5 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Good afternoon.

6 COMMISSIONERS: Good afternoon.

7 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: I'm Vice Chair
8 Commissioner Eva Dewaelsche. And I'm going to be
9 chairing the meeting today for Chairperson Lisa Carter,
10 who is excused.

11 On behalf of the Board, for those who are
12 attending, thank you for joining us. And for people
13 viewing this meeting on your government cable station,
14 thank you for viewing our meeting.

15 At this time, I would like to ask our
16 commissioners to introduce themselves. And I would
17 like to start to my left.

18 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Your military right?
19 Commissioner Darryl Brown, District One.

20 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Jim Holley, At-Large.

21 COMMISSIONER BELL: Commissioner Willie Bell,
22 District 4.

23 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Commissioner Elizabeth
24 Brooks, At-Large.

25 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Commissioner Shirley

1 Burch, District 3.

2 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Good afternoon, William
3 Davis, District 7.

4 MR. HICKS: Madam Chair, you have a quorum.

5 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Thank you. For our
6 invocation, we've invited Detroit Police Chaplain Corp,
7 Chaplain Mobley. Could you please come to the podium?
8 Thank you.

9 CHAPLAIN MOBLEY: I would like to thank you
10 this afternoon and all those that are here, the command
11 staff of DPD. And I would like to open up with prayer.

12 Father, we come before you today and we thank you
13 for the opportunity which you afford us to just lean on
14 your everlasting hand and trusting your grace and your
15 mercy. I thank you, Father, for this Commissioner
16 Board, Father, that has been guided through wisdom and
17 given, Father, direction that will help our community
18 and bless, Father, those who are here today.

19 So I thank you, in advance, for decisions that's
20 made, for discussions that have been given, that have
21 come to a medium, that is agreeable. I thank you for
22 these things and all things, in Jesus name, Amen.

23 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Thank you,
24 Chaplain.

25 A couple of business items that we need to take

1 care of first. Approval of the agenda. Is there a
2 motion to approve the June 21st agenda?

3 COMMISSIONER BROWN: So moved.

4 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: There's a motion.
5 Is there a second?

6 COMMISSIONER BELL: Second.

7 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: It's been moved and
8 seconded. All those in favor, start by saying aye.
9 Opposed.
10 (Motion carried)

11 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Extension,
12 Commissioners, you have the minutes for June 14, 2018.
13 Is there a motion to approve?

14 COMMISSIONER BROWN: So moved.

15 COMMISSIONER BELL: Support.

16 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: It's been moved and
17 seconded. All those in favor, indicate by saying aye.
18 Opposed? Extension.
19 (Motion carried)

20 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Thank you. I would
21 like to ask, is there any elected officials in our
22 audience? Any elected officials or representatives of
23 elected officials, would you please introduce
24 yourselves?

25 Seeing none, then I have a couple of -- I have at

1 least one person that I would like to introduce at this
2 time. We have a Jamiesha Oaks who is joining us today
3 and she's an intern here.

4 MS. OAKS: Hi.

5 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Graduated from
6 Rosedale High School and Henry Ford. And is a student
7 at Henry Ford?

8 MS. OAKS: Yes.

9 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: College. Thank
10 you. Thank you for being here.

11 Okay. Next on the agenda is the Chairperson's
12 report. And so, on behalf of the Board, I want to
13 express like we usually do at our meetings, our concern
14 and support for fallen and injured officers.

15 Our board receives a weekly report from the
16 department, listing injured officers. And I would like
17 to ask D.C. Bettison if he could just provide us with
18 any additional information.

19 Before I go any further, I would like to ask D.C.
20 Bettison, first of all -- introduce you because you're
21 going to be here for Chief Craig and to introduce your
22 staff.

23 CHIEF ASSISTANT BETTISON: Temporarily.

24 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Okay.

25 CHIEF ASSISTANT BETTISON: The Chief will be

1 down momentarily.

2 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Okay.

3 CHIEF ASSISTANT BETTISON: And Assistant
4 Chief Bettison. And I'll have the staff introduce
5 themselves. So, we'll start with the union.

6 (Host of DPD introduced themselves)

7 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Anybody else?

8 ASSISTANT CHIEF BETTISON: I think that's it.

9 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: And then, I would
10 like to ask our Secretary, Greg Hicks, to introduce our
11 Board of Police Commissioners staff.

12 MR. HICKS: Thank you, Madam Chair. Just
13 before making the introduction, I do want to indicate
14 for the record, Sergeant Quinn is taping today's
15 meeting and also, Media Services is providing the
16 audio/visual work. And then, Ms. Mapp is our court
17 reporter for the day.

18 And immediately to my right is Robert Brown. And
19 then, if we go all the way over to the left side,
20 interim personnel director, Ms. Lamar is sitting on the
21 left side of the room. And then, back to the right, we
22 go to Ms. Blossom who is media outreach. Mr. Wyrick
23 who is our attorney for the Board.

24 And then, of course, Ms. Johnson who is fiscal.
25 And then, Dr. McAllister, will introduce not only

1 herself, but also the OCI staff that's present.

2 MS. McCALISTER: Good afternoon, board.

3 COMMISSIONERS: Good afternoon.

4 MS. McCALISTER: I'm Paulene McCalister,
5 Supervising Investigator Cromwell, Investigator Banks,
6 Investigator Calloway, Investigator Nichols, Senior
7 Investigator Jones, and Senior Investigator Sloan.

8 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Thank you,
9 Dr. McCalister. Thank you, Mr. Hicks.

10 And the Chief, Chief Craig, has joined us. Thank
11 you for joining us.

12 CHIEF CRAIG: Thank you.

13 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Good afternoon.

14 CHIEF CRAIG: Good afternoon.

15 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: So continuing, the
16 Board of Police Commissioners meet every week, every
17 Thursday except for Thanksgiving and Christmas holiday
18 periods. We meet at the Police Headquarters three
19 weeks in the month on Thursdays at 3:00 p.m. We always
20 meet in the community, the second Thursday of every
21 month.

22 The Police Commission exists to provide civilian
23 oversight for the work of the Detroit Police
24 Department. As a board, we receive and investigate
25 non-criminal citizen's complaints, monitor the

1 operations of the department and work with the Mayor or
2 the Chief of Police to make or modify police policy.

3 Our objective is the same as the City of Detroit,
4 to provide for the best use of our tax dollars to
5 improve on the quality of life within our city.

6 As a board, we bring a unique perspective to
7 policing the eye and the viewpoint of civilians. The
8 principle of civilian oversight is as old and is as
9 important as all of the founding principles in our
10 democracy.

11 Separation of powers between and within government
12 allows for accountability, transparency, for the rights
13 to appeal, and citizen's control.

14 These principles are important nationally, as well
15 as locally. And I would like to call to your attention
16 a few important items. Several are informational items
17 and others will require action from the Board.

18 The first meeting in July is scheduled for
19 Thursday, July 5th. The timing of this meeting is
20 likely to result in limited attendance because of the
21 July 4th celebration, one day before our meeting. I
22 would suggest that we cancel the July 5th meeting,
23 provided that there is support for this cancellation at
24 the appropriate point, I will ask for a motion to
25 cancel the meeting.

1 I want to draw your attention to your board
2 packet, board members. Included in the packet is a
3 copy of the Board of Police Commissioner special insert
4 in the Michigan Chronicle to be published with the June
5 27th Edition. The insert discusses our role in
6 providing oversight to the police department and many
7 of our current accomplishments.

8 I want to thank Ms. Teresa Blossom, our media and
9 outreach director for her continuous work to provide
10 information to the community and heighten the profile
11 of the Board.

12 On Monday, June 18th, the department issued a
13 notification advising that 23 senior citizens had been
14 arrested for protesting in the area of Bates and
15 Randolph Street in Downtown Detroit. The notification
16 indicated that the seniors were ticketed and
17 transported to the parking lot of the Detroit Detention
18 Facility. The information beyond this point is
19 unclear. I asked the department to update us on this
20 activity which might be related to the Poor People's
21 Campaign, and it's efforts to highlight a water crisis
22 within our city.

