5 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Good afternoon.
6 Welcome to the Board of Police Commissioners' weekly
7 meeting. My name is Lisa Carter, Chair of the
8 Commission, and I will be conducting the meeting
9 this afternoon.

10 On behalf of the board, for those of you
11 in attendance, thank you for joining us. And for
12 those of you viewing the meeting on your local cable
13 channel, thank you for joining us.

14 Commissioner Shirley Burch has asked to
15 be excused today, and today we have invited Chaplain
16 Gregory Wilson to provide the invocation.

17 CHAPLAIN WILSON: Father, first we want
18 to thank you before we ask you for anything, we want
19 to say thank you. Thank you for this day because it
20 truly is the day that you have made, and we're going
21 to rejoice and be glad in it. God, we thank you for
22 your love, your grace, your kindness and your mercy.
23 Now, God, we ask that you direct us now as we go
24 forth in this meeting. Bless every commissioner
25 that's on this board, bless every household that's

1 represented. Lord, you said in your Word that if we
2 acknowledge you in all our ways, you would direct
3 our path. Give us direction for the people of this
4 city; and, God, we'll give you praise and glory. We
5 ask this in your son, Jesus's, name.

6 ALL: Amen.

7 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, Chaplain
8 Wilson. At this time we're going to begin
9 introduction of the commissioners beginning to my
10 far right.

11 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Good afternoon.
12 William Davis, District 7.

13 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Good afternoon,
14 Elizabeth Brooks, At-Large.

15 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Eva Garza
16 Dewaelsche, At-Large. Good afternoon.

17 COMMISSIONER BELL: Willie Bell,
18 District 4.

19 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Good afternoon,
20 Jim Holley, At-Large.

21 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Good afternoon,
22 Darryl Brown, District 1.

23 MS. WHITE: Madam Chairperson, you have a
24 quorum.

25 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, ma'am.

1 Thank you, Commissioners.

2 Commissioners, you have before you the
3 agenda for February 27, 2020. Is there a motion for
4 approval?

5 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: So moved.

6 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Support.

7 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and
8 supported that we approve the agenda for
9 February 27, 2020. Is there any discussion? Those
10 in favor?

11 THE BOARD: Aye.

12 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed? The
13 motion carries.

14 Commissioners, you have before you the
15 minutes from February 20, 2020. Is there a motion
16 for approval?

17 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: So moved.

18 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Support.

19 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and
20 supported that we approve the minutes from
21 February 20, 2020. Is there any discussion? Those
22 in favor?

23 THE BOARD: Aye.

24 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed?

25 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Nay.

1 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Motion carries. At
2 this time, Ms. White, could you please introduce the
3 BOPC staff.

4 MS. WHITE: Thank you, Madam Chairperson.
5 Before I go into the BOPC staff, Sergeant Alan Quinn
6 is taping our meeting this evening, Media Services
7 is conducting our audio and visual, and Ms. Theresa
8 Roberts is our court reporter this afternoon. And
9 starting to my immediate right I will ask the entire
10 board staff to stand and introduce themselves.

11 MR. WYRICK: Jermaine Wyrick, board
12 attorney.

13 MR. BROWN: Robert Brown, board staff.

14 MS. BLOSSOM: Teresa Blossom, community
15 relations.

16 MR. AKBAR: Supervising investigator
17 Lawrence Akbar, Office of the Chief Investigator.

18 MR. CROMWELL: Asa Cromwell, supervising
19 investigator, office of the chief investigator.

20 MS. ANDERSON: Dr. Marcella Anderson,
21 director of police personnel.

22 MR. CALLAWAY: Investigator Daniel
23 Callaway, Office of the Chief Investigator.

24 MS. STEWART: Investigator Tiffany
25 Steward, Office of the Chief Investigator.

1 MS. WHITE: Thank you, Madam Chairperson.

2 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. At this
3 time I'd like to introduce Deputy Chief Marlon
4 Wilson, who is sitting in for the chief.

5 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Thank you.

6 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Good afternoon.

7 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Good afternoon.

8 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you for
9 joining us and any staff that you want to introduce,
10 have themselves introduce.

11 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: I'll start on my
12 left with my legal advisor, D.C. Ha.

13 MR. HA: Grant Ha.

14 CAPTAIN SADAKA: Captain Sadaka,
15 communications operations.

16 CAPTAIN TOSQUI: Aric Tosqui, captain in
17 the crime intelligence unit.

18 LIEUTENANT WILLIAMS: Lieutenant
19 Williams, communications.

20 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: And we have Mark
21 Young in the back. Mark, if you could stand up.

22 MR. YOUNG: Mark Young, president of the
23 Lieutenants and Sergeants Association.

24 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. Is that
25 everybody?

1 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: If I can
2 acknowledge the DPOA, as well.

3 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay.

4 MR. THOMAS: Ron Thomas, vice president
5 of DPOA.

6 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. At this
7 time if there are any elected officials or
8 representatives, please stand and give your name for
9 the record, please.

10 MR. TENNEL: Brian Tennel representing
11 councilman Roy McCallister, second district.

12 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. Any
13 civic leaders or their representatives, as well?
14 Hearing none. Right on to the agenda to my report.

15 As we do every week, on behalf of the
16 board I want to express the board's concern and
17 support for fallen and injured officers and their
18 families. Officer safety and citizen's protection
19 are ranked as two of the most important priorities
20 of the board. Our board receives a weekly report
21 from the department listing injured officers, and I
22 ask that during your remarks, deputy chief, please
23 provide us with any updates during your report.

24 The Board of Police Commissioners meets
25 every week except for Thanksgiving and Christmas

1 holiday periods. We meet at police headquarters
2 every Thursday at 3 P.M. except the second Thursday
3 of the month when we meet in the community at 6:30
4 P.M.

5 Under the Detroit City Charter, Article
6 7, chapter 8, the Board of Police Commissioners is
7 empowered to provide civilian oversight and
8 supervisory control of the police department. Our
9 board investigates noncriminal citizens' complaints,
10 monitors department operations and works with the
11 mayor and the chief of police to establish police
12 policies, rules and regulations.

13 As an oversight agency the board has the
14 broad responsibility to protect the citizens,
15 protect the city of Detroit from frivolous lawsuits
16 and create policies to enforce strict adherence to
17 the department policies. Additionally, the board
18 works to eliminate police misconduct, discriminatory
19 police practices and unnecessary use of force by
20 police. The board also believes in transparency,
21 community input and accountability. As a civilian
22 oversight agency, we protect the rights of citizens.
23 Our objective is to increase the quality of life for
24 residents and visitors to Detroit.

25 Commissioners, there are several items of

1 importance for your consideration and information
2 today in your board package that was emailed to you
3 Tuesday, and that's in your packet today. On
4 Tuesday, February 25, 2020 we received a letter from
5 Chief Craig recommending the appointment to the rank
6 of commander for Captain Melissa Gardner. You
7 received a copy of the letter and the support
8 material in your Tuesday packet and in today's
9 packet. At the appropriate time I will request a
10 vote on this recommendation.

11 Today we will also honor and recognize
12 Commissioner Vice Chair Eva Garza Dewaelsche for the
13 hard work and endless contributions she has made to
14 this board and the Detroit Police Department and the
15 community. We thank her and truly appreciate her
16 voice and leadership to this oversight board locally
17 and abroad. We wish her continued success and
18 happiness, as you know -- and know that her work in
19 civilian oversight will continue. At the
20 appropriate time we will honor Commissioner
21 Dewaelsche. Also, prior to going into closed
22 session, we will have cake celebrating Commissioner
23 Dewaelsche, so please join us for the celebration.

24 I would also like to acknowledge that
25 this is the last board meeting during Black History

1 Month. All month we have shared stories, visions
2 and dreams that were both birthed and realized as
3 part of black history, American history. Marian
4 Wright Edelman, activist and president of the
5 Children's Defense Fund, once said "A lot of people
6 are waiting for Martin Luther King, Jr. or Mahatma
7 Gandhi to come back, but they are gone. We are it.
8 It is up to us; it is up to you." We are living
9 proof of this affirmation. We must continue to
10 honor those who chartered a path for us, those who
11 continue to pave the way and those who will continue
12 this legacy. Continue to honor and recognize those
13 who have made a significant contribution and impact
14 on your life.

