5 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Good afternoon
6 everyone. Welcome to the -- good afternoon. Welcome to
7 the weekly board Board of Police Commissioners meeting,
8 virtual meeting. My name is Lisa Carter police
9 commissioner for District 6 chair of the board and I
10 will be conducting this afternoon's meeting. On behalf
11 of the board for those of you in attendance and viewing
12 this meeting on your government cable channel, thank you
13 for joining us this afternoon. Today we've invited
14 Chaplain Candice Morgan to provide the invocation.
15 Chaplain Morgan.

16 (Invocation given.)

17 SECRETARY WHITE: Madam Chairperson?

18 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Yes.

19 SECRETARY WHITE: Yes, okay, I believe the
20 chaplain has finished her prayer.

21 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay, thank you. At
22 this time we will -- Ms. White, can you call the roll,
23 please?

24 SECRETARY WHITE: Yes. Thank you, Madam
25 Chairperson. Madam Vice Chairperson Commissioner Holt?

1 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Her microphone is
2 muted.

3 SECRETARY WHITE: Okay we're un-muting --

4 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you. Yes, I'm
5 here. Commissioner Holt at large.

6 SECRETARY WHITE: Yes, ma'am. Commissioner
7 Bell.

8 COMMISSIONER BELL: Present.

9 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Brooks.

10 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Present.

11 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Burch?

12 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Here.

13 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Burton?

14 Commissioner Burton? Commissioner Brown? Commissioner
15 Brown?

16 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Microphone. He's muted
17 again. Try again.

18 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Brown? Okay,
19 I can circle back. Commissioner Davis?

20 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Present.

21 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Griffie?

22 Commissioner Griffie? Commissioner Holley?

23 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Present.

24 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Brown? Okay

25 I did hear Commissioner Brown earlier, Madam

1 Chairperson, but at this time you do have a quorum.

2 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, Ms. White.

3 At this time, Commissioners, you have before you the
4 agenda for April 7th, 2020. Is there a motion to
5 approve?

6 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: So moved.

7 COMMISSIONER BELL: Second.

8 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and
9 supported that we approve the agenda for May 7th, 2020.
10 Is there any discussion? Those in favor?

11 ALL: Aye.

12 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed? The
13 motion carries. You have before you the minutes from
14 April 30th, 2020. Is there a motion for approval?

15 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: So moved.

16 COMMISSIONER BELL: Second.

17 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and
18 supported that we approve the minutes from April 30th,
19 2020. Is there any discussion? Those in favor?

20 ALL: Aye.

21 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed? The
22 motion carries. Thank you, Commissioners. At this time
23 Ms. White, would you please introduce the rest of the
24 BOPC staff.

25 SECRETARY WHITE: Yes, thank you, Madam

1 Chairperson Carter. The following includes the board
2 staff introduction and just before I go to that our
3 court reporter this afternoon is Mrs. Caitlyn Hartley
4 and the Department of Innovation and Technology is
5 monitoring the board's meeting today. So the board's
6 staff introductions the following staff members are in
7 attendance: Attorney Jermaine Wyrick; Mr. Robert Brown;
8 Mrs. Teresa Blossom, community relations coordinator;
9 Mrs. Jonya Underwood, administrative assistant;
10 Ms. D'Layne Richards, legal assistant; interim chief
11 investigator Lawrence Akbar; supervising investigator
12 Lasonya Sloan; supervising investigator Ainsley
13 Cromwell, and that concludes the introductions at this
14 time Madam Chairperson.

15 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, Ms. White.
16 At this time sitting in for the chief is Deputy Chief
17 Marlon Wilson. Good afternoon, sir.

18 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Good afternoon, ma'am.

19 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: And any staff that is
20 here for the police department?

21 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: I see several names.
22 I'll start with Director Graveline and any other
23 department members if you can announce yourself.

24 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: They might be -- okay.

25 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Well, I'll get

1 started, ma'am. You got Commander Tiffany Stewart from
2 homicide.

3 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay hi.

4 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: You got Captain Derek
5 May from homicide. You got Lieutenant Kenneth Gardner
6 from homicide. You got Captain Aric Tosqui from crime
7 Intel. You got Director Chris Graveline from
8 professional standards. We got our legal attorney Grant
9 Ha on the line on the call as well. You got Captain
10 Liddell from professional standards. Captain Michael
11 Parish and I believe that will conclude the department
12 members on the Zoom conference call.

13 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, sir. Thank
14 you all for attending this afternoon's meeting. Any
15 elected officials, Ms. White, that we know of or
16 representatives?

17 SECRETARY WHITE: Not at this time, Madam
18 Chairperson.

19 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay. Thank you. And
20 once again thank you all for attending this afternoon's
21 meeting. Given the critical impact of the coronavirus
22 the board will continue to utilize this platform for our
23 weekly business meetings until further notice. Please
24 note a few housekeeping rules before we move on. We
25 have distributed instructions on how to access the

1 virtual meeting and how to participate during the public
2 comments section on the agenda. Upon joining the
3 meeting please note that you will join the meeting
4 muted. Please do not start your video unless invited to
5 do so by the host. Video or images deemed inappropriate
6 by the chair will result in your dismissal from the
7 meeting. To make a public comment please complete the
8 Smart...

9 COMMISSIONER BROWN: I think we lost her.

10 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Ms. White, should I?

11 SECRETARY WHITE: Yes, please by all means
12 Ms. Madam Vice Chairperson Holt.

13 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: You know I have to
14 go find it.

15 SECRETARY WHITE: Okay. And I'll also just
16 see if I can reach Madam Chairperson are you there?
17 Madam Chairperson? Okay. So she while she is
18 connecting Madam Vice Chairperson, she was right at the
19 very beginning of the chairperson's remarks.

20 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. It was an
21 e-mail by itself, correct?

22 SECRETARY WHITE: Yes, ma'am.

23 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Allow me a few
24 seconds to go to that very e-mail. Thank you for your
25 patience.

1 SECRETARY WHITE: Yes, ma'am. I'll also
2 indicate that I did see additional BOPC staff members
3 join the line investigator Daniel Calloway and
4 investigator Cecilia Washington. Senior investigator
5 Rosalia Madrigal.

6 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. All right
7 thank you, Ms. White. I found the chair's report
8 remarks. Okay. Please see attached proposed -- oh no.
9 May is mental health awareness month where we emphasize
10 the importance of mental health awareness according to
11 Mental Health America. 44 million U.S. adults
12 experience a mental health illness and 18 percent of
13 U.S. adults are living with mental illness.
14 Additionally, nearly 1 in 5 American adults will incur a
15 diagnosable mental health condition in any given year.
16 Also according to Mental Health America 46 percent of
17 Americans will meet the criteria for a diagnosable
18 mental health condition sometime in their life and half
19 of those people will develop conditions by the age of
20 14. While these statistics are concerning and show us
21 that we have more work to do, there are reasonable --
22 there are resources available. I would like to
23 highlight a few of them.

24 Number one, Mental Health America, which is
25 a community-based nonprofit organization dedicated to

1 educating and providing mental health services. Number
2 two, Northeast Integrated Health formally Northeast
3 Guidance Center and CAPP, Community and Police
4 Partnership Advocacy, is an organization dedicated to
5 partnering mental health organizations with community
6 providers to deliver mental health services that ensure
7 health, safety and overall mental wellness. These
8 organizations also offer special resources during
9 COVID-19. Please check your local listings for more
10 information and resources. We will continue to
11 highlight this important topic as we encourage you to
12 stay educated on this matter.

