7	My name is Lisa Carter and I will be conducting today's

17	CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, sir. And

Police Commissioner William Davis, District 7. 8 9 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Good afternoon. Shirley Burch, District 3. 10 11 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Good afternoon. 12 Elizabeth Brooks, at large. 13 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Good afternoon. 14 Eva Garza Dewaelsche, at large, Vice Chair. COMMISSIONER BELL: Willie Bell, District 4. 15 16 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Darryl Brown, District 17 1. COMMISSIONER BURTON: Commissioner Willie 18 19 Burton, District 5. 20 MR. HICKS: Madame Chair, you have a quorum. 21 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: At this time can you 22 introduce the Board staff, please. 23 MR. HICKS: Thank you, Madame Chair. Sergeant Quinn is taping today's meeting. Media 2.4 Services is providing the audio visual work and Shay 25



1 Coleman is the court reporter today. Of course, the Board Attorney is Jermaine Wyrick. If you can 2 introduce yourself and we'll proceed in that fashion 3 and we'll go to the first row and we'll conclude with 4 Dr. Polly McCalister. 5 6 (Whereupon the Board staff introduced 7 themselves.) CHAIRPERSON CARTER: At this time we'll 8 introduce Chief James Craig and Chief Craig introduce 9 10 anyone you have. CHIEF CRAIG: Good afternoon, Madame Chair 11 12 and also the Board. 13 (Whereupon Chief Craig introduced his 14 staff.) 15 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. At this time 16 if there are any elected officials or VIPs or civic 17 leaders or their representatives would you please stand and give your name for the record, please. 18 19 (None responded.) 20 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Seeing none, we're going to move on to the Chair's Report. On behalf of the 21 22 Board I want to express our concern and support for 23 fallen and injured officers. Our concerns for officer 24 safety and citizen protection is ranked as two of the 25 most important priorities of the Board. Our Board



1 receives a weekly report from the Department listing injured officers. I would ask that Chief Craig during 2 your remarks please provide us with any additional 3 information related to injured and fallen officers. 4 The Board of Police Commissioners meets every 5 week except for Thanksgiving and Christmas holiday 6 periods. We meet at Police Headquarters three weeks in 7 a month on Thursdays at 3 p.m. We also meet in the 8 community every second Thursday of the month at 6:30 9 10 p.m. Under the Detroit City Charter Article 7 11 12 Chapter 8 Board of Police Commissioners is empowered to 13 provide civilian oversight and supervisory control of 14 the Police Department. Our citizens are justified in 15 asking how does civilian oversight of law enforcement 16 help you as a citizen within our community. Our answer is we protect the civil rights of citizens. 17 Oversight organizations like the BOPC are at the forefront of 18 19 investigating, reviewing and auditing individual cases 20 of citizens' complaints and patterns of operation by police agencies to eliminate misconduct, discriminatory 21 police practice and unnecessary use of force by police. 22 23 Our work is based on developing and 2.4 supporting effective policy. Mutual trust and respect

25 between the police and the community is critical toward



increasing the quality of life for residents and 1 2 visitors to Detroit. Board of Police Commissioners exists to provide civilian oversight for the work of 3 4 the Detroit Police Department. As a Board we receive and investigate non-criminal citizens' complaints, 5 monitor the operations of the Department and work with 6 7 the Mayor and the Chief to make or modify police policy. 8

I want to point to several important items 9 for your consideration and information. 10 The NACO Conference is fastly (sic) approaching. I remind the 11 12 Board we are continuing to work with NACO, the National 13 Association for Civilian Oversight of Law Enforcement, 14 to host a conference on September 22nd through 26th in 15 Detroit. During this time Detroit will be celebrating 16 our 45th year as a civilian oversight organization.

17 The BOPC has secured an exciting keynote speaker for the 45th anniversary dinner, Christie 18 19 Lopez. The 45th anniversary dinner is Tuesday, 20 September 24, 2019 from 5 p.m. to 7 p.m. at the 21 Marriott Hotel. Christie Lopez is a former member of the U.S. Department of Justice in the Special 2.2 23 Litigation Section as well as a visiting professor at 2.4 the Georgetown Law School. Professor Lopez' work has centered on criminal justice reform and constitutional 25



policing. Professor Lopez lead the DOJ in conducting pattern of practice investigations of local police departments and negotiated settlement agreements in Chicago, New Orleans, Las Angeles, New York, New Jersey and several other important oversight initiatives across the country.

7 Again, the planning process is well under way, and again, we invite your participation. We also 8 invite you to volunteer to help with the conference in 9 June. Volunteer forms are located on the back table. 10 The Chief of Police has transmitted to the Board three 11 12 recommendations for appointment to the command ranks of 13 the Department. The positions are for Deputy Chief, 14 Commander and Captain. Each Board member was 15 transmitted copies of the appointment packages on 16 Monday, August 26, 2019. We are currently conducting a review of these recommendations. 17

Upon the completion of this review I will 18 19 schedule these appointments for approval on the 20 September 5, 2019 Board meeting. There continues to be some confusion suggestion that the Board is in 21 violation of the Open Meetings Act. The Act is clear 2.2 23 that no persons shall be required to identify 2.4 themselves as a pre-condition to participate in a meeting held by a public body. While the Act has some 25



exceptions to open meetings, the Board does not require
 identification to participate in our meetings; however,
 we continue to receive complaints that the Public
 Safety Headquarters building requires identification
 and also runs the identification through a machine
 before they allow for entrance into the building.

7 I have asked Dan Davis, Director of Building 8 Security for the Public Safety Headquarters Building, 9 to appear to explain their policy and procedures in 10 connection with building operations. Again, the Board 11 does not run the Public Safety Headquarters building. 12 Again, it is my hope that this presentation will 13 address some of the concerns on the subject.

14 I also want to report that the next addition 15 of the Detroit Board of Police Commissioners Newsletter 16 has been printed and is scheduled to hit the mailboxes immediately following the Labor Day Holiday. 17 The approximate printing run was one thousand -- I'm sorry 18 -- 160,000 copies. We are mailing directly to 150,000 19 households. We also provide copies of the newsletters 20 to the Detroit Public Library system and various 21 community centers that act as community hubs, including 2.2 23 workforce development sites, as well as direct mailing to some 3,000 individuals who have indicated their 24 interest in the work with the BOPC. 25



1 Copies of the newsletter are also on-line at 2 our website, www.detroitmi/bopc. Today in addition to the presentation of the building security, we have two 3 presentations; the 4th Quarter DPD Financial Advisor by 4 Nervus Nazarko of DPD finance, and the report from the 5 Chief Investigator Dr. Polly McCalister of the Office 6 of the Chief Investigator. Please note that staff of 7 the Board transmit questions to the Finance Section in 8 advance of our meeting. I hope these questions will 9 direct the presentation today. Copies of the questions 10 are included in your Board package. Under the Chief's 11 12 Report I'm requesting an update on our crime statistics 13 and any critical issues facing the Police Department.

Again, at the end of the meeting we will have public comments from the audience. Please make sure your name is printed on the speakers card. Cards are located on the back table or can be obtained by seeing Mr. Brown who is seated up here in the front. He will need your card before the end of the Chief of Police Report. We will hold each speaker to two minutes.

I ask that everyone place their cell phones or electronic devices on vibrate to make sure that we are not interrupting the meeting. Chief Craig, the floor is yours. Thank you.

CHIEF CRAIG: Thank you, Madame Chair.

25



1 Again, Board, as I start my report I start with crime. It seems like murders as well as non-fatal shootings 2 3 are starting to decline, which is good news. Again, not waving the flag of success, but as of today we're 4 5 up five homicides as compared to this time last year. Sexual assaults we're up 24 as compared to this time 6 7 last year. Aggravated assaults we're down 137. Non-fatal shootings we're up ten. Robberies we're down 8 9 43. Carjackings we're down 155. Total 2 percent overall reduction in violent crime. Property crime 10 we're down 3 percent. 11

12 So again, when we really look at this time 13 last year, we really ran very close to the same so our 14 work continues. I want to start by thanking Mr. Blunt, 15 Commissioner Carter and Bell and some Commission staff 16 who attended a presentation I held on the status of the 17 matter involving Corporal Jones. I want to also advise you attend and participate in a forum Pure Heart 18 19 Foundation, a foundation developed for children of 20 incarcerated parents; and lastly, attend on Monday our Cease Fire Call-in. We thought it was well attended; 21 2.2 great response by the participants. With that, I open 23 up for any questions you may have.

24 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioners, questions25 for the Chief.



1 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes. CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Davis. 2 3 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Chief, I've been getting a number of complaints over there in District 2 about a 4 5 flatbed truck. People have been complaining to me from like McNichols area from like Pontchartrain to 6 7 Livernois about an ongoing flatbed truck that is parked on Envious (ph) and McNichols. They've been 8 9 complaining to me for about two months. I drove past there a number of times because I work not too far from 10 there and I see it's constantly parked there. I know 11 they said that they have talked to the 12th Precinct a 12 number of times. Could you have somebody look into it 13 14 and see if they can do something about it? 15 CHIEF CRAIG: You've been knowing about it 16 for two months? COMMISSIONER DAVIS: People have been 17 18 complaining about it for two months. 19 CHIEF CRAIG: Complained to the police station? 20 21 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes. 2.2 CHIEF CRAIG: I see. Deputy Chief Fitzgerald is here and I will ask if you would follow up. Is that 23 24 Number 12?25 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: That's Number 12. I qot



1 three separate calls on it and I decided to drive by 2 myself and went by there four different times and seen 3 it in the past two weeks.

4 CHIEF CRAIG: Thank you.

5 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: That's all I have.

6 COMMISSIONER BROWN: I have a few complaints 7 about the towing issues and the fees. And one of the complaints discussed with me, which was something that 8 9 really was a common sense answer, I really couldn't I thought I'd let you respond to it; 10 give it to him. 11 that was if the towing yards are closed on Saturday and 12 Sunday and they can't get their cars out on those days 13 why are they being charged those extra fees when it is 14 something that we're doing to not give them access to 15 their vehicles. I quess what can we do about that?

