5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Good afternoon. I am
6 police commissioner Willie Bell. I represent District
7 4. I serve as the chair of the board when we conduct
8 our meeting today. On behalf of the board for those in
9 attendance thank you for joining us. For people viewing
10 this meeting on your government cable channel, thank you
11 for viewing our meeting. Please note Commissioner
12 Elizabeth Brooks has requested to be excused from
13 today's meeting. Invocation will be given by Jimmy
14 Clark of the Detroit Chaplain Corps.

15 (Invocation given.)

16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Chaplain. At
17 this time I'm going to ask the commissioner to introduce
18 themselves starting to my far right.

19 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Good afternoon, Annie
20 Holt, at-large.

21 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Good afternoon,
22 Commissioner William Davis, District 7.

23 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Good afternoon, Shirley
24 Burch, District 3.

25 VICE CHAIR BROWN: Good afternoon, Darryl

1 Brown vice chair, District 1.

2 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Good afternoon, Lisa
3 Carter, District 6.

4 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Eva Garza
5 Dewaelsche, at-large.

6 MR. HICKS: Mr. Chair, you have a quorum.

7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Commissioners
8 and thank you Mr. Hicks. At this time I'm going to ask
9 the commission to approve the agenda for this afternoon
10 meeting.

11 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: So moved.

12 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Support.

13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Been properly moved and
14 supported. Discussion? Those in favor aye.

15 ALL: Aye.

16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Those opposed? Motion
17 carry. The next item would be approval of the March 14,
18 2019 minutes.

19 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: So moved.

20 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Support.

21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Been properly moved and
22 supported. Discussion? Those in favor aye.

23 ALL: Aye.

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Those opposed? Motion
25 carry. Mr. Hicks, would you introduce the board staff.

1 MR. HICKS: Thank you, Mr. Chair. Just
2 prior to making the introductions of the board staff, I
3 do want to indicate for the record that Captain -- I
4 mean, Sergeant Quinn is taping tonight's meeting --
5 today's meeting. Media Services is doing audio/visual
6 work and Caitlyn Mancini is the court reporter. And
7 then immediately to my right is Robert Brown. And if
8 you direct your attention to the first row it will be
9 Mr. Wyrick who is the attorney for the board.
10 Mrs. Blossom who is our media community outreach and
11 then we go to the second row. I see Dr. McCalister who
12 is police personnel -- I'm sorry Dr. Anderson who is
13 police personnel. Trying to see who's next to
14 Mrs. Johnson who is of course our fiscal area and then
15 if we go to Dr. McCalister who's the chief investigator
16 she'll introduce herself and any of the OCI staff
17 present.

18 DR. MCCALISTER: Good afternoon board. I'm
19 Dr. Polly McCalister, chief investigator and attending
20 today's meeting with me is supervising investigator
21 Cromwell. Senior investigator Jones. Senior
22 investigator Rivera. Investigator Banks. Investigator
23 Callaway. And Investigator Washington.

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Thank you
25 board staff and OCI it's always good to see you at one

1 of our meetings. Chief Craig stepped out for a second;
2 I'm going to ask our deputy chief to introduce himself
3 and also DPD staff, please.

4 DEPUTY CHIEF BARREN: Thank you, Chair.

5 Deputy Chief Elvin Barren, Deputy Chief of neighborhood
6 policing east.

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Is that DPD? I just want
2 to appreciate the union leadership. Would you stand up
3 again and introduce yourself, please.

4 LIEUTENANT YOUNG: Lieutenant Mark Young,
5 president of the Lieutenants and Sergeants Association.

6 CAPTAIN: Captain Eric Tosqui, president of
7 the command office association.

8 (Inaudible name.)

9 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. It's very
10 rare we have all three union president at one of our
11 meeting. Thank you for your attendance. Chief Craig.

12 CHIEF CRAIG: Good afternoon, board and
13 chair.

14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Good to see you this
15 afternoon. I want to pause to allow Commissioner Willie
16 Burton to introduce himself.

17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you,
18 Mr. Chairman. Commissioner Willie Burton, District 5.

19 CHAIRPERSON BELL: And also?

20 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Jim Holley.

21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Jim Holley,
22 at-large. Thank you, sir. Do we have any elected
23 officials or representative of elected officials in the
24 meeting? Yes, sir.

25 MR. MARTEL: Ed Martell on behalf of state

1 representative Cynthia A. Johnson house District 5.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you for your
3 attendance. Any others? I thank all of you for coming
4 out this afternoon for our meeting. The next item would
5 be the Chairman's report. On behalf of the board I want
6 to express our concern and support for fallen and
7 injured officers. Our concern for officer safety and
8 citizen protection is ranked as two of the most
9 important priorities of the board. On our board receive
10 a weekly report from department listing injured
11 officers. I would ask the chief of police during his
12 remarks to provide us with any additional information
13 related to injured and fallen officers.

14 The board of police commission meet every
15 week except for Thanksgiving and Christmas holiday. We
16 meet at police headquarters three weeks in the month at
17 Thursday at 3 p.m. We also meet in the community every
18 second Thursday of the month at 6:30 p.m. Under the
19 Detroit city charter Article 7, Chapter 8, the Board of
20 Police Commissions is in power to provide civilian
21 oversight and supervise control of the police
22 department. Our citizens are justified in asking how
23 does civilian oversight of law enforcement help you as a
24 citizen within our community. Our answer is we protect
25 the civil rights of citizens. Oversight organization

1 like the BOPC are the forefront in investigating,
2 reviewing and auditing individual case of citizen
3 complaints and handling the operation by police agency
4 to eliminate misconduct, discriminatory police practice
5 and unnecessary use of force by police. Our work is
6 based upon evolving and supporting effective policing.
7 Mutual trust and respect between the police and
8 community is critical towards increasing the quality of
9 life for resident and visitor to Detroit.

10 The board of police commission exists to
11 provide civilian oversight for the work of the Detroit
12 Police Department. As a board we receive and
13 investigate noncriminal citizen complaint, monitor
14 operations of the department, work with the mayor and
15 the chief of police to make or modify police policy. I
16 want to point to seven items for your consideration.
17 The board is continuing to work with NACOLE, National
18 Association of Civilian Oversight of Law Enforcement to
19 host the national conference on September the 22nd
20 through the 26th, 2019 in Detroit. During the same time
21 Detroit will be celebrating our 45th year as civilian
22 oversight organization on July the 22nd, 2019. I will
23 repeat this message several times as we approach the
24 September conference. We inviting law enforcement and
25 other civic minded individuals to join us at the

1 conference. The planning process well under way and
2 again we invite your participation.

3 Today we have a full agenda. The board
4 office transmitted to each commissioner three lists from
5 the Chief of Police in connection with the motions and
6 appointments. The first list includes sergeants who are
7 to be appointed as master sergeant. Under the recent
8 memorandum of understanding by the lieutenant and
9 sergeant association special a designation of master
10 sergeant was created. The rank of master sergeant is to
11 increase our leadership supervision within our patrol
12 unit. I think we going to hold that up; is that
13 correct?

14 MR. HICKS: Yes.

15 CHAIRPERSON BELL: We not going to address
16 that at this meeting?

17 MR. HICKS: Yes.

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: That will be in the near
19 future. I hope to take this up at our next meeting.
20 The second transmission from the board office involve
21 appointing to the rank of commander and captain. The
22 chief expresses his intent to appoint one commander and
23 six captains; that's one commander and six captains. In
24 the chief transmittal letter he described this acts as
25 appointment. And our reaction to the chief regarding

1 appointments and promotion is the same. In each case
2 the individual employee will receive an enhanced duty
3 assignment, potentially be reassigned to another unit
4 with different responsibility and is found to receive
5 pay increase in line with promotion. In fact, these
6 appointments are promotion and therefore must follow the
7 rules created for promotions in the Detroit city charter
8 and charter section seven eight fourteen, that's seven
9 dash eighteen. Promotion, it reads the chief of police
10 shall make all promotion within the department. All
11 promotions shall be with approval of the board.
12 Therefore, after my Chairman report I would ask a motion
13 to promote Captain Franklin Hayes to commander. I would
14 also ask a motion to promote Lieutenant Stacy Cavin and
15 Michael Diccico, and Michael Parish, Lashanna Potts,
16 Lena Purifoy and Ian Severy to the rank of captain.

17 The third transmission from the board seek
18 motion to rank of lieutenant and sergeant. It's my
19 understanding that we have been asked to expedite our
20 consideration of this list so the chief can finalize the
21 promotion after the associate with the 2015, '16
22 promotion list. This is seven round of promotion from
23 the 2015, '16 promotion list. After our action it is
24 also my understanding that the chief of police personnel
25 will start the process begin a new promotion exam

1 process. After this announcement we'll no longer be
2 able to use the current promotion; therefore, again I
3 would ask a motion to promote eight new captains and
4 four sergeants recommended by the chief. I'm going to
5 reserve the names to the personnel committee render
6 those names at that particular time.

7 Also on agenda is one request
8 at this time to suspend Officer Diamond Greenwood, Badge
9 3733. The other officer held in abeyance so that will
10 not take place at this particular meeting. Both of
11 these matters will be taken up under new business. I
12 will be asking for a motion to go into closed session as
13 permitted under the old meeting act for issues related
14 to personnel. Please note that we have adjusted the
15 flow of the meeting to allow for public comments before
16 we go into our closed session. We would also convene
17 after the closed session when we have reached a point in
18 which we will vote on the matters in the closed
19 sessions. The vote will take place in our regular
20 session open to the public.

21 We also have presentations from
22 crime intelligence. Presentation will be from Captain
23 Kari Sloan. My hope is presentation will update the
24 board on the new challenges to crime and using advanced
25 technology. The crime Intel unit is in a unique

1 position to see the effects of our Green Light system
2 and other enhanced technology like our realtime crime --
3 realtime crime center on policing.

4 Also the note article published by the
5 Urban Institute on public surveillance cameras. The
6 article was distributed to the board at the request of
7 Commissioner Holt. On the resolution we also have a
8 retirement resolution for police officer Kareem Wheeler,
9 a 20 year veteran with the department. We wish Kareem
10 and his family well as he began another chapter in his
11 life. Under the chief report I want to remind the chief
12 that he indicated he would share written copies of the
13 Steele and Garrison Snapchat investigation as well as
14 environmental investigation done at the 6th precinct,
15 police precinct.

