4 CHAIRMAN BELL: Good afternoon and welcome to
5 the weekly afternoon meeting of the Board of Police
6 Commission. I am your Chair, Willie Bell, from
7 District 4 and I'm going to call the meeting to order.
8 And we have one of our outstanding chaplains in the
9 house. I'm going to call for Chaplain Barry to come
10 forward for invocation, please. It's good to see all
11 your smiling face this afternoon. Must be post
12 Valentine.

13 (Invocation given).

14 CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes. Good afternoon. Thank
15 you. We're going to have roll call and I'm going to
16 start to my far left with Commissioner Shelby.

17 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Commissioner Richard
18 Shelby, District 1.

19 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Commission Ricard Moore
20 District 7 Vice Chair.

21 CHAIRMAN BELL: It's good to see and interact
22 with my immediate past Chair, Lisa Carter from District
23 6.

24 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Yes, sir.

25 CHAIRMAN BELL: It's good to see you this

1 afternoon.

2 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you, sir. It's
3 good to be here. Thank you.

4 CHAIRMAN BELL: Commissioner Brooks?

5 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Elizabeth Brooks
6 at-large.

7 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: Derek Sanders
8 at-large, appointed.

9 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Eva Garza
10 Dewaelsche at-large.

11 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you. We have excused
12 absence for Bishop Edgar Vann and that's it at this
13 time.

14 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Commissioner Crawford is
15 going to be --

16 CHAIRMAN BELL: Right. Commissioner Crawford
17 is in the building and he'll be here shortly. Mr.
18 Hicks, do we have a quorum?

19 SECRETARY HICKS: Yes, I guess, Mr. Chair,
20 you have a quorum.

21 CHAIRMAN BELL: Okay. He hesitated for a
22 minute but it's been established that we have a quorum.
23 The Chair would entertain a motion for approval of the
24 agenda for this afternoon meeting.

25 COMMISSIONER: So moved.

1 COMMISSIONER: Support.

2 CHAIRMAN BELL: It's been properly moved and
3 supported. Discussion? Those in favor aye?

4 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

5 CHAIRMAN BELL: Those opposed. Motion
6 carried.

7 The next item with the approval of minutes
8 from February should be hopefully the 9th right? Yes.
9 2017.

10 COMMISSIONER: So moved.

11 COMMISSIONER: Support.

12 CHAIRMAN BELL: It's been properly moved and
13 supported. Discussion? Those in favor aye?

14 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

15 CHAIRMAN BELL: Those opposed? Motion
16 carries.

17 And sitting -- no. Let's move to Mr. Hicks.
18 Would you introduce the board staff, please?

19 SECRETARY HICKS: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

20 First of all, I want to introduce or indicate that
21 Robert Brown is not with us this evening. Robert had
22 the good occasion to go visit his daughter who's away
23 at school and we're all, you know, really supportive of
24 dads in that regard. Replacing Robert at the table is
25 a Jonya Underwood. Jonya's over here. And, of course,

1 we have Ms. Johnson who's sitting at the front for our
2 fiscal area, Ms. White, and policy area Gail Oxendine,
3 who's over in this area here. And I should indicate
4 that, of course, Sergeant Quinn is doing the taping of
5 the media services is doing the audio visual today, and
6 Mindy Womack is the court reporter today. And then
7 seems like last, but never last, but I come back to
8 Chief Drake, because Chief Drake normally has other
9 individuals on her staff she'd like to also introduce,
10 so Chief Drake.

11 C.I. DRAKE: For the record, Pamela Davis
12 Drake, Chief Investigator, and with us today is
13 supervising investigator, Lawrence Akbar.

14 CHAIRMAN BELL: Good to see you all and
15 appreciate your attendance and your involvement. And
16 sitting in for Chief Craig, who needs no introduction,
17 but I'm going to introduce him anyway, the one and only
18 AC Dolunt.

19 A.C. DOLUNT: Afternoon.

20 CHAIRMAN BELL: Afternoon, sir. Would you
21 entertain introducing any other staff of DPD?

22 A.C. DOLUNT: Captain Bliss is here from the
23 5th precinct.

24 CHAIRMAN BELL: My captain from the 5th
25 precinct, Captain Bliss.

1 A.C. DOLUNT: Your captain. He'll be doing a
2 presentation later for the board. Captain Chambers is
3 here from internal affairs. Lieutenant Johnson from
4 Assistant Chief Stair's office. Sergeant Alexander
5 from Assistant Chief White's office. Commander Simpson
6 internal affairs. Lieutenant Potts from Neighborhood
7 Policing and Sergeant Potts from firearms. Anyone else
8 I missed?

9 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you, sir. It's good to
10 see DPD family at the meeting. Do we have any elected
11 officials or anyone representing elected officials? At
12 this time, would you like to care to introduce
13 yourself? Dr. Divers?

14 DR. DIVERS: From the office of Councilman
15 George Cushingberry.

16 CHAIRMAN BELL: Any others. Any community
17 organization leaders? Madam president. Thank you.
18 And I see assistant police academy. Sharon Pannell and
19 others. Any others? It's good to see you. Did I miss
20 anyone? Thank you. Commissioner Willie Burton has
21 joined us. Thank you from District 5.

22 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you, Mr.
23 Chairman.

24 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you, sir. I just have
25 a brief report that myself and Chief Investigator

1 Pamela Davis-Drake had an opportunity to interact with
2 academy class, correct me if I'm wrong. Is that 17D?
3 Drake 17D about 30 young people in the academy. I
4 think we was pleased. We had a great deal of
5 interaction Q and A, so it was real -- interface was
6 good and we was impressed with the class. They was
7 engaging and Ms. Drake gave always a thorough
8 PowerPoint on OCI, break it down. And we also gave
9 them a little history in terms of the DPD, the past,
10 the present and the future and we welcome them and
11 director of personnel, Gail Oxendine, would be pleased
12 with that type of interaction. And academy class staff
13 is on full capacity, in my opinion, so I appreciate
14 that type of -- oh, there he is. Captain Williams. I
15 don't see you. I got overshadowed by all the Internal
16 Affairs in the house. Officer always get a little
17 nervous when Internal Affairs would show up, but I
18 finished with a clean career. But it's good to see
19 you, sir. Appreciate the academy and all this go into
20 that type of involvement.

21 And was that Wednesday morning? Wednesday
22 morning our Vice Chair, Ricardo Moore, we had
23 interaction with interns. You want to elaborate on
24 that? You want to share?

25 COMMISSIONER MOORE: It was about 12 interns

1 I guess recruited from Director Oxendine's office and
2 we just had an opportunity to talk to them about law
3 enforcement and my main message was for them to stay
4 relevant to the citizens of Detroit, and that means
5 whether it means listening to the music that folks
6 listening to or go back and become educated, just be
7 relevant to whatever your mission and core function is
8 in law enforcement. And I think the Chairman was
9 talking about and Joe Frazier and Muhammad Ali and the
10 rope-a-dope so you might want to elaborate on that.

11 CHAIRMAN BELL: Most of them could not
12 identify with that, it was so long ago. I just tried
13 to explain to them that when you go into the ring,
14 everybody is in the ring with you and they give
15 instruction. They going to throw a left and right and
16 everybody giving instruction. When it come down to it,
17 they have to step out of the ring, right, and it comes
18 down to those two individuals. So we can train them,
19 but at some point in time, they're going to be out
20 there as police officers in terms of that training is
21 to kick in but we're doing our best to make sure they
22 are trained. And as you well know, Muhammad Ali went
23 on to a great career and Joe Frazier was a heavyweight
24 champion too, so they have opportunity. Main thing,
25 they was in the ring and we'd get in the ring with

1 them, but after that, you pretty much have to -- that
2 first day on the job you're out there and there are
3 people who are going to be helpful but it's on you now.
4 You are the star. Thank you. And that was a good
5 interaction with that particular group of individuals.

6 That's basically all I have. We're going to
7 hear more. I had two conversations with Chief Craig.
8 Chief Craig is attending a NOBLE conference, National
9 Black Law Enforcement Executive something, training
10 conference, so he briefed me in references to what has
11 transpired. I'm pretty sure AC Dolunt probably going
12 to elaborate, but there was some concern that these
13 investigation of police shootings, especially a
14 fatality is not just by DPD, it's also involve Michigan
15 State Police and that's something and that was some
16 statement in reference to that, but the Michigan State
17 Police was involved in that investigation. You'll
18 probably hear more in reference to AC Dolunt reporting
19 out on that, but that's basically all I want to convey
20 to you at this time in terms of my reporting out.