13 We also urge you to continue monitoring you
14 and your family's overall mental well being as well as
15 physical health. Under this coronavirus pandemic our
16 mental and physical well being are equally important.
17 Regarding the recent protest in Lansing last week I
18 would like to highlight the board's support for governor
19 Gretchen Whitmer's ban against assault rifles,
20 confederate flags, and other violent, racially,
21 discriminatory symbolism and acts. This is especially
22 in light of the recent protest against the governor's
23 stay-at-home orders that occurred in Lansing last week.
24 The board supports peaceful protest and assembly as well
25 as safety measures and precautions that save lives. At

1 the appropriate I will ask for a resolution in this
2 regard.

3 Lastly, in recognition of public service
4 recognition week the board would like to highlight and
5 acknowledge all first responders, law enforcement
6 personnel sworn and civilian, all front line workers and
7 professionals including but not limited to hospital,
8 transportation, water, grocery, sanitation and all
9 essential workers. We thank you for your dedication and
10 commitment to helping us to save lives. The board
11 continues to spend -- excuse me, the board continues to
12 send its support and prayers to the department... and
13 prayers to the department, Detroit and the board as we
14 all continue adhering to public health mandates and
15 safety precautions. Please stay safe and stay healthy.
16 Thank you, sincerely.

17 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, Vice Chair
18 Holt.

19 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay.

20 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Yeah, technology is
21 something else. I have three things here I have to
22 connect to 'cause I have poor Internet connection I
23 guess. I'm going to continue on with the rest of my
24 report as we do every week on behalf of the board I want
25 to express the board's concern and support for fallen

1 and injured officers and their families. Officer safety
2 and citizens' protection are ranked as two of the most
3 important priorities of the board. Our board receives a
4 weekly report from the department listing injured
5 officers and I ask that Deputy Chief Wilson, Marlon
6 Wilson, provide us with any updates during your report.
7 The Board of Police Commissioners meets every Thursday
8 except Thanksgiving and Christmas holiday periods.
9 Typically, we meet at police headquarters every Thursday
10 at 3 p.m. except the second Thursday of the month when
11 we meet in the community at 6:30 p.m. However, as
12 indicated before we will hold virtual meetings every
13 Thursday at 3 p.m. until further notice. Under the
14 Detroit city charter Article 7 Chapter 8 the Board of
15 Police Commissioners is in power to provide civilian
16 oversight and supervisory control of the police
17 department. Our board investigates noncriminal
18 citizens' complaints, monitors department operations,
19 works with the mayor and the chief of police to
20 establish police policies, rules and regulations, and
21 acts as final authority on all disciplinary matters. As
22 an oversight agency the board has the broad
23 responsibility to protect the citizens and create
24 policies to enforce strict adherence to department
25 policies.

1 Additionally, the board works to eliminate
2 police misconduct, discriminatory police practices and
3 unnecessary use of force by police. The board believes
4 in transparency, community input, and accountability.
5 And as a civilian oversight agency we must protect the
6 rights of citizens and victims. Our objective is to
7 ensure the safety and protection of -- for everyone.

8 Commissioners, there are several important
9 items for your consideration and information in your
10 board packet e-mailed to you on Tuesday of this week and
11 in your packet today. Under resolutions we have two
12 resolution. The first is for Officer Edward Lamb,
13 retired officer, and a resolution supporting Governor
14 Gretchen Whitmer's ban against assault rifles and racism
15 and violent acts. At the appropriate time I will
16 request for the presentation of the resolutions. From
17 the chief's office I'm requesting updates on city wide
18 crime statistics and any other critical issues facing --
19 critical or incidents facing the department. I'm also
20 requesting updates on the following: Critical incidents
21 impacting the department amid COVID-19 and in general.
22 Updates regarding the department's COVID-19 rapid
23 testing and quarantine information. Updates regarding
24 off-duty police officer arrested for alleged drunk
25 driving, chasing -- crashing into a building. An update

1 on internal investigation of the major violators unit.
2 Updates on the department hazard pay for all members.
3 Arrest and citation data in light of COVID-19. Update
4 regarding SPO, student police officer, recently injured
5 in vehicle -- in a vehicular accident a few weeks ago.
6 General update on department's use of surveillance real
7 time crime center technology and facial recognition
8 technology amid COVID-19. And general update regarding
9 city council's approval of the department's tow budget
10 and the department's commitment to handle 25 percent or
11 less of all police authorized tows and any other DPD
12 budgetary impacts and any other critical items relating
13 to the department and the community.

14 Today we have one presentation, officer
15 involved shootings where the board will receive updates
16 from forced investigations and the Homicide Task Force.
17 Our interim board secretary Ms. White will also provide
18 us with various updates regarding incoming
19 correspondence.

20 And lastly, I want to announce a few
21 reminders. Again, if you would like to make a public
22 comment please complete the Smart sheet form referenced
23 on the board's agenda or you may raise your hand by
24 clicking on the participants in the attendee controls at
25 the bottom of your computer screen. You will then see

1 raised hand at the bottom of the participant's list. Or
2 you may dial star 9 if you're participating by mobile
3 device. Utilize any of these options by 4 p.m. to be
4 acknowledged for public comment. Please also note video
5 or images deemed inappropriate by the chair will result
6 in dismissal from the meeting. During the public
7 comments section of the agenda each speaker will have
8 the two minutes to speak. Mr. Brown will acknowledge
9 each speakers. We will ask that you remain respectful
10 and professional. Please also note the board continues
11 to accept citizen's feedback by telephone e-mail, fax
12 and mailing and will respond accordingly. The telephone
13 numbers to the board's office is 313-596-1830 it's
14 313-596-1830 and the Office of the Chief Investigator is
15 313-596-2499. It's 313-596-2499 should you like to file
16 a citizen's complaint regarding alleged police
17 misconduct.

18 At this time please silence your cell phones
19 and other electronic devices and other background sounds
20 to prevent interrupting the meeting. In the spirit of
21 effective communication please treat each other
22 respectfully and professionally. Commissioners, please
23 be reminded not to speak until you are recognized and
24 address your comments to issues that are relevant to the
25 agenda. My objective is to run an orderly meeting and

1 conclude in a reasonable period of time. Thank you. At
2 this time we will have the resolution for Officer --
3 police officer Edward Lamp and I'm going to ask that
4 Commissioner Bell please read the resolution.

