- 5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Good afternoon. I want
- 6 to say welcome back from our Thanksgiving break. I am
- 7 police commissioner Willie Bell I represent District 4.
- 8 I serve as chair of the board and will be conducting our
- 9 meeting today. On behalf of the board for those in
- 10 attendance thank you for joining us. For people viewing
- 11 this meeting on your government cable channel, thank you
- 12 for viewing our meeting. Commissioner Elizabeth Brooks
- 13 will not be -- let me try again -- will be unable to
- 14 attend today's meeting and has asked to be excused. I
- 15 want to acknowledge a new commission to our table Evette
- 16 Hollins-Griffie and I invite her to address the board
- 17 and audience at the time to introduce herself, if you
- 18 would be so kind. Yes, ma'am.
- 19 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Thank you so much for
- 20 having me. I'm very proud to represent District 2.
- 21 Aside from being a police commissioner I worked for DTE
- 22 energy as chair of staff in the customer service
- 23 department where I was on the leadership team there and
- 24 managed about a thousand people. I'm very proud of our
- 25 team there. I'm really excited to be involved. Some of



- 1 the things that are really important to me is making
- 2 sure our police officers have a strong presence in the
- 3 community. I'm very proud of this police Department and
- 4 think we've done a great job, this board and I look
- 5 forward to furthering along with that and working with
- 6 my new colleagues. Thank you.
- 7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Let's give this young
- 8 lady a round of applause. It is always crucial that
- 9 when we have a young person joining our team of public
- 10 service been appointed to the position we arrive to
- 11 appointment process and election process but the bottom
- 12 line we are here to serve the community and
- 13 accountability of civilian oversight and DPD. I welcome
- 14 you to the team. As you probably know this board been
- 15 around since 1974. And some people will say that
- 16 Reverend Jim Holley been around since 1974 but we want
- 17 to wish Commissioner Holley a happy 75th birthday. Can
- 18 we give a round of applause?
- 19 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: 75 and one day.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Well, that is a milestone
- 21 and I'm looking forward to my 75th God bless me next
- 22 year and I will join you. So there's some longevity
- 23 here for you and DPD in terms of your longevity so
- 24 department been good to me and city been good to me and
- 25 we are very fortunate. As we go forward I'm going to



- 1 ask our chaplain from Detroit chaplain corps Ronald
- 2 Franklin to bring the invocation, please.
- 3 (Invocation given.)
- 4 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.
- 5 Commissioners, I'm going to ask you to introduce
- 6 yourself starting to my far right.
- 7 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Hello, police
- 8 commissioner William Davis, District 7.
- 9 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Good afternoon Shirley
- 10 Burch, District 3.
- 11 VICE CHAIR BROWN: Good afternoon, vice
- 12 chair Darryl Brown, District 1.
- 13 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Jim Holley at large.
- 14 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Eva Garza
- 15 Dewaelsche at large.
- 16 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Evette Griffie,
- 17 District 2.
- 18 MR. HICKS: Mr. Chair, you have a quorum.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir. Mr. Hicks
- 20 would you introduce the board staff?
- 21 MR. HICKS: Thank you, Mr. Chair. Before I
- 22 introduce the board staff I do want to indicate that
- 23 Sergeant Quinn is taping today's meeting. Media
- 24 services is providing the audio, visual work and Caitlyn
- 25 Mancini is the court reporter for today. And



- 1 immediately to my right is Robert Brown and if you draw
- 2 your attention to the first row on the right side of the
- 3 room, we have Mr. Wyrick who is the board attorney. We
- 4 have Mrs. Blossom who does our audio -- I mean our media
- 5 outreach activity. We have Mrs. White who does the
- 6 fiscal and then probably second or third row in we have
- 7 Dr. Anderson who is the HR director, DPD HR director,
- 8 and we have Mrs. Johnson who does our fiscal and seated
- 9 next to Mrs. Johnson as a quest today is George James
- 10 who is the CFO. He's our CFO once we transfer to that
- 11 department. And I'm looking to see if I see anyone
- 12 else. And then what we typically do is go to the chief
- investigator for the chief investigator not only to
- 14 introduce herself but introduce the balance of staff
- 15 related to the office of the chief investigator.
- DR. MCCALISTER: Good afternoon, board. I'm
- 17 Dr. Polly McCalister, chief investigator. And attending
- 18 today's meeting with me today is senior investigator
- 19 Cromwell. Senior investigator Jones. Investigator
- 20 Banks. Investigator Callaway. And investigator
- 21 Washington. Thank you.
- 22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Mr. Hicks and
- 23 Dr. McCalister and I just want to -- one thing about
- 24 Chief Craig. He always give recognition to his staff,
- 25 his team of people so in every setting I've been to he



- 1 always make a habit and I'm going to make a habit of
- 2 that too about our staff, board staff. We thank you and
- 3 also OCI staff, we thank you and recognize the work they
- 4 put in day to day on behalf of the board of police
- 5 commissioners. You all know we are not full-time
- 6 commissioners. We are -- I want to say that we're
- 7 loosely part-time commissioner but full-time obligation
- 8 and without the staff carrying out that, then we would
- 9 not be able to function fully in terms of our charter
- 10 mandated duties. I just want to thank you and
- 11 acknowledge you for your work that you engage in. So I
- 12 just want to let the record reflect on this day that we
- 13 gave recognition to you; and I know I speak for the
- 14 entire board because it's enormous work involved in
- 15 terms of trying to keep up somewhat with DPD but they
- out there 24/7. And I really appreciate that. On that
- 17 note I'm going to let our newly minute -- the phone got
- 18 me again. D.C. Deputy Chief Wilson. Good to see you at
- 19 the table as deputy chief and would you entertain,
- 20 introduce any DPD staff.
- 21 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Good afternoon, Board.
- 22 For the record Deputy Chief Marlon Wilson, detective
- 23 bureau. I'll start with Commander Giaquinto and I'll
- 24 let remaining staff introduce themselves.
- 25 COMMANDER GIAQUINTO: Giaquinto, commander



- 1 of organized crime.
- 2 DEPUTY CHIEF BARREN: Deputy Chief Alvin
- 3 Barren, neighborhood policing east.
- 4 COMMANDER BLISS: Commander Mark Bliss,
- 5 office of support operations.
- 6 CAPTAIN RASHEED: Captain Debbie
- 7 Abdur-Rasheed, Detroit Detention Center.
- 8 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: Deputy Chief
- 9 Charles Fitzgerald, neighborhood policing bureau west.
- 10 SERGEANT HEWITT: Sergeant Gerald Hewitt of
- 11 the chief's office.
- 12 LIEUTENANT SIMS: William Sims, Lieutenant,
- 13 chief's office.
- 14 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: I think that's it.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON BELL: That's it?
- DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Yes, sir.
- 17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Commissioner
- 18 Burton, I heard you loud and clear. Good to see you.
- 19 Commissioner Burton, Willie Burton, from District 5.
- 20 Good to have you in attendance.
- 21 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you, Mr. Chair.
- 22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Are there any elected
- 23 officials in the audience or representatives of any
- 24 elected officials?
- MR. MCCALISTER: Roy McCalister, District 2.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you for your
- 2 attendance councilman from District 2. You always been
- 3 very, very supportive and we appreciate that. Yes, sir.
- 4 MR. MARTIN: Albert Martin, council member
- 5 of McCalister's staff.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Any others
- 7 that -- civic leaders in any capacity, precinct
- 8 delegation in attendance? If not, I thank all of you
- 9 for your attendance. Do I see a group of individuals
- 10 over there to my right or? Wilson?
- 11 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: I'm sorry. Do we have
- 12 any officers in the back that want to introduce
- 13 themselves? Sergeant Scott Hall?
- 14 SERGEANT HALL: Sergeant Scott Hall, third
- 15 precinct.
- 16 (Many other names introduced.)
- 17 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: And, lastly, I just
- 18 saw Captain Michael Chambers.
- 19 CAPTAIN CHAMBERS: Captain Michael Chambers,
- 20 internal controls.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. We make a
- 22 serious effort to recognize all our DPD personnel in
- 23 attendance, that's our tradition and we will continue
- 24 that so we appreciate you coming out for our afternoon
- 25 meeting. And we going to move on to the business item



- 1 I'm going to ask the commissioners to approve the agenda
- 2 for this afternoon meeting.
- 3 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: So moved.
- 4 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Support.
- 5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Been properly moved and
- 6 supported. Discussion, those in favor aye.
- 7 ALL: Aye.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Those opposed? Motion
- 9 carried. The next item of business will be approval of
- 10 the minutes for November the 15th, 2018.
- 11 VICE CHAIR BROWN: So moved.
- 12 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Support.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Been properly moved and
- 14 supported. Discussion, those in favor aye.
- 15 ALL: Aye.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Those opposed? Motion
- 17 carried. The next item of business will be the Chairman
- 18 report. Out of respect for the office of the United
- 19 States of America presidency I would like for us to
- 20 stand to honor the life of the 41st president of the
- 21 United States George Herbert Walker Bush, HW Bush.
- 22 Today former president George Bush has been funeralized
- 23 this morning in Texas. Thank you.
- 24 Today an interesting reign in the era for
- 25 justice. In 1865 the 13 amendments to the United States