21 So the next item of business would be
22 resolution from our immediate Chair, Lisa Carter, and
23 Commissioner Moore.

24 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Good afternoon, once
25 again. This is a resolution honoring retired police

1 officer Curtis S. Yancy. Whereas Curtis S. Yancey was
2 appointed to the Detroit Police Department on July
3 15th, 1985. Upon graduating from the Detroit
4 Metropolitan Police Academy, Officer Yancey began his
5 career at the 7th precinct and now, therefore, be it
6 resolved that the Detroit Board of Police Commissioners
7 speaking on behalf of the Detroit Police Department and
8 the citizens of the City of Detroit recognize the
9 lifelong commitment to public safety by Police Officer
10 Curtis S. Yancey, your fidelity to law enforcement has
11 been an invaluable asset to the Department and merit
12 our highest regard. We salute and congratulate you,
13 Police Officer Curtis Yancey, signed by the Detroit
14 Board of Police Commissioners. Move for adoption.

15 COMMISSIONER: Support.

16 CHAIRMAN BELL: Been properly moved and
17 supported. Discussion? Those in favor aye?

18 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

19 CHAIRMAN BELL: Those opposed? Motion
20 carried. Thank you.

21 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Resolution honoring
22 retired Investigator William Everett Galen. Whereas
23 Mr. William Galen was appointed to the Detroit Police
24 Department on February 3rd, 1996. Upon graduating from
25 the Detroit Metropolitan Police Academy his career

1 began at the Seventh precinct.

2 And now, therefore, be it resolved, that the
3 Detroit Board of Police Commissioners speaking on
4 behalf of the citizens of Detroit and the Detroit
5 Police Department award this resolution to Investigator
6 William in recognition of his 26 years of outstanding
7 service and dedication. His professionalism, integrity
8 and standard of commitment to the City of Detroit and
9 its citizens merit our highest regards and best wishes
10 for continued success. We thank and congratulate you
11 Investigator William Galen from the Detroit Board of
12 Police Commissioners. Move for adoption, Mr. Chairman.

13 COMMISSIONER: Support.

14 CHAIRMAN BELL: Been properly moved and
15 supported. Discussion? Those in favor aye.

16 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

17 CHAIRMAN BELL: Those opposed? Motion
18 carries. Thank you.

19 And the next item of business would be
20 hearing from AC Dolunt on behalf of Chief Craig.

21 A.C. DOLUNT: Good afternoon. There's a
22 couple things we're going to cover. First the stats.
23 Homicides are up five which is 15%. Non-fatals we have
24 terrible start to the year. Slowly getting better, but
25 we're up to 127, non-fatals which is 36%. Armed

1 robberies are down 8%. Our car-jackings are down 13%.

2 There's been a couple things that have
3 happened recently. In today's paper, one of the
4 Detroit Police Officers was arrested for first degree
5 murder in Florida named Brian Mytych. He was here for
6 five years. Left. Went to Westland. No longer there.
7 Went to Florida and killed a man last night. So I
8 don't know much about his career in Detroit, but I just
9 want to bring it out that he did leave. Unfortunately,
10 one of the pictures I seen of him was in a Detroit
11 Police uniform. The last time he was employed by
12 Westland Police. On Tuesday we had an officer involved
13 in a shooting. It was fatal. I did speak to the
14 officer today.

15 As you spoke earlier, the homicide section is
16 evident. Our task force, which is also comprised of
17 Michigan State Troopers, so there shouldn't be an
18 appearance that we're trying to hide anything. As
19 Chief Craig spoke about on Wednesday at the press
20 conference, the officers were making a routine traffic
21 stop, were going to try to make a routine traffic stop
22 on a car that was speeding. Unbeknownst to them, the
23 car was carjacked on Saturday, I believe. It hadn't
24 been reported to the police. The officer didn't know
25 that. Went to make a traffic stop. The individual

1 lost control of his car. We're told he hit a van by
2 citizens at the scene. However, the owner of the van
3 has not come forward so we've not been able to
4 substantiate that. He came to rest at a building, took
5 off on foot. The officer, a 22-year veteran chased the
6 subject for about a quarter mile zigzagging through
7 vacant lots, abandoned houses, overgrown brush. Over
8 on Webb in the back yard, a struggle ensued and a shot
9 was fired by the officer. The individual is deceased.
10 We did track. We were unable to locate a weapon,
11 though we have, we believe, statements the individual
12 may have been armed. When we spoke to the individual
13 who had been carjacked, he pointed him out. Subject
14 that was shot and said he was armed when he stole my
15 car. Additionally, the individual had been arrested I
16 believe late last year in another carjacking crew. He
17 was not charged. The other three that were arrested
18 with him were.

19 So, it's my understanding we're going to
20 submit the investigator's report to the Wayne County
21 Prosecutors Office I believe by the end of the week and
22 they should start reviewing it on Monday. I would
23 caution the public, or anyone else, to think there will
24 be a rush to judgement. If you recall, the two
25 officers that were involved in the shootings in

1 Dearborn, it took just about a year before a final
2 decision was made. Ms. Worthy tries to do a very
3 thorough investigation. Does not try to jump the gun.
4 So I'm assuming it will be the same case here. So I
5 would ask that the public, and everyone else, be
6 patient. I'm sure they're going to have additional
7 questions and ask for additional information from our
8 investigators and we'll provide them with that and
9 that's kind of where we're at. Does the Board have any
10 questions?

11 CHAIRMAN BELL: Commissioners, questions or
12 concerns for AC Dolunt? Let's pause. I want to
13 recognize Commissioner Reggie Crawford joined us about
14 five minutes ago.

15 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes. I apologize for
16 being late. I had another very very important meeting.
17 My discipline doesn't allow me to be late to meetings,
18 but in this case it's an exception.

19 Yes, sir, Assistant Chief. I just have a
20 question in terms of this man that was shot,
21 unfortunately, and killed. Information that was
22 released to the media about his criminal history, was
23 that really relevant or is the department normally --

24 A.C. DOLUNT: Once he was identified, the
25 news media started asking about that. Our initial

1 stuff we had, information was -- oh, I'm sorry.
2 Director Woody would like to comment.

3 DIRECTOR WOODY: Good afternoon, Board.
4 Director Woody, human relations Detroit Police
5 Department. We at no time released any background
6 information on that suspect. It should be noted that
7 the media carries their own background check process.
8 They can access a lot of the same records that we can.
9 They have Lexus Nexus, a lot of different tools that
10 they use. So at no time did the Department release any
11 information.

12 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Okay. Because I know
13 the Department would not want information released on
14 the officer in terms of -- and there's always a
15 pushback in terms of getting the officer's name
16 involved, particularly if there's a discipline, if
17 there's anything like that. Particularly in this
18 particular incident, I mean the man deceased. So what
19 would be the relevance of releasing, other than what
20 the Assistant Chief said in terms of the car, the
21 carjacking, perhaps, but just this --

22 DIRECTOR WOODY: Correct. From our position,
23 sir, there would be no relevance whatsoever from us.

24 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Perhaps I need to
25 talk to the media see about this criminalization and

1 demonizing someone who's deceased.

2 CHAIRMAN BELL: Commissioner Moore.

3 A.C. DOLUNT: May I respond? I'm not trying
4 to demonize anyone, but I'm also -- I don't want people
5 to think. And sometimes they do, especially in current
6 state of the country, that our law enforcement officers
7 are just shooting people for no reason. In this
8 particular case, the officers were not aware of the
9 effect and definitely could have been seriously
10 injured. We didn't have that information. So it does
11 work both ways. I'm not demonizing anyone. I'm not
12 exonerating the police officer until the investigation
13 is complete. All I'm saying is that I have heard and
14 I've spoke to the officer myself and he's distraught
15 because he is being portrayed as this heartless killer,
16 and that's not the case. As he spoke to me, we talked.
17 It's never easy to use your weapon. It's never easy to
18 take someone's life. I'm not demonizing anybody, I'm
19 just telling people that this is what goes through
20 cops's minds when they have a split second to make a
21 decision. And when people have to make a split second
22 decision, they're going to be Monday morning
23 quarterbacked.

24 And part of my speech on the don't rush to
25 judgement on the warrant is because even though it took

1 a year for those two officers from Dearborn to be
2 exonerated, they have to live with the fact that people
3 are demonizing them because they haven't been
4 exonerated or found guilty and they have not had in
5 their minds due process. And I've gone over this with
6 several people who have had to take an individual's
7 life, and it's not an easy thing. I was not trying to
8 demonize anyone, for the record.

9 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Excuse me, for the
10 record, I think the record --

11 CHAIRMAN BELL: Could, could.

12 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Pardon me.

13 CHAIRMAN BELL: Could we pause for a minute.
14 I think Commissioner Moore, you were next.

15 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Because I never
16 implied or said the Department. I believe the record
17 will reflect in speaking to Mr. Woody that I said
18 perhaps I need to talk to the media about demonizing
19 and criminalizing this individual since it was the
20 media that put it out there. So with all due respect,
21 Assistant Chief, I didn't say you said it or the
22 Department. I said I will talk to the media and I got
23 that information from Mr. Woody who stated that the
24 Department didn't put this information out there.

25 A.C. DOLUNT: Fair enough. I will apologize

1 to you, Mr. Crawford, publicly I will apologize to
2 Commissioner Crawford. It's very emotional.

