4 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Good afternoon. I am  
5 Police Commissioner, Lisa Carter. I represent District  
6 6. I serve as the Chair of the Board and will be  
7 conducting our meeting this afternoon. On behalf of the  
8 board for those in attendance, thank you for joining us.  
9 For those viewing this meeting on your government cable  
10 channel, thank you for viewing our meeting.

11 Commissioners Eva Dewaelsche, Shirley Burch  
12 and Willie Burton have been Excused from today's  
13 meeting. Today we have invited Chaplain Tia Davis to  
14 provide invocation. Is Chaplain Tia Davis here? No.  
15 So I'm going to ask Reverend Holley if you'd please do  
16 the invocation.

17 (Invocation given)

18 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, Commissioner  
19 Holley. At this time, we're going to start with  
20 introductions to my far right with Commissioner Holt.

21 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Thank you, Chairperson.  
22 Annie Holt, member At-Large.

23 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: William Davis, District  
24 7.

25 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Good afternoon.

1 Elizabeth Brooks At-Large.

2 COMMISSIONER BELL: Willie Bell District 4.

3 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Jim Holley At-Large.

4 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Darryl Brown, District  
5 1.

6 MR. HICKS: Madam Chair, you have a quorum.

7 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, Mr. Hicks.

8 We have a few business items for your consideration,  
9 Commissioners. First is the approval of the agenda, and  
10 the second is approval of the minutes for July 18, 2019.  
11 At this time, I'll ask for a motion to approve the  
12 agenda.

13 COMMISSIONER: So moved.

14 COMMISSIONER: Support.

15 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and  
16 supported that we approve the agenda for today, July  
17 25th, 2019. Is there any discussion? Those in favor?

18 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

19 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Opposed? Motion  
20 carries. At this time, Commissioners, you have before  
21 you the minutes from July 18, 2019.

22 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: So moved.

23 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Support.

24 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: So moved and supported  
25 that we adopt the minutes form July 18, 2019. Is there

1 any discussion? Those in favor?

2 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

3 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed? Motion  
4 carries. At this time, Mr. Hicks, would you please  
5 introduce the BOPC staff.

6 MR. HICKS: Thank you, Madam Chair. Just  
7 prior to making those introductions, I do want to  
8 indicate that the meeting today is being taped by  
9 Sergeant Quinn, Media Services is providing the  
10 audiovisual work, and Mindy Womack is the court reporter  
11 today. And immediately to my right, of course, is Board  
12 attorney, Jermaine Wyrick. And then, of course, if I  
13 can ask for in addition to Robert Brown ask for the  
14 other staff that on the BOPC and the OCI to stand and  
15 introduce yourselves.

16 MS. JOHNSON: Faye Johnson, Board  
17 accountant.

18 MS. BLOSSOM: Theresa Blossom, Human  
19 Relations.

20 MR. HICKS: Then we go to, of course, Chief  
21 Investigator, Polly McCalister. Polly McCalister will  
22 introduce herself and the balance of the OCI present.

23 DR. MCCALISTER: Good afternoon, Board. I'm  
24 Dr. McCalister, and attending today is meeting with me  
25 today is Supervising Investigator Akbar, Senior

1 Investigator Moses, not here yet. Investigator Nichols,  
2 investigator Coulter, Investigator Neely, and  
3 Investigator Callaway. Thank you.

4 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, for that.  
5 At this time, I'd like to introduce Assistant Chief  
6 David LeValley. Good afternoon, sir.

7 A.C. LeVALLEY: Good afternoon. Good  
8 afternoon to the Board. Assistant Chief David LeValley  
9 Office of Neighborhood Policing. Sitting in for Chief  
10 Craig currently. Additionally with me today are some  
11 Detroit police staff.

12 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. If there  
13 are any elected officials, VIPs, or civic leaders, or  
14 representatives in the audience, please stand and give  
15 your name for the record, please. Hearing none, I will  
16 go on to my report. Before I start my Chairperson's  
17 report, I want to call your attention to the change in  
18 our -- to a change in our procedure. Typically, we  
19 create an opportunity for the public to address the  
20 Board under public comments at the end of the meeting.  
21 The practice is consistent with the Open Meetings Act.  
22 Today I am introducing two changes to our practice. One  
23 is the board will be voting on an important policy  
24 recommendation. I will allow a special public comment  
25 period before the vote restricted to the policy under

1 consideration.

2 Two, the normal public comments at the end  
3 of the meeting will remain as parts of our standard  
4 agenda; however, if you would like to speak in public  
5 comments at the end of the meeting, you will have to  
6 provide your card to Mr. Brown no later than the end of  
7 the Chief's report.

8 I also want to make a clarification. The  
9 Detroit Board of Police Commissioners do not require for  
10 people attending our meetings to show identification or  
11 identify themselves as a condition to participate in our  
12 meetings; however, the Public Safety Headquarters  
13 Building does require identification. The Board does  
14 not operate the building. The enhanced security of the  
15 public facilities go back to the provision under the  
16 Patriot Act and are implemented in all federal, state,  
17 and local government buildings.