15 On today's agenda we have one formal
16 presentation to the board, the budget report from
17 DPD fiscal, quarter two, 2019 to 2020. The board
18 will -- the report will be presented by DPD agency
19 CFO Mr. Nevrus Nazarko. The board received a copy
20 of the PowerPoint presentation yesterday, and a copy
21 is included in your packet today.

22 From the chief's office I am requesting
23 updates on city-wide crime statistics and any other
24 critical issues facing the department. I am also
25 requesting an update on the following: an update on

1 the Kenyel Brown case, the Green Light response time
2 at the gas station noted in the news this past week
3 and police response time, in general, and an update
4 on DPD's internal investigation on major violators
5 unit.

6 I want to also acknowledge the
7 department's recent administrative messages
8 previously discussed by some of the commissioners.
9 Teletype number 20-0088 recording of law enforcement
10 activity regarding photographing and filming members
11 conducting their official duties in public; and
12 teletype number 20-0097 reflash, digital proof of
13 insurance and registration allowing motorists to
14 present electronic verification of proof of
15 insurance and registration, which is allowed by
16 state law. Thank you for providing these updates
17 and reminders. I'm asking the department to share
18 any updates on these items.

19 I want to also highlight the department's
20 black history event held on yesterday celebrating
21 black history trailblazers. The community joined
22 the department in recognizing public servants of
23 Detroit who made monumental impacts on our
24 community. The honorees were former Wayne County
25 Clerk, Ms. Teola Hunter; Attorney Cornelius Pitts,

1 Legislative Sergeant-at-Arms; Mother Lilly Lester
2 and Community Educator, Dr. Curtis Ivery. This was
3 a historical event. Thank you to Chief Craig and
4 for the staff for having this event, and
5 congratulations to all of the honorees. On behalf
6 of the board, Commissioner Willie Bell attended this
7 event and provided remarks.

8 Today from our interim board secretary,
9 Ms. White will provide us with various updates
10 regarding incoming correspondence.

11 Immediately following any unfinished
12 business we will have public comments from the
13 audience. We have adjusted the agenda to move the
14 public comments in advance of our closed session
15 hearing so that we might hear from the public.

16 Under new business we have the
17 correspondence from the chief of police, James
18 Craig, regarding the administrative leave without
19 pay but with medical benefits for Police Officer
20 Joseph Walker, badge 257 assigned to the 8th
21 Precinct and personnel matters concerning the
22 position of the interim chief investigator.
23 Afterwards, the board will return to the public
24 meeting after the closed session to vote on any
25 matters discussed during the closed session.

1 Also, I want to announce a few reminders.
2 Under the BOPC bylaws, Article 12, Conduct of
3 Meetings, subsection (B), the City of Detroit BOPC
4 meetings shall be conducted in a professional,
5 courteous and respectful manner. Citizens,
6 commissioners and staff shall be allowed to state
7 their positions in an atmosphere free of slander,
8 threats of violence or the use of the BOPC as a
9 forum for politics. Sufficient warnings may be
10 given by the chair if at anytime during remarks and
11 in the event that any individual shall behave
12 unprofessionally or discourteously, the chair shall
13 cut off comment or further debate.

14 Every member of the BOPC designed to
15 speak shall address the chair upon recognition by
16 the presiding officer, shall confine their remarks
17 to the questions under debate. Commissioners shall
18 at all times avoid indecorous or improper language
19 or references to personalities.

20 For your convenience the office of the
21 chief investigator will have a citizens' complaint
22 table at every meeting to take citizens' complaints
23 from those persons interested in filing a citizen's
24 complaint regarding police -- alleged police
25 misconduct. You may visit the table and speak with

1 one of our OCI staff members for more information.

2 Again, we will move our public comments
3 earlier on the agenda. Please make sure that you
4 print your name on a speaker's card located on the
5 back table or from Mr. Brown, who is seated here at
6 the front; he will need your card before 4 P.M. We
7 will hold each speaker to the allotted two minutes.

8 At this time please place your cell
9 phones or other electronic devices on vibrate as to
10 not interrupt the meeting.

11 And, finally, in the spirit of effective
12 communication, please treat each other respectfully
13 and professionally. Commissioners, please be
14 reminded not to speak until you are recognized by
15 the Chair and address your comments to the issues
16 that are relevant on the agenda.

17 For the attending audience please note
18 there is time on the agenda for citizen input and
19 feedback. My objective this evening is to run an
20 orderly meeting, including public comments and to
21 adjourn at a reasonable time. Thank you. At this
22 time we will have the --

23 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Madam chairperson,
24 I'm sorry.

25 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Holley.

1 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: What does the word
2 I-N-D-E-C-O-R-O-U-S, what does that mean, so I make
3 sure that I'm going to be in compliance with this.
4 What is that?

5 MS. WHITE: Improper, through the chair,
6 the meaning of that word indecorous means improper.

7 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Why didn't you just
8 say improper? Thank you.

9 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: I'm going to
10 recognize Commissioner Burton who came in during my
11 report. And at this time we'll move to the
12 recommendation for appointment.

13 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair.

14 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Bell.

15 COMMISSIONER BELL: Recommendation for
16 appointment to the rank of commander for Captain
17 Melissa Gardner as outlined by Chief Craig in terms
18 of the memo we received a couple days ago, and we
19 have copies of it today, this afternoon. I move to
20 motion.

21 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHÉ: Support.

22 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and
23 supported that we approve the appointment to the
24 rank of commander, Captain Melissa Gardner. Is
25 there any discussion?

1 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Can I have her
2 stand up before we vote?

3 COMMISSIONER BELL: There's no
4 commercials. We have to vote on a resume.

5 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those in favor?

6 THE BOARD: Aye.

7 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed?

8 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: The motion carries.
9 Congratulations, Commander.

10 COMMANDER GARDNER: I want to say thank
11 you to the board for the approval for the promotion.
12 I also want to give thanks to Chief James E. Craig,
13 I know he is not here on tonight; and for Assistant
14 Chief Stair, as well as the rest of the executive
15 team, because I cannot stand here today -- just the
16 support. Those who know me know I take my job
17 seriously, but I still can't stand here today
18 without the support of my colleagues and the
19 commanding rank, as well as my staff that is here on
20 tonight.

21 I accept the honor and the position and
22 will work hard -- just as hard in the position that
23 I've just received, so thank you so much. And also
24 to my husband who I really don't get to see. He is
25 very supportive because I put in a lot of hours. We

1 do a lot of passing to and throw. And I'm still
2 married, so that's good. But again, thank you. And
3 I do accept it and will continue to work just as
4 hard. So again, thank you.

5 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, we are
6 just so proud of you, Commander, and good luck.

7 At this time we'll have the resolution
8 honoring Commissioner Eva Dewaelsche -- Garza
9 Dewaelsche. It's going to be read by Commissioner
10 Elizabeth Brooks.

11 COMMISSIONER BELL: I think we should
12 stand, Commissioners.

13 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: It saddens me, and
14 I'm also so glad that she was a police commissioner
15 when I came aboard. I was the only woman for years,
16 and I really am sad that she's leaving. But I know
17 that she's going on to greater things.

