.  
2 There's no reason to shoot people over stupid  
3 things and it result in kids with no parents and  
4 spouses with no husband or wife and parents with  
5 no kids. So I know it's hard but I think we'll  
6 have another meeting on this. I honestly  
7 believe, or at least I hope so, that we can get  
8 people of this generation to understand that  
9 conflict resolution can work. You don't have to  
10 shoot people. So it was a good meeting.

11 Also, today--oh, Captain Chambers,  
12 you're here somewhere. Stand up. Come over here  
13 near a microphone. Do these people know you  
14 left?

15 CAPTAIN CHAMBERS: Some of us.

16 ASSISTANT CHIEF DOLUNT: So can you tell  
17 them you left.

18 CAPTAIN CHAMBERS: I'm no longer at the  
19 4th Precinct. I transferred on January 18th and  
20 Captain Whitney Walton is the new captain. She  
21 is somewhere around here.

22 ASSISTANT CHIEF DOLUNT: Come on up.  
23 You'll notice they don't look alike by any  
24 stretch of the imagination. I want to thank you  
25 for what you did here at the 4th Precinct, but it

1 was time for you to move on and now we have  
2 Whitney, who I guarantee will carry it on.  
3 Introduce yourself, please.

4 CAPTAIN WALTON: I'm Whitney Walton.  
5 I'm the new captain of the 4th Precinct.

6 ASSISTANT CHIEF DOLUNT: And even though  
7 her last name is Walton she's Hispanic, Puerto  
8 Rican decent, so we are trying to diversify our  
9 command staff as well as our officers.

10 And, the last thing, we're going to do  
11 the Officers of the Quarter. And, just so you  
12 know, to me, these are cops of the quarter.  
13 These men and women, it's not just based on  
14 felony arrests. It's based on how they handle  
15 the community with professionalism, the way they  
16 look, the way they go out of their way to put in  
17 extra time without getting paid, to serve the  
18 community. Some of these are younger officers.  
19 Some are veteran officers. And in a perfect  
20 example, although not getting an award today, is  
21 a 20-year veteran yesterday who got in a foot  
22 chase of a guy with a gun; fell down and caught  
23 the man without use of force. The  
24 professionalism of these cops, and there is a  
25 difference, I'm pleased to say there's more cops

1 on this Department every day that take this job  
2 seriously and are very professional and I'm proud  
3 to serve them as an Assistant Chief.

4 So with that said, we can do that. I'd  
5 appreciate it. Just so you guys know, I'm not  
6 going to read all the great things you did  
7 because I'd have to put my glasses on, but you  
8 guys did a really good job as men and women.

9 DEPUTY CHIEF HALL: Police Officer Jason  
10 Taylor from the 2nd Precinct. From the 3rd  
11 Precinct we have Police Officer Donald Painter.  
12 From the 4th Precinct we have Police Officer Eric  
13 Carthan. From the 5th Precinct we have Police  
14 Officer Karen Maxey. Officer Maxey is not here.  
15 From the 6th Precinct we have Police Officer  
16 Nathan Miller. From the 7th Precinct we have  
17 Officer Shawn Mortier. From the 8th Precinct we  
18 have Officer Ransom Williams. From the 9th  
19 Precinct we have Police Officer Michael Bryant.  
20 From the 10th Precinct we have Police Officer  
21 Charles Ruffin. From the 11th Precinct we have  
22 Police Officer Demario Walk. And from the 12th  
23 Precinct we have Police Officer Jose Martinez.

24 Again, everybody, on behalf of our  
25 entire executive team, we truly appreciate

1 everything that you guys go out and do every day.  
2 When we look at the numbers that we are down and  
3 how we are making a dent in crime it's because of  
4 you. Thank you.

5 ASSISTANT CHIEF DOLUNT: I just gotta  
6 tell you guys something. Even though they're  
7 getting awards, that's all Detroit's finest right  
8 there. They're supporting each other.

9 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: At this time we're  
10 going to have--Assistant Chief Dolunt, is that it  
11 for you?