3 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: I didn't in know way
4 imply that or say that.

5 A.C. DOLUNT: Fair enough.

6 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Thank you.

7 CHAIRMAN BELL: Commissioner Moore.

8 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Just a quick question.
9 Who's responsible for DPD Live, Detroit Police
10 Department Live on Facebook?

11 DIRECTOR WOODY: That would be my department,
12 sir.

13 COMMISSIONER MOORE: So that's open for
14 anybody to go back and look that no one said about the
15 gentleman's criminal history being put out there, is
16 that correct? I think the Chief is the primary
17 spokesman.

18 DIRECTOR WOODY: That's correct, sir. And I
19 do believe that there was one particular incident that
20 was referenced but not in detail was anything provided
21 to the media to the degree that was released.

22 COMMISSIONER MOORE: What was that one
23 incident?

24 DIRECTOR WOODY: I believe he discussed a
25 carjacking incident from that actually sparked off that

1 whole --

2 COMMISSIONER MOORE: I thought I heard
3 something about a prison guard or something being
4 assaulted or something?

5 DIRECTOR WOODY: That's correct. That did
6 not have anything to do with his juvenile record. That
7 was something that occurred in 2016 and was a matter of
8 some other proceedings that may be relevant to the
9 investigation.

10 COMMISSIONER MOORE: So is that what
11 Commissioner Crawford's talking about his criminal
12 record?

13 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: With all due respect,
14 I haven't seen anything on DPD Live or anything like
15 that. The issue as was out there in the media and I
16 was just concerned about the origin of it. And even as
17 the Assistant Chief stated, and I have all the
18 confidence in the Wayne County Prosecutor, Kim Worthy,
19 in terms of her conducting her investigation so that's
20 where I, you know, in terms of at this point.

21 My statement was the man is deceased. So
22 what is the relevance of it? I mean other than getting
23 back to the statement the Assistant Chief made in terms
24 of the carjacking, you know, and that would lay perhaps
25 credence as to why this man was running because, as you

1 well know, what was reported initially, they didn't
2 even know why he was fleeing at the time.

3 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you.

4 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: And also I might add
5 too, Prosecutor Kim Worthy came to us four months ago,
6 spoke before this Commission in terms of what -- about
7 information being released in the media in terms of
8 investigations, etcetera. She did speak before this
9 Commission on that issue in terms of how investigations
10 are conducted and kind of -- well, in essence, not
11 releasing certain information or to be time sensitive.
12 Perhaps that's my statement.

13 COMMISSIONER MOORE: I believe she said it
14 was a state mandate.

15 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, sir.

16 CHAIRMAN BELL: Any other Commissioners?
17 Thank you.

18 DIRECTOR WOODY: Thank you so much.

19 CHAIRMAN BELL: These are always serious
20 issues, very sensitive in terms of any police
21 shootings, especially with a fatal shooting, so
22 investigation will go forward. And we have no control
23 of the media. The media come in so many facets in this
24 day and age, I wouldn't know where to start. But the
25 bottom line, it's the media. And, as you well know,

1 you can find out stuff over an instant by Googling
2 anybody's name and you come with etcetera, etcetera.
3 You go a little further and pay a little fee and
4 they'll be it little bit more, so it's out there. So
5 I'm glad to hear that the Department was respectful and
6 not engage in that type, but sometimes the background
7 people want to know.

8 So let's move on to -- was there anything
9 else, AC Dolunt?

10 A.C. DOLUNT: I think that's it.

11 CHAIRMAN BELL: You had a couple people join
12 us. I see two or three join us.

13 A.C. DOLUNT: Oh. Commander Bettison.

14 CHAIRMAN BELL: And Deputy Chief Washington.
15 Are we prepared for the Chief of Police Improvement
16 Plan? Is that something going to be in the future
17 perhaps?

18 SECRETARY HICKS: To my understanding is that
19 AC White was going to be present for that discussion.

20 A.C. DOLUNT: I wasn't aware of that. I'm
21 sorry.

22 CHAIRMAN BELL: We're just going to get
23 clarity if we're going to go forward. If not, we can
24 move on.

25 D.C. WASHINGTON: Yes, sir. Through the

1 Chair. Celia Washington. So there had been some
2 preliminary discussion as it relates to the Improvement
3 Plan. Documents were provided to Mr. Hicks and Ms.
4 White and we were going to have a pre-meeting, it was
5 my understanding, before the presentation, and I'm
6 still waiting to get that meeting.

7 For today, one of the items on the Board's
8 calendar of events was the Annual Report and that's
9 what we were prepared for today.

10 CHAIRMAN BELL: Okay. We'll speak to the
11 Annual Report then.

12 D.C. WASHINGTON: Yes, sir.

13 CHAIRMAN BELL: Okay. Thank you for that
14 clarity. Annual Report then.

15 CAPTAIN BLISS: Good afternoon, Board. I am
16 Captain Mark Bliss of the Fifth Precinct. Also a
17 member of the Annual Report Committee.

18 In November of 2016 under the direction of
19 James E. Craig, Assistant Chief James E. White
20 established the Annual Report Committee which is
21 comprised of Second Deputy Chief Celia Banks
22 Washington, Director Michael Woody, myself, Lieutenant
23 Sonia Russell, Lieutenant Melissa Gardner, Lieutenant
24 Carrie Sloan, Lieutenant Franklin Hayes, Sergeant Rumel
25 D. Alexander, sergeant Alan Quinn, Corporal Stacy

1 Amering, Police Officer Gregory Matthews, Rose Love and
2 Elena Farmer of the City of Detroit's Creative Services
3 Department.

4 The Committee's objective is to create an
5 annual report that focuses on our members and our
6 achievements. The 2015 Annual Report was constructed
7 from the ground up specifically detailing what sections
8 were to be focussed on and how the information was to
9 be presented to the reader. There were many ideas
10 developed and implemented in the first report that will
11 be carried over to the 2016 version. The format will
12 remain mostly the same with the order of the sections
13 being slightly modified for updated material. The
14 following changes will we made to the 2016 report.
15 First, the community partnership's page will now
16 reflect a new individual each year.

17 Secondly, the officers in charge of the
18 department specialized units and platoons will be added
19 and identified.

20 Third, the unsung officers supervisor section
21 well be replaced. The officer in charge of each
22 platoon will be highlighted in the precinct section.
23 And finally, a revised memorial page will be produced.
24 In addition to these changes, all department personnel
25 will be updated to include appointments, promotions,

1 new members and retirees. With the layout finalized,
2 other facets of the report can be revised to present
3 the reader with a familiar but new product. Currently,
4 the committee is in the process of data collection and
5 selection of photographs for the book. In addition,
6 the written sections are being reviewed and refreshed
7 with more content. Report is scheduled to be completed
8 by the end of February and we're on track to make that
9 date. Any questions?

10 CHAIRMAN BELL: Commissioners? Well, we look
11 forward to receiving the annual report. Completion
12 probably going to be the end of the month so somewhere
13 along in March in that time.

14 CAPTAIN BLISS: We'll have a working draft
15 probably by the end of February, beginning of March.
16 Then we'll be presenting something. You'll probably
17 see the draft before anything else is finalized.

18 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you, Captain.

19 CAPTAIN BLISS: Thank you.

20 CHAIRMAN BELL: The next item would be the
21 Criminal Justice System Liaison program is going to be
22 coming before us. Commission, you have a handout here.
23 Little housekeeping before they start speaking and
24 identify themselves. Back table there are some cards.
25 Have you collect cards?

1 MS. UNDERWOOD: Not yet.

2 CHAIRMAN BELL: I'm sorry. We're going to
3 circulate. If you want to speak when we get down to
4 that point in the agenda, put your name on the card and
5 staff will call you up in that order. So this is your
6 opportunity to fill out the card and we ask you comply
7 with that process as we try to initiate a little order
8 in terms of how we're conducting our order. And I just
9 went to say you have two minutes and you're speaking to
10 the Board and be respectful because we respect you in
11 terms of coming out this afternoon at our meeting and
12 give you that floor so we want to make sure that we do
13 things properly and thank you. Yes, sir.

14 MR. HOWARD: Good afternoon, Board. My name
15 is Norris Howard. I'm representing, as you can see
16 from the pamphlet, Central City Integrated Health. It
17 is a community reentry division that I am the division
18 manager for. And one of the things that we're here
19 today is to introduce you and give the Board
20 information about a position that has been developed
21 with the cooperation of the Detroit Wayne Mental Health
22 Authority for a criminal justice systems liaison. And
23 this is an individual that will work with the community
24 as well as criminal justice system and the court system
25 to identify those individuals with a mental illness

1 that may be assisted and diverted both from the jails
2 as well as going into the jails and to reduce
3 recidivism for those individuals that we come into
4 contact with as well as to help those reintegrate into
5 the community.