5 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, ma'am. If you
6 would post it, I would. Resolution honoring retiring
7 Corporal Edward E. Lamb. Whereas Edward Lamb was
8 appointed to Detroit Police Department on February the
9 7th, 2000. Upon graduating from the Detroit
10 Metropolitan Police Academy police officer Lamb began
11 his career at the Ninth Precinct; and whereas he
12 dutifully served the Ninth Precinct and eastern
13 district, and the Ninth Precinct again before serving in
14 Gaming. Police Officer Lamb displayed tremendous
15 diligence and aptitude in his assignments. On October
16 the 18th, 2018 he was promoted to the rank of corporal
17 and continues serving the Gaming until retirement; and
18 whereas during his law enforcement career Officer Lamb
19 was the deserving recipient of the Chief Merit Award,
20 Perfect Attendance Award, Perfect Driving Award, Consent
21 Judgment Award, the Major League Baseball All Star
22 Recognition Award, the Rosa Parks Funeral Recognition
23 Award, and the Superbowl XL Recognition Award. He also
24 received commendations from supervisors and numerous
25 letters of appreciation from the citizens. And whereas

1 Corporal Lamb has tirelessly served the Detroit Police
2 Department, the citizens of Detroit, and its neighboring
3 communities for more than 21 years. His
4 professionalism, commitment to the public service,
5 integrity, and dedication have been to a credit to the
6 Detroit Police Department. He is highly respected as a
7 consummate professional. Now, therefore, be it resolved
8 the Detroit Board of Police Commissioners speaking for
9 the citizens of Detroit and Detroit Police Department
10 award this resolution in recognition of Corporal Lamb's
11 21 plus years of dedicated and diligent public service.
12 His professionalism, integrity, and lifelong commitment
13 to the city of Detroit and its citizen merit our highest
14 regards. We thank you and congratulate you Corporal
15 Edward E. Lamb. Madam Chair, I so move we receive this
16 resolution in honor of this retiring corporal.

17 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Support.

18 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and
19 supported that we approve the resolution honoring
20 retired officer -- Corporal Edward E. Lamb. Is there
21 any discussion? Those in favor?

22 ALL: Aye.

23 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed? The
24 motion carries. At this time I did want the resolution
25 for Governor Whitmer's ban on assault rifles in the

1 capital but I think that we need to do a little bit more
2 with the language in the resolution, so I'm going to
3 hold that off until next week and we'll put it on the
4 agenda for next week. So moving on we have now the
5 chief's report from Deputy Chief Marlon Wilson.

6 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Thank you, Madam
7 Chair. I'll start with crime stats. I'll start with
8 homicide year-to-date we have 87, which is a 50 percent
9 increase. Sexual assaults we're at 229, which is a
10 decrease of 25 percent. Aggravated assaults we're at
11 2,820 which is a 3 percent increase. Nonfatal shootings
12 we're at 236, which is an increase of 37 percent.
13 Robberies we're at 661, just under 1 percent increase.
14 Carjackings at 55, which is an 8 percent increase for
15 overall part one violent crime increase of 1 percent.
16 Go down to property crime. Burglaries we're currently
17 at 1,762 which is a 20 percent decrease. Larcenies
18 we're at 4,015 which is a decrease of 12 percent. Auto
19 thefts we're at 2,101 which is an increase of 5 percent
20 for overall decrease of part one property crime of 10
21 percent.

22 Next I'll go into injured officers. We
23 currently have, and it kind of changes day to day, but
24 five members currently hospitalized as a result of
25 COVID-19. Student police officer Connor Donahue is

1 still recovering at a local hospital but I'm glad to say
2 we talked to his father every day he's actually -- he's
3 in serious condition and every day he's showing
4 improvement, so we're happy to report that.

5 Updates regarding the rapid testing and the
6 quarantine information for DPD. We currently have 70
7 members who are currently quarantined. That's the
8 breakdown is 57 sworn, 13 civilian. The department has
9 returned 1,061 members back to full duty who were
10 previously quarantined.

11 Hazard pay our officers we are starting to
12 track hazard pay effective April 13. Our members are
13 receiving an additional five dollars per hour hazard
14 pay. They'll get their first payment in July of this
15 year.

16 As far as arrest data post COVID or during
17 this COVID pandemic, honestly, late March early April we
18 saw a decrease somewhat. We normally average around 400
19 or so arrests a week. We went down kind of somewhat
20 half of that but if you look at the week of May 3rd,
21 we're kind of back up to our normal numbers and a lot of
22 that is because of that number of 1,000 officers who are
23 currently back to full duty.

24 Give an update on tickets that we've issued
25 since the COVID crisis. We've issued 2,170 citations.

1 That's roughly since March 23rd.

2 To answer how we're currently utilizing
3 surveillance or facial recognition and Project Green
4 Light. There really has not been a change. We're still
5 utilizing it in the same capacity that we did before
6 COVID.

7 There was a question that came in from a
8 citizen regarding a parks detail. We currently do not
9 have a parks detail. We'll probably stand that up maybe
10 early June but we do have a mandate that our local
11 precincts as well as our mental division maintain
12 constant observation of the parks.

13 Two additional questions that I'm going to
14 have Director Graveline talk about is the update on the
15 major violators investigation as well as the recent
16 officer who was arrested for drunk driving; and then
17 lastly I will finish up with Captain Parish who will
18 talk about towing. Director Graveline.

19 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: Thank you, D.C. through
20 the chair. In terms of the major violators
21 investigation. So prior to the COVID-19 pandemic we
22 were conducting quite a few interviews of citizens,
23 advancing our investigation. With the pandemic we kind
24 of took a pause on the interviews just to kind of cut
25 down on maybe some unnecessary contact between people

1 with the governor's stay-at-home order. So we've really
2 done a deep dive into some more of our records that we
3 have. We've developed a number of investigative leads
4 based upon the last four or five weeks and we'll be
5 starting back with our interview process next week. And
6 so that's where we stand right now in terms of that.
7 Our FBI partners as well were abiding by the
8 stay-at-home order. They're coming back into the office
9 and not working from home as much and we'll be seeing
10 them out with us doing interviews beginning next week.

11 In terms of the officer with the operating
12 while intoxicated last Friday morning at 4:50 a.m. We
13 had one of our officers involved in an alcohol-related
14 incident. We believe his car ran into a building over
15 in the Sixth Precinct. This officer actually is an
16 Eighth Precinct officer. He was off duty at the time
17 and at the time he could not be given a breathalyzer so
18 we had to do a blood draw. We have not received the
19 results of that blood draw yet, so I can't update the
20 board on what his blood alcohol content was. That
21 officer has been placed on administrative duty no gun.
22 Well, he will be placed on administrative duty no gun
23 status 'cause he's actually now currently serving a
24 suspension for a previous disciplinary case. Once he's
25 done with that suspension, he will then be placed on

1 administrative gun -- administrative duty no gun status.
2 I believe that will begin on May 13th is the date.
3 Pending any questions on either of those topics that's
4 my brief on those two issues.

5 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

6 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: And through the chair
7 Captain Parish if you can answer the question regarding
8 the recent approval of the tow budget.

9 CAPTAIN PARISH: Yes. As the board's aware
10 in two thousand -- September 2018 DPD, the board, and
11 the mayor's office issued a directive establishing DPD
12 towing operations. Since that time we've been working
13 with the Detroit Towers Association to try to make sure
14 that the piece that DPD took on was fair and equitable
15 while at the same time preserving our right to tow and
16 store vehicles in the city of Detroit. This led to a
17 large amount of conversation with city council this past
18 budget season. I'm happy to say that city council,
19 after receiving a commitment by Chief Craig on certain
20 towing matters, city council did approve the
21 department's budget including the towing aspects of that
22 department budget. So that just occurred this past
23 Tuesday. I sent Ms. White a copy of the closing
24 resolution which spoke to the department's commitments
25 with respect to DPD towing, as well as a copy of the

1 letter sent by Chief of Police James Craig to city
2 council establishing certain commitments; for example,
3 that DPD would only tow approximately 20 percent -- 25
4 percent of all police authorized towing, as well as
5 certain commitments relating to billing and payments
6 that we've worked with the towers to develop. Subject
7 to any questions, that's my report on that matter.

8 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, sir. Deputy
9 Chief Marlon is that the conclusion?

10 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: That concludes the
11 chief's report and I'll answer any questions.