18 Resolution honoring Commissioner
19 Eva Garza Dewaelsche.

20 Whereas: Eva Garza Dewaelsche, a
21 life-long resident of the City of Detroit, was first
22 appointed by Mayor Dennis Archer on February 3,
23 1998, to serve on the Detroit Board of Police
24 Commissioners during the tenure of Police Chief
25 Isaiah McKinnon. On February 15, 2015, she was

1 appointed a second time by Mayor Michael Duggan; and

2 Whereas: Commissioner Garza Dewaelsche
3 was highly active in the community, yet immediately
4 embraced her responsibility to ensure accountability
5 and prove oversight to the Detroit Police
6 Department; and

7 Whereas: Commissioner Garza Dewaelsche
8 going above beyond the call of duty served as the
9 board's chairperson, vice chairperson, while serving
10 on several board committees which included,
11 citizens' complaints, disciplinary appeal, personnel
12 and training and budget; and

13 Whereas: Commissioner Garza Dewaelsche
14 upheld her responsibility to the board
15 simultaneously with her professional duties as
16 Director of Education of SER Metro Detroit and in
17 recent years as Chief Executive Officer of the
18 non-profit organization which provides adult
19 programming, education, occupational skill and
20 vocational training, youth programs and academy
21 enriched tutoring, mentoring, leadership development
22 and career guidance and counseling. Holding a
23 Bachelor of Arts in sociology and a master's degree
24 in education from Wayne State University,
25 Commissioner Garza Dewaelsche has devoted her entire

1 work to serving Detroit and its diverse population;
2 and

3 Whereas: Commissioner Garza Dewaelsche
4 continues to devote time to community organizations
5 such as the Detroit Economic Growth Corporation,
6 Detroit Public Television, Comerica Community
7 Development Advisory Committee, Wayne County
8 Community Development Entity, New Detroit, Wayne
9 State University Alumni Board and LA SED; and

10 Whereas: Commissioner Garza Dewaelsche
11 has received numerous local and national awards and
12 letters of recommendation from schools, churches,
13 organizations, corporations and businesses for her
14 remarkable civic contribution and leadership.
15 Always seen networking to better her community and
16 the city, Commissioner Garza Dewaelsche is loved and
17 highly respected by all those who know her; and

18 Now, therefore, let it be resolved:
19 That the Detroit Board of Police Commissioners,
20 speaking on behalf of the citizens of Detroit and
21 the Detroit Police Department recognizes and highly
22 honors the enduring dedication and public service of
23 Commissioner Eva Garza Dewaelsche. Her talent and
24 selflessness have proven to be an invaluable asset
25 to the City of Detroit. And be it further resolved

1 that the commissioners of this board thank and
2 congratulate you on your perseverance and
3 determination to promote the mission of the board
4 and the Detroit Police Department. We salute and
5 honor you, Commissioner Eva Garza Dewaelsche, the
6 Board of Police Commissioners.

7 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: So I'm going to
8 present this beautiful plaque, success with
9 significance, a testimonial of sincere appreciation
10 presented to Eva Garza Dewaelsche.

11 We honor you for your distinguished and
12 unselfish service given to the board with
13 outstanding leadership, vision and ability as vice
14 chairperson of the Detroit Board of Police
15 Commissioners, 2020 Detroit Board of Police
16 Commissioners presented to you. Thank you.

17 This is a beautiful plaque and it has a
18 picture of Susan B. Anthony, Rosa Parks and
19 Michelle Obama. And I ask all commissioners to
20 please come up so we can take a photo. Thank you.

21 (Photograph taken)

22 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: I just want to
23 say a few words. First of all, thank you so much
24 for that beautiful award. We actually saw it at
25 Reverend Holley's event that he had this past year,

1 and I just raved and raved about it and how I
2 thought it was the most beautiful award I had ever
3 seen, and now I'm just so honored to have one. I
4 feel just privileged.

5 I want to say that the nine years that I
6 have served on the police commission in two terms
7 have been an experience of a lifetime. I've learned
8 so much about the city, I've learned so much about
9 making the city safe, helping residents, the police
10 department, working within the police department and
11 outside of the police department to improve the
12 city; and it's just been an honor and a privilege.

13 I thank you for allowing me to have a
14 leadership role, all of you, because I was elected
15 by all of you, so thank you so much, and I hope I
16 made a difference.

17 I'm still going to continue to be
18 involved with police because I always have been. I
19 love law enforcement and everything that you do to
20 protect our city. So I'm going to stay involved
21 with my community relations meetings in my
22 neighborhood, which I've been attending
23 sporadically; but now I'm going to be there every
24 month.

25 But again, thank you. I appreciate every

1 single commissioner that's up here, because I've
2 learned something from every single one of you.
3 Thank you so much.

4 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, I move
5 that we accept the resolution for Commissioner Eva
6 Dewaelsche.

7 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I second.

8 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and
9 supported that we approve the resolution honoring
10 Eva Garza Dewaelsche. Is there any discussion?
11 Those in favor -- oh, I'm sorry.

12 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yeah, Madam Chair, I
13 just want to say that I had an opportunity to serve
14 as administration lieutenant of OCI when
15 Commissioner Eva Garza Dewaelsche was a
16 commissioner. So I worked for her and now I had an
17 opportunity to work with her, and she's just been
18 really a tireless worker and a person that advocate.
19 And she's also, I guess, a little well kept secret,
20 she is formerly DPD for a couple years, so she
21 understand law enforcement. And I just can't say
22 enough of her support for NACOLE when we needed help
23 and she came through financially to give us that
24 seed money to host NACOLE here in Detroit on our
25 45th.

1 So she's just really been outstanding. I
2 just wish her the best and her family the best and
3 God just continue to be with her and guide her. And
4 I just want to say it's been a pleasure.

5 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Thank you,
6 thank you so much.

7 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Brooks.

8 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Well, some of it
9 has been said, but as I said, we go back. We had a
10 business, our business worked with her business.
11 But the main thing I want to say, she doesn't know
12 but she's going to continue to help me to recruit.
13 And the article I read in the paper on recruiting,
14 we're seriously going ahead to recruit more
15 officers. The salary went up and we want more
16 people out on the streets. So people in the
17 communities don't have to say we don't have enough
18 officers. So whether you know it or not, you're
19 still on the -- you will still help us to recruit.
20 Thank you.

21 COMMISSIONER DEWAELESCHE: Thank you, I
22 will, definitely.

23 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those in favor?

24 THE BOARD: Aye.

25 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed? The

1 motion carries. Thank you, Commissioner Dewaelsche.

2 So at this time we'll have the Chief of
3 Police report.

4 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Thank you. I'll
5 start off with crime. I'll start off with the crime
6 of criminal homicides. Year to date we're showing
7 an 87 percent increase, we're currently showing 43
8 homicides. Sexual assaults, we're at 108 which is a
9 decrease of 20 percent. Aggravated assaults, we're
10 at 1,161 which is an 8 percent increase. Nonfatal
11 shootings, we're at 79 which is a 19 percent
12 increase. Robberies, we're at 334 which is a 17
13 percent increase. And carjackings, we're at 27
14 which is a 50 percent increase. For overall
15 increase of part one violent crimes of 8 percent.

16 Going over to property crimes. The crime
17 of burglary, we're at 813 which is a 15 percent
18 decrease. Larceny, we're at 1846 which is a 2
19 percent increase. Auto theft, we're at 897 which is
20 an 8.7 percent increase. Total property crime
21 overall is down 1.1 percent.

22 I move over to injured officers. We have
23 four officers that are currently at home recovering.
24 I'll start with Waldis Johnson, he's recovering from
25 a gunshot wound at a long-term care facility.

1 Officer Christopher Therssen is recovering from a
2 motorcycle accident, he's recovering at home.

3 Officer Phillippe Batoum-Bisse is recovering from a
4 gunshot wound at home. And Officer Mark Robbins is
5 recovering at home due to a motorcycle accident.

6 Upcoming events: The 9th Precinct is
7 hosting a police and pancakes in the community.
8 It's going to be at the Ford Resource and Engagement
9 Center at 1549 Maddelien Street. That's March 6th
10 of this year, and the hours are from 9:30 A.M. to
11 11:30 A.M.

12 I'll start with the responses to the
13 questions from the board. I'll start with the
14 update of suspect Kenyel Brown. He's currently
15 still receiving care at a local hospital due to a
16 self inflicted gunshot wound. As the chief stated
17 and what has been stated in the media, he's wanted
18 in connection with six fatal shootings, one nonfatal
19 shooting and two carjackings. Those incidents
20 occurred in River Rouge, Highland Park and Detroit.
21 He's been officially charged with one incident at
22 River Rouge where he was charged with the murder of
23 two individuals that he knew and nonfatally shooting
24 one other person.