6 If you refer to the sheet that looks like
7 this, I've also been tasked by the state a diversion
8 council to develop a system-wide program that would
9 address each of the five intercept points that you see
10 before you. The intercept point that we would like to
11 work with the Detroit Police Department with would be
12 intercept position one, number one and that's the
13 community, and I will have Mr. Matthew speak to you
14 about his position as that liaison.

15 MR. BROWN: Good afternoon, Board. For
16 record, my name is Matthew Brown. I am a licensed
17 Masters of Social Work and I have a full license in
18 dealing with the Community Mental Health System. So my
19 position as a criminal justice systems liaison would be
20 to both interact with the individuals in the community
21 while also interacting with all different systems
22 across the criminal justice system. We are working
23 with the courts. We are work with Pastor Barry. We've
24 been working with Detroit/Wayne Mental Health
25 Authority. So any system that is within the criminal

1 justice kind of auspices, we will be functioning to
2 bridge any gaps. And to kind of put this into context,
3 we designed this program to identify those who are kind
4 of falling between the cracks. So the people who might
5 be indigent or individuals in the community that might
6 be at risk of committing a crime due to mental illness,
7 substance abuse and also, well, one of the pieces to
8 highlight is the intellectual and developmental
9 abilities.

10 So just as us working in the jails, we also
11 want to try and work at getting services connected with
12 individual's pre-arrest, and that's what my position is
13 designated to do. And if you can refer to this form,
14 it's a basic program outline of my position and the
15 beginning piece we'll discuss the primary intended
16 outcomes and then also at the very bottom would be the
17 scope of service for your review. So please, if any
18 questions, I'm more than willing to answer.

19 CHAIRMAN BELL: Commissioners, questions or
20 concerns?

21 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: I have a question.

22 CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, ma'am.

23 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: For the police, are
24 there any police being trained now in any kind of
25 program to interact with people with mental illness?

1 Can they identify with them? Is there any system or
2 program going on now?

3 A.C. DOLUNT: Commander Bettison? Commander
4 Bettison. Commander Bettison. Did you hear the
5 question from commissioner?

6 COMMANDER BETTISON: I believe I did hear the
7 question. I'll repeat it to make sure that I did hear
8 it. Is the Detroit Police Department providing mental
9 illness, mental illness training to our officers. The
10 answer is absolutely yes. In our academy in our
11 40-hour training, all of our department members receive
12 training as far as mental illness, awareness, things to
13 look out for. So yes. Thank you.

14 CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes Commissioner.

15 COMMISSIONER SHELBY: Through the Chair. Are
16 you asking the Detroit Police Department to contact you
17 when the officers come into contact with individuals
18 suffering from mental illness?

19 COMMANDER BETTISON: Yes. We are putting
20 together the ability for you to contact us and we will
21 have transportation to come to whatever site you're at.
22 We also have temporary housing, if that's the issue.
23 We can also take that person to a -- we're a qualified
24 healthcare facility, so if there are other issues,
25 housing issues, whatever we --

1 COMMISSIONERS SHELBY: Because correct me if
2 I'm wrong, generally we take them to the Crisis Center
3 when we come across an individual.

4 COMMANDER BETTISON: What we're looking at is
5 those individuals that aren't in a crisis but at risk
6 for becoming a crisis without any intervention.

7 A.C. DOLUNT: I'm not sure -- I don't want to
8 sound ignorant, but I'm not sure how -- I can have
9 mental issues and you can come in contact and you might
10 not know it. So how -- as the officers, how would you
11 know that I have mental illness?

12 COMMANDER BETTISON: But if you would suspect
13 that a person has some issues that, that doesn't put
14 them in an emergency situation at that time, then you
15 can contact us.

16 MS. WASHINGTON: Celia Washington. Again,
17 through the Chair. So this is not a new topic, and we
18 have had conversations, I believe, with your agency in
19 the past. And there were some things that needed to be
20 worked through. One of those particularly was the
21 ability to identify those types of individuals. The
22 bigger piece was where do they go. And the last
23 conversations I was involved in, that had not been
24 resolved.

25 At one point that there was a facility that

1 may have been overcontrolled by an agency, but we knew
2 for sure that the DBC wasn't appropriate and that Wayne
3 County Jail was not appropriate. So there are some
4 logistics and we'll be happy to resume those
5 conversations, but I know that's a couple year's worth
6 of conversations that I've been involved in.

7 CHAIRMAN BELL: Commissioner Moore?

8 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Just a quick question.
9 Are you a 24-hour facility?

10 MR. BROWN: Our services are 24 hours.

11 A.C. DOLUNT: That's a good question because
12 if your services are 24 hours.

13 MR. BROWN: Yes.

14 A.C. DOLUNT: But if I'm working midnights.

15 MR. BROWN: And you get in touch with us and
16 you have an individual that needs some type of
17 services, we have what we developed our transitional
18 housing room and board and that person will take them
19 to, and then one of our staff will go and work with
20 that person.

21 A.C. DOLUNT: So it's not a committal.

22 MR. BROWN: No, it's not a committal.

23 A.C. DOLUNT: I can't make them go though,
24 right?

25 MR. BROWN: No. It's all voluntary.

1 CHAIRMAN BELL: Commissioner Carter.

2 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Through the Chair. So
3 do you have to be referred by the Police Department?
4 Can a community member refer someone to you?

5 MR. BROWN: Community member, anyone. We're
6 open to the community at-large. It's a community
7 liaison.

8 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you.

9 MR. BROWN: You're welcome.

10 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: How long have you been
11 in existence?

12 MR. BROWN: Central City Integrated Health or
13 this particular program?

14 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: This program.

15 MR. BROWN: This program, his position is a
16 pilot program. We've been doing jail diversion and
17 prison reentry since 1997 and we were formerly known as
18 Detroit Central City Integrated Health, but now that
19 we're a qualified healthcare facility we have
20 re-branded to Central City Integrated Health.

21 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: So you have
22 experience.

23 MR. BROWN: Yes, sir.

24 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Through the Chair.

25 CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes.

1 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: So you are working
2 with the Wayne County Jail System.

3 MR. BROWN: Yes. As a matter of fact, we're
4 putting in completion touches on a MOU and we'll be
5 able to gain access into the jails to begin the
6 services working with the individuals. We're also, the
7 Mental Health Point Program, working with Judge King so
8 that's also one of the programs that is a part of our
9 organization.

10 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, sir. I work in
11 the Wayne County Jail. There is a lot of work needed
12 in the Wayne County Jail. Those individuals bond case
13 dismissed or whatever and they're released back out
14 into the communities.

15 MR. BROWN: We're also working a pilot
16 program where we can actually start seeing the bonders
17 right before they're released, and we've been working
18 with the tether division to identify those individuals
19 with mental health issues that are being released on
20 tethers and we will actually pick that person up and
21 take them to the point of contact where they can
22 receive services.

23 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Thank you, sir.

24 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Are you working on
25 locating a facility now, because there are a lot of

1 empty buildings around in Detroit?

2 MR. BROWN: No, ma'am. That is not part of
3 what our program is doing. That's more on the
4 authority's side. But yes, they are looking at trying
5 to get that in place. And I am familiar with that
6 project that they were working on. And it was, it was
7 difficult to try to find a facility that wasn't a
8 crisis center, but more or less like a urgent care
9 center that the officers could take the person and drop
10 them off, but it required so much conversation that
11 they're still working on that. So in lieu of that,
12 we've come up with this.

13 CHAIRMAN BELL: Any other comments from the
14 Board? If not, what I heard from Deputy Chief
15 Washington, she's somewhat familiar with your program
16 and she's willing to interface with you and perhaps
17 work something out in terms of a formal, semiformal
18 whatever process. I would strongly suggest that you
19 contact her and she's willing to work with you on
20 behalf of the Department to see where that goes. Yes.

21 COMMISSIONER MOORE: I just want to thank
22 Chaplain Barry for bringing you here today. He's from
23 the 2nd Precinct. He's part of District 7 and the
24 majority of the residents that usually attend are from
25 District 7. Thank you.

1 CHAIRMAN BELL: I think Chaplain Barry took
2 the initiative from a couple of weeks ago we had this
3 discussion about mental health, how can we serve our
4 community with so many people falling so we appreciate
5 you coming before us. I just hope you take advantage
6 of what's been offered by DC Washington trying to
7 really work. There's such a need.

8 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: Yeah, there is.
9 Absolutely.

10 CHAIRMAN BELL: There's a tremendous need,
11 unfortunate so many instances that people need that
12 type of assistance.

13 COMMISSIONER SANDERS: Especially in District
14 7.

15 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: All Districts.

16 CHAIRMAN BELL: All districts. Citywide.
17 Nationwide, really. Thank you. Thank you. Appreciate
18 it.

19 CHAIRMAN BELL: Standing committees reporting
20 out at this time? If not, ad-hoc committee, we would
21 like to hear in terms of -- we always want to hear from
22 about recruiting. Anything you want to share with us
23 just say we're recruiting. That would be fine. But
24 however you want to approach it.