18 At our community meetings, which are  
19 normally held in nongovernmental settings like churches  
20 and community centers, we do not have security checks  
21 unless it's required by the host facility. With these  
22 updates, I will continue with my normal Chairperson's  
23 report.

24 On behalf of the Board, I want to express  
25 our concerns and support for our fallen and injured

1 officers. Our concern for officer safety and citizen  
2 protection is ranked as two of the most important  
3 priorities of the Board. Our Board receives a weekly  
4 report from the Department listing the injured officers.  
5 I would ask that the Assistant Chief please during your  
6 remarks provide us with any additional information  
7 related to injured and fallen officers.

8 The Board of Police Commissioners meet every  
9 week except for Thanksgiving and Christmas Holiday  
10 period. We meet in the Public Safety Headquarters three  
11 weeks in the month, three weeks in the month on Thursday  
12 at 3 p.m. We also meet in the community every second  
13 Thursday of the month at 6:30 p.m. Under the Detroit  
14 City Charter, Article 7 Chapter 8, the Board of Police  
15 Commissioners is empowered to provide civilian oversight  
16 and supervisory control of the Police Department.

17 Our citizens are justified in asking how the  
18 civilian oversight of law enforcement helps you as a  
19 citizen within our community. Our answer is we protect  
20 the civil rights of our citizens. Oversight  
21 organizations like the BOPC are at the forefront of  
22 investigating, reviewing and auditing individual cases  
23 of citizen complaints and patterns of operation by  
24 police agencies to eliminate misconduct, discriminatory  
25 police practices and unnecessary use of force by the



1 police.

2 Our work is based on developing and  
3 supporting effective policing. Mutual trust and respect  
4 between the police and the community is critical toward  
5 increasing the quality of our life of our residents and  
6 for visitors to Detroit.

7 The Board of Police Commissioners exists to  
8 provide civilian oversight for the work of the Detroit  
9 Police Department. As a board, we receive and  
10 investigate noncriminal citizens complaints, monitor the  
11 operations of the Department and work with the mayor and  
12 chief to make or modify police policy.

13 I want to point out several items for your  
14 consideration and information, the Board of Police  
15 Commissioners has not received a modified version of the  
16 Chief's proposed directive on facial recognition. When  
17 this matter arrives, we will post it on our website and  
18 review the proposed directive. We will also notify the  
19 public of our intent to vote on it as it will be added  
20 to the action items on our agenda. The proposed agenda  
21 is released on Tuesday of each week allowing for 48  
22 hours notice of our intent to take up this important  
23 directive.

24 Again, I want to remind the Board we are  
25 continuing our work with NACO, National Association for

1 Civilian Oversight of Law Enforcement, to host the  
2 National Conference on September 22nd through 26th, 2019  
3 in Detroit. During this time, Detroit will be  
4 celebrating our 45th year as Civilian Oversight  
5 organization. We are inviting law enforcement and other  
6 civic-minded individuals and organizations to join us at  
7 the conference. The planning process is well underway,  
8 and again, we invite your participation.

9           The Board received a request from the Chief  
10 of Police to suspend without pay Police Officer Naine  
11 Brown. Information on this suspension has been shared  
12 with the full Board. Mr. Wyrick is reviewing the  
13 request. The BOPC has notified the Detroit Police  
14 Officers Association and we are suggesting a hearing on  
15 this matter next week, August 1st, 2019.

16           The next graduation from the Police Academy  
17 for class of 2019-D will be Friday August 2nd, 2019 at  
18 10:30 p.m. -- a.m. at the Second Ebenezer Church. I  
19 encourage the Board to attend and show your support to  
20 new officers and their families who will soon be joining  
21 the police force.

22           Additionally, I want to remind the Board of  
23 the retirement celebration for Deputy Chief of Police  
24 Elvin Barren. The celebration is today beginning at 5  
25 p.m. Each Board member has a reminder in their Board

1 package of the event, its location, and time. Please  
2 refer to the sheet for more information.

3 Today we have one presentation scheduled.  
4 The presentation is the monthly report from the office  
5 the Chief Investigator, Dr. Polly McCalister. She will  
6 be making the presentation.

7 Under the chief's report, I am requesting an  
8 update on a crime statistics and any critical issues  
9 facing the police department. Again, at the end of the  
10 meeting, we will have public comments from the audience.  
11 Please make sure you print your name on the speaker's  
12 cards. Cards are located on the back -- in the back on  
13 the table, or can be obtained by seeing Mr. Brown, who's  
14 seated up here in the front. He will need your card  
15 before the end of the Chief of Police report. Again, he  
16 will need your card before the end of the chief's  
17 report. We will hold each speaker to the allotted two  
18 minutes.

