5 CHAIRMAN BELL: Good afternoon. I am police
6 commissioner Willie Bell. I represent district four. I
7 serve as chair of the board conducting our meeting
8 today. On behalf of the board with those in attendance
9 thank you for joining us. For people viewing this
10 meeting on your government cable channel, thank you for
11 viewing our meeting. Commissioner Willie Burton and
12 Commissioner Darryl Brown have asked to be excused for
13 today's meeting. I want to acknowledge the recent
14 passing of former Detroit city council member Kwame
15 Kenyatta. I ask that we memorialize him with a moment
16 of silence please. Thank you. Our prayers go out to
17 his family as you well know he was a long time African
18 leader, community activist and all that. I think he
19 started on the east side of Detroit, Reverend Holley.
20 Operation get down. And he had a long career and he on
21 the political scene from the school board and Wayne
22 County just a great brother in terms of (inaudible). We
23 lift up his family up in memory and prayers.

24 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Through the chair. May
25 I please add to what you...

1 CHAIRMAN BELL: Sure sure.

2 COMMISSIONER HOLT: And also at the time
3 when he was on the board he was very instrumental in
4 making sure that the Detroit public school only adopted
5 books that did an accurate description of the roles that
6 Africans and African Americans played in world history.
7 Now he got some push back even from some parents but at
8 the time the director of social studies Dahia Ibo
9 Shabaka. Again, they worked very close together and
10 some of the textbooks that are used in the -- well, 2011
11 textbooks again did a very accurate depiction of the
12 contributions of Africans and African Americans in world
13 history.

14 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you for sharing that.
15 And some of us know the history; some of us have lived
16 that experience.

17 COMMISSIONER HOLT: I know.

18 CHAIRMAN BELL: It's important to lift up
19 brothers and sisters who have been part of that
20 struggle. I call on heroes in particular areas you just
21 mentioned. Today we have invited Chaplain Candace
22 Morgan to provide invocation. And you can properly
23 introduce yourself; any other remarks you want to make.

24 CHAPLAIN MORGAN: Good afternoon. Thank you
25 so very much for having me here today. My name is

1 Candace Morgan; I am a chaplain and I just wanted to
2 thank the commissioners as well as the chief for all
3 that you are doing in our community. Let us pray.

4 (Invocation given.)

5 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you. Next item would
6 be commissioners introduce themselves and start to my
7 far right.

8 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Good afternoon, Annie
9 Holt at large.

10 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Good afternoon William
11 Davis, district 7.

12 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Good afternoon, Shirley
13 Burch district 3.

14 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Good afternoon,
15 Elizabeth Brooks at large.

16 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Good afternoon, Lisa
17 Carter district 6.

18 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Jim Holley at large.

19 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Eva Garza
20 Dewaelsche at large.

21 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you, Commissioners.
22 Mr. Hicks.

23 MR. HICKS: Thank you, Mr. Chair. I do want
24 to indicate prior to introductions of our staff that the
25 meeting is being taped by Sergeant Quinn. The audio

1 visual services is provided by Media Services and
2 Caitlyn Hartley is the court reporter. To my immediate
3 right is of course Robert Brown and I would go to the
4 first row and I would ask members of the BOCB to stand
5 and introduce themselves.

6 MR. WYRICK: Jeremiah Wyrick, board
7 attorney.

8 MRS. BLOSSOM: Teresa Blossom, community
9 relations.

10 MRS. JOHNSON: Faye Johnson board
11 accounting.

12 MRS. ANDERSON: Marcella Anderson, director
13 of personnel.

14 MR. HICKS: And then of course we go to the
15 chief investigator for introductions of herself as well
16 as other members of the OIC staff who are here.

17 DR. MCCALISTER: Good afternoon board. Dr.
18 Polly McCalister and attending today's meeting with me
19 is supervising investigator Cromwell. Senior
20 investigator Rivera. Investigator Banks. And
21 investigator Callaway. Thank you.

22 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you. And I'm going to
23 pause for the next round of instruction. I'm going to
24 ask our commissioners from District 2 to introduce
25 herself.

1 COMMISSIONER GRIFFE: Please excuse my
2 tardiness. Hi everyone, Evette Griffe, commissioner
3 from district 2.

4 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you. We going to move
5 to chief James Craig for introduction of DPD.

6 CHIEF CRAIG: Thank you. Starting up front.

7 DEPUTY CHIEF BARREN: Deputy Chief Elvin
8 Barren neighboring policing east.

9 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: Deputy Chief
10 Charles Fitzgerald neighboring policing bureau west.

11 COMMANDER HAYES: Franklin Hayes, commander,
12 third precinct.

13 MR. HA: Grant Ha, legal advisor.

14 COMMANDER BRYANT: Commander Bryant
15 professional (inaudible).

16 CAPTAIN CAVIN: Captain Stacy Cavin, SVU.

17 LIEUTENANT MCGINNIS: Mike McGinnis,
18 homicide.

19 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Marlon Wilson, Deputy
20 Chief, detective bureau.

21 MR. HALL: Jordan Hall, chief neighborhood
22 liaison.

23 CHIEF CRAIG: To the board I have an
24 observation. You know, these men and women lead one of
25 the best police departments in the country and they tend

1 to sit at the back. Is that a police thing? Can one of
2 you help me understand. I'm doing some research on
3 that. Deputy Chief Charles Fitzgerald any thoughts?

4 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: You know, we go in
5 and out and we don't want to disturb too much.

6 CHIEF CRAIG: Good answer.

7 CHAIRMAN BELL: We're not intimidating, they
8 just want (inaudible). I appreciate it. I know one of
9 my favorite deputy chief you always take that first row.
10 I look for that but I understand; we appreciate that. I
11 want to recognize any elected officials or any person
12 that's involved with elected officials. Would you
13 introduce yourself?

14 MR. CORBET: Afternoon. Paul Corbet here on
15 behalf of councilman Roy McCalister's office.

16 MR. SLAUGHTER: Good afternoon, James
17 Slaughter. Staff member for Congresswoman Brenda
18 Lawrence.

19 CHAIRMAN BELL: All is well in D.C., right?

20 **THE WITNESS: We going to pray on that.**

21 CHAIRMAN BELL: Any others? Civic leaders?
22 I don't want to leave anyone out but before I go any --

23 MINISTER BLOUNT: Minister Eric Blount from
24 Sacred Heart Church.

25 CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, sir. Thank you, sir.

1 I'm going to ask the board to approve the agenda for
2 this afternoon meeting.

3 COMMISSIONER GRIFFE: So moved.

4 CHAIRMAN BELL: Those in favor aye.

5 ALL: Aye.

6 CHAIRMAN BELL: Those opposed? The next
7 item will be approval of the minutes for May the 16th,
8 2019.

9 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Support.

10 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: So moved.

11 CHAIRMAN BELL: Been properly moved and
12 supported. Discussion? Those in favor aye.

13 ALL: Aye.

14 CHAIRMAN BELL: Those opposed? Motion
15 carried. Before I want to -- before I move on to the
16 Chairman's report I'm going to ask Commissioner
17 Dewaelsche to share our experience this past Sunday at
18 the Historic Little Rock Baptist Church under the
19 leadership of Commissioner Senior Pastor Jim Holley,
20 reverend doctor I'm sorry. What was unique about that I
21 think he almost ordained Chief James Craig. I'm not
22 sure.

23 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: He did; he gave him a
24 title.

25 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Yeah. It was an

1 extremely wonderful event on Sunday at 10:00. The
2 Reverend Holley and his church recognized law
3 enforcement officials. Chief Craig was recognized along
4 with several of his executive staff and wonderful
5 attendance. Just a wonderful ceremony. Very enjoyable.
6 And, you know, the music, the choir oh my gosh
7 beautiful, beautiful choir. Wonderful sermon and then
8 after there were refreshments and low and behold there's
9 a cake with Chief Craig's face. It was beautiful and
10 then hundreds of cup cakes with his picture on it as
11 well so he was, you know, very, very honored that day
12 and very well deserved and we had a wonderful time and
13 several commissioners were in attendance. I believe
14 Commissioner Bell, Commissioner Carter, Commissioner
15 Davis, Commissioner Brooks, Commissioner Burch,
16 Commissioner Holt. I believe almost all of us were
17 there that could attend. It was a wonderful event and
18 thank you so much. I hope you'll consider doing this
19 regularly. Thank you. We needed -- that was like I'm
20 sure it was a shot in the arm to the department and it
21 was a morale booster I think for the community and the
22 department so thank you, Reverend.

23 CHIEF CRAIG: I'll share my acknowledgements
24 in my time.

25 CHAIRMAN BELL: Okay thank you.

1 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Could we just mention
2 too the most unique plaques Reverend Holley put up that
3 I've never seen. They were just simply awesome of four
4 civil rights leaders. I did take a picture actually, so
5 one day I'll bring it but that was an awesome thing,
6 Dr. Holley. Those leaders to show how the struggle and
7 how they fought for humanity. Thank you, sir.

8 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Do you mind?

9 CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, ma'am.

10 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: The thing you left out
11 is the fact if a female was getting a plaque, it had
12 four great females from the past so much for this
13 country and if the male received the plaque, they had
14 four males who've done great things for this country.
15 I've never seen anything like that it. And I'm just
16 going to mention, I know this might sound trivial but
17 the little bag we got our gift in was great and the
18 program was awesome so Reverend Holley, we thank you.

19 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Thank you.

20 COMMISSIONER HOLT: My last comment the
21 young man that was put in charge to introduce the chief
22 he's going to be a tough act to follow. He was very
23 prepared, showed a sense of humor, very intelligent
24 behaving young man.

25 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: That was his nephew.

1 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Okay, well, now it makes
2 sense.

3 CHIEF CRAIG: I'll tell you. Yeah I'll tell
4 you.

5 CHAIRMAN BELL: Sure. I was wondering about
6 that. He was sitting all the time, you know, give you
7 the opportunity okay. Thank you. We just wanted to
8 share that with you. It was really spiritual type of
9 activity that we was engaged in and I was so pleased for
10 chief and his team and for the commissioner who came out
11 for that type of setting was just great so.