16 Additional, I ask the chief to update us
17 on a critical issue; update us on critical issues facing
18 the department. Immediately following the presentation
19 of Captain Sloan we'll have a public comment from the
20 audience. Again, we have adjusted the agenda to move
21 public comments up in advance of the closed session so
22 that we would hear from the public without forcing them
23 to stay until the closed session over. Please make sure
24 you print your name on a speaker card. Cards are
25 located in the back on the table or can be obtained by

1 Mr. Brown to my far right. He will need your card
2 before the beginning of public comments. We will hold
3 each speak for allotted two minutes. Remember after
4 closed session the board will return and handle any
5 votes necessary flowing from the closed session. We
6 would abide by the cards and would ask you to restrict
7 yourself to that type of card activity and in that time
8 frame. We're going to strictly enforce that because we
9 have a heavy agenda. I'm going to move to the motion --
10 entertain a motion for promotion from the personnel
11 committee for commander and captains.

12 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHÉ: You want me to
13 read the names?

14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, ma'am.

15 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you,
16 Mr. Chair. Motion -- I'm going to make a motion that we
17 approve the promotions for the following individuals:
18 Franklin D. Hayes from captain to commander. Stacy M.
19 Cavin from lieutenant to captain. Michael Dickey from
20 lieutenant to captain. Michael A. Parish from
21 lieutenant to captain. Lashanna M. Potts from
22 lieutenant to captain. Lena M. Purifoy from lieutenant
23 to captain. Ian P. Severy from lieutenant to captain.
24 I make a motion to approve these promotions?

25 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: So moved.

1 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Second.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: It's been properly moved
3 and supported. Discussion? Those in favor aye.

4 ALL: Aye.

5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Those opposed? Motion
6 carry.

7 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Thank you.

8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Madam
9 Commissioner. The next item will be entertain a motion
10 for rank of lieutenant and sergeants.

11 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Thank you,
12 Mr. Chair and so I make a motion that we approve the
13 promotions to lieutenant of: Lonnie Lowery-Ross, Curtis
14 Shell, Todd W. Svenkesen. Kimberly Blackwell. Brandon
15 Cole. Angelique Chadwick-Bills. Ray Gilmore. And Dawn
16 Johnson. Motion to approve.

17 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Second.

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Been properly moved and
19 seconded. Discussion? Those in favor aye.

20 ALL: Aye.

21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Those opposed? Motion
22 carry.

23 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Thank you, sir and
24 now I'd like to make a motion to approve the promotions
25 to the rank of sergeant for Yasmin Robinson. Damir

1 Jakupovic, Terri Kennedy, Andre Kirkland, Markila
2 Thomas-Curtis, Carrie Moore, Anthony Portis, Scott

5 Motion to approve.

6 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Second.

7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Been properly moved and
8 supported. Discussion? Those in favor aye.

9 ALL: Aye.

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Those opposed? Motion
11 carry. Thank you.

12 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Thank you,
13 Mr. Chair.

14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Is the newly
15 promoted commander in the room?

16 CHIEF CRAIG: Through the chair the
17 commander is currently on the Baker Hills (sic) event.

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Well, we have any newly
19 promoted captains?

20 CHIEF CRAIG: Yes.

21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Would they come forward
22 please? I want to give them the opportunity to answer
23 for -- we always welcome that type of interaction with
24 newly promoted.

25 CAPTAIN PARISH: Good afternoon.

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Brief remarks, if you
2 care to.

3 CAPTAIN PARISH: Oh Captain Michael Parish.
4 Thank you for the vote approving my appointment to this
5 rank. I will endeavor everyday to make this board proud
6 and satisfied with this department and Chief Craig, I
7 will work hard everyday to live up to your expectations.

8 CHIEF CRAIG: Thank you.

9 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Well deserved. We have
10 worked together for the last three or four years. We
11 appreciate your professionalism and your activities we
12 looking forward.

13 CAPTAIN PARISH: I appreciate the board.

14 CAPTAIN SEVERY: Ian Severy. I want to say
15 thank you to the chief and the board. I appreciate the
16 opportunity and just to echo what Captain Parish said, I
17 will work hard to (inaudible).

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Wish you the
19 best.

20 CAPTAIN SEVERY: Thank you.

21 CAPTAIN POTTS: Lashanna Potts. I just want
22 to thank you, Chief, for having belief in me. Thank you
23 to the board for approving the promotion. I promise
24 every day that I wear this gold badge that I simplify
25 what it is to be a Detroit police officer and do it with

1 integrity and honor. Thank you.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Lieutenant Potts, I mean
3 Captain Potts, it's been a pleasure to work with you in
4 the last two or three years. You're doing some
5 outstanding work and we look even more of your engaging
6 activities. I know the chief going to have to fill some
7 very difficult shoes 'cause she has really brought it.
8 Thank you.

9 CAPTAIN POTTS: Thank you, sir.

10 CAPTAIN DICICCO: Captain Michael Dickey,
11 newly made captain of the 5th precinct. Thank you,
12 Chief for the opportunity. Thank you, Board, for the
13 approval. DPD's my family; I intend to protect it as I
14 always have throughout my career and I appreciate the
15 effort or the opportunity.

16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Did you say the 5th
17 precinct?

18 CAPTAIN DICICCO: I'll be going to 5th
19 precinct.

20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: That's my home precinct.
21 That's chief home precinct.

22 CAPTAIN DICICCO: I did hear that.

23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Looking
24 forward to interaction with you.

25 CAPTAIN PURIFOY: Captain Purifoy. I'm

1 honored to serve the next rank as captain and it's a
2 privilege to continue to serve this department. I've
3 been here for almost 23 years. Thank you, Chief, for
4 this opportunity. Thank you, Honorable Board.

5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: And thank you for your
6 service to the 5th precinct.

7 CAPTAIN CAVIN: Stacy Cavin. I want to say
8 thank you to the chief and to the board for this
9 opportunity and I hope to continue to serve this
10 community.

11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Appreciate
12 it. Any other commissioners want to speak to -- next
13 would be the lieutenants. Any lieutenants in the house?
14 Definite. Definite. Thank you. That's a very
15 important rank.

16 LIEUTENANT LOWERY: Good afternoon, board.
17 Lonnie Lowery-Ross. Thank you, Chief, for this
18 promotion. Thank you board of police commissioners for
19 the approval of the promotions to the ranks of
20 lieutenant. In this rank I will continue the work of
21 holding members accountable to the code of conduct that
22 the Detroit Police Department as well as ensure that our
23 members of this department are holding the missions and
24 values and goals of the Detroit Police Department.

25 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. We wish you

1 the best.

2 LIEUTENANT LOWERY: Thank you.

3 LIEUTENANT JOHNSON: Hello, my name is Dawn
4 Johnson. I was the cut off in the lieutenants; it's
5 quite a surprise. My heart is racing right now. I want
6 to thank the chief of course and everyone else. I
7 really appreciate this opportunity. I'll bring the 20
8 years dedication I've already experienced and bring it
9 forward to another 10, 15, 20 year hopefully. Thank
10 you.

11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I like your remarks.

12 LIEUTENANT SVENKESEN: My name is Todd
13 Svenkesen and I want to say thank you to the chief and
14 board for giving me the opportunity to advance my
15 career.

16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Could you speak a little

20 opportunity.

21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I like you too, sir.

22 LIEUTENANT SHELL: Curtis Shell. I want to

25 management team. I really appreciate this opportunity

1 to serve in a management level position after 19 years
2 and I look forward to doing so. Thank you very much.

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, sir.

4 LIEUTENANT CHADWICK-BILLS: Good afternoon
5 I'm Lieutenant Angelique Chadwick-Bills. I just want to
6 thank the chief and the board for this opportunity. I'm
7 looking forward to continuing in servicing the Detroit
8 Police Department. It's been 20 years and I'm so
9 thankfully honored. Thank you.

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. And now the
11 sergeants.

19 Johnson I was at the end too so I was shaking in my
20 boots. But I do appreciate; I plan to keep working
21 hard, you know, in the community and with --

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Could you please give you

24 SERGEANT JOHNS: Oh I'm sorry, Crystal
25 Johns, so thank you.

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Wish you the
2 best.

3 SERGEANT ROBINSON: Hi, I am Yasmin
4 Robinson. I want to thank the chief, thank you board.
5 I appreciate this opportunity and you guys won't be
6 disappointed.

7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

8 SERGEANT MOORE: Good afternoon, Carrie
9 Moore. And I am like Dawn extremely I'm nervous, I'm
10 excited and I just want to say thank you, Chief. I as
11 well was at the cut off and did not think it was going
12 to happen from this list. Talking to A.C. Stair over
13 there, she brought tears to my eyes and this is just me.
14 Community relations I speak in front of a lot of people
15 all of the time but I've never had chills in my voice.
16 So I want to say thank you after 18 and a half years.

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. I know
18 there's a sigh of relief not to take another test. I've
19 been there so thank you. I just want to acknowledge
20 Chief Craig and his wisdom since he been chief of police
21 to look at the promotion exams, mobility as you know
22 some of us serve in the rank. There was a long gap
23 between opportunity, even longer for this last 15 years
24 or, so this is really a welcome to getting promoted to
25 sergeant, lieutenant especially for those who studying

1 and you made that final cut off. It's like March
2 madness just kick in for you this week. I just want to
3 wish you the best. Thank you. Looking forward to that
4 promotion ceremony. Yes, ma'am.

5 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Mr. Chief -- I
6 mean Mr. Chair.

7 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Why are you nervous?

8 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Too many titles
9 there. No, what I wanted to comment on was that it's
10 very, very wonderful to see that there are officers who
11 have 18, 15, 20 years because being on the recruitment
12 committee of the board retention is one thing that we're
13 looking at and you all have that and thank you for
14 staying with the department and we look forward to your
15 leadership. Thank you.

16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Well said.
17 The next item would be resolution that vice chair Brown
18 is going to recognize Officer Wheeler.

19 VICE CHAIR BROWN: Officer Wheeler present?
20 Resolution honoring Kareem D. Wheeler. Kareem D.
21 Wheeler was appointed to the Detroit Police Department
22 on March 8th, 1999. Upon graduating from the Detroit
23 Metropolitan and Police Academy, Police Officer Wheeler
24 began his career at the 6th precinct and whereas, he
25 dutifully served in narcotics conspiracy section and

1 violent crimes task force on May 22nd, 2017 Officer
2 Wheeler was assigned to the office of the chief
3 integrity unit until his retirement and whereas, Officer
4 Wheeler has tirelessly served the Detroit Police
5 Department, the citizens of Detroit and his neighboring
6 community for 20 years. His professionalism, commitment
7 to public service, integrity and dedication has been a
8 credit to the Detroit Police Department. He is highly
9 respected as a consummate professional. Now therefore
10 be it resolved that the Detroit Board of Police
11 Commissioners, speaking for the citizens of Detroit and
12 the Detroit Police Department award this resolution in
13 recognition of police officer Kareem Wheeler 20 years of
14 dedicated and diligent public service; his
15 professionalism, integrity and lifelong commitment to
16 the city of Detroit and its citizens merit our highest
17 regard. We thank you, we congratulate you, Kareem D.
18 Wheeler.