12 ASSISTANT CHIEF DOLUNT: I hope so but  
13 thank you.

14 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Are there any  
15 standing committee reports?

16 (None responded.)

17 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Under new business  
18 we have a presentation from Mr. Tom Adams for  
19 Chance for Life.

20 MR. ADAMS: Thank you. Give an honor  
21 God; recognizing the Mayor of this great City and  
22 to this awesome Commission for all of our  
23 wonderful police officers and to all of you who  
24 are here in attendance today; thank you for  
25 allowing me to come out. I can't go any further

1           until I introduce my partner Dr. Jessica Taylor.  
2           Jessica, will you sand up. She was a past police  
3           commissioner. What we want to do today is set  
4           the stage. We are currently in the 2nd Precinct  
5           and we have set up a family peace center, which  
6           is geared at bringing harmony and peace and  
7           actually getting at the cause and the root of  
8           major issues that go on in the community to help  
9           bring down the neighborhood violence and prevent  
10          people from going back into prison.

11                        We're going to set the stage by showing  
12          you a short DVD that I'll talk about the Center  
13          for a half minute and then take any questions  
14          that you may have. So if we can roll the DVD  
15          I'll appreciate it.

16                                (Video Presentation.)

17                        MR. ADAMS: Thank you. I want to be  
18          very short and brief. On the inside, we've been  
19          in prisons for 23 years. We set up mediation  
20          centers as AC was mentioning. Through those  
21          mediation centers we've been able to drop the  
22          negative incidents in prisons by over 40 percent.  
23          We're now at nine prisons throughout the State.

24                        What we're currently doing is bringing  
25          that to the outside. With partnership with the

1 Detroit Wayne County Mental Health Authority, we  
2 have set up in the 2nd Precinct a third new hope,  
3 a family peace center, which is geared at taking  
4 people that come out of prison and putting them  
5 in environments that they can continue their  
6 learning, have a support system, bring their  
7 families in and have their families involved and  
8 we can get at the root cause of the issues and  
9 problems.

10 Whatever sent these guys to prison,  
11 there were some deeper issues that caused those  
12 things. That's what we work to deal with. We  
13 have fifty spots that are available, fifty spots.  
14 And what we're asking is that the support of this  
15 Commission, the support of the Police Department,  
16 the support of the community. Because we are a  
17 Wayne--even though the 2nd Precinct is our focus,  
18 we're a Wayne County Agency, so we can accept  
19 people anywhere from Wayne County.

20 We have a ten-week training program. If  
21 you participate in that we can access all types  
22 of services for you. That's including  
23 employment, mental health treatment,  
24 transportation, housing. You name it; we can  
25 pretty much do it. They have an eight hundred

1 million dollar budget, but you have to  
2 participate in that ten-week training program.  
3 We can do some emergency services; like lights  
4 and gas and things of that nature, but we're  
5 billing this as a short-term emergency service  
6 entity.

7 So I'm asking that if you would please  
8 send people to our entity so we can get support.  
9 We're doing this in conjunction with the Police  
10 Department, the City leaders, block clubs, so  
11 there's no--everybody's pulling together, and we  
12 want to make this the safest entity in the entire  
13 country. Any questions? Excuse me. Can you give  
14 us the address and telephone number?

15 MS. TAYLOR: It's located inside of  
16 Third New Hope Baptist Church. If everybody got  
17 one of these the address is on this flyer.

18 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: They don't know the  
19 address.

20 MS. TAYLOR: It's 12850 Plymouth Road  
21 at Steel and it's inside the Third New Hope  
22 Baptist Church. The telephone number is  
23 313-748-9209.

24 MR. ADAMS: That's one of the best  
25 proofs we can have; Terry Parks, five years in



1 prison. He looks like that every day. That's  
2 Chance for Life. Any other questions?

3 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Questions,  
4 Commissioners?