16 CHIEF CRAIG: Through the Chair, I'm not 17 aware of that but certainly will look into it. That's the first I'm hearing. One complaint that I did 18 receive, actually, from a detective who indicated that 19 vehicles that where a victim's vehicle was involved in 20 a drive-by shooting, as the victim, the vehicle was 21 towed and assessed tow fees. When it's a crime victim 2.2 vehicle we should treat that vehicle the same way. I 23 don't know what the logic. That's been a practice. I 24 told them I want that practice ceased; that a crime 25

victim is a crime victim. If you use that as some kind 1 of leverage to get a witness to come in and give a 2 3 statement that's not proper so that practice should have ceased. If it doesn't someone can let me know. 4 5 I'd appreciate it. It should be treated the same regardless of what the issue. But in terms of closed 6 tow yards, that's something I will have to look into. 7 Assistant Chief White -- in fact, Sergeant Hewitt (ph), 8 can you follow up on that issue and report back. 9 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Bell. 10 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, Madame Chair. I 11 12 just want to thank you, Chief, for hosting that forum, 13 Corporal Jones, for the opportunity for civilians to 14 participate. I thought it was very helpful in terms of 15 your continuations and transparencies to have dialogue. 16 I just want to give kudos to the Homicide Section. Ι know they've been extremely hard working with the rash 17 of shootings and responding to the scene on call. 18 19 Sometimes I think you overlook the work of the Homicide 20 Division and also our neighborhood police officers for the job they've been doing on abandoned houses. 21 I know its been a tedious process and one officer was hurt in 2.2 23 that process. I hope he's doing well and returned to 2.4 duty. That's going beyond the scope of duty and responsibility. Thank you for that. 25



1 CHIEF CRAIG: Thank you for those comments. I certainly appreciate that. And, yes, the Homicide 2 team has done phenomenal work this year. In fact, we 3 don't talk much about headquarters surveillance, which 4 is kind of the surveillance of Homicide, they really go 5 6 out and put in maximum effort in identifying the location of homicide suspects. Sometimes, as you know, 7 we're waiting for arrest warrants to be signed by the 8 9 Prosecutor's Office so the suspect is not in custody and so they try to monitor that person until it is 10 signed. And then when it is signed they go out and 11 12 pursue that suspect. So just great work. I know 13 Captain McGinnis (ph), I want to acknowledge him 14 personally. Job well done. 15 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other questions, 16 comments for the Chief? 17 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Good afternoon. I want to say in the 11th Precinct you hear me randomly, 18 almost every week, speaking about the speeding. At one 19 20 time we did have the rotating digital sign that would be posted in certain areas. We haven't seen it in a 21 while. Is it you're using it somewhere else maybe? 22 23 CHIEF CRAIG: Through the Chair, I'm not sure its current location. I know that Deputy Chief 24 Bettison has taken a keen interest in your traffic 25



Page 17 very meeting, but

complaints and we know it comes up every meeting, but we want to be as responsive as possible. I'll make sure we follow up on that. One thing I've neglected to brief the Board on; I don't know if maybe someone is going to ask questions. I'll report it out. We did talk about it at the press conference. There was a major violator seizure a week ago today.

8 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair, I 9 have a few questions for the Chief. Ouestion number one is since you've been the Chief of Police here in 10 the City of Detroit how many officers been investigated 11 12 and charged since you've been here reflecting back on 13 what's happened with the Narcotics Unit? I believe a 14 couple years ago you renamed that unit to Major Violators. How many officers been arrested? How many 15 16 been charged and how many more investigations going 17 forward?

18 CHIEF CRAIG: Through the Chair, I don't have 19 a hard number. If you're talking globally how many 20 officers have been charged, arrested, I don't have it 21 at my finger tips. I've been very transparent and at 22 times aggressive about when we learn about officer 23 misconduct. If it includes criminality we're not being 24 shy about taking appropriate swift action.

25 I just want to remind the Commissioners



1 relative to narcotics investigation. It started before my appointment. The FBI opened an official probe in 2 2010; although the investigation did show that the 3 activities occurring there did pre-date even 2010. 4 So if you talk to some of the tenured officers that are in 5 the Department, they will tell you there have been off 6 7 again on again investigations. We try to make some changes right after the investigation relative to 8 9 staffing. Some have spent long careers in Narcotics so we put kind of a limit that we knew we couldn't just 10 designate the entire Narcotics Unit. 11

12 As I pointed out, relative to the one officer 13 who just got indicted, he had been there for a period 14 of time. He was also transferred out, came back. Tn 15 this incident it looks like it's isolated to just him. 16 For our seizure that we made on last week it's a 17 continuing part of our effort to make sure that we don't have any additional or current issues in Major 18 19 Violators. In fact, a lot of what we learned through the seizures had to do with the initial probe again 20 going back to 2010. So we're looking at areas to 21 address that. 2.2

We also indicated there was a civil lawsuit that came about from that 2010 probe. Since there was a civil lawsuit filed there is some allegation of false

1 statements, false affidavit. And so because of our 2 learning of that through the civil suit we have opened an investigation dealing with that. So there's some 3 things that we're looking at going forward. We don't 4 5 have that plan yet. I can tell you that anything that we seized the FBI has agreed to assist us in cataloging 6 every piece of record, and again, these records date 7 back many years before. We just want to know if 8 certainly the FBI is concerned and interested in civil 9 rights violations as I am interested in that. 10

Again, this is dated. Some of these people are no longer with the Police Department; however, if they're no longer employed here they still can be subject to criminal prosecution unless there's a statute of limitations. So again, this is a continuation of fully eradicating any corruption.

17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: So since you renamed 18 the unit, restaffed the unit, things are still not 19 working well in that unit. What were your initial 20 plans as far as revamping that unit and what's not 21 working? How should that department or that unit work 22 compared to other cities and what is your plan going 23 forward turning that narcotics unit around?

CHIEF CRAIG: Through the Chair, I just wantCommissioner to understand that this is a continuation.

1 I made the statement clearly that when we move staff out it would have been misguided for me to take 2 3 everyone in the unit and move them out and put new people in. There's a learning curve in doing this 4 work. Again, this was isolated to one officer who 5 engaged in this type of criminal misconduct. And this 6 officer should have known he was there when the time --7 well before 2010 -- so he understood some of the 8 9 activities. I anticipate as we catalog and continue to probe into the files that we're going to find things. 10 Again, I stress to you, a lot of this 11 12 predates me. I can't control what happened in 2010. 13 In fact, I was in Portland, Maine. I just have to keep 14 plugging away and suggesting that it's not working now. 15 I am not going to sit here and tell you that every 16 member of Major Violators is corrupt because they are 17 not. There have been some management barriers from the past. We know that that's why we changed leadership 18 19 but the work continues. Once we get -- we have never 20 done a whole seizure of records. That was a decision I made because I want to know. So it's not over but it 21 22 also goes back.

We might go back as far as ten years or more. We just want to root out whatever, and certainly if we find that there is any criminality we're going to hold



1 people accountable.

2 COMMISSIONER BURTON: So should DPD be in 3 charge of the investigation or should the Feds be in 4 charge of the investigation?

5 CHIEF CRAIG: Preliminarily I can tell you in 6 terms of how we're approaching this Chris Garvin (ph), which you know is a former U.S. Attorney, has been 7 involved in large scale probes. The FBI is involved in 8 9 assisting us so we have a cross section right now of people who are conducting this probe. This Department 10 under this administration has not had any issues 11 12 relative to not being transparent and being able to 13 investigate itself or hold us accountable.

14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: So if this was New York 15 or Chicago or LA would a Chief be in charge of the 16 investigation there or would it be the Feds would come 17 in and do this if this was New York or Chicago?

Through the Chair, just a 18 CHIEF CRAIG: 19 matter of my own personal experience, I was involved 20 investigatively in one of the largest corruption scandals in the United States in Los Angeles. LA did 21 their investigation. Sometimes it's an investigation 2.2 23 that runs concurrent. There are things the Feds can do in an investigation. As you know, if it's a civil 24 rights or color of law investigation, the FBI will take 25



the lead. We don't know yet if that's going to emerge in this probe that we're doing so part would be their's.

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Certainly if we find out that there was some 4 tampering with evidence, the affidavits were falsely 5 prepared, that might fall more under Wayne County 6 Prosecutor's jurisdiction. So very soon I'm going to 7 be asking Prosecutor Worthy to come in and get involved 8 9 in that. So that's generally how investigations work, particularly when you talk about a Federal case, State 10 11 case.

12 In the end we might find out that there is no 13 criminality because of the statute of limitations. But 14 then we would have to approach it administratively and 15 impose discipline that way. And, for those members who 16 are no longer with the Detroit Police Department, if there's no criminality then there's no administrative 17 sanction; they're retired or resign from the Police 18 19 Department.

20 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other questions,21 Commissioners?

22 (Non responded.)

CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, Chief. At
this time we will hear from Mr. Dan Davis from Building
Security.



1 MR. DAVIS: Good afternoon, Madame Chairperson, Board, Chief Craig and staff, all you 2 visitors here today. My name is Dan Davis. I'm the 3 Director of Security here at DPHS. I've been asked to 4 5 speak. I've been asked to speak to some of the 6 concerns basically about our policy for access control here in this facility. I will tell you we take 7 security here very seriously as we do your concerns. 8 The ID policies that we currently enforce for the most 9 part have been in place for six years since the 10 facility did open. We do normally review these 11 12 procedures annually. That review process is not just 13 security. It involves representatives of the Detroit 14 Police Department, Detroit Fire Department. Michigan 15 State Police do it; Detroit Building Authority, 16 Property Management.

17 Anyone who has some say in how we operate in this facility we invite you to participate. We are 18 19 considered critical infrastructure and under the Patriot Act are required to identify personnel entering 20 this facility. Also, based on the nature of this 21 facility, we are governed by what's called CJIS, 22 23 Criminal Justice Information Security, protocol and I'll give you a little security procedure. It's not 24 very thick. 25



We're required under that to also identify, 1 and that's under the U.S. Department of Justice and the 2 3 Federal Bureau of Investigation, we're required to identify everyone coming into this facility; so to put 4 this in a little bit of a bind with respect to the Open 5 Meetings Act. But I will tell you even in this 6 facility uniformed police officers and firefighters 7 that access this facility are required to show photo 8 identification whether they're in uniform or not. So 9 if they don't have a building badge we've issued they 10 have to show us typically their DPD ID cards, 11 12 credentials.