19 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, commissioner
20 Brown.

21 VICE CHAIR BROWN: I move that we accept
22 this resolution.

23 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Support.

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Been properly moved and
25 supported. Discussion? Those in favor aye.

1 ALL: Aye.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Those opposed? Motion
3 carry. The next item would be the chief of police James
4 E. Craig.

5 CHIEF CRAIG: I still don't know what E
6 stands for. We have the same --

7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Mine is Earl.

8 CHIEF CRAIG: Okay I'll leave mine alone.
9 Kind of embarrassing. My dad would not like me to say
10 that. But first I want to thank -- start out by
11 thanking the board for your support for the promotions
12 and those appointed to keep positions within the
13 department. I want to also thank community leadership
14 who's here present today for your support and then,
15 lastly, but certainly not least I knew of members and
16 command staff, supervisors and as it was pointed out by
17 one of the candidates, you know, really staying focused
18 on moving our mission forward in the coming years. So
19 thank you for that.

20 I want to also go into crime quickly. I
21 know we have a long agenda. So as of today we're
22 sitting on a 27 percent reduction in criminal homicides,
23 which translates into 13 fewer homicides compared to
24 this time last year. Sexual assaults we're still
25 showing 19 percent, 33 more sex assaults. In the area

1 where we see the most increase 7 percent increase with
2 103 aggravated assaults. Our nonfatal shootings show an
3 11 percent reduction, which is 13 fewer nonfatal
4 shootings. Robberies show a 9 percent reduction with 41
5 fewer robberies. Carjackings I'm showing a 53 percent
6 reduction with 31 fewer carjackings. So I want to -- I
7 know we're going to have a presentation on realtime
8 crime but I will say, and I know it's been a lot written
9 lately about the Green Light, and the question often
10 times get asked, I mean, what do you think is a key
11 contributing factor to lower robberies and carjackings?
12 And in my judgment I really believe it is the Green
13 Light. We're now in excess of 500 Green Lights and we
14 all remember just three years ago when we had 8 gas
15 stations. We know that the likelihood of robberies
16 occurring during nighttime at gas stations and liquor
17 stores were highly probable. And so with the fact that
18 we installed Green Lights, high definition cameras,
19 educate the community, made some key arrests criminals
20 is making different decisions; and when you talk about
21 robberies, which is clearly a crime of opportunity, the
22 places of opportunity are places where people
23 congregate. And so it just really illustrates the
24 significance that the Green Light has had.

25 But also the other question I often times

1 get asked, and there's no police department that can
2 predict, well, chief how many crimes are you actually
3 preventing? I don't have that answer. But we do know
4 when we see reductions we can only imagine how many.
5 How many lives have we saved from Green Light? I don't
6 know the answer. There's no way any police department
7 can know that but we do know that this strategy has had
8 a profound impact. We know cease fire has had an impact
9 on use and gang and group violence so we look at the
10 totality and certainly not to forget about our community
11 and the men and women who wear the uniform, all these
12 things together really do contribute to success. And
13 granted we still have quite a bit of work left to do but
14 I'm optimistic and as we continue to leverage our
15 technology, I do believe we will see even deeper
16 reductions in the area of violent crime. Even when you
17 look at our property crime we're showing 11 percent
18 reduction. Burglaries I'm showing 7 percent, larceny is
19 down 14 percent and motor vehicle thefts down 7 percent.
20 What's fascinating about motor vehicle thefts at this
21 time last year when we go back at least five years we've
22 almost cut all thefts in half. And I hope that
23 translates and Detroiters get lower insurance rates
24 because Detroit has been a leader for year after year in
25 thefts and so feels like we're starting to turn that

1 corner. So I'm excited about that.

2 And then, lastly, before we went off for
3 questions -- well, before I open it for questions two
4 other points. I know my friend, someone I graduate from
5 high school with, I know he was missed in the early
6 acknowledgements Stephen Grady, chief of staff, for your
7 city counsel president Brenda Jones, can you stand and
8 be acknowledged? Thank you. Then, lastly, update on
9 the 6th precinct. We're committed to providing the
10 board advanced report on the environmental audit. As
11 I've indicated in open that the internal investigation
12 is going to be at some point presented for criminal
13 assessment. That report I won't be making available to
14 the board. However, I will continue to give you
15 briefings on where we are. I can tell you since the
16 terminations of both Officer Garrison and his partner,
17 we are now moving into what we call phase B of the
18 internal investigation where it appears that there may
19 be as many as three additional officers charged for
20 various offense, and we'll keep you briefed on that as
21 that phase of the investigation continue. As relates to
22 the environmental audit we anticipate that report being
23 completed in I would say roughly three weeks. The
24 report is a very detailed report, as I indicated in
25 prior briefings, in excess of 100 interviews we've

1 conducted. This was a very thorough investigation. One
2 of the things that came out in the news late last week
3 this week some contention that the report in some way
4 was a knee-jerk response, if you will, to the original
5 core report. As I went on the record stating the core
6 report was a valuable tool, however, it was not an
7 investigatory report. That said there were
8 conversations with members of the organization; there
9 were some statements made; however, a lot of those
10 statements could not be validated because the
11 individuals making statements were not afforded an
12 opportunity to be interviewed because they didn't want
13 to be.

14 However, I will remind the board that the
15 environmental audit did consist of an investigation, if
16 you will, and interviews. One issue that we tackled,
17 and I don't know if I brought it up during the last
18 session, but during the environmental audit and during
19 the core report, there was some reference made to a
20 disparity as it relates to training opportunities for
21 blacks and whites, that whites more often receive
22 training than blacks did and it was denied by the
23 commanding officer. What we did find -- we found no
24 merit to that. We did look in a very surgical way at
25 the issue of training. We found that African Americans

1 and whites equally went to training or close to that.
2 The one issue that came out involving an African
3 American officer who in the presence of a white officer
4 was denied the training opportunity then given to the
5 white officer. What we found in that situation that
6 that officer, the African American officer, did not meet
7 whatever the qualifications were for that training but
8 the white officer did so he was granted training. Where
9 there was a management failure, the concern of the
10 commanding officer or captain in this instance, did not
11 take the time to explain to the African American officer
12 why he was not selected. And so clearly when you see
13 that and you're told no and you look over and you have
14 another officer an opportunity to get the same training,
15 it does give the perception that why was I denied? Was
16 it based on race? Was it based on just don't like me
17 but that was not the case. So I'm very comfortable in
18 saying that and that certainly will be transmitted in
19 our fuller report. Again, it will released in about two
20 to three weeks to this board in advance of the public
21 release. And so with that I'll take any questions you
22 might have.

23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioners?

24 Mr. Brown.

25 VICE CHAIR BROWN: Before I do I just want

1 to pause and recognize a strong community leader is in
2 our midst right now, it's Master Marvis Cofield from the
3 Alkebu-Lan village; he's been a strong community
4 activist on the east side.

5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I'm aware.

6 VICE CHAIR BROWN: And he has been in my
7 life and taught me a lot of things about discipline over
8 the years and I thank you for your service to this
9 community, sir. But chief I just want to commend your
10 handling of the investigation with the 6th precinct. I
11 thank you for not jumping to conclusions with the
12 pressure of what was going around you, to make a
13 confident decision so these things could be ironed out
14 and going even further with the environmental
15 investigation, I know it's going to cover some more
16 things but thank you for your time and your staff's
17 diligence with handling that situation.

18 CHIEF CRAIG: Through the chair, thank you
19 vice chair for that and I just want to also note, and it
20 was reflected in a recent news article, that I did have
21 a chance to meet with members of the 6th precinct,
22 particular the shift where the issues were identified,
23 the afternoon shift, but also in the rollcall is members
24 from the day shift, afternoon shift, special operations
25 so it was a very diverse group of police officers. You

1 know, I explained to them where we were with the
2 investigation; advised them that we fully support them.
3 We know that the majority of the officers assigned to
4 the 6th precinct do a phenomenal job and this does not
5 in any way suggest that every member of the 6th
6 precinct, particularly those who are white officers, are
7 racist. My instincts told me and the feedback I got
8 that there were appreciative of the feedback; they
9 recognize that the healing process continues and I know
10 we just announced Captain Potts' promotion; she will be
11 going to the 6th precinct. One of the reasons why we
12 selected Captain Potts to go to the 6th precinct, it's
13 no secret of her relationship in the community. But
14 also her relationship to men and women of the department
15 and she's been a key leader certainly in our peer
16 support effort that has gone a long way and one thing
17 that I'm certain of that members of the 6th precinct are
18 in need of healing and support, and so we want to
19 continue to give them support. As I said the road's
20 going to continue being a little rocky going forward and
21 certainly when this full environment audit report's
22 released there are going to be many issues discussed and
23 once again the spotlight will be on the 6th precinct.
24 So thank you vice chair.

25 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

1 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Mr. Chair.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, ma'am.

3 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Chief, I would just
4 like to share with you we were with you -- when I say we
5 the east side, 8 Mile and Dequindre when you first
6 started the Green Light. We're proud to have had at
7 state fair and Dequindre one of the first that signed on
8 and I also wanted to tell you I think the Green Light
9 brings, enhances participation of citizens. Now they
10 are aware where they can go to be safe but they can
11 encourage the business to receive the Green Light, so I
12 think it's all about networking, communicating with the
13 citizens, the police to defeat most of this crime in our
14 neighborhoods. So thank you.

15 CHIEF CRAIG: You're welcome.

16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioners?

17 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Through the chair.
18 Thank you, Chief Craig. You commented earlier that
19 something to the effect when crime does not go down as
20 you would anticipate it's kind of difficult for you to
21 explain what are the variables that might have
22 interfered with your intended success. I'd like to say
23 to Mr. Hicks thank you for including this article Urban
24 Institute and my question, Chief Craig, is this article
25 basically talks about the success that three cities

1 experienced Chicago, Baltimore, and Washington D.C. You
2 might be familiar. But the article is dated 2011 and I
3 notice that when you give your stats you give
4 year-to-date. Is it something appropriate that your
5 police department might benefit from by revisiting the
6 stats that were included in this article to see if the
7 surveillance system is still working as successfully as
8 it was noted in 2011?