5 ASSISTANT CHIEF DOLUNT: I actually went  
6 to the prison two years ago with you guys and I  
7 think it's a great program. They've got my  
8 support a hundred percent.

9 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, I  
10 appreciate AC Dolunt endorsing this program and  
11 being familiar with it. I was just so  
12 enlightened and thought that it would be ideal  
13 that he present out here.

14 So I would make a Motion that we endorse  
15 and support Chance for Life Program as presented  
16 to us today and as they go forward in the  
17 community because all of us have family members;  
18 whether it be cousins, distant cousins or  
19 whatever, that's been incarcerated, and as you  
20 well know, a lot of people are coming back. They  
21 are not a hundred percent removed from your  
22 environment so you have to have a program.

23 If you ever have an opportunity to see  
24 the young people when they first follow the Wayne  
25 County Jail you can get an idea of the problem we

1 have in our community. So this program is  
2 worthwhile presenting out to the community.  
3 They've been engaging and have a track record.  
4 That is my Motion that be endorse and support the  
5 program.

6 (Moved and Supported.)

7 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Is there any  
8 discussion?

9 (None responded.)

10 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those in favor?

11 (Several responded by indicating  
12 aye.)

13 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed?

14 (None responded.)

15 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: The Motion carries.

16 MR. ADAMS: Thank you, Commissioners.

17 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, Dr.

18 Taylor, for all that you do and all that you've  
19 been doing. Thank you so much. At this time  
20 Commissioners, the Board of Police Commission  
21 Policy and Procedures for Election of Officers.  
22 You have that in your packet. If you are  
23 prepared at this time, if you've had a chance to  
24 review it, we'd like to vote on it, but if you  
25 want to table it we can do that as well.

1 COMMISSIONER MALLETT: I so move.

2 (Moved and Supported.)

3 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and  
4 supported that we adopt the election of officers  
5 policy. Is there any discussion?

6 (None responded.)

7 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those in favor?

8 (Several responded by indicating  
9 aye.)

10 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed?

11 (None responded.)

12 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: The Motion carries.

13 Thank you, Commissioners. Is there any old  
14 business?

15 (None responded.)

16 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: At this time I'd  
17 like to recognize the District Manager Rico Rozzo  
18 (ph) and I believe the Deputy District Manager  
19 Lisa Cambpo (ph) is here. Thank you all for  
20 coming out. And if there--under announcements  
21 our next meeting is Thursday, March 17th at 3  
22 p.m. Detroit Public Safety Headquarters located  
23 at 1301 Third Street in the Michigan Room. Our  
24 next Board of Police Commissioners Community  
25 meeting will be April 14, 2016 in the 11th

1 Precinct at Second Ebenezer Church, home of our  
2 own Bishop Edgar Vann located at 14601 Dequindre  
3 Street in the City of Detroit.

4 At this time we'll have oral  
5 communications from the audience. Please give  
6 your name for the record and limit your comments  
7 to two minutes, please.

8 MS. RIMEREZ: Good evening, Commission  
9 to the Chair. To the Board of Police  
10 Commissioners, thank you and welcome to Southwest  
11 Detroit. As always, I just wanted to--and I want  
12 to give a special thanks to Commissioner  
13 Dewaelsche.

14 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Your name for the  
15 record.

16 MS. RIMEREZ: My name is Mini Rimerez  
17 (ph). I'm Director of Community Relations and  
18 Outreach of Chance Health Center here in  
19 Southwest Detroit. It's a medical clinic. What  
20 I want to say, first of all, thank you,  
21 Commissioner of our constant discussion and with  
22 your guidance. Thank you so much.

23 The concern that we have here is that  
24 crime and the stats are not--does not reflect  
25 what is going on here in Southwest Detroit only

1 because the 4th Precinct does not have someone  
2 that speaks Spanish and is there for 24 hours.  
3 Whether we have a police officer there or if we  
4 have a civilian there, it would really help us  
5 and it would also shout out communication into  
6 our area into Southwest Detroit and let them know  
7 that they can and feel comfortable to come in and  
8 do translation.