12 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Through the chair one
13 more thing I just wanted to mention that I've gone to
14 many different programs and services and I've never seen
15 a blinged out tie. And Reverend Holley he had on a
16 blinged out tie. He was -- well he's always put
17 together but that was the first thing I had seen a
18 blinged out tie and I just commend you on your attire.
19 Always look so lovely but it was a wonderful program and
20 thank you for having this.

21 CHAIRMAN BELL: When you see Tyrone he
22 probably wearing one. Thank you, Commissioners. The
23 Chairman's report. On behalf of the board I want to
24 express our concern and support for fallen and injured
25 officers. Our concern for officer safety and citizen

1 protection is ranked as two of the most important
2 priorities of the board. Our board receive a weekly
3 report from the department listing injured officers. I
4 want to ask the chief of police during his remark to
5 provide us with any additional information related to
6 injured and fallen officer. The board of police
7 commission meet every week except for Thanksgiving and
8 Christmas holiday. We meet at police headquarters three
9 weeks of the month on Thursday at 3 p.m. We also meet
10 in the community every second Thursday of the month at
11 6:30 p.m. Under the Detroit city charter article 7
12 chapter 8 the board of police commissioners are in power
13 to provide civilian oversight and supervise control of
14 the police department. Our citizens are justified when
15 asking how does civilian oversight of law enforcement
16 help you as a citizen within our community. Our answer
17 is we protect the civil rights of citizen, oversight
18 organization like the BOPC are at the forefront of
19 investigating, reviewing and auditing individual cases
20 of citizen complaints and patterns of operations by
21 police agency to eliminate misconduct, discriminatory
22 police practice, and unnecessary use of force by police.
23 Our work is based on the public in supporting effective
24 policing. Mutual trust and respect between the police
25 and the community is critical toward increasing the

1 quality of life for residents and visitor to Detroit.
2 The board of police commission exists to provide
3 civilian oversight for the work of the Detroit police
4 department. As a board we receive and investigate
5 noncriminal citizen complaint, monitor operations in the
6 department, work with the mayor and chief of police to
7 make and modify police policy. I want to point to
8 several items for your consideration and information.

9 Again, I remind the board we continue to
10 work with NACOLE, National Association of Civilian
11 Oversight of Law Enforcement to host the national
12 conference on September the 22nd through the 26th in
13 Detroit. And Commissioner Brooks going to be giving an
14 update on the NACOLE conference activities of the board.
15 During the same time Detroit will be celebrating our
16 45th year as a civilian oversight organization on July
17 the 22nd, 2019. We inviting law enforcement and other
18 civic-minded individuals and organizations to join us at
19 the conference. The planning process is well under way
20 and again we invite participation.

21 I want to announce that the board of police
22 commission also will be closed on Monday, May the 27th,
23 2019 Memorial Day. I want to point to very important
24 development regarding historian and researcher Ken
25 Coleman. History of Detroit to date. William Ferguson

1 was born in 1893. Ferguson he would become the first
2 African American elected to the the Michigan House of
3 Representative. Ferguson support (inaudible) in the
4 Michigan Capital building. Additionally, according to
5 Ken Coleman on this day in 1864 the first Michigan
6 colored (inaudible) a volunteer group of black men who
7 served on the union side of civil war since 1863
8 officially underwent a name change to 102nd Regiment
9 United States Colored Troops. Today we have one
10 presentation that is from the downtown conservative
11 partnership. Commander Franklin Hayes will be making
12 the presentation. On the DPD chief report I'm
13 requesting update on crime stats and any critical issue
14 facing the police department. Update on the shooting of
15 some of our police personnel in the recent week. On
16 behalf of the board I would hope that the situation has
17 stabilized and their injuries are healing. At the end
18 of the meeting we will have public comments from the
19 audience. Please make sure you print your name on a
20 speaker's card. Cards are located in back on the table
21 or can be obtained by Mr. Brown raising his hand to my
22 far right. He will need your card before beginning
23 public comments. We hold each speaker to allotted two
24 minutes. I ask everyone turn off your cell phone and
25 other electronic devices. This request does not include

1 devices held by DPD personnel. Many of you are aware
2 they on emergency standby. I ask them to put that on
3 vibrate. We going to move on to Chief Craig.

4 CHIEF CRAIG: Good afternoon, Mr. Chair and
5 the board. So I wanted to start out acknowledging
6 Reverend Dr. Holley. I will tell you one of the best
7 appreciation ceremonies that I've been a part of. And I
8 will tell you why it's so important. You know, many
9 times we talk about the wonderful work that our men and
10 women on the ground in uniform do and they should be
11 acknowledged each and every day. They do the
12 unthinkable and so they should be acknowledged but to
13 acknowledge the leaders of this organization that really
14 the glue that holds this department together was very
15 special; so I think I speak on behalf all of them, very
16 touching. The cake was wonderful. And wearing the
17 title of Bishop for that day and you allowed me to sit
18 in the big seat. I've never sat in the big seat, so
19 that was special, so again Reverend Holley I appreciate
20 it. Thank you so much and again, I say it on behalf of
21 the entire DPD executive team.

22 Going to crime stats this last week probably
23 represented our second most violent week and we hope
24 this is not a trend that continues. A couple of
25 observations. Certainly a couple of the shootings

1 involve gang-related activities. Because of our tactic
2 and strategy that we deploy what's called a rapid
3 response, there was a gang on the east side that really
4 started to emerge violently and we were able to shut
5 that down. Other fatal shootings involved narcotics.
6 One narcotics dispute. One of the things that continues
7 to plague us and probably our number one challenge in
8 terms of abating violence is just how do we get in and
9 stop people who are involved in maybe a domestic, spates
10 with friends not to resort use of a firearm. That
11 continues to be a challenge. Certainly alcohol is a
12 factor, other intoxicants, mental illness just to name a
13 few. One such shooting during this one week period
14 involved a mentally ill person. He was arrested; he
15 admitted to his crime and so we are in the process, we
16 have issued a warrant on that one. So it's those kind
17 of violent acts but in time terms of overall crime we're
18 down 10 percent for homicides year-to-date, which is 8
19 fewer than this time last year. 6 assaults we still are
20 up by 41 incidents, 13 percent increase. Aggravated
21 assaults are down 3 percent, 113 fewer. That's the
22 steepest reduction we've seen year to date in assaults.
23 Nonfatal shootings are down by 11, five percent
24 reduction. Robberies are down by 87. Carjackings are
25 down 40. And again, I attribute when we talk about

1 robberies and carjackings I still believe that the Green
2 Light is having a significant impact on reduction of
3 robberies in terms of property the crime is down 153
4 burglaries. Down 461 larcenies. And down 125 motor
5 vehicle thefts with an overall reduction of property
6 crime sitting at 7 percent. So that's also good news.

7 I'm going to give an update on the officer
8 involved shooting of last week. As you know one of our
9 officers sustained a gun shot wound during an
10 investigation. Two additional officers were injured.
11 Officer Rodriguez sustained a gun shot wound; he has
12 been released from the hospital several days ago. He's
13 recovering. Officer Bush who was in the hospital longer
14 than Rodriguez was injured when he was struck by a
15 vehicle that was attempting to get away from our
16 officers. And also Michael Rayis Morales (sic) was also
17 injured. He had the least injury; he was released from
18 the hospital the same night. So still continues to be a
19 growing trend of the violent attacks on police officers.

20 When I initially reported out the incident
21 from that night, some of the facts have changed so I
22 want to clarify that at this point. I indicated during
23 the news briefing what I was told then that the vehicle
24 was traveling at a high rate of speed down a one-way
25 alley; the alley was not a one-way it was a two-way.

1 The vehicle actually pulled into a parking space. The
2 reason for the investigative stop when we looked at body
3 worn cameras you can see the high beams, they went to
4 investigate and it was during that investigation that it
5 began to turn very quickly and escalate. Suspect again
6 tried to injure the officer as he backed up; he did in
7 fact injure one officer who was standing outside of the
8 driver's side door. Suspect exited and as he exited the
9 one thing that we could see he had a hand gun in his
10 right pocket. He began to remove that hand gun and
11 doing so the officers feeling threatened for their life
12 they did fire on the suspect who sustained several
13 gunshot wounds. He was taken to the hospital. He's
14 considered now I believe in stable condition into
15 custody of Wayne County.

16 In terms of the officers, all officers did
17 fire their weapons to mitigate that threat and again
18 only one officer did sustain one gunshot wound and again
19 he was released within days of that shooting incident.
20 And any questions about that at the appropriate time.
21 Last week as you may know I attended police week in
22 Washington D.C. to memorialize three of our fallen
23 officers: Fadi Shukur, Darren Weathers and Glenn Doss.
24 In this coming week I'll be attending major city chiefs.
25 As you know and probably read certainly there's a

1 growing movement about facial recognition. There's been
2 some national -- would you like to get your phone, sir?
3 Did you not advise everybody to turn their phones off?
4 What I was saying is I'll be attending major city
5 chiefs. One of the key conversations will probably be
6 on facial recognition. As you know city of Chicago --
7 not Chicago the city of San Francisco abolished any use
8 of that. We probably have one of the more restrictive
9 policies in its use. There was a Harvard white paper
10 that came out or should be out now, it was very critical
11 and accurately reported how we use facial recognition.
12 They highlighted the city of Detroit and city of
13 Chicago. So it is becoming a growing topic and I think
14 that concludes my report. I'll take any questions that
15 the board might have.

16 CHAIRMAN BELL: Commissioners?

17 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes, to the chair to
18 the chief. I wanted to ask you when you mentioned the
19 gangs on the east side what part of the east are they
20 evolving?

21 CHIEF CRAIG: Through the chair as a matter
22 of practice I don't always like to pay homage to these
23 gangs by naming them. They're the East Side Blood Gang
24 primarily operating out of the 9th precinct but I'll
25 take you back a week when we had the shooting incident

1 in downtown Detroit, those were involving gang members
2 from suburban communities, emphasis on that. One such
3 community Farmington Hills. I think what was that, I
4 think Carson, California. What's the other? Canton and
5 Livonia and so the message was you don't come into
6 Detroit with that violence. We did identify a suspect
7 in that case. And again, using facial recognition
8 appropriately and I think it's important to make note of
9 that, there is an appropriateness of it. And one of the
10 national news stories that came out relative to New
11 York, the article written indicated that New York at
12 times have used sketches and even use celebrity photos
13 to get a match; we never do that. And so that's what
14 they do and so I think it will be a lot of conversation
15 all next week about facial recognition and I will tell
16 you that the technology being leveraged is very helpful.
17 We think about that three-year-old that was shot and
18 killed on the freeway. Again we leveraged our
19 technology to close that case so.