9 CHIEF CRAIG: Through the chair I'm not
10 familiar with that article. If Mr. Hicks would have
11 shared that, I would have been prepared to respond to
12 you. However, I am extremely confident based on my
13 training, based on my years of experience that the
14 strategies we have put in place are absolutely working.
15 Now, again, I'm not waving a flag of success. Both
16 myself and, you know, you look at 261 murders ending
17 last year which was the lowest number in 50 years it's
18 hard for me to get excited because one murder is one too
19 many. We know crime will happen but when I think of my
20 old home in Los Angeles, a city four times the size of
21 Detroit, and had fewer murders than Detroit it makes me
22 take pause. I will say that I remember it vividly when
23 Los Angeles had in excess of 1,000 murders a year and I
24 did say 1,000. One police precinct, I remember vividly,
25 having as high as 150 murders a year. LA did not turn

1 the corner overnight. There was some strategies they
2 put in place that were very effective and I'm going to
3 reflect back on the mayor's state of the city when in
4 some other meeting that he was presenting and he
5 recognized that New York and LA, because I know it well,
6 actively engaged in a tactic called stop and frisk but
7 we also know that when you actively engage in stop and
8 frisk, you run the high risk of alienating the
9 community, so particularly if you don't understand the
10 strategic nature of how to approach abating violence.
11 Certainly, when you leverage technology is what we do
12 very well and we're going to continue to do very well.

13 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Right.

14 CHIEF CRAIG: It has a very different
15 outcome. Community supports it. We've seen community
16 groups that have marched on businesses without Green
17 Light, not at the encouragement of the Detroit Police
18 Department. This is something that they decided to do.
19 So when the critics come out and say this is nothing
20 more than Big Brother, this is nothing more than there's
21 no way to really show, I would say that when you look at
22 crime and the continuing decline -- particularly let's
23 talk about carjacking. When I arrived here almost 60
24 years ago the city, the police department, was
25 desensitized by the crime of carjacking. No one seemed

1 to get excited. It was odd for me. In cities that I've
2 lived, cities where I was chief if there was a
3 carjacking that was a big deal. It is not normal for
4 someone to be stopped at a stop light in an interaction
5 and to get dragged out of your car at gun point. That
6 is not the norm. So of course we spoke loud; we began
7 to do everything we could to abate that violent crime
8 because that's one of the crimes when you talk about
9 driving fear, robbery, a crime of opportunity, drives
10 tremendous fear.

11 And so I say that these strategies are
12 working and I don't want to get overly optimistic but I
13 think as we continue to push this Green Light and we've
14 got a lofty goal of going to 800 by the end of the year.
15 Imagine that, what will happen next. But to the critics
16 who say this is nothing more than Big Brother I say to
17 them it's not Big Brother; we are in the public space.
18 We're not look into people's private residences. And
19 who are we more supportive of, the people who live, work
20 and play in the city of Detroit who have a strong desire
21 to be safe or are we more concerned about protecting the
22 criminals who engage in violence? Who are we more
23 concerned about? That's the question I'm trying to
24 answer today.

25 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Through the chair.

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes.

2 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Chief Craig, I was not
3 attempting to be critical. Basically, what I should
4 have jumped in and said the article basically supports
5 surveillances as the system that you and the mayor and
6 other departments in the city are getting on board and
7 what I'd like to ask if it were okay for the website
8 from where this article came to perhaps appear on our
9 agenda for next time whereas our audience would be able
10 to read it and understand that as the chief has said
11 several times technology will support him in his success
12 of decreasing crime.

13 CHIEF CRAIG: Through the chair. Thank you
14 for that response. Again, I didn't take it as a
15 criticism but it was more of my opportunity to get out
16 to those critics, some who were watching and some who
17 are here physically, to take a strong stand that this is
18 certainly not an attempt at Big Brother. We're not
19 interested in immigration, that has been said. We're
20 interested in one thing: Making the city safer and if
21 you commit a violent crime, and we can find you, I will
22 say that horrible crime involving the shooting of that
23 three year old on the freeway, that's a matter that's
24 still pending. We all know the horrific nature of that
25 crime. It was because of the diligence and the tenacity

1 of members who worked in crime intelligence and
2 leveraging technology, we were able to identify that
3 suspect. Had we not had that technology, I'm not
4 certain we would have apprehended him.

5 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Thank you.

6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Commissioner
7 Dewaelsche.

8 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHÉ: Yes, I just wanted
9 to -- is this on? Piggy back upon Commissioner Holt's
10 comments a little bit. I would be interested to know
11 who those people that are saying this is like Big
12 Brother where they live number one. I think if you talk
13 to a lot of Detroit residents they're not thinking that
14 way because they know that these Green Lights are in
15 public places. And I just wanted to go back to your
16 report where you indicated that these numbers may not be
17 attributed to Green Light. I'm not sure exactly what
18 you said but let me just say this, the numbers are what
19 I look at and I see them significantly going down as it
20 relates to carjacking. I remember three years ago
21 before we started Green Light or when it was eight or a
22 few carjacking was the number one issue; we had people
23 coming to our meetings quite often to talk about that
24 crime and if you look at the stats today just, and I
25 know it's early in the fiscal year, but last year at

1 this time or I'm sorry 2017 at this time we had 60; and
2 this year 2019 we only have 26. That's like a third or
3 half or whatever but a significant drop so that's what I
4 looked at are the raw numbers and this is what I'm
5 pleased with. They're going down.

6 CHIEF CRAIG: And through the chair and I
7 appreciate that and yes, you asked the question I wonder
8 where the critics live. Well, I can tell you that the
9 chief critic against, you know, our cameras has been the
10 ACLU. I wonder how many of those who are being critical
11 live in the 9th precinct where we have our highest
12 tendency towards violence or live in the 8th precinct.
13 I wonder, I don't know but this is nothing to do with as
14 I've indicated, nothing but abating violence in the city
15 so I appreciate your comments.

16 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Thank you.

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Carter.

18 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Yes, thank you.

19 Through the chair. Chief, good afternoon. I want to
20 ask you for an update on a couple of things that you --
21 initiatives that you announced last year sometime. One
22 had to do with the east and west traffic cars if that
23 trial period has been successful or what's going on with
24 it; and then the other one is the speed bumps is there
25 any updates on that as well?

1 And then the other thing I wanted to talk
2 about, back to the precinct, the 6th precinct, as a
3 result and I'm trying to -- I understand that if as a
4 result of the investigation is that the reason why
5 Lieutenant -- Captain Potts is being assigned? Is there
6 the captain that was there before is that person
7 reassigned or have you changed the leadership in the 6th
8 precinct and are you planning to change the rest of the
9 leadership?

10 CHIEF CRAIG: Through the chair I'll start
11 with the soft ball first. The soft ball question the
12 east and west neighborhood police officers traffic NPOs
13 as we're calling them, and I know we made a commitment
14 to after a reasonable amount of time to consider
15 southwest Detroit and I think we're very close to that
16 place. Certainly, if the commission likes, we can get
17 you a full report. From what I see on both the east and
18 west traffic neighborhood police officers is having a
19 significant impact and the commissioner's not here. She
20 was -- she allotted the work in the 11th precinct.
21 Maybe it was --

22 COMMISSIONER BURCH: That's me. He's like
23 she's not here.

24 CHIEF CRAIG: I'm sorry. I think there was
25 an issue that was occurring in the 11th precinct and it

1 was an east side neighborhood traffic NPO that knocked
2 it out and so and, yes, we are using them very
3 effectively. Speed bumps is a tactic and strategy that
4 we're going to continue to deploy and so if you like in
5 a future meeting we can come in with a full presentation
6 on that effort with statistics and then we can further
7 launch into the southwest neighborhood police officers,
8 'cause I know how important it is to the southwest
9 community.

10 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you.

11 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Chief, I just want to
12 say that's Sergeant Robins, that's who's the officer on
13 the east side. He's doing a fantastic job.

14 CHIEF CRAIG: Thank you, appreciate it.

15 COMMISSIONER CARTER: And the hard ball.

16 CHIEF CRAIG: Oh the hard ball. Notice I
17 forgot the hard ball. So at any rate it was reported
18 and I didn't name names of the command officers, one was
19 de-appointed from the rank of captain. Another one
20 opted to retire. In the environmental audit a couple of
21 command officers came up. As I indicated without going
22 into a lot of detail at this point, we believe there
23 were management failures. Given the issues occurring
24 out of the 6th precinct, it was clear that supervisors
25 some supervisors, some command officers, knew or should

1 have known that these things were occurring and no
2 action was taken. And so I'm very protective of the
3 personnel information; however, eventually that
4 information will be released but and so as I indicated
5 when we were talking about the update on the 6th
6 precinct, Captain Potts was assigned there based on her
7 strengths and, clearly, we wanted to make sure that
8 there was no erosion of the public trust in the 6th
9 precinct and because of her background in working with
10 the community, that felt right.

11 The second part was because of the healing
12 that needs to take place among those officers that are
13 continuing to do a phenomenal job we need someone there
14 who understands the importance of wrapping their arms
15 around officers as we go through this process. She gets
16 that and so she's carrying two big things as a command
17 officer; and one thing I will add the current commander
18 Arnold Williams, as I had indicated in public reports,
19 during the environmental audit he was lotted as part of
20 a healthy change in the 6th precinct. So we believe
21 that the commander and captain will complement each
22 other.

23 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you.

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. And thank
25 you, Chief for your respond to the board. I just want

1 to say briefly about the racism in the department as you
2 well know it's been close to my heart for many years in
3 terms of some folks going back to the '70s. I led the
4 movement for black police officers, the Guardians Police
5 Association and also before that concern police officers
6 league of justice and also on a national level. I just
7 want to commend you for taking a serious dive into this
8 issue. Do we have issues of racism? Yes, because we
9 have issues of that in this society as we all know but
10 we must tackle those issues; we must speak to it; we
11 must interact and I know that 6th precinct is
12 highlighted but my concern is that we look at the entire
13 department to alleviate the concerns of the community.
14 We can start that by looking at the 6th precinct in
15 terms of how they feel about what has transpired there,
16 so we would look at our schedule and have that type of
17 dialogue. I think it's a very important part. If you
18 address it and talk about it, then you can address it in
19 terms of get an understanding that we are human beings.
20 I don't believe in that the blue line, you know, so that
21 we only see blue; that is not the case. The reality is
22 that we see people black and white, male and female.
23 That's why we have a captain going over there as a
24 female command officer, too. There was none there. So
25 we got to address that head on. So I want to commend

1 you for taking those steps because that was not the case
2 in the past. As we move forward let us work together;
3 any concerns that you might have I would hope that you
4 would reach out to this board and address those concerns
5 and perhaps we can address it in terms how you feel
6 about those issues. I just want to thank the department
7 for taking a strong stand. It's long overdue.