13 So we do not -- I want to make sure everybody understands that any information we obtain downstairs 14 15 when you sign in as a visitor is never ever shared with 16 the Board of Police Commissioners. No offense to these 17 folks. They're good people. But we don't share that information with anyone relative to the BOPC. That is 18 19 just for the internal use for this facility for security and just for security purposes only. No one 20 will ever ask you to show ID when you're upstairs 21 coming into the Michigan Room for the meeting. No one 2.2 23 will ask you to sign something to prove your identity. That would be a violation of the law. 2.4

We considered different locations. This is



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1 the venue for the meeting here. Downstairs is the entry point to this campus. This facility is a focal 2 3 point. It's no different than if you came to the Abbott Street facility or some other. We're going to 4 5 screen people and check IDs. That is basically the 6 protocol we follow. It's pretty short and simple and sweet but we do have other regulations federally that 7 we are mandated to comply with as well. 8 9 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioners, do you have any questions? 10 11 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes. CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Davis. 12 13 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: So I attend a lot of 14 stuff -- a number of things at the federal courts. I 15 never had to show my ID there. 16 MR. DAVIS: I can't speak to the Federal 17 Court. They don't run our security program. I can only speak to what we do here at this facility and what 18 19 rules we have to follow here. 20 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Who operates this building? 21 2.2 MR. DAVIS: As far as property management, 23 JLL. 2.4 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: And who operates the Coleman A. Young Building? 25



1	MR. DAVIS: I believe that's MYND Property
2	Management. It used to be. I don't work there either.
3	I believe that's MYND Property Management.
4	COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Okay.
5	MR. DAVIS: It's a different security. I
6	don't know what protocols they're following over there.
7	I do know we're obligated under the Patriot Act and
8	also under CJIS, again, our policies as far as what
9	security enforces is typically ruled once a year with
10	Detroit Police Detroit Fire and representatives who
11	come down and we ask all procedures and protocols who
12	have any issues or problems and we try to address those
13	to see if we can find a way to fix it.
14	COMMISSIONER DAVIS: So if you was in
15	violation of State Law would that effect some of your
16	decisions?
17	MR. DAVIS: I can't change our policy as
18	director. I can't just arbitrarily say yes he's
19	threatening me. I'm already told they wanted me
20	arrested but I'm here today, but I have to enforce what
21	we are obligated to enforce. I have to follow the
22	policies that are set forth for this facility. They're
23	not things I arbitrarily write down. This isn't Dan
24	Davis' policy. That's why we have a review process in
25	this building so that no one person is going to



arbitrarily write a bunch of rules and insist everyone
 follows those.

3 So security and safety of everyone in this building is paramount to me. It is my daily 4 5 consideration every time I come in here everything I do is predicated around the security of the people that 6 work here and the people that visit here. 7 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Madame Chair. 8 Commissioner Brown. 9 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: 10 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Mr. Davis, I quess what Commissioner Davis was eluding to was that 36 District 11 12 Court, Recorder's Court, City County Building has just 13 as much security personnel and things as any building 14 and no one is ever asked to submit or surrender any 15 type of ID to come in there. Only thing they're asked 16 to do is submit to some type of preliminary search; whether it is going through a metal detector. And the 17 only thing we're asking is on these days -- because I'm 18 19 of the opinion that we are in violation of the Open Meetings Act; how ever you stretch it. We are in 20 violation of it because you are asking people on this 21 22 particular day, even though it's a practice you do 23 every day, that on this day we're asking you what is the problem. They can go no further than this third 24 25 floor. They can go no further than this third floor.



If they come in this building, come in this meeting,
 they're still being asked to surrender ID and if they
 don't have it they're being turned away. The
 responsibility of that falls on us.

5 MR. DAVIS: I can't speak to whether other 6 facilities if they fall under the Patriot Act or CJIS rights. I know we do so we are obligated to follow the 7 protocol that's outlined in this process. Background 8 checks, people being issued badges to identify people 9 that enter the facility. That's what we follow. 10 So with respect to people not being able to go any further 11 12 in the building that's not necessarily true. We have 13 had people try to breach the facility. I don't want to 14 be in, I'm going to BOPC meeting. You can't check my ID. And then they try to access our facility and find 15 16 a way to piggy back into the building in some other wav. We can't watch everybody 24/7. It's just not 17 possible for our staff. 18

19 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Is it possible that the 20 screening process is set up in addition to what you 21 have downstairs can be moved to the third floor on 22 Thursdays as a preliminary check for people coming into 23 the building?

24 MR. DAVIS: If we move the process and 25 identify people here now we're violating the law. If I



check your ID at the door I'm clearly in violation of
 the Public Meetings Act. I'm checking your ID to enter
 the facility.

If a police officer stops you in the parking 4 lot you can't say well I'm here. I'm going to BOPC 5 6 meeting. I don't have to show you my ID. You still 7 have to show the officer your ID. We're checking IDs for people entering the facility, the campus, 8 irrespective of where they're going in the building. 9 We don't care if it's the BOPC meeting or something 10 That's not what we're trying to ascertain and 11 else. 12 that's not what the process is for.

13 COMMISSIONER BROWN: That's not really what I 14 was eluding to. If the problem is them getting past 15 the bathrooms maybe there can be a check point for 16 employees to go past that point. You can't group the 17 public in a group with employees coming into the building such as police and firefighters when they're 18 19 off duty because they're employees. They know they have to show ID to come into the building or go any 20 21 place else to get a pass.

What I'm saying is that if the problem is we think of people coming into and accessing the facility past this third floor can there be some other check point set up for employees to go through where they can



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1 scan their badges and come through on the third floor 2 just beyond that restroom right there and that way on 3 Thursdays when we meet here and the public wouldn't 4 have any issues. You're saying that the Federal 5 Patriot Act is trumping the State Law. That question 6 is where we're stuck at with your opinion of it. And what my opinion on it -- and early on I asked Madame 7 Chair if we could get the opinion of the Attorney 8 9 General who wrote a brief on the Open Meetings Act -that if we can't come to some amenable agreement that 10 maybe the public is right; that we need to move this 11 12 meeting to some other location.

13 MR. DAVIS: Thank you. I appreciate that. 14 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other questions? 15 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: I don't have a 16 question. I have a statement. Any building I've been 17 in in Detroit, 36th District Court, any place, I have had to show ID. I feel comfortable doing it. 18 I feel safe and I think it's a good thing. When I travel any 19 place I go in I have to use ID. You're not going to 20 sit there and tell me what I do. But I just want to 21 let you know that I feel safe and I'm glad that you 2.2 23 have to show ID.

CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other questions?
 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I have another question.



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Mr. Davis, how long do ya'll maintain to keep the records of the scanned information for individuals that's coming?

4 MR. DAVIS: Downstairs that was another issue 5 that popped up someone asked about. We had people who didn't want to have their ID cards scanned. 6 So we do 7 have a process where if someone asked us not to scan the ID we would just record the information, that kind 8 9 of thing, basic information. As long as we can verify it's them. We record the name. We don't have to 10 11 necessarily scan it, but as far as, honestly, I think 12 two years-

COMMISSIONER DAVIS: You keep it two years?
 MR. DAVIS: We get asked on other cases for
 information.

16 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other questions,17 Commissioner Davis?

18 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: That's it.

19 COMMISSIONER BELL: I just want to say 20 Mr. Davis, I have been coming to this building as an 21 elected official to the Board for six years and we all 22 should be security conscious about reality of what 23 we're dealing with not just in Detroit but in this 24 country. And I just want to appreciate the effort that 25 you go through to make everybody safe. And also-



1 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Commissioner Bell, this 2 is the public-3 COMMISSIONER BELL: Excuse me. I'm speaking, sir. 4 5 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You have to be 6 respectful. CHAIRPERSON CARTER: You don't have the 7 floor. 8 9 COMMISSIONER BELL: I just want to say as an elected official for the last six years when I'm in the 10 11 Coleman A. Young Building I have to show ID, which 12 consistently even prior to being an elected official I 13 have to show ID and go through the process. I just 14 want to say that we all -- I think majority of the 15 people want us to be safe and I think majority of the 16 commissioners have held accord that we want you to have a process where everybody is safe in the building 17 because that is an issue. But recently we know what 18 we're dealing with and now with reference to the whole 19 concern but basically hold. We can resolve the issue 20 but continue on unless we get a different ruling on 21 that but federal law is federal law. It supersedes 2.2 23 State law. I'm not the attorney. 2.4 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair. 25 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Burton.



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24 don't have to show ID there. I mean, I think that when 25 the public, you know, comes to our meeting, they listen



1 to this body for two hours, sometimes three hours or 2 whatever, just like they listen to us. We should 3 listen to them. They are the ones that making the 4 sacrifice arranging their schedule to come down here. 5 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other questions? 6 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Comment, Madame Chair. Just a comment that we live in the City of Detroit. 7 You hear almost every day of unexpected people that 8 9 come in a building and do mass shootings. I have no problem with showing my ID. I want to know who's in 10 the room with me and whether you're coming in here to 11 12 harm anybody in here, not us the Board, but you might 13 harm anybody. So what are you hiding that you can't 14 show your ID? What's wrong? Because of the violence 15 in this world. Think about that instead of yourself. 16 Thank you. Thank you, Madame Chair. Thank you, 17 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioners. Thank you, Mr. Davis. I think that the 18 subject warrants additional conversation and I think 19 that we will do that. Mr. Hicks, I also would like 20 21 something from the corporation counsel, an Opinion. Ιf 2.2 you could work that up for me, please. Thank you. 23 We're going to move on to the budget report from the DPD Fiscal Financial. 24

MR. NAZARKO: Good afternoon, Madame Chair.



25

1 Good afternoon, Board. Today I'm presenting to you four financial reports -- actually six. I added two 2 just before the meeting started. Unfortunately, I do 3 not have a Power Pointe; however, I will go over the 4 5 questions that the Board asked verbally and next I will 6 work on a Power Pointe presentation. The reason for not having one today is because the questions came 7 Tuesday afternoon and the reports that I provided to 8 9 you yesterday afternoon are hot off the press. Thev are coming from -- I opened it up yesterday because we 10 are in the process of closing the year. I wanted to 11 12 get as accurate information as possible to you.

I met with your Board CPA, I think it was a month ago, and we had a good conversation because my understanding is that the Board in the past has not been satisfied with the type of reports, financial reports, that you have been seeing so I tried to put together some reports, financial reports, that are useful to the Board and this is a work in progress.