- 1 Constitution abolishing slavery was ratified. In more
- 2 modern time as we honor our 41st president we are forced
- 3 to see how justice has been a moving target for many
- 4 Americans. President Bush won his presidency in large
- 5 parts due to the negative use of race with his continued
- 6 reference to William Horton. President Bush was also
- 7 late to recognize the critical importance of the HIV and
- 8 Aids problem. Bush support for United States Supreme
- 9 Court nominee Clarence Thomas continued to fly in face
- 10 of our recognition and resolution to the problem of
- 11 sexual harassment and discrimination in our society. To
- 12 be here to honor and criticize American life is truly
- 13 what make us Americans with our inherent rights to be
- 14 critical of our government and other concerns in the
- 15 political environment. I hope as we honor public
- 16 heroes, we strive to tell the whole story with respect
- 17 and reverence for their contribution to American life.
- On behalf of the board I want to express our
- 19 concern and support for fallen and injured officers.
- 20 Our concern for officer safety and citizen protection is
- 21 ranked as two of the most important priorities of the
- 22 board. Our board receiving weekly report from the
- 23 department listing injured officers. I would ask the
- 24 deputy chief during his remark to provide us with any
- 25 additional information related to injured and fallen



- 1 officers. The board of police commission meet every
- 2 week except for Thanksgiving and Christmas holiday
- 3 period. We meet at police headquarters three weeks in
- 4 the month on Thursday at 3 p.m. We also meet in the
- 5 community every second Thursday of the month at 6:30
- 6 p.m. Under the Detroit city charter Article 7 Chapter 8
- 7 the board of police commission is in power to provide
- 8 civilian oversight and supervised control of the police
- 9 department. Our citizens are justified when asking how
- 10 does civilian oversight law enforcement help you as a
- 11 citizen within our community? Our answer is we protect
- 12 the civil rights of citizens. Oversight organization
- 13 like that BOPC are at the forefront of investigating,
- 14 reviewing and auditing individual cases of citizen
- 15 complaints and patterns or operation by police agency to
- 16 eliminate misconduct, discriminatory police practice and
- 17 unnecessary use of force by police. Our work is based
- 18 on supporting effective policing. Mutual trust and
- 19 respect between the police and community is critical to
- 20 increase in the quality of life for resident and visitor
- 21 to Detroit.
- The board of police commissioner exists to
- 23 provide civilian oversight for the work of DPD. As a
- 24 board we receive and investigate noncriminal citizen
- 25 complaint, monitor operation of the department and work



1 with the mayor and the chief of police to make or modify

- 2 police policy.
- I want to congratulate the public safety
- 4 foundation for a very successful, above and beyond award
- 5 celebration. The foundation recognized the hard work of
- 6 public employees involved in policing, firefighters and
- 7 delivery of emergency medical service. Several of our
- 8 commissioner attended the award celebration. I can't
- 9 say enough about DPD, the fire department, and our EMS
- 10 in terms of outstanding above and beyond. The
- 11 foundation you did it timely, you did it well and well
- 12 deserving and also off officers lost their lives family
- 13 has just been outstanding in this day and age we more
- 14 supportive and more appreciate the work that's involved
- 15 in public safety.
- As I mentioned earlier it's 24/7 there are
- 17 no off days and sometimes there are no off minutes and
- 18 we have to be on our game for public safety. Number one
- 19 issue in America is public safety. I also want to
- 20 acknowledge the death of retired Sergeant Terri Hart.
- 21 Sergeant Hart retired from DPD on January the 19th,
- 22 2001. Please join us in supporting his family. I think
- 23 he was an outstanding officer. He was an academy
- 24 officer; he trained a whole lot of officers with DPD and
- 25 we lift up him and his family. I just hope that we get



- 1 more notification of officers who have made their
- 2 transition in terms from retirement for us 'cause some
- 3 of us know them but if not we know their legacy, their
- 4 body of work and we standing on their shoulders now.
- 5 On our agenda I asked the board to ratify
- 6 decision made by the chair following our last meeting to
- 7 allow for three members of the department to advance to
- 8 sergeant training as part of the group of 22 officers
- 9 promoted in our last board meeting. And also asking you
- 10 to formally promote these three DPD members to the rank
- 11 of sergeant. Over the break staff transmitted to the
- 12 attention of the board all the necessary verification
- 13 that these officers need to meet the requirements for
- 14 promotion. Have also adjusted the order of the agenda
- 15 to allow for public comment before a scheduled closed
- 16 session. In the closed session we take up the issue of
- 17 Corporal Dewayne Jones, Badge 777. The chief of police
- 18 requesting Corporal Jones to be suspended without pay.
- 19 Under the old meeting act we allow to hear personnel
- 20 matters in closed session. However, we must return to
- 21 the regular session should we decide to vote on the
- 22 recommendation of the chief. By taking public comment
- 23 before the closed session, citizens who are interested
- 24 in the work of the board or commission will not have to
- 25 wait to address the board as many of these closed



- 1 sessions last beyond the hour. I would say within an
- 2 hour, perhaps 30 minutes or less but we take whatever
- 3 time to making sure that we have a fair process for the
- 4 all officers involved.
- 5 Additionally, we have an updated Green Light
- 6 location list. The Green Light location are up to 456
- 7 locations throughout the city of Detroit. That task
- 8 listed divided by city district. Commissioner Burch,
- 9 you can look at your district and all the Green Lights
- 10 in your area.
- 11 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Appreciate it.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: We have attached a map of
- 13 the Green Light location so that you can see how they're
- 14 distributed across the city. Today we have a
- 15 presentation from the Detroit Detention Center.
- 16 Following the Department of Justice consent order the
- 17 department agreed to change how we confine suspect
- 18 awaiting charges and trial. The DDC is the home of the
- 19 former Mound Correctional Facility, which closed in
- 20 January 2012. The DDC was opened on August 1st, 2013
- 21 operating on an interagency agreement between Detroit PD
- 22 and the Michigan Department of Corrections. Under the
- 23 chief report I would like to ask the chief -- say
- 24 correction -- the deputy chief vice is he aware of the
- 25 recent controversial issue related to positive field



- 1 testing kit. Reports from various policing agencies
- 2 across the country are reporting that the field test
- 3 kits are providing false positive reading in field
- 4 narcotics tests. While I do not believe that Detroit
- 5 Police Department used these field test kits, I would
- 6 like for the deputy chief to verify our practice in this
- 7 area of testing narcotics.
- Additionally, in a recent internal
- 9 notification of critical incident, one report referred
- 10 to a shots fired task force. The report indicated the
- 11 officer responded within minutes of the alert. However,
- 12 I recall the discussion with the chief that Detroit was
- 13 not utilizing this technology. Clarification on this
- 14 subject is requested.
- 15 Finally, under the chief police report by
- 16 the deputy chief the board noticed administrative
- 17 message on November 30, 2018 teletype 180739. The
- 18 message indicated that DPOA members could use in lieu of
- 19 suspension time banks to offset the time off given under
- 20 the systemary process. This message sound a lot like
- 21 abuse departmental rules and go on vacation. Our staff
- 22 has searched for authority on this declaration. We have
- 23 been unable to locate any authority on this relationship
- 24 to DPOA. I would ask for clarification on this matter.
- 25 At the mid point of the meeting we have oral



- 1 communication from the audience, that's where you come
- 2 in. Make sure you print your name on a speaker's card
- 3 located in the back on the table or can be attained by
- 4 seeing Mr. Brown or staff. We need your card before the
- 5 public comments going to be announced. As you well know
- 6 we on a time frame so we need to get those cards in.
- 7 You have two minutes to speak and we going to hold you
- 8 to that time frame but you can always speak to if
- 9 there's a matter concerning office of the chief
- 10 investigator you can speak to our staff. If a matter
- 11 concern DPD, you can speak to DPD. They are available
- 12 during the meeting and after meeting. They would
- 13 accommodate you, so you don't always have to say the
- 14 whole story for five minutes 'cause you're not going to
- 15 get five minutes at the podium.
- I want to say I had the opportunity this
- 17 afternoon at 1:00 to speak to the newly promoted
- 18 sergeant and lieutenant. It was good hour exchange. We
- 19 looking forward to the graduation and promotion next
- 20 Friday at 10:30 at Greater Grace on the west side of
- 21 Detroit. We all know that location. I'm going to move
- 22 on to at this time our deputy chief.
- 23 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Good evening -- or
- 24 good afternoon again. Deputy Chief Marlon Wilson. I'll
- 25 start off with a crime stats. Total violent offenses



- 1 are down 3 percent. Total property offenses are down 9
- 2 percent. Total part one offenses are down 7 percent.
- 3 I'll highlight a few categories. Homicide we're
- 4 currently down 2 percent. Robbery we're down 13
- 5 percent. Category of carjacking we're down -- we're up
- 6 actually 1 percent which equates to three additional
- 7 carjackings, but that is trending in the right direction
- 8 for the last 28 days. Aggravated assaults we're down 3
- 9 percent and non-fatals we're down 11 percent.
- To address, Commissioner, there are a couple
- of items that you listed in your report out. Field
- 12 testing kits I am aware of some of the false positive
- 13 that's out there but currently DPD we do not use field
- 14 testing kits. When we collect our narcotics it's sent
- 15 off to the lab for testing.
- 16 Second item was the incident I believe it
- 17 took place in two areas 3000 block of Pingree along with
- 18 Hazlewood. It came out as shots fired. We got a call
- 19 for service shots fired. We don't have shot spotter
- 20 technology in that area at all. So it was a call for
- 21 service. The 10th precinct had a task force already
- 22 formulated and based on that the -- reason for that, if
- 23 you can recall, maybe two, three months ago it was a
- 24 location that was highlighted on the news where
- 25 individual home was shot at multiple times. This