25 Response time. I'm going to have D.C.

1 Fitzgerald come up and give us update for the
2 incident at 17100 Livernois. But as he's coming up,
3 I'll give an update on overall response time. This
4 is due mainly in part to the great work by Commander
5 Melissa Garner. Last week we were showing an
6 average response time of 10 minutes and 48 seconds.

7 DEPUTY CHIEF FITZGERALD: Yes, Charles
8 Fitzgerald, Deputy Chief for the record. The
9 response time to 17100 Livernois, the actual
10 response time was right around 12 minutes 17 seconds
11 from the time they took the call at 911 to the time
12 the first officers arrived. We have since made an
13 arrest at that location. We actually identified two
14 people; one person was not going to be charged, the
15 other one was charged with destruction of property
16 of over a thousand dollars.

17 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Thanks, D.C.
18 Fitzgerald. Next moving on to a recent teletype
19 that was issued regarding digital proof of
20 insurance. This teletype mainly was just
21 summarizing the fact that citizens can use their
22 phone as proof of insurance and registration. As we
23 know now, due to technology, most insurance
24 companies give you the ability to have your
25 insurance and registration digital on your cell

1 phone. So that was just a way of informing our
2 officers that they can take that as proof.

3 I'm going to have Director Graveline come
4 up and give us an update on major violator's
5 investigation.

6 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: Good afternoon. For
7 the record, Chris Graveline, Director of
8 Professional Standards, Detroit Police Department.
9 So we've been moving along with our investigation.
10 Specifically, what we're doing right now is
11 identifying as many potentially false affidavits as
12 possible. And I think what the board will see over
13 the next month is an increase in the speed at which
14 we were able to identify those. We're working on
15 about a half dozen right now that we think
16 potentially might be false affidavits. So we're
17 particularly interested in those because that might
18 lead directly to someone whose conviction might be
19 expunged or if they're in jail they might be able to
20 get out. So that's our focus right now.

21 We're hoping to have some good news to
22 report -- well, some fruits about our investigation,
23 I don't know if it's good news, some fruits about
24 our investigation, I don't know if it's good news.
25 Some fruits about our investigation to report out

1 within the next month or so. Barring any questions
2 about that from anyone?

3 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Holley.

4 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Commissioner Bell
5 mentioned when we started this, and he was talking
6 about the independence piece, but I'm okay with what
7 you report. I just want to make sure that I'm
8 listening to radio and I know -- I know radio, talk
9 shows and all. I just want to make sure that
10 because we represent the community, that somehow in
11 this report there is a qualifier or somebody to
12 validate, other than to state that this
13 investigation is what it is. Are you following me?

14 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: Yes, Commissioner.
15 And so through the Chair, I think what you'll see is
16 a final product here. First, we're working every
17 day with the FBI. The FBI is with us on a daily
18 basis conducting interviews, going through the
19 materials. So we're talking about the FBI.

20 We have had multiple conversation with
21 the U.S. Attorney's Office in this matter and
22 keeping them briefed up on it. They'll be a
23 decision maker in this before it's all said and
24 done.

25 We've been having conversations with the

1 Wayne County Prosecutor's Office. They're going to
2 be decision makers in this process before it's all
3 said and done. So we're working collaboratively
4 with everyone and on a daily basis.

5 So, right now, just to give the board a
6 little bit of a sense of what we're doing is, so
7 when we collected all these records back last
8 summer, what we're talking about is, we conduct
9 anywhere between 700 and 1,000 drug raids per year.
10 And we seized ten years of those records.

11 So, I mean, right there just off the rip,
12 that's 7,000 to 10,000 records. We had to find a
13 room big enough. It's actually over at our Detroit
14 Police Academy. But we have FBI agents with
15 computer drops there on a daily basis working with,
16 I believe at the last count we had nine DPD members
17 working on a daily basis. And so, between the FBI,
18 Michigan State Police and DPD, we have 17 people
19 actively working this investigation.

20 And so it's not just DPD, but we have FBI
21 actively involved and we've been regularly briefing
22 the U.S. Attorney's Office and the Wayne County
23 Prosecutor's Office.

24 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Just to kind of
25 follow up, does that answer your question, Teresa?

1 MS. BLOSSOM: Yes, sir.

2 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: That's what I'm
3 talking about. I guess at the end of the day when
4 we make the report to the community I'd really like
5 to have those people there, if it's okay with you.
6 You know, if you feel like it has some visibility.

7 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: I think what you're
8 going to see at the end of this investigation is;
9 one, there will be a report from DPD that will lay
10 out a lot of our findings in this. But I believe
11 the way the prosecutor's office usually announces
12 their findings or lack thereof is through charging
13 people or not charging people. So those speak
14 through their charges or their indictments more so
15 than maybe at a final press conference. But DPD
16 will and I'm sure our investigative partners will
17 minimally extend the offer for them to come and
18 talk, as well.

19 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Thank you much,
20 Chris.

21 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair.

22 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Bell.

23 COMMISSIONER BELL: I just want to say,
24 Commissioner Holley, we had in depth discussion with
25 Chief Craig and the director, the vice chair and the

1 chair. And I have full confidence that this matter
2 is now on -- I wouldn't say now been handled
3 correctly, but it was very informative. And I have
4 confidence in Chief Craig and the DPD and anything
5 involved to bring this to a thorough investigation.

6 So I retreat from my statement about a
7 month ago and I want to echo that publicly after
8 giving that type of briefing, observation, I have
9 full confidence in terms of how we handled the
10 matter.

11 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: I think what you
12 will see, as I stated before, you're going to see
13 increased activity coming here. With that many
14 records we need to take a couple months simply to
15 get it organized, put it into computer databases
16 that we can easily access and find something that
17 quickly.

18 And now that we're at that point, if
19 someone comes and asks us a question, we usually can
20 have an answer for them within an hour, as opposed
21 to going through boxes that might have taken us a
22 day when we first started this. We're getting to be
23 that fast, and so I think you're going to see a lot
24 of increased activity over the next month or two
25 months.

1 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Madam Chair.

2 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Brown.

3 COMMISSIONER BROWN: I know you guys are
4 doing a fantastic job. Are you going back ten
5 years, just only ten years?

6 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: Just ten years to
7 2009.

8 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Okay.

9 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: Now, I will say
10 this: I think what you'll see in a final report is,
11 there are incidents that happened through the years
12 at DPD that we will note through the years. But in
13 terms of going through the records and doing an
14 exhaustive search of the records, we went back to
15 2009. Now if there's something that we find in
16 2009, 2010 that leads us to believe that we have a
17 bigger problem systemically going back to 2008 or
18 2006, we'll go and get those records, as well.

19 The issue that we have, I think, is the
20 records that we went and received there were
21 basically for the last ten years. It's not as if we
22 left a whole bunch of file cabinets that said 1974
23 or 1984. That's what we had, was really that ten
24 years. So that's why we're focused on this last ten
25 years.

1 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other questions,
2 commissioners? Thank you.

3 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: The last two
4 responses that we'll provide to the board will come
5 from legal advisor, D.C. Grant Ha. And that's the
6 items of recovery damages for DPD scout cars. He's
7 going to provide the Board with an update and also
8 an update on the recent teletype regarding the
9 recording of police officers.

10 DEPUTY CHIEF HA: May it please the
11 board, Grant Ha. Some time last year the board
12 requested an update in regards to damages to the
13 Detroit Police Department scout cars and our
14 recovery efforts. I just wanted to give you an
15 update in regards to what we've recovered thus far,
16 year-to-date. Just to give you an idea of where it
17 began.

18 Back when I came in, in September of
19 2017, I attended a graduation in October of 2017 and
20 then Deputy Chief Elvin Barren reported to Chief
21 Craig that one of our scout cars had been struck by
22 a drunk driver. And Chief Craig had the vision to
23 start something to recover damages to our vehicles.

24 And as a result of that vision, in
25 collaboration with the law department, to date we've

1 been able to recover \$86,378. That does not mean --
2 there is an additional roughly \$200,000 that's
3 outstanding that has not been paid. Some of those
4 will go into litigation and we'll try to recover
5 that there in which case we are entitled to 12
6 percent interest and attorney fees, as well. So I'm
7 just letting you know in regards to our recovery
8 efforts.