20 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Thank you, Chief. I
21 wasn't specifically speaking about the names of the
22 gangs. I meant the area where they're evolving, on what
23 side of the east, the streets; can we say that or we
24 can't say that?

25 CHIEF CRAIG: Well, it's the east side gang.

1 Yeah, 9th precinct primarily. But again, they're
2 mobile. A lot of times what we see is their retaliation
3 and I really got to give a lot of credit to the work of
4 gang intelligence, of federal partners who very quickly,
5 and I always talk about the speed of execution, where
6 they went out, identified the involved gang, and sent
7 what we call a cease fire message and the promise is if
8 you shoot a gun, we're going to appropriately deal with
9 you. And we have not had any violence associated with
10 that gang. But we're not, you know, relaxing. We're
11 going to continue.

12 The other thing I didn't provide you, and
13 someone may have a question about ATVs, and I want to
14 talk a little bit about that. We're not tolerating it.
15 But we're also not going to endanger the public. We're
16 not going to engage in high speed pursuits; we're not
17 going to chase these young people. We're concerned
18 about their safety and safety of our police officers and
19 our community. But we have deployed a strategy that has
20 preliminarily worked out well. One thing you can never
21 run away from is a helicopter. We're effectively using
22 air support. Again, we're leveraging technology very
23 effectively and when we contain these group of young
24 people, then we're going to seize their ATVs. I didn't
25 realize until we start planning for this but some of

1 those ATVs are low priced out at like four thousand
2 dollars, so it behooves them not to use these off-road
3 vehicles in the street.

4 The other thing we're concerned about you
5 heard or read about the fatal traffic collision. We
6 believe it was associated with illegal street racing.
7 So we're attentive to that as well at the same time
8 we're dealing with ATVs. And then lastly, I know many
9 of you who respond to your constituents, the chief
10 complaint that we always hear is traffic why are people
11 speeding? And I know Commissioner Burch that's a big
12 deal with you; big deal with me and so we have enhanced
13 our enforcement over this holiday weekend. No tolerance
14 for speeders, reckless driving and all the other things,
15 that you might cross Alter Boulevard and you think it's
16 a free-for-all but we will have people waiting for you.

17 COMMISSIONER BURCH: That's wonderful to
18 hear, Chief, and I want to commend Officer Robbins.
19 He's the officer that controls the east side. He's out
20 there. I hear from all the other citizens; they see
21 him, so.

22 CHIEF CRAIG: That's our traffic
23 neighborhood police officer. Doing a wonderful job.

24 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes.

25 CHIEF CRAIG: But we want to make sure the

1 message is clear so as you talk to your constituents if
2 anyone's complaining about traffic whether it's
3 speeding, let us know so we can focus but we do have a
4 key focus on ATVs and illegal street racing.

5 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Thank you so much.

6 CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, sir.

7 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Two questions: One, as
8 relates to facial recognition, I know a number of people
9 raised concerns about it's not as accurate with African
10 Americans and Hispanics; do you know anything about
11 that?

12 CHIEF CRAIG: Through the chair I've heard
13 some of that. The way we use it we've been very
14 effective. One thing we don't ever do we don't make
15 random -- we don't do live video streams and search
16 through. Now I will tell you in the event of a threat.
17 I mean, when I talk a threat I'm not just talking about
18 some small threat, but let's say there's a terror attack
19 being planned that we know about that we may not
20 announce to the public, we may use it in that manner.
21 But we're very sensitive. Just because someone shows up
22 in facial rec is not enough to say we have probable
23 cause to arrest; it's a lead only. It's like all the
24 things we have in our tool box. Now when you take that
25 coupled with maybe a hit on a firearm casing, those

1 things collectively may cause us to believe that this is
2 a suspect who was involved in the crime but we don't do
3 randomness. We don't ever use it for immigration
4 purposes and we don't just sit up and scan people coming
5 in. And I'm glad you raised the question. It was in
6 this Harvard White Paper it made reference to our Green
7 Lights and talked about the Green Light at a medical
8 clinic suggesting that we were using the technology to
9 randomly look at patients. Absolutely untrue. And so I
10 just want to reassure this board and our community that
11 we're very thoughtful on how we deploy it. And it's
12 really used primarily when we have a crime of violence
13 and it has helped us solve crime but it's not the only
14 thing. Just one thing in our tool box.

15 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Okay the next thing,
16 ATVs, are there -- is there any discussion about testing
17 any areas in the city of Detroit that people can utilize
18 the ATVs that wouldn't be a danger to traffic?

19 CHIEF CRAIG: Through the chair, you know,
20 I'm glad you brought that up, Commissioner, because
21 during my conversations with the mayor that was one of
22 the things I brought up. We actually started talking
23 about this last year. I would like for us to have a
24 place. It may not totally abate the problem but
25 certainly, if we put it on the east side, then what

1 about the west sideers because this is a city-wide
2 concern and --

3 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I would think you'd
4 need at least four.

5 CHIEF CRAIG: That might be right. So we're
6 going to continue that conversation. Maybe there's a --
7 someone who can help us with a project such as that
8 because these young people do need a place to take these
9 very expensive off-road vehicles. They just can't do it
10 on the public street. And then to add insult to injury
11 they taunt our officers. They do other things, too, as
12 they're -- because they know if you take an ATV even if
13 we engage in the high speed pursuit, which we're not,
14 there's no way we can maneuver a police vehicle between
15 houses, up on rough terrain, there's no way we could
16 stop them, but they can't outrun air support. And so
17 that's our chief strategy but we have other things.
18 We're also looking at, and if you really want to dig
19 deep into I think Attorney Ha is here, we're also
20 looking at going after organizers of these 'cause what
21 we're finding they're organizing events, say we're going
22 to meet up at X location and they will also say and
23 we're going to taunt the police. So it's a total
24 disregard for public safety and again, it's my position
25 we're not going to tolerate it but we're going to do it

1 the right way.

2 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Do you have any drones
3 in use to get (inaudible).

4 CHIEF CRAIG: Through the chair, we don't
5 have any drones. I know that's amongst some a dirty
6 word. I think drones would be very helpful but we're
7 always to sensitive to constitutional policing,
8 particularly if drones have cameras on them. So right
9 now I think the strategy we have in place will be one
10 that's effective. We don't really want to take
11 anybody's four thousand dollar piece of property but if
12 you violate the law, and it's certainly a public safety
13 concern, we're going to have to take it. And we also,
14 in fact I think it was yesterday or the day before
15 yesterday, we seized four of them.

16 COMMANDER BARREN: And then two more
17 yesterday.

18 CHIEF CRAIG: And two more. And then you
19 heard about the fatal collision, which had nothing to do
20 with our task force but it was a gentleman who I'm told
21 was an experienced rider lost control and... fatal
22 traffic collision.

23 CHAIRMAN BELL: Any other commissioners?
24 Yes.

25 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: I have two questions:

1 One is when is the next cease fire?

2 CHIEF CRAIG: I want to say probably in the
3 next three to four weeks.

4 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: 'Cause --

5 CHIEF CRAIG: I'm not sure the location.

6 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: I get a lot of
7 information out of that that I can pass on to people in
8 the community. And the second question is do we have a
9 recruit graduation tomorrow or is it next Friday?

10 CHIEF CRAIG: Through the chair there is one
11 tomorrow and we are graduating 18 and starting a new
12 class on Monday.

13 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Where is this being?
14 Greater Grace?

15 CHAIRMAN BELL: Greater Grace.

16 CHIEF CRAIG: Greater Grace.

17 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Thank you.

18 CHAIRMAN BELL: Any other commissioners?
19 Thank you, chief.

20 CHIEF CRAIG: Appreciate it.

21 CHAIRMAN BELL: Pleased that you're taking
22 initiative on the ATVs.

23 CHIEF CRAIG: It really doesn't show the
24 city in the proper light.

25 CHAIRMAN BELL: It's not the proper light.

1 CHIEF CRAIG: I will tell you one thing I
2 did leave out, so as we were planning a strategy to deal
3 with it we wanted to know if other cities were
4 experiencing, but they are. What we found Baltimore has
5 a problem. What was the other city Barren?

6 COMMANDER BARREN: Philadelphia.

7 CHIEF CRAIG: Philadelphia has a bigger
8 problem.

9 CHAIRMAN BELL: But not metropolitan Detroit
10 is not having a problem, right? They don't ride
11 anymore.

12 CHIEF CRAIG: Oh I have not heard of --

13 CHAIRMAN BELL: I don't think riding in
14 Grosse Pointe on Mack Avenue.

15 CHIEF CRAIG: I don't think so.

16 CHAIRMAN BELL: I don't think it's no
17 problem but Detroit and I don't sympathize when people
18 invest in that because you can get a scooter, a legal
19 scooter, and you can buy a motorcycle. You know, and to
20 be safe, we all safe, but there's a danger to themselves
21 and if you want to buy it, go up north like people been
22 doing it all the time and 'cause to have four or five
23 sites in city of Detroit, we have issues trying to deal
24 with service in terms of area people trying to stay in
25 their homes. So I'd like to see that type of investment

1 continue like what's happening on Jefferson Chalmers
2 which is a major announcement. What happened with the
3 jobs that is another announcement because I just don't
4 see how we can just say, okay. So they just really,
5 okay, I know you can't chase; I know you can't impact
6 but now we trying to bring it under control.

