

What is a Land Based Project?

A land based project uses land for urban agriculture, gardening, beautification and other productive uses, whether for profit or as a community based activity.

Timeline

- City team of 11 departments and agencies has met regularly for over a year to discuss opportunities for streamlining and improvement
- Workshops, meetings and focus groups January April 2019
- Recommendations and improvements in 2019



What We Have Done

- 2018 TASP grant
- Conversation with permitted projects in December (20 permitted projects)
- Meeting with land based projects in January (Georgia Street Community Collective)
- Tours of over 25 land based projects in January and February



What We Have Heard

- Parts of the process are uncoordinated, inconsistent, or unclear – predictability, clarity, and upfront information is important
- Land based projects have unique needs for utilities and infrastructure that need to be addressed
- Neighbors want to understand expectations for new land based projects
- People appreciate being able to communicate directly with multiple City departments