12 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay. Commissioners,
13 any questions for Deputy Chief?

14 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair.

15 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Bell.

16 COMMISSIONER BELL: I don't have a question
17 for the deputy chief but I just want to commend the
18 department on handling this towing issue. As you well
19 know towing been a huge issue in the past and we inherit
20 the towing issue and so I think they're handling it very
21 professional. They convinced council to improve their
22 budget and I haven't heard any public outcry in
23 reference to this, even the towers themselves, so this
24 is I think huge in terms of resolving the issues. It's
25 been long standing in the city of Detroit. I want to

1 thank them for that type of professional work ethics in
2 dealing with the towing issue.

3 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other --

4 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Madam Chair.

5 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Burch.

6 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Hi, how are you? I
7 just want to say it was last week that we spoke about
8 animal control and I believe it was A.C. LeValley said
9 that he would have a number for community leaders to
10 directly speak with the person regarding pit bulls. It
11 was a number supposed to be released to us. Do you have
12 that number yet?

13 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Through the chair,
14 yes, I can provide that number. The number is --

15 COMMISSIONER BURCH: So you'll do it off the
16 air; I understand off the air.

17 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: No, I can do it now.
18 Or I can do it off the air.

19 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Excuse me, you're going
20 to give me a number that's a general number, we already
21 tried that.

22 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Okay, I understand.

23 COMMISSIONER BURCH: You're supposed to give
24 a number --

25 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: I'll provide that

1 number to you off line.

2 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes, sir. That's what
3 I'm saying it's not to the public.

4 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Yes, ma'am.

5 COMMISSIONER BURCH: And again, I just want
6 to give a shout-out to Officer Lee Brown (sic), Officer
7 Eric Hill, and NPO Dan Robinson of the fine job we
8 actually witnessed in our neighborhood. The officer was
9 on a bike, I'm talking about just a two wheel bike. It
10 was good to see; that gave us comfort and it gave us a
11 sense of peace that they're out there protecting and
12 serving by motor bike. Just a bike, okay? And like I
13 said we thank you for all that you're doing and if it's
14 appropriate, Madam Chair, for me to share later whenever
15 you say so regarding our experience in taking the COVID
16 test as a commissioner. If you will allow it later, if
17 you so be. I thank you.

18 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: You can share your
19 thoughts now Commissioner Burch.

20 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Okay. All right, very
21 good, Madam Chair. Thank you. We were contacted by a
22 police officer out there. I was. So I guess that was
23 the norm for everybody that you have an appointment,
24 which was this past Sunday. When we approached the
25 parking area down at the Red Cross old building on Mack

1 and Woodward. It was such a beautiful experience, the
2 responders being so very professional and as we entered
3 the building with our credentials we didn't have to do
4 anything because we were already reserved so that was in
5 order. As we entered the facility everyone was dressed
6 in the garb as they should be to protect themselves and
7 the CD was just like in this hallway where nobody --
8 where everybody obeyed the social distancing. In taking
9 the test, everybody, it was such a wonderful nurse; I
10 get everybody's name even if you don't say it I'll ask
11 you what is your name. So the particular nurse or
12 doctor, I think that's what she was, that gave the
13 actual test. She broke it down in such detail that you
14 had no questions. If you did, she was able to answer
15 them. So I thank God myself I too got to be negative
16 and as we went on to all of the other testing to all the
17 other doctors nurses they were very, very professional;
18 and one thing I want everybody to understand in District
19 3 we are not known as a marijuana district. We are
20 known as love where you live and when we went to that
21 facility the Red Cross saw our sign and they accepted it
22 to stay at that facility to encourage people and we
23 wound up giving out five of those signs, Mrs. Madam
24 Chair, and to the police and you should have it in your
25 precinct. Everybody should have that sign in the

1 precinct to encourage. So I want to thank Mayor Duggan
2 for all that testing that he provided for the
3 commissioners because he didn't have to but it shows
4 that he cares about citizens that are serving this great
5 city. That's what I have to say. I thank you
6 Mrs. Commissioner, Madam Chair. Thank you.

7 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you Commissioner
8 Burch. Any other questions, comments, Commissioners?

9 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yeah, Madam Chair.

10 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Brown.

11 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Hey D.C. thank you for
12 the report and everything. One of the things I want to
13 do is just give a shout out to Commander Patterson over
14 at the Eighth Precinct for the fine job he's doing with
15 his hands being tied with a lot of young officers over
16 there. I'm over there every day and also Commander
17 Williams of the Sixth Precinct. I'm still having an
18 ongoing concern with monitoring the radio and being in
19 the cars with the officers that I'm hearing too many
20 people that are being pulled over and are running from
21 the police. They're pulling off. I know about the no
22 chase policy and all of that stuff but I think
23 something's going to have to be done with this; this has
24 got to change because it's happening too often where
25 people feel that they don't have to stop and talk with

1 the police when they're being pulled over for civil
2 infractions and things like that.

3 And also what are we doing with giving the
4 officers the electronic ticket devices so that they can
5 have the equipment necessary that once they get behind
6 them and they capture the license plate number, they can
7 do that. I think we need to really look into the
8 follow-up of these vehicles pulling off from the police
9 once they're pulled over. I mean, I'm hearing it out
10 there and if anyone else has a radio, you should monitor
11 and you'll see what I'm talking about but it's happening
12 too often and I think that's putting the public at a
13 greater risk with these people just pulling off without
14 regard to traffic and anything like that, like they just
15 trying to get away from escaping the ticket. So I just
16 -- what are we doing about it? What's our plan? Have
17 we discussed it or anything like that?

18 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Honestly -- oh through
19 the chair.

20 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Yes, sir.

21 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Commissioner, we have
22 discussed it. You know, recently we have televised
23 where we had the issue with the drag racing and
24 drifting. When you go to those incidents you obviously
25 have individuals driving high powered vehicles and

1 they're going to move from us. One of the strategies
2 that we do deploy is in that situation is the
3 helicopter. We partner with Michigan State Police or
4 ourselves. So we do talk about it but we do have a very
5 a restrictive chase policy, so for traffic violation we
6 will not chase.

7 To answer the second part of your question
8 most vehicles that are 2017 or newer they have the
9 ability; they have the electronic ability to print out
10 tickets and most of those vehicles also have license
11 plate readers attached to them. It's kind of like what
12 you're saying, the follow-up can happen after the person
13 leaves, we just got to make sure that we're tracking
14 that so I'll get with A.C. LeValley and make sure we put
15 something in place to track it.

16 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Okay, but we do have
17 anything like an ordinance or anything like that in
18 place for pulling off from the police? I mean.

19 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: It depends. Honestly,
20 if the person -- if officer gets out of the vehicle and
21 give you a direct order, I mean, that's resisting and
22 obstruction, that's an R and O. So maybe it's just us
23 getting out talking to like, say, we have a lot of young
24 officers maybe it's us getting out training officers on
25 some of the things that they can do additional when that

1 happens.