25 MS. BROOKS: We are recruiting. We have run

1 into a little difficulty with raising money for
2 Driver's Ed for Cody. Cody was one of the schools that
3 was on the list. And so some of the funders that I've
4 had set up meetings with, I'm delaying them until we
5 can find out how we can do it because they have told me
6 they will not give money to the schools. So I'm
7 working with Lieutenant Gardner and the Police
8 Foundation to see how we can fund it into the Police
9 Station's 501c3, and that's all I'm going to speak of
10 that. I will tell you more when we get more plans
11 together. Thank you.

12 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you.

13 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHÉ: If I could just
14 add, we are going to be putting a calendar together as
15 well. We're going to be meeting very soon to put a
16 calendar together. But we are looking at recently
17 there was a fair, a career fair at the Northwest
18 Activities Center with the Sheriff's Department and the
19 Detroit Police Department Director, and I think there
20 was a lot of -- we were able to get a lot of candidates
21 that way. So we're looking at doing that at the other
22 one stops as well so we'll be coming up with a calendar
23 real soon to do that because it was very successful,
24 right?

25 MS. OXENDINE: Yes, it was.

1 CHAIRMAN BELL: Director Gail, how many
2 openings do we still have off the top approximate? We
3 want to make sure the public's aware that we are
4 aggressively recruiting good people for the Detroit
5 Police Department.

6 MS. OXENDINE: Give me one second so I can
7 tell you exactly.

8 CHAIRMAN BELL: See what I mean by you can
9 just pop it right up.

10 MS. OXENDINE: Yes, sir. For the record,
11 Gail Oxendine Human Resources Director. I have 130
12 positions as of Monday.

13 CHAIRMAN BELL: Okay. So that 200 figure is
14 no longer there. So we have 130. So you have been
15 busy.

16 MS. OXENDINE: 130.

17 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you. Thank you.

18 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: And also I have one
19 other. Lieutenant Gardner and I will be meeting, and
20 I'm going to tell you, I know his first name is
21 Reginald. I think he's a police chaplain. I cannot
22 remember his last name at this moment but we have a
23 meeting with him tomorrow to discuss recruiting in that
24 area. So as I said before, we are working. We really
25 want to give the mayor 40 a month so we're working hard

1 on that.

2 CHAIRMAN BELL: Okay. Outstanding. Thank
3 you for that update.

4 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Through the chair.

5 CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, sir.

6 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, sir. Reporting
7 out from the to Policy Committee meeting. The Policy
8 Committee had a meeting at 1:30 today prior to this
9 one. Myself -- well, I was present along with
10 Commissioner Moore and also Mr. Hicks and also Ms.
11 White. In reviewing the draft policy for electronic
12 control weapons and also training directive for the
13 body-worn cameras, I want to thank attorney Washington
14 for getting the information to us and also to thank Mr.
15 Hicks and Ms. White for appropriately and efficiently
16 putting together or gathering the information. Next
17 week Thursday, is that correct, Mr. Hicks, Policy
18 Committee would like to -- well, it is a presentation
19 by Assistant Chief White. Also I'd like to thank
20 Assistant Chief White.

21 CHAIRMAN BELL: Could we pause on that type
22 of announcement? Just -- I'll talk to you about it.
23 Can we just pause on that?

24 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, sir.

25 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you. Thank you. Any

1 other committee want to report out? Mr. Hicks, Board
2 Secretary.

3 SECRETARY HICKS: Thank you, Mr. Chair. I
4 have nothing, no additional information in the form of
5 report for this evening.

6 CHAIRMAN BELL: Okay. Thank you. Any old
7 business?

8 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Mr. Chair, just quick
9 question. What is Sun Guard? Can anyone in the
10 Department speak to Sun Guard?

11 A.C. DOLUNT: It is the new report system and
12 it has to deal with -- I'm not an expert on it.

13 CHAIRMAN BELL: Commander Bettison, come on
14 down.

15 COMMANDER BETTISON: I'm not the technical
16 expert on it, but it's an all-in-one system as far as
17 it's a records management system. It's a CAD system
18 and it's property system. So finally our major
19 technologies as far as communication can talk. So CAD
20 is Computer Aided Dispatch. So with our 911 system,
21 now the police run automatically gets incorporated into
22 the police report so that the records management system
23 so it's going to make our department a lot more
24 efficient. And they brought it on in phases and we're
25 training, we have provided training to all department

1 members and we're currently continuing to train and
2 it's all-in-one. It's something that we were really
3 moving forward on to be able to bring our department
4 where it needs to be as far as technology. It allowed
5 us to do the thing that we need to do.

6 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Ultimately just replaces
7 CRISNET.

8 COMMANDER BETTISON: It replaces CRISNET from
9 the incident reporting piece of it, but before when we
10 just had CRISNET, or CAD, our computer aided dispatch
11 system was completely different. That was Tiburan. So
12 they really, they didn't talk, whereas in other
13 departments looking at best practices, it's best when
14 they're all connected. So now finally we have systems
15 that are interconnected and it's going to increase our
16 efficiency tremendously.

17 COMMISSIONER MOORE: Thank you, sir.

18 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: One question. When I
19 was in the department they went to CRISNET and CRIS
20 didn't talk to NET. Trust me, it was very difficult,
21 initially. This, as you just stated, so Sun is going
22 to talk to Guard, is that correct?

23 COMMANDER BETTISON: Absolutely. And one of
24 the things that we did before we went to it, it was a
25 lot of research put into, you know, picking the best

1 system and actually doing demos. And we had the actual
2 officers come into the demo sessions looking at a lot
3 of different systems, and it's really the rank, and
4 file and the end users who actually made
5 recommendations to pick this system and,
6 overwhelmingly, this is the system that they chose to
7 go with as far as functionality.

8 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: And they do not have
9 to drive back to the precinct, as we did many years
10 ago, to do a CRISNET report.

11 COMMANDER BETTISON: They're working through
12 all that.

13 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Thank you.

14 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you. Are we good?

15 A.C. DOLUNT: AC White's here. Commissioner
16 Moore wanted to know exactly what Sun Guard was.

17 COMMISSIONER MOORE: I was actually satisfied
18 with Commander Bettison.

19 CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, ma'am.

20 MS. DEWAELSCHÉ: Mr. Chair, I just have a
21 comment. I guess it would be considered old business.
22 I wanted to commend the Department for the work that
23 they did along with several other departments to close
24 down Victory Inn on Michigan Avenue, which is right
25 across the street from our Workforce Development

1 Agency. I cannot tell you how many decades that motel
2 has been there, and there has been a lot of drug
3 trafficking, a lot of prostitution on Michigan Avenue.
4 And we are a training center and we have now a lot of
5 youth programs and is has been just horrible having
6 that motel across the street. I know that it's been
7 closed down for a year. At least that's what I've
8 read. I don't know if there's anything you can tell us
9 more about it.

10 AC DOLUNT: I was told in the courts it had
11 to sell it and sell all the fixtures. And it's a
12 chain, for what's that worth. This was the worst
13 offender. They have to divest everything from there.

14 MS. DEWAELSCHÉ: And it turned out to be,
15 from what I read, an international ring.

16 A.C. DOLUNT: Human trafficking.

17 MS. DEWAELSCHÉ: Yes. Very dangerous. And
18 so it is so much safer, so much nicer now to go to work
19 because a lot of the people that went there would be on
20 Michigan Avenue and people coming into our center would
21 be accosted by the -- approached and accosted in a
22 verbal way. I'm just saying. But we thank you. We're
23 very very appreciative. Anything that we can do to
24 keep it closed, please let us know.

25 A.C. DOLUNT: Yes, ma'am.

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COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN BELL: That's good news. Appreciate it. So we covered old business. New business? Announcements? The next meeting's going to be on Thursday, February 23rd, 2017 at 3 p.m. Public Safety Headquarters 1301 Third Street right here. Our next community meeting in March on the second Thursday, March 9 would be 6:30 p.m. We're going to be at Downtown Service Wayne County Community College 810 West Fort Street. I'm looking forward to that because that would be our spring meeting, March, the quarter and they have -- Wayne County do such an outstanding job of criminal justice students training and that type area so we want to interface from recruiting and Inspector James Jackson is a former longtime Commander of the Detroit Police Department Academy back when Commissioner Crawford was in the academy and George Anthony, our former Board Secretary, and there's quite a few staff members that we wanted to try to interact, try to gather some of these young people, try to expose them to DPD and the Board of Police Commission, especially DPD in terms of going in and come and teach criminal justice there and all the campus throughout. Hopefully we can really galvanize that type of awareness on March 9th along with the community coming

1 out for the meeting too so we really want to promote
2 that.

3 That covers announcement. Oral communication
4 from the audience. As I stated, come and do the honor.
5 Please give your name and your comments two minute and
6 we're going to -- Mr. Hicks is going to do honors
7 Hicks.

8 SECRETARY HICKS: Yes. Mr. Chair, we have
9 five individuals who've signed up for -- to speak -- to
10 address the Board and the first individual is Eric
11 Blount to be followed by Kiana Suggs. So Mr. Blount,
12 if you can come forth and Ms. Suggs can follow.