- 1 individual matches the description and the MO. So on
- 2 that night around 3 or 4:00 in the morning called a
- 3 service team out. He actually fired into 7 homes that
- 4 we documented on the 3000 block of Pingree. Officers
- 5 got in the area, saw him, he fled the officers. They
- 6 were able to recover an AR15 and a hand gun. Currently,
- 7 the homicide task force is investigating this matter and
- 8 we anticipate a warrant being submitted tomorrow
- 9 morning.
- 10 As well you mentioned the teletype regarding
- 11 DPOA utilizing comp time or vacation time in lieu of
- 12 suspension. It's my understanding that's something that
- 13 was already agreed upon with the lieutenants and
- 14 sergeants association, so I believe that's agreed upon
- 15 between the department and the DPOA.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I think we are asking for
- 17 a little bit more fact finding on that particular matter
- 18 just because it's applicable to the LSA don't mean it's
- 19 binding on the DPOA and we need a little research if you
- 20 would take the initiative. I'm pretty sure you will to
- 21 enlighten us and that will be very, very helpful.
- 22 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: If the board will
- 23 allow I'll get with the disciplinary unit and labor and
- 24 report out.
- 25 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir. We thank you



- 1 for that. And really we appreciate you responding to
- 2 that neighborhood that was under fire and I witnessed
- 3 the TV interview and they were relived. This person was
- 4 just at random firing up the neighborhood, so you
- 5 approach it very professional and you've been able to
- 6 make the arrest and we appreciate that type of response.
- 7 That's due diligence, you know, because no neighborhood,
- 8 no house should be under that type of fire and this guy
- 9 definitely have a problem. I'm glad you was on this.
- 10 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Absolutely. Thank
- 11 you, sir.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: That's your report?
- 13 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Yes.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner, any
- 15 question or concern for deputy chief? Yes, sir.
- 16 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Deputy chief, thank
- 17 you for the report. A number of weeks ago one of the
- 18 deputy chiefs indicated we were talking about residency
- 19 he mentioned, and I may not be accurate but I apologize
- 20 too if I'm not.
- 21 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Yes, sir.
- 22 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: He mentioned about the
- 23 fact that the telephone numbers that you may not have of
- 24 the officers that are not in residency. It was outside
- 25 of the city. And my concern was the question, the fact



- 1 is how do we get in touch with them if we don't -- it
- 2 seems like he said 70 percent we don't have the numbers
- 3 the right numbers and so I'm concerned about it.
- 4 Number two, is it -- a number of years ago
- 5 there was an effort in terms of police department of
- 6 trying to make sure that we would promote residency.
- 7 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Yes, sir.
- 8 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Is it your
- 9 understanding or should it be our understanding that
- 10 we're not really trying to really advocate that, promote
- 11 that, we're just basically just trying to just ignore
- 12 that because we feel like it's not going to happen or
- 13 something like this? What's the culture or the attitude
- 14 that you feel should we just give up on this in terms of
- 15 asking these kind of questions but even at that I think
- 16 we ought to be concerned whether we have the right
- 17 information about the police officers who do not -- in
- 18 case of emergency.
- 19 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: I know that's kind of
- 20 like a two part question, so I'll start with the first.
- 21 As far as the 70 inaccuracy of phone numbers, that's new
- 22 information to me.
- 23 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I apologize. It may
- 24 not be --
- 25 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: And I will allow,



- 1 maybe have the deputy chief's help chime in as well, but
- 2 my span of control is the detective bureau. I probably
- 3 have 3, 400 officers or detectives assigned to me and we
- 4 actually just really -- we just recently did a test
- 5 mobilization. We have everybody's phone number.
- 6 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Very good.
- 7 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: We actually went
- 8 through that exercise and I think our accuracy rate was
- 9 over 90 percent.
- 10 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: Assistant Chief
- 11 James White. That's correct as the deputy chief
- 12 indicated we just completed a test mobilization. I
- don't know where the 70 percent number came from.
- 14 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: And I apologize it may
- 15 not -- I might have have the wrong number there but I
- 16 have concern -- I think we always concerned that the
- 17 fact that it was alarming number.
- 18 ASSISTANT CHIEF WHITE: We weren't delighted
- 19 from the response from the mobilization but there's a
- 20 number of different components to a mobilization. One
- 21 is the actual phone number of reaching out and
- 22 contacting an officer and then there's the accuracy of
- 23 the information in reaching the officer in case there
- 24 was a major incident in the city. We're comfortable
- 25 with the fact that we can reach an officer but what the



- 1 mobilization revealed is that we had to make some
- 2 improvements in contacting. Some things were very basic
- 3 people moved, people get married, people change their
- 4 numbers. We've since corrected that and the numbers
- 5 that we've seen preliminary are in the 90 percentile.
- 6 Now we want to be at 100 percent but it's in the 90th
- 7 percentile and we're getting ready to launch another
- 8 test mobilization next week and we'll provide the board
- 9 with those numbers once we get it.
- 10 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I appreciate that.
- 11 And the other point should I just give up; should we as
- 12 board just give up on the fact that this is the culture
- we're basically go forward with or is it something
- 14 that...
- 15 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: No, I think we
- 16 continue the narrative but I can speak for my specific
- 17 area in the detective bureau a lot of officers.
- 18 especially the young ones, they do reside in the city of
- 19 Detroit. I'm actually seeing that; I'm seeing that
- 20 number actually grow.
- 21 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Okay. Thank you very
- 22 much.
- 23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Any other, Commissioners?
- 24 Yes, ma'am.
- 25 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: I did have a question



- 1 through the chair. My question is what is the process
- 2 now and it's (inaudible not talking into microphone)
- 3 contact of getting employee information in the system to
- 4 make sure the number remains at 90 percent 'cause as you
- 5 stated people often move and it is important that we are
- 6 able to reach out to the employees.
- 7 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: In order to maintain
- 8 accuracy just like AC White said, what we do is we
- 9 continue that practice regularly whether it's on a
- 10 quarterly or monthly basis till we get that number at,
- 11 so it's close to the 100 as much as possible. But
- 12 that's a regular exercise.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Any other
- 14 commissioners? Yes, sir.
- 15 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Is it a requirement
- 16 that they provide to update their numbers?
- 17 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Oh yes, that is
- 18 definitely a requirement.
- 19 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: That was my
- 20 understanding.
- 21 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Yes, it is an
- 22 understanding. Address there's certain things that you
- 23 have to update, your address, phone number, things of
- 24 that nature; that is a requirement. So, obviously, I
- 25 guess the next question is for those commands that found



- 1 people in violation, that's something we'll have to
- 2 address.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: If not Deputy Chief,
- 4 thank you for your report. Looking forward to more
- 5 information on the issues we raised as soon as possible
- 6 but we understand; and as far as the residency one of
- 7 the areas that we can, which we are concentrating on
- 8 now. Commissioner Holley has stepped up to be part of
- 9 the recruiting committee and with Commissioner
- 10 Dewaelsche and Commissioner Brooks. We are doing
- 11 everything possible but as we well know our issue of
- 12 public safety and education is in forefront of why
- 13 people are leaving Detroit and I think we have come a
- 14 long way. I know the mayor indicated that he would look
- 15 at growth population in terms of him being the mayor; he
- 16 did not achieve his goal at the last state of the city
- 17 but we all are concerned and I know -- but as I
- 18 indicated to the newly promoted sergeant lieutenant, not
- 19 withstanding we want you to do the best job that you can
- 20 possibly do as a police officer wearing your DPD
- 21 uniform. And as you well know I fought long and hard in
- 22 reference to the whole residence issue my entire career
- 23 but it changed, so but we have to really make this job
- 24 more attractive in so many different areas but also the
- 25 city more attractive and we not going to give that up.



- 1 Commissioner, we not going to give that issue up in
- 2 terms of fighting for that and who knows political
- 3 climate might be changing in Lansing one of these days,
- 4 so it's something that we will due diligence. D.C.,
- 5 thank you.
- 6 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Yes, sir.
- 7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: It's your first report as
- 8 deputy chief?
- 9 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Yes, sir.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I give you a B+.
- 11 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: A B+. I'll strive for
- 12 that A. Thank you, sir.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Really. The
- 14 next item of business would be hearing from -- as you
- 15 see I didn't bring my reading glasses, I'm winging it
- 16 somewhat -- Detroit Detention Center. All right. Would
- 17 you come forward, please?
- 18 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Mr. Chair, can they
- 19 possible bring out some more chairs? We have a lot of
- 20 people standing.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: It's possible, but they
- 22 okay. There are some seats up front, two or three
- 23 seats. I don't know if any other chairs might not be
- 24 available. I don't know but if we move the agenda, they
- 25 know how to adjust; left foot, right foot. But I want



- 1 to make sure all our senior citizen are sitting down.
- 2 If you are a senior citizen but if you have some need,
- 3 we ask some of our young people to give that seat up.
- 4 So we don't want you to be uncomfortable. Is that okay,
- 5 Commissioner?
- 6 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Okay.
- 7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: We do have one or two
- 8 seats here. We okay? Okay. It's good to see these
- 9 young people here. I'm familiar with both of them. We
- 10 had the opportunity to work together in PPU and also
- 11 office of the chief investigator. They going to
- 12 introduce themselves but I have a great deal of respect
- 13 for these two individuals. I wish Chief Craig was here,
- 14 there's people that still know Willie Bell as a working
- 15 person on this job. Go ahead.
- 16 LIEUTENANT MOORE: Yes, there is. I'm
- 17 Lieutenant James Moore.
- 18 CAPTAIN RASHEED: And I'm Captain Debbie
- 19 Abdul-Rasheed. I'm having a little problem with my
- 20 voice today. So the lieutenant will be assisting me.
- 21 LIEUTENANT MOORE: So if you don't mind I'll
- 22 do the vocal part of this presentation. I'll start off
- 23 by saying good afternoon to the honorable board members.
- 24 Good afternoon to deputy chief Marlon Wilson who is
- 25 representing chief of police and I would be remiss if I