19 I ask that everyone turn off your cell  
20 phones and other electronic devices. This request does  
21 not include the devices held by DPD personnel, as many  
22 of you are on emergency standby. I ask DPD personnel to  
23 keep their phones on vibrate so that ringing phones will  
24 not interrupt our meeting.

25 At this time, we'll have the report from

1 Assistant Chief LeValley. Thank you.

2 A.C. LeVALLEY: Thank you, Madam Chair.

3 I'll start with the crime stats for today. This is as  
4 of 11:59 last night. Homicides for this year were at  
5 134. Last year we were at 132 on this date. So we're  
6 two higher. Sexual assaults were at 532. Last year we  
7 were at 499, an increase of 33. Aggravated assaults  
8 5,366. Last year we were at 5,362, and increase of  
9 four. Nonfatal shootings we were at 403, last year we  
10 were at 377, increase of 26. Robberies we were at  
11 1,214. Last year we were at 1284. That's 70 fewer.  
12 And carjackings we're at 109. Last year 180. That's 71  
13 fewer. Property crime, burglaries are down 8% compared  
14 to last year. Larceny is down 4%, and motor vehicle  
15 thefts are down 2%.

16 Moving on to injured officers. Currently  
17 Officer Wallace Johnson is still recovering from a  
18 gunshot wound to the head. He's in a long-term care  
19 facility. Officer Christopher Thursen is recovering at  
20 home from a motorcycle accident. Officer Marvin  
21 Rodriguez recovering at home from a gunshot wound.  
22 Officer Christopher Bush, and Officer Michael Reyes  
23 Morales both recovering at home after being struck by  
24 vehicles. Officer Darius Tolbert was involved in an  
25 on-duty motor vehicle accident. He's recovering at home

1 after surgery. And also police Officer Michael Borden  
2 with your Neighborhood Police Officer is recovering at  
3 home after being bit by a spider. He was hospitalized  
4 and since been released.

5 Announcements. You already made the  
6 announcement about Deputy Chief Barren's retirement  
7 celebration this evening and graduation of 2019-D, which  
8 is next Friday, August 2nd. Also an announcement that  
9 on August 10, 2019, we will be celebrating field day at  
10 the Wayne State University, that's from the 8 a.m. to  
11 6:00 p.m. on that date. And that will conclude my  
12 report.

13 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, Assistant  
14 Chief. Any questions for Assistant Chief LeValley?

15 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes. Question. I  
16 don't know if you noticed, but I see the personnel  
17 director is not here, but if an officer separates and  
18 wants to come back in less than a year, what is their  
19 procedure, because I know a lot of officers and  
20 ex-officers approach me constantly. So do you know the  
21 procedure?

22 A.C. LeVALLEY: So officers who have  
23 separated, they write a letter to the Chief of Police  
24 requesting to be reappointed to the Department. Then  
25 that letter is then sent to the recruiting unit who

1 conducts a background investigation just to make sure  
2 that nothing has happened from the time that they  
3 separated the Department to the time that they want to  
4 come back. Assuming they pass the background  
5 investigation, then they receive a hire date and report  
6 back to the Police Academy just for like a two-week  
7 refresher course and the Chief swears them back into the  
8 Department.

9 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I know that this  
10 particular officer left, you know. He had to leave  
11 about eight months ago and he's ready to come back.

12 A.C. LeVALLEY: If he just writes a letter,  
13 addresses it to the Chief of Police, as soon as they  
14 receive the letter, then that initiates the process of  
15 being rehired.

16 COMMISSIONER BELL: Okay. I might add if  
17 the Chief denies him an opportunity, he can appeal,  
18 write a letter to the Board of Police Commissioners.

19 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I gave him my card.

20 COMMISSIONER BELL: That will be the final  
21 appeal by the Chief for the first step. By all means,  
22 he needs to exercise with his union leadership in  
23 reference to support for that particular matter.

24 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Madam Chairperson.  
25 Assistant Chief, just a couple of things. One, the

1 status of Officer Jones, you had a -- the last time he  
2 had like three weeks since we had an update on what the  
3 status is, and I thought that some, some -- something  
4 would be done in terms of finalization of that. Do you  
5 know that? Do you want to come back with that?

6 A.C. LeVALLEY: I know that there was a  
7 disciplinary hearing that was held. I don't believe a  
8 decision has been released yet from the Chief, so I'll  
9 have to come back with that.

10 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Secondly, in light of  
11 all the things that's going on like in New York where  
12 water is thrown on officers, so what do we say to our  
13 officers to make sure that just in case something like  
14 that do. Is there something that you guys are doing  
15 just to be prepared for copycats or something like that?  
16 Is there something that goes on in terms of if there's  
17 roll call?

18 A.C. LeVALLEY: We always remind our  
19 officers to be vigilant of their entire surroundings,  
20 constantly watching their partners, watching who's  
21 approaching them. If our officers are assaulted,  
22 certainly they would be in the right to make an arrest  
23 in that type of situation. In terms of the water, it's  
24 not legal to throw any type of object on anybody.