As we move forward our work, again, with Ms. Johnson to see if she or the Board actually would like to be provided with different types of reports. I think that the change that I made this quarter should be a welcomed changed and should give you some information that probably again you did not have



1 before. There were several questions that were asked by the Board and I'll read the question and the 2 3 response. The first question when was your final budget 4 5 and revenues expenditures for the fiscal year 2018 and 6 2019. The total expenditure budget was approximately-7 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Excuse me. Can I 8 let them know it's in the packet? MR. NAZARKO: And I will point on the first 9 10 page number when response number one answer. The budget for the Police Department for fiscal year 2018 11 12 and 2019 across all the funds was \$321,681,000. When 13 you see the report on the second page it shows three 14 out of ten million dollars; however, the difference 15 between 310 million that is the general fund portion of 16 the expenditures. The 11 million dollars are grants and special revenue funds; namely, trading funds as we 17 call them and the E911 funds. So the total budget, 18 19 again, between the general fund and all grants and special revenue fund is \$321,681,000. 20 21 The revenues that the Police Department receives through various sources, but majority of them 2.2

from income tax and excise tax was budgeted to be 58 1/2 million dollars approximately; however, the number 24 25 I just got couple of hours ago it looks like the income

23



tax and the excise tax came to almost four million 1 dollars over that. So the final figure when I present 2 to you next time the final numbers for the year 2019 3 fiscal year that it will be the revenues will exceed 62 4 5 million dollars. The reason why we present or we give that figure the revenues is because we take the 6 7 revenues out of the expenditures and try to find the net cost of the Police Department. And in this case 8 9 the net cost of the Police Department was budgeted at 252 million dollars. However, the final figure will be 10 a little bit less than that. 11

12 Question number two was you had a question 13 about the revenues and expenditures that I presented to 14 you two months ago on the code ending March 31, 2019. Those figures -- I understand the confusion, however, 15 16 those figures are estimates; actuals and estimates. We 17 provide both but the budgeted figures are estimates because what we do at that time or what the budget 18 19 office does is kind of like evenly dividing the expenditures throughout the course of the year in four 20 21 quarters.

22 Unless we know of a major expenditure the 23 rest of them we kind of divide by four and give you 24 those expenditures budgeted for that particular 25 quarter. Needless to say, those expenditures have



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estimates at best they are different than what they end 1 up being. So I would not put a lot of weight on the 2 3 budgeted figures to see on the quarterly basis because, again, some expenditures tend to be even throughout the 4 5 year and some other expenditures tend to be happening in a particular point in time. For example, purchase 6 tasers the second quarter I believe of 2019 in the 7 amount of 4.4 million dollars and that expenditure 8 obviously did not make it to the third quarter. As a 9 matter of fact, when I render reports today they have 10 not booked that. It's in the budget but it has not 11 been booked in the general ledger. 12

So, just to give you a flavor, an idea as to 13 14 why some of those reports in the middle of the year are different, what is not cannot change and the report is 15 16 when we close the books and that was one of your other 17 questions. When we close the books around, I say mid October, but that's a little bit optimistic. October 18 19 is the end of October, mid November for sure, and at that time I will provide some figures to you about the 20 revenues and expenditures that will not change because 21 those are the figures that are stipulated and verified 2.2 by the auditors. 23

24 Question number three was how much receiving 25 grants for fiscal year 2019. Again, number three on



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1 the first page the grants were \$7,157,000 the fiscal year 2019. Question number four had to do with 2 3 forfeited funds. The revenues. The Federal forfeiture, the State forfeiture brought in \$689,000 in 4 forfeited funds and the federal forfeiture brought in 5 6 \$153,000. Now, this amount may change because, as I 7 say, we're in the process of recording -- there is a rule in recording. We receive nine days after the 8 close of the fiscal year, which the fiscal year ends on 9 June 30th. We may accrue and book references back to 10 2019 even if we get there by the end of September, in 11 12 some cases usually sixty days, but this not unusual 13 ninety days as well.

14 Ouestion number five had to do with amounts of overtime spent during the fiscal year 2018. 15 That 16 amount is 43.8 million dollars. Question number six 17 asked about towing revenue that we booked during the fiscal year and that amount is \$1,785,000. Keep in 18 19 mind that's the towing revenue in October 2018 so it's not a full year. And the last question was if the DPD 20 was unable to make the major purchases during the 21 2.2 fiscal year and my response to that was yes. Case in 23 point on the tasers in the amount 4.4 million dollars the report that I provided today to Ms. Johnson shows 24 that we were able to purchase 143 vehicles for the 25



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1 Police Department.

And, furthermore, two additional reports, and 2 3 the first one is on the last page of the packet you received that shows that DPD capitol improvements and 4 repairs and maintenance for the fiscal year 2019 5 provided by GSD and that amount is 2.8 million dollars. 6 And I from last meeting a few of the board members 7 asked me they want that broken down by district and 8 that's what you have on that sheet of paper. I broke 9 those expenses down by district. 10 11 Then today I received -- actually, yesterday 12 late afternoon -- I received one from the d/b/a and 13 d/b/a spent another 2.6 million dollars on capitol improvements and repair maintenance, which also in that 14 15 two-page report that was handed today is broken down by 16 place. The majority of that, as you can see, is on the 17 second page of the report -- actually, the first page. The full reports that I'm look forward to give you 18 19 every quarter and I'll add to that and a Power Point of 20 the budget versus actual grant funds available, forfeiture activity, and the DPD facilities cost by 21 location report just like the one that I included in 2.2 23 the package and summarized to you this afternoon. So with that, that ends the portion of my presentation and 24 25 I'd be happy to answer any questions.



1	CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioners, any				
2	questions?				
3	COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes.				
4	CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Davis.				
5	COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Question. Can you				
6	provide us with an executive summary? I know you do it				
7	for the general fund. Can you provide it for like say				
8	drug funds and forfeiture funds, an executive summary				
9	for those also?				
10	MR. NAZARKO: Through the Chair, executive				
11	summary meaning a narrative or just the numbers?				
12	COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Narrative and the				
13	numbers.				
14	MR. NAZARKO: The numbers are on the second				
15	page. General fund is on the second page of your				
16	packet.				
17	COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Can you also provide a				
18	narrative.				
19	MR. NAZARKO: Yes, I'll do that.				
20	COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Also, didn't the budget				
21	have like 20 million for overtime and you ended up				
22	allocating more? Did some additional money come in				
23	from somewhere?				
24	MR. NAZARKO: Actually, no additional money.				
25	Out of the ones that I told you about; the income tax				



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1 and the utility tax. However, the Department was short staffed. We had close to 150 vacancies throughout the 2 3 year, and the Chief can correct me if I'm wrong, and that amount, that high number of vacancies, caused 4 5 along with other factors, which I'm not going to go into those factors, but because of height number of 6 vacancies and other initiatives throughout the City, 7 the overtime tends to increase and be higher than under 8 9 normal circumstances when the Department is fully staffed. 10 So, to answer your question directly, is that 11 12 the savings from the vacancies were transferred into 13 the overtime amount that was exceeded the budget 14 amount. 15 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: So that came to over 20 16 million dollars? 17 MR. NAZARKO: Correct. COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Where is the tow 18 revenues posted at? 19 MR. NAZARAKO: Tow revenues for the fiscal 20 21 year 2019 is posted as a part of the general fund; 2.2 however, the physical year that we are currently now 23 2020 we are trying not -- trying but we are going to show a special revenue fund called towing fund and it 2.4 will be easier to identify and easier to provide those 25



1 reports to you. But remember, the towing as a process started late last year middle of the year and it was 2 3 all over. So we're trying to make improvements and segregate that for the rest of the funds. 4 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Also, last thing, can 5 6 you provide us with a grant schedule? I know it appears like received three million more than the 7 original budget. 8 9 MR. NAZARKO: Through the Chair, again, I do 10 have a detailed report on the grant and the grants are 11 by, let's say, a PA grant 2018/2019 it's a big report. 12 So I'll provide that to Ms. Johnson and she can, but I 13 do have the totals by the separate grants and it's 14 recorded. It's like 25 pages. 15 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Okay. Thank you. 16 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other questions, 17 Commissioners? Commissioner Dewaelsche. 18 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. This 19 report is very, very good. It's easy to read, very user friendly from what I can see. I just have some 20 questions and I want to be able to understand how to 21 read it but it is just a wonderful report. Thank you 22 23 so much. And so much detail that we have not gotten in 2.4 the past so thank you for that. I did have the 25 question, it's the year end report so it would be June



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1 30th; ending June 30th the fiscal year. But you did 2 indicate that it could be changed because you really 3 close out in ninety days after?

4 MR. NAZARKO: Yes.

5 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: So I just want to 6 understand that. And you also mentioned the grants. 7 You provided a separate listing of the grants and the 8 amounts. Where can I find that amount on this report? 9 I looked under grants and other revenues and it is 10 blank.

11 MR. NAZARKO: Because the grants and other 12 revenues on the second page you're looking only the general fund. So I provided only general fund. 13 The grant summary is on the other pages but not in that 14 15 format because do not come from the same. I will try, 16 however, in the future to provide you some type of 17 report that resembles the general fund that you see on Page 2 for the grants. But the more detail on the 18 19 grants, again, the 25 page report I referred earlier, 20 I'll provide it to Ms. Johnson this week.

21 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: So this one page 22 report that's the general fund and the difference 23 between the general fund or the expenditures and the 24 revenue is the police budget; is that what you were 25 trying to say?