2 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Okay. And also with
3 respect to Eighth Precinct, and that's the only thing I
4 can speak about right now with Commander Patterson over
5 there. Did I say he was doing a fine job? So we have a
6 lot of young officers. What are we doing -- I mean, I'm
7 in the car with two officers that only have a year and a
8 half on the job. What are we doing to get some of the
9 veterans out so they can spread this training out to,
10 you know, like Commissioner Bell always says to teach
11 them how to be the real police. So I'm seeing that you
12 have over there the average age of person on the job is
13 less than five years or five years at best over in the
14 Eighth Precinct area. How are we negotiating this with
15 teaching these young officers the dos and don'ts and how
16 to be, you know, the police? I know Commander Patterson
17 and his team and Captain Diccicco and Sergeant Johns and
18 the crew over there they really have their hands tied
19 and they're doing the best they can but what's our plan
20 for implementing, you know, more senior officers to get
21 them involved with being on the streets and training
22 these young officers?

23 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: The strategy that we
24 recently discussed as an executive team is honestly
25 increasing the number of corporals slash field training

1 officers that we have. We were in the process of doing
2 that before be COVID hit. Now that we're kind of
3 starting to get our numbers back to full strength that's
4 the strategy looking to deploy probably within the next
5 week or so.

6 COMMISSIONER BROWN: But are we -- when we
7 just -- I mean, I'm saying we can't just look to making
8 people corporals. Is there any type of thing that's
9 saying, okay, to qualify for this you must have at least
10 five years on the job? Are we going to that measure?
11 And I think it should be the same thing with the testing
12 but I'm just saying at least the minimum that promotion
13 a person should have at least five years on the job. I
14 know in the fire department you had to have at least
15 five years on the job in the fire fighting division to
16 move to any other division in the fire department. Are
17 we planning on mirroring that?

18 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: We do have criteria.
19 You can't -- I think if you are under five years you
20 can't become a corporal so that is some of the things
21 that are built in, that A.C. White assured that is built
22 in, so we're trying to get our senior officers to give
23 them incentive to go out and teach as well. Like you
24 said not just the Eighth Precinct you go to any precinct
25 especially on afternoons, you're going to see those

1 officers with four years or less, so that's one of the
2 recent strategies that we're trying to deploy.

3 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Thank you.

4 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other questions,
5 Commissioners?

6 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes, I have a question.

7 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Davis.

8 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes. Question, as
9 relates to Belle Isle. Are you all contacted when the
10 state closes? I understand Belle Isle has closed a
11 couple times this past weekend. Is the department
12 contacted and do you know if they are enforcing the
13 permit policies?

14 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: I truly believe that
15 they are enforcing the permit policies, but yeah when it
16 is closed down, we do get a communication.

17 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Thank you.

18 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: All right. If there
19 are no other questions thank you Deputy Chief Wilson.
20 And staff. Thank you.

21 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Thank you.

22 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: At this time we'll have
23 the presentation to the board, officer involved
24 shootings.

25 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the chair.

1 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Burton.

2 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Question for the
3 chief. When it comes to DPD police forfeiture how many
4 cars has been compensated during this pandemic crisis?

5 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Captain Parish if he's
6 still on if he can maybe provide us some numbers.
7 Captain Parish, are you on?

8 CAPTAIN PARISH: I'm on. I'm on, chief, and
9 I apologize for the commissioner, can you repeat the
10 question? I apologize.

11 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: He's asking is how
12 many cars have we forfeited and especially during this
13 COVID crisis? I think, Commissioner, is that accurate?

14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: That was my question.
15 How many cars have DPD forfeited during (inaudible.)

16 CAPTAIN PARISH: So the audio was a little
17 choppy but I think what I heard a question about how
18 many vehicles we have forfeited; is that correct?

19 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Correct.

20 CAPTAIN PARISH: So forfeiture has slowed
21 down immensely during this COVID crisis as did I believe
22 other branches of enforcement. I don't have the exact
23 numbers in front of me but forfeitures were marginal for
24 the last two months I would say.

25 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Okay. I'd like to

1 have those numbers by the next board meeting. I'd like
2 to see how many cars has been taken off the streets of
3 Detroit. I've been getting a lot of calls from
4 constituents across the city pertaining how DPD is
5 forfeiting vehicles but also when it comes to the
6 governor's stay-at-home order how Detroit Police
7 Department is surveilling or are you all -- hat type --
8 are you all using facial recognition to -- are Detroit
9 Police Department using facial recognition or any
10 surveillance equipment as far as looking at the
11 governor's stay-at-home order? Detroit Police
12 Department's written over 1,700 tickets to those that
13 wake up every day and party. You know, we know that
14 this technology has racial bias but also when it comes
15 to Detroiters why Detroiters are being over taxed. I
16 mean Detroiters are being hit with these 1,000 dollar
17 fines when others will get a pass when they come into
18 the city. So, you know, speaking for those civil
19 liberty groups and my constituents, they want to know is
20 Detroit Police Department surveilling them because they
21 may be spending they time with they families at their
22 home on their property? And they shouldn't have to pay
23 these 1,000 dollars in fines and tickets.

24 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Through the chair.
25 No, we're not utilizing any facial recognition to

1 enforce the governor's order. Those tickets that you
2 see written are officers who are driving around who are
3 given the authority to enforce the governor's order.
4 You can see a lot of the citations we probably -- I'm
5 looking at year-to-date we probably have over 4,000
6 warnings as well. Those citations tend to be written
7 when you have a situation where there's a safety issue
8 or people who do not want to adhere to the warnings. So
9 I think it's been stated by the chief and others that
10 it's really all about the safety and wellness of our
11 community.

12 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

13 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Well, there's an
14 article in Risk Magazine [sic] stating that they're
15 using surveillance to crack down on gathering. Is the
16 Detroit Police Department use any form of surveillance
17 to issue those tickets?

18 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: To answer that
19 question, no, not to my knowledge, no.

20 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I'd like to have an
21 update by the next board meeting as well on that.

22 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Yes, sir.

23 COMMISSIONER BURTON: And is Detroit Police
24 Department using (inaudible).

25 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Sorry, through the

1 chair. I didn't hear the question.

2 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: I didn't hear the
3 question either and it looks like he's frozen up. We
4 can come back. Commissioner Burton, if you can type
5 your question in the chat box because you froze. I can
6 see your screen is frozen and we will come back to that
7 to your question. Right now we're going to move on to
8 the presentation.

9 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Madam Chair, I had
10 question and I would like my question to be heard for
11 the record.

12 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: For the record we're
13 moving on.

14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: No, Madam Chair, point
15 of information and --

16 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: For the record we're
17 moving on, Commissioner Burton.

18 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I have the right to
19 have my question heard.

20 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: I already answered your
21 question and I'm not going to argue with you. Right now
22 we're moving on to the --

23 COMMISSIONER BURTON: -- cell phone.

24 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: -- officer involved
25 shootings --

1 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Point of order, Madam
2 Chair. And point of --

3 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. We are
4 going to the officer involved shootings. Thank you.

5 LIEUTENANT GARDNER: Good afternoon. Hello.
6 Thank you. I am Lieutenant Kenneth Gardner of the
7 Detroit Police Department. I am currently the officer
8 in charge of the Homicide Task Force under the direction
9 of Captain May, the commanding officer of homicide.
10 Today I just wanted to give you a little information on
11 about officer involved shootings. Do I have to say next
12 slide or you just go on? Okay, very well. All right
13 then.