23 The Board is concerned with the treatment of our
24 senior citizens as well as others who protest, against
25 injustices, to be handled in a respectful and

1 professional manner. All reports suggest that this was
2 the case on Monday, June 18th.

3 I asked the Chief to add an update on this in his
4 report to the Board. And the Chief of Police has
5 recommended six officers to be promoted to vacant ranks
6 of Lieutenant and six officers to vacant ranks of
7 sergeant. The Board has reviewed these recommendations
8 and is poised to act on the Chief's recommendations.

9 Under new business, Commissioner Willie Bell will
10 introduce a motion to act on the Chief's recommendation
11 and read the names of the individual officers into the
12 record for the Board's consideration.

13 Also, many of us have been shocked by the recent
14 practice of the Federal Government to separate children
15 from their parents at the U.S. border. I will provide
16 a statement that should reflect the concerns of the
17 Board.

18 We will also have a presentation from the Public
19 Safety Foundation. Ms. Patti Kukula, Executive
20 Director of the foundation will address the Board and
21 report on the work of the foundation.

22 Toward the end of the meeting, we will have oral
23 communications. Please make sure that you print your
24 name on a speaker's card. The cards are located in the
25 back of the room on the table at the back, or can be

1 obtained by seeing Mr. Robert Brown. And he needs to
2 have your card before the beginning of public comment.

3 And now, I would like to read a statement as it
4 relates to the policy of forced family separations at
5 the U.S. borders:

6 The Detroit Police Commissioners are outraged that
7 law enforcement officers in our national government are
8 involved in the inhumane act of separating families
9 immigrating to the U S. Moreover, we are equally
10 outraged that our Federal Government has not developed
11 a reasonable series of immigration laws that address
12 today's realities.

13 The advice that our National Government gives to
14 those fleeing terror is to report to a designated
15 entrance point and claim asylum. In reality, as many
16 people do as their instructed, our government continues
17 to turn perspective asylum seekers away, often times
18 leaving defenseless people with no other alternative,
19 but to cross the borders under the cover of night.

20 The general public is mindful that there are no
21 laws that require the practice of separating children
22 from their parents. Rather, this was a self-directed
23 policy that was proposed and implemented by the current
24 administration and has fueled the conflict.

25 Yesterday, President Trump signed an executive

1 order directing the government to stop the practice of
2 separating children from their parents. However, we
3 hope that our citizens clearly understand that the
4 executive order does not speak to the nearly 3,000
5 children who have already been separated from their
6 parents. In fact, the executive order does not include
7 a plan at all, to reunite and return 3,000 plus
8 children, some as young as a few months old, to their
9 parents.

10 In Michigan, according to a Detroit Free Press
11 article, authored by Nancy Kaffer, an 8-month-old boy
12 is one of 50 children already transferred to our state.
13 Immediate family reunification and adequate support for
14 children and adults should be one of the highest
15 priorities of our public policy.

16 We, the Board of Police Commissioners, call upon
17 President Donald Trump and the members of Congress to
18 end all practices that separate children from their
19 parents and to implement an immediate plan to return
20 and reunite the 3,000 plus children with their parents.

21 We also, strongly urge Washington, D.C. to become
22 more engaged with the family of nations to develop and
23 implement reasonable immigration practices that
24 recognize conflict in other areas of the world, that
25 reinforce and drive defenseless people to seek

1 opportunities in America.

2 As a Board, we stand to remind others that our
3 nation's democratic principles and basic human decency
4 will not be denigrated by today's inhumane practices.
5 Ultimately, they will stand the test of time.

6 (Applause)

7 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Thank you. Thank
8 you.

9 At this time, I would like to request a motion for
10 the cancellation of our July 5th meeting. Is there a
11 motion?

12 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, I so move
13 that we cancel our July -- was that 4th?

14 COMMISSIONER BROWN: 5th.

15 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: 5th meeting.

16 COMMISSIONER BELL: Our July 5th meeting, due
17 to all activities going on.

18 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Support.

19 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: There's been a
20 motion made and seconded. Is there any discussion?
21 Hearing none, all those in favor, indicate by saying
22 aye. Opposed? Motion carries. Thank you.

23 (Motion carried)

24 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: And now, I would
25 like to ask the Chief if he would like to give a report

1 to the Board.

2 CHIEF CRAIG: Good afternoon, Madam Chair and
3 Board.

4 COMMISSIONERS: Good afternoon.

5 CHIEF CRAIG: Start with crime. Overall
6 crime is down 11 percent which includes both violent
7 and property. Our violent crime is down 7 percent,
8 overall. And our property crime is down 12 percent.

9 As you know, over the last couple of weeks, we did
10 have some challenges. Things have slowed some. So,
11 we're optimistic that we'll continue through going in
12 that direction, particularly given that first day of
13 summer, fireworks are on Monday and we anticipate a
14 safe, safe event.

15 I also attended, over the weekend, Cops, Coffee,
16 and Cars at the Twelfth Precinct. Lots of community in
17 attendance. Also, mentoring that day, teaching young
18 men to tie a tie and to stay optimistic. That was at a
19 local business on Livernois.

20 And I would ask, as it relates to the one report
21 you ask, on the arrest, if Commander Salahji will come
22 forward and give an update. I believe what, 22
23 arrests?

24 COMMANDER SALAHJI: Twenty-three, sir.

25 CHIEF CRAIG: 23. Approximate.

1 COMMANDER SALAHJI: Good afternoon.

2 COMMISSIONERS: Good afternoon.

3 COMMANDER SALAHJI: So a week ago, we
4 received a notification from Lansing that a Poor
5 People's Coalition was planning a protest in downtown,
6 Detroit. Whenever we get notifications of a protest,
7 we try to get ahead of it. So we made contact with the
8 organizers and explained to them a dialogue of
9 basically, the rules of the protest and to explain
10 we're there to protect their right to protest as much
11 as they are there to protest.

12 So on arrival, we had about 250 subjects involved
13 in the protest. They started out at the water
14 department building on Randolph, and went to the area
15 of Campus Martius. Of 250 persons, all of them very
16 respective and mostly cooperative.

17 At that time, one of the representatives informed
18 me that they had, at that time, 20 persons, that to
19 make a statement, wanted to be arrested that day. I
20 said okay and we talked about what that would look
21 like. And 23 persons eventually, did do acts that
22 required arrest. They blocked the front entrance of
23 the Compuware building, one, Campus Martius, with a
24 banner.

25 We talked to them and said you're blocking private

1 property. You will have to leave or I will have to
2 place you under arrest. We did this under video
3 camera. They were very cooperative and they knew when
4 they submitted to arrest.

5 We also had one where a group blocked the M-1 Rail
6 in the same fashion. All of the persons arrested, all
7 23 were obviously senior citizens, age 60 and up. And
8 it was a very hot day. So due to that, we did take
9 them. We took care with not trying to handcuff anyone
10 in the rear when it wasn't necessary. And we had a
11 shaded pavilion inside the Campus Martius Park. We
12 placed them there. We provided water to them. That's
13 while we waited for the prisoner bus. We made sure
14 everyone had good fluids and everyone was well-treated
15 and we had no complaints.

16 From that time, we took them to the Detroit
17 Detention Center. I spoke with Deputy Chief Baron
18 regarding the offenses which were minor city
19 ordinances. I said I don't believe registering them
20 and taking them back into cells would be appropriate or
21 necessary.

22 So, we made a decision to issue an appearance
23 notice in court and their families were allowed to pick
24 them up at the detention center without delay.

25 CHIEF CRAIG: Does the Board have any

1 questions?

2 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Any questions?