9 Also, in collaboration with the 36th
10 District Court Prosecuting Attorneys, we've also
11 started getting restitution for instances where our
12 scout cars are damaged by drunk drivers. Then we,
13 as victims, are asking for restitution. In those
14 efforts we collected \$25,000 in regards to that.
15 Year to date we've collected \$20,336.70, and we're
16 just at the end of February. So I anticipate that
17 now we've got this process going it will be
18 seamlessly getting more recovery for the department.

19 In regards to the teletype of recording
20 for law enforcement activity, this is an activity
21 that began prominently on the west coast. And what
22 they are are self proclaimed first amendment
23 auditors. And they're individuals who walk around
24 with videotapes and they record the law enforcement
25 activities of law enforcement officers and under the

1 premise of the first amendment. And some may be
2 valid and some may arguably be there to get YouTube
3 likes and more hits and so forth.

4 Regardless of the fact the movement has
5 started to move inward into the Midwest from the
6 East Coast and the West Coast. And recently within
7 the past couple of weeks the department has had to
8 deal with these first amendment auditors, and there
9 was a need to get these teletype out in regards to
10 how they should handle them.

11 Just to give you an idea, just yesterday
12 I got an email from my counterpart in Tucson,
13 Arizona. And, unfortunately, these first amendment
14 auditors have taken it to extremes because there was
15 a case law that came down from our own Michigan
16 courts that indicated that flipping off an officer
17 was constitutionally protected under the first
18 amendment.

19 So now they've combined that with the
20 right to video record, and the video that I saw from
21 Tucson, Arizona was extremely disturbing. The two
22 individuals were using words that my first grade
23 teacher at McKinny Elementary School would have
24 rendered capital punishment back then. But I just
25 wanted the department to be prepared in regards to

1 these first amendment auditors.

2 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, I do
3 have two questions. How -- what's the process of
4 explaining to the public and the officer perhaps,
5 what is the proper distance? I understand you can't
6 interfere, but how do we sum it up to the public to
7 understand you can't be, you know, whether it be 6
8 feet, 12 feet or what is the reasonable span of --
9 How do we approach that?

10 DEPUTY CHIEF HA: So in terms of case law
11 there isn't a set distance in regards to what is a
12 safe distance. But if an officer can articulate, I
13 would recommend that the officer turn on their body
14 worn camera when dealing with these first amendment
15 auditors and articulate why the officer needs a safe
16 amount of distance.

17 I understand that you may have your first
18 amendment rights, but I don't know you. And it's
19 hard to deal with an individual in regards to either
20 as a victim or as a perpetrator of a crime; and I'm
21 trying to deal with it. I'd ask you to keep a safe
22 distance.

23 So long as the officer is able to
24 articulate what, in his or her mind, would be a safe
25 distance, I think that would be fine.

1 Again, under the constitution the officer
2 has an objectively reasonable standard in regards to
3 the totality of the circumstances, so long as the
4 officer articulates his or her position.

5 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you. I think
6 the OCI need to understand that issue in terms of
7 that definition, and we receive complaints in
8 reference to that. And we don't want to be citing
9 the officer if they're doing their job properly.

10 The second part of my concern, I think a
11 couple months ago I raised a concern about officers
12 utilizing their personal cell phone to take photos
13 of one's driver's license and insurance. That has
14 surfaced in terms of OCI complaints. So we haven't
15 got and response. Where are we with that response?

16 DEPUTY CHIEF HA: We just responded --

17 COMMISSIONER BELL: Well, you responded
18 to presenting, we accept their driver's license,
19 registration on their cell phone. I'm talking about
20 officers taking the opportunity, in terms of their
21 investigation, whatever, taking their phones out and
22 taking a shot of their driver's license, shooting my
23 driver's license. Do you understand my point now?

24 MS. WHITE: Through the Chair, if I may
25 add. The department did transmit the recent policy

1 directive on mobile communication devices. And so
2 the policy division is reviewing that policy item at
3 this time and plans to bring it before the board
4 within the next couple of weeks for your
5 consideration.

6 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

7 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you, thank you,
8 sir. And I appreciate that update.

9 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Madam Chair.

10 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Brown.

11 COMMISSIONER BROWN: I did see the video
12 one time, it was alarming to me. Is there any way
13 we could invest -- can we look into the laws like
14 the fire department, you know, we clearly mark the
15 sign that says keep back 500 feet. Do we need to
16 have that signage on police vehicles when they're
17 conducting investigation? Maybe we can get some
18 legal ramifications or laws passed to say this is a
19 safe distance for you to be back. I truly
20 understand. I watched that video, and I think the
21 female officer was very tolerant.

22 DEPUTY CHIEF HA: Extremely tolerant.

23 COMMISSIONER BROWN: If they had been any
24 place else they would have been arrested for it.
25 Disorderly conduct and things like that. But they

1 chose not to engage them. I just think that if it's
2 clearly defined, like on the back of all those fire
3 trucks, keep back 500 feet, if we could work on some
4 legislation to get something like that just to put
5 in the books so that the public knows that this is
6 your safe distance, move back. And secondly, how
7 are we with the incident we had a couple weeks ago?
8 Did we get the signs posted where authorized areas
9 only at all the precincts? How is that going?

10 DEPUTY CHIEF HA: There are multiple
11 layers of questions. Through the Chair, in regards
12 to the fire department, I have no actual knowledge
13 or rationale in regards to why it's 500 feet. I
14 would hope that they had some type of empirical data
15 and study in regards to why it's 500 feet. The
16 reason why I would hesitate to articulate the
17 specific distance for a police officer, as you would
18 understand, it's based on the totality of the
19 circumstances.

20 A distance in an open field may be
21 different than a distance in a crowded nature out in
22 the -- like during a festivity or some forth where
23 the officer is not able to control the environment.
24 So that's why I would not advocate a specific
25 distance and I do advocate again that the officer

1 should be able to articulate in the reports and for
2 the body worn camera the reasoning behind why they
3 are asking the individuals to keep a safe distance.

4 In regards to the signs, we did post some
5 signs and specifically in regards to restricted
6 areas. So in those restricted areas, an individual
7 has a legal right to take pictures of law
8 enforcement activities so long as they have a legal
9 right to be in that place. There are certain areas
10 that are restricted to an individual clearly because
11 of law enforcement -- the sensitivity of law
12 enforcement nature. There are criminal justice
13 information that citizens are not entitled to have
14 nor would they be entitled to it if they were to ask
15 for the documents through FOIA. And so for the
16 protection of the criminal justice information as
17 well as evidence, we've prohibited those cameras not
18 just for civilians but for DPD personnel sworn and
19 civilian personnel unless it's so authorized.

20 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, if you
21 will indulge me one more question. There is out
22 there on Facebook and in the community, I normally
23 don't pay attention to that, but it sort of
24 disturbed me at the state of the city there are
25 people advocating we had snipers on the building.

1 And I know in any major event, when whatever it is,
2 we have police officers. I can't say -- but I think
3 we need to say whatever we need to say in reference
4 to the sniper dialogue. I know we deploy officers
5 in different capacities there. They specifically,
6 like okay, I wouldn't a sniper.

7 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: I'm not familiar
8 with that, I'll have to take a look and I can bring
9 that back to the board.

10 COMMISSIONER BELL: Okay. Thank you.

11 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other questions,
12 commissioners? Thank you Mr. Ha.

13 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: With that, that
14 concludes my report. I'll be happy to answer any
15 questions.

16 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you Deputy
17 Chief. Any questions for Deputy Chief Wilson.

18 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes.

19 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Davis.

20 Oh, I'm sorry, before you ask that question.

21 Commissioner Annie Holt came in.

22 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Yes, thank you.

23 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you for

24 joining us. Commissioner Davis.

25 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Question, I don't

1 need no real super specific answer as to it relates
2 to what's going on now, but normally as it relates
3 to informants and do people normally check? Is
4 there a policy to check to make they're not
5 violating and not doing other things that they
6 shouldn't be doing?