7 CHIEF CRAIG: Yes, so through the chair. A
8 very important event we had yesterday our second
9 brotherhood event where we had 300 young men, high
10 school age, young men well attended. Very intrigued and
11 about the session. They're very positive. We certainly
12 talked about making good decisions with the jobs coming
13 into Detroit. FCA announced 5,000 jobs and certainly
14 Chrysler has said that they're not going to hire someone
15 who's consuming drugs, particularly marijuana, and so
16 wanted to make sure these young people know 'cause many
17 in that room tomorrow could be age appropriate to apply.
18 I think you can submit application at 17, get hired at
19 18 but Detroit At Work is thinking that we should start
20 taking applications end of June at the earliest. And
21 jobs should be filled toward the last quarter of the
22 year, maybe October, so five -- and that's 900 jobs
23 right there. So this is a great opportunity for the
24 city of Detroit so this is good news where you can get a
25 job making -- starting at 18 dollars an hour. And I

1 think over a period of a couple years going up to 30
2 dollars an hour. So for a young person, and there's
3 some things that Detroit At Work's going to be doing to
4 prepare candidates to be ready to take the test. You
5 know, remind them of what they should not be doing.

6 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Excuse me, Chief, I'm
7 sorry.

8 CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, sir.

9 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Is there anything
10 would be done or can be done or should we be concerned
11 when the marijuana piece goes in effect and will we have
12 statistics on the traffic, the violation based on
13 marijuana and, you know, crime, anything pertaining to
14 the suspect having marijuana? Is anything going to be
15 done in terms of helping us to collect data to see how
16 we can address this in terms of publicity later on based
17 upon this new trend that's going to be set?

18 CHIEF CRAIG: Through the chair, I'm certain
19 that we can but many forget while the state has
20 legalized marijuana, it's still illegal to drive under
21 the influence of an intoxicant, which also includes
22 marijuana. And so there's a lot of ambiguity right now.
23 Even though you might have have a medical marijuana
24 card, that does not give you permission to operate a
25 motor vehicle, you know, under the influence of

1 marijuana. You can't have a CPL, concealed pistol
2 license, and private sector and public sector employees
3 can still restrict you from being an employee if you
4 have marijuana in your system. And Chrysler has made a
5 very clear statement that that's a disqualifier for
6 them.

7 CHAIRMAN BELL: Commissioner Dewaelsche.

8 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Yes, thank you. I
9 just wanted to know is there a special test yet for
10 marijuana use if you stop someone or what testing will
11 be conducted to determine whether they're using?

12 CHIEF CRAIG: Through the chair it's
13 objective symptoms and certainly unsteady gait, watery
14 eyes.

15 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Smell.

16 CHIEF CRAIG: Eat very quickly. No, I'm
17 joking but some objective symptoms that just like under
18 the influence of alcohol. I don't know if one of my
19 colleagues might want to add to it.

20 CHAIRMAN BELL: Commissioner Brooks said
21 smell.

22 CHIEF CRAIG: Yeah, of course the odor
23 emanating from the car gives you reasonable suspicion to
24 investigate. Anybody else that want to help out?

25 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: Chief, like you

1 said based off that and then we take them to the
2 hospital and do a blood draw.

3 CHIEF CRAIG: Right, okay. Thank you.

4 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you, chief and
5 commissioner for raising that issue because it's sort of
6 sad that they make the big job announcement and in the
7 same vain they say, well, marijuana. It takes 45 days
8 to get out of your system. Now they giving you some
9 warning signs, it takes 45 days and they don't really
10 know exact science but each body's different but they
11 let these young people, letting the public -- I mean,
12 whatever it is you want to apply but they do need to be
13 marijuana or drug free and they send them a message
14 already the same announcement they made yesterday they
15 made about don't come up here, you know, with drugs in
16 your system, you're not going to get the job. Now who
17 you going to blame for that?

18 CHIEF CRAIG: Through the chair that was the
19 same message we gave the young men from the brotherhood
20 that's a choice and you'll miss out on opportunity.

21 CHAIRMAN BELL: And we made that choice,
22 right?

23 CHIEF CRAIG: That's right.

24 CHAIRMAN BELL: You know, I think about,
25 come on, ATVs. We had reservation of riding in the

1 street if our parents knew, you know how that go. We
2 were like on edge. You know, but it's a whole different
3 level out there. So I just really -- we are trying to
4 appreciate that program, trying to reach these young
5 people not until the cease fire before they get into it
6 bringing them together so I just really want to commend
7 and people talk about DPD but these are the real program
8 in terms of crime prevention and trying to encourage and
9 when that 11 year old spoke -- you didn't mention that.

10 CHIEF CRAIG: Oh through the chair, the
11 11-year-old his parents are friends with my younger
12 sister so he was able to share some personal stories
13 about me, which I won't repeat here, 'cause my sister --
14 love her -- decided to share the story. I don't need to
15 share? Oh thank you. I'll follow your lead for a
16 change. She said no. But anyway it was probably one of
17 the best (inaudible) he did a phenomenal job.

18 CHAIRMAN BELL: He did an excellent job and
19 he was focused; he had a little sense of humor but he
20 was, you know.

21 CHIEF CRAIG: They say he was very nervous.

22 CHAIRMAN BELL: No indication of that.

23 CHIEF CRAIG: Right, no indication.

24 CHAIRMAN BELL: He was just well mannered
25 and, you know, whatever that is we moving the facts

1 around and then talked. He was focused, got up there,
2 and then he walked on out.

3 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: If I could just
4 make one comment. At the end of his presentation he
5 said if you would like to have more information on Chief
6 Craig, just go online and puts whatever it was. It was
7 so hilarious.

8 CHIEF CRAIG: He was good.

9 CHAIRMAN BELL: Trying to encourage these
10 young -- especially young boys. I know I have daughters
11 and a grandson but I'm concerned about these young boys
12 as you well know we cannot do enough to making sure they
13 still on the right path. There was a time when I came
14 out of high school -- no comment there. Anyway military
15 would take you in you if you potentially got in trouble
16 the court said, okay, you have a choice you end up going
17 to jail or you can join the military. Well, that been
18 off the table quite some time. Right, Deputy? They
19 don't want you that potentially, so if we can save some
20 them; I know majority of kids are doing great but we
21 lose a lot of good kids, to, as you well know. But we
22 can move on. Thank you, again. Commander?

23 COMMANDER HAYES: Good afternoon honorable
24 board. I'm Franklin Hayes, third precinct commander and
25 I'll be presenting to you this afternoon. The

1 partnership between the DDP or Detroit Downtown
2 Partnership and DPD. The DDP's mission is to advance
3 Detroit by driving engagement, development and programs
4 that benefit businesses, residents and visitors
5 throughout downtown's urban core. We strengthen and
6 support downtown Detroit through strategic initiatives
7 and programs that evolve with the changing needs of the
8 community. DDP convenes business, philanthropic and
9 government partners to ensure that efforts in the
10 creation of a vibrant, urban core for Detroit are
11 balanced and all perspectives are considered. There are
12 four pillars in which they seek out this mission:
13 Planning, safety and security, place-making and the
14 business improvement zone. What's unique about this is
15 there's over a hundred partners or members that are
16 involved in this partnership and they're not all just
17 big businesses. They're educational institutions such
18 as Wayne State University. There are houses of worship
19 that are part of this organization as well, such as
20 Second Ebenezer. Those that serve the community for
21 some of the most basic needs such as electricity not
22 only in downtown Detroit but throughout the region. DTE
23 energy is a part of the downtown Detroit partnership as
24 well as businesses. The Dumouchelle Auction House has
25 been a staple in downtown Detroit at the corner of Brush

1 and Jefferson for well over 50 years. Their founder
2 Larry Dumouchelle just passed away in the last month.
3 Small businesses as well are a part of this
4 organization.

5 The footprint is broken down into ten areas.
6 River front central, the renaissance area just to give
7 you a landmark. The river front west, which is the Joe
8 Lewis Arena. East entertainment, which is Greek Town.
9 The entertainment district itself, Ford Field. West
10 entertainment, MGM Casino. Northwestern entertainment
11 motor city casino. Central district, which is
12 Compuware. North central, Masonic Temple. River front,
13 which is east, and the northeast entertainment, which is
14 Brush Park. For the footprint and for the areas that
15 the members of this honorable body serve, the lion's
16 share is in district 6, however, there's a small portion
17 in district 5 so Commissioner Burton and Commissioner
18 Carter, this is your area and the DDP is very active in
19 your footprint.

20 So when we talked about the pillars of the
21 DDP's mission parks and place-making. DDP operates
22 maintains and programs downtown Detroit's parks. There
23 are five right now that are online. Beacon Park, Campus
24 Martius, Cadillac Square, Capitol Park and Grand Circus
25 Park. Providing world class public spaces to help

1 attract businesses and residents. Some of their
2 missions when they talk about programming these parks,
3 not only the landscape but streetscape to make sure that
4 these parks are ADA accessible, as well as the lighting.
5 We know that the footprint of downtown is changing, it's
6 not only businesses but there's a residential component
7 now. So details is the light on? Is it ambulant light?
8 Are they pointed up or are they pointed down into
9 someone's apartment? That it may be in that area, so
10 these are things that the DDP focuses on when they're
11 programming these parks as well as trash.

12 The BIZ. It's four components of what the
13 BIZ does or the Business Improvement Zone. This was
14 created to keep downtown Detroit clean, safe and
15 beautiful. It offers cleaning, safety, hospitality,
16 holiday lighting, and landscaping services for
17 residents, visitors and business owners as well as
18 property owners. The ambassadors are very recognizable
19 as they clean spaces and serve as an information
20 resource. The ambassadors maintain 39 miles of
21 sidewalks and cover the equivalent of 15 football fields
22 for landscaping and preservation of parks and green
23 spaces. Within the station throughout downtown Detroit
24 they serve as concierge, providing assistance with
25 directions, restaurant recommendations, tourist

1 attractions, and even to jump a stalled vehicle. They
2 truly are ambassadors. What's unique about their
3 composition is while they provide these valuable
4 community services, their benefit is that many of them
5 are Detroiters. About 85 percent of Detroit's
6 ambassadors are Detroit residents. Many experiencing
7 barriers to employment. We have some returning citizens
8 that make up that -- those ambassadors, as well as those
9 that are retirees and may not be able to get online or
10 may not be able to do what Chrysler announced those
11 jobs; they may not be able to take those but there are
12 opportunities for those in the community to supplement
13 their income and and be a DDP ambassador. They work
14 collectively well over a thousand hours and assist in
15 thousands of downtown Detroiters and hundreds of tons of
16 traffic. A few weeks ago you met Sergeant (inaudible)
17 who was involved with addressing the homelessness in
18 downtown Detroit from those that have mental needs as
19 well as those that are in tents. When they vacate an
20 area, sometimes they stay in parks or their tents or
21 they've set a tent in a place that it should not be and
22 we have them move. It is often that the BIZ that we
23 call over, our partners with DDP, that will power wash
24 an area, decontaminating. Those that come in and place
25 flyers, posters, they may come in leaflet vehicles and

1 when they come off people throw them on the ground as
2 well as graffiti. These are some of the things that the
3 BIZ doe sto help beautify downtown Detroit and keep it
4 clean.