13 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you.

14 MR. BLOUNT: Thank you, Board. I come before
15 you just as a lifelong member and resident of the City
16 of Detroit. Between my wife and I we average over 60
17 years in this city. Tuesday's fatal shooting was very
18 disheartening on many levels. And just hear me out.
19 As we see how the Dearborn Police Department handles
20 masked gunmen coming into their police precinct and not
21 a shot being fired. So and along with that, the Chief
22 of Police Commission the study not that long ago whose
23 findings were released that said that there was growing
24 and systemic recidivism within the Detroit Police
25 department. All of that is the backdrop for Tuesday's

1 incident where you just have to -- your heart breaks
2 wondering where are the body cameras. Why wasn't a
3 taser used instead of a lethal weapon. So just as a
4 lifelong Detroiter, I want you to hear our concerns,
5 our worries and I'd just like for someone or anyone or
6 everyone to address it, please.

7 CHAIRMAN BELL: AC Dolunt?

8 AC DOLUNT: As far as the tasers, we are
9 doing a study on that. We have not been approved yet.
10 There's no timeline on that. The Chief has tired to
11 get tasers and we had some resistance. We're working
12 through the taser incident. And again, the shooting
13 was very unfortunate. Yes, I do give kudos to the
14 Dearborn Police Department. They used great restraint.
15 When masked men come in with AR-15s or AK-47s, whatever
16 it is, and they're told to get down. They finally did
17 get down. I do give them a lot of credit. They were
18 at a distance. And according to the video I've seen
19 from the subjects that were arrested, in this
20 particular case under investigation, it was a close
21 contact and I'm going to let the results of the
22 investigation. But we don't have tasers. That why
23 tasers were not used.

24 MR. BLOUNT: Can I just follow up? What's
25 the plan?

1 CHAIRMAN BELL: No. No. We can't go back
2 and forth with dialog, sir, at this time. Could we
3 just pause for one second. Commissioner Crawford?

4 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, sir. Through
5 the Chair. Yes, sir. In reference to the tasers, and
6 that's what's I just referenced earlier about
7 electronic control device. It's in committee now and
8 I'm the Chair of the Policy Committee and that's what I
9 referenced earlier about that 1:30 meeting because
10 there is a drafted policy. The board, it hasn't even
11 come before this board for a vote.

12 So in terms of the body cams, it has been two
13 and a half years or actually three years when we took a
14 seat on this Commission. So it's roughly been two and
15 a half years. It was a pilot program or even we moved
16 beyond a pilot program in two precincts. But I do
17 concur with what you're saying in terms of because in
18 this particular incident it's just the officer out
19 there and the deceased individual. So if we had a body
20 cam, it would perhaps bring a little bit more to the
21 table or to somewhat be able to tell the story as to
22 what happened out there. But I respect the
23 investigation of the Department, the Task Force and
24 particularly Wayne County Prosecutor Kim Worthy to
25 review it.

1 CHAIRMAN BELL: You'll hear from Commissioner
2 Burton and AC White want to respond.

3 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you, Mr.
4 Chairman. I'd just like to add, I've been advocating
5 for our Department to have tasers since 2014 and I'm
6 just optimistic that this department will have tasers
7 in the near future. But I've been advocating since
8 2014. Some of the other Commissioners have been
9 advocating as well. But the Department has come a long
10 way. The Department came a long way and a lot of
11 progress has been made and you know we just approved
12 body cams a year ago. The Department is in the third
13 pilot phase. And so we are moving in the right
14 direction, but I am optimistic that tasers will come to
15 this Department.

16 CHAIRMAN BELL: AC white?

17 AC WHITE: Good afternoon, Board. James
18 White, for the record. With regards to the body
19 camera, the body camera deployment now sits at
20 Precincts 4, 7 and we're completing 11. The deployment
21 strategy is one precinct per month. The phase that
22 everyone is speaking about is when we were in the
23 testing phase or the phase that we called our risk
24 mitigation phase where we identified a number of issues
25 with the body camera. As the Board is aware, we wanted

1 the seamless integration between the in-car video and
2 the body camera. So that did, in fact, delay the
3 deployment. We don't make that or use that as an
4 excuse, that's a fact, and by the end of this year we
5 anticipate completing the full deployment for the
6 Police Department.

7 With regards to the taser, I think we have to
8 be careful with the taser deployment and not
9 necessarily using the taser as a solution to this
10 circumstances without having all the facts. I think
11 we're very fortunate to have a very transparent chief
12 who keeps the community abreast of every issue that's
13 going through the Department at the time that it's
14 happening in realtime.

15 And if you look at the taser in the way the
16 tasers are deployed across the country and particularly
17 how we will model our policy, the taser is a hard hand
18 weapon and it is not a deadly force weapon. So let's
19 wait till the determination is made on this case before
20 we determine if a taser was the appropriate weapon to
21 use at the time. But having a taser at this
22 circumstance or with this situation may have been
23 inconsequential to the outcome.

24 CHAIRMAN BELL: And I agree with you
25 wholeheartedly, AC White, because there's pros and cons

1 about the use of tasers too and we work through the
2 whole concept. So there's no magic wand in reference
3 to tasers or body camera solutions to issues that
4 officers are facing and sometimes it turns out to be
5 deadly or shooting. We just have to work through in
6 terms of the investigation process and rely on the
7 system to function in that capacity. So we hear you,
8 sir, we are concerned, but unfortunate it's something
9 that we offer condolence to the family and definitely
10 we're concerned, as been stated by AC Dolunt, about the
11 officer involved in the shooting, so it's something
12 that we all have to deal with and bear, and the facts
13 come out in terms of what has transpired.

14 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: I have one question.
15 In terms of our Consent Decree and some of the other
16 things that came out of Washington in the Obama
17 Administration. We're not pushing back from any of
18 those, are we, I mean in terms of the Department?
19 Because I have real concerns about attorney general,
20 Jeff Sessions, the new attorney general. And I read
21 the Rosa Parks letter to congress in terms of when he
22 was he was seeking federal judgeship and he was denied
23 that due to the history of Mr. Sessions. And there are
24 those who not only in this community but across the
25 country have concerns as to whether or not departments

1 will look the other way, some of them perhaps even tear
2 up those Consent Decrees and not enforce them. And if
3 there is any pushback, I'd like to know.

4 AC WHITE: There is no pushback. Certainly
5 we've been a constitutionally police agency, I feel,
6 for a number of years, and certainly the federal
7 government concurs with us by virtue of the fact that
8 we're no longer under a Consent Judgement.

9 With regards to the current administration,
10 his philosophy, I have not had an opportunity to look
11 at that report. I did look at the previous
12 administration's report on policing and community
13 policing and we've adopted a number of those policies.
14 I do believe that the city is a model police agency.
15 When you look at our NPO program, when you look at
16 transparency that our Chief operates with, certainly it
17 starts at the top. If you look at our relationship
18 with our community, we find that relationship to not
19 only be important, but it's part of what we do as a law
20 enforcement agency. It's not the police and community,
21 it's us working together. So that's why we've had some
22 of the success that we've had.

23 As we all know, the Chief constantly pushes
24 community policing efforts really by example. He's
25 always out in the field. He's always out in the

1 community. We joke with him. We call him Hollywood
2 because he's always out in the community doing
3 something with the community and it happens to get on
4 television. And I say that somewhat tongue in cheek,
5 but he's very committed and passionate about community
6 interactions and it certainly starts there and that's
7 why we've enjoyed the success that we've had. We don't
8 pat ourselves on the back by the success that we've
9 had, we're looking at how can we make our relationship
10 with the community better.

11 So we're going to have incidents such as
12 these, unfortunately, in law enforcement. We're going
13 to have a transparent and full investigation. We're
14 going to turn our findings over to the prosecutor's
15 office. But my purpose of addressing the Board today
16 was just to speak to the fact that a taser is not
17 designed to be a deadly force weapon. I will assure
18 the Board, though, when we present our policy that it
19 will be a thoughtful policy. It will be well written.
20 It will be drafted in such a way that is easily
21 digestible by the Board and the community and I'll be
22 available to answer any questions that should come up.

23 CHAIRMAN BELL: And thank you. And some
24 people are not going to we happy if we approve tasers,
25 as you well know, so it's something that we have to

1 deal with. We think it's the right thing to do and
2 we'll be moving forward on that particular issue, but
3 some people are still not going to be happy with it in
4 terms of my understanding. There's going to be
5 opposition, but I think it's something that the
6 Department needs to engage in and I think this Board is
7 going to be supportive of that. Thank you, sir.

8 AC WHITE: Thank you.

9 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: On a final note, all
10 politics are local and I might add all power politics
11 are local. That's a reference to what's going on in
12 Washington DC.

13 CHAIRMAN BELL: All right. Thank you. Mr.
14 Hicks.

15 SECRETARY HICKS: Yes. Ms. Suggs to be
16 followed by Bernice Smith.

17 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you.