- 1 did not say good afternoon to Assistant Chief White and
- 2 the rest of the command staff who are present here
- 3 today. I'm Lieutenant James Moore. I'm here to give
- 4 you a presentation about the Detroit Detention Center,
- 5 which we routinely call the DDC. So also present with
- 6 us is some of our partners. I have not had a chance to
- 7 scan the room but if I'm not mistake the deputy warden
- 8 from the Michigan Department of Corrections, I didn't
- 9 hear him introduce himself when we were doing
- 10 introductions --
- 11 DEPUTY WARDEN: I came in kind of late.
- 12 LIEUTENANT MOORE: Oh okay. So he is here.
- 13 Deputy Warden Terry Tellez, as well as one of his
- 14 assistants Mr. Boras (sic). So at the DDC our manpower
- 15 consist of 1 captain, 3 lieutenants, 9 sergeants, 1
- 16 detective, 13 police officers, 13 police assistants and
- 17 24 civilians who are currently assigned to a 24 hour 7
- 18 day a week operation. The DDC opened in 2013 as the
- 19 chairperson was saying earlier in his comments and it's
- 20 a partnership between us -- between DPD and the Michigan
- 21 Department of Corrections. The DDC is the centralized
- 22 holding facility responsible for the holding of all
- 23 prisoners in the Detroit Police Department. We process,
- 24 we house, we detain for for Detroit Police Department as
- 25 well as some of the other law enforcement agencies that



- 1 operate in and around the city. The DDC is organized in
- 2 two parts. We have building 100 for the processing of
- 3 all prisoners. Building 500 is where we house all the
- 4 detainees. Other agencies such as the Detroit Public
- 5 Schools, Wayne State University, Michigan State Police
- 6 and sometimes federal agencies ICE and other agencies
- 7 are also -- make use of the DDC by detaining their
- 8 arrests at that location.
- 9 The DDC opened in 2013 and we processed
- 10 approximately 6,324 detainees in that several months
- 11 from August of that year. In 2014 was the first full
- 12 year that the DDC was in operation and we processed
- 13 21,210 detainees. 2015 the amount went down slightly to
- 14 20,194. 2016; 18,591. 2017; 18,476. So as you can see
- 15 the amount of detainees that we are processing on an
- 16 annual basis has slowly gone down. So far this year we
- 17 have processed 15,129 detainees. Building 100 consists
- 18 of the front desk and the lobby and our responsibilities
- 19 there is where we do our probable cause review.
- 20 Officers bring their arrests in and supervisors will
- 21 review probable cause for the arrest. The detainee
- 22 screening takes place in the initial process. This is
- 23 all being done by the officer in charge of the DDC and
- 24 the civilian employees who are there to assist in the
- 25 administrative tasks. That detainee -- I'm sorry. The



- 1 detainee tracking that take places there ensures prompt
- 2 judicial review, prisoner transport, security and
- 3 bonding operations.
- 4 Okay. Area 1 is where we do our initial
- 5 intake. Area 2 is the search and control room where we
- 6 search and take contraband off of our detainees prior to
- 7 to turning them over to area 3 which is -- I'm sorry
- 8 prior to turning them over to MDOC. Area 3 is the
- 9 report room. Also in building 100 we have a
- 10 breathalyzer room, five interview rooms where officers
- in charge of cases can interview detainees with regards
- 12 to the cases that they're investigating. The detainee
- 13 information call desk. We have a line up room where
- 14 attorneys and -- you can do line ups and case officers
- 15 do line ups. We have attorney visit booths where
- 16 attorneys can visit their clients as well as
- 17 administration offices for DPD and Michigan Department
- 18 of Corrections. Inside building 100 you can see we have
- 19 a lobby there with a metal detector and walk through
- 20 booths. We have a walk through metal detector as well
- 21 as hand wands where we can actually physically check
- 22 people for metal or contraband. The sally port gates
- 23 are where the officers drive their scout cars inside and
- the detainees are taken from the scout cars and brought
- 25 into the facility in a secure fenced area. Yeah, that's



- 1 the picture in the top right. The intake lobby is the
- 2 picture in the bottom left where the detainees are
- 3 brought in and they sit in those chairs there until
- 4 we -- while we process them and get their paperwork done
- 5 prior to taking them into the bubble area where we do
- 6 their searches. Afterwards officers can go to the
- 7 bottom right area, which is the report room where
- 8 officers can actually do their reports while still at
- 9 the DDC.
- 10 Building 500 is where the final processing
- 11 stage take places. That is the facility that is
- 12 operated by our partners the Michigan Department of
- 13 Corrections. It's where detainees are live scanned. It
- 14 has approximately 6 live scan machines. We have
- 15 approximately 50 female holding cells, 150 male holding
- 16 cells. There are a couple of rooms for video
- 17 arraignment on each side, male and female. So when you
- 18 see those pieces on the news of people being video
- 19 arraigned they're actually not in the courtroom they're
- 20 at our building over on Mound Road and the court is
- 21 taking place downtown, so it's all being done by video
- 22 over the Internet. We normally hold two arraignments
- 23 daily, 9:30 is the traffic arraignment and 1:00 is when
- 24 felony arraignments take place. And in building 500
- 25 there is 24 hour nurse on duty, as well as a 24 on call



- 1 physician for issues involving medical issues with the
- 2 inmates. The DDC has continuously saved the department
- 3 money since its initiation. There's been just an
- 4 enormious cost savings there, as far as our cost medical
- 5 and the overall building costs. The DDC has three new
- 6 prisoner vans; we just got three new prisoner vans this
- 7 year so moving people around has gotten a lot easier.
- 8 Our immediate video arraignment is continuing daily. We
- 9 have an ATM machine in the bubble area for detainee
- 10 usage for the purpose of bonding. Those people who are
- 11 given bonds in their video arraignments are afforded
- 12 the opportunity to use their credit cards or ATM debit
- 13 cards in order to bond out. That process takes place 24
- 14 hours a day 7 days a week. Any questions?
- 15 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioners, do you
- 16 have any question or concerns for the lieutenant and
- 17 captain?
- 18 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir.
- 20 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: On an average how many
- 21 detainees do you have in the holding cell, male and
- 22 female?
- 23 LIEUTENANT MOORE: Off the top of my head
- 24 'cause I didn't bring that information with me but
- 25 average I would say about 70 combined.



- 1 CAPTAIN RASHEED: I would say between 15 and
- 2 20 females (inaudible) and probably about between 50 and
- 3 60. On a weekly basis we average probably about 350
- 4 prisoners a week.
- 5 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Okay.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir.
- 7 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Problem with me about
- 8 not asking questions to let people know just how naive
- 9 you are. But tell me 'cause I'm thinking if I get
- 10 arrested on 7 Mile and Woodward I'm going to be taken to
- 11 the precinct; you're telling me I'm going to go from the
- 12 spot I get arrested to the detention center?
- 13 LIEUTENANT MOORE: Yes, sir.
- 14 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Help me with the
- 15 narrative. Help me if you could, please.
- 16 LIEUTENANT MOORE: If you're stopped at 7
- 17 Mile and Woodward, traffic stop for whatever reason you
- 18 end up being arrested, the officers will take you over
- 19 to Mound Road and Nevada, which is around the corner
- 20 from 11th precinct and that's where we'll begin the
- 21 processing of you and you'll be handled.
- 22 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: When did you guys
- 23 start doing that? I know I sound like a -- when did you
- 24 start?
- LIEUTENANT MOORE: 2013.



- 1 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: '13?
- 2 CAPTAIN RASHEED: (Inaudible.)
- 3 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Can you speak into
- 4 the microphone?
- 5 CAPTAIN RASHEED: The officers now begin to
- 6 process the paperwork from their vehicle.
- 7 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I gotcha.
- 8 CAPTAIN RASHEED: So 99 percent of the time
- 9 by the time they get to the DDC --
- 10 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: So I'm a pastor and I
- 11 want to find my member, I'm thinking I'm going to the
- 12 police to get -- to help my member you're telling me --
- 13 I mean, again I apologize. I just don't know so I'm
- 14 asking because people are looking at this and maybe I'm
- asking questions other people feel like I do. So you're
- 16 telling me that -- how are we getting the word out to
- 17 community that this is the process to get your husband,
- 18 your wife, your children, brother and sister or
- 19 preacher? How we getting that message that that's what
- 20 we do?
- 21 LIEUTENANT MOORE: This is a process that
- 22 began over five years ago and so that message has pretty
- 23 much gotten out there.
- 24 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Not for me.
- 25 LIEUTENANT MOORE: Yeah, I hate to say that.