9 We have a Domestic Violence Unit, and  
10 we are constantly being called to come over and  
11 translate to those women that are in a domestic  
12 violence situation. However, after I say all  
13 that, thank you so much, Commissioner Dewaelsche.  
14 And I have to say and commend Captain Walton from  
15 4th Precinct who had heard our cry and we think a  
16 couple of days, in less than a couple of days,  
17 she contacted us and she came up with a computer  
18 that when you talk into it it will translate in  
19 Spanish and then the officer can talk in English  
20 and it will translate in Spanish.

21 It's a start because you have to  
22 actually type it, although it doesn't have the  
23 voice recognition to it, and at this point that  
24 particular company is working on one, which is  
25 going to take a little time. But it is a start

1 and I just wanted to commend Captain Walton and  
2 Commissioner Dewaelsche. Thank you.

3 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner  
4 Dewaelsche.

5 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHÉ: It is a start  
6 and we are very pleased with that. However, we'd  
7 like to reiterate to our community that we need  
8 to recruit officers from our community, and  
9 that's how we're going to get more officers and  
10 staff who are bilingual. So let's work on that  
11 as a community. Let's try to recruit more  
12 officers. And thank you, Mini, for bringing that  
13 to our attention.

14 MS. PANYEL: Good evening. My name is  
15 Sharon Panyel (ph), 2nd Precinct. I'm having a  
16 problem with the fact that we don't have a  
17 captain or commander over there anymore. And  
18 it's so much chaos going on that we have had at  
19 least eight different changes in the last couple  
20 of years. Once we get used to someone they  
21 change it. The community gets frustrated like I  
22 am.

23 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

24 VICE CHAIR DOLUNT: I can address that.  
25 Right now the Chief is eluding to the fact that

1 Captain O'Shawn (ph) is temporarily assigned to  
2 nights captain duties. I can't get into it  
3 totally; however, there is an internal  
4 investigation going on, and for his privacy and  
5 the privacy of what's going on internally, I  
6 can't disclose that. Right now Lieutenant Gary  
7 Saroka (ph), who was a captain in 11 is filling  
8 in for Captain O'Shawn right now. And upon a  
9 completion of the investigation a determination  
10 will be made whether to return Captain O'Shawn to  
11 Number 2. I understand your concerns.

12 MS. PANYEL: Thank you. We just want to  
13 know who is a contact person because when we have  
14 problems in the area, just like on my street,  
15 they're stealing cars real bad again.

16 ASSISTANT CHIEF DOLUNT: So same office  
17 number. Gary will handle whatever you got right  
18 now until a determination is made after the  
19 completion of investigation.

20 MS. PANYEL: Thank you very much.

21 ASSISTANT CHIEF DOLUNT: Thank you,  
22 ma'am.

23 MS. BUTLER: Good evening. My name is  
24 Rita Butler and I'm the secretary for the 2nd  
25 Precinct Police Community Relations Council, and

1 I am a community activist. I'm very concerned  
2 about what's happening within our City. One  
3 thing I know is that we are still under an  
4 emergency manager, which to me is just like being  
5 on a plantation. There are three things--three  
6 questions I would like to ask you before I give  
7 my statement about our captain.

8 First, what does credit have to do with  
9 a young black male becoming a police officer?  
10 And the other one is what is being done about the  
11 man that was shot in Detroit by the Dearborn  
12 Police Officer? And what is being done about the  
13 shooting that took place in Dearborn of a black  
14 female? And perhaps--I know you can't perhaps  
15 comment on that right now, but I would like to  
16 put that out.