25 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Thank you, Madam

1 Chairperson.

2 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other questions,  
3 Commissioners?

4 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yeah, Madam Chair.

5 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Brown.

6 COMMISSIONER BROWN: A.C., I was concerned  
7 about looking at the situation concerning the shooting  
8 of the dog over in the 6th precinct area. Wasn't one  
9 that, per se, but I was just concerned about they  
10 deployed tasers and they failed to operate or something.  
11 Can you elaborate on the situation like that, and is  
12 that going to be a situation where we're probably going  
13 to have with these tasers going forward, or is this just  
14 an isolated incident.

15 A.C. LeVALLEY: I don't have specifics. I  
16 think Deputy Chief Fitzgerald a command does report to  
17 him and he may have specifics.

18 D.C. FITZGERALD: Yeah. Deputy Chief  
19 Charles Fitzgerald. We've had a lot of success with the  
20 tasers. This one had distance and it didn't quite set  
21 with the clothing the person was wearing. There was no  
22 attempt to tase the animal. They were attempting to  
23 tase the dog owner.

24 COMMISSIONER BROWN: One more question. I  
25 notice I've seen the cars with blue overhead. Have we



1 gotten any data back on how successful that is in  
2 helping reducing officer fatalities in traffic stops and  
3 things like that?

4 A.C. LeVALLEY: In the two precincts, I  
5 don't have specific numbers available with me. In the  
6 two precincts that we did deploy the lights in we've  
7 seen fewer crashes, but I don't have any studied data to  
8 provide at this point. That will come in the future.

9 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Well, that's a start.  
10 All right. Thank you, Madam Chair.

11 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you,  
12 Commissioners. Any other questions? I just want to add  
13 that today, several commissioners had an opportunity to  
14 visit the Realtime Crime Stoppers and had a presentation  
15 from the executive manager of Realtime Crime Center,  
16 which was very, it was very enlightening. So I think,  
17 is there something scheduled next week, Mr. Hicks?

18 MR. HICKS: Thank you, Madam Chair. First,  
19 of all, we indicated to the Chiefs office there were two  
20 days that we would poll, and the individuals that  
21 responded today had there's, and in the intervening  
22 period of time as other Commissioners responded, we'll  
23 make arrangements for something next week as well.

24 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay. Thank you. And  
25 I want to thank those Commissioners who were in

1 attendance today. Thank you, Assistant Chief LeValley.

2 At this time, we will have our presentations from Dr.

3 Holley McCalister the monthly OCI report.

4 DR. McCALISTER: Good afternoon again.

5 Today you will be hearing and viewing our June report.

6 So we added in for June our year-to-date -- excuse me.

7 I'm losing my voice today. We added in our year-to-date

8 for our CCRs. We broke them down by filed, closed, and

9 pending, which are still open. And for June, we

10 actually had a 20% increase, which was we processed 98

11 additional complaints over last year. So we took in an

12 extra 98 from last year. For closed, we actually did a

13 16% increase, which are, we processed 80. And for our

14 open, which are our cases that we're still working on,

15 we processed 38. So we had a 17% increase there.

16 So from year-to-date we had an extremely

17 high increase. The only thing I can credit it to is

18 people are feeling more comfortable with calling our

19 office and filing complaints at the different precincts.

20 Within the precinct, they are taking those complaints.

21 I think when I first started, there was a few issues,

22 but thus far, I think it's all been worked out. And

23 normally when a person walks into a precinct, the

24 complaints are taken and they're sent directly to us.

25 This is our typical command list of how many

1 citizens complaint each command has had. The 8th  
2 precinct, again, kind of like holding onto the 10 and 11  
3 spot. We're hoping to work with them to get those down,  
4 and, as always, our unknowns are always the highest.

5 For our citizen's complaints alleging use of  
6 profanity, this is something that Commissioner Bell  
7 started and has been tracking over the last year. For  
8 May we had six, for June we had six, but we also had a  
9 decrease in the F word. We had four in May, and only  
10 one in June. And I know Commissioner Holley, you were  
11 always interested in the offensive slurs, and the only  
12 thing that came up for these were we had somebody say  
13 hey Gucci man, come here, and somebody used God's name  
14 in vain so. . .

15 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Who was that?

16 DR. McCALISTER: I'll find out. I'll find  
17 out. And these are our CCRs that are actually closed.  
18 As always, we have procedure and demeanor and normally  
19 searched are always our highest. This month, procedure  
20 has taken over from demeanor, so our officers are really  
21 being polite. They're learning what to say and what not  
22 to say. However, our procedures have excelled for 74  
23 and we were able to close 74 of those.

24 For our electronic evidence, we were able to  
25 capture 41 out of 48. We did have several complaints

1 that were actually filed after the 90 day, so we were  
2 not able to go back and pull that data, so we lost that  
3 as far as those but seven, but it's still not bad.  
4 We're able to capture the majority of them.