- 1 It's on our website.
- 2 CAPTAIN RASHEED: MDOC also has the
- 3 information on their website as well as DPD.
- 4 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Okay. But you know
- 5 I'm talking about the average, you know, we got
- 6 illiteracy problems here and I'm probably one of them,
- 7 okay? That's good. So you feel comfortable that the
- 8 community they know?
- 9 LIEUTENANT MOORE: Yes and anybody that
- 10 calls any precinct or any place in the police
- 11 department, they're immediately referred.
- 12 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: That makes sense. And
- 13 thank you for --
- 14 LIEUTENANT MOORE: We also have a call
- 15 center, 24 hour call center. If you dial the number,
- 16 they can tell you whether or not we have you person in
- 17 custody.
- 18 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Thank you for that.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, ma'am. Go ahead.
- 20 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: She was first.
- 21 COMMISSIONER BURCH: No, you go ahead.
- 22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: You got the mic.
- COMMISSIONER BURCH: I just want to support
- 24 commissioner Holley. Everybody commissioner does not
- 25 know that what you just say about you not knowing. I've



- 1 spoken to this about with Chief Barren that it needs to
- 2 be more information to the public of actually what goes
- 3 on in the police department and I'm just sharing that
- 4 what you think we may know we don't know because I'd
- 5 like to know as far as that Mound facility right there
- 6 you're saying that anywhere you get arrested in Detroit,
- 7 they take you to that place, which is called the holding
- 8 center, right?
- 9 CAPTAIN RASHEED: Detroit Detention Center.
- 10 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Is it just for people
- 11 that have a ticket or it's not for murderer or killers,
- 12 right?
- 13 LIEUTENANT MOORE: It's for everybody that's
- 14 placed under arrest by the Detroit Police Department.
- 15 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Whatever crime they
- 16 committed?
- 17 LIEUTENANT MOORE: Yes.
- 18 COMMISSIONER BURCH: That's what I'm saying;
- 19 I didn't know that either. Just for like somebody that
- 20 was picked up for a ticket and, you know, whatever
- 21 speeding whatever reason so it needs to be like I was
- 22 speaking with Chief Barren more information for the
- 23 public to be aware of what's in the area and what they
- 24 go through. It was just like we brought up last time
- 25 here at this board about people hijacking that that's a



- 1 federal offense. People didn't know that.
- 2 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Carjacking.
- 3 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Carjacking, did I say
- 4 the wrong thing? Carjacking. That's a federal offense.
- 5 Some people they don't know that. So maybe that would
- 6 deter people if they knew some of the penalties that
- 7 they wouldn't perhaps do them so quickly. And so I'm
- 8 looking at your report, which is good but it just needs
- 9 to be to me broken down a little bit more as far as I
- 10 don't see anything in here regarding their lunch room.
- 11 What do they eat? Do they eat three times -- see,
- 'cause I'm concerned about sometimes prisoners get such
- 13 good treatment they don't want to leave. I just want to
- 14 know are they served three meals a day? Do they get to
- 15 go play tennis? Do they get to go watch TV? What do
- 16 they do while they're sitting there in the holding
- 17 place?
- 18 LIEUTENANT MOORE: Yes, ma'am. We do feed
- 19 people three times a day. There is no television and
- 20 nobody stays in our facility longer than 72 hours.
- 21 Under no circumstance, three days.
- 22 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Okay, where do you put
- 23 them if they don't -- when they leave there, where do
- 24 they go?
- 25 CAPTAIN RASHEED: They go to home or Wayne



- 1 county jail.
- 2 LIEUTENANT MOORE: Or if they're extradited
- 3 to another facility somewhere else, you know.
- 4 COMMISSIONER BURCH: We always hear that
- 5 Wayne County's overfilled, too, right? I just wonder
- 6 what we doing with all these people? And where's the
- 7 rehabilitation; how are we helping people to be better
- 8 citizens?
- 9 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner that is not
- 10 our focus.
- 11 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I know.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: That's not our focus at
- 13 this time; it's another discussion. I'm going to move
- 14 on to Commissioner Dewaelsche.
- 15 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Thank you,
- 16 Mr. Chair. I have a couple questions as it relates to
- 17 the capacity of the facility. First of all, are these
- 18 single unit cells? Is there only one person in each
- 19 cell?
- LIEUTENANT MOORE: No.
- 21 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Okay. So when you
- 22 have 50, it's possible you're not -- you have 25 cells?
- 23 LIEUTENANT MOORE: We have single unit cells
- 24 and they have segregated areas for people who have
- 25 problems, problem detainees.



- 1 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Like mental?
- 2 LIEUTENANT MOORE: Right. Or intoxicated.
- 3 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: And then
- 4 Commissioner Burch may have asked my question, but let
- 5 me just ask it again. If for any reason you are at full
- 6 capacity any day or, you know, couple days 'cause you
- 7 only keep them for 72 hours, right? If you're at full
- 8 capacity, what happens to those individuals that are
- 9 brought in?
- 10 CAPTAIN RASHEED: Well, the premise, ma'am,
- 11 is that we have arraignment every day. If you are there
- 12 for traffic, you're out. We do not keep you.
- 13 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: So people are
- 14 leaving every day?
- 15 CAPTAIN RASHEED: Every day.
- 16 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: So you haven't had
- 17 that?
- 18 CAPTAIN RASHEED: Never had it.
- 19 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.
- 20 CAPTAIN RASHEED: Not even close since I've
- 21 been there.
- 22 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.
- 23 CAPTAIN RASHEED: You're welcome.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Any other commissioners?
- 25 I want the commissioner to know that this was a process



- 1 on a consent agreement with the justice department. A
- 2 long study we spent significant amount to get out of
- 3 precinct prison lockup, precinct lockups, so this is a
- 4 wholesome where they get medical care, they do not get a
- 5 baloney sandwich and a piece of bread anymore. You can
- 6 see that is very wholesome process and I'm pleased
- 7 that -- we all should be pleased. This has been five
- 8 years that this been in place and trust me the people in
- 9 Detroit know how to find their loved ones. If they call
- 10 the precinct, they will get information more timely.
- 11 Unlike the old days when people get lost in the system
- 12 it's a different technology in this day and age so
- 13 nobody get lost. People been processed, arraignment all
- 14 it's happening constantly. So you're doing a good job
- and if we can enlighten the commission more but
- 16 basically the people in the community know. Unfortunate
- 17 the people who -- whatever they did -- go ahead.
- 18 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: What kind of video
- 19 surveillance is in the prison in the detention center on
- 20 Mound Road? I'm asking because I just happen to be this
- 21 weekend watching a documentary about (inaudible not
- 22 taking into microphone) case. One of the risk
- 23 mitigation (inaudible). I just want to make sure that
- 24 something that we use there to protect police officers
- 25 from being accused of something they did not do.



- 1 LIEUTENANT MOORE: There is a high
- 2 definition video surveillance sytem, not only in the
- 3 detainee lockup but also in the administrative building.
- 4 It is a former prison so there was high definition video
- 5 all over the grounds. And still there.
- 6 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: You can see every
- 7 cell?
- 8 LIEUTENANT MOORE: Yes.
- 9 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I'm asking --
- 10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay.
- 11 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: You had the two people
- 12 the warden, is it the warden?
- 13 LIEUTENANT MOORE: Deputy warden, yes.
- 14 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: This is a jail, I
- 15 mean?
- 16 LIEUTENANT MOORE: They're actually
- 17 employees of the state of Michigan. The state of
- 18 Michigan still owns the place; we rent it; they operate
- 19 the lockup.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: We can hear from the
- 21 warden.
- 22 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: But you make me feel
- 23 so bad.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Don't feel bad. I just
- 25 got a little inside knowledge. It's okay.



- 1 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: So I'm trying to
- 2 figure out, I'm thinking the detention center is a
- 3 holding place so why do I need a warden and assistant
- 4 warden?
- 5 DEPUTY WARDEN: Sir, it is a partnership
- 6 with the city of Detroit and I am a representative from
- 7 the state of Michigan for Michigan Department of
- 8 Corrections.
- 9 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Your role?
- 10 DEPUTY WARDEN: My role is the oversight
- 11 over the facility. Correct.
- 12 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: So do you work for us
- 13 or you work for state?
- 14 DEPUTY WARDEN: I work for the state, sir
- but I'm actually paid for under the interagency
- 16 agreement, so in effect I'm paid for by the city.
- 17 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Thank you so much. I
- 18 feel so much better.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I don't want no
- 20 commissioner not to receive information. That's why
- 21 these entities come before us constantly so don't be,
- 22 you know, whatever basically want you to know because
- 23 contrary to popular belief Commissioner Bell don't know
- 24 everything. None of us know, that's why -- we learn
- 25 something every day how the process work. And they are



- 1 updating us but we are no longer in housing and plus it
- 2 freed up police personnel from the precinct. That's
- 3 another manpower that can be involved with public safety
- 4 versus in this precinct; is that correct?
- 5 LIEUTENANT MOORE: That's correct.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: So that was a whole game
- 7 change in terms of personnel so on behalf of the board
- 8 thank you two. You did an outstanding and thank our
- 9 warden too for joining us this afternoon and it's
- 10 something that it's a wholesome process because if you
- 11 don't know it's no fun to be locked up one minute and we
- 12 try to make a good experience but you won't come back,
- 13 but they do come back.
- 14 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Are you...
- 15 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. We going to
- 16 move on to the next item would be any outstanding ad hoc
- 17 committee reports. If not, I'm going to ask the next
- 18 item will be from our board secretary, Mr. Hicks.
- 19 MR. HICKS: Thank you, Mr. Chair. I do want
- 20 to draw your attention to the items that are listed on
- 21 the agenda, 11 items listed under agenda. These items
- 22 really represent items that are coming, that have come
- 23 into the office. They are not set on the agenda for
- 24 action for today. In most cases they're referred to a
- 25 proper place for further information or investigation.