14 Officer involved shootings is as you can see
15 here it's to discharge any firearm by a sworn law
16 enforcement officer or the discharge of a firearm by a
17 suspect at a sworn law enforcement officer. Our
18 organizational structure and responsibilities at the
19 Homicide Task Force: Our organizational structure is
20 under the Detroit Police Department, which is the next
21 slide, we have one lieutenant, one sergeant, four
22 detectives, one corporal, one crime analyst and we
23 partner with Michigan State Police; and we have one
24 lieutenant, one detective sergeant, three detective
25 troopers, and one intelligence analyst. Our

1 responsibilities and investigations include
2 investigations of officer-involved fatality. That is if
3 it's a fatal shooting of an officer or a fatal shooting
4 of a citizen. Also non-fatals of citizens or non-fatals
5 of officers. We also have the responsibilities of
6 investigating shoots fired at officers or if an officer
7 fired a shot at a citizen. We do not investigate animal
8 involved shootings or accidental discharge because those
9 have a lack of criminal intent. We also have the
10 responsibility for investigating any entity, any police
11 entity that comes in the city of Detroit and if they
12 should discharge their firearm. There you go. Sorry
13 about that, the lights went out here. If any entity was
14 to enter into the city of Detroit whether state, local,
15 or federal and they should discharge their firearms, the
16 Homicide Task Force has the responsibility for making a
17 thorough investigation.

18 The Homicide Task Force also handles these
19 types of shootings whether they are on duty or off duty.
20 Our team specializations: The Homicide Task Force is
21 specialized in surveillance, which is a unique dynamic
22 by our team because that help us to really get really in
23 depth knowledge about criminal activity and things that
24 may have led up to a police shooting. We are also RAID
25 trained, which means we have the ability to execute our

1 own search warrants unless it meets the threshold where
2 we have to activate SRT. We have the capability of
3 doing our own video extractions and we coordinate with
4 various law enforcement agencies whether it's local,
5 state, or federal to conduct a thorough investigation.

6 Our coordination of apprehension: We use
7 what is called a rapid deployment of specialized units
8 and resources. Some of those entities as you can see
9 consist of SRT, headquarters surveillance, special
10 operations of that particular precinct. We have our own
11 body-worn camera portable unit, that way we're able to
12 get video immediately. We have an embedded video
13 technician. That includes getting Green Lights video.
14 Ring videos, Ring.com videos, and any other type of
15 video surveillance they may find during our
16 investigation. We also work with Violent Crimes Task
17 Force, NIBIN, and Evidence Analysis Lab. We have
18 contacts in the lab where we can sometimes put some of
19 our investigations ahead of other investigations, which
20 is a big plus when we're solving police shootings. We
21 also work with Forced Investigative Unit.

22 What's unique about this whole situation is
23 that we do and are able to provide a real time update.
24 How do we do that? We use text messaging, we use a
25 group text messaging so that everyone in that text

1 message steam is able to receive live updates
2 immediately in order to help us apprehend the persons
3 responsible in police shootings.

4 So what do we do? When we arrive at the
5 scene it is information collection. Now we are
6 transparent in all of our reviews of all evidence so we
7 look for evidence that is exculpatory as well as
8 inculpatory in these crimes. One of the things that we
9 ask for is that if there's a discharge of a firearm that
10 there is restricted moving or handling of that firearm.
11 Why again do we do that? Because we are looking at DNE
12 -- DNA. We also asked that there is minimal touching of
13 the uniform and that is we know and I understand that
14 sometimes officers like to embrace each other after a
15 police shooting but we try to restrict that movement
16 because again it helps us in our DNA analysis.

17 Again, while we're at the scene we're able
18 to immediately grab the body-worn cameras and also the
19 scout car video because we do have the equipment there
20 to help us with those extractions. We also ask to be
21 restricted of any items that are dropped by a member
22 during the police shooting are left in place. This
23 helps us to put together exactly what happened during
24 the time of the shooting. Our arrest coordination we're
25 utilizing headquarters surveillance unit, our Violent

1 Crimes Task Force, and the U.S. Marshals. We do our own
2 warrant preparation and submissions, our own court
3 presentations, and we coordinate with Force
4 Investigative Unit.

5 So through the chair at this time I would
6 like to yield the floor to Captain Lena Liddell of the
7 Internal Control Unit who will take it and give you
8 statistics and also what force investigation does.

9 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

10 CAPTAIN LIDDELL: Good afternoon board.

11 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Good afternoon.

12 CAPTAIN LIDDELL: The next slide, please.

13 I'll summarize the data as it pertains to the law
14 enforcement officers who were assaulted or fatally
15 wounded by shootings or other felonious means in years
16 of 2018, 2019, 2020. This information will reflect
17 Detroit police officers in or outside city limits and
18 outside agencies within city limits. Officers were
19 fired upon 7 times in 2018, 10 in 2019. This includes
20 one member from an outside agency. And two times in
21 2020. Three officers were non-fatally shot in 2018, two
22 in 2019, and one officer from an outside agency while
23 off duty in 2020.

24 As the board is aware tragically we lost one
25 on-duty officer in 2018, one on-duty and one off-duty in

1 2019. One on-duty officer was struck and killed by
2 hitting a driver (sic) in 2018. There are several
3 incidents where officers fired shots at suspects without
4 causing injury. 15 in 2018, 1 in 2019. Detroit police
5 officers fatally wounded two suspects in 2018 and one in
6 2019. Detroit police officers non-fatally wounded three
7 suspects in 2018, seven in 2019, and one in 2020.

8 After an officer involved shooting or
9 critical incident a debrief is directed by the chief.
10 In attendance are the senior management team and key
11 members germane to the investigation. An incident will
12 be evaluated for legality, policy, tactics, and
13 training. Force investigations will conduct an
14 investigation and at the conclusion of that
15 investigation, the command level review team will
16 evaluate the incident for tactics, effectiveness of
17 equipment used, and whether training, risk management or
18 risk management issues need to be addressed. I thank
19 the board for the opportunity to present today and I
20 will answer any questions.

21 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioners, do you
22 have any questions?

23 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I have a question.

24 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Davis.

25 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Question: As it

1 relates to shootings if an officer discharges his weapon
2 and doesn't strike anyone, is there an attempt made to
3 figure out where that bullet or bullets may have went?

4 CAPTAIN LIDDELL: Absolutely. Yes, always.

5 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Thank you.

6 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Any other questions?

7 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Madam Chair.

8 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Burton.

9 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I have a question and
10 my question is a follow-up and I'd like an answer. When
11 you shut down the commissioner for raising a question
12 you disenfranchising the hundred thousands of voters
13 that live in the district. The question once again --

14 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Burton,
15 can you get to the point so these officers can get back
16 to their work?

17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: -- baseline. Is the
18 Detroit Police Department using Sting Ray to track and
19 monitor citizens' cell phones in America's blackest,
20 poorest city like Detroit?

21 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: I think that question
22 has been asked and answered several times. I believe
23 that the chief answered that question back a few months
24 ago.

25 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I just raised the

1 question; I'd like the answer. You said we was moving
2 on, so I'm bringing the question forth now and I'd like
3 an answer for point of information.

4 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay. We'll get you an
5 answer. Are there any other questions for Captain
6 Gardner?

7 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair.

8 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Bell.

9 COMMISSIONER BELL: Could the captain sort
10 of walk through the process once an officer involved in
11 a shooting, what step do they take to process that
12 officer in terms of the interview or interrogation,
13 their rights, and what actually happened? Is he
14 reporting back to duty within 24 hours or he's suspended
15 for a period of time? Could she go through the steps; I
16 think the public need to understand that.