5 And for DPD members by seniority and rank,  
6 for lieutenants, we had three complaints for June. We  
7 had an increase by three. For police officers had 101.  
8 We actually had a decrease by 25, which is exceptional,  
9 because that's been the highest we've always had.  
10 Officers have always had 135, 140, but for this month,  
11 we only had 101. 34 members with ten to 19 years we are  
12 up nine, and 24 sworn members with 20 to 29 years we are  
13 up one. For detectives, we are down three, and for nine  
14 sworn members with 30 years, we are down one.

15 And a reminder that the Board is speaking to  
16 the class 2019-D on June 26. Mr. Hicks sent that email  
17 out a couple of weeks ago, so those that are able to  
18 attend. I think they're going to try to coordinate --  
19 July 26, I'm sorry, for tomorrow. But it's actually  
20 tomorrow at 10. But he sent that email out to you guys  
21 to coordinate your schedules. So hopefully you got them  
22 and you opened them, maybe. That's the class that's  
23 graduating on August 2nd.

24 And as always, how to file a citizen  
25 complaint. You can either come to our office directly,

1 which is at 900 Merrill Plaisance, and our telephone  
2 number, which is 596-2499, or you can file online and  
3 we'll get it and process. Any questions?

4 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, Dr.  
5 McCalister. Any questions, Commissioner? Commissioner  
6 Davis.

7 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Two questions.

8 DR. McCALISTER: Yes.

9 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Well, one comment.  
10 I've been talking to people all over the city and I  
11 encourage them to call you.

12 DR. McCALISTER: Yes, I know. They tell me.  
13 Commissioner Davis said to call you.

14 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Also, secondly, are you  
15 short of staff? And if you are short of staff, is that  
16 a problem? Is that slowing up the process? Is that  
17 making you not closing as many as you'd like to as  
18 quickly as you'd like to?

19 DR. McCALISTER: I mean we are short, but I  
20 think every department in the city is short. So we just  
21 kind of like dig in and get it done.

22 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: How short are you? I  
23 mean staff, not your personal height.

24 DR. McCALISTER: Well I have on heels, so  
25 I'm not short today. Actually, we're only down one

1 supervisor because he retired, and I think we're down  
2 two investigators.

3 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Okay. That's three.  
4 Thank you.

5 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other questions,  
6 Commissioners?

7 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I don't have a  
8 question, I'd just like to comment. This is very nicely  
9 done. Very nicely done. I just want you to know that.

10 DR. McCALISTER: Thank you.

11 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Just let you know, I  
12 very seldom -- I like you. Just know you've done it.  
13 This is a beautiful report.

14 DR. McCALISTER: Thank you.

15 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other comments or  
16 questions?

17 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Madam Chair?

18 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Brown.

19 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Dr. McCalister, always  
20 just thank you for your report and time you put into it.  
21 It's always an excellent presentation. I just still had  
22 that one concern about the footage for the camera issue.  
23 What can we do? I know it takes up a lot of memory, or  
24 whatever. Is there anything we can do after that to  
25 maybe that OCI can develop their own storage or data

1 bank base to store these videos for up to a year and  
2 then we get rid of them, or is this a policy issue that  
3 may have to come before the Board, again, in alignment  
4 with DPD's policies? Is there something we can create  
5 outside of that so that once they discard the videos  
6 that they come to OCI for an additional source to be  
7 held on for at least a year?

8 DR. McCALISTER: Actually, that's not our  
9 issue. Our issue is like so a citizen has an encounter  
10 with a police officer three months ago, and then they  
11 decide in August to make the complaint. The video is  
12 actually gone from the server for us to go in and pull.  
13 That's what I mean when I say it's past the 90 days and  
14 we don't have the capabilities to pull it. Once we do  
15 pull it, we can download it and we do save it. It's  
16 just that 90 day, and I think that would have to come  
17 through the Department. As far as extending that, I  
18 don't know if it's possible. I think that's a  
19 conversation that we could probably have with the Chief  
20 or one of the Assistant Chiefs.

21 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Okay. Thank you.

22 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other questions,  
23 Commissioner? Thank, you Madam. Commissioners, any  
24 standing or ad hoc committee reports at this time? Mr.  
25 Hicks will have the board secretary report.

1 MR. HICKS: Thank you, Madam Chair. I did  
2 want to call to your attention three items that were  
3 listed as incoming items into the board, and they're  
4 listed specifically on the agenda. One was a Freedom of  
5 Information request around the July -- Freedom of  
6 Information request around the events of July 11 Board  
7 meeting. Secondly, we had a request from Team Wellness  
8 Center. This was a Team Wellness Center was one of the  
9 groups that participated in the mental health panel  
10 discussion, and they wanted to come back and update us  
11 relative to some of the work that they have done since  
12 that period of time, including the addition of  
13 psychiatric unit, and a number of the things that we're  
14 doing with the Department, and they made the appeal  
15 because they had made a presentation to the Full Board  
16 and wanted to keep the Full Board apprised as to the  
17 work in which they're doing. And then the third one was  
18 email communications and it was, I think, also included  
19 in your, in your packet. And this was a individual,  
20 Terry Robinson, who made some comments relative to the  
21 July 11th Board meeting. And with that, that's all the  
22 items that we've had incoming for this week. Unless you  
23 have any particular questions, that would be my report.