3 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, I just want
4 to say outstanding work. I have witnessed the
5 activities in the past and how you continue to handle
6 these matters professionally and I just love that the
7 people can at least peacefully demonstrate their
8 concerns and protest, that's a core freedom in America.
9 And the way the officers responded is amazing. Thank
10 you.

11 COMMANDER SALAHJI: Thank you, Chair. Thank
12 you.

13 CHIEF CRAIG: Are there any additional
14 questions?

15 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: That concludes your
16 report? Okay. Any comments or questions?

17 COMMISSIONER BELL: Good to see you, Chief.

18 CHIEF CRAIG: Good to see you.

19 COMMISSIONER BELL: I wanted to follow-up
20 with Deputy Chief in regards to the noise complaint on
21 the river front. I think we met with Councilwoman Mary
22 Sheffield and others to address their concerns which
23 has been long standing, even from last year. So if you
24 can give us an update, that would be appreciated.

25 DEPUTY CHIEF BETTISON: Deputy Chief Bettison

1 for the record. The update from Commander Mahone. It
2 was Operation Jefferson Corridor. And it was based off
3 of a complaint of music, motorcycles in the area. They
4 started back on May 18th. They've been executing it
5 ever since, with special attention and heightened
6 enforcement in the area.

7 I can read off some stats and I can tell you
8 before I even do that, that the primary individual that
9 they were working with, receiving the complaints is
10 satisfied at this time, based off the enforcement
11 actions taken.

12 Just last week, they investigated 80 vehicles,
13 issued 71 traffic violations, 32 parking violations, 5
14 vehicles towed. The week before that, they
15 investigated 80 vehicles, 71 traffic violations. I'm
16 sorry.

17 Oh, the week before that, it was one felony arrest
18 for warrants, 95 investigations, 83 vehicles being
19 investigated, 26 vehicles towed, 16 traffic stops and
20 then, 12 ordinance citations issued for loud noise and
21 4 for open intoxicants, 15 traffic violations, 57
22 parking violations. They continue to give special
23 attention to that area.

24 And thus far, I was at that community meeting in
25 the efforts that they are deploying down there, the

1 residents say they can see a difference and have
2 experienced relief.

3 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, Madam Chair.

4 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Are there any other
5 questions or comments?

6 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Yes.

7 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Ms. Brooks.

8 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Questions for the
9 Police Chief.

10 There's confusion about the bicycle lanes on East
11 Jefferson. I've had citizens come to me and ask, "What
12 are the police going to do about it?" They don't know
13 what lanes to get in. They don't know where to turn.
14 They don't know what all those cones and different
15 things are. Is there something that could be given to
16 the citizens so they can understand what the bicycle
17 lanes really are?

18 CHIEF CRAIG: We have done that in our
19 community meetings. I know the Mayor has, at his
20 meetings, had lots of conversation. I am not aware of
21 a brochure. Certainly, when you -- Jefferson, in
22 essence, was cut down from a, what was it, five lane
23 to?

24 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Down to two.

25 CHIEF CRAIG: Down to four. Not including

1 the left-turn lane, so two in either direction. Four
2 lanes and the left-turn lane, five. It's smaller and
3 the cones represent an area where vehicles are not to
4 travel. And that the lane closest to the curb line is
5 a lane designated for bicycles.

6 As you travel Jefferson, you will see notations on
7 the street notating bus stops where a bus can actually
8 turn into the area designated. People can be picked
9 up. That way, it won't obstruct the normal flow of
10 traffic.

11 The traffic is moving slower as you can imagine,
12 because of fewer lanes. It's going to take some time
13 to get adjusted to, but I certainly will make sure that
14 those precincts affected, I will have Chief Bettison
15 talk to the concerning command officers.

16 I know the Fifth Precinct and Seventh Precinct are
17 impacted on Jefferson. And so, we'll make sure their
18 education is clear. But I know the Mayor does it.
19 I've done it at a number of meetings.

20 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Thank you.

21 COMMISSIONER DEWAEELSCHÉ: Ms. Burch.

22 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes, thank you.

23 Commissioner, I want to backup what Commissioner Brooks
24 is saying. I've noticed the bike lanes on Schaeffer.
25 Now, Schaeffer is up and down so the motorists don't

1 really know what lanes to drive in because there's not
2 a lot of markings saying bike lanes. When they put
3 this together, did they consider how many people use
4 Schaeffer? And why would you need a bike lane? If
5 they put it into consideration, not that many bikes go
6 that route.

7 CHIEF CRAIG: To the Chair, through the
8 Chair, I wasn't part of that planning, so I don't have
9 that answer for you.

10 I can tell you, Jefferson is a very heavily
11 traveled area. I do see lots of bicyclists using those
12 lanes. I think it's a byproduct of these bicycle
13 lanes, traffic along Jefferson has slowed down. That
14 has been a chronic problem as those who live on the
15 eastside know, we've had our traffic enforcement units
16 spend a lot of times, in the past, on Jefferson because
17 of speeders. I've made traffic stops on Jefferson
18 because of speeding.

19 So, I'm hoping this has the effect of slowly
20 people down. A lot of cities do it. I mean, Detroit's
21 not, I mean, certainly not the first. This is common
22 in a lot of big cities across America.

23 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Commissioner
24 Holley.

25 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: This is just an

1 unofficial because I'm sure the Chief is right, but the
2 city is changing. And we can sit here and talk about,
3 you know, traffic. In this gentrification, everybody
4 knows that we don't use bikes. But I do feel like,
5 perhaps, maybe we ought to bring somebody in. Like the
6 Chief said, he's not part of this planning on this.
7 Maybe we need to bring somebody in and just, sort of,
8 let the community know.

9 Because I went on Jefferson and I'm -- I'm not
10 the, you know, the smartest guy, nor am I the dumbest
11 guy, but it's tough navigating your way. And you've
12 got, I think, it was 50 bikes, people riding bikes.
13 And you so afraid that you -- you know, that's a busy
14 street.

15 People trying to get home after work, you know,
16 going east, you know. But it's changing. We just got
17 to understand that. I think the Chief is being very
18 nice as he always is, but I just know from my
19 standpoint, that we really got to understand that it's
20 stuff going in this city and we don't like bikes, we
21 don't do bikes. You know, we don't.

22 And so, we can try to be politically correct and
23 all this, kind of, stuff and be nice and want to be
24 nice, but I really think, Madam Chair, we need to bring
25 somebody in that's planning this in the city. It's not

1 just Jefferson. It's all over the place.

2 And, you know, Belle Isle and it's another culture
3 taking place. I think we just need to be transparent
4 and be honest. Not that anybody is not being honest,
5 but I think we ought to have the information and try to
6 get it out on the media since we're on television and
7 all, and do everything we can to try to make sure this
8 transition goes fine. But because, again, it's
9 changing. And we know that it's changing.

10 And we know, basically, that we gone have to deal
11 with it. But I think we ought to deal with it, with
12 knowledge and with transparency and not, basically, try
13 to pretend that it's not.

14 But I do feel like, perhaps, like the Chief said,
15 they're not part of this, maybe. But maybe we ought to
16 bring somebody in that is in the planning. We have a
17 right to know what the City is planning.

18 You know, it's stuff going on in this city and I'm
19 happy about a lot of it, but also, I think we need to
20 know. And sometimes, look, if you're not -- you know,
21 Madam Chairperson, if you're not at the table, you on
22 the menu. And if you not at the table, you on the menu
23 and I just think we've got to understand that we're not
24 on the table and that we -- things are basically
25 happening and we need to, not to say that the menu is

1 not okay, it's just that I like to know what's going on
2 and when I'm going to have hamburgers and when I'm
3 going to have steak.

4 So I just think that saying all that, I just think
5 I've been in this city for, like, 60 years. You know,
6 coming out of the south and I'm going to do everything
7 I can to try to -- but I just know that the people in
8 this community need to know that the city is changing,
9 and, for the best, but at least we ought to be part of
10 it. And I'm just saying that I think we ought to have
11 someone to come in, Madam Chairperson.