- 1 But you do have 11 items on there and I do want to note
- 2 that, typically, on each occasion where there is a
- 3 transmission from the chief of police where his section
- 4 has reviewed the police manual and they're recommending
- 5 changes to the police manual, a transmission is given to
- 6 us about a proposed change in the police manual. When
- 7 we receive those things we immediately route them to the
- 8 commissioners themselves and then we refer them
- 9 internally to our policy division, which is headed by
- 10 Mrs. White, who was introduced earlier today. This --
- 11 we receive these on a regular basis. This issue is kind
- 12 of tied into one of the other issues in which you
- 13 received over the break and that was a request from the
- 14 chief's office. It was actually a request from AC
- 15 White's office to meet on a particular issue and this
- 16 was related to one of the proposed changes in the
- 17 manual. We, in talking with the chair and the
- 18 leadership what we prepared was a response and a copy of
- 19 that response was one, transmitted to you all and is
- 20 included in this list. The essence of that response is
- 21 that we tend to be at odds with the police department
- 22 over the interpretation of the powers of the board of
- 23 police commission. The department sees it one way; we
- 24 see it another way and it really does not make a lot of
- 25 sense to continue to process these proposed directive



- 1 changes if there's some dispute as to whether or not we
- 2 have the power to do such. So that was one of the items
- 3 that I do want to call your attention to.
- 4 The rest of the items that are on the list
- 5 relates to standard communications in which you
- 6 received; for example, you did receive a communications
- 7 from the chief's office with reference to the suspension
- 8 without pay for Corporal Dewayne Jones. That was
- 9 immediately transmitted to the members of the board.
- 10 Subsequent to that members of the board also received,
- 11 and it's in your packet today, a copy of the review that
- 12 was done by board attorney Mr. Wyrick and that review
- 13 will be something that of course you will take into the
- 14 closed session later today.
- So with those general highlights I do want
- 16 to note that you do have 11 items. Some of them we've
- 17 spoken to already. Others will be processed over a
- 18 period of time. Unless there's any particular question
- in which you would have, that would be my report for the
- 20 day.
- 21 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Mr. Chair, I have a
- 22 point of clarification?
- 23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, ma'am.
- 24 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: It's noted on the
- 25 agenda that my term ends on June 30th and I had spoken



- 1 with the mayor's office and I don't believe that's true.
- 2 I believe I will be appointed until the end of what was
- 3 Conrad Mallet's term. I think 2021. That was what was
- 4 submitted to the office so I just want to correct that
- 5 for any record.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Well, we cannot make that
- 7 correction until we have a directive to that effect.
- 8 I'm pretty sure they would forth coming we will make a
- 9 correction in the future. That's what it is now and we
- 10 saw that; we was wondering, you know, why a six month
- 11 term is unusual.
- 12 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Yes. I think it was
- 13 an error, clerical error so.
- 14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: So when we get that
- 15 directive, we will make that correction in the next
- 16 minutes in terms reflecting whatever they indicate is
- 17 your term.
- 18 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Thank you.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON BELL: If there's no other
- 20 business for the secretary, I move on to any old
- 21 business? Old business, I do have one item that you all
- 22 are aware on -- what's the date December the 6th?
- 23 There's legal marijuana now and I'm going to request at
- 24 our community meeting that our chief staff give us a
- 25 little update what does that mean as far as DPD and the



- 1 public. I think there's so much information out there
- 2 to give clarity but we want to make sure that we have
- 3 some working knowledge coming from DPD in reference to
- 4 that you cannot smoke marijuana in public places. You
- 5 need to know that.
- 6 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Oh man.
- 7 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Mr. Chair, we
- 8 (inaudible) at one of these meetings. I think that's a
- 9 great point you make in terms of what policy changes
- 10 (inaudible) on the training for officers.
- 11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yeah, we have had
- 12 different forums that it's coming and now it's here.
- 13 It's not, you know, they would give us the update
- 14 hopefully a brief update perhaps it's a short notice at
- 15 our next community meeting next week to enlighten us
- 16 somewhat but there's been breakout information, like I
- 17 said some people don't follow that trend in terms of how
- 18 they should be smoking and even riding in the car with
- 19 marijuana. So we look forward to that report next week.
- DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Yes, sir. We should
- 21 be able to accomplish that. I think a teletype was
- 22 published today regarding that, so I'll forward that to
- 23 you.
- 24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Then we have
- 25 more dialogue. Commissioner?



- 1 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Mr. Chair, and if
- 2 I recall back in October we did have a formal
- 3 presentation from the corporate -- I mean the council's
- 4 office and I requested that we get an update in January
- 5 after this law passed depending on what status was but
- 6 maybe we do it sooner because.
- 7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Well, we give update from
- 8 DPD and we look forward to corporation council in
- 9 January.
- 10 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: That sounds good.
- 11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: And meanwhile I hope
- 12 nobody's smoking (inaudible) and get in trouble but
- there's federal law we all know it's still federally
- 14 against the law for marijuana. New business.
- 15 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes, sir. Can I give a
- 16 report on the third district where I'm the district
- 17 commissioner there. I'm happy to say that there's a new
- 18 business that has come into our area. It is called the
- 19 Michigan Recreational Contractors. These are people
- 20 that go around and enhance our Detroit parks so in lieu
- 21 of my attendance at a zoning hearing there are too many
- 22 scrap yards that we have in our city. We're trying to
- 23 change the premises of what you think you can do in our
- 24 city by bringing things in not to help us but to make us
- look worse and then so by this company coming we're very



- 1 happy because he's going to promote the blight that is
- 2 in District 3 and anybody else. So I just wanted to
- 3 acknowledge that company; we're happy to have them in
- 4 District 3. And I'll give you more update as the next
- 5 project he will be doing. Thank you.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. The Chairman
- 7 would entertain a motion to authorize the promotion of
- 8 the three individuals that we cited earlier Detective
- 9 Armstrong, Detective Doughty (sic) and Officer Friedman
- 10 to sergeant class.
- 11 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Motion to approve.
- 12 VICE CHAIR BROWN: Support.
- 13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Been properly moved and
- 14 supported. Discussion, those in favor aye.
- 15 ALL: Aye.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Those opposed? Motion
- 17 carry. And thank you. Announcement, our next meeting
- 18 would be Thursday, December 11th at 6:30 p.m., The third
- 19 precinct at Wayne State McGregor Center. That's 496?
- 20 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: 495.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: 495 Gilmour Mall.
- 22 Parking, it's outlined free parking there in Wayne State
- area so there's a map on the hand out. You got the
- 24 agenda if you should -- if you have any problems, you
- 25 can always call the office and get directions. The hand



- 1 out it gives you the breakdown where it is. Our next
- 2 community meeting will be on Thursday, January the 10th
- 3 that would be at 6:30 p.m., The 12th precinct at Unity
- 4 Temple, 17376 Wyoming and that's on the west side of
- 5 Detroit. So that would be our next meeting next week
- 6 will be last meeting of the year, is that correct, and
- 7 we'll be taking a Christmas break.
- I also want to point out on that January the
- 9 10th first meeting of the charter commission at 6:30, if
- 10 they on time, we going to communicate a letter to them
- 11 hopefully in the future they will not schedule a meeting
- of that nature on our meeting night because we want to
- 13 be involved with the charter commission. As you well
- 14 know (inaudible). We will communicate our schedule to
- 15 them and perhaps but I know when they convene they were
- 16 just working on a date in January; they didn't look at
- 17 nobody calendar; they looked at their calendar, so we'll
- 18 make them aware but that's a kick off of January 10th;
- 19 you will hear more information about that. We're going
- 20 to move now to oral communication from the public
- 21 Mr. Brown, how many cards?
- MR. BROWN: I have 11 cards.
- 23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: 11 cards? We going to
- 24 hold you to two minutes, 'cause we are going to recess
- 25 for the personnel matters, so I'm going to ask if you



- 1 going to speak, would you go to my left to this wall, if
- 2 you going to speak. Call the first person.
- 3 MR. BROWN: First speaker is councilman Roy
- 4 McCalister followed by Mr. Eric Blount, followed by
- 5 Ms. Michelle George. Sergeant Scott Hall. Alexis
- 6 Sukey. Sherry MCcain. Lieutenant Pierce. Ronald Lach.
- 7 Marian Smith. Jason Kleinsarge. And Raymond Stephen.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: And we going give respect
- 9 to the councilman in terms of time frame, so if you have
- 10 something to say, don't feel rushed, if you want to
- 11 share with us, go ahead.
- 12 COUNCILMAN MCCALISTER: Thank you, Mr. Chair
- 13 to the chair. First of all, I'd like to give honor to
- 14 God who's head of my life for allowing me to be here and
- 15 allowing each and every one of you to be here. On the
- 16 ending of this year and one of the things I want to do
- is I want to give blessings a member that I work with
- 18 Retiree Terry Hodge who passed away. And Commissioner
- 19 Holley I want to give you a belated happy birthday as
- 20 well. But I also want to come in and welcome new
- 21 commissioner to my district, Commissioner Griffie. I've
- 22 had the opportunity to speak with her and I look forward
- 23 to her -- working with her, her being involved in the
- 24 district because one of the things that we do in
- 25 District 2 is we make sure the people are taken care of.