8 CHIEF CRAIG: Through the chair. Again, I
9 appreciate it. I do offer a word of caution and I only
10 offer this word of caution because, again, I stress the
11 fact that the majority, and I mean the vast majority of
12 the members of this department of all ethnicities,
13 African Americans, white, Hispanic, Middle Eastern do a
14 phenomenal job. The last thing we want to do is send
15 the wrong message that we have a police department
16 that's full of racist police officers. It's easy to get
17 caught up in the emotion, so I just offer that word of
18 caution. Like yourself I too served as a president of a
19 black police association in Los Angeles at one point
20 that was during the Rodney King affair, so I know racism
21 first hand. I as a young police officer starting here
22 in 1977 was subjected to discriminatory treatment in my
23 early days as a Detroit police officer. I then found
24 out later, and know full the issue I faced in the Los
25 Angeles department as a new police officer. So I'm very

1 familiar with what racism looks like but I also look at
2 the world through the lens of balance and that we should
3 not -- should never paint a broad brush.

4 So we look at for example what happened at
5 Michigan State, the tragedies involving those young
6 women participating in athletics but that doesn't mean
7 every coach and every person of leadership at the school
8 was in some way corrupt, and so I just offer as a word
9 of caution we will continue to take a vigorous stance on
10 issues concerning racist behaviors and certainly, if we
11 get a sense, what we find out that it's wide spread in a
12 departmental entity, in this case at an entire precinct,
13 that continue to trust and believe that I and this
14 department will do what's right, by this board as well
15 as the community.

16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I agree with you
17 wholeheartedly. I just look at this education
18 opportunity for all us to tackle the issue. So that's
19 how I'm approaching it's educational opportunity for all
20 us to approach it. We know the climate is America USA
21 and we know the climate well in terms of what has
22 surfaced throughout the world so this is education
23 opportunity for all us to come together and work
24 together and try to be a better individual and a better
25 police officer. We can move on to the next item would

1 be hearing from our crime intelligence unit. Thank you,
2 Captain.

3 CAPTAIN SLOAN: Hi, good afternoon. Thank
4 you for allowing me to present to you today. Thank you
5 Chief. I'm Captain Carrie Sloan and I am in charge of
6 the crime intelligence unit. So I wanted to share with
7 you the mission of our unit. It is the mission of the
8 crime intelligence unit to gather information from all
9 sources in a manner consistent with the law, to analyze
10 that information, and to assist law enforcement,
11 particularly members of DPD, with information that may
12 be used to prevent crime, to pursue and apprehend
13 offenders, to obtain evidence necessary for conviction,
14 protect officer and civilian safety and/or assist with
15 any other lawful duties and objectives of DPD.

16 So I thought it was important to share that
17 but in a nutshell our goal is to get good information
18 that is usable out to the officers on the street as
19 quickly as possible. So the crime intelligence unit has
20 become a hub for all of our department intelligence. We
21 provide intelligence reports, which are based on crime
22 incidents to the department. We provide mapping,
23 statistical analysis, and provide the daily and weekly
24 statistical crime stats. But I wanted to indicate in
25 2018 we provided 1,900 Intel reports to the department,

1 which is really outstanding and the quality of the
2 report is very important to us, that we're giving out
3 good information to the officers and the investigators
4 that are responding to these crimes. So we believe that
5 the programs we have at Crime Intel are leveraging
6 technologies, we were just talking about, to improve the
7 investigative abilities within our detective bureaus and
8 provide the highest quality information to the officers
9 out on the street to increase officer and citizen
10 safety.

11 So this is our realtime crime center. I
12 know a lot of you have had the opportunity to come for a
13 tour. We opened in November of 2017. We're a 24 hour
14 operation that has about 60 staff members. That's a mix
15 of sworn and non-sworn staff and we like to try to
16 maintain a ratio of one-third sworn to two-thirds
17 non-sworn staff. And what we found is that staffing mix
18 allows us to leverage the experience, the enforcement
19 experience of our sworn officers and bring that together
20 with our formally educated analysts and we found that
21 that's leading us to a lot of success and a really
22 winning team. So we view some of our innovative
23 technology to accelerate information sharing to officers
24 out on the street and some of that technology is
25 obviously there. It's our 32 foot by 9 foot video wall

1 and then we also have access to over 6 thousand video
2 feeds that are city-owned cameras, private partner
3 camera systems, and of course project Green Light. We
4 also have access to license plate readers, facial
5 recognition software, as well as tether tracking data
6 for parolee and probationaries who are out on tether.

7 So since our opening in 2017 we have hosted
8 over 170 tours to our center here, which we're really
9 excited about, and 40 of those tours have been to other
10 police departments that are coming here to see what kind
11 of programs we're running in an attempt to emulate those
12 programs in their own cities. So we're really proud of
13 that. They've come from as close as Hamtramck and Flint
14 and as far away as Berlin, Germany; London, England; and
15 we've even had Australia and Ireland come for a tour.
16 So the programs that we're running here have also
17 allowed us to shine globally. We were awarded the
18 international critical communication award for the best
19 use of a control room in 2018. So some of the programs
20 that are running out of the realtime crime center. Here
21 we're colocated with traffic management. And we work
22 together with them to promote safe and efficient
23 movement of vehicle and pedestrian traffic throughout
24 the city; and we work together during special events and
25 under the direction of downtown services and Commander

1 Hayes, officers from downtown services come to access
2 their cameras twice a day during the busiest traffic
3 times to attempt to alleviate some of the traffic
4 congestion.

5 AVERT, which is the Audio Video Evidence
6 Response Team reports to the crime intelligence unit as
7 well. That's a seven-member team that's tasked with
8 recovering all video evidence from crime scenes. They
9 recover and process that video for evidence purposes and
10 they also provide support to our investigative units as
11 well as perform pre and post install audits for our new
12 Green Light businesses. So they go out and they
13 determine the placement for the cameras for maximum
14 viewing abilities. Our counterterrorism threat analysis
15 team, that's CTAT for short, they perform a daily threat
16 assessment of all of our critical infrastructure and
17 they also monitor all international and domestic
18 terrorist incidents to determine if there's any issues
19 that could potentially affect us here in the city. They
20 also vet social media for all local events that are
21 going on to, again, try to determine if there's anything
22 that we need to be aware of.

23 Some of the external partners that we work
24 with through our counterterrorism team is Detroit
25 Homeland Security, FBI, as well as the Detroit Crime

1 Commission. DPD shield is a program that we started in
2 2017 and this is a partnership with a private sector and
3 this allows us the ability to organize a unified and
4 consistent response to any active shooter or critical
5 incident that could potentially occur in the city. So
6 through this we disseminate incident assessments and
7 open source intelligence bulletins to the private sector
8 but the most important program that we run through DPD
9 Shield is the CRAS program and that's the Civilian
10 Response to an Active Shooter incident, so what we do is
11 we go out and we train civilian people in different
12 types of businesses on how to behavior and what to do in
13 the event that they find themselves in an active shooter
14 situation. So from 2017 through 2018 we trained 3,600
15 people. So we're really proud of that number.

16 The illegal dumping project is a project
17 that we work on with a general assignment unit and we
18 work together with them to address quality of life
19 issues that are sometimes a challenge to enforce in the
20 city of Detroit. So what we found is there was a large
21 amount of people dumping garbage and construction waste
22 throughout the vacant areas of the city we have
23 installed covert cameras in some of those locations and
24 we monitor that and through this program we have had 255
25 case closures and issued \$200,000 in fines.

1 And of course we already talked a lot about
2 -- the chief's talked a lot about project Green Light.
3 Of course this is a project that we're very proud of.
4 It's our most uniquely innovative program. A little
5 history of course, might be a little repetitive, but our
6 analysis revealed that it is proportionate amount of
7 crime was occurring after 10 p.m. at -- within 500 feet
8 of our gas stations. So the goal of project Green Light
9 was to significantly reduce violent crime at these
10 locations, so beginning in January of 2016 we had eight
11 gas station owners volunteer to participate with us in
12 this project and they installed high definition cameras
13 in their businesses, they upgraded their lighting, and
14 agreed to display our Project Green Light sign and a
15 physical green light in order to deter crime. And so we
16 have those realtime footage or we get realtime footage
17 in the realtime crime center where we're able to perform
18 virtual patrol and virtual response of any issues at
19 those locations. So this is just a visual to show you
20 and represent how the program has grown. This is what
21 the map of our Green Light businesses looked like when
22 we had eight in the very beginning in 2016 and this is
23 where we're at today. It's amazing. We actually have
24 512 businesses, we just got one that was added today.
25 And the type of business has really changed. We started

1 with eight gas stations and now we have retail,
2 restaurants, we have churches, vocational schools and we
3 just had a funeral home come on earlier this week, so
4 our relationships with our business owners is really
5 important to us. Earlier this week Chief Craig hosted a
6 business partner meeting with us from the realtime crime
7 center where over 100 of our business partners and
8 future Green Light business partners came and attended
9 and they couldn't say enough in support of our project.
10 We were able to listen to several testimonials of
11 business owners that have seen a drastic decrease in
12 crime, and increase this their business and they listen
13 to their patrons and, you know, they feel safe to be
14 there and the business partners are really excited to
15 continue to work with us in the program.

16 So overview of our future state. Of course
17 we're trying our very best to scale for growth as all of
18 our projects grow and expand we want to make sure that
19 we have the appropriate staffing to manage those
20 programs to make sure that they're sustainable into the
21 future. And what we really want to do this year is try
22 to understand the impact that the unit has on the entire
23 department. It's easy for us to say statistically the
24 impact we've had for Project Green Light but what we
25 really want to understand is what impact are we having

1 on case closure; what impact are we having on
2 investigations and what value do we bring to patrol
3 officers as well.

4 So in addition to that we are expanding the
5 realtime crime center later this year. The plans are in
6 the work for that. We are adding precinct level
7 realtime crime centers in the 8th and 9th precinct where
8 they will have neighborhood level Intel centers. We're
9 adding non-Project Green Light corridors that will be
10 200 cameras that will be city-owned so they will be in
11 high crime areas that have less coverage for Green
12 Light. And then of course we want to keep searching for
13 the best technology. We don't want to become lax; we
14 want to stay current and remain globally recognized. So
15 our goal on here I have 700 but 800; our goal for this
16 year is to get 800 businesses in our projects so we're
17 going to go back to the drawing board. We have a lot of
18 planning that works for how do we accomplish that and in
19 fact today we were sort of brain storming on new ideas
20 on how to market the project and get more businesses in.

21 So in addition we'd like to add multifamily
22 housing and more commercial corridors. Those are the
23 groups of businesses that join together for optimal
24 camera placement. So we have no doubt that we'll meet
25 these goals with the continued support of the

1 department, the chief and the board, the mayor and we
2 look forward to see what 2019 brings. That concludes my
3 presentation.

4 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioners?

5 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes. Have you had any
6 discussions with any of the people that live in the
7 multifamily developments?