12 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Yes. I agree with
13 that Reverend Holley. And we've been talking about
14 this for the bike lanes for about maybe two, maybe
15 three years and we still haven't gotten used to them
16 because we're still, as commissioners, we're being told
17 or talked to, you know, by some of our residents that
18 they don't understand how those bike lanes work. And
19 so, if we can't respond to those questions as
20 Commissioners, and they do expect the Police Department
21 to respond, or the commissioners. So I think that's an
22 excellent idea. I think we need to bring somebody.

23 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair.

24 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Go ahead,
25 Commissioner.

1 COMMISSIONER BELL: Just to enlighten you, we
2 spent 45 minutes for one of those so-called experts
3 coming to our meeting at Sacred Heart last year and
4 after that meeting, we were still confused.

5 Just to enlighten you, I attended some of those
6 meetings the Mayor responded to just recently and it
7 was at the Fifth Precinct and he was on the verge of
8 canceling this out, the bike lanes. And certain people
9 on the staff agreed to paint the bike lanes, put the
10 markers up and the Mayor said he would continue, but
11 you would have an opportunity to weigh in on it. If
12 you still continue to be unhappy, you need to let the
13 Mayor know in the fall. That's my understanding,
14 somewhere in the fall, he would revisit this issue
15 because so many people were concerned about what's just
16 been indicated.

17 But we had their experts and in fact, Bishop Van
18 was part of that discussion and he led that and brought
19 that to us. But they said they don't have bike lanes
20 leading into Grosse Pointe. They come out of Grosse
21 Pointe into Detroit. But that's another issue.

22 I don't see how you can put bike lanes. It's only
23 two lanes on the river front, Jefferson, it gets
24 narrower and narrower. It's an issue on Jefferson.

25 But I agree with Commissioner Holley, things have

1 changed and we must embrace. So, but if you're unhappy
2 with it, monitor it and you can take your complaint
3 directly to the mayor in the fall. He will hear you if
4 it's an issue that's going to continue. So speak up,
5 Detroit.

6 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Thank you, Madam
7 Bell, Mr. Hicks.

8 MR. HICKS: Excuse me, Madam Chair, we did
9 have a lot presentation on this subject. What we can
10 do is go back and reissue to the Board, the
11 presentation and the other information that was
12 associated with this, just so that you would have a
13 quick reminder at your ready when members of the public
14 approach you.

15 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: And I think that
16 would be a good idea to have, maybe a summary of a
17 report, of the presentation. However, we have several
18 new board members that were not at the presentation and
19 it would still be helpful to have a presentation, maybe
20 an update. So I would still wish to request that.

21 MR. HICKS: Sure. Sure.

22 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: At some future
23 meeting. Thank you.

24 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: I have just one other
25 thing.

1 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Commissioner.

2 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: I brought this up
3 because people were coming to me. And as a police
4 commissioner, I want to be able to answer them
5 intelligently. So I want to know as much as I can
6 about the bike lanes. They're everywhere, every city
7 I've gone to, every state.

8 When we went to Washington, at the conference,
9 bikes lanes. So I know they're around. I just want to
10 be able to respond as a police commissioner. Thanks.

11 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Thank you.

12 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Madam Chair.

13 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Go ahead,
14 Commissioner.

15 MR. BROWN: To the Chief.

16 I visited the training academy last week.
17 Outstanding job with your staff over there with Captain
18 Williams and your group. I was very impressed with
19 what I saw, with the things they're working with, with
20 what they have. I did ask him some things that he's
21 going to get back to me. If there's anything this
22 Board can do to make sure they have everything they
23 need to do to do their job.

24 I was really impressed with a lot of the layout,
25 with the scenario areas and everything like that. I

1 was really impressed with the staff.

2 And also, I don't want to talk about bike lanes,
3 but these guys on these mini bikes that's riding down
4 the street like their motorcycles, what's the deal with
5 that? How are we going to address that? There's been
6 a couple of close calls that I've seen, a couple I've
7 almost witnessed myself or been a part of, of hitting
8 these guys. They're running through red lights.
9 They're riding in the middle of the street. They don't
10 have any turn signals, brake lights, anything like that
11 and you can't even see them at night.

12 So is there something we can do to address this in
13 the city? They're everywhere and they ride in, like, a
14 pack. When I was a kid, I know I had a mini bike and
15 y'all took it from me.

16 CHIEF CRAIG: Through the Chair. It's an
17 issue, but we shouldn't forget that first of all, our
18 pursuit policy prohibits any pursuing of those
19 vehicles.

20 Take you back in time to the tragic shooting death
21 of the young man on the 18-wheeler and that incident.
22 So it is a problem. In our doing things, we're
23 launching operations with using our helicopter so that
24 when they stop, we can certainly go in and safely
25 detain, investigate, and recover those vehicles. But

1 to see it and then go into a pursuit is not an option.

2 Our police officers are frustrated. Everyone is
3 frustrated. But it's no win to them. If we try to
4 pursue them, they're in violation of policy. It
5 certainly puts the public at risk as well as the person
6 riding that vehicle that shouldn't be on it.

7 There's been some loose conversation by a member
8 of my staff that talked about creating safe areas in
9 the city that they can take those off-road vehicles,
10 ATVs, mini bikes, and ride them there, but we don't
11 have that as of yet.

12 And so, therefore things that we are doing and
13 working on, but candidly, it's a frustration. And I
14 know it's a frustration to many who live in the city.
15 It's just, there's a limit to what we can do unless,
16 again, we use our helicopter which we have, and do.
17 And when they stop, we can direct units in. And then,
18 they can take off again and we have the same, kind of,
19 issue.

20 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Okay.

21 CHIEF CRAIG: So, it's a concern.

22 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Any other comments
23 or questions, Commissioners? Hearing none, thank you,
24 Chief for your report.

25 CHIEF CRAIG: Okay. Thank you, so much.

1 COMMISSIONER DEWAEELSCHE: Next on our agenda,
2 we are going to have a presentation by the Detroit
3 Public Safety Foundation. And please identify yourself
4 again for the record, Patti.

5 MS. KUKULA: Good afternoon, my name is Patti
6 Kukula, Executive Director of Detroit Public Safety
7 Foundation. Good afternoon.

8 COMMISSIONERS: Good afternoon.

9 MS. KUKULA: Thank you, so much for this
10 opportunity.

11 I think all of you have our financial, annual
12 financial report from 2017. I'd like to say that you
13 probably know that the Detroit Police Foundation
14 actually began the foundation in 2003. It changed its
15 name To Detroit Public Safety in 2001 and added the
16 Detroit Fire as part of our mission to support.

17 We're an independent body, a 501(c)(3) independent
18 body. One of your board members, Betty Brooks is on
19 the agenda for August 7th, to be a formal board member.
20 It goes before the full board and we expect a vote.
21 And so, we expect her to be there in August. So
22 welcome, Betty.

23 (Applause)

24 MS. KUKULA: And I would like to thank Betty,
25 as well. We do have two events a year. It's the Women

1 in Blue and Above and Beyond, which will be November
2 29th this year. And so, we're looking forward to
3 having more support at our wonderful event for our
4 officers and firefighters and EMS.

5 We, as you know, happily, we run the Detroit
6 Police Museum and Gift Shop as well, as our function.
7 That was something that we have taken on. I think the
8 Chief was instrumental as well, in making sure that we
9 had a museum. So Jeff LaMoe who is a former DPD
10 officer who is our curator and he is just exceptional
11 at what he does.

12 And we are very, very glad to have him. I would
13 like to introduce Carter Jewelry, who is here. She's
14 our director of administration, marketing, and grants.
15 And I think she's been with us for about two and a half
16 years, almost three years.