1 MR. NAZARKO: The police budget entirely, yes, out of that 310. All of that is the general fund 2 3 and 11 million dollars are grants and special fund. 4 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: So that was the 5 question I had and I noticed in this report that one page summary, and I want to just understand how to read 6 it, that the revenues are down by about 3 million and 7 the expenses are down by 18.5 million-8 9 MR. NAZARKO: Not exactly. COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: -which accounts for 10 the variance of 12.5 million that you have listed? 11 12 MR. NAZARKO: Actually, the one that I'm 13 looking at, the column on the right, the second column 14 on the right, the total combined revenues and 15 expenditures is a difference of what 9.3 million 16 dollars if you look at the bottom number on the second column from the right. 17 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: What I'm looking at 18 19 is the variance budget versus actual year to date. And you have 31 million as a total for revenue. 20 Then you have 18.5 million as a total for expenditures. One is 21 a deficit. One is a positive, which came up to the 2.2 23 difference of about 12-

24 MR. NAZARKO: Yes. However, that amount does 25 not include the accruals and the final amount, which



1 again, is not final because we're still working on but it's more close to like nine and a half. 2 3 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: All right. And does the forfeiture fund net balance get rolled over 4 into the next fiscal year, the amount? 5 6 MR. NAZARKO: Yes. 7 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: So it's always added to the next fiscal year? 8 9 MR. NAZARKO: Yes. The unspent amount for forfeiture funds and other special revenue funds roles 10 over to the following year. The general fund does not. 11 12 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. So you also included as a supplement on the sheet that shows 13 14 d/b/a capitol improvements in the amount -- well, 15 various amount. Are those amounts included in the line 16 item general fund report under capitol improvements? 17 MR. NAZARKO: Most of them, yes, however, they are scattered around the various call centers are 18 19 what we call them depending on where they were budgeted. So majority of that should be on capitol 20 improvement, but some of those coming out from 21 different sources within that general fund or special 2.2 23 area funds or grant funds. 2.4 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: So when you do the DPD budget report or financial report and it looks like 25



1 this will we be able to pinpoint those line items once you do that or is it still going to be scattered? 2 3 MR. NAZARKO: It's still going to be 4 scattered and that report is a very condensed report so you're talking about 321 million dollars worth of 5 expenditures and thousands of line items that I 6 condensed into 25 or 30 lines. However, going forward, 7 if you do have a question, let's say that you say in 8 that 7th Precinct spent \$1,908,000, where did those 9 funds come from, and I can tell you the exact place 10 where that came from. But it's difficult to get all 11 12 this and kind of point to one account alone. 13 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: It's just that when 14 I read financial reports and I get supplements that 15 have amounts I like to match those amounts with the 16 financial report line item. That's how I read 17 financial reports. But then my final question is you also included a listing of vehicles that we had 18 19 acquired in fiscal year '19; it's 143 vehicles. Τs

20 there an amount that is tied to these vehicles shown in 21 the revenue section?

22 MR. NAZARKO: That's a good question. 23 Through the Chair, again, those vehicles were purchased 24 by City funds but not from the funds that I'm showing 25 you in the report because the fleet management comes



out of a different source. It's not part of the police budget; therefore, I don't have the amount but I can get it for you how much we paid for those vehicles. However, that number as you set apply that to the other reports does not tie anywhere in those reports that I presented.

7 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other questions,8 Commissioners?

9 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Madame Chair, I have a 10 question. I apologize. I had to step out and 11 apologize for my phone. Just one question concerning overtime and how this is being tracked and reported. I 12 13 know that some officers do secondary unemployment are 14 paid overtime. Is that paid through that or is it paid through a separate budget or is it all lumped into that 15 16 one sum? And maybe it's police recording the numbers. I know that we're reimbursed by that when those 17 officers are paying for those officers to be there. 18 19 MR. NAZARKO: My understanding is that

20 secondary employment gets paid through a different 21 source. So we build the company; however, I don't 22 think that goes to our books.

23 COMMISSIONER BROWN: So, you're saying that 24 our overtime that we spent, are these numbers that are 25 just here that are on duty in uniform get overtime?



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MR. NAZARKO: Yes. And secondary employment; whatever the officers earned at those places are fully reimbursed back to the City but has nothing to do with the expenditure that shows up. The expenditure you see is for City purposes only; not for other entities. CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other questions? COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, Madame Chair, a little housekeeping, sir. Did you indicate that you received these questions in the last 24 hours? MR. NAZARKO: No, actually on Tuesday. COMMISSIONER BELL: You need a little bit more time? MR. NAZARKO: I'd like a little bit more time; however, I was very pleased to receive those questions because at least I can prepare myself to answer and not go around. COMMISSIONER BELL: Good. T know sometimes there's a tendency for our staff to draft questions in a short period of time. I know we don't want to receive something last minute. I think it would be more appropriate if we know this is coming up,

especially the financial report, that we should be more diligent in reference to getting these questions out to you. I heard that before in reference to the Department reporting out we got late questions. I want



1 us to continue that -- cease that habit. I want -- I 2 appreciate you responding to them. As we go forward make the staff notice of that fact that we need to do 3 things in a little bit more timely manner because this 4 is something that's very crucial and I know we want the 5 answer because we was not even familiar with the 6 7 question too. So thank you. Thank you for a very 8 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: 9 thorough report and I am a visual person so I would appreciate at Power Point next time. 10 11 MR. NAZARKO: Work in progress. Thank you. 12 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: That would be good for 13 the audience too. 14 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: At this time we'll have 15 the monthly OCI Report from Dr. Polly McCalister. 16 DR. MCCALISTER: Good afternoon again. I will be giving you the July Office of the Chief 17 Investigator Report. So we started to keep the year 18 19 today as requested so for January to July from 20 --20 from 2018 to 2019 for CCRs filed within our office we 21 had an 87 percent increase which totaled 14 percent. For the CCRs closed from 2019 versus 2018 we had 124 2.2 23 increase as far as closures so that was a 21 percent 2.4 increase and CCRs that are pending which means cases 25 that are still open, we had a 7 percent decrease.



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1 And as always we have the chart that shows each precinct as far as how many complaints they 2 actually have so this is our chart that tells each 3 precinct each command what type of complaint they've 4 actually received as far as numbers. So the 5th and 5 the 8th Precinct actually have eight. 9th Precinct has 6 seven and the 2nd Precinct actually has six. And it's 7 always -- the unknowns are always high. 8

We're still trying to figure out a method to 9 reduce those and for the citizens complaints regarding 10 alleged use of profanity for June. We had five uses of 11 12 profanity and one use of the F word and two offensive 13 slurs. For July we had four uses of profanity and 14 three uses of the F word and four offensive slurs. Τf 15 you would like to know what those offensive slurs were 16 I can tell you after the meeting. And these are our citizens complaints that were closed for July 2019. 17 For procedure we had 82; demeanor, 53 and service was 18 19 26. As always , demeanor, procedure and service are always our highest categories. 20

And, then for our electronic evidence, 57 out of 678 incidents were captured on body worn camera. We had ten that were not. Out of the ten six complaints were filed after the ninety days and we were not able to pull the video. I think one was it extended over



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1 two years when they filed the complaint. We had one 2 complaint that came from a young man that was 3 incarcerated so we really weren't able to handle his 4 complaint.

And these are our DPD members by seniority 5 6 and rank for lieutenant. We had an increase by 2 complaints. For police officers we had an increase by 7 46. For detectives we had an increase by 7. And with 8 9 members who had 10 to 19 years on the job we increased by 3. Sworn members with 20 to 29 years up 15 and 10 11 sworn members with 30 years and up we increased by 6. 12 And in your packet it's not portrayed because it's 13 sensitive data on there. You have two reports from the 14 Disciplinary Unit regarding, I guess, the closure thing 15 for the officers that have been under investigation.

16 Mr. Hicks, I gave you a packet in case you 17 want to start keeping your own data. It's over there and I will give it to you after the meeting. It's June 18 19 and July. I have not received August yet but when I receive August I'll give it to you prior to the 20 21 meeting. But because the names of the officers are listed it won't be up on the screen. You have two 2.2 23 months worth for your review. If you look at it and you see there's some additional information you would 24 25 like captured let me know and we can sit down and



1	redraft how it looks for you.			
2	And how to file a complaint; you can either			
3	come by our office, you could call us, you can fax the			
4	information or you can access us on-line or you can go			
5	to any DPD precinct and file your complaint. Any			
б	questions?			
7	CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioners, questions			
8	for Dr. McCalister?			
9	COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Question as relates to			
10	the unknown.			
11	CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Davis.			
12	COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Question as relates to			
13	the unknowns, are those more prevalent in certain			
14	precincts or is it spread out evenly?			
15	DR. MCCALISTER: No precinct has any more			
16	than anybody else. It increases at different times.			
17	We don't have the ability to identify those officers so			
18	it goes under the unknown. No precinct is higher than			
19	the other.			
20	COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Okay. Good.			
21	CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other questions,			
22	Commissioners? Commissioner Dewaelsche.			
23	COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Yes.			
24	Dr. McCalister, as always, this is a great report. I			
25	like the visual. Very nice. I'm a little confused			



1	about the periods, however, that you're reporting and
2	here's why. We have a fiscal year of July through
3	June, and I don't know, but at some point I thought we
4	were reporting following that period when we report OCI
5	numbers. Are we not doing that anymore?
6	DR. MCCALISTER: We had a January to January.
7	When you requested the information you weren't here
8	that week. That's why we extended it to July.
9	COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: So when will you
10	start your new year of reporting? I guess that's my
11	question.
12	DR. MCCALISTER: January.
13	COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: So you went to a
14	calendar reporting is what you're saying?
15	DR. MCCALISTER: Yes.
16	COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Instead of a fiscal
17	year?
18	DR. MCCALISTER: Right. But we expanded it
19	to capture the information from last month and this
20	year just for the Commissioners that were not here.
21	COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Okay. And so I
22	guess if we're going to tie OCI Operations to our
23	finances I would think that we should use the period
24	that our fiscal year is. I could be wrong, but I would
25	think that that's what we would use as our new year of



numbers would begin July. That's what we do with our
 work.

All our reports are tied into the fiscal year. I can understand where you went from January to June because all the Commissioners are requesting different things. I can understand why that would happen but that's just my recommendation.

8 DR. MCCALISTER: We can switch that over. 9 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Because I would 10 like to know from one year to the next from July to 11 June tied through our budget how many complaints did we 12 have, how many were closed, how many were investigated, 13 all that, but tie it to our finances. That's my 14 recommendation.

15 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: I agree, because we also
 16 have to do our annual report, which is the fiscal year.
 17 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Burch.

18 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Thank you. You and I 19 have spoken before and I just want to reiterate to you again and see what you think, okay. Now, we receive a 20 lot of complaints about far as the demeanor of the 21 officers, you know, you're back and forth with the 2.2 citizens saying they disrespected them. So again, they 23 will say what about the body cam and all that kind of 24 thing. I thought of this idea; why not do like a 25



1	refresher when we have the new recruits that go out on
2	duty with the senior officer hopefully. And even
3	within a six-month period go to each precinct and just
4	have a little gathering, friendly talk, and ask them
5	how they're doing.
6	Maybe that would help them curtail. I'm not
7	saying all officers do it because the citizens also
8	speak not kind, right. So just check with the officers
9	to see how they're feeling when they do that
10	face-to-face one-on-one with the citizens. Can we do
11	that?
12	DR. MCCALISTER: I know DPD sends out a
13	teletype of different types to address the demeanor and
14	procedure just as reminders for the staff and that
15	always helps.
16	COMMISSIONER BURCH: Can we do a pallet at
17	number 11 and just try it out?
18	DR. MCCALISTER: Sure, we can.
19	COMMISSIONER HOLT: Through the Chair, thank
20	you, Dr. McCalister. Here, though, with the 8th
21	Precinct the numbers went down, right?
22	COMMISSIONER BROWN: That's right.
23	DR. MCCALISTER: But they just had eight and
24	we do the highest ones.
25	COMMISSIONER HOLT: But it was 11.