18 MS. SUGGS: Hello, everyone. My name is
19 Kiana Suggs. I was born and raised here in Detroit.
20 I'm here because I'm asking for results. I moved back
21 to the Detroit area September of 2016, well, August,
22 end of August, beginning of September, and I have
23 encountered aggravated stalking. I've made at least
24 seven reports within the past four months and one of
25 the issues that I've been following up consistently is

1 that this new system came in January the 1st. My
2 reports haven't been found. I probably walked into the
3 6th Precinct maybe ten times. I maybe placed over 20
4 phone calls with DPD. I've been down here probably
5 about five times. Not even that.

6 When you're in a situation like that you
7 encounter police officers who are scout, who patrol the
8 are whom look at the situation as if they can't even
9 help me with certain situations. Come to my home. I
10 had to leave my home. I am in hiding it's gotten to
11 that point. So all I'm asking is can you put
12 someone -- I've gone through the chain of command. I
13 haven't gotten any help from this precinct.

14 Not to knock people. I've got two people,
15 two officers, I think his name is Michael Laforge and
16 Melissa Evans, they patrol the area, but for them to
17 come and see me washing paint off my car at 3:00 in the
18 morning, they have on their nice uniforms or come to my
19 home where somebody broke in three times in one day.
20 They can't baby-sit me.

21 So let me say this, you do have some good
22 people. I mean I pretty much say everybody, but right
23 now maybe the ball has been dropped with me. I'm just
24 asking for some results and no apathy.

25 CHAIRMAN BELL: If you talked to Commander

1 Bettison, he's waving his hand, and if you need to talk
2 to the Chief Investigator or her team you can do that.
3 But you can speak to him now and maybe step outside.
4 If you're not satisfied you can always -- one of our
5 staff member also interact with you. Thank you for
6 bringing it to our attention.

7 MS. SUGGS: Thank you, very much.

8 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you.

9 SECRETARY HICKS: Mr. Chair, the next speaker
10 is a Bernice Smith to be followed by Kathleen Pope.

11 MS. SMITH: Good afternoon, Chief and the
12 commission. Bernice Smith, political activist. First
13 of all, I'd like to send my condolences to you in
14 regards to your family. Church was to a capacity
15 showing their love for you. So I want to extend my
16 condolences to you.

17 For several weeks now, well, three weeks ago
18 I was cohost on a radio program. I stated the problems
19 that we had in the Medical Center in regards to the
20 towing. In the meantime, what has happened, there's a
21 listener that calls in after I get through talking and
22 she does -- in other words, she calls me names that I'm
23 not this and I'm a flunky for the Police Department.
24 And so what I respond that particular day, I told her I
25 said well, I'm going to do like the Obamas do, you go

1 low and I go high. So that was the end of that.

2 This past Friday, I had an operation. I am
3 blessed to be here. I had a kidney stone that was
4 removed. I thought it was my kidney and I thought you
5 guys wasn't going to see me anymore. But anyway. Good
6 Lord said I got more work to do so I'm here. She went
7 on the air Sunday under Senator Young's program. She
8 did the same thing. Mother Bernice is this and that.
9 And she didn't come to -- there was a convention
10 Saturday at Cobo Hall, which most of you know,
11 democratic convention, she spoke in that respect, she
12 didn't name a name other than Mother Bernice. And she
13 said she did show up because I was looking for her
14 because I had something I was going to tell her and she
15 used a little profanity.

16 CHAIRMAN BELL: Ms. Smith, Ms. Smith. Could
17 you --

18 MS. SMITH: Can I finish, please, because
19 this is serious?

20 CHAIRMAN BELL: Could you, could you pause
21 for a minute. We don't entertain personal dialog what
22 you might have. Do you have a specific question or
23 concern for this Board?

24 MS. SMITH: I have concern for the fact that
25 I have been threatened twice. She did it Tuesday. I

1 have tapes now. I called Commander and he told me to
2 present it to the Board, okay? So I'm not just
3 standing up here taking up your time. My life has been
4 threatened because of the fact she made statement
5 Saturday at the convention on the radio because I did
6 show up to the convention. Now, I think that's serious
7 enough. Not only has she insulted Helen Moore, she
8 insulted Talabi. So am I number three on the Board?
9 I'm not going to take it, not at all. So I'm doing the
10 right thing by coming to the Board and reporting it
11 because I want to a police protection order. My
12 children has stated that I need to.

13 CHAIRMAN BELL: Ms. Smith, you want to file a
14 police complaint against someone, is that correct?

15 MS. SMITH: I am going to do that today. I
16 was told that. You won't let me finish nothing.

17 CHAIRMAN BELL: I'm just trying to get you --

18 MS. SMITH: I know the procedure. I'm not
19 going out and getting a gun, even though I have one. I
20 know what the procedure is. I'm going to go to her and
21 file it and then I'm going to tell Bettison where the
22 tapes are, okay? That's what I got to say.

23 CHAIRMAN BELL: Ms. Smith, we do not take
24 that type of complaint. What you've got you've to file
25 with the Police Department, not with the Board of

1 Police Commission.

2 MS. SMITH: Well, you know the Board of
3 Police Commission should do more in regard to public
4 and I leave it like that because I do have complaints
5 about the Board too. People have asked me to run for
6 it. I don't want to run for it. I want to be just
7 where I am so I can tell you what you're doing wrong.

8 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you, ma'am.

9 MS. SMITH: Now, can I give her --

10 CHAIRMAN BELL: Ma'am, we do not take that
11 type of complaint. Thank you. Would you call the next
12 person, please?

13 SECRETARY HICKS: Kathleen Pope is the next
14 speaker to be followed by Catherine Richardson.

15 MS. POPE: Good afternoon. My name is
16 Kathleen Pope and I'm the account manager to the
17 Medical Center Court Apartments for Goch & Son's Towing
18 and I wanted to come before the Board today because
19 we've heard that there's been a couple of gentlemen
20 that have been making disparaging remarks about our
21 towing practices over at the apartments. I wanted to
22 set the record straight because this actually stems
23 from a competitor through Breakthrough Towing. We've
24 had an injunction against Breakthrough Towing. They
25 initially were blocking us doing business at the

1 Medical Center Courts like we were contracted to do.
2 When a judge issued an injunction, then all of a sudden
3 these two gentlemen which have appeared before this
4 Board which never used their real names with this
5 Board, their names are actually James Milton and Marvel
6 Milton. They stand out on the corner. They tell
7 people that we tow 500 cars out of there a day. We
8 pull pregnant women out of their cars, elderly people
9 out of their cars to tow them. This is absolutely
10 false.

11 There is an injunction against both the
12 Milton brothers. Just late last year a \$10,000 bench
13 warrant was issued for each of them for continuing to
14 ignore the injunction. In addition to that, many of
15 our driver's employees have PPO's against the Miltons
16 and James Milton has a felony stalking warrant out for
17 him due to physical threats that he's made against
18 drivers.

19 More disparaging than that is simply the fact
20 to make these statements that we tow unethically,
21 private property impounding, I mean it's not a popular
22 business. A lot of towing companies won't even do it,
23 but I can assure this Board that we would not be in
24 business since 1926. We're family owned. If we didn't
25 operate ethically and in accordance to the laws, we

1 wouldn't hold contracts with the Michigan State Police
2 or local municipalities or have done work with the FBI
3 or the Federal Reserve.

4 And I do have some copies just real quickly.
5 I know my time is up. I'm a woman. I can talk
6 forever. But it shows the injunctions, it shows the
7 contempt of court and it shows pictures of the Milton
8 brothers. So if I can just leave them with the Board.

9 CHAIRMAN BELL: Commissioner Crawford.

10 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Through the Chair.
11 Yes, ma'am. Your company has a contract with that
12 private property, is that correct?

13 MS. POPE: Yes.

14 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: How long have you had
15 the contract.

16 MS. POPE: I believe it is almost five years
17 now.

18 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: And when did these
19 issues start to occur?

20 MS. POPE: Almost four years. First they
21 would bring their trucks and they would block and they
22 would tell people not to park there, which -- I mean
23 life would be easier. The bulk of the angry customers
24 that we get comes from people whose vehicles are
25 impounded. We've put up additional signs. We've tried

1 to come up with different ways.

2 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: But this goes far
3 beyond the issues of them telling, because anyone can
4 stand there and tell people don't park there.

5 MS. POPE: Absolutely.

6 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: You're about to get
7 your car towed.

8 MS. POPE: But they're not community
9 activists like they portray themselves to be, nor are
10 they concerned citizens, they're actually employees of
11 Breakthrough Towing. They've come here. I reviewed
12 your videos. They've used names like Kareem, Sharif.
13 It's just unfortunate. But it really just stems over
14 competition for a towing contract.

15 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Okay. While you've
16 been towing on this property so you haven't had any
17 issues with anyone else other than --

18 MS. POPE: Out of any other competitors?

19 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Well, not
20 competitors. But just I guess any other individuals.