17 I've been here almost, since August of last year.
18 We have a very small staff. We have a part-time
19 bookkeeper in the office. And we also have Allen Young
20 is our CPA and we work very closely with them every
21 month. They do all of our 990 tax plans. And we work
22 with Plant Maria who does our annual audit. So we are
23 hopefully very helpful to both, the Detroit Police and
24 Fire.

25 We receive grant funding as well as our donations

1 that come in. We certainly want to support all of the
2 activities which include the training and the outreach.
3 A lot of equipment that we try and achieve and that's
4 above and beyond what the budget the City has for the
5 officers and for the fire department. So we also
6 receive funding from Skillman Foundation, Hudson Weber,
7 Department of Justice. That's mainly for our ceasefire
8 program. We do all the payroll for the ceasefire
9 piece, that's non-employees.

10 We also, last year, received a wonderful
11 hundred-thousand dollar grant from GM for The Drive to
12 Thrive. And I thank Betty Brooks. She was involved in
13 that very early.

14 We also received training funding from Motorola
15 Solutions for safe routes to school funding last year.
16 We also operate the Secret Santa and Back to School
17 Program that Target assists with. And also, Fire House
18 Repairs from Home Depot and a few other things that the
19 DPD precincts have been around with.

20 We tried to reach, last year, over seven thousand
21 citizens in some of the outreach programs with things
22 that we helped the police officers initiate.

23 We helped sponsor the Neighborhood Police Officer
24 Summit Field Day, LGBTQ Chant. And, Advisory Board had
25 them in July. City Camp, the Chaplain Seminar last

1 year. This year again, we are partnering with City
2 Camp, LGBT programs, and Field Summit Show Down in
3 Motown, Bridging the Gap, Ceasefire, Chaplain Suicide
4 Intervention Program, the K-9 Units. Many precincts,
5 the little library that's around town at some of the
6 precincts now. We also worked with DFD Arts and Adopt
7 a Family Program. The DPD Hero's Ball and many
8 activities.

9 We are the account for many of the things that go
10 on in donations in time and as well as financial. We
11 are very proud we have a good accountability and very
12 transparent.

13 So far, in 2018, we were just recently awarded
14 about 67,911 dollars from the DMC Foundation for
15 equipment, mannequins and Train the Trainer Program,
16 for the police academy.

17 We also received a 45,000-dollar grant from
18 Children's Hospital Foundation of Michigan. It's the
19 first team we've had a grant from them. This is to
20 fund City Camp this year. So we're very proud of that
21 partnership and we hope it will continue year after
22 year.

23 We received 40,000 dollars from Chemical Bank from
24 the banker to banker fund that the Chief initiated to
25 have wellness and physical activity for the officers in

1 California, the relay race in California, Bakers,
2 California, to Las Vegas. Very successful.

3 And we've been very lucky in getting other grants
4 that you might hear about in a few press releases that
5 will be coming out.

6 So we're a small team, but we're here and happy to
7 support the police and fire. I'm happy to answer
8 questions.

9 (Applause)

10 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Commissioners, any
11 questions or comments?

12 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I would just like to say
13 to you and the organization, that is simply wonderful
14 what you're doing. I'm so proud to be a part of this
15 and to know what we're going to help others. I just
16 think it's marvelous and I wish you have continued
17 success with what you're doing.

18 MS. KUKULA: Thank you. I appreciate it,
19 very much.

20 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Commissioner Bell.

21 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, Madam Chair. First
22 of all, I want to thank you for your entertaining our
23 concerns to have input with the Safety Foundation with
24 an additional member of someone of the Caliber,
25 Commissioner Betty Brooks. And she's a hard worker and

1 we appreciate you entertaining that in terms of your
2 board. So that's a welcoming involvement.

3 And I want to say also, that the Women in Blue, it
4 was off the hook. Your keynote speaker was just
5 outstanding. I've been around a little while and I've
6 heard from speakers, but she set the tone for
7 involvement. I can't repeat what she said.

8 And I want to give our first Assistant Chief
9 there, her props. And Paula Young and all the young
10 ladies who were recognized. I think it's sort of
11 historic to recognize these young ladies in law
12 enforcement. It's not the most popular job, but you're
13 lifting it up.

14 And I just met two parents just last -- just this
15 week who have daughters who have joined the police
16 department a year ago. And that is rather unique when
17 you go through the neighborhood and say my daughter
18 joined, you know. And it's just really a plus, plus.

19 I recall the Seventh Precinct and the Twelfth
20 Precinct, one of our female officers joined the pro
21 ranks some time ago. Chief Craig, it was a welcome.
22 It was a challenge. But they lived up to it. And so,
23 I want to just commend you on your work and just
24 continue to do a great job. And we thank you. We
25 appreciate you.

1 MS. KUKULA: We're really happy and proud and
2 honored that we have the support of the Chief and his
3 staff because we want to help build the morale and be
4 there any way we can.

5 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes.

6 MS. KUKULA: We've had tremendous support
7 from all of you and the staff. We're on the seventh
8 floor. Did I say seventh? Fifth floor. Fifth floor
9 any time. Stop by, the door is always open.

10 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Any other comments?

11 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, at some
12 point, we need to recognize the annual report of the
13 DPD. It's outstanding.

14 CHIEF CRAIG: Thank you.

15 COMMISSIONER BELL: I really love the
16 picture. It was worth waiting on. I haven't went
17 through it yet, but just on the cover, it's a plus.
18 These two young ladies here, and with the first
19 Assistant Chief and you, and Willie Bell there, too. I
20 can see my Halo.

21 CHIEF CRAIG: Oh, you are there?

22 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you.

23 (Applause)

24 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Thank you,
25 Ms. Kukula. And I might add to Commissioner Bell's

1 comments, very good information for the police
2 commission to have as well as the officers in the
3 community. And we look forward to that report every
4 year because it is so -- it has such great information.
5 So thank you for that.

6 Any other comments or questions? If not, then are
7 there any police commissions standing or ad ha
8 committee reports? Hearing none, we'll go to the
9 report from the Secretary.

10 MR. HICKS: Thank you, Madam Chair. I don't
11 have any particular item to report on. There may be
12 some questions later on when we get to the process in
13 verifying the promotions that were sent by the Chief.

14 But other than that, we did include in the
15 information sent out to the Board, a list of Michigan
16 State Police Troopers who were signed throughout the
17 City, as a liaison, essentially, into our districts.

18 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Thank you. Is
19 there any old business to come before the Board?
20 Hearing none, new business. Commissioner Bell, will
21 you please lead us in this agenda item?

22 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes. Madam Chair, you
23 already indicated in your report, that we received
24 communication from Chief Craig in reference to
25 promotion in rank of Lieutenants and Sergeants and Mr.

1 Hicks and staff went through a thorough process and
2 they met all the criteria.

3 First of all, the budget and all the other reviews
4 in terms of background, resume, and all that. So the
5 recommendation should go forward and the recommendation
6 to promotion to rank a Lieutenant. And I'm going to
7 share with the community and also, you have your report
8 before you, Commissioners, from the sergeant rank would
9 be Sergeant Bryan Bowser, Sergeant -- if you're here,
10 we can acknowledge, but perhaps, I just continue if
11 you're not here. If here, you can stand if you're
12 here.

13 Sergeant Gerry Johnson, is that Jr.?

14 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Yes.

15 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yeah, I knew his father.
16 Okay. Sergeant James Demps. Sergeant Kimberly, is
17 that Gabriel?

18 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHÉ: Uh-huh.

19 COMMISSIONER BELL: Sergeant Lawrence Purifoy
20 and Sergeant Tereasa E. Duncan.

21 And to the rank of Sergeants, Detective Joanne E.
22 Wright, Corporal Abery Thomas, Police Officer Sarah K.
23 Monti. Is that family, too? That name sounds
24 familiar.