17 What is happening at our 2nd Precinct,  
18 Captain O'Shawn has done so much work in that  
19 community; in our community. He has organized  
20 the businesses; people who have come together for  
21 them to clean up their business. Some areas we  
22 have had problems with drugs. And I know I only  
23 have two minutes so I'm trying to get through  
24 this. He has come where we work together with  
25 Wayne State University. We have a meeting once a



1 month with them. And he is accessible to the  
2 community. Even to--you can call him at any  
3 time. He might not get back with you but he has  
4 heard what you had to say and then you look  
5 around and it has been taken care of. And I wish  
6 that whatever the concerns are with Captain  
7 O'Shawn that he would be placed back at the  
8 2nd Precinct. We need him there. We have--he  
9 has accomplished so much since he's been there  
10 and this is like destroying our community by  
11 removing him. He is a valuable person within our  
12 community. Thank you.

13 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Assistant Chief  
14 Dolunt.

15 ASSISTANT CHIEF DOLUNT: Yes, ma'am.  
16 First thing, the individual that was shot in  
17 Detroit by the Dearborn Police Department, an  
18 investigation has been turned over to the Wayne  
19 County Prosecutor and we have to wait for them to  
20 make a determination. We've completed our  
21 investigation and turned everything over so it's  
22 in the hand of the Wayne County Prosecutor.

23 As far as the female that was shot in  
24 Dearborn, Michigan State Police is handling that.  
25 It's my understanding that they turned their

1 stuff over to the Wayne County Prosecutor so  
2 that's out of our hands; both cases.

3 The third thing about credit; whether  
4 it's a young man, old man, young female, you  
5 don't want to get someone who is too far in debt  
6 because, unfortunately, people become susceptible  
7 to bribes to be point blank. You want someone  
8 who has a pretty good credit history. And  
9 unfortunately, not just them, but their families  
10 because you don't want people, unscrupulous  
11 people, to use that their family's problems  
12 against them. That's the third thing.

13 As far as Captain O'Shawn, everyone here  
14 knows that I recommended him for captain, and I  
15 believe in Captain O'Shawn. He is a very good  
16 individual; you're absolutely right. The  
17 internal investigation does not pertain to his  
18 involvement in the community. It is a  
19 departmental issue. I'll let it go with that.  
20 And if he is cleared I can see him coming back to  
21 Number 2 by Monday. If they find some problems  
22 departmentally we'll address those and move from  
23 there. But I can't make any promises.

24 MS. BUTLER: But he did receive an award  
25 from the community. I did a random survey. Of

1 course it wasn't a scientific survey but yet and  
2 still, I have the papers that I wrote up about  
3 him that I got from the community.

4 ASSISTANT CHIEF DOLUNT: Ma'am, I have  
5 no doubt that he is very good in the community;  
6 however, this is an internal issue with the  
7 Police Department and it has to do with the  
8 regulations and procedures of the Police  
9 Department. It has nothing to do with his  
10 involvement in the community. There are a lot of  
11 good officers out here that do great things with  
12 the community; however, if they violate or are  
13 accused of a violation we have to investigate the  
14 procedures and regulations. It's for him too so  
15 it's impartial so that's why we moved him so  
16 there's no bias.

17 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, ma'am.  
18 Commissioner Moore.

19 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Just a brief  
20 comment in terms of Captain O'Shawn being on  
21 transfer. I learned about it via Facebook  
22 yesterday. So that just concerns me that he's  
23 one of my captains and I take it somewhat  
24 personal. But leadership in the Department could  
25 reach out a little bit better and let us know so

1 I don't learn it on Facebook like everybody else.  
2 So hopefully we can get those internal checks and  
3 balances in place so I can learn about it some  
4 place other than Facebook.

5 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. Yes,  
6 ma'am.

7 MS. BURN: Welcome to District 6. My  
8 name is Ann Burn. I am currently the West Vernor  
9 civilian patrol lead for training and  
10 communication and one of the chief architects of  
11 the Southwest Safety Hub, which is about to be  
12 the first safety hub in the City of Detroit. And  
13 we are thrilled and delighted the Mayor's Office  
14 has been directing the Department in great  
15 support of the radio patrols. We want to be your  
16 eyes and ears. I know the Department remains  
17 understaffed and we want to continue to be those  
18 eyes and ears as the staffing rises.