7 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: I can speak through
8 the chair, I can speak specifically for Detroit,
9 yes, that is our policy to vet individuals. We run
10 their criminal history, we check to make sure that
11 they're not wanted for anything, we check them in
12 our criminal database so there is a vetting process,
13 we have a policy for that.

14 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Okay.

15 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other questions?
16 Thank you. At this time we'll move on to the
17 presentation to the board from the DPD, quarter 2
18 budget report.

19 MR. NAZARKO: Good afternoon Madam Chair,
20 Honorable Board. My name is Nevrus Nazarko and I'm
21 the agency CFO for the Detroit Police Department.
22 Today I will present to you the second quarter
23 budget review and other financial information which
24 is basically the period ending on December 31, 2019.

25 The reports that will be shown to you

1 today are the budget to actual revenue and expenses.
2 A detailed report was provided via the packet.
3 Grant funds available report is another report that
4 was in detail provided through that printout packet.
5 Then forfeiture funds, state forfeitures. DPD
6 facilities report, both GSD and DBA and the
7 quarterly active grants assessment report.

8 For the quarter ending on December 31,
9 2019, the amended budget on the revenue side is 23.5
10 million dollars. Now this represents the midpoint
11 of the revenues that we expect to collect for the
12 entire year. Same thing on the expenditure side,
13 the budget is 159.5 million dollars and that again
14 is one-half of the budget for the entire year.

15 The actuals for the second quarter amount
16 to, on the revenue side, close to 7 million dollars
17 and the expenditures to 162 million dollars. The
18 variance on the revenue side is because the major
19 source of revenue such as utility users tax and the
20 income tax are usually booked towards the third or
21 fourth quarter in the fiscal year, so that's why
22 there is discrepancy. However we expect the revenue
23 to meet the budget on the revenues.

24 On the expenditures side our
25 year-to-date actuals, as I said amount to 163

1 million dollars and that's a 4.4 million dollars
2 variance meaning that seemingly we have spent 4.4
3 million dollars more than the budget amount.
4 However, that is not the real case because some of
5 the expenditures, with the exception of personnel
6 and benefits, are accrued ahead of time before the
7 actual amount has been paid or the actual expense
8 has been incurred.

9 And case in point that could be the
10 rental agreements we have with the Michigan
11 Department of Corrections. We have a lease with
12 them that is a little bit over 8 million dollars a
13 year. However, at this point we probably have
14 accrued close to 6 million dollars so that's why
15 things like this are a little bit out of whack at
16 this point.

17 As I said earlier, the actuals compared
18 to the budget, again total revenues 7 million
19 dollars compared to the overall year of 60 million
20 dollars and the total budget for the entire year is
21 317.5 million dollars and total expenditures, the
22 actual year-to-date is 163 million dollars.

23 This shows the capital projects that DBA
24 is doing on behalf of the city of Detroit for the
25 police department. Only the two that are

1 highlighted there I was told by the DBA that are
2 active and that's the 8th police precinct work and
3 then some work remains, for example, in the chief
4 investigator's office.

5 On the GSD capital projects side, this
6 table represents the projects that are being
7 undertaken by the GSD. On the left-hand side we
8 show the facility that they work on, the contractor
9 who is doing the work, the contract amount and the
10 funding source. And the milestone phase shows where
11 are we in the construction or planning phase.

12 Then this other slide shows the DPD
13 vehicle purchases from the fleet department that
14 shows that the last quarter of the fiscal year, we
15 purchased 108 vehicles. And the operation that they
16 are working on, where deployed is under the
17 operations service. Also we have shown the amount
18 of money spent which is 5.6 million dollars for all
19 those vehicles, including the outfitting. And the
20 estimated deployment was given to me as 7-1-2020 but
21 I believe that some of them may be in service
22 earlier. Derrick Kazan can help me with that if
23 that is not correct.

24 On the forfeiture activity it shows on
25 top as a first quarter 2020, however that is not the

1 case. This is the second quarter so there is a typo
2 there. There was no federal forfeiture activity on
3 the state side. We have budget revenues of 2
4 million dollars and close to 4 million dollars in
5 budget expenditures. As of December 31, 2019, we
6 have brought in \$600,000 worth of revenues and have
7 spent \$889,000 on the expenditure side from the
8 state again, forfeiture activity.

9 On the grant side for the year 2019 we
10 brought in the total awards were -- amounted to 7.87
11 million dollars. The grant's office is doing a
12 great job in applying for more grants and on the
13 right side you see a couple or three grants that we
14 are in the process of, you know, the applications
15 are pending. That current score basically shows
16 that the grants department is doing a good job in
17 conjunction with the department to make sure that we
18 are complying with the grant requirements because
19 otherwise bad things can happen such as the grant
20 being discontinued or worse here, the money needs to
21 be paid back.

22 And that concludes my presentation. As I
23 said the more detailed budget information is given
24 to you via the print and I'll be happy to answer any
25 questions.

1 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Madam chair.

2 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Brown.

3 COMMISSIONER BROWN: A couple of
4 questions. Thank you for bringing that report,
5 update for us. Concerning the 8th Precinct, the
6 Real Time Crime Center, satellite office, are they
7 going to have on there -- the dollars that you have
8 budgeted there, is that including the updates and
9 the renovation of the annex across the street that's
10 right in the lot for the 8th Precinct? I get a lot
11 of questions about the development of that community
12 center that's under the guise of the Detroit Police
13 Department.

14 MR. NAZARKO: Is that the historical
15 library?

16 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Correct.

17 MR. NAZARKO: No, that does not include
18 it.

19 COMMISSIONER BROWN: That's just the
20 money for the Real Time Crime Center?

21 MR. NAZARKO: Yes.

22 COMMISSIONER BROWN: And secondly I know
23 that we approved dollars for the update and the
24 remodeling of the range. When are we expecting
25 those dollars to be spent or are there any plans in

1 the making right now that we execute or implement
2 before July?

3 MR. NAZARKO: I'm not sure if it's going
4 to happen before July. But as I indicated earlier,
5 again, through the Chair, I apologize, is that this
6 report shows the activity as of December 31st. So
7 if any planning or any dollars are committed to that
8 project, it would not show until the third quarter.

9 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Okay, thank you.

10 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Madam Chairperson.

11 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Holley.

12 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Thank you. It's
13 always appreciated, your report. I want you to know
14 that. Is it because of our history in terms of the
15 over spending you already know where you're going to
16 make it up at, that's the reason why you --

17 MR. NAZARKO: I don't think it's a
18 history more than the ability to follow the budget
19 day in and day out and week in and week out and work
20 closely with the chief's office to make sure all the
21 projects are on time and the budget is not over
22 spent.

23 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: And the other
24 question is, and this may be a different -- out of
25 your shop, you can just let me know. My concern is

1 we've got one of the biggest budgets of all of the
2 departments in the city of Detroit. My concern is
3 in terms of, do we, the police department involve,
4 in terms of the Detroiters, who gets the work in
5 terms of Detroiters? I know it's -- I've had to be
6 careful because I come from way back school but I
7 want to make sure I'm politically correct. For our
8 Detroiters? I know you can't say black now, but
9 Detroit. So I'm asking, do we, or is that comes out
10 of another shop?

11 And the other thing I'm concerned about,
12 have been, and Madam Chairperson if you can help me
13 with this. And that is this maybe somewhere down
14 the line that we can have some idea of who's getting
15 the money -- who's getting the work from the
16 stations that we got work going on, the fixing work.
17 We got a lot of, I mean, that's a lot of money here
18 and I want to make sure that -- I know you are too.
19 I'm not trying to say you're not doing it. I'd just
20 like to go to bed at night knowing that I'm doing my
21 job.

22 MR. NAZARKO: Through the chair, I
23 believe the Commissioner, you and I both attended
24 the State of the City and I believe that the Mayor's
25 direction is that more and more Detroiters have to

1 be awarded or will be awarded this type of stuff.
2 However the short response to that is that we have
3 centralized the procurement process in the city of
4 Detroit who is working under the chief financial
5 officer's office and I believe again, the direction
6 from the Mayor's office and I'm sure the Chief is
7 that as we move forward more and more of those
8 contract dollars will go to the city of Detroit --
9 of Detroiters.