8 CAPTAIN SLOAN: I have not personally but we
9 have an executive manager that works in our unit that
10 communicates to different types of businesses about
11 their needs and of course we're always cautious about
12 bringing on new types of business or new types of
13 buildings to be cognisant of the issues that that could
14 bring.

15 CHIEF CRAIG: Through the chair. In
16 response to Commissioner Davis's question the mayor and
17 I did attend a meeting and a senior home was one of the
18 first multi-complex. The response we got was
19 overwhelming; they wanted it, and it's been installed
20 and so that's been the feedback. The other thing is
21 kind of significant in working with other parts of the
22 city what we have found, and my number might be low now,
23 but we had 41 block club associations across this city
24 that have signed on saying we want Green Light
25 corridors, 41. I mean, that's phenomenal. And we think

1 it's even higher than that. That was the number I had
2 as of yesterday.

3 VICE CHAIR BROWN: Through the chair.
4 Captain, thank you for your report. As always it's
5 always well illustrated and full of a lot of
6 information. The thing I'm always bombarded with is how
7 can we get a tour? They want a tour.

8 CAPTAIN SLOAN: Actually, we have open tour
9 hours, sir, Fridays from 1 to 2 but I will certainly
10 contact you to get it arranged.

11 VICE CHAIR BROWN: And also to address
12 Commissioner Davis' question I've been talking with the
13 mayor and the suggestion to bring those Green Lights to
14 residential establishments and I believe we are
15 earmarked for the second one at Smith Holmes over on
16 Evergreen. They're looking at putting them in all of
17 the establishments throughout the city.

18 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Through the chair.

19 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I'm sorry could you hold
20 on for one second please? Commissioner Dewaelsche and
21 Carter then you.

22 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Thank you.

23 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Yes, thank you,
24 Mr. Chair. With regard to the Green Light the program
25 itself is it unique to the city of Detroit or are there

1 other similar programs throughout the nation? That's
2 the first part of my question I just wondered chief.

3 CHIEF CRAIG: Through the chair in response
4 Green Light is absolutely unique. You know, certainly
5 in the city of New York they have a surveillance camera
6 video system like all of Manhattan but ours -- I know of
7 no other city that's doing it quite like we do, that's
8 tied in in the manner of 9-1-1 calls being able to --
9 you know, certainly the Green Light has evolved from the
10 initial eight. I tell the story about where the Green
11 came from, those know. Certainly, I know president Bell
12 knows because --

13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: We don't want to know.

14 CHIEF CRAIG: Michigan State, did you go to
15 Michigan State?

16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: No, Cass Tech is fine,
17 sir. You can stick with Cass, it's local.

18 CHIEF CRAIG: So the Green came from that
19 and we wanted to make a distinction between what was in
20 downtown and midtown where you saw the blue lights. So
21 blue lights in those areas did not work anywhere close.
22 It was looked upon as a safe haven, a place where
23 community members could go in, make a phone call or get
24 help if needed. The Green Light is so different than
25 that. It's tied in through WiFi high definition

1 cameras, lighting. It's a collaborative business
2 partnership, so it's very involved. Other cities are
3 trying to replicate. You'd be surprised the cities that
4 have come out really interested in starting the Green
5 Light program. I think predictably as crime continues
6 to move outside of the boundaries of the city of
7 Detroit, I think some of our neighborhoods in some of
8 the suburban communities may want to opt for Green
9 Light. So you want to add something to that?

10 CAPTAIN SLOAN: I sure do. We've had as I
11 mentioned 40 tours of police departments looking to
12 replicate what we're doing. But what I didn't mention
13 is the continual e-mails requesting information from us
14 from other departments throughout the country every day.
15 They want to understand how we develop the program.
16 They want copies of our standard operating procedures,
17 any information that we can give them on how we develop
18 this program, so it's something that departments wants
19 to do all over the country.

20 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHÉ: And I ask that
21 because, Mr. Chair, I think this will be a wonderful
22 topic to have at our NACOLE conference. Maybe we are
23 talking about it but that would be a wonderful topic.
24 The other thing is, you know, you probably raise money
25 or fundraise or if not, could fund raise so that you can

1 afford to put -- I mean, so you could assist those
2 organizations that cannot afford the cost up front to
3 set up a Green Light and to do that I think -- the
4 question I have is do you take or record any anecdotal,
5 like you said you ask people come and talk about Green
6 Light and how it has impacted their businesses; do you
7 record that in any way because that would help with
8 proposals I think.

9 CAPTAIN SLOAN: That's an excellent idea,
10 ma'am. No, we do not but the fundraising is not
11 something that we've explored but there are several
12 businesses who have had the ability to get access to
13 grants to fund their upfront fees for their Green Light
14 installation.

15 CHIEF CRAIG: Through the chair you might
16 remember, it might be almost two years ago Reverend
17 Sheffield and a group of community members wanted to
18 assist local gas station or party store, I'm not sure
19 which, but they raised funds to support that business
20 and get into Green Light. That's the one I know of, I'm
21 not certain if there's any others.

22 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHÉ: I was thinking in
23 terms of like DOJ funds or federal funds, grants, yeah.
24 Thank you.

25 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Carter then

1 Commissioner Holt and then Commissioner Holley.

2 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Thank you Mr. Chair.
3 Captain Sloan, one question what happens when businesses
4 are no longer paying the bills and they still have that
5 Green Light on their building indicating that they are
6 part of Green Light?

7 CAPTAIN SLOAN: Yes, ma'am. So we have a
8 very extensive standardized compliance process, so if a
9 business loses connectivity or in any way is not a good
10 partner to us, we have a process that they go through in
11 order to be removed from the project. It involves a
12 verbal warning, a written warning, and then we take that
13 business and their compliance issues to our realtime
14 crime center board for decision for removal and at that
15 point we issue a cease and desist order and we follow-up
16 to ensure that they take the light and the signs down.
17 So there have been instances where that has not occurred
18 and we worked with the law department to bring a lawsuit
19 and that lawsuit is working its way to a settlement
20 agreement.

21 COMMISSIONER CARTER: So on another question
22 who's on your board?

23 CAPTAIN SLOAN: Myself, AC LeValley, DC
24 Marlon Wilson. Several of our tech people, IM, Director
25 Stein as well, AC White.

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Commissioner
2 Holt.

3 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Thank you. Yes, chief
4 through the chair. Chief Craig, there's a contest over
5 in District 1 whereby we are collecting proposals that
6 demonstrate the community's enthusiasm for the expansion
7 of the Green Lights and the attachment of cameras. Now
8 two concerns have come out of that new phenomena. Folks
9 want to know will the Green Light camera process will it
10 -- is it a way of folks getting more traffic tickets and
11 how do we respect folk's privacy?

12 CAPTAIN SLOAN: Through the chair, we do not
13 use the camera feeds to issue tickets. And I'm sorry
14 the second part of your question?

15 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Some people are
16 concerned about the privacy.

17 CAPTAIN SLOAN: Sure. The camera placement
18 is only in publically accessible areas and even in areas
19 where we have multifamily housing as well we never --
20 we're never in an area where it could capture the
21 entrance to somebody's home or something to the like.
22 It's always in the publically accessible areas.

23 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Thank you.

24 CHIEF CRAIG: One thing I wanted to add that
25 I didn't add earlier Detroit Green Light is trademarked

1 so I think this to your question. We got our trademark
2 it's probably been four or five months now so, you know,
3 people can copy without using the signage or the Green
4 Light. It's strictly city of Detroit.

5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Holley.

6 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Excellent point,
7 Captain presentation, excellent and, you know, every
8 other meeting I come here I get so -- I just get really
9 -- my pride in terms of first class police department
10 and I know in terms of the men and women but also in
11 terms of the presentations like this and in terms of
12 intelligent unit, and I really thank you for that. Let
13 me just ask you a couple of things. One is is that
14 maybe through the chair to the chief is that I'm very
15 partial to Wayne County Community College district. By
16 disclosure I'm a consultant to the school. And I guess
17 I get very concerned when I see Wayne State, which I'm a
18 graduate of and I love them, but when Wayne County
19 Community College is not a partner I wish that we could
20 do something to have 173 -- 137 police officers that's
21 on that Wayne County got six campuses, which if they're
22 a partner they could help in terms of -- and I'm sure
23 you are in some kind of way. I just want to put it out
24 there.

25 The other thing, for example, Captain, if

1 I'm looking for to do something wrong and I know Green
2 Light is over here and no light is over there, is there
3 any study that's being done in terms of helping the
4 poor? In other words, people who can't afford it, is
5 there anything we can do to say this really does well
6 and, you know, for crime but the people who can't afford
7 it so that we maybe go for grants from the justice
8 department or through, you know, the rich -- the people
9 who doing a lot of stuff for the city, and it's a lot of
10 good people in this city that could try to help so we
11 can raise money to help those who really can't afford
12 it. So that we can help this, Chief and you where we
13 can basically where everybody's safe. Are you following
14 me?

15 CAPTAIN SLOAN: Absolutely, sir.

16 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Am I making sense to
17 you?

18 CAPTAIN SLOAN: Absolutely.

19 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: And it may not
20 necessarily be an answer to it, but if you can just put
21 it in your spirit because I feel like that sometimes
22 that we just forget about -- I know you don't but that's
23 the way I feel, so can you help me with Wayne County
24 Community College district as a partner and how can we
25 do a study or something to really help those who can't

1 afford it and see how we can raise money as the
2 commissioners indicated.

3 CAPTAIN SLOAN: Absolutely, sir.

4 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Thank you so much.
5 Excellent.

6 CHIEF CRAIG: Through the chair, kind of
7 respond to Commissioner Holley. As you know it's the
8 goal to expand corridors and the public space with video
9 surveillance in the neighborhoods and it's designed to
10 focus on those neighborhood where crime is highest and
11 that's at no cost to those residents. So we're excited
12 about the expansion of that. We think it's going pay
13 big dividends in reducing crime. As it stands now we
14 use Green Light not say if a crime occurs in the area of
15 a Green Light location, we'll go there and many times
16 the analyst and investigators will find a route of
17 escape of suspect. I think I touched somewhat on it
18 with the tragic shooting death of the three year old, we
19 used the Green Light location to track that suspect and
20 license plate reader. In terms of Wayne County
21 Community College I've met with Dr. Ivery about his
22 public safety officers and something that he wanted to
23 explore in terms of expansion. Certainly, we support
24 it. We just don't know where it's at right now but we
25 have had conversations with him on that.

1 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Thank you.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, ma'am.

3 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Mr. Chair, thank you.

4 Thank you so much, Captain, beautiful report and perhaps
5 Chief Craig you can help with this answer. Regarding
6 the Green Light and when we were at Second Baptist for
7 our meeting last week I think it was Commander Hayes
8 that brought up the volume of traffic that comes off the
9 bridge, you know, from Canada here, so you got the
10 tunnel and you got the bridge. Are there Green Lights
11 there? That's our security, in other words, do you have
12 them posted, if they are posted, who pays for that?