- 1 So I look forward to that, as well as I continued to
- 2 look forward to working with the board, the
- 3 commissioners as well as and Commissioner Brooks as you
- 4 well know I was with you at your meeting there but I
- 5 just wanted to say thank you and good job done for this
- 6 year and, again, we look forward to working with you.
- 7 Thank you and God bless you.
- 8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, sir.
- 9 MR. BROWN: Mr. Blount followed by Ms.
- 10 Michelle George.
- 11 MR. BLOUNT: Good afternoon board. For the
- 12 record my name is Eric Blount, a life long Detroiter.
- 13 I've also been a minister here in Detroit for over 30
- 14 years. And I've had a sad experience in visiting people
- 15 at the Wayne County jail. So my question on this
- 16 Detroit Detention Center is what safe guards are in
- 17 place to protect the detainees? I know they're only
- 18 there for 72 hours but they cannot protect themselves;
- 19 they cannot always be on guard against physical and
- 20 sexual abuse.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Lieutenant Moore going to
- 22 respond to that question.
- 23 LIEUTENANT MOORE: Well, I will say that
- 24 most of all the staff. The DDC is pretty much an open
- 25 facility and those people who are held in bull pins



- 1 where you have multiple people, it's open, it's an open
- 2 area. They can be seen; it's under high definition
- 3 camera. But most of all the staff. The staff is always
- 4 there and we haven't had any issue like that to my
- 5 knowledge. No sexual assaults or anything like that.
- 6 But we also --
- 7 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Through the chair, as
- 8 a point of reference after we do the initial processing
- 9 we turn a prisoner over to the Michigan Department of
- 10 Corrections so they manage their safety.
- 11 LIEUTENANT MOORE: Also I wanted to add the
- 12 Michigan Department of Corrections is responsible under
- 13 the federal government's prison rape act. And we were
- 14 just audited within the last three or four months and we
- 15 received 100 percent. They came in from out of state
- 16 and the federal agencies and they did an audit and we
- 17 received 100 percent.
- 18 CAPTAIN RASHEED: Detainees and everything.
- MR. BLOUNT: Thank you.
- 20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Mr. Blount, good
- 21 question.
- MR. BROWN: Ms. Michelle George followed by
- 23 Scott Hall.
- 24 MS. GEORGE: Good evening to Chairman Bell
- 25 and this honorable board. I wish Chief Craig was here



- 1 but I'm sure you'll give him the message. I wanted to
- 2 comment on my concern is the lawsuits that have been
- 3 coming to DPD recently. One of the lawsuits was on the
- 4 news, officers treated unfairly after reporting Detroit
- 5 police time card fraud. My concern is that the Detroit
- 6 police officers they see violence every day and they put
- 7 their lives on the line. I guess what I'm thinking is
- 8 so much stress on them that they have to worry about
- 9 officers allegedly retaliating against them and it
- 10 effects the community. How the community got
- information we were told to watch the news, so that's
- 12 something I'm hoping the board will hone in on because I
- 13 know that that ACOU had did a lawsuit back in August
- 14 with complaining of a racially hostile environment. I
- 15 don't feel police officers should have to deal with that
- 16 and they're here to serve and protect with stress. I
- 17 also have been a product of bullying, even as a nurse
- 18 but the patients came first and I had to deal with the
- 19 bullying situation and the environment. So I'm hoping
- 20 Chief Craig, I know he's playing two roles as chief of
- 21 police and as deputy Mayor but that's something that
- 22 should be dealt with. Police officers shouldn't have to
- 23 come to work to deal with stress from other officers and
- 24 then go on the street and see the crime and violence
- 25 they have to see every day. So that's my concern with



- 1 that.
- 2 Also National Action Network we did a press
- 3 conference on Monday for a moratorium on tax abatements
- 4 and that's something we going to focus in on with city
- 5 council because I don't know how many officers in the
- 6 city of Detroit maybe 2,200 but each officer could get
- 7 \$3,000 bonus. I feel the officers should be paid
- 8 especially in Detroit with living in the most violent
- 9 city and that's something we going to be focused on
- 10 because the city council is approving all these tax
- 11 abatements and millions of dollars can go to police for
- 12 money and police can come into the city, so that's
- 13 something we're going to be focussing on with city
- 14 council. That's been my heart. It's too many tax
- 15 abatements and the city council was going to give --
- 16 what is it -- one of the corporations four billion
- 17 dollar tax abatement. I know my time is up; I got more
- 18 to compliment on but I'll wait till next time.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON BELL: And thank you. I just
- 20 want to say this. As you know we can't comment on any
- 21 lawsuit but the other part we cannot unveil message this
- 22 is the most violent city. We should not have that
- 23 dialogue that feed into this PR marketing about Detroit.
- 24 So we should not -- we should refrain from having that
- 25 type of dialogue.



- 1 MS. GEORGE: Well, it was in the news
- 2 article. I'm just commenting.
- 3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I'm just trying to be
- 4 more positive about Detroit and we don't want the
- 5 audience, we don't want you to fall into that. That's
- 6 one of the areas that we know all cities, urban cities
- 7 have issues but somehow Detroit get that and then we
- 8 feed into that. I just want to share that with you.
- 9 MS. GEORGE: Thank you.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: As you well know. Thank
- 11 you.
- MR. BROWN: Mr. Hall followed by Ms. Sukey.
- MR. HALL: Good evening ladies and
- 14 gentlemen. Thank you guys for your service and commit
- 15 to the city of Detroit. I truly appreciate you guys and
- 16 everything you do for the city. At the beginning of
- 17 this meeting, Mr. Chairman, you stated that this board
- 18 oversees excessive uses of force by DPD members. Well
- 19 this incident that -- involving Corporal Jones didn't
- 20 look pretty on the 32nd news clip; I don't believe it
- 21 was an excessive use of force incident. I think it was
- 22 a necessary part of Corporal Jones's duty that day. I
- 23 have personally known Corporal Jones for nearly 20 years
- 24 and never have I seen him use any amount of excessive
- 25 force or demeaning actions toward any citizen. I would



- 1 like that bring to your attention the lady that was
- 2 involved in this incident has had several prior uses of
- 3 forces with DPD members besides Corporal Jones; and just
- 4 weeks prior to the incident with Corporal Jones she
- 5 assaulted a man with a brick, a handicapped man,
- 6 wheel-bound chaired man with a brick. I believe that
- 7 any officer that would be in Corporal Jones's shoes
- 8 probably act the same way he did that day and use the
- 9 hard hand techniques he utilized to get this lady under
- 10 control. She does suffer from mental health issues and
- 11 she does not process information or understanding like
- 12 you or I would.
- In closing I am just asking this board to
- 14 consider keeping Corporal Jones pay status the same
- 15 until he has the opportunity to have his case
- 16 adjudicated. Corporal Jones has already lost out on the
- 17 opportunity for being promoted to sergeant because of
- 18 this incident he was passed over in this recent class so
- 19 I'd like you to keep that into consideration as well,
- 20 please. Thank you.
- 21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.
- MR. BROWN: Ms. Sukey followed by
- Ms. McCain.
- 24 MS. SUKEY: Hello. Just in regards to the
- 25 force used by Corporal Jones I want to say police using



- 1 force is never going to be pretty. We are trained in
- 2 hard hand techniques and that's what he did and that's
- 3 what I would have done in the same circumstance. I've
- 4 been Corporal Jones' supervisor for the past two and a
- 5 half years and if there is a poster child for Detroit
- 6 police, I would choose Corporal Jones. He always gets
- 7 the job done by the book; he's never let us down and I
- 8 just want to say a failure to support him right now is
- 9 not only going to be a devastating loss to him and his
- 10 family, all the officers that have worked with him but
- 11 the city of Detroit as a whole. That's all, thank you.
- 12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.
- MR. BROWN: Ms. McCain.
- 14 MS. MCCAIN: I'm trying not to be emotional.
- 15 Sherry McCain, third precinct. I worked with Dewayne,
- 16 Corporal Dewayne Jones. This has hurt me to the core.
- 17 Such a fine officer. One of the best. That's why I'm
- 18 here. I know you guys, some of you guys do know me and
- 19 I hope that by you knowing me and the type of
- 20 professional person that I try to be he is outstanding.
- 21 The worst bite is a human bite. I've been on this job a
- 22 long time and my encounter was not with a human bite but
- 23 it was of a dog. I want you to know I killed that dog.
- 24 We were trained to do hand to hand combat. Okay? Hard
- 25 hands. I can't imagine to run into a woman that's



- 1 trying to bite me and I got to do hand to hand combat
- 2 with her. It's the worst bite is a human bite. I need
- 3 you guys to know that; you don't know what he would have
- 4 had to go through if he had been bit by this woman.
- 5 He's a fine officer. And I'm here to tell you from the
- 6 bottom of my heart, okay? This his family is
- 7 devastated. I'm devastated. This effects us all; he's
- 8 such a good person. I just -- I don't know what to say.
- 9 Show him some leniency; don't take his house, his car,
- 10 his kid. That's it. He's a good person.
- 11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.
- MR. BROWN: Lieutenant --
- 13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I want to pause in terms
- 14 of protocol. I've been very patient but I cannot
- 15 tolerate anymore of you guys. We are commissioners.
- 16 And you are officers; we are not you guys. I cannot
- 17 tolerate anymore comments of that nature.
- MS. MCCAIN: I apologize, sir.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON BELL: You're okay. I just want
- 20 to share that with you; it's one of my pet peeves. We
- 21 are not you guys. We are commissioners. And we refer
- 22 to you as officers so let's get protocol. Thank you.
- 23 LIEUTENANT PIERCE: Good evening. I'm
- 24 Lieutenant Lori Pierce of the third precinct. I've been
- 25 on the job for over 25 years. I've been a lieutenant



- 1 for over 18 years. I was born and raised in this city.
- 2 Love Detroit. My heart is in Detroit. I'm here because
- 3 pretty much all of us back there and over here would
- 4 have done the same thing. That's what we're trained to
- 5 do, okay? The highest level he could have take, he did
- 6 it. He used hard hands. It's what we have to deal with
- 7 when we're dealing with some mental people, okay? I'm
- 8 going to try to stick with what I wrote down here. I
- 9 have been Corporal Jones' previous direct supervisor for
- 10 a period of time. He's truly one of the best I've ever
- 11 worked with in 25 years. He has a very high moral
- 12 character. He did what almost all of us would have
- done. A lot of us would have done a lot more, okay?
- 14 And just so you know the mental population in the third
- 15 precinct is very high. We always want to try to help
- 16 them. We had a sergeant just the other night try to
- 17 help them, got stabbed in the leg and has three staples
- in his leg dealing with violent mentals, okay?
- 19 That night a Taser was not an option for
- 20 Corporal Jones. The chemical spray, pepper spray, was
- 21 not an option for Corporal Jones. PR24 the collapsable
- 22 baton we carry was not an option for Corporal Jones. He
- 23 chose the lowest -- one of the lowest forms on the force
- 24 continuum in our DPD policy, which is hard hands.
- 25 Doesn't look pretty on video; just like a collapsable