10 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: So, I'm asking, can
11 you in the future just give us an idea of how this
12 money is spent with vendors? Is that something --
13 would you be concerned about that or should I be
14 concerned about that?

15 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: There is a
16 procurement process so I wouldn't be concerned with
17 how the money is spent.

18 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: She didn't convince
19 me. I'm just saying --

20 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam chair,
21 Commissioner Holley, that's beyond the scope of this
22 body here. Like you said, the Mayor and council
23 weigh in on those issues. They weigh in on those
24 issues heavily. That is in their ballpark.

25 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Okay. Thank you,

1 thank you very much.

2 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Madam Chair, I
3 have a question. With regard to the listing of the
4 grants, the document that you provided, probably the
5 third page there is and grant that's called PUB,
6 improving criminal justice responses to domestic
7 violence and there are no amounts and I was just
8 wondering was that left out or is --

9 MR. NAZARKO: Oh, on the sheet that I
10 gave you because I don't have that on the slide.

11 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Oh yeah, it's
12 the long sheet.

13 MR. NAZARKO: Yes, I'll check on it,
14 what's that called?

15 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: It's the 2020
16 grant. Oh, maybe you're applying for it.

17 MR. NAZARKO: Yes, some of them are in
18 the application phase.

19 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Oh, okay. So
20 there is no amount or anything but that's because
21 you're just applying. This is potential, okay,
22 thank you. Thank you.

23 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other questions,
24 commissioners? Thank you, sir.

25 MR. NAZARKO: Thank you.

1 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. At this
2 time we will have the report from the Interim Board
3 Secretary. Ms. White.

4 MS. WHITE: Thank you Madam chairperson,
5 Honorable Board, please refer to section 12 of your
6 agenda and section P of your booklet. The following
7 correspondence was received this week from the
8 department.

9 Number 1, the DPD facial recognition
10 report, number 17, the second item that was received
11 was a DPD fiscal PowerPoint presentation which you
12 just received for our quarter 2, 2020. The budget
13 to actual summary quarter 2, 2020. The budget to
14 actual detail, quarter 2, 2020, and the grant report
15 quarter 2, 2020 as part of the budget presentation.

16 And the last two items consist of
17 correspondence from five LSA and DPOA members, the
18 subject was restore Detroit police officers to the
19 ranks of sergeant with retroactive pay. And the
20 last item is the media request, the freedom of
21 information act request, A19-07986 from the ACLU
22 regarding facial recognition requests. And that
23 concludes our report at this time.

24 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you,
25 Ms. White. At this time commissioners, any

1 unfinished business?

2 That will move to oral communications
3 from the audience. Please give your name for the
4 record and limit your comments to two minutes.

5 Mr. Brown.

6 MR. BROWN: Madam Chair, I currently
7 have three cards. First speaker will be Ms. Fredia
8 Butler followed by Mr. Eric Blount and your last
9 speaker will be Ms. Michelle George.

10 MS. BUTLER: Good afternoon, Board. My
11 name is Fredia Butler I'm a community activist.
12 Commissioners, August 6, 2018 Officer Duane Jones
13 was seen on video beating a naked black mentally ill
14 female while another officer and others did very
15 little to stop them. Mr. Eric Blount and Mr. Scotty
16 Boman have addressed this issue before you several
17 times asking about if there was ever a clear answer
18 what discipline has or was taken.

19 I believe a member of the woman's family
20 has appeared before you. Commissioners, I believe
21 if the woman had been white, Officer Jones would not
22 have even thought to raise his hand to strike her.
23 People are arrested, fined and jailed for abusing
24 animals. And to add insult to injury, Officer Jones
25 has been considered for a promotion.

1 Who is in charge? Commissioners, that
2 kind of behavior exhibited by Officer Jones is the
3 kind of behavior our people suffered during our time
4 of enslavement. A study needs to be done to answer
5 the question whether rage, feeling inferior and self
6 hate has become a part of some of our DNA due to the
7 treatment of many of our ancestors received during
8 slavery. I have spoken to people who deny any
9 connection to Africa.

10 When I saw Officer Jones his behavior
11 brought to mind movies I have seen about slavery. I
12 quote from Sojourner Truth, a famous abolitionist,
13 ain't I a woman? Commissioners, when Mr. Gregory
14 Hicks was accused of giving Mr. Robert Brown a
15 raise, among other things, he was dismissed. I
16 wonder what process was used to dismiss him. Was he
17 given a fair hearing? Did Mayor Duggan fire
18 Mr. Hicks or did you? Another concern
19 commissioners, Willie Bell, why do you want to spend
20 our tax dollars for a national search for a
21 secretary when money should be used to employ
22 someone who lives in Detroit.

23 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you
24 Ms. Butler.

25 MS. BUTLER: One more sentence, please.

1 Do you believe that there is no qualified person in
2 the city of Detroit to fill that position, what
3 about us. Please read paragraph 2 again. Thank
4 you.

5 MR. BROWN: Mr. Blount.

6 MR. BLOUNT: Good afternoon Board and
7 Assistant Chief. For the record my name is Eric
8 Blount, a life-long Detroiter. Ms. Butler has
9 brought up my various concerns about Corporal Jones.
10 So we do need to know as an employee of this
11 department, is he still employed and what is his
12 legal criminal standings? As an employer, you have
13 to know that.

14 On the issue of these false affidavits,
15 not just as a proud black Catholic but as a
16 minister, I often -- in our mass there's a part of
17 the mass called the prayers of the faithful and I
18 pray for all of those in prison, the innocent and
19 the guilty. And I'm asking you to keep a keen eye,
20 that if these affidavits ever come back with any
21 false allegations, that not only are these prisoners
22 released, but they are given the \$50,000 a year they
23 are awarded by the state of Michigan.

24 I believe it was the state constitution
25 that was adjusted that all innocent convicts receive

1 \$50,000 a year. So I just ask that you keep a keen
2 eye to make sure this happens for them.

3 Again, as far as -- we list fallen and
4 injured officers but we also need to know the
5 suspensions, keep a running list of the suspensions.
6 You tell us when they happen. Keep a list of them
7 like you do fallen and injured officers and then and
8 maybe then we won't need to ask so many questions
9 about Corporal Jones or any other officers that have
10 been known or suspected of false doings. Thank you.

11 MR. BROWN: Ms. George.

12 MS. GEORGE: Good afternoon to Chair
13 Carter and this Honorable Board as well as Deputy
14 Chief Wilson. I just wanted to make a comment
15 concerning -- last week I did speak with someone --
16 still been trying to get with Craig Miller dealing
17 with Corporal Jones. I just made some suggestions
18 and I did speak with the sergeant of arms regarding
19 Corporal Jones. She told me off nicely, in a verbal
20 way. It was a good dialogue to make some
21 suggestions concerning Corporal Jones so hopefully
22 we can get some, you know, deal with some issues
23 with that in terms of suggestion.

24 Also I just came back from D.C. this past
25 -- the last few days and met with Senator Peters

1 trying to work on -- there were other issues that I
2 met with Senator Peters about but also dealing with
3 police salaries. So when I look at the budget and I
4 look at what's going on with the money for facial
5 recognition and all this other money, seem like when
6 there's negativity we can find money for that.

7 I did speak with the governors office,
8 hopefully to meet with someone in April in Lansing.
9 We're going to give police money -- this more money
10 because we try to do a mantra, men in blue, oh we
11 care about them but how about caring about them by
12 putting more money in their pocket for what they
13 have to deal with on a daily basis. I know last
14 week we talked about trauma. The average police
15 officer sees 188 incidents of PTSD.

16 So at least we can try -- we going to try
17 to get them more money, I already talked with the
18 governor's office, Mayor Duggan, city council, we're
19 going to come all together where the Detroit police
20 salaries should start at least \$55,000. So we're
21 going to try to get some legislation in. Senator
22 Peters gave me some suggestions as well but there's
23 some things we can do with giving police officers
24 more money. Because I think it's an insult, as a
25 public health nurse, I know how our salaries starts

1 as nurses. But I think it's an insult to start
2 Detroit police officers out -- I understand from
3 \$30,000 to \$42,000 and I know they put their lives
4 on the line everyday and they probably cussing under
5 their breath. But I'm just saying -- but I just
6 want you to know there's an advocate for them and
7 we're going to work on getting some legislation done
8 with that. Thank you.