1	COMMISSIONER BROWN: That excellent
2	leadership.
3	COMMISSIONER HOLT: Progress is progress.
4	Thank you.
5	CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other questions,
6	comments?
7	COMMISSIONER BROWN: Madame Chair.
8	CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Brown.
9	COMMISSIONER BROWN: My question is,
10	Dr. McCalister, thank you for reporting the numbers you
11	put up for us but have you how are you settling in
12	the building now? Do you have all the tools needed to
13	do your job? I know at one point you didn't have all
14	the audio visual equipment there for you guys to hold
15	your meetings and things like that. Has that been
16	resolved and the cameras outside of your building
17	for your personal securities? Has that been resolved?
18	DR. MCCALISTER: No. We're waiting. AC
19	White said they were in the works so it's in the
20	workings.
21	COMMISSIONER BROWN: Thank you.
22	COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.
23	CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Burton.
24	COMMISSIONER BURTON: So question for
25	Dr. Polly McCalister. I know prior to before you



1 arrived many of your investigators that are assigned to 2 your unit, a lot of them felt unsafe when they went out 3 in the community because their weapons was taken away from them way before your arrival. Are there been any 4 discussions about your investigators getting their 5 weapons back so they can, you know, for their safety 6 7 when they're out? Because that pepper spray, whatever they're using, you know, you know, as we go into Fall 8 9 that's going to, you know, it's going to be getting darker early. Police response time still a problem in 10 the City of Detroit, but more importantly you've got 11 12 investigators that are assigned to your unit. So for 13 their safety have there been any discussions on getting 14 them their weapons back?

15 DR. MCCALISTER: Yes. When Commissioner Bell 16 was the Chair we sent several letters to the Chief and 17 we talked about it. It was sent over to the Law 18 Department and it really has not been resolved because of the policy issues as far as different buildings. 19 What we do now is we go out in pairs and we do 20 canvassing during the day so there's no evening 21 canvassing. So we try to make it work. 2.2

CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other questions,
 Commissioners?

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COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, Madame Chair,



briefly. Dr. McCalister, what is the common denominator for seizures in terms of the numbers? Is there a basic thing that we can perhaps make the

4 Department aware in reference to this being an on-going 5 in the City to be rectified? Is that something that

6 you looked at?

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7 Yeah. DR. MCCALISTER: So the biggest issues with procedure is that one they may forget to give a 8 9 person back their driver's license. They may forget to -- like we just had one he left the guy's phone on top 10 of the car and when he pulled off it got broke. 11 So 12 small instances like that. And I think just a 13 refresher type will address it. We get a lot of 14 complaints about tows because citizens don't fully 15 understand when an officer can tow, why they're towing 16 my car. So it increases the procedure complaint level 17 but a lot of times they are in violation and sometimes 18 they're not.

19 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you.

20 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other questions,21 comments, Commissioners?

22 (None responded.)

23 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you,

24 Dr. McCalister. At this time any Standing Reports or

25 Ad hoc Committee?



(None responded.)

1

2 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: If not we'll move on to 3 the report from the Board Secretary.

Thank you, Madame Chair. I want 4 MR. HICKS: to call your attention to items that are already posted 5 on the Agenda. There were three items that had come 6 into the office. One of them of course that you've 7 mentioned in your Chair's Report was a recommendation 8 9 for appointments/promotions to the three command positions; deputy chief, commander and captain. 10 That information has been shared with the Board. 11

12 Secondly, we have received a use for the BOPC Subpoena and this involves a Force Investigation and 13 14 you have the case number in front of you. And then 15 lastly, we did receive yesterday, I think it was like 16 after 4 o'clock, Quarterly Reports from DPD Finance and that information was transmitted to you all 17 electronically and put into your packages Tuesday as 18 19 well. Unless there is a specific question from the Board that would conclude my report today. 20 21 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. Commissioners, any Old Business? 2.2

23 (None responded.)

24 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: New business.

25 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I have something for



1 Old Business.

2 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Go ahead.

3 COMMISSIONER BURTON: So question for the Chief under Old Business. Under the situation with 4 Corporal Officer Duane Jones, when the Board -- when it 5 was a hearing before the Board regarding Corporal 6 Officer Duane Jones I raised a question about video, 7 body worn cam, dashboard cam. The only video that we 8 saw was the hospital video as well as, I think there 9 may have been a video inside the patrol car, the scout 10 11 car.

12 When a -- in the near future -- not the near 13 future, but going forward, when a Commissioner raise 14 questions pertaining video, dashboard cam, body cam, is 15 the Department going to honor our request? Because 16 that was a question that was raised in closed session, 17 you know, that was raised at the table; where is the body cam? Where is the dashboard footage? There was 18 19 no dashboard footage shown. There was no body worn camera shown. Only -- it was only maybe two videos was 20 shown inside the hospital as well as inside the squad 21 2.2 car.

Also, we wanted to know, a question was raised, how many citizens complaints did the officer have. All of that information was kept hidden from



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Commissioners. So when Commissioners bring these
 questions going forward is our questions is going to be
 honored?

Through the Chair, I don't 4 CHIEF CRAIG: 5 disagree with you, Commissioner. In fact, I made a 6 point during my presentation there was information I 7 didn't have that I should have had so I could conduct a total review. And so one of the things that I've 8 9 directed professional standards that you, the Board, the Union and myself will get everything that we can 10 give you as long as it doesn't violate some CJIS issue. 11 12 But when we talk about video footage you should have 13 that. I should have it and the Union should have it. So going forward that is the direction. 14 15 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other Old Business? 16 (None responded.) CHAIRPERSON CARTER: 17 New business. New business. 18 COMMISSIONER DAVIS:

19 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Madame Chair.

20 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Yes.

21 COMMISSIONER BURCH: New Business. I want to 22 make this announcement for the 3rd District -- but 23 matter of fact, the first statement I'm going to make 24 is for all children. We know that our public schools 25 all schools are going to be opening this coming



1 Tuesday. We want to wish them the very best success 2 and a safe learning experience. I also want to ask 3 your help with Pershing High School. They need water. 4 So if you could drop by a case of water at Ryan and 7 5 Mile Pershing High School, that's this Tuesday. I 6 thank you.

7 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Question. I don't know 8 if it should go to the Chief or the HR Director. As 9 relates to the Detroit Public Schools I know at one 10 time we had like maybe three schools that was doing law 11 enforcement type activities and programs and stuff. I 12 understand its been reduced. Is it going to be an 13 effort to try to expand that?

14 CHIEF CRAIG: Through the Chair, it has been our commitment to do so. It was our idea to go into 15 16 the schools and start a law enforcement program as a mechanism for recruitment. We started with two. 17 One school decided to go in another direction. We still 18 19 have one, University Prep. We thought we had Cass 20 That didn't work out and so we are still very Tech. much interested in using that as a mechanism for 21 2.2 recruiting Detroiters.

23 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Okay. I'd like to see24 it expanded as much as possible.

25 CHIEF CRAIG: We could certainly use your



1	help if you're aware of a school.
2	COMMISSIONER DAVIS: In fact, I just talked
3	to Superintendent Vitti about that.
4	CHIEF CRAIG: If there's a school that's
5	interested we'll certainly support that.
6	COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Could I ask a
7	follow up question with relation to that? Chief, what
8	does the school have to commit to in order to be a
9	partner in that venture?
10	CHIEF CRAIG: Through the Chair, I don't have
11	the full details. It's really up to the school
12	administrator that we do a school. We don't control
13	that. That's a conversation between the school
14	administrator, the principal and the superintendent.
15	We make the offer like we did in the past and the
16	schools decide.
17	COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: I guess my question
18	is it would be space? It would be recruiting the
19	students? Would there be like times that the space
20	would have or is it a full day program?
21	CHIEF CRAIG: It's a full curriculum. We
22	call it Police Magnet. I hate to say the word Las
23	Angeles and it was very effective. So when we
24	thought about the LA model, which was a school in the
25	district, commanding officer was very effective.



1 That's why we brought it here. We got some interest. Again, it really comes down to the school administrator 2 3 saying yes this is what we're going to do. 4 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. 5 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Just to give a point of 6 information, it is space and also transportation. So DFD has to bring it over to service the space. I think 7 we have two kids now that was in the program that are 8 9 successfully on the Detroit Fire Department. And it's space and the Department will provide the instructors 10 11 and the training. They just need space and equipment. 12 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Thank you. 13 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other questions, 14 Commissioners? 15 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: I just wanted to ask 16 the Chief do we still have the old two schools that we 17 did a lot of recruiting from? CHIEF CRAIG: As I indicated, just one 18 19 school. 20 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Which school is that? 21 CHIEF CRAIG: University Prep. COMMISSIONER BROOKS: So we lost the other? 2.2 23 CHIEF CRAIG: The other thing is we staff it. Whenever we go into a school we staff the police 24 officers, which is no problem. We're committed to the 25



1 effort. It's just the school's decision.

2 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: This might not be the 3 time to ask this question, but I work with raising 4 money for students to get their driver's license-5 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I'm sorry. You didn't 6 have permission from the Chair.

7 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: I help to raise money 8 for the students to get driver's license. General 9 Motors gave us a ton of money. Does the Police 10 Foundation have that now or where did all that money 11 go?

12 CHIEF CRAIG: I'm pretty sure -- I don't know 13 who has it. I know we work with Drive to Thrive. We 14 also have candidates apply from the Police Department. 15 As you probably know, some candidates come and apply 16 without a driver's license. We help facilitate them 17 getting and obtaining their driver's license. We've 18 done that as well.

19 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Okay. I'm checking20 with the Police Foundation Board.

21 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Deputy Chief Bettison. 22 DEPUTY CHIEF BETTISON: The grant money 23 definitely went to the Detroit Public Safety Foundation 24 and the Thrive to Drive Foundation is still in effect 25 and very successful.



1 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other new business? 2 COMMISSIONER BURTON: New business, Madame 3 Chair.

CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Mr. Burton.