- 1 baton looks like a terrible beating on video. Doesn't
- 2 look nice; our jobs do not look nice. We deal with a
- 3 lot; it's not pretty. He did what all of them would
- 4 have done; what all these people would have done; what I
- 5 would have done. And it doesn't look nice. And what
- 6 everyone here needs to know is that media's portraying
- 7 him in thi sway that he came across this woman at a
- 8 hospital and wants to just beat up on her. He was going
- 9 to the station to do a report. Here's a run come out, a
- 10 naked lady in the street. He said you know what, I'm
- 11 going to go help this lady; I'm not going to go to the
- 12 station and do this report. He goes, he looks for her,
- 13 she's not there. He finds her anyways, he searches for
- 14 her. He takes her to the hospital; she gets out of the
- 15 car naked. He's like no, I don't want people gawking at
- 16 you. I'm going to get you a sheet and wrap you up in a
- 17 sheet and get you some help. Then the whole incident
- 18 with this woman biting the hospital personnel; he used
- 19 hard hands. It's what everybody else here would have
- 20 don; it's what I would have done. I thank you for
- 21 hearing me.
- 22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.
- MR. BROWN: Ronald Lach followed by Marian
- 24 Smith.
- 25 MR. LACH: Good afternoon, commission. My



- 1 name is Officer Ronald Lach. I've been a Detroit police
- 2 officer for almost 24 years. I've known Corporal
- 3 Dewayne Jones for just over 20 years. Corporal Jones
- 4 definitely is a poster child of a Detroit police
- 5 officer. He's such a hard worker; such an honest guy,
- 6 such a good guy. He became a corporal to train the new
- 7 officers. That was his main job to train new officers,
- 8 the way officers that trained him. I think Corporal
- 9 Jones was put in some very unfortunate circumstances
- 10 this past summer. He was put in a very unfortunate
- 11 position. I concur with every one of coworkers that
- 12 were up before this honorable commission and I would
- have done the exact same thing; there's nothing more
- 14 that we could do. We've been trained to use hard hands
- 15 when we have to. This is a situation where he had to.
- 16 He could not use a baton. He couldn't pepper spray; he
- 17 was way too close to even attempt to try and utilize his
- 18 Taser. And then Corporal Jones didn't just start --
- 19 well, I don't want to speculate on everything that
- 20 happened. This will get hopefully sorted out in court
- 21 but he didn't start out using hard hands. There was an
- 22 investigation. And, again, I just want to leave that
- 23 alone, that will be sorted out in court. I can just say
- 24 that Corporal Jones did everything that we were trained
- 25 to do, everything that I would have done. And



- 1 commissioners, you guys don't know me other than
- 2 Commissioner Bell. Commissioner Bell was my sergeant 23
- 3 years ago and he knows that I'm an honest, hard working
- 4 person. I wouldn't come up here and tell a tale. Thank
- 5 you.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.
- 7 MR. BROWN: Officer Smith.
- 8 OFFICER SMITH: I'm Officer Smith of the
- 9 third precinct. I just wanted -- first of all, when I
- 10 put my name on the piece of paper I didn't know it was
- 11 to come up here and speak but at any given time the
- 12 reason that I came up here anyway, at any given time I
- 13 can say something about this man. This man's
- 14 disciplinary actions, his discipline, the way he carries
- 15 himself and in 20 years you see each other on and off
- 16 duty. On and off duty this man is disciplined. He's by
- 17 the book. He's number one, if there's something he is
- 18 unknown first to call a supervisor to the scene. Never
- 19 to just take anything into his own hands and just act
- 20 frivolously. The young lady that is in question this
- 21 woman she lives in the Woodbridge area, which is the
- 22 area I cover. And she has many, many complaints from
- 23 all -- well, let me not say all but from a lot of people
- in the Woodbridge area. And then plus her snapping, her
- 25 mental instability was not so when Corporal Jones



- 1 brought her into the hospital. That was as a result of
- 2 something that the nurse said to her and her mental
- 3 instability was -- went off. So it's not because of any
- 4 action that he has done. He did his job. And I just
- 5 wanted to say that to you.
- 6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.
- 7 MR. BROWN: Sergeant, say your last name
- 8 when you get up, please.
- 9 SERGEANT KLEINSARGE: Good afternoon, board,
- 10 chief. My name's Sergeant Jason Kleinsarge, I'm
- 11 assigned to the third precinct, platoon 2. I at one
- 12 time was also Corporal Jones' supervisor. And I just
- 13 want to speak on his behalf a lot of my fellow
- 14 supervisors and partners here have spoke on Corporal
- 15 Joan's behalf. He is a wonderful person. He is like
- 16 everyone said a poster child for DPD. He actually he
- 17 eats and sleeps DPD. This is what this Corporal Jones
- 18 does. Like Sergeant Hall said you watch the video, yes,
- 19 it looks one way but until you're there, until you're
- 20 put in these situations you don't know how you're going
- 21 to react. We were trained to do what Corporal Jones
- 22 did. Like Lieutenant Pierce said some of his options
- 23 were taken away at that point and he felt he had to do
- 24 what he had to do in a split second when he had to do
- 25 it. Not everybody 's given that chance; they get to



- 1 watch the video, hit replay, go back, watch it again and
- 2 again and just judge Corporal Jones. I just don't want
- 3 Corporal Jones to be judged on the split second incident
- 4 that he had by the media, who he is being judged by how
- 5 they're portraying him I think it's wrong but I want to
- 6 thank you for letting me address the board.
- 7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.
- 8 MR. BROWN: Mr. Raymond Stephen.
- 9 MR. STEPHEN: Good afternoon. I'm here
- 10 about a personal incident. Nothing do with the previous
- 11 discussions. On Noel Day my wife who works at child --
- 12 who volunteers at Charles H. Wright museum and their
- 13 Freedom school and she goes every Saturday. It starts
- 14 at 10 and goes through noon and what have you, so she
- 15 parks in the same spot. You know, every Saturday, you
- 16 know. And this particular Saturday she parked there;
- 17 she came out to get in her car and her car was gone and
- 18 she didn't understand why and later on she was told,
- 19 well, they're not allowing any parking at this -- in
- 20 this area because of Noel Day but there were no no
- 21 parking signs posted. And, therefore, I had to go and
- 22 redeem my car for a total of \$215. And I want to know
- 23 who can I appeal to to get my \$215 back because she was
- 24 ticketed and towed i nan area where it wasn't posted
- 25 that there should be no parking.



- 1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Sir, why don't you take
- 2 time to speak with one of the DPD personnel and they can
- 3 instruct you in terms of the process of dealing with
- 4 your situation.
- 5 MR. STEPHEN: Any one of them?
- 6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Speak to you after we
- 7 reconvene shortly.
- 8 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Deputy Chief Barren is
- 9 right there.
- 10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Deputy chief will take
- 11 your concern.
- MR. STEPHEN: Thank you.
- MR. BROWN: Commander Giaquinto will be your
- 14 last speaker.
- 15 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir.
- 16 COMMANDER GIAQUINTO: Good evening,
- 17 honorable board. I had the privilege and honor of being
- 18 Corporal Jones's commander for a period of over a year
- 19 and a half. Probably one of the reasons that he was a
- 20 corporal and is to this day. I have seen him exercise
- 21 his duties as a Detroit police officer in a manner that
- 22 exceeded those of many of the other officers that served
- 23 me at the third precinct. I urge you to make a fair and
- 24 just decision. Please take the time to review other
- 25 in-car video and body camera video that this officer has



- been involved in. I have sent him numerous e-mails and 1
- recognize him both publically and privately for his 2.
- 3 service to this city. My request is that you discharge
- a decision fairly. Review the service that this man has 4
- given to the city of Detroit. Take all of his work into 5
- 6 consideration. Thank you.
- 7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.
- MR. BROWN: That is your last speaker, 8
- Mr. Chair. 9
- CHAIRPERSON BELL: Next business will be the 10
- chair will entertain a motion to go into a closed 11
- 12 session regarding the change of duty status for Corporal
- 13 Jones.
- 14 VICE CHAIR BROWN: So moved.
- 15 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Support.
- 16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Properly moved and
- supported. Discussion, those in favor aye. 17
- 18 ALL: Aye.
- 19 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Those opposed? Motion
- carried. We stand adjourned. 20
- 21 (Off the record at 4:32 p.m.)

- 2 actually been charged with one felony count of
- 3 misconduct in office and one misdemeanor account of
- 4 assault and battery.
- 5 Also the other alleged policy violation is
- 6 102.3-6.24 (sic) use of force mistreatment of a person.
- 7 My recommendation is to agree with the chief's
- 8 recommendation based upon the fact that on the video he
- 9 actually struck the lady when her back was turned,
- 10 coupled with the criminal charges and the violations.
- 11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: The chair would entertain
- 12 a motion --
- 13 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the chair.

- 16 recommendation.
- 17 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I ask for roll call.

- 19 vote. Before we get a roll call we have to get a motion
- 20 on the floor.
- 21 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I thought we had one,
- 22 so moved for the vote.
- 23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: The attorney
- 24 recommendation?
- 25 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Yes. I'm sorry. I'm



- 1 making the motion, I'm sorry.
- 2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: You make the motion.
- 3 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Support.