19 We also know that the Department is  
20 being restructured for optimal efficiency;  
21 however, I'd like to take this time to remind the  
22 commissioners to continue to engage the  
23 Department in understanding that when dealing  
24 with community liaison the community has to have  
25 a consistent liaison.

1 Commander Bettus has opted out.  
2 Sergeant Wood moved on. We just got Daniel Woods  
3 back from furlough. We need to have someone  
4 consistent, someone who is consistently putting  
5 through our applications. There's been a big  
6 hold up on that so we can't get any patrollers  
7 out. We were so thrilled to have a captain,  
8 Captain Chambers, for two years and we're looking  
9 forward to many years with Captain Walton.

10 Our business district right up and down  
11 here that we are sitting in right now, employs  
12 secondary patrol officers. Our business district  
13 was told there would be funding for those  
14 officers to have another office beside the 4th  
15 Precinct where they could write their reports and  
16 things. We tried to incorporate that into the  
17 Safety Hub so that they would have a place there;  
18 that they could contribute to that budget without  
19 having to rent an entire office. And we got word  
20 from Sergeant Woody just before he left that that  
21 was just off the table and yet they came to our  
22 meetings. They wanted us to participate. They  
23 want the patrol to expand but nobody's showing us  
24 the money either.

25 So just want to put that out there. We

1 want to continue to do all of this in a  
2 professional way and let you see what happens  
3 when the community is allowed to contribute to  
4 its policing.

5 THE COURT: Thank you, ma'am.

6 ASSISTANT CHIEF DOLUNT: Can I address  
7 that?

8 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Yes. I was looking  
9 at Commander Betus.

10 COMMANDER BETUS: I was sitting there  
11 and when I heard my name that said I opted out I  
12 got out of the conversation to figure out what  
13 that means.

14 ASSISTANT CHIEF DOLUNT: Will you have  
15 that discussion with her?

16 COMMANDER BETUS: I will have a  
17 discussion. But as far as the application, we  
18 worked that out and smoothed it out and there  
19 should be no longer be a delay in any  
20 applications. Danielle Woods is still in the  
21 Chief's office processing those applications.  
22 And when we get those we typically have a 48 hour  
23 turnaround period for those. I will have the  
24 conversation with her and I'm still here.

25 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you,

1 Commander. Any other oral communications?

2 (None responded.)

3 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other oral  
4 communications?

5 (None responded.)

6 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: I just want to take  
7 a moment. We lost a member of our community in  
8 the 6th District, Mr. Charlie Thomas. His  
9 viewing is tomorrow from 4 to 8 p.m. at the  
10 Clora Funeral Home on Coolidge in River Rouge.  
11 The family hour is Saturday at 3 p.m. and his  
12 Homegoing is after 4 p.m. at River Rouge High  
13 School Auditorium. If there are no other oral  
14 communications?

15 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Madam Chair,  
16 I'd like to make an announcement.

17 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Yes.

18 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: The Mayor has  
19 got a new--well a summer initiative that you're  
20 probably all very familiar with; that's the  
21 Summer Youth Program, which is called Grow  
22 Detroit's Young Talent. The Mayor has increased  
23 the number of young people that he wants to put  
24 to work for this summer. Last year he was very--  
25 we were successful in putting 56 hundred young

1 people into work experience positions.

2 This year he wants to try to fill those  
3 positions with eight thousand kids. So we need  
4 everybody's help. We need businesses to help,  
5 provide some support, financial support, and work  
6 sites. But we also need young people to apply.  
7 So if you have any young people in your families  
8 in your neighborhoods please let them know that  
9 they can go to the City of Detroit website  
10 gdyt.com to apply.

11 If you want any further information you  
12 can also see me after the meeting and I can give  
13 you more information. So please help us with  
14 recruiting young people and also businesses to  
15 participate; ages 14 through 18.

16 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's 14 to 24. The  
17 Mayor said last night that the website is still  
18 open although it says March 5th it closes but the  
19 website is still open. They extended it a couple