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5 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You know, in the past, 6 you know, its been an ongoing situation where many of Detroit citizens come down to the Board of Police 7 Commissioners and being turned away because they have 8 to show identification. So in order to for this body 9 to be in compliance, you know, I move that that we move 10 11 our meetings outside of Headquarters and move them to 12 the community and move them to the City County Building so this Board can operate in compliance but also show 13 14 respect to the community.

We've got members of the community comes down here each week and they hear us for two, three hours but we cannot hear them for two seconds. So -- but and they come here and they tell us every time that we are operating in violation of the Open Meetings Act. So, you know, I want the record to reflect that-

21 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Do you have a motion you 22 want to put on the record?

23 COMMISSIONER BURTON: That -- a motion is
24 about to be made.

25 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: What is the motion?



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1 COMMISSIONER BURTON: That I move that we 2 follow the Open Meetings Act, move our meetings outside of Headquarters, move them to the community or City 3 County Building so we can be operating accordingly to 4 5 the Open Meetings Act without asking citizens to show their ID during -- prior to entry. 6 7 COMMISSIONER BROWN: I second the motion. CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Its been moved and 8 9 supported that we-COMMISSIONER BURTON: And also call for 10 division of house record roll call vote, Madame Chair. 11 12 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: -move the meeting 13 outside of Detroit Public Safety Headquarters. Is 14 there any discussion? 15 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Through the Chair, 16 Commissioner Burton, when you talk about moving it down to the Coleman A. Young Municipal, that's going to pose 17 a problem, you are aware, as relates to parking? Are 18 19 there some specific locations that you think would be in line to support or to alleviate some of the concerns 20 we have about this building? 21 2.2 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You know, you know, we -- you know, if it's -- if it's move it over to CAYMC, 23 many Detroiters are using meters. You are parking at 24

25 meters. Parking is going to be an issue, but the



biggest problem right now is we have to be in compliance, and right now the Board is operating out of compliance. So we must operate accordingly to the City Charter, also to the Open Meetings Act, and we have to move these meetings from here.

6 CAYMC with the City County Building, that's a 7 opportunity where we can move into and have our meetings there. That's one opportunity -- not to say 8 9 that it is the ultimate opportunity, but we also have the Northwest Activity Center. We got Coleman Young 10 Recreation Centers. We have other facilities wouldn't 11 12 mind allowing this body to meet. We got -- what's the one -- what's the one on Warren and Conner? 13 The 14 Samaritan Center. There are other locations that this 15 body can meet, but right now we meeting in violation 16 and we cannot afford to continue to be operating like 17 this.

CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Do we have discussion? 18 19 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madame Chair, I don't think we can just casually approve a motion to move 20 anywhere. There are certain stipulations that we can't 21 2.2 just casually move into the Coleman Young Building 23 because we desire to move. There's a lot of issues financially. And the bottom line is I don't think, in 24 my opinion, that we are in violation of the Open 25



1 Meeting Act. That hasn't been determined. There is 2 research feasibility which you already asked for in 3 reference to that particular Act, Corporation Counsel Attorney General, but I don't think we can say that we 4 are in violation contrary to the Commissioner's 5 6 viewpoint on that. 7 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Madame Chair, real quick-8 COMMISSIONER BELL: I move for order. 9 The Commissioner has spoken two or three times on the 10 11 motion. 12 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Just real quick, I just 13 wanted to know-14 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: The vote on the matter 15 is if we are going to -- I'm sorry. Mr. Hicks, can you 16 repeat that, please. 17 MR. HICKS: The motion that's on the floor is that the Board move this meeting, meaning our regular 18 19 meetings, out of the Public Safety Headquarters to 20 another location within the City of Detroit to avoid conflict with the Open Meetings Act. 21 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those in favor of the 2.2 23 motion. COMMISSIONER BURTON: I did call for a 2.4 25 division of the house record roll call vote.



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1	COMMISSIONER BELL: That would not be
2	appropriate.
3	CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those in favor of the-
4	COMMISSIONER BURTON: No. Point of order.
5	Bell, you're speaking out of turn. You didn't get
6	recognized by the Chair.
7	COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: You didn't get
8	recognized.
9	COMMISSIONER BURTON: No, but I did put the
10	division of the house out there.
11	CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those in favor of the
12	vote.
13	(Three Commissioners voted by indicating
14	aye.)
15	CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed.
16	(The remainder of the Commissioners
17	voted by indicating nay.)
18	MR. HICKS: Madame Chair, motion fails.
19	CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.
20	COMMISSIONER BURTON: Madame Chair, when the
21	division of the house is called a record roll call vote
22	that must be honored, Madame Chair, according to
23	Robert's Rules.
24	CHAIRPERSON CARTER: I'm moving on to-
25	COMMISSIONER BURTON: You're in violation of



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1 the Robert's Rules, Madame Chair.

2 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: You were not 3 recognized, sir.

4 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You're not following5 Robert's Rules of Order.

6 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: We're going to move on. 7 I've already asked for an Opinion from the Legal 8 Department. I think that we should wait until we hear 9 from the Legal Department as to where we're going to 10 move or if we're going to move or if anything is going 11 forward. And, with that, we're moving on to 12 Announcements.

13 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Excuse me. May I speak? 14 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: We're going on to 15 Announcements. Our next meeting will be Thursday, 16 September 5, 2019 at 3 p.m. here at Detroit Public 17 Safety Headquarters located at 1301 Third Street. Our next community meeting will be Thursday, September 12, 18 19 2019 at 6:30 p.m. in the 4th Precinct at the Kennedy Recreation Center located at 2260 South Fort Street. 20 21 At this time we'll have Oral Communications from the audience. Please give your name and limit 2.2

23 your comments to two minutes and I have seven cards 24 here.

25

I'm going to ask that the three people that I



call come and have a seat on the first row. Actually,
 I'm going to call four. The first person can step to
 the microphone, which will be Bernice Smith, and I need
 Mr. Eric Blunt, Ms. Marie Thorton and Ms. Valerie Glenn
 to have a seat on the first row, please. Thank you.
 MS. SMITH: Good afternoon. I'm going to be

7 very brief as I am very bored and what they have been 8 talking for the last two hours you have taken enough 9 time to get it over with whatever you have to say. And 10 it's horrible that we have a Commissioner that 11 continues to keep this abreast going on and on and on 12 and I am very frustrated.

I have notified the Attorney, the Inspector General, in regards to what's going on at these meetings. Not only are they out of control, you have the audience that's out of control and you do not have any sergeant of arms that can take control and put these people out when they go off course.

Now, this is something that has been going on for the last three months and I think we should put a stop to it. We are very disgusted with what's going on at these meetings. We used to come here and it was quiet and consumed. We said what we had to say. That was the end of that. But since we have this Commissioner who has taken over every meeting, and I



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1 don't think that it's right, and I think we should put
2 a stop to it not next week, not next month but
3 immediately. I am tired of it.

We have other things to talk about when we 4 5 come to this meeting. I have the squatter situation 6 I've been dealing with. I've got the Police Chaplain Hope, she's doing a wonderful job and Sergeant Hewitt. 7 Those are things that involve the public and the people 8 in the neighborhoods; not this personal animosity 9 that's going back and forth with this Commissioner and 10 I'm sick and tired of it. I have a dope house that 11 12 I've been reporting. We have dope houses in this City. 13 You need to go and see what's going on in your 14 neighborhoods and help the people in the neighborhoods. 15 This is such petty -- it's petty what we're 16 doing down here and I don't see why the Commissioners 17 do not take advantage and do something about it and stop it. You need a sergeant at arms. That's what I 18

19 gotta say. Take care. Thank you. Chief, good luck to 20 you.

21 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Mr. Blunt.

MR. BLUNT: Good afternoon, Board and Chief. For the record, my name is Eric Blunt. Chief, I want to echo your compliment to me. I'll give it back to you. Thank you for meeting with concerned citizens



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regarding brutality against women. I thank you but at the same time the news article in today's newspaper was very fair, I think, in describing the fact that we agreed on very few points. It is what it is and we respected each other's opinion and moved on.

6 The thing that concerns me the most is Judge 7 Miller heavily leaned on the before and after of what the officer did; how nice he was before the attack took 8 9 place and how calm he was after the attack was over. This is an old diversion but it's in reverse. We've 10 seen it before when Stephen Clark (ph) was murdered. 11 12 The first thing they want to say was oh he was a vandal. And even going back to the most tragic one of 13 14 all is Travon Martin. As soon as he was murdered they 15 want to talk about his drug problem in high school.

No, the issue is what about the attack and what penalty and punishment should be had. As I left the meeting yesterday I did take a tour of the Real Time Crime Center. I'm still demanding that all people be treated equally. As long as people of color are unfortunately misidentified I will never stop complaining about this system.

Lastly, on the financials; the tasers were bought in the third quarter but still not recorded. Is there some type of accrual method of accounting that's



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1 been violated? Thank you.

2 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Marie Thorton followed3 by Ms. Valerie Glenn.

MS. THORTON: For the record, my name is Marie Thorton and please consider this letter as my official request under the Michigan Freedom of Information Act for a copy of the budget report that was read today and that was presented in today's meeting. I'm going to make sure you have a copy of that.

11 I am what you call a court watcher so I'm 12 constantly in and out of 36th District Court. I'm also in and out of 3rd Circuit Court. And at no point have 13 I ever had to show ID. In fact, my son works for 14 15 Probate Court as a Wayne County Deputy Sheriff and I 16 never had to show ID in that particular Court. So when 17 I hear Commissioners saying that everywhere you go you show ID, that is a false statement and you should be 18 19 operating better than that.

I did write to the State Attorney General regarding violation of the Open Meetings Act. I take this very serious. I commend Commissioner Willie Burton for addressing the community concern and this is an issue that has now gone up to the State Attorney General for her opinion.



1 Also, I noticed yesterday and the day before that police officers are soliciting apartment managers 2 3 to participate in the Green Light Program. They're operating like they're sales people. Who assigned them 4 to go in and out of these buildings asking or 5 soliciting for that program and what is the cost? And 6 then my concern, Judge Greg Mathis assault -- alleged 7 assault, is that under investigation? And if so how? 8 I watched you all today. Chief Craig says crime is 9 down but I watch you all say it's up. That's why we 10 have to have everybody to show ID. Who's lying? Who's 11 12 telling the truth? And as far as Bernice, if Mr. Burton asked 59 times, make the same motion, he's 13 14 entitled to as an elected official. 15 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Thank you. Good afternoon. Valerie Glenn. 16 MS. GLENN: Several things. With the Detroit NACO 45th anniversary 17 meeting it's a \$600 cost associated with attending that 18 19 particular meeting. If you are volunteering it's 20 impossible to volunteer and actually participate and hear what's going on with the meeting. So I'm trying 21 to find out how we can get scholarships and be able to 22 23 attend that meeting as opposed to sitting outside and doing other things. 24

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Number two, the ID situation is unheard of.