21 MS. POPE: From people who's vehicles who
22 have been towed?

23 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Yes, ma'am.

24 MS. POPE: You know, on average, you know,
25 people get upset with their vehicle being impounded.

1 Some of it is also the form that they receive from the
2 State that terms it as an abandoned vehicle, and they
3 think oh, it wasn't abandoned. I just walked across
4 the street to the hospital. I was coming back for it.
5 We go to court for Medical Center Courts, people who
6 contest the impound, approximately 10 to 12 times a
7 year. I mean each time it has been found reasonable
8 how the tow took place.

9 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Your company is
10 where? City of Detroit?

11 MS. POPE: It's in Detroit. It's located at
12 750 South Deacon Street. And we have a secondary
13 location too.

14 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Could you leave the
15 information, your phone number, etcetera, with our
16 Board Secretary?

17 MS. POPE: Absolutely. And if anybody on the
18 Board wants to tour our facility or talk further about
19 some of the things that we put in place just to make
20 the signs more visible or to get the word out a little
21 bit more, I mean we welcome that dialog.

22 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: And have you
23 experienced any extenuating circumstances?

24 CHAIRMAN BELL: Could we close it out,
25 Commissioner Crawford?

1 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Excuse me.

2 CHAIRMAN BELL: Could we close it out,
3 please?

4 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: I have the floor.

5 CHAIRMAN BELL: You have the floor, as the
6 Chair recognized in terms of the timeframe.

7 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: Okay. Excuse me.
8 Extenuating circumstances where vehicles are towed
9 where you might try to work with the person in terms
10 of --

11 MS. POPE: You know, absolutely. We're not a
12 heartless company. When a vehicle's towed, it doesn't
13 come with a sign on it that says out of work veteran,
14 father of two, you know. So I mean vehicles aren't
15 towed based on who gets out of them. Most of the time
16 we don't even know who owns the vehicle. It's
17 basically do you have a permit, do you not. Did you
18 display it, did you not. You try to work with people
19 if they're reasonable or if you feel there is a
20 hardship.

21 I know one time specifically, just real
22 quickly, there was a woman who had to bring her
23 daughter to the hospital. She wasn't thinking
24 straight. Her father had raped her daughter.

25 CHAIRMAN BELL: Ma'am, we understand.

1 MS. POPE: There's no questions, they're
2 going to get their car back. So yeah.

3 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you.

4 SECRETARY HICKS: Mr. Chair, we have two
5 remaining cards. Kathleen Richardson would be followed
6 by Michelle George, and that would conclude the cards
7 that we have.

8 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you.

9 MS. RICHARDSON: It's indeed an honor to be
10 standing before you all this afternoon. And what my
11 purpose is, I am an activist for the seniors of the
12 City of Detroit. And the State of Michigan.

13 CHAIRMAN BELL: Can you speak more into the
14 mic? We can barely hear you.

15 MS. RICHARDSON: Can you hear me now? And
16 what I'm here for this afternoon, we're having a lot of
17 difficulties with a particular precinct on their calls
18 to the senior's buildings. They feel that they're not
19 being handled properly. They feel that the police
20 officers are being a little aggressive toward them when
21 they feel that -- and which we call them only when we
22 need them. So at that moment, they are actually the
23 person that's being harmed or feeling unsafe in their
24 environment.

25 When the officers get there, you all spoke a

1 moment ago about the 911 calls and stuff like that. I
2 have a packet with me. I'm not calling out the
3 precinct here on the floor today, but I do have the
4 precinct that I would like you all to look at. And
5 they are not taking proper information. They're
6 bringing back to their precinct the wrong address, the
7 wrong apartment, the person who has the PPO who've been
8 harmed, whatever, etcetera, okay?

9 So I would like for -- I'm here to find out
10 when they are in training the officers, do they get
11 certain training on how to handle seniors? Some
12 seniors take medication. Some take 23 pills a day,
13 okay? They sometimes is not coherent to understand
14 what an officer is saying to them. Do you be taught
15 how to be a little patient, be understanding,
16 compassionate, because this is a senior you're dealing
17 with, you know? So that's why I'm here today.

18 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the chair. I'd
19 just like to say, Ms. Richardson, I'd like to get on
20 your calendar this upcoming week and maybe you and I
21 can sit down and talk and maybe if I can come out and
22 share a few words for your seniors.

23 MS. RICHARDSON: No problem.

24 CHAIRMAN BELL: Commissioner.

25 COMMISSIONER MOORE: I know you said you

1 don't want to call the precinct. I'm the police
2 commissioner of District 7, which is called the called
3 2nd, 6th and 10th precincts. Is it one of those three
4 precincts?

5 MS. RICHARDSON: No.

6 CHAIRMAN BELL: Why don't, why don't you,
7 ma'am, why don't you speak to AC Dolunt and when the
8 meeting's over with speak to him personally about your
9 concerns and hopefully we can probably resolve it and
10 he can take that concern to another level.

11 MS. RICHARDSON: Thank you, so much.

12 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you, ma'am.

13 SECRETARY HICKS: Mr. Chair, the last card
14 which I have this evening is Michelle George.

15 MS. GEORGE: Good afternoon, Commissioners
16 and Chairman, Mr. Chairman. This is more focussed on a
17 health question. I want to ask the Commissioners, and
18 I don't know if it's the right venue to ask. I'm a
19 nurse in HIV care and a lot of times there's right now
20 we're almost next to a cure. There's medication out
21 there to if a person is exposed to HIV to prevent them
22 from getting HIV if you can get that medication in in
23 the next 72 hours. I know a lot of times officers come
24 in contact with patients maybe not be sure or
25 assailants or suspects may not be sure what the suspect

1 may have and there is I think, and I'm doing that
2 research, one documented case of a human bite and so
3 from the transmission of HIV. So what I wanted to
4 know, who would I see regarding that, because I know a
5 lot of times officers can come in contact and may get
6 injured with a human bite, but there's medication out
7 there. So say, for instance, if the suspect had HIV,
8 if we get that medication within the patient within 72
9 hours, it's almost 100% sure they would not get
10 exposed. So who do I speak with about that?

11 AC DOLUNT: I would guess we'd go through
12 medical section.

13 CHAIRMAN BELL: Director Gail Oxendine behind
14 you, she will talk to you in reference to that.

15 MS. GEORGE: Thank you, very much.

16 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you.

17 SECRETARY HICKS: Mr. Chair, that concludes
18 the cards that you have this evening.

19 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you for your public
20 comments. I just want to say, we do not regulate
21 private towing companies on private property. This
22 Board is charged with public DPD Detroit Police
23 Department towing, okay? There's been a misconception.
24 Am I right, DC Washington? We do not regulate.
25 Michigan State Police regulate towing on the freeways

1 in the City of Detroit. We do not deal with towing on
2 the freeways. Michigan State Police has that
3 responsibility. The people that's come before us, but
4 we want to make sure that people are aware of our
5 charge and responsibility.

6 There's some issue with Medical Center Court,
7 issue with DMC and all of that, but that is private
8 matter that this Board do not have that charge and
9 responsibility. Is there any other business coming
10 before us?

11 COMMISSIONER CRAWFORD: I just have a follow
12 up to that. We stated that before the table but also I
13 want to thank the woman for coming out today because it
14 does clarify a number of things that were stated and
15 also too, it's really truly about the community
16 relationship here. Thank you.

17 CHAIRMAN BELL: Any other business?

18 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Yes. That was a very
19 good question the woman before asked.

20 CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes.

21 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Are there any training,
22 Gail Oxendine? Do you know if there's any training?

23 MS. OXENDINE: With respect to?

24 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: With policemen how they
25 handle elderly people.

1 MS. OXENDINE: I wouldn't have any knowledge
2 of that.

3 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Okay. But I think we
4 should find out. As recruiting, I'm going to find out.

5 MS. OXENDINE: It be a question for Captain
6 Williams.

7 CHAIRMAN BELL: Any other business?

8 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: I just want to
9 remind the Commissioners, I had sent an email out
10 during the week regarding the city council meeting on
11 February 28. There are going to be several appeals for
12 medical marijuana facilities and I don't know if
13 anybody has a chance to go, it's going to be all day
14 and there are about seven or six that are appealing to
15 keep their locations. And since we're very concerned
16 about it, I just wanted to let you know.

17 CHAIRMAN BELL: And we scheduled for the law
18 department to give us an update at some point in time
19 in the near future on that calendar, so I'm glad you
20 shared that. Might want to participate in that forum
21 to witness that process.

22 The Chair would entertain a motion for
23 adjournment.

24 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Before we adjourn, I
25 just wanted to say thank you, thank you, thank you to

1 everybody for the support during the loss of my child.
2 So thank you, and I'm glad to be back so I just want to
3 say thank you. We just got so many blessings during
4 that time and just continue to keep us in your prayers.
5 Thank you.

6 MS. DEWAELSCHÉ: And we missed you a lot,