5 Safety and security. DDP works with the
6 city of Detroit and the community stakeholders to
7 support an environment that provides residents and
8 visitors personal safety. They provide a private and
9 public strategy and implementation to address issues of
10 real and perceived safety for residents, employees,
11 businesses and visitors throughout the downtown area.
12 Based on the reductions in crime that we currently have
13 here in the city of Detroit, they take it very
14 seriously. From some of it being event-based for the
15 people that come down as well as those work there. DDP
16 is committed to informing all that come down to the
17 footprint, those ten areas, that they can do so safely
18 and an opportunity to educate them with things such as
19 leafleting, not leaving valuables out in the open, and
20 other areas where it can help them or minimize the
21 potential for them being a possible victim. We have
22 comp stat. Here at DPSH on the fourth Monday of every
23 month and the next one is July 22nd, it is open to the
24 public. And if your calendars permit we'd love for you
25 to attend. That concludes my presentation of the DDP

1 and --

2 CHAIRMAN BELL: Commissioners? Yes, sir.

3 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Question. Is Wayne
4 Counties Community College district part of the
5 partnership?

6 COMMANDER HAYES: Sir, not to my knowledge
7 through the chair.

8 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Any special reason why?

9 COMMANDER HAYES: Sir, I can't speak to the
10 composition of that. I can link -- I can inform the
11 members of the board -- of the DDP to reach out and it's
12 possible we'll partner.

13 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Okay.

14 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Mr. Chair?

15 CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes.

16 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Just a couple things
17 and I appreciate the report. One is that the Second
18 Ebenezer that's almost 6 Mile, how do they put them in
19 downtown in your downtown report?

20 COMMANDER HAYES: Through the chair there's
21 no barriers for those that want to be part of this
22 partnership. That is the area that they cover at this
23 point, however, wherever if you want to be a partner or
24 if an organization wants to be a part of the DDP, the
25 DDP allows that.

1 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I just know when you
2 say downtown you pass me to get to him. The second
3 thing, and I don't want to be insensitive, I'm a cancer
4 survivor and I lost my wife to cancer but when you have
5 these marathons and I live downtown and I can't even get
6 to church in a respectable -- I mean, it seems like
7 there is no consideration for residents 'cause, and I
8 know it's huge and I know that the police officers are
9 never -- they're never disrespectful or anything like
10 that but for us to get to work or get to church or
11 anything on Sunday it just seems there's some
12 insensitivity for those of us who live in downtown. I
13 just wish you would give some consideration --
14 consideration with that, that's all. And I mean, I've
15 been there for 20 -- a long time and it's hard to get
16 back and forth. Coming back is not a problem, it's just
17 trying to get -- on Sunday, it's just like Sunday is not
18 -- I can understand but I still feel like I need to be
19 -- I'm talking to a lot -- for a lot of people.

20 COMMANDER HAYES: Through the chair
21 certainly I'm first of all very sorry for the loss of
22 wife. I too empathize with you. Cancer, my mother
23 passed away from cancer so glad to see that you're
24 surviving. When we have events or when events are held
25 there's a process in which those that could possibly be

1 impacted are supposed -- there's supposed to be a
2 reach-out and dialogue to happen as an alternative so in
3 case that you're commissioners or whatever the business
4 may be that could possibly be impacted that there's an
5 alternative so that you're not going to be
6 inconvenienced in any way. An example would be the
7 upcoming fire (inaudible) where the DPD has sat down to
8 the businesses and those that are down here with the
9 street closures that may be effected, that there are
10 plans in place to allow those members to come either
11 leave work or possibly come and enjoy the event. The
12 commitment is that going forward anything that impacts
13 not only you but we'll use this as an example to be more
14 mindful and make sure everyone that may be impacted that
15 we talk to and ensure that there's a plan in place so
16 they're not inconvenienced.

17 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Thank you so much.

18 LIEUTENANT BLACKWELL: Good afternoon
19 honorable board. Lieutenant Kimberly Blackwell, special
20 events. Just to speak to that, sir, during rollcall we
21 do emphasize that to the officers to accommodate
22 residents as much as possible and what we try to do is
23 whenever there's a safe passage, we try to allow all
24 residents through because we do not want to
25 inconvenience you. We try to minimize it as much as

1 possible.

2 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: But they always --
3 I've never -- and other people I've never had anybody to
4 talk to me about disrespect or anything, it's just that
5 we just have to wait and wait and wait and wait and
6 wait.

7 LIEUTENANT BLACKWELL: We do apologize.

8 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: One time I need you to
9 bring breakfast one morning.

10 LIEUTENANT BLACKWELL: My apologies but we
11 do try to emphasize and make sure that we do allow you
12 all in as soon as it's safe to do so.

13 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Thank you.

14 CHAIRMAN BELL: And I want to second
15 Commissioner Holley. Several folks have raised that
16 concern of being not able to travel to and from
17 especially traveling to that morning, whatever it is,
18 that we are not sensitive to their concerns. I
19 understand you need to reemphasize that. It is a valid
20 complaint of a lot of folks in trying to get to out
21 whatever and you're just totally restricted like you
22 said. It's a real problem for -- and I guess it's not
23 going to impact you unless you live in that area, you
24 know, but I have heard in terms of that types of
25 feedback. I don't know how we can approach it. It's

1 not on the Freepress marathon day but other activities.

2 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: There's five of them a
3 year. And all of them don't go by the bridge they come
4 by river front. I'm just messing with you.

5 CHAIRMAN BELL: Any other commissioners?

6 Yes, ma'am.

7 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: I forget what I was
8 going to say. Thank you so much. I just want to say
9 that I walk the river walk and there are more and more
10 people out there come spring, you all do a fantastic
11 job. I don't think often people thank you all enough
12 for what you do. I notice there's no loud music,
13 there's no selling anything out there and everybody
14 seems to be obeying the rules and you all come back and
15 forth down the river front also, so thank you very much.

16 COMMANDER HAYES: Through the chair I will
17 certainly convey your notice and appreciation and thanks
18 to the men and women that do that job. Often times in
19 downtown services as well -- I'm sorry the 7th precinct
20 so I will certainly let them know at rollcall tomorrow.

21 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Thank you.

22 CHAIRMAN BELL: Commissioner Burch.

23 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes, thank you,
24 Mr. Chair. This is more so to the chief. Bear with me,
25 Chief. When for instance when we host the graduation

1 for the recruits right, we had in the 3rd district at
2 Second Ebenezer on Saturday at the shooter, okay?
3 Here's my point, so when the officers go through the
4 graduation process you have what you call like Reverend
5 Holley would call it a captured audience. They going to
6 sit there and listen to what the message coming across.
7 I'm just asking you with your executive team perhaps
8 it's an idea that we need to be a little bit more
9 creative while we got those people there, the families.
10 Now wait. Don't go quiet on me. Wait. So when they
11 finish the graduation perhaps we could have refreshments
12 where they could stay and hear maybe just an hour of all
13 that good information that was given out. We need to
14 capture the people that's already there, that they would
15 stay there and receive -- 'cause remember we got young
16 people, kids and everybody. If you think that's a
17 pretty good idea just to -- while the people are there
18 have them to stay, and I would be willing to use the
19 stores I have to help with refreshments. Nothing but
20 like pizza, cupcake and a drink. You see the point,
21 Chief?

22 CHIEF CRAIG: Through the chair I always
23 look for opportunities where we can bond with our
24 community. As you know many of the folks take time off
25 from their jobs on Friday they come in and they got to

1 get back to work. As you also know many of them live
2 outside the city of Detroit and so but I'm always open
3 for a way that we can find ways to deliver the good news
4 so we can talk off line about that. I'm not certain
5 that I'm totally sold.

6 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I have to really speak
7 it to you for you to understand. Thank you.

8 CHIEF CRAIG: You're welcome.

9 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: (Inaudible) cupcakes.

10 CHIEF CRAIG: Still some leftover cupcakes
11 with my face on them.

12 CHAIRMAN BELL: Any other comments? Thank
13 you. Commander, outstanding. We appreciate your work
14 and endeavors and looking forward to ongoing
15 interaction.

16 COMMANDER HAYES: Thank you, sir. Good day.

17 CHAIRMAN BELL: Any standing and committee
18 reports? I know that Commissioner Brooks want to report
19 out.

20 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Thank you. We're all
21 very excited about the conference coming to Detroit. I
22 think all of you heard us talk about it. I just want to
23 give you a few points to kind of bring you up to date.
24 First of all, NACOLE stands for the National Association
25 for Civilian Oversight of Law Enforcement. The 25th

1 annual NACOLE conference will be in Detroit this year.
2 The conference is Sunday through Thursday September the
3 22nd to the 26th at the Ren Cen Marriott. This is the
4 first time the conference will be in Detroit, and the
5 first time in Michigan. Even though we wanted the
6 conference before they never wanted to come until now,
7 so we're very appreciative. This is a big and new
8 opportunity; 500 new visitors and 550 thousand in new
9 tourism. It is a time to help Detroit to shine. As a
10 city Detroit is also celebrating 45 years since the
11 community and police began working together through
12 civilian oversight of the police department in 1974.
13 Please save the date: Tuesday September the 24th, 2019
14 at 5 p.m. for a special Detroit dinner celebrating our
15 45th anniversary of the 1974 chapter for civilian
16 oversight and board of police commissioners. We will
17 have a program with a song or maybe two. There will be
18 a speaker. Some requests have gone out. We're working
19 on confirmation. We will have a commemorative program
20 that features all people who have served on the board.
21 We want it to be a great keepsake. And we will have
22 some awards and acknowledge the role of the labor union,
23 the clergy and the community activists in getting this
24 board started in 1974, and helping sustain the work we
25 do. We thank everyone who is serving as honorary host

1 the mayor, Carl Evan, council president Brenda Jones and
2 other leaders and we thank every citizen, partner who is
3 contributing to support the cost of making the NACOLE
4 conference and 45th celebration successful for the city.
5 We are very grateful to partners who immediately said
6 yes; strong police community relations are very
7 important. Just to name a few Wayne County Community
8 college district, Greek Town, Casino Hotel, the Michigan
9 Department of Civil Rights, AAA of Michigan, Comerica
10 Bank, Rock Security, Michigan Carpenters Union and
11 Commissioner Dewaelsche SER Metro. We are working hard
12 'cause we want our 45th to be great and we want NACOLE
13 to come back. It took 24 years to get them here, and we
14 want them back because they bring great attention and
15 great tourism to our city. This is just a few points
16 about where we are now. If you have any questions,
17 please feel free to ask Teresa Blossom. She can answer
18 your questions. My main thrust is raising money. So if
19 there are any questions, please get those questions to
20 Teresa Blossom.