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1 We definitely need to make sure that people don't need to show State issued ID. That's an income situation. 2 3 Number three, Ms. Bernice Smith needs to quit. Now, it's about time that all of you, every last one of you, 4 5 stop having her talk about Mr. Burton, stop having her talk about those of us that's in the community. It's 6 7 disrespectful. You can stop looking over there too because that's disrespectful. 8

You looked at her as if you were trying to 9 figure out what I was saying. I don't know your name. 10 I'm sorry. But the bottom line is she said that we 11 12 shouldn't be at the meeting. The last time I checked 13 everyone in here is a person that should be at the 14 meetings. Why have you allowed her to talk about 15 individuals? When she's been taken out of this meeting 16 she's not being escorted off the property because when we get downstairs she's still downstairs in the parking 17 lot, so that's ridiculous. Last but not least, I have 18 19 one other thing. Perimeters of the charter-

CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Your time is up, ma'am.
MS. GLENN: Thank you. Well, I guess my time
was probably of before I started to speak. Thank you.
CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Ms. Brenda Hill, Ms.
Faith and Ms. Joann Warwick.

25 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I want to personally



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1 say thank you, ma'am.

MS. HILL: My name is Brenda Hill. I want to 2 3 speak on the IDs as well. I paid about \$45 every three 4 years for an ID. I know I get the enhanced ID, but I 5 know that's a problem for some people. That's against Open Meetings Act to ask for ID. We can just simply 6 7 move these meetings. Put it in the budget if there's a cost to have those meetings elsewhere. Every citizen 8 of this City should be allowed to be at a public 9 meeting, which it is. 10

11 I don't have a problem with the building 12 manager saying what they need to come in this building. 13 What we need to do is not be in this building for this 14 meeting. Also, they need to post what they need 15 downstairs. That's against the Patriot Act and they 16 don't have that posted. And the guard down there is 17 very nasty. He's very nasty. He doesn't like us asking for IDs not to be scanned or any questions. And 18 19 last week he took my ID and wrote down my name and my 20 driver's license number on a business card. Where does that go? Somebody could have my information and think 21 they're me. So I have a problem with that. 22

I wonder if the neighborhood police officers could help with the dog situation while they're out and about. Maybe the dogs that are outside, inquire if



they're registered or not, let us know. If they can help Animal Control. Animal control has an issue. I got 30 seconds.

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I was on Let It Rip last night and Nasser 4 Beydoun, one of the architects of the Green Light 5 Program, stated he is not for facial recognition. He's 6 7 for Green Light but not for facial recognition technology as I am not for facial recognition 8 technology. I think that's a big deal that one of the 9 architects of the Green Light Program is against facial 10 recognition technology as well. 11

12 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Ms. Faith followed by13 Ms. Joann Warwick.

14 MS. FAITH: Welcome to this honorable Board 15 and welcome to the audience as well. For the record, 16 my name is Ms. Faith and I have something that I wrote 17 yesterday and it's called Nine Months Crime Prevention question mark. My parents are addicted to drugs and 18 19 They're promiscuous, not celibate, but alcohol. 20 wandering from boutonnière and flower to boutonnière 21 and flour. Now I'm pregnant with half brothers and 2.2 sisters.

While my central nervous system is picking all this up and mom and dad are fussing and fighting over drugs, money, extra affairs on the side, and I'm



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the result of an affair, or they wouldn't have fussed over extra affairs beside the one I came from, or it would have been only one family tie and bond just for me.

5 Now I'm three months old inside mamma and the 6 doctor bills are increasing and we can't keep them paid. So daddy gets him a job selling drugs to support 7 my momma's and his and my drug and alcohol and gambling 8 habits to feed, clothe and shelter all of us. Now I'm 9 six months inside mamma and daddy decides this is too 10 much so in a stupor he vents on mamma and whips her 11 12 repeatedly. By this I'm learning violence to settle 13 any arguments without control. This causes me to wet 14 my pants in practice before ever born; and don't 15 mention disobedience and rebellion to authority. They 16 are two authorities over me. They can't teach-17 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Your time is up, ma'am. MS. FAITH: Okay. But this is what I was 18

19 thinking, we must protect our babies.

20 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Ms. Joann Warwick.

MS. WARWICK: Yes, my name is Joann Warwick. There were some mistakes made in the notes of August 8th. I was talking about the country of Norway that had a brutal dictatorship and now they changed around and they changed a prison into a shopping mall where



they held people in solitary confinement for long
 times.

3 Anyway, for the Open Meetings Act, if you want to have the meetings in this building then lobby 4 5 the Legislature to change the law. Again, about this policy of cutting off public comment, I think -- I find 6 it extremely disrespectful to the public. If you don't 7 want to listen to people for two minutes each please 8 resign. I do agree with the Commissioner's suggestion 9 about civility training. I think that's an excellent 10 11 idea.

12 Also, a lot of people need some training on the 1st Amendment and the 14th Amendment. Some people 13 14 don't seem to know the difference between the right to 15 protest and the right to petition Government for 16 redress of grievances. Also, deescalation; I think 17 everybody should be deescalating now, even the democrats with their rhetoric. I think we all need to 18 19 deescalate, get along and figure out how to survive on the planet and leave it safer for future generations. 20

Integrity and sufficiency. Wow, so I'm being prosecuted. The report does mention some of the officers that were there. There's supposedly only one body worn camera. There's missing evidence. They found a pill but where's the smashed pill bottle? It's



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1	evidence. It's evidence because it shows how hard the
	police officer throw me down . And when he made a
2	police officer threw me down. And when he made a
3	comment about that in the detention facility the police
4	officer went and took it over and put it with the
5	medical marijuana. He doesn't even mention, okay, it
6	said medical. Most people understand that as medical.
7	So there's missing evidence, folks. So how am I
8	supposed to trust the police force when these kinds of
9	things are going on?
10	CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. At this time
11	we're going to hear from Mark Young.
12	COMMISSIONER BELL: Mark, I apologize. I
13	know I promised you early on. I know you came
14	prepared. Thank you.
15	COMMISSIONER BURTON: Did he get permission
16	from the Chair?
17	MR. YOUNG: First of all, I'd like to thank
18	you Commissioner Carter and the Board of Police
19	Commissioners and of course Chief Craig. I appreciate
20	you guys. I'll be brief. I have a tremendous respect
21	for each one of you individuals and your oversight
22	role. I have attended many, many meetings at the Board
23	of Police Commissioners, and while I sat in the back I
24	tried not to disturb anybody and I tried to listen and
25	be a partnership in the great efforts of our Department



and our great city and I respect everybody's opinion and I've never disrespected anybody's opinion and I have an opinion on facial recognition or the men and women that I represent.

While I have listened over the last few 5 6 months I've heard some very valid points and the safeguard civil rights of all is important. 7 In fact, they're so important that the men and women that I 8 9 represent risk their lives and give their lives for that very cause. I wholeheartedly support facial 10 recognition on behalf of the men and women that I 11 12 represent. The criminal element is evolving. 13 Criminals are so bold they no longer wear masks nor do 14 they fear police or prosecution.

15 We send law enforcement out to combat crime 16 all the while we handcuff them and lay kryptonite at 17 their very feet. The men and women at the Department care deeply about this great City. They care so much 18 19 that they hurt when they can't bring justice to an individual that they're serving. They care so much 20 that on the walls of Lansing the newly Michigan Law 21 Enforcement Officers Memorial, that's where 588 names 2.2 are on their panels, over half of them are members of 23 the Detroit Police Department. 24

25

While facial recognition is a reality of our



1 world that's not going to change, it's not the end all of all and we don't claim it to be. In my 32 years on 2 3 the Department we lacked a lot of technology. Now we're on the cutting edge. I'm not naive and I 4 5 understand that this is not perfect nor was it meant to 6 This we can agree and what we should be working on be. is the policy to make sure that no violations are made. 7 I know of no law enforcement officer who wants to see 8 9 someone unjustly prosecuted or incarcerated. I know of no one that wants that. But many law enforcement 10 officers are devastated and frustrated that they cannot 11 12 bring justice to victims.

13 I heard someone state during one of the 14 meetings that our police are underpaid and a lack of 15 benefits that they deserve. I agree. And the use of 16 this technology and somewhere might help us reduce crime to make our City a great and safer place to live, 17 work, play and socialize while creating a stronger tax 18 19 base to be able to afford the men and women that I 20 represent better pay and benefits.

Lastly, I ask that everyone support the men and women of law enforcement not only for our department but everywhere. Technology is affording law enforcement the tools to help make society safe just like any other tools that we need to reduce the



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criminal element that seems to be embolden. We just
 want the deterrent. We just want to make it available
 to be a deterrent. Hopefully as a deterrent many
 individuals will not do the crime that they're doing
 knowing that this technology is available.

I'd also remind you all that the Prosecutor's 6 Office is demanding more than just testimony. And 7 while facial recognition is not an end to all means it 8 creates leads where there are none to afford those who 9 seek justice. I would like to remind everyone that 10 there's a criminal element that's out there that go to 11 12 work every day like we do. This issue is not going to 13 change, and if you were affected by a crime, instead of 14 being an adversary you would be an advocate if this facial technology software could help solve the crime 15 16 of the loss of your loved one.

17 I just got one more point. I'd like to thank you for allowing me to speak. I think that the voices 18 19 of men and women that go out here and risk their lives every day, and while we appreciate you Chief speaking 20 21 on our behalf, the men and women that's out there every day that risk their lives deserve every to bring the 2.2 23 citizens justice. What a lot of people don't 2.4 understand is that we too are devastated that they 25 cannot bring closure to people that are suffering every



1	day. Thank you. I appreciate you all.
2	COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Madame Chair, move
3	for adjournment.
4	COMMISSIONER BELL: Second that motion.
5	CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Its been moved and
б	supported that we adjourn. Those in favor.
7	(Several Commissioners responded by
8	indicating aye.)
9	CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed.
10	(None responded.)
11	CHAIRPERSON CARTER: We stand adjourned.

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
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