13 Another question, another part, it's not
14 hard regarding the neighborhoods, do you think it would
15 be a good idea to put cameras in the alleys where they
16 have the lights, put some cameras through there maybe
17 where it's heavy crime? Those are two things if you
18 could answer.

19 CAPTAIN SLOAN: Through the chair. Yes,
20 ma'am, I think that's a great idea to put cameras in the
21 alleys because that I know that a lot of things are
22 happening back there, illegal dumping and that type of
23 thing. I think that's a great idea. The other part of
24 your question, ma'am, was could you remind me? I
25 apologize.

1 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I'm sorry, traffic that
2 comes --

3 CAPTAIN SLOAN: Yes, ma'am. So we do not
4 have any Green Light cameras in that area but as I
5 mentioned earlier we do partner with the traffic
6 management center and they have 59 cameras that are
7 downtown and in a couple areas around that we do have
8 access to, so that's what we use during rush hour when
9 the downtown services officers come through, they
10 monitor those cameras there to feed information to the
11 traffic officers that are out on the street to alleviate
12 traffic issues. So we do have views of just about the
13 entire area right there on Jefferson that you were
14 mentioning.

15 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Thank you so much. But
16 look into the alley, please.

17 CAPTAIN SLOAN: I sure will.

18 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Thank you so much.

19 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I didn't know we had that
20 many alleys. Most alleys are closed now but I guess if
21 you can find them then they --

22 COMMISSIONER BURCH: They're clean now
23 that's the difference.

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: We don't have them in our
25 neighborhood, no alleys. Thank you, Captain, for

1 outstanding report. We appreciate. Looking forward I
2 know advanced technology; I know it's going to be a
3 great debate about people privacy and constitution issue
4 and we looking forward to that debate too, so thank you.

5 CAPTAIN SLOAN: Thank you very much.

6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Moving on do we have any
7 standing or ad hoc committee report at this time? If
8 not, Mr. Hicks board secretary.

9 MR. HICKS: Thank you, Mr. Chair. I simply
10 want to draw your attention to the five items that are
11 listed on the agenda. Again, these items were listed as
12 incoming items and largely throughout the course of the
13 meeting you've touched on all of these particular
14 issues, so unless there's a specific item in which the
15 board has to ask of me, that would conclude any remarks
16 that I want to make for the meeting.

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Any old business?

18 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the chair.

19 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir.

20 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Under old business,
21 you know, I move that the board allow committee meetings
22 to be open to commissioners that may want to attend as
23 well as open to the public.

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Oral communication from
25 the public and comments. At this time we going to open

1 the floor. Mr. Brown.

2 MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair, I have eight cards.
3 First speaker will be Mr. Eric Blount followed by
4 Ms. Diane Wilcoxa.

5 MR. BLOUNT: Good afternoon, board and
6 chief. For the record my name is Eric Blount, that's
7 with an O for reporters. I'm a life-long Detroiter. I
8 come to you again with concerns about the relevance and
9 independence of this board. I asked you to search your
10 souls to see why and how you serve this board. I say
11 this because of the recent incident this week where a
12 Wayne County jury found a police officer guilty of
13 assaulting a naked woman in a hospital. The police
14 chief did recommend suspension without pay. The
15 attorney for the board Mr. Wyrick did agree with the
16 chief and cited that this woman was being assaulted
17 while her back was turned. I wholeheartedly agree with
18 civilian oversight but this isn't it. Although we don't
19 have the same mother or father this naked woman was my
20 sister. She was my daughter. She was my aunt, my
21 mother, and the lady next door. And this board just
22 doesn't seem to be able to come to that view of the
23 citizens of this city. Thank you for listening to my
24 comments.

25 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, sir.

1 MR. BROWN: Mrs. Wilcoxa followed by
2 Ms. Joann Warwick.

3 MRS. WILCOXA: Good afternoon, honorable
4 board and to the chief and to our department. I have
5 been asked to come and ask this board and this
6 department to move with as much caution and deliberation
7 as it relates to installing additional cameras
8 throughout the city of Detroit that are connected to the
9 Green Light as it did when it investigated whether or
10 not an officer should be removed -- or officers I should
11 say -- should be removed from their positions based on
12 inappropriate behavior as it related to posting on
13 Snapchat. When we look at installing additional cameras
14 we have to ask ourselves several questions: One is when
15 will the feed be running? Is it running constantly or
16 is it running only when the officers think that there is
17 a particular crime that raises to a certain level that
18 for whatever reason police think they need to engage
19 cameras?

20 Secondly, who will have access to these
21 cameras? Homeland security, FBI, DIA? There is
22 subpoena power in our country.

23 Thirdly, what is the cost of ongoing
24 monitoring? Have monies been set aside for that?

25 And thirdly, the right of privacy which is

1 extremely important in our country. It has been argued
2 that there is no right of privacy in public places. If
3 you read the constitution, the fourth amendment, and if
4 you look at the 9th amendment enabling the Bill of
5 Rights to be incorporated, it says that we the people
6 retain powers to ourselves. We retain a privacy right
7 both in our homes and in our persons, which means
8 wherever our persons go, the privacy right afforded by
9 the constitution goes with us as well. We have a law
10 department very capable of researching these issues.
11 Connecticut is currently being sued based on the same
12 premises that we are now getting ready to operate under.
13 These are serious questions which require serious
14 assessments on the part of this board and on the part of
15 our police department working in conjunction with our
16 law department. Thank you.

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

18 MR. BROWN: Ms. Warwick followed by
19 Ms. Kelly Burch.

20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I just want to
21 acknowledge Commissioner Griffie from District 2 has
22 joined us. Thank you.

23 MS. WARWICK: Yes, hello. First thing I'd
24 like to ask is would you please consider recycling? I
25 had lunch here today, nice sandwich but it was Styrofoam

1 and the city doesn't recycle Styrofoam, so while
2 Mr. Grady's here can the city recycle Styrofoam also
3 'cause I really don't want to breathe it and I don't
4 think other people would like to as well.

5 For Green Light at traffic lights I was
6 asked by the district manager, Debbie district manager,
7 to start asking people what they thought about it.
8 Initial response is absolutely no, we have a right of
9 privacy. When one of the ladies that was promoted
10 talked about she works on making sure people follow the
11 code of conduct but I'm concerned in a case that I filed
12 the Board of Police Commissioners, chief investigator,
13 nobody made these people file a code of conduct. My
14 understanding is there is a code of conduct around
15 police cameras and so I recently called the chief
16 commissioners and I said when I got a report back that
17 didn't explain much at all about the reasoning, in fact
18 there was no reasoning for the decision, and that lack
19 of reasoning erodes public trust in the board of police
20 commissioners and the police. If we have to put stuff
21 in writing, it would be nice if you could tell us and
22 put things in writing, but anyway I was told that even
23 though I have a video with a camera in a Green Light, I
24 was told it wasn't recording. And I think I was told
25 the police officers weren't on duty so I don't

1 understand why they were wearing a uniform and had a
2 camera on but I met my neighborhood police officer last
3 night and she had a camera on and it had a green light;
4 I said, so is that on or not? She goes, oh they're
5 always on; said the Green Light's on but it isn't
6 necessarily recording; I said, gee, I had a situation, I
7 was told the camera wasn't on and even when you have --
8 when a police officer has an encounter with a citizen,
9 my understanding is they're supposed to have their
10 camera on and if they didn't, they're supposed to write
11 a report but in the case that I filed that wasn't
12 addressed. There was no report and when I complained
13 about that there was supposed to be a second complaint
14 but I never received an answer. Thank you.

15 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

16 MR. BROWN: Mrs. Burch followed by
17 Ms. Eryion Burch I believe is the first name.

18 MRS. BURCH: Good afternoon. So since I
19 only have a little time I'm going to run down the
20 evidence of police misconduct that I've uncovered while
21 earning my degree in criminal justice specializing in
22 forensic science. Detective Olson wrote in his report
23 that my brother was in possession of a stolen weapon.
24 The Michigan State Police report states that the weapon
25 did not have any useable prints. The shooter also said

1 in his interview, and also in his written report, he did
2 not see my brother with a gun or my brother shoot at
3 him. Evidence tech Eugene Fitzhugh he wrote in his
4 report that the gun had blood on it. Trace evidence,
5 the Michigan State Police report states that the swab
6 was not tested or analyzed, so he lied. The result said
7 they don't know if it was semen, blood, spit; they don't
8 know what it was because it was never tested. The
9 evidence tech also reported that my brother exchanged
10 gun fire with Paul Jones. There is no such thing; you
11 can't exchange gun fire with somebody that didn't have a
12 gun. The evidence tech also relayed to the medical
13 examiner that they were in a gun fight; you can't have a
14 gun fight if the other person doesn't have a gun.

15 They delayed the forensics in the case. The
16 gun that the shooter used was sent to the medical, the
17 Michigan State crime lab in March when the shooting
18 happened. The gun that they claim my brother had was
19 sent to the Michigan State crime lab July 26. Where was
20 the gun all that time?

21 The crime scene was not securely -- properly
22 secured. The whole alley should have been cornered off,
23 only the crime scene partly. I wrote Chief Craig ever
24 since 2012. I've written you 12 letters. I've e-mailed
25 you 20 times. I've came here and spoke in front of the

1 board over seven, eight times. Internal affairs has
2 covered this up. No one has listened to me at all.
3 I've given you the proof; the proof is in your own
4 investigation and you have refused to do anything. This
5 man is still walking the streets. I haven't worked in
6 eight years. I have PTSD. I'm worried that these cops
7 --

8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Ma'am.

9 MRS. BURCH: -- that have turned this over
10 is going to blow my brains out one day.

11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Ma'am. Thank you.

12 MR. BROWN: Ms. Burch followed by Mr. Ed
13 Martell.

14 MRS. BURCH: Eryion Burch, that's my
15 daughter. She was going to yield her time to me. Go
16 ahead, Eryion.

17 MS. BURCH: I yield my time to my mother.

18 MRS. BURCH: Also it is a shame that I came
19 before this board and you all, I have given you proof,
20 I've given Deputy Chief LeValley, he looked over this
21 case; he had problems with this case. Captain Decker
22 told me that my brother's blood was on that gun.
23 Captain Decker blatantly lied because the trace evidence
24 was never tested. Why was my brother's case covered up
25 by the police? Because the owner of the bar has friends

1 in the police department. I am scared to work. I've
2 been DJ'ing for 25 years all over the city. I am scared
3 to DJ because I don't know who I'm going to run into,
4 who I'm going to see. It's a shame. Detective Olson is
5 retired and living his life and is free to do what he
6 wants to do. But he is the one who is also being sued
7 for 25 million dollars because he also set up Aaron
8 Salter and made that man serve 15 years in prison and
9 he's the same detective who is the reason why Paul Jones
10 is walking the street right now. Every time I tried to
11 get in touch with you, Chief Craig, somebody always
12 interfered. I've talked to over 30 people within this
13 department, homicide. I can name so many people. And
14 they won't let me talk to you since 2012.