25 Okay. Thank you. Police Officer Danielle K.

1 Murray; Police Officer Julie L. Krupinski; is that
2 close? Detective Reginald Beasley; neighborhood Police
3 Officer; Steven A. Shank. That's going to be a loss
4 there. They love their Neighborhood Police Officer.
5 Police Officer Ronald Kidd; and Police Officer Delicia
6 L. Smith (Ponder); and Police Officer Daniel E. Austin;
7 and Corporal Gregory Sawmiller; and Police Officer
8 Robert Rowe; Police Officer Timothy E. Jones; Police
9 Officer Brandon R. Shortridge; and Police Officer
10 Richard J. Farrell.

11 Madam Chair, I move and proceed the Sergeants for
12 the rank of Lieutenants and also Detectives for the
13 rank of Sergeants. So moved.

14 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I second.

15 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Can I just get a
16 clarification? Do we need a motion for each promotion?

17 MR. HICKS: No, Madam Chair.

18 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Just the body.
19 Okay. It's been moved and seconded. Is there any
20 discussion?

21 MR. DAVIS: Discussion. Okay. So what if
22 there's one of these that I want to vote against?

23 MR. HICKS: Madam Chair, if there's any
24 exception by the board member, they would simply tell
25 us who that member is and we would note it in the

1 record. You could request a vote of the entire body.
2 But if it's only one person that might have the
3 objection, we would just simply note it in the record.

4 COMMISSIONER DEWAEELSCHE: Go ahead,
5 Commissioner.

6 MR. DAVIS: Okay. I'll vote against Police
7 Officer Daniel Austin.

8 COMMISSIONER DEWAEELSCHE: Okay. Any other
9 discussion? Hearing none, all those in favor, indicate
10 by saying aye. Opposed?

11 Okay. And for the record, yours will be on the
12 record.

13 MR. HICKS: Madam Chair, with all of the
14 members voting, with the one exception, even in the
15 case of the one exception, it did not fall below the
16 threshold that was necessary in order to group the
17 promotions. So as it stands, for the record, all of
18 the individuals that are listed in the motion were
19 approved by your body.

20 COMMISSIONER DEWAEELSCHE: Thank you for that
21 classification. Commissioner Bell.

22 COMMISSIONER BELL: Well, I'm not somewhat
23 clear. I assume that you're saying Police Officer
24 Daniel Austin goes forward?

25 MR. HICKS: Yes.

1 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: There was no objection,
2 no.

3 MR. HICKS: Yes. It was just a notation to
4 the record.

5 COMMISSIONER BELL: It was just a notation?

6 MR. HICKS: Right.

7 COMMISSIONER BELL: Okay. Thank you. I just
8 wanted to make sure.

9 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Okay. The motion
10 carries for all promotions that were presented before
11 the Board. Thank you, Commissioners.
12 (Motion approved)

13 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair.

14 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Oh, go ahead.

15 COMMISSIONER BELL: I just want to commend
16 all these members who have just been newly named. We
17 wish them all success in their careers. And there's a
18 chief commitment to timely promotions and I can
19 appreciate this and the Board can appreciate that. We
20 look forward to them attending class as soon as
21 possible and receiving their badge for Lieutenant and
22 Sergeant. Thank you.

23 CHIEF CRAIG: Thank you.

24 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Thank you, Chief.
25 Thank You, Commissioner.

1 Announcements, the next meeting will be Thursday,
2 June 28th here at 3:00 p.m. at the Detroit Public
3 Safety Headquarters, 1301 Third Street. The next
4 community meeting will be Thursday, July 12th at 6:30.
5 It will be at the Tenth Precinct at the Joseph Walker
6 Williams Center located at 8431 Rosa Parks.

7 And now, are there oral communications, Mr. Brown?

8 MR. BROWN: Yes, Madam Chair, I currently
9 have four cards. The first speaker will be Mr. Peter
10 Rhoades followed by Ms. Rondalyn Cash.

11 COMMISSIONER DEWAEELSCHÉ: How are you?

12 MR. RHOADES: Doing good. My name is Peter
13 Rhoades. I'm a resident. I've been here many times
14 before. In fact, I started coming many years ago
15 because the Police Department was giving tickets to
16 individual gas station attendants and I thought that
17 may be a bad procedure.

18 I'm here today because there's a gas station at
19 4125 West 8 Mile Road that's at the intersection of 8
20 Mile and Livernois and recently, it came to the
21 attention of City Council Member, Roy McAllister, Jr.,
22 because of neighborhood complaints.

23 Just as an aside, when a City Council member goes
24 to a gas station to look at all the debris outside and
25 the dirty conditions inside, the sales clerk behind the

1 counter should probably not be selling loose cigarettes
2 to the customers. That's probably a bad idea.

3 But I'm bringing it to the attention of the
4 Detroit Police Department because they might want to
5 contact the Detroit Building Safety Engineering
6 Department Licensing Center because when this gas
7 station as well as all the other gas stations come up
8 for renewal at the end of August, this one can be
9 pointed out that there should be a show cause hearing
10 in front of the independent show cause hearing officer
11 concerning the activities going on there. And, if
12 appropriate, show cause hearing officer can revoke or
13 suspend their license. And that's the proper way.

14 Please, don't give tickets to the individual
15 behind the counter for failure to have a business
16 license. Instead, go after the manager or the owner
17 and have their license revoked. Thank you, very much.

18 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I agree.

19 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you.

20 DEPUTY CHIEF BETTISON: Deputy Chief
21 Bettison, for the record. I've met with Councilman
22 McCalister. I already met with B.C., working on it,
23 with connection with the Detroit Police Department,
24 have responded to that particular gas station. And, we
25 sent undercover officers in there. They bought

1 loosies, a ticket was issued.

2 So B.C. and DPD officers working together on it
3 and doing exactly what Mr. Rhoades said. So that's the
4 strategy and the plan and not only that, but just for
5 the record as well, gas stations, liquor stores, places
6 that are dirty, selling loose cigarettes, per
7 violation, given the directive of Chief Craig, we are
8 going after them.

9 MR. BROWN: Ms. Cash followed by Ms. Faith.

10 MS. CASH: Hello everyone, I lost my father
11 --

12 MR. BROWN: Could you please state your name?

13 MS. CASH: Oh, yes. Rondalyn Cash from
14 Memphis, Tennessee.

15 I lost my father and uncle here last year,
16 February 1, 2017. I spoke with different detectives,
17 different guys. My mom saw the whole thing, the whole
18 -- the whole crime and she gave, you know, every
19 detective everything she know. I got --

20 I called plenty of times. One of the detectives
21 talked about me to a family member in another city.
22 They mistreated me, lied, continuously lied to me. I
23 lost my dad and uncle. They were twin brothers.

24 My dad was gone from me 20 years and I only spent
25 five years with him and I feel like that somebody can

1 do something. I mean, I've provided them so much
2 information. Somebody can help me do something. I
3 mean, help me. If it was them, just be in my shoes for
4 one second, one minute and think about it. And I just
5 wanted to say, like, I think everything -- my step dad
6 worked for the sheriff department 29 years. And I
7 mean, I know how it goes and I was told that --

8 Well, I know that the getaway driver was a female.
9 Her granddad worked for the police department. I don't
10 know if it was a favor or whatever, but nothing has
11 been done. And I mean, when I say, we have all the
12 evidence, everything, it's just continuously lies to
13 me. It hurts me. There's nothing been done about this
14 and there's not a day goes about that I don't think
15 about my dad and uncle. And I just want somebody to
16 help me do something about this. And that's all.
17 Thank you.

18 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Okay. Chief, did
19 you want to say something?

20 CHIEF CRAIG: Yes.

21 Captain, do you have an update on this case?

22 UNIDENTIFIED CAPTAIN: I will have to get the
23 update and get the information.

24 CHIEF CRAIG: Are you familiar with that?

25 UNIDENTIFIED CAPTAIN: No, I'm not, sir.

1 CHIEF CRAIG: Okay. The Captain will assist
2 you with that. He runs the homicide here.

3 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Thank you.