24 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: May I ask a question,  
25 Madam Chair, please?



1 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Yes.

2 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Mr. Secretary, for  
3 example, one of the reasons why I was concerned about  
4 Team Wellness coming and psychiatric ward piece, I want  
5 to make sure that it's just not for us, for the Board,  
6 that somehow I want to make sure that some of these  
7 things that come before us are basically be connected to  
8 the Police Department. In other words, I want to make  
9 sure there's some follow-up so that if this is something  
10 like what happened a few months ago, it can go to them.  
11 They have a bed, they have a psychiatric ward. So I  
12 just want to make sure that it's not always just for us;  
13 that somehow it's your office, making sure that your  
14 office connect with the people in the Police Department  
15 that will somehow get it to the point where it's  
16 implemented if necessary.

17 MR. HICKS: Madam Chair, if I can just  
18 expand on that. The reason why they wanted to come back  
19 was to update us specifically on their expanding  
20 relationship and their capacity with the Department. So  
21 they wanted to say, in effect, we engage the Department,  
22 we have these types of things in which we're doing with  
23 the Department, and they want to report it out to us.  
24 The Department is already conversant and working with  
25 them, as far as I understand it.

1 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I am fine. I just  
2 know you used the word, presentation was they're coming  
3 back to us, the Board, not to the Police Department, and  
4 I want to make sure that the work that we do is not just  
5 for us, but it's for the work of the Police Department.  
6 And I want to make sure that at some point or another,  
7 there is some way of allowing us to know that this is  
8 working, that it's been implemented because, again,  
9 anyway, I'll just leave it at that. You understand what  
10 I'm trying --

11 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Yes, I do.

12 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I'm not trying to be  
13 difficult or adversarial, I just want you to know, I  
14 want to make my point on record that it's not just for,  
15 just for grandstanding. I want to make sure that it  
16 works for us.

17 MR. HICKS: Commissioner, what they're  
18 coming in to do is a report to you they have been in  
19 front of you before on the work that they are doing with  
20 the Department. That's what they are coming in to do.

21 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Thank you so much.  
22 Thank you, Madam chair.

23 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Mr. Hicks, I do not  
24 have a copy of the email communication, so can you make  
25 sure we get it. Thank you. Any old business,

1 Commissioners? New business. Announcements. Our next  
2 meeting will be Thursday August 1st, 2019 at 3 p.m. here  
3 at the Detroit Public Safety Headquarters located at  
4 1301 Third Street. Our next community meeting will be  
5 Thursday, August 8, 2019 at 6:30 p.m. in the 5th  
6 Precinct at the Carolyn Cheeks Kilpatrick room at the  
7 Samaritan Center located at 5555 Connor Street. At this  
8 time, we'll have oral communication for the audience.  
9 Please give your name for the record and limit your  
10 comments to two minutes, please.

11 MR. BROWN: Madam Chair, I currently have  
12 five cards, I just count five of them. Ms. Fredia  
13 Butler, Ms. Karen Gordon, Ms. Tawana Petty, Ms. Brenda  
14 Hill, and Ms. Madge Morgan.

15 MS. BUTLER: Good afternoon. Commissioners,  
16 thank you for recognizing and honoring Sergeant Vanessa  
17 Wyatt for her 42 years of service in the Detroit Police  
18 Department. When Chief Craig attended the community  
19 celebration May 23rd at Butzel Recreation Center, he  
20 says that when officers retired in California they made  
21 plans for four months in advance to celebrate such an  
22 achievement.

23 Even though your recognition here did not go  
24 as I had hoped, pictures with the Chief, Commissioners  
25 and the Commander at the 2nd precinct and his

1 neighborhood police officers in a formal setting for  
2 Sergeant Wyatt to have a recorded memory, I'm sorry that  
3 pictures with the Board and Chief Craig could not have  
4 been taken in a timely manner, so Commander and his NPOs  
5 could return to their positions. However, the City had  
6 an opportunity to witness that Detroit's finest have  
7 officers who are dedicated to serve and are worthy to be  
8 honored.

9           When I interviewed Sergeant Wyatt, I learned  
10 that during her 42 years of service, she never fired her  
11 weapon in the line of duty. That speaks volumes to her  
12 character as an officer. Commissioners are passionately  
13 support our officers, especially our neighborhood police  
14 officers in the 2nd precinct for the work they're doing  
15 in our communities.