15 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

16 MR. BROWN: Mr. Martell followed by
17 Mr. Scotty Bowman.

18 MR. MARTELL: Good afternoon, Honorable
19 Board, Chief Craig, Mr. Chairman. Ed Martell on behalf
20 state representative Cynthia A. Johnson. I just want to
21 applaud this board and chief for your efforts on
22 combatting this illegal dumping crisis within our city.
23 To further assist you in your efforts Representative
24 Johnson recently introduced HB4192 and 4193, which will
25 give you more tools, more tools to combat these rogue

1 contractors and their illegal dumping, so I definitely
2 -- we are behind you in that effort. And if any the
3 residents would like a copy of that or language
4 concerning that, please reach out to our office.

5 Secondly, HB4326, which is a post conviction
6 employment bill, commonly known as band the box was
7 recently introduced by our office. What that is aimed
8 at is combating recidivism, thus making your job easier.
9 You know, strengthening the work force and again lowing
10 the rate of recidivism. So, again, if you would like
11 information on either of those bills, please contact our
12 office. But again, thank you for your efforts.

13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, sir.

14 MR. BROWN: Mr. Bowman and followed by
15 Mrs. Michelle George.

16 MR. BOWMAN: I am going to raise two topics
17 in my two minutes, so I'll be listening for an answer to
18 this first question, which is really a yes or no answer,
19 after I'm done and that is whether or not the convicted
20 assault and batterer Dwayne Jones is still working for
21 the Detroit Police Department at this time.

22 Moving on to the topic that was being
23 discussed throughout the afternoon here. There seems to
24 be a misstatement, and I've heard the idea expressed
25 that somehow if one is concerned about one's privacy,

1 then one must be doing something wrong and that is a
2 common mantra used throughout anybody who really opposes
3 the privacy movement or respecting individual privacy
4 rights; and part of the problem comes in here is that
5 there's often behavior people may not want other people
6 to know about whether or not you think it's wrong, it's
7 legal but once that gets out that could have a
8 significant effect on the person's personal life.
9 That's one type of situation.

10 Another type is that all because something
11 is legal now and all because certain behaviors is
12 recognized as one's -- one acting out on one's personal
13 individual liberties and rights doesn't mean it's going
14 to be that way tomorrow. Governments change, policies
15 change. And a good bow work against a police state, and
16 I'm sorry authoritarian state, not meaning the police
17 are authoritarian here, but on the good bow work against
18 an authoritarian government is to be vigilant in
19 preserving privacy as well as individual rights every
20 step of the way where possible. The problem with having
21 them on the traffic lights, and I've seen traffic
22 cameras since a long time ago, and when I asked MDOT
23 officials about that, what they told me was oh they can
24 only detect movement they can't detect details and say
25 privacy is safe. We're just getting statistical

1 information. Well, I have a feeling that sometime
2 between back then and now they've moved into high
3 resolution, possibly facial recognition, so I see a
4 drift.

5 And I'm sorry one more thing the -- and I
6 already heard about putting them in neighborhoods. If
7 one of those is pointed at my house monitoring who comes
8 and goes, something's going to happen to that camera.

9 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

10 MR. BROWN: Ms. Michelle George, and
11 Mr. Chair, that will be your last speaker.

12 MS. GEORGE: Good afternoon, Chairman Bell
13 and to the board of police, Chief Craig; how are you? I
14 wanted to just give you up to date. Last week we were
15 in Washington D.C. at a legislative policy conference
16 and Chief Craig, I brought your name up to Senator
17 Stabenow. She met with us about the support of having
18 that support for police officers with the mental health
19 issues and we're happy to know that she received
20 bipartisan support on the bill with the Republicans,
21 which is a good thing, to combat the behavioral health
22 for treatment and to address the mental health issues
23 and opioid crisis. So it would be a community health
24 treatment bill. So that's a good thing; she's been
25 working on the bill since 2013. So because I was

1 letting her know that we want you to have a support as
2 well, so also we're happy that the federal government
3 congress passed a bill, the juvenile prevention
4 delinquency act, which received bipartisan support.
5 We're happy about that and they will be bringing money,
6 federal money, into the states to address the care and
7 treatment of juveniles and to bring the money in.

8 I also would like to address that one of the
9 issues that I'm working on and I have brought it up in
10 the past about Detroit police officers about receiving
11 more pay for the base pay rate. I reached out to
12 Senator Santana, well, she reached out to me. The only
13 bills that she put on the floor she told me was senate
14 bill 234 and senate bill 235 to prevent police
15 departments from poaching officers trained by the
16 Detroit Police Department but also putting more money
17 into their retirement tax, so I didn't get a chance to
18 look at the budget for Mayor Duggan but we're going to
19 work on Detroit Police Department 'cause Highland Park
20 police just received a raise. So my goal is to work
21 with the legislatives to get more money into the police
22 to increase that base pay. Thank you.

23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

24 MR. BROWN: That's your last speaker,
25 Mr. Chair.

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I think that's the end of
2 public comments. Our announcement next meeting will be
3 on Thursday, March the 28th, 2019 at 3 p.m. at public
4 safety headquarters 1301 Third. Our next community
5 meeting will be on Thursday April 11, 2019 at 6:30 p.m.,
6 11th precinct Wellness Plan East Medical Center 4909
7 East Outer Drive on the east side. Thank you all for
8 attending. You heard we made announcement earlier that
9 we are going to go into closed session. The chair would
10 entertain a motion.

11 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: So moved, sir.

12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Been properly moved and
13 supported. Discussion? Those in favor aye.

14 ALL: Aye.

15 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Those opposed? Motion
16 carry. I'm going to give you five minutes to go
17 whatever. We'll meet in the room directly in front of
18 us.

19 (Off the record at 4:50 p.m.)

20 (Back on the record at 5:50 p.m.)

21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: The chair would entertain
22 a motion to reconvene the board meeting.

23 VICE CHAIR BROWN: So moved.

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Been properly moved and
25 second. Discussion? Those in favor aye.

1 ALL: Aye.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Those opposed? Motion
3 carry. The order of the business Attorney Wyrick's
4 going to set for the record the point of the business
5 that we have on hand.

6 MR. WYRICK: Good afternoon, this honorable
7 body. Through the chair my name is Jermaine Wyrick.
8 I'm the board attorney. The matter before the board
9 currently was about on February 22nd, 2019 the change of
10 duty request to administrative leave without pay but
11 with medical benefits was forwarded to the Board of
12 Police Commission for Officer Diamond Greenwood Badge
13 number 3733. She has actually at this point been
14 charged with felonies and based upon that we have just
15 -- I would -- my recommendation on page two in writing
16 is that the board agree with the chief's request based
17 upon the department policies violated which are very
18 specifically enumerated in my report, which have
19 actually led to felony charges, about six total felony
20 charges, I recommend that Officer Greenwood be placed on
21 administrative leave without pay but retain the medical
22 benefits.

23 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Chair?

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, ma'am.

25 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: I move that we accept

1 our attorney's recommendation.

2 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Second.

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Been properly moved and
4 second. Discussion?

5 VICE CHAIR BROWN: Mr. Chair, I'd just like
6 to make a recommendation of a rollcall vote.

7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Recommendation for the
8 rollcall vote, and I'm going to Mr. Hicks to conduct a
9 rollcall vote.

10 MR. HICKS: Thank you, Mr. Chair.
11 Commissioner Griffie?

12 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Aye.

13 MR. HICKS: Commissioner Burton?

14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I support the chief's
15 recommendation.

16 MR. HICKS: That would be a yes? That would
17 be recorded as a yes?

18 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes.

19 MR. HICKS: Commissioner Dewaelsche?

20 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Yes.

21 MR. HICKS: Commissioner Holley?

22 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Yes.

23 MR. HICKS: Commissioner Carter?

24 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Aye.

25 MR. HICKS: Commissioner Brown?

1 VICE CHAIR BROWN: Aye.

2 MR. HICKS: Commissioner Burch?

3 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Aye.

4 MR. HICKS: Commissioner Davis?

5 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Aye.

6 MR. HICKS: Commissioner Holt?

7 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Yes.

8 MR. HICKS: And Commissioner Bell?

9 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Aye.

10 MR. HICKS: Through the chair all members
11 voted in the affirmative and the recommendation to
12 suspend without pay is --

13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: What is the vote count,
14 please?

15 MR. HICKS: The vote count was a ten to
16 zero.

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

18 COMMISSIONER GRIFFE: Mr. Chair?

19 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, ma'am.

20 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: I'd like to entertain
21 a motion that we accept the personnel committee's
22 recommendation on the personnel matter that we discussed
23 in closed session.

24 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: So moved.

25 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Been properly moved and

1 seconded. Discussion?

2 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Move for a rollcall
3 vote.

4 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Mr. Hicks, would you
5 conduct a rollcall vote?

6 MR. HICKS: Yes. Commissioner Griffe?

7 COMMISSIONER GRIFFE: Aye.

8 MR. HICKS: Commissioner Burton?

9 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Nay.

10 MR. HICKS: Commissioner Dewaelsche?

11 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Yes.

12 MR. HICKS: Commissioner Holley?

13 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Yes.

14 MR. HICKS: Commissioner Carter?

15 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Aye.

16 MR. HICKS: Commissioner Brown?

17 VICE CHAIR BROWN: Nay.

18 MR. HICKS: Commissioner Burch?

19 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Aye.

20 MR. HICKS: Commissioner Davis?

21 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Aye.

22 MR. HICKS: Commissioner Holt?

23 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Yes.

24 MR. HICKS: Commissioner Carter -- I mean
25 Commissioner Bell?

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Aye. Can we have a vote
2 count, please?

3 MR. HICKS: Yes, you have a total of ten
4 members present, two members voting against and all
5 eight additional members voting to support the personnel
6 recommendation.

7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: So the motion pass?

8 MR. HICKS: Yes.

9 COMMISSIONER GRIFFE: I --

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, ma'am.

11 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: I was going to
12 entertain a motion to adjourn.

13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: If there's no other
14 business the chair will entertain a motion for the
15 adjournment that's just been made?

16 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Support.

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Been properly moved and
18 seconded. Those in favor aye.

19 ALL: Aye.

20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: We stand adjourned.

21 Thank you.