4 MR. BROWN: Ms. Faith, followed by Ms. Sharon
5 Harper Lee.

6 MS. FAITH: Good evening, everyone. My name
7 is Ms. Faith. And through this Chair, I just wanted to
8 comment about the babies being put back with their
9 families. I was a little baby myself when my mama
10 passed away and I know how it feels. I never know what
11 she looked like, at all. So I'm glad for that, that
12 the babies are back with their families.

13 So I wanted to comment on the seniors being
14 humanely treated. They were talked to and told about,
15 you know, what things they did that was not acceptable
16 or wrong and then they cooperated and treated them
17 well, gave them refreshing water, treated them very
18 humanely. And for that, I'm very, very pleased to see
19 that the seniors were taken care of.

20 And also, oh, my memory is escaping me. As you
21 get old, you know, that's one of the things that goes.
22 I'm thankful for the things that come up, that blessed
23 me so much to see you all today.

24 And Commissioner Brooks, my hat goes off to you in
25 the things you're doing with the training and

1 recruiting and the different young folks that's coming
2 on. And Commissioner Burch, I want to commend you
3 also, for the work you're doing in the different
4 precincts and things. And commend you for all of the
5 good I do see.

6 And also, Commissioner Holley, the few free to
7 speak here, whatever you want to say, and the
8 understanding that comes and follows. And, wonderful
9 to see.

10 And, I know I only have one minute left, but I
11 have a thing I want to request from the chaplains and
12 all of y'all. I had -- I found out I have an enlarged
13 heart and so, just be praying for me, my health be
14 restored. I will continue to go forward and not
15 regress back, as you all have taught me by your precept
16 and example. Thank you for letting me speak.

17 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Thank you,
18 Ms. Faith. We will definitely be praying for you.
19 Thank you, so much.

20 MR. BROWN: Ms. Harper Lee, followed by
21 Ms. Michelle George.

22 MS. HARPER LEE: Good afternoon, Chief Craig
23 and Commissioners. I just wanted to come and tell you
24 guys, that my husband and I are still in our house on
25 Parkside. I'm a teacher with a masters and he's a

1 retired FEO engineer who got hurt on the job. And his
2 health is deteriorating even more with his feet because
3 he has neuropathy. This young lady at 18255, I won't
4 say her name, she is politically connected with the
5 City, they do have money, some, I guess. But she is
6 just horrible, and just stalking us, and almost running
7 us off the road and having her, quote on quote, people,
8 homies. There's nothing we can do to stop her?

9 We need some control in the University District
10 for the seniors, if nothing else. And as the gentleman
11 stated here, Mr. Brown, the go cart things. I live on
12 Parkside and people are doing, 50, 80, 90 miles an
13 hour. I'm telling you, someone was in a Camaro and
14 they just went straight through to 7 Mile.

15 And we've got no babies and gentrification is
16 okay. But we shouldn't be forced or try to be forced
17 because I'm not going anywhere. You shouldn't be
18 forced to try to leave your home when you've invested
19 all that money.

20 I just want to show you, I have this book and
21 another one in the car of this woman of police officers
22 at the Twelfth Precinct, who allowed her to make false
23 police reports. Commander Sims, she's amazing, but
24 she's overwhelmed. So her detectives, whether it's Lee
25 or Bledsoe. Fitzgerald who told me, move.

1 Somebody called and left a message on my husband
2 phone today that said move. We're not going nowhere.
3 That's ridiculous. All our money is in our home until
4 we're ready to go, and we should be ready to go. I'm
5 the same age you are or maybe a little close to it. I
6 know people you went to school with. Or close to it.
7 So all of us are over 40. Forty, 50, okay?

8 Who doesn't want to go off your porch because two
9 women are ready to jump on you? That's what happened
10 to me with my daughter last year. Please, please, I
11 don't care how politically connected she is. 18255
12 needs to be reprimanded. An automatic cease and
13 desist. This is ridiculous.

14 I will be at the mayor's meeting because I see I'm
15 not getting help in Detroit. I thank the police
16 officers that are doing a wonderful job and the police
17 commissioners who hear our voices. That's why you're
18 here. And, we pay taxes. Thank you.

19 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Thank you.

20 MR. BROWN: Ms. Michelle George followed by
21 Mr. Eric Blount.

22 MS. GEORGE: Good afternoon, Commissioners
23 and to Chief Craig.

24 COMMISSIONERS: Good afternoon.

25 MS. GEORGE: I wanted to state, just sharing

1 information as usual. Last week, maybe two weeks ago,
2 there was a zoning hearing about the marijuana
3 dispensaries that were in the district. And they were
4 discussing what they were going to do with some of the
5 money if -- if they have those dispensaries. Which, of
6 course, we're fighting that because this is not a
7 debate about if the medical marijuana helps people with
8 health issues. We know that.

9 But the young lady from the Law Department
10 mentioned that some of the money from the funding will
11 go to the Wayne County Sheriff's and zero to the
12 Detroit Police Department. And I don't understand
13 that. So, we're going to be on her about that, Chief
14 Craig. I just don't understand that.

15 Also, they mentioned some of the money will go to
16 show Detroiters how to grow marijuana. So I did bring
17 that up, to put that into their communities. That's
18 why I joined the lecture. I missed a lecture, but I
19 heard the director speak on this before. The structure
20 racism, equity, schools and communities. And that's
21 the reason why, just for that reason.

22 But I'm going to be -- we're going to be on that,
23 with that. Because money should go, if it's going to
24 benefit that, but it goes to Wayne County.

25 Also, I want you to keep your eyes out. The House

1 just passed a billed called The Sista Act, that is
2 going to give Attorney General Jeff Sessions
3 unprecedented power on the war of drugs. Now, I know
4 it has a lot to do with the opioid crisis. But it also
5 is going to impact people of color. And I think it's
6 going to have to do with the issues of these medical
7 marijuana dispensaries.

8 Like I told them at the zoning hearing, we saw how
9 crack ravished our neighborhoods back in the 80's. And
10 then you want to have dispensaries in an impoverished
11 city, that Wall Street just wrote an article about,
12 "The Worst City to Live In."

13 That's structure of racism that we have to fight
14 on that. But we're going to keep an eye because when
15 you give Attorney General Jeff Sessions power, it's
16 going to impact people of color and it's going to come
17 into the neighborhood. So, but I will keep a close
18 eye. It's going to go to the Senate next week, but it
19 was approved by the House.

20 Also, Chief Craig, I want to let you know, I don't
21 know if your Deputy Chief told you this, Stabenow is
22 working on getting mental health facilities in the
23 community. So working on that and I think that's it.
24 Okay. Thanks.

25 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Thank you. Very

1 good information.

2 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Very good.

3 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Any questions or
4 comments, Commissioners?

5 MR. BROWN: One more speaker, Eric Blount.

6 MR. BLOUNT: Good afternoon, Board and to the
7 Chief.

8 COMMISSIONERS: Good afternoon.

9 MR. BLOUNT: For the record, my name is Eric
10 Blount, a lifelong Detroiter. This week, I've
11 experienced the best and some of the worst in policing.

12 I'm a member of the Poor People's Campaign. I
13 found myself behind the blockade that the police had
14 constructed in front of Campus Martius. I did not
15 intend to be inside the blockade. But when I was, I
16 looked around and realized how closely I was to the
17 action.

18 The police were very, very professional and acted
19 with wisdom and knowledge and compassion. We are a
20 nonviolent civil disobedient way of protesting. So we
21 don't mean to be violent in anyway, and thank God we
22 weren't.