17 CAPTAIN LIDDELL: Okay, through the board.
18 What we do typically after we do our preliminary
19 investigation officers are immediately met by our
20 subject matter experts from Homicide Task Force and from
21 force investigations we're all at the scene with the
22 executive staff that's appropriate for these
23 circumstances and the location. What happens at that
24 time the officers are removed from the incident,
25 evidence is collected from the officers and from the

1 scene and any witnesses. The officers are taken to a
2 separate area, they're separated, they give written
3 statements and from that point the next step is they
4 would go to our police medical section where they are
5 scheduled to be evaluated by a clinical professional to
6 determine what the next course for them returning to
7 duty. So there's a fitness -- we call it a fitness for
8 duty that's an evaluation for the officer. They are not
9 returned within usually at all within 24 hours. I can't
10 give you exact time frame but it's based on the
11 circumstances and the officer's involvement in that
12 incident. So they are at that time placed on disabled
13 status or restricted duty until there's a determination
14 that they're fit to return to duty and after the Warren
15 -- I'm sorry, Wayne County prosecutor's office reviews
16 the circumstances to determine whether there is any type
17 of legal issues with the circumstances.

18 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, I have one
19 more question, please.

20 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Yes, sir.

21 COMMISSIONER BELL: Could you -- you sort of
22 highlighted the role of the Michigan State Police. Are
23 they involved initially or at what point in time do they
24 become involved in the Detroit PD?

25 LIEUTENANT GARDNER: Through the chair,

1 Lieutenant Gardner. Yes, Michigan or the Michigan State
2 Police responds immediately with us. They're embedded
3 in our task force, so they're there immediately with us.
4 Also I think it should be pointed out that since also
5 the public safety statement is also given by the
6 officers and each officers have been given cards where
7 they know exactly what to do on those sheets.

8 COMMISSIONER BELL: Thank you.

9 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. Any other
10 questions?

11 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Madam Chair, just a
12 statement. I just want to thank Lieutenant Gardner and
13 his team for the fine report that they would bring that
14 information to us. But I keep seeing Commissioner
15 Holley's screen pop up. I wonder is he trying to say
16 something?

17 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: No, I'm not.

18 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Okay, I just want to
19 bring it to your attention, but Lieutenant Gardner,
20 thank you for the report and I appreciate all the work
21 that goes into what you guys did to bring that
22 information to the board.

23 LIEUTENANT GARDNER: You're welcome,
24 Commissioner.

25 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Madam Chair.

1 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Yes. Commissioner
2 Burch.

3 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Can you hear me?

4 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Yes, I can. Yes, we
5 can.

6 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Oh okay, I wanted to
7 ask because Commissioner Bell brought it up about the
8 state police and I just want to if they could answer my
9 question regarding the borderline, which I'll use
10 Dequindre and 8 Mile as a boundary, do the state police
11 have to have permission to light patrol or do they not
12 need that? And can they, if they see a motor speeding,
13 do they have that authority to stop that motorist and
14 give out a ticket or do they have to be requested to
15 come into the city of Detroit? I want to hear it from
16 the state police.

17 LIEUTENANT GARDNER: Through the chair,
18 Madam Burch -- Commissioner Burton.

19 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Burch.

20 LIEUTENANT GARDNER: The state police are
21 not on the line with us this evening.

22 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I didn't hear your
23 answer, I'm sorry.

24 LIEUTENANT GARDNER: I was saying that the
25 Michigan State Police is not on this line this evening,

1 so I don't have any information but I certainly will get
2 back with you as to how they do their patrols within the
3 city of Detroit.

4 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I'd appreciate that.
5 Ms. White, could you give my number to the other
6 commander also so they can speak to me on my private
7 line? Would you be so kind, Ms. White?

8 SECRETARY WHITE: Yes, Commissioner Burch.
9 Yes.

10 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Thank you.

11 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, I don't
12 think we want to leave that question out there.
13 Michigan State Police have authority in the state of
14 Michigan. They do traffic enforcement; they are the
15 state police. They don't need permission from any
16 entity even though there's an established relationship
17 in Detroit behind the incident with the ATV but they are
18 the Michigan State Police.

19 COMMISSIONER BROWN: And we should also note
20 Madam Chair likewise with Wayne County sheriffs. If
21 you're in Wayne County, you can be pulled over just as
22 if in the state of Michigan you can be pulled over.

23 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Thank you.

24 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: All right. If there
25 are no other questions, thank you all for your

1 presentation. Deputy Chief Marlon, I do need you to
2 answer Commissioner Burton's question regarding Sting
3 Ray or whatever it is that he wants an answer about. Do
4 you utilize that tool?

5 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: It hasn't changed.
6 The chief's answer was no and it's still no. We don't
7 utilize that technology.

8 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

9 COMMISSIONER BURTON: So Sting Ray is not
10 being called Baseline here in the Detroit Police
11 Department?

12 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: I'm sorry, I don't
13 know anything about a Sting Ray being called Baseline in
14 the city of Detroit. Sorry.

15 COMMISSIONER BURTON: So you're saying
16 Detroit Police Department is not tracking or monitoring
17 citizens' cell phones? You stand by that, right? You
18 standing by that?

19 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Sir, you asked a
20 question, Commissioner, do we utilize Sting Ray; do we
21 have technology that we can utilize to track people,
22 yes, we do.

23 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You're being
24 disingenuous. So the --

25 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay, we're not going

1 there Commissioner Burton without -- we're not going
2 there. We're going to move on to our report from our --
3 thank you Deputy Chief Wilson.

4 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: You're welcome.

5 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: We're going to move on
6 to our interim board secretary's report.

7 SECRETARY WHITE: Thank you, Madam
8 Chairperson Carter. Honorable board, under item number
9 11 of the agenda the following includes the incoming
10 correspondence for this week and they are as follows:
11 Number one, DPD facial recognition report number 26.
12 Number two, request for change of duty status to
13 administrative leave without pay but with medical
14 benefits for police officer Latasha Williams, Badge 72,
15 assigned to the Ninth Precinct; and this was mentioned
16 during last virtual board meeting and it is scheduled
17 for a tentative date on next Thursday, May 12th. And
18 the last item includes the letter from chief of police
19 Craig regarding the DPD towing operations, which you
20 heard updates from Captain Michael Parish on the copy of
21 the resolution to city council outlining commitments and
22 other items contained in that resolution. And also the
23 honorable board received correspondence related to
24 today's presentation on officer involved shootings
25 consisting of applicable department directives under use

1 of force and other associated directives, as well as
2 additional articles from The Washington Post who records
3 and includes all of the officer involved shootings in
4 their national database as well as The Guardian and of
5 course on the federal level. That concludes the
6 incoming correspondence and my report for this evening.

7 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, Ms. White.

8 Next, Commissioners, we have unfinished business.

9 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Madam Chair --

10 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: -- Carter.

11 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: -- Reverend Holley.

12 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Should I be speaking
13 or should Reverend Holley be speaking?

14 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Holt and
15 then Commissioner Holley.

16 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: You said unfinished
17 business as I understand?

18 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Yes, ma'am.

19 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. There's a
20 motion; I move that interim secretary to the board and
21 interim chief investigator receive the 5 percent pay cut
22 or the equivalent use of 18 vacation days as outlined in
23 Category C of the mayor's proposed budget plan effective
24 May 18th, 2020.

25 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Is there support? The

1 motion? No support? All right, thank you, Commissioner
2 Holt. Commissioner Holley.

3 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Chairperson, thank you
4 for this. Can I have a copy of the statistics about
5 mental health that was in your report? Can I have a
6 copy of just the mental health report? I think it's so
7 -- that was excellent that you've done. Can I have a
8 copy sent to me tomorrow?