16           As a citizen, I hope to always speak up for  
17 what is just and speak out for any unjust act committed  
18 by any officers or officials who took an oath to serve  
19 our City. Commissioners, please do not allow unpleasant  
20 discourse among you to take your focus off the  
21 responsibility that has been given to you as oversight  
22 for the good and safety of our communities. Meet and  
23 work out your differences before coming before the  
24 public to learn of our concerns. Thanks for listening.

25           CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

1 MR. BROWN: Ms. Gordon.

2 MS. GORDON: Hi. My name is Karen Gordon,  
3 and I'm here again today. I'm wondering why still not  
4 yet have I found the 7th precinct. No one in it know  
5 how to write up a false police crime report. When a  
6 report was filed on me, it was a false police report.  
7 And it says in the Penal Code Act 328 since 1931 750.  
8 41. If a person made a false police report on you, you  
9 can file charges against them, and I want to know why  
10 can't I file charges against the three people that I can  
11 prove made false police reports?

12 And then I also want to know that they, the  
13 police officer also made a false police report and also  
14 lied to his fellow police officer. So is he held to the  
15 same as this penalty code, or is he exempt from this  
16 law? And when I can't find an answer, who do I go to?  
17 I done went to the police. The police don't know the  
18 law. So who know the law? Who do I go to to find out  
19 who know the law?

20 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Madam Chair?

21 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Go ahead, Commissioner.

22 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Let me ask Dr.  
23 McCalister, is this something that your office can  
24 handle for her?

25 DR. McCALISTER: We can speak to her about

1 one complaint. Yes.

2 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Just one of the  
3 complaints?

4 MS. McCALISTER: Yes.

5 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Can you advise her  
6 about the second one? Even though you can't do nothing  
7 about it, you can advise her the legal?

8 DR. McCALISTER: We can talk.

9 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: So we're going to help  
10 through the Chair, we're going to help you today.

11 MS. GORDON: Thank you.

12 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Can we do that, Chief?

13 DR. McCALISTER: We'll have somebody talk to  
14 her. Yes.

15 MR. BROWN: Ms. Petty?

16 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Thank you so much.  
17 Thank you, Madam Chair.

18 MS. PETTY: Hello again. Tawana Petty  
19 representing Detroit Community Technology Project. Of  
20 course I'm here to talk about facial recognition  
21 technology and also my disappointment at the fact that  
22 city council voted to expand a Realtime Crime Center  
23 while we're in a heated debate, and a lot of folks are  
24 confused, and there's a lack of transparency coming from  
25 the mayor's office and the Detroit Police Department.

1 I'm feeling very anxious about your upcoming  
2 vote, considering that everyone's going on catered field  
3 trips to the Realtime Crime Center where you won't even  
4 be able to determine whether or not you're getting a  
5 real experience on a day-to-day practice of law  
6 enforcement because you're not technologists so you can  
7 be shown pretty much anything at this point. So I just  
8 want to voice my concern about that.

9 And finally, I think that there has been a  
10 lack of transparency about mobile use in conjunction  
11 with Project Green Light and the potential for facial  
12 recognition technology. The contract identifies that  
13 there's unlimited mobile use. I still yet to hear how  
14 law enforcement is using mobile cell phones in  
15 conjunction with this technology. I don't think that's  
16 been interrogated. I haven't heard anybody ask about  
17 that, and I haven't heard it answered. And so I want to  
18 put back on the record that I think there needs to be  
19 some transparency regarding the stats that are being  
20 given about accuracy regarding the use of mobile cell  
21 phones regarding what happened to drones within the  
22 proposed directive that was put forward in April, and  
23 I'd like to get some, a few technologists to scrutinize  
24 the Realtime Crime Center. And so that's my comment.

25 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

1 MR. BROWN: Ms. Hill?

2 MS. HILL: Yes. I don't feel very well.

3 Can Valerie Glenn take my two minutes?

4 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Yes.

5 MS. GLENN: Good afternoon, citizens and  
6 Police Commissioners. My name is Valerie Glenn,  
7 lifelong resident of the City of Detroit. I am here,  
8 first of all, I'd like to ditto what Ms. Petty said.  
9 I'm very concerned about the transparency regarding the  
10 technology or the facial recognition technology. It has  
11 now been written down and presented to the citizens by  
12 some of the members of the city council, Ms. Sheffield  
13 in particular, or Councilwoman Sheffield. She actually  
14 has said that you could have been using this technology  
15 for two years. That's real disappointing to me along  
16 with the community.

17 Right now I'm very, also very concerned  
18 about the amount of arrests that have taken place  
19 amongst the community activists attending meetings in  
20 the City Council Building along with the other  
21 buildings. When I attended the last City Council  
22 evening meeting, I counted with the police officers that  
23 were hiding in the back to the left of the center about  
24 a one police officer to three citizens ratio. That's  
25 entirely overkill. I wouldn't even have that many



1 people with children, or I wouldn't even have that in a  
2 teaching situation.