23 One of the worse that I saw was just yesterday at
24 the Water Board Meeting. Some of you were there.
25 Commissioner Davis was there when someone was

1 passionate and concerned about water shutoffs, this
2 woman was pushed and pulled in a very inhumane way. I
3 chastised Gary Brown, even though he's no longer a
4 police officer, he has that experience. I chastised
5 him for not stepping up and stepping in to make sure
6 that even though people may not have liked what she
7 said and did, just arrest her or not, but don't push
8 and pull on people, left and right.

9 Lastly, not just the zero-tolerance policies of
10 our cruel president, I would like to know again, and
11 I've mentioned this before, Chief Craig, as the Chief
12 of Law Enforcement Officer of this city, we need to
13 know where you stand as far as this city being a
14 sanctuary city. We need to know where the Mayor stands
15 as far as this city being a sanctuary city. And know
16 for sure, Chief Craig, the answer to this question is
17 binary. It's either yes or no. There is no lukewarm.
18 There is no maybe to it. We need to know and we need
19 to know now. Thank you.

20 CHIEF CRAIG: Through the Chair. I've gone
21 on record with my position which is supported by the
22 City. We are not, and I'm going to -- it's not a yes
23 or no answer. I'll just be clear that we are not in
24 the business of stopping individuals and asking their
25 immigration status. So we don't perform that type of

1 work.

2 However, if there's someone who is involved in a
3 violent crime who happens to be here illegally in this
4 country, we will cooperate with the federal
5 authorities. I've said that before. That is the
6 City's position and it's consistent.

7 MR. BLOUNT: Thank you.

8 COMMISSIONER DEWAEELSCHÉ: Thank you. Thank
9 you, Chief.

10 MR. BROWN: Madam Chair, that was your last
11 speaker.

12 COMMISSIONER DEWAEELSCHÉ: Yes.

13 MR. DAVIS: I have a comment. Just for
14 general information purposes, the lady who was touched
15 at the Water Board Meeting was not touched by a Detroit
16 police officer. Some people sometimes think that
17 Detroit water and sewage security is Detroit Police.
18 They are not. There was some Detroit police officers
19 there. Just a comment for people to know.

20 CHIEF CRAIG: Through the Chair, thank you
21 Commissioner Davis.

22 SPEAKER: I stand corrected.

23 COMMISSIONER DEWAEELSCHÉ: Commissioner Davis,
24 I'm sorry, just clarification, did you say there was
25 not police officers?

1 MR. DAVIS: There was police officers.

2 COMMISSIONER DEWAEELSCHE: Okay. But the ones
3 who did it weren't.

4 MR. DAVIS: She was touched inappropriately
5 by Detroit water and sewage security people, but there
6 was no inappropriate contact by any Detroit police
7 officers.

8 COMMISSIONER DEWAEELSCHE: All right. Thank
9 you.

10 MR. BLOUNT: I thank you for that correction
11 because in the mix of it all, with who is or isn't, we
12 don't know who is or isn't.

13 COMMISSIONER DEWAEELSCHE: And it happens a
14 lot where the Detroit Police are identified and they're
15 not even there. Thank you for that clarification.

16 Commissioner Burch, did you have a comment?

17 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes. I wanted to talk
18 about, if you remember, I brought up about The Police
19 Keep Detroit Beautiful signs. That I requested these
20 signs be put in the location of our gas stations and we
21 start some, kind of, program asking these gas stations,
22 not only asking, but really telling them, they need to
23 beautify their areas with flowers or some, kind of,
24 class. Something to beautify because I don't think we
25 should take what the gas stations give to our citizens

1 in Detroit and when you go in the suburbs, they are all
2 nice and neat.

3 So that's why I said why can't we just inform,
4 especially the ones with the green light, since they're
5 part of this, Chief, why can't they start beautifying
6 their grounds around their gas stations? That was
7 given to Detroit Edison. Please Keep Detroit Beautiful
8 signs.

9 CHIEF CRAIG: Through the Chair. I will tell
10 you that I'm not going to demand that a gas station put
11 up a sign. That's private property, number one.

12 Secondly, we started the green light, as you may
13 know, many years ago. In it's infancy, it was designed
14 to identify those locations that were viewed as safe
15 havens because they were clean. They didn't allow
16 loitering. And so, that was the beginning.

17 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Right.

18 CHIEF CRAIG: As this program has began to
19 evolve, I think we're at 350 locations now, the vast
20 majority of them are clean. We work directly with the
21 owners. The community, not the Detroit Police
22 Department, when they want a green light Detroit gas
23 station in their neighborhood, they go out, the
24 community members, basically demand, we want it or we
25 will take our business elsewhere. And we support

1 community members who do that.

2 We don't directly engage in that, kind of,
3 activity. But we do work with the owners who are green
4 light. We will work with the owners who are not green
5 light. And if those dirty gas stations that are
6 selling loosies and we become aware of it, we will take
7 appropriate action. That's something we talk about
8 often.

9 But I am not going to direct gas stations to put
10 signs on property. It's just not proper.

11 COMMISSIONER BURCH: No, I didn't mean that.
12 I didn't mean make them do it. I'm just saying these
13 signs are already around the City of Detroit.

14 CHIEF CRAIG: If a business owner wants to
15 place a sign up, that's fine. We love it.

16 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Okay.

17 CHIEF CRAIG: But I'm not going to -- I'm
18 more concerned about the safety. And I also know that
19 the dirty location breeds criminality.

20 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Correct.

21 CHIEF CRAIG: So we'll approach it from
22 there. We will assess and address criminal complaints
23 coming out of the location. And so, we know, recently,
24 as recent as early this morning, there was a murder at
25 a gas station. We now know that the person may have

1 been involved in the selling of drugs at that location.
2 We also want to know if that person was selling drugs,
3 did management know about it? And if so, what did they
4 do about it? And, if they did nothing.

5 So we're getting ready to take a look at that gas
6 station, and, you know, if it meets our scrutiny in
7 terms of, it's dirty, they're selling loosies, what
8 have you, allowing drug selling, we will take
9 appropriate action.

10 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Okay. Thank you. Just
11 wanted to know if we have your support as block clubs
12 when we go to the gas station.

13 CHIEF CRAIG: Through the Chair. You've had
14 our support from day one. I think we have done, maybe,
15 slightly above our average job, Todd Bettison.

16 CHIEF DEPUTY BETTISON: I think so.

17 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Thank you,
18 Commissioner. Thank you, Chief.

19 CHIEF CRAIG: Thank you.

20 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Is there any other?

21 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, I have one
22 comment. The young lady that spoke about her father
23 and her uncle, she traveled from Memphis, Tennessee. I
24 spoke with her. And would you have homicide, just give
25 us a little notation or note to the board secretary of

1 -- you know, they traveled from Memphis, Tennessee,
2 really concerned. So if you could share, at some point
3 in time, just a little note to the Secretary, he will
4 share it with us?

5 CHIEF CRAIG: Through the Chair. We will
6 definitely make sure we do that. And also, one of the
7 things we've implemented, I take it very seriously.
8 Whenever we talk about family members of homicide
9 victims, one thing that didn't occur that occurs on a
10 routine basis now and certainly, Commander Bryant can
11 speak to that, is that we touch every family member
12 because we know how important it is to do that. There
13 was a time that there were murders occurring and
14 sometimes the family member never even met the
15 detective. That does not happen today.

16 COMMANDER BRYANT: Hi, Commander Bryant for
17 the record. Yes, we actually have her upstairs right
18 now meeting with the detectives. And I just wanted to
19 point out that the detective that she was referring to
20 that she had the bad experience with no longer works at
21 homicide. So we have a new detective that took that
22 detective's case and that detective is working on her
23 case.

24 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you, very
25 much. Appreciate that.

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Any other business to come before the Board?

COMMISSIONER BELL: So moved, ma'am. No other business, for adjournment.

COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: It's been moved and seconded. All those in favor, signify by saying aye. (Motion carried)

COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Thank you all for your attendance and have a good evening.