21 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHÉ: Commissioners can
22 we just have the date of the dinner?

23 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: The date of the dinner
24 is September the 24th at 5 p.m.

25 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHÉ: Thank you.

1 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: That's going to be at
2 the Marriott also.

3 CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, sir.

4 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I can see the hard
5 work that's going into this, Commissioner Brooks, and I
6 appreciate it so much, all the work you guys are doing.
7 I just want to ask you -- I want to make sure that we
8 talk about somewhere between 17 to 27 possibly 20
9 million dollars in terms of that's going to be invested
10 at this time with hotel and so forth. I want to try to
11 see what we can do to drive things to that American
12 businesses. For example, I'd like to see a tour of the
13 African American business has a touring bus through a
14 company. I'd like to put that in the mix. And if we
15 have a tour of the African American museum and motown
16 all around town and I'm asking that; and I'm sure you're
17 going to do it. I want to make sure that I put this --
18 put some emphasis on it and try to make sure they see
19 all. This is just not -- it's just not a one
20 dimensional group. This is very diverse. And I want to
21 try make sure that they get a real taste of Detroit. If
22 I can do anything to help you with that, I'd be happy to
23 but I see the work that you're already doing and I'm so
24 grateful to that but it's a lot of money that's going to
25 be sitting and I want them not to be sitting there at

1 the Marriott; I want thme to spend this money in floods
2 and --

3 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Black businesses.

4 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Black businesses. And
5 the tour. And anything I can do to help you with that I
6 will be happy to do that but I thank you so much for the
7 work you've done and the work you're doing and so I just
8 want to put that my little two cents in it.

9 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Thank you. We already
10 have. Teresa, you want to talk about motown and the
11 Charles H. Wright museum and other places that we're
12 planning on having tours?

13 MRS. BLOSSOM: Good afternoon board, Teresa
14 Blossom, community relations. Thank you Reverend
15 Holley, excuse me, police commissioner Holley for the
16 questions. I do want you to know that we met very early
17 on with the Detroit Metropolitan Visitor and Convention
18 Bureau to ensure that we knew where the black businesses
19 were. We have maps; we have had -- you know, things to
20 pass out to convention participants to ensure that there
21 is money spent with those black businesses not just by
22 the visitors but also by NACOLE as an organization as
23 printing and other services are required. We are very
24 sensitive to that from the get-go and that's a
25 conversation that started in 2017 as we tried to land

1 the conference as well. We are talking with NACOLE as
2 well about other activities that can fit in with people
3 around their visit to Detroit. As the Commissioner
4 pointed out this is the first time that many are coming
5 here in mass to enjoy all that Detroit offers and we
6 want them to have a really great time and enjoy the
7 beautiful September weather. We've been in contact with
8 several of the venues downtown that are easy to get to
9 especially along the People Mover routes, as many people
10 will be flying in, so that they know what's available.
11 The convention bureau has allowed us to use their
12 Twitter feed and various messages every other week or so
13 go out in the Twitter universe to their, you know, their
14 arena. And you had one other question that I meant to
15 address I think I forgot it.

16 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: While you're thinking
17 about that are the convention bureau are they giving you
18 any funds to work with?

19 MRS. BLOSSOM: As part of the NACOLE
20 proposal the convention bureau made a small grant to
21 NACOLE because they wanted to ensure that NACOLE came to
22 Detroit.

23 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: So the question I'm
24 asking we are hosting it. And one of the claims I have
25 always is that they don't really -- let me rephrase

1 this. I'm going to wreck it. What I'm asking you are
2 they giving us anything to help us to host it; not to
3 give money to them are they giving us any money for
4 hosting it?

5 MRS. BLOSSOM: Well, thank you, sir. To
6 clarify we're the host organization because we're a
7 member organization of NACOLE. All the expenses around
8 the NACOLE conference itself are paid for by NACOLE.
9 We're doing some additional work with them to really
10 ensure that their success to make Detroit -- to
11 reiterate that Detroit's a very popular venue and that
12 we can put on a very good hosting opportunity for them,
13 so they will make the decision to come back.
14 Commissioner Brooks pointed out that there's a 550
15 thousand dollar direct spend by the NACOLE attendees.
16 That's part of that tourism money and that's really what
17 we want to bring back to Detroit. It's not a huge
18 conference but it is a very big conference and I think
19 Detroit benefits from having an organization like NACOLE
20 come here every few years.

21 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: You understand what
22 I'm saying?

23 MRS. BLOSSOM: Oh yes, sir. We share that
24 concern and we shared it very early on with the
25 convention bureau because often it's your board staff

1 that brings the diversity to the table.

2 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Thank you so much.

3 Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Thank you, Mrs. Brooks.

4 MRS. BLOSSOM: And may I also say we thank
5 Chief Craig and our own Chairman Bell for the Detroit
6 evolution presentation that will be the first hit that
7 morning on Tuesday September 24th.

8 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: So we do have a
9 commitment from the chief and from the mayor to be on
10 the program?

11 MRS. BLOSSOM: We have the chief's
12 commitment. The mayor is an honorary host and we are
13 trying to get on his calendar both for the opening
14 reception and for the official gavel that Monday the
15 23rd.

16 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Did you mention that we
17 have a member on the board?

18 MRS. BLOSSOM: And of course our own
19 Chairman Bell is a member of the NACOLE board and he
20 always is making sure that they are thinking positively
21 about Detroit and remembering all the wonderful things
22 that we offer here.

23 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Thank you.

24 CHAIRMAN BELL: Go ahead.

25 MRS. BLOSSOM: I'm sorry, I remembered

1 Commissioner Brooks mentioned a tie-in early. We made
2 certain that NACOLE as it reached out to past and
3 possible current attendees for 2019 also promoted the
4 Motown 60. It just so happens that that anniversary
5 abuts the opening weekend of our NACOLE conference and
6 it made some sense for people to come in a little early
7 and start spending money. And having a good time.

8 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Maybe you should also
9 mention the leader of NACOLE is from Detroit and went to
10 Cass on the west side.

11 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: I just want to say I
12 have attended all the NACOLE conference except one and
13 that was because of the death of my husband. They have
14 great conferences. We are going to outshine them.
15 We're going to have the best conference that we can
16 possibly have. I've always enjoyed them; everything's
17 in place but we are going to put Detroit on the map
18 because they never came before and now they want to come
19 like everyone else they want to come to Detroit. So we
20 need all of your help. Thank you very much.

21 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you. Thank you. And
22 I just want to add that that was the goal to making sure
23 that we would take part in the whole process.

24 MRS. RIVERA: Through the chair, excuse me
25 Adela Rivera, former chairperson. I just kind of was

1 sitting there and feeling a little insulted that this is
2 not a black organization. NACOLE certainly has all
3 nationalities that come to the convention and I kind of
4 feel like, you know, we have a lot of other places that
5 the conventioners can spend money, certainly Mexican
6 town should be represented, you know, and I'm sure
7 there's other nationalities. I just feel a little
8 slighted sitting here thinking that you're pushing all
9 black, black, black when it's really a very diverse
10 organization, and we shouldn't lose that.

11 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I appreciate that and
12 I did say diverse; I did use that word and commissioner
13 here, she's here to make sure and remind us that and I
14 do what I can to remind you of what I do.

15 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHÉ: Right.

16 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: And you're right.

17 CHAIRMAN BELL: And Detroit is diverse. We
18 hosted a NACOLE MGM and Commissioner Dewaelsche
19 sponsored that. And we're making sure that Reverend
20 Holley and others get on the host committee 'cause we
21 want to --- unlike other cities I don't feel as though
22 we really venture out, you know, in the evening hours so
23 we going to make sure that they see Detroit within the
24 restriction of the activities that NACOLE sponsored so
25 we want to really -- and Detroiters, you know, from

1 southwest Detroit, whatever that is, we want to make
2 sure that they aware of the activities there. You
3 correct; it's diverse population of people who actually
4 take part in NACOLE and that's why I'm sitting on that
5 board just to make sure that Detroit get the proper
6 frame work of hosting. They can do the heart but we
7 want to make sure that they enjoy the city.

8 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Thank you, Adela.
9 We will make sure.

10 CHAIRMAN BELL: Let's move on to Mr. Hicks.

11 MR. HICKS: Thank you, Mr. Chair. Want to
12 draw your attention to the portion on the agenda that is
13 entitled report from the board secretary and typically
14 with this section of the agenda does is to allow me an
15 opportunity to report incoming and outgoing
16 communications of the board. I do want to point to four
17 for the purposes of this meeting. One, you've already
18 talked rather extensively about and that is the
19 communications that was prepared by Teresa Blossom and
20 it was an update, which had been delivered not only to
21 the -- to Commissioners Brook but I believe balance of
22 the board that gave you a summation of what was going on
23 relative to the -- let me back up a little bit. Lost my
24 place there. The item that was prepared by Mrs. Blossom
25 was a collection of e-mails that we had received in the

1 office relative to the issue of facial recognition and
2 the police surveillance issue. So in the last meeting,
3 last several meeting, Commissioner Bell did push rather
4 heavily that we advertise that we have an upcoming
5 conversation that is centered around the directive that
6 was sent to us by the chief roughly about a month ago.
7 And as we review that we're going to be inviting
8 community people in to give comments. Commissioner Bell
9 at the same time has been pushing that as we go through
10 that comment period that we have placed -- a copy of the
11 directive on the police website -- on our website and
12 that we're beginning to receive information and I think
13 we had upward of maybe 10 to 15 communications some of
14 them supporting the initiative, others not, some of them
15 asking for new information. I would say by the volume
16 of responses on this particular subject it far exceeds
17 any responses that we've gotten thus far on any of the
18 things that we've posted in connection with the website
19 and encourage members of the community to review them.
20 So I wanted to point that out.