9 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.
10 Commissioners, the next meeting will be Thursday,
11 March 5, 2020 at 3 P.M. here at the Detroit Public
12 Safety Headquarters located at 1301 Third Street.
13 Our next community meeting will be Thursday, March
14 12, 2020 at 6:30 P.M. at the Wayne County Community
15 College district Downtown campus at the Curtis L.
16 Ivery Downtown campus. The Frank Hayden Community
17 Room located on West Fort Street. At this time we
18 have new business, commissioners. And we are
19 scheduled to go into closed session.

20 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: So moved to go into
21 closed session.

22 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and
23 supported that we go into closed session to discuss
24 personnel matters. Is there any discussion? Those
25 in favor?

1 THE BOARD: Aye.

2 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed? The
3 motion carries.

4 At this time we will go into closed
5 session. Thank you for attending the meeting. If
6 you want to stick around, we will reconvene and vote
7 on any matters if necessary.

8 MS. WHITE: Madam Chair, excuse me, there
9 is cake in the back room.

10 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Oh, there is cake in
11 the back room in recognition for Commissioner
12 Dewaelsche. The public is invited, so have some
13 cake please.

14 (Closed session.)

15 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay, we're ready.

16 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam chair, I move
17 that we reconvene our board meeting.

18 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Support.

19 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and
20 supported that we reconvene our meeting. Is there
21 any discussion? Those in favor?

22 THE BOARD: Aye.

23 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed? The
24 motion carries. Commissioners, before we go into
25 what we need to vote on, I want to just answer a

1 couple of questions regarding Corporal Jones and
2 Deputy Chief Wilson.

3 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Wilson.

4 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. What is
5 the status of Corporal Jones at this time, if you
6 know?

7 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Through the Chair,
8 it's my understanding that his court case is still
9 going through appeal process. But I've just had
10 conversation with Director Graveline, so he can
11 provide us additional information.

12 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: Through the Chair,
13 yes, there has not been a conclusion as to Corporal
14 Jones' criminal appeal yet. So it's still pending
15 within the court system.

16 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay. Thank you.
17 And this board did vote to deny his promotion to
18 sergeant; is that correct?

19 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, ma'am, correct.

20 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay. Thank you. I
21 just wanted to update that stat. Okay,
22 commissioners, with regards to the Officer Joseph
23 Walker's request to change of duty status to
24 administrative leave without pay but with medical
25 benefits for Police Officer Joseph Walker.

1 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, I so
2 move that we move that he would be suspended on
3 administrative leave, follow recommendation of Chief
4 Craig.

5 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Support.

6 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and
7 supported that we follow the recommendation of Chief
8 Craig with the request for change of duty status to
9 administrative leave without pay but with medical
10 benefits for Police Officer Joseph Walker. Is there
11 any discussion? Those in favor?

12 THE BOARD: Aye.

13 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed?

14 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Nay.

15 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Motion carries. And
16 I'm sorry, commissioner -- the motion carries.

17 There was a point of clarification that we need from
18 someone who was in the room with regards to who in
19 the video stated that he --

20 MR. WYRICK: About the asthma. It was an
21 asthma question.

22 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: What was the
23 question? I'm sorry.

24 COMMISSIONER BURTON: So the question was
25 one of the officers made a statement that -- along

1 the lines that the gentleman said he had asthma and
2 he said something along the lines just paraphrasing;
3 no, you don't or no you don't or something along
4 those lines.

5 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Do you know who that
6 was, inspector? If you don't know, can you bring it
7 back to us, please?

8 MR. WYRICK: Yes, basically was it the
9 same person or was it a different person?

10 COMMISSIONER BURTON: We'll listen to the
11 video again. Sometimes with body worn cams it's
12 difficult to distinguish who is talking at times,
13 but we'll play it back and try and figure out where
14 in the conversation. Based on my memory of it, I
15 think it's not the person who did the choke hold, I
16 think it's someone else. But we'll be back and
17 we'll report back.

18 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, sir.
19 Commissioner Bell.

20 COMMISSIONER BELL: Oh, Commissioner
21 Dewaelsche.

22 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Madam chair, we
23 received -- upon the request of the board we
24 received a recommendation for the appointment to the
25 position of Interim Chief Investigator. And it was

1 from the board secretary after an extensive
2 evaluation, which included evaluation interview and
3 providing documents, back-up information for the
4 board. And with the assistance of Reverend Holley,
5 the recommendation is to appoint Lawrence Akbar to
6 the position of interim chief investigator, and
7 that's my motion.

8 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: So moved.

9 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Madam chair, that
10 motion is out of order.

11 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and
12 supported that we follow the recommendation and
13 appoint Mr. Akbar to the position of interim chief
14 investigator. Is there any discussion?

15 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yes, Madam Chair.

16 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Brown.

17 COMMISSIONER BROWN: As stated, this
18 motion is out of order. At the last meeting this
19 motion was voted on, it was approved in a four to
20 one margin. There was no motion to reconsider this
21 or anything as such, so the motion that we voted on
22 and approved last week should stand.

23 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Madam Chair.

24 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Burton.

25 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I call for a legal

1 opinion by the city of Detroit law department, as
2 well, and also the city inspector general to look
3 into this. Because what we seeing here is, we
4 seeing -- what we seeing here is that when
5 commissioners does take a vote and something pass,
6 they're not honoring the process, not honoring the
7 procedure. Even when we bring up something like
8 call for a record roll call vote, something as
9 simple as that is something that we ought to honor
10 as a public body for exercising our fiduciary
11 responsibilities.

12 But we cannot appear to be involved in
13 any form of improprieties or even look like we're
14 doing something wrong as a public body. So,
15 therefore, I call for a legal opinion from the city
16 of Detroit's law department and also the city
17 inspector general on this matter.

18 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam chair, I call
19 for the question.

20 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: The question is to
21 appoint interim -- appoint Mr. Akbar to the position
22 of interim chief investigator.

23 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Madam Chair, last
24 thing, last thing --

25 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those in favor of

1 the motion?

2 COMMISSIONERS HOLLEY, BELL, DEWAELSCHÉ,
3 BROOKS, HOLT, and CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Aye.

4 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed?

5 COMMISSIONERS BROWN, BURTON and DAVIS:
6 Nay.

7 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: The motion carries.

8 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Madam Chair.

9 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Burton.

10 COMMISSIONER BURTON: We voted on this
11 matter before, you know, just -- you know,
12 for everybody to know, we voted on this matter
13 before. And what the board is doing today by taking
14 up another vote is wrong. How can you all look in
15 the mirror, look at yourselves when you make
16 decisions like this? This goes against everything
17 that we should stand for as individuals. This is
18 not a fair process. This is not right. No one
19 had -- you know, we call for a legal opinion. We
20 looked at the video, how this was voted on just this
21 previous week and we make decisions like this today.

22 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Burton,
23 I think that the -- last week there was some
24 confusion and the vote was taken and the vote
25 passed. The vote failed for the -- Commissioner

1 Brown's vote failed, and there was another one to
2 accept the resignation and that vote passed. Today
3 we came in and we voted for an interim chief
4 investigator and everyone here, except for three,
5 the vote passed for the recommendation.

6 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Madam chair --

7 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: At this time --

8 COMMISSIONER BROWN: -- that motion did
9 not fail.

10 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: At this time --

11 COMMISSIONER BROWN: That recommendation
12 I made passed four to one.

13 COMMISSIONER BURTON: We can watch the
14 video right now.

15 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Right now we're
16 going to adjourn. Is there a motion to adjourn?

17 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, I so
18 move.

19 COMMISSIONER DEWAELSCHE: Support.

20 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and
21 supported that we adjourn. Is there any discussion?
22 Those in favor?

23 THE BOARD: Aye.

24 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed? The
25 motion carries. Have a good evening, everyone.