3 Right now we have another person who has  
4 been arrested and injured, and that is Ms. Warfield,  
5 Joanna Warfield, or Joanne Warfield. Warwick. I'm  
6 sorry. Warwick. And her situation is confusing, but  
7 she was in the Coleman Alexander Young Building, and  
8 there was an altercation with one of the police  
9 officers. This is way overkill. My husband in his 35  
10 years as being on the force never used his gun as well,  
11 our he never got into and altercation. This is bad.  
12 I'm sorry. You guys are not doing your job.

13 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Ms. Glenn, and to the  
14 rest of you. This is an example. When citizens come to  
15 us and make complaints, we try to make sure that police  
16 officers are available. We don't know what the  
17 complaint is going to be, so we have homicide, we have  
18 all kind of police officers here for the citizens. It's  
19 not for us, it's for the citizens. So that the  
20 Assistant Chief, or the Chief will say to one of the  
21 police officers how you can help, or the other side.  
22 This is why we have them here.

23 MS. GLENN: Not here.

24 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I'm just responding.  
25 I know you very well. I respect you very well.

1 MS. GLENN: I know you very well too.

2 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I'm just saying to you  
3 is that again, that's why we have the police officers  
4 here, okay? That's the main thing.

5 The other thing I just wanted to say is that  
6 I've been in this business for a long time, as you know,  
7 and all I ask, all we ask here, and ask the president to  
8 allow me just the same two minutes, less than a minute,  
9 and that is we give you an opportunity to speak at the  
10 end of the end. Anybody can speak for two minutes. We  
11 just don't want you to speak during the meeting. It's  
12 not you. I'm just talking now. I'm not talking about  
13 nobody, I'm just talking about what I'm talking about.  
14 That's all we want is to just have a respectful meeting.  
15 But the police officers here, the OIC is here, and this  
16 is simply for the citizens, that's why we have them  
17 here. Not for overkill. We do mistakes sometimes.  
18 We're not perfect, but I want you to know we respect you  
19 and all the citizens because we're basically here  
20 because you got us here.

21 So I just wanted to thank you for that. As  
22 always, I know what you're saying. I know the work that  
23 you do, and I just want to let you know this is why we  
24 do what we do, and that's all. And thank you for  
25 allowing me to come behind you and just say this without

1 you, because I know normally you would be very -- I'm  
2 just letting you know. I thank you for that. Thank  
3 you, Madam Chair.

4 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Ms. Morgan. Madam  
5 Chair, that will be your last speaker.

6 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Mr. Burns, you're not  
7 speaking tonight?

8 MR. BURNS: You want me to say something?

9 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: No.

10 MR. BURNS: I do have a lot on my mind.

11 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I know you do. You  
12 always do.

13 MS. MORGAN: Hi. My name is Madge Penelope  
14 Morgan. And this is my first time attending, or the  
15 first time in a long time attending one of these  
16 meetings. And the evil that was visited upon  
17 Commissioner Burton brought me down here today. So my  
18 question and my comment -- can I ask a question? Can my  
19 comment be a question and get an answer? So I've been  
20 reading on the news reports, and my question is, is it  
21 true that you guys have a Wednesday meeting behind  
22 closed doors? Secret meetings? Is that true? Yes or  
23 no?

24 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Wednesday meetings?

25 MS. MORGAN: Wednesday meetings where the

1 public is now allowed where Commission Burton was barred  
2 from. Are there Wednesday meetings held in secret  
3 behind closed doors is my question.

4 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Ma'am, we have a  
5 Wednesday meeting that is myself and the staff members,  
6 and sometimes the immediate past chair, the vice chair  
7 where we discuss administrative issues. We discuss the  
8 agenda, what's coming up on the agenda. So it's not a  
9 secret meeting, it's just a meeting with myself and  
10 staff, or whoever the chair is.

11 MS. MORGAN: So those --

12 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's not going to be a  
13 back and forth, so you have to ask all your questions  
14 and then get an answers.

15 MS. MORGAN: I've got another question.

16 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay. Go ahead.

17 MS. MORGAN: What's you mean it's not going  
18 to be a back -- I see you've got a transcriptionist over  
19 there. Does the transcriptionist take notes at the  
20 Wednesday meetings also?

21 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: No. We record the  
22 meetings.

23 MS. MORGAN: Oh, there's recordings of the  
24 meetings? That's what I wanted to know.

25 MR. BROWN: Madam Chair, that was your last

1 speaker.

2 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. If there's  
3 no other business, I'll entertain a motion to adjourn.

4 COMMISSIONER BELL: So moved.

5 COMMISSIONER: Support.

6 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: So moved and supported  
7 that we adjourn. Those in favor?

8 COMMISSIONERS: Aye.

9 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Motions carries. The  
10 meeting is adjourned. Thank you all for coming out this  
11 afternoon.

12 (The proceeding was concluded at 3:50 p.m.)

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