21 Secondly, and that ties into item number two
22 as well and I think we have in your packets the actual
23 copies of some of the -- of all of the responses that I
24 think we've received, 'cause it will be incumbent on
25 this board at the point when you are reviewing the

1 recommendation that was put forth, the directive that
2 was put forth by the chief that you take under
3 consideration some of the concerns that came from
4 members of our community both positive and negative.

5 Thirdly, the chief has recommended a
6 promotion for Kari Sloan. That was also distributed to
7 the board and my expectation is that we'll do the same
8 type of review that we did for Captain Russell and we'll
9 have something at the next board meeting for you to act
10 on in that connection.

11 And then the last communications really ties
12 back into the discussion that you've had on the the
13 NACOLE convention and that was former commissioner Cohen
14 who has sent the communication in and was rather
15 enthusiastic about attending and participating in the
16 45th anniversary and I would say that really based on a
17 lot of the work that was done by Robert Brown is that
18 we've communicated with we believe all of the former
19 commissioners or their families if they have -- if
20 they're not with us any longer or have moved to another
21 area and they have began to express really on mass their
22 appreciation first of all for the recognition and
23 secondly, it appears that a great number of them will be
24 in attendance at the 45th anniversary.

25 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you. Any other

1 comments?

2 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Mr. Chair. This is
3 old business; I'll wait for that.

4 CHAIRMAN BELL: Okay, well, Mr. Hicks has
5 finished. We can move on to old business.

6 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I'm really -- I've
7 been asking Mr. Secretary through the Chairman for the
8 team mental health wellness to come in and make a
9 presentation. I really wanted to make sure that the
10 chief would be here during the time, if he could be
11 according to his schedule, on his schedule, so we can
12 see how this can be collaborated the mental health with
13 the police department. And I visit them and sit and
14 talk to them and I think they have a lot they can offer
15 to help us with our mental health situation. So I just
16 want to know if I could ask...

17 CHAIRMAN BELL: You're requesting -- we had
18 the mental health forum and you want an update in terms
19 of how we interact with DPD? We had --

20 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: What I'm asking for is
21 a team, it's called Team Wellness on Mack --

22 CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, that was the forum.

23 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: We had it already?

24 CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, sir.

25 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I didn't make it.

1 CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes.

2 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Outside?

3 CHAIRMAN BELL: No, no, no.

4 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Was it here?

5 MR. HICKS: It was in our community meeting.

6 COMMISSIONER BURCH: It was the wellness
7 center.

8 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Maybe I should have
9 been --

10 COMMISSIONER BURCH: -- every --

11 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: -- instead of the
12 chief.

13 CHAIRMAN BELL: Yeah, but we can --

14 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: If you're okay with
15 it, if the chief -- that's fine. I'm happy.

16 CHAIRMAN BELL: Assistant Chief White was on
17 the panel and well --

18 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: It was very good.

19 CHAIRMAN BELL: It was well attended. Good
20 interaction.

21 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Thank you.

22 CHAIRMAN BELL: Is there any way that we can
23 recap that and circulate to the commissioners in terms
24 of what took place at that forum?

25 MR. HICKS: Yes. We can do a couple things.

1 One is we can recirculate the minutes. Secondly, I can
2 pull the actual date and send a copy of the video to you
3 as well. And I think there may have been some
4 information that the Team Wellness actually left at the
5 meeting and I'll send you a copy of that for you.

6 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Thank you,
7 Mr. Chairman.

8 COMMISSIONER BURCH: That was April 11th and
9 Mrs. Barbara Lynch she's the manager there at the
10 Wellness Center. If you need me to give her number, I
11 can give that to you.

12 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you. Under old
13 business I just want to share with the commissioners and
14 more or less with the public and also the viewing public
15 there's been a great deal of concern in reference to
16 perception of the board or commissioners in term also of
17 our meeting how we flow and last week we had a detailed
18 discussion on that issue. We are well aware of how that
19 is presented out and even from our viewing audience gave
20 us feedback and I think one of our regular members
21 mentioned that last week and others have to. We're not
22 going to duck that particular issue and I think the
23 majority of the commissioners are committed to
24 conducting our meeting orally in a business-like
25 fashion, courteous fashion and understand the rules of

1 order how you should conduct yourself and the
2 Chairmanship flow in terms of the will of the body; the
3 body of commissioners is not going to tolerate certain
4 behavior of a commissioner. That's going to end. And
5 we have had that detailed discussion with other entities
6 too. If the commissioner's out of order and we go out
7 of order, out of order; if the board is supportive, that
8 chair would ask that commissioner to leave or be
9 escorted out of this meeting. That is in the frame work
10 of any organization. We have consulted with others who
11 conduct themselves in a certain manner. We are not
12 going to tolerate that because it reflect all of us. It
13 reflect. And we are committed -- you can have
14 disagreement but you must respect the process. And we
15 are agreeable to doing that and we cannot allow this to
16 be operating in that manner and continue on. We would
17 have more strong words but all the commissioners been
18 served notice to that effect. Don't be alarmed but we
19 not going to have any political priors up here or any of
20 that; that is inappropriate. This board been around for
21 45 years in July and we are committed regardless how you
22 got here elected or appointed, you are serving the
23 community. This is a volunteer organization. And we
24 not going to tolerate, so therefore we are going to we
25 are -- addressing that. We have heard you loud and

1 clear. I reassure you that those steps are being taken
2 now that each commissioner will understand our bylaws
3 and our city charter mandate and how we should conduct
4 ourselves. Unfortunate we haven't had any issues in the
5 last three or four years and you know exactly what I'm
6 speaking of. So let's be honest if you can help any
7 individuals in terms how to conduct themselves, then
8 let's do that. We have tried to counsel individuals how
9 to act and behave. You make your point but the chair
10 must moderate the meeting. That is standard procedure
11 on how we respect the process. The chair change every
12 year July the 1st. In that time frame you will have
13 another chair but you must respect the process and
14 that's something that we can we cannot tolerate, so
15 don't be alarmed if the commissioner's out of order this
16 body so ruled that person will be removed from this
17 particular meeting. I just want to make sure that the
18 public understands 'cause we have gotten feedback and we
19 are not going to tolerate that and thank you for your
20 support. Any suggestion you might have we respect you
21 in terms of ability to interact in the podium but as we
22 well know there's a protocol of how we try to conduct
23 ourselves. You can always interact with these
24 commissioners before and after the meeting and you have
25 opportunity; DPD staff is always here. Not just

1 assistant chief, deputy chief they stay for the entire
2 course of the meeting and you have opportunity to speak
3 and interact with them; same thing with our office of
4 chief of staff. Same thing with our staff and board; we
5 here; we meet too often. We meet weekly. And you know
6 the schedule and I appreciate those who continue to come
7 out but sometimes it's embarrassing and we don't want to
8 continue that line of image. As you well know we got a
9 commission in the city of Detroit that's trying to cope
10 with some serious issues but we not going to fall into
11 that particular -- it's a spirit of Detroit what we
12 should be about.

13 Let's move on to any new business? Our next
14 meeting will be on May the 30th, 2019 at 3 p.m., Public
15 safety headquarters. Our next community meeting is
16 going to be on Thursday, June the 13th 2019, second
17 precinct, St. John Lutheran Church, 4950 Oakman
18 Boulevard. Now we going to move on to oral
19 communication from the public. And Mr. Brown.

20 MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair, I have seven cards.
21 Your first speaker will be Mrs. Faith followed by
22 Mrs. Bernice Smith followed by Mr. Eric Blount.

23 CHAIRMAN BELL: If you are speaking could
24 you move up to the front to my left, please?

25 MR. BROWN: Mrs. Faith.

1 MRS. FAITH: To this board, to this
2 honorable board good afternoon. For the record my name
3 is Mrs. Faith. And you all are always appreciated in
4 everything I've seen you done throughout the years. And
5 I want to honor the chief just like everybody else has.
6 And we all received an honorable person when they look
7 at you, Chief and I hear nothing from the constituents
8 about the same thing and whether it's Wayne State or
9 whether it's on the west anywhere I am that people
10 mention you it's always honorable and well warranted
11 'cause you're an honorable person. I appreciate it.
12 And one word of excellence, award given to Commissioner
13 Griffie, I say moment of excellence keep it up. I
14 appreciate -- you're well appreciated. And Commissioner
15 Dewaelsche --

16 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: You got nothing for
17 me?

18 MRS. FAITH: Commissioner Holley, you're
19 very honorable. I really appreciate you very much,
20 Commissioner Holley. And Commissioner Dewaelsche and
21 commissioner -- I want to say one thing about
22 Commissioner Carter. She always has this calmness about
23 her all the time. If there is something that comes up
24 as, you know, is always was that the wind that hit my
25 face or did someone leave the fan on. She's always so

1 peaceful and so calm. And I do appreciate that about
2 you Commissioner Carter. And Commissioner Bell, you're
3 always in charge and level-headed all the time.
4 Commissioner Brooks, I can't do it individually 'cause I
5 don't have enough time but one of these times I'm going
6 to do the very same thing that Commissioner Holley did.
7 You all pray for me that God will help me to be able to
8 do it because you're all very honorable persons.
9 Commissioner -- excuse me, his name escapes me right
10 now, but he used to be on the board. Very tall
11 gentleman -- Crawford, Commissioner Crawford; there are
12 no throw-away people. I am with him 100 percent on
13 that. There are no throw-away people on the board and
14 the world at large, including myself. But I will get me
15 out of the way but -- okay, thank you all very much.

16 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you.

17 MR. BROWN: Mrs. Smith followed by
18 Mr. Blount.

19 MRS. SMITH: Good afternoon. Bernice Smith,
20 board chair of mid development downtown. Welcome,
21 Chief. You get my booklet, yes? Okay. I don't know
22 why you was looking at me while you were doing your
23 little speech just now but I didn't come here to fuss
24 today. I want to let you know Sergeant Hewitt did a
25 wonderful job for me. When I came in, complained about

1 the man doing the cars on the boulevard and the drug --
2 well, I won't say anymore. But anyway I'm very proud of
3 my police department. Franklin, you did a good job in
4 the 3rd, which I am in the 3rd, and the fact that we do
5 have a good police force and I'm not just saying that.
6 The chief is just like my son 'cause he and my son are
7 the same age so I can tell him what I want to tell him
8 but in the meant time I just want you to know keep up
9 the good work and stop doing what you're doing, and you
10 know what I mean. Get along with each other and you're
11 going to be all right in my eyesight. Reverend, you
12 start praying for the board, all right? And we going to
13 do a good job. That's all I have to say today. And I
14 love you all.

15 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: We love you, too.

16 MR. BROWN: Mr. Blount followed by Diane
17 Wilcoxa.

18 UNKNOWN PERSON: I think Mr. Blount left.

19 MR. BROWN: Mrs. Wilcoxa followed by
20 Mrs. Michelle George.

21 MRS. WILCOXA: Good afternoon, honorable
22 board. I want to say to Commissioner Brooks and to the
23 department relative to recruiting Detroiters that the
24 city of Detroit is very proud of you for that
25 undertaking. The basis for recruiting your own and for

1 promoting your own is deeply rooted in our constitution.
2 It is under the home rule clause of the Michigan
3 constitution, which gives people the right to act in a
4 particular manner based on a geographic area. So there
5 is definitely an authoritative basis for recruiting
6 one's own. I'd also like to thank this board and
7 specifically Commissioner Holley, Commissioner Brown,
8 who isn't here, and Commissioner Davis for comments that
9 will be incorporated in a commemorative edition of the
10 Renaissance Observer which will commemorate the life and
11 the death of Judge Damon Keith, who is honorable -- was
12 honorable in his own right. Never met a stranger, never
13 met a big person or a small person but was extremely
14 intelligent, articulate and represented the city of
15 Detroit exceptionally well.

16 Also relative to the proposed four ATV
17 designated areas I am definitely in support of
18 designated areas for ATVs. Our children are crying out
19 for recreational outlets. We've closed up most of the
20 recreation centers in the city of Detroit and we have
21 made it virtually impossible for our children to play in
22 their own neighborhoods so it is incumbent upon us as
23 leaders to find areas that are suited for our children
24 to be just that, children. They are only asking for the
25 same rights and privileges that we ourselves had and we

1 owe them that. We take our resources and we know that
2 all resources are finite and we take them and place them
3 where we think we are looking at priorities. We have an
4 abundance of police officers in downtown Detroit; we
5 have an abundance of police officers in mid town and
6 it's now time to take our monies and make certain that
7 our children are safe.

8 MR. BROWN: Mrs. Michelle George followed by
9 Mrs. Karen Gordon.

10 MRS. GEORGE: Good evening to Chairman Bell
11 and to this honorable board as well and Chief Craig, I
12 want to thank you for Deputy Chief Bettison, the
13 officers at the charter commission. I told them to tell
14 you to thank you so much and also the gang squad that
15 solved the crime for those on the east side. I wanted
16 to -- and Commander Hayes awesome presentation, going to
17 try to partner because we have to get in these
18 neighborhoods and I'm going to be reaching out to the
19 Mayor Duggan; I saw him on Monday. The situation we
20 have to get in the neighborhoods; we finding
21 dispensaries. I was telling Commissioner Carter. And
22 we at the zoning board and we want the them to have good
23 jobs for Chrysler but these dispensaries they circumvent
24 that wealthier neighborhoods that come in the area. But
25 Commissioner -- I mean to Chief Craig, I have a letter

1 from one of my church members who's here; she didn't
2 want to be on TV but to Chief Craig and the
3 commissioners, on March 31st I became a victim of credit
4 card fraud. A young lady who I was helping with
5 educational matters went into my purse, stole money,
6 took pictures of my credit card and went on a shopping
7 spree. Not only was my credit card compromised but my
8 daughter's credit card, which was in another room, was
9 effected in this manner as well. The young lady
10 attempted to charge over two thousand dollars for
11 clothing items and was successful with obtaining
12 merchandise of more than 500 dollars. My daughter and I
13 filed a police report with the 8th precinct. After
14 filing a police report I waited a few days -- excuse me
15 -- to see if the report was ready. I telephoned the
16 fourth police precinct and disturbed to hear the
17 following from someone who works in the police
18 department: The gentleman answered the phone and
19 questioned me when I informed him that I wanted to get
20 to the bottom of this case to find out who truly
21 committed the crime. He told me that I was wasting my
22 time. He asked if Sears reversed the charges and I said
23 yes; he then told me that since I got my charges
24 reversed, I was made whole and that that should be the
25 end of it. And no one is going to do anything. I

1 proceeded to tell him that there are others out there
2 who may become victim to the same person. My daughter
3 and I we were assigned to investigators who both stated
4 that nothing can be done on their end. My question to
5 both was why were we assigned an investigator if nothing
6 can be done?

7 Finally, after conducting my own
8 investigation and presented to the young lady she
9 admitted that she committed the crime. What disturbs me
10 is that she has no record related to the crime that she
11 committed. I would like to know why -- what can I do as
12 a citizen of Detroit to be certain that her name is not
13 connected to any criminal act? Thank you Mrs. Martin
14 and she is here. And I told her to see you Chief Craig
15 and this board.

16 CHIEF CRAIG: Through the chair Deputy Chief
17 Wilson's in the back so if that person would join your
18 friend outside. Thank you.

19 MRS. GEORGE: Yes, sir. Thank you.

20 MR. BROWN: Mrs. Gordon followed by Scott
21 Bowman.

22 MRS. GORDON: Hi, my name is Karen Gordon
23 and I'm back. I'm talking about Earnest Macey (sic),
24 he's a detective of 7th precinct. He did his
25 investigation; he had a video that he checked out and I

1 have a form that showed that he checked it out and he
2 knew the police officer that day was telling a lie but
3 he did nothing. He went along with their lie, okay. I
4 was locked up. I don't know if this a male or a female
5 Tony Clark wrote in the detention center that he saw me
6 or she saw me. I was never seen by this person, which
7 on the paper you know they didn't see me 'cause they
8 said I had black hair -- I mean, gray hair and my hair
9 was black at that time. They said I had long hair, even
10 in the definition of a man looking at a female my hair
11 was short. He said I was medium complexion; I have
12 never been called medium complexion. He said I had no
13 facial marks; I have facial marks. He said he asked me
14 to sign this and that he read this constitutional rights
15 notification to me. I never seen this; I was never read
16 this. And I was never talked to and how you can see
17 he's lying too the person that signed it along with him
18 is state he seen me at 12:02 he said. He ended our
19 conversation at 12:02. If you showed me anything like
20 this and read it to me or asked me to read it, you
21 walked in and you walked out, 'cause in less than a
22 minute you couldn't have presented this; and if you look
23 up his record you'll see he never or she never talked to
24 me or came to see me. Once again here go another lying
25 police officer and if they lie about this -- I know

1 that's not the first time -- who else have they lied on?
2 I just happen to feel I was injustice in pulling up
3 proof to show that I have been unjustly, unfairly
4 accused of stuff I didn't do.

5 CHIEF CRAIG: Through the chair, I know that
6 part of this meeting Sergeant Hewitt, I don't know if
7 this is new information but I would ask that -- you have
8 the information? All right, thank you.

9 CHAIRMAN BELL: Thank you, Chief.

10 MR. BROWN: Mr. Bowman.

11 MR. BOWMAN: Hello. First of all, much has
12 been made and there is a bit of a news report I was
13 actually at a rally about this issue about the
14 unfortunate death of multiple women and I know one
15 person had been arrested in connection with one of those
16 deaths over I think it was at Park Place Towers and I
17 congratulate the department on getting that person. But
18 what I want to urge people to do who are concerned about
19 these crimes and others to join a radio patrol because
20 we have a small number of officers out there and we need
21 to have more people, more eyes and ears out there. So I
22 encourage people to you join a radio patrol and act as
23 eyes and ears and also to remember the number
24 1-800-SPEAKUP. You can call that number, Crime Stoppers
25 and report information and not worry about being

1 identified because they have a system set up so they
2 can't even figure out who you are even if they tried,
3 which they don't. So I just want to put that out there.

4 Next I also wanted to thank Commissioner
5 Bell for acknowledging that, you know, that he's been
6 out of order and that, and I understand, yeah, he
7 mentioned embarrassing and it is embarrassing that we
8 have commissioners voting against transparency and that
9 -- and failing to recognize new business on May 9th;
10 failing to have that in the meeting; failing to
11 recognize a commissioner on May 16th and I'm glad that
12 we have a chair who's willing to have themselves removed
13 if he is out of order.

14 Finally, I have a question for Commissioner
15 Dewaelsche. And I want to know when does your term
16 begin, end, and who did you replace?

17 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Do I have the
18 floor? May I respond?

19 CHAIRMAN BELL: Yes, ma'am.

20 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: My term began
21 February 2015 and it ends February 2020.

22 MR. BOWMAN: Thank you. Who did you
23 replace?

24 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Who did I replace,
25 Commissioner Bell?

1 CHAIRMAN BELL: I have no knowledge of
2 how...

3 MR. BOWMAN: Thank you.

4 MR. BROWN: Mr. Chair, that was your last
5 speaker.

6 CHAIRMAN BELL: If there's no other business
7 before this body before I ask for adjournment, I want to
8 wish you a safe Memorial Day weekend. Drive safe. And
9 live safely in your neighborhood and we hope to see you
10 next week. Motion for adjournment.

11 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: So moved.

12 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Support.

13 CHAIRMAN BELL: Properly moved and
14 supported. Discussion? Those in favor aye.

15 ALL: Aye.

16 CHAIRMAN BELL: Those opposed? Motion
17 carried. Thank you.