9 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Sure, we can have a
10 copy. You mean in my remarks?

11 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: No, just the mental
12 health piece.

13 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay. Will do. Thank
14 you.

15 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Thank you so much,
16 Madam Chairperson.

17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Madam Chair, I second
18 the vice chair motion.

19 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: You second the vice
20 chair's motion?

21 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Correct.

22 COMMISSIONER BELL: I done think we moved
23 on.

24 COMMISSIONER BURTON: No, I was saying
25 second. We using virtual technology. My hand is up;

1 I'm saying second. Motion was put on the floor and I
2 said second.

3 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Okay. It's been moved
4 and supported that the interim -- I'm sorry?

5 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: The interim
6 secretary and the interim chief.

7 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Investigator?

8 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Correct.

9 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: So five percent pay cut
10 as outlined in the mayor's proposed budget.

11 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Correct. Equivalent
12 use of 18 days.

13 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Is there any
14 discussion?

15 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yeah, Madam Chair.

16 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Brown.

17 COMMISSIONER BROWN: With us doing that part
18 shouldn't we also be including the 80/20 with the rest
19 of the staff? And also I just have some discussion on
20 maybe just doing the 5 percent and not the 18 vacation
21 days. I just, I want to hear some discussion on it then
22 I'll go ahead with a motion to amend but I think we
23 should go ahead and do it. I've have some discussions
24 with the understanding that if we don't vote on this, it
25 would make it cumbersome for the CFO and their office to

1 assist anyone that's looking for those benefits that's
2 coming from those state and federal dollars.

3 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: I think that
4 Commissioner Holt was going to make a second motion so
5 that it was clear what was going on.

6 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Okay then I would like
7 -- is she going to do that now? Are you going to amend
8 your motion to include that and be specific -- well, I'd
9 like to move to amend her motion to just include the
10 five percent pay cut temporarily and exclude the 18
11 vacation days.

12 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: I don't think we can
13 exclude the 18 vacation days because that was something
14 that came out of the mayor's office in lieu of the 5
15 percent cut they can also choose to opt to give their 18
16 vacation days.

17 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yeah, I understand it's
18 one or the other and I think we should just move in one
19 direction.

20 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair.

21 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: I'm not understanding
22 what your --

23 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair.

24 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: They are allowed to
25 either take a 5 percent cut or the 18 vacation days. So

1 you're saying that they should only have one option?

2 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yes.

3 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair.

4 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Bell.

5 COMMISSIONER BELL: I think it's clear the
6 pay cut or you have a choice to take the vacation days.
7 That's standard across the board, so we should not treat
8 our people any different and have that opportunity, so.

9 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Well, Madam Chair, with
10 that statement you are treating them any differently
11 than the rest of the staff by not having them take the
12 80/20 that's been recommended for the staff across the
13 board. So you are treating them differently. There's a
14 motion on the floor.

15 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: There was no support
16 for the amendment. So the original motion is for the 5
17 percent pay cut or 18 vacation days. And Ms. White, can
18 we do a roll call vote, please.

19 SECRETARY WHITE: Yes. Madam Vice
20 Chairperson Holt?

21 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes.

22 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Bell?

23 COMMISSIONER BELL: No.

24 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Brooks?

25 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: No.

1 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Brown?

2 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yes.

3 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Burch?

4 COMMISSIONER BURCH: No.

5 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Burton?

6 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes.

7 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Davis?

8 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: No.

9 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Griffie?

10 Commissioner Griffie? Commissioner Holley?

11 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: No.

12 SECRETARY WHITE: Madam Chairperson, the
13 motion failed.

14 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you.

15 Commissioner Holt?

16 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes.

17 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Is there another
18 motion?

19 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair --

20 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I can't understand --

21 COMMISSIONER BELL: -- can we table this
22 issue to have more discussion on it in our next meeting
23 and a little bit more research from the staff.

24 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: What other research do
25 we need? This is pretty --

1 COMMISSIONER BELL: The motion --

2 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Pretty simple to me.
3 There were three options that the mayor had.

4 COMMISSIONER BELL: Okay.

5 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: One was a 10 percent so
6 the people could keep their health care benefits. The
7 second was 20 percent cut with 80 percent of the work,
8 and the third option was 5 percent cut doing 100 percent
9 of the work. So what other options do you want -- what
10 other research do you want to hear? Is miss -- is the
11 director of personnel on the line?

12 COMMISSIONER BELL: I thought we had --

13 SECRETARY WHITE: We're trying to find
14 locate her.

15 COMMISSIONER BROWN: But, Madam Chair, wait
16 a minute. Go ahead, Commissioner Bell.

17 COMMISSIONER BELL: I thought we had more
18 time to address this matter.

19 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: The 18th, she said it
20 needed to be done by the 18th.

21 COMMISSIONER BELL: Okay. The day is May
22 the 7th.

23 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Yeah.

24 COMMISSIONER BELL: Okay.

25 COMMISSIONER BROWN: I was -- didn't the

1 agent, the CFO just come before us and make a change a
2 recommendation that it was 80/20 at the last meeting?
3 And that's what we should have been voting on and then
4 there was a motion came back to separate the board
5 staff, the interim people, and the attorney different --
6 to treat them differently from the rest of the staff
7 when his recommendation was that it was 80/20, and I
8 think we should just go with that and be done with it.

9 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: His recommendation was
10 for -- was no cut for the people that are managing the
11 OCI and the Board of Police Commissioners. That was his
12 recommendation.

13 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Oh I didn't hear that.

14 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: We can wait till next
15 week, that's fine. We'll move on to new business. Any
16 new business?

17 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Madam Chair Carter.

18 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Yes.

19 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Dr. Anderson is
20 online. Perhaps Commissioner Brown could pose his
21 question to her. Through the chair.

22 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner -- I'm
23 sorry, Director -- okay, that's fine.

24 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Brown?

25 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yeah, Dr. Anderson if

1 you're listening, I was under the impression that he
2 came on here last week and said we should go with the
3 category B. We went from C to B, that was the
4 recommendation?

5 DR. ANDERSON: Yes.

6 COMMISSIONER BROWN: That's what he did, and
7 the category B I don't have it in front of me where it
8 was the 80/20. Was there anything -- go ahead, director
9 -- I mean Dr. Anderson.

10 DR. ANDERSON: Through the chair,
11 Commissioner Brown, so the recommendation from James
12 George was that the board accept the Category B work
13 share for all employees except for the chief
14 investigator, the interim chief investigator, the
15 interim secretary to the board, and the board attorney.

16 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Okay. I must have
17 missed that in the writing, so I'm going to agree with
18 Commissioner Bell. Let me go back through the
19 paperwork; let me reread this and see what's going on
20 with it. So I move to table this until our next
21 meeting. Is there a second?

22 COMMISSIONER BELL: Second.

23 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Madam Chair, if we keep
24 doing the same thing over and over we'll never settle.
25 Now that Commissioner Brown understands, can we go ahead

1 and vote with this?

2 COMMISSIONER BROWN: There's a motion on the
3 floor.

4 COMMISSIONER BURCH: -- over and over.

5 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Madam Chairperson,
6 Reverend Holley.

7 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: There's a motion on the
8 floor to table and it's been seconded.

9 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Okay.

10 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Discussion for that?

11 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, I think I
12 support Commissioner Brown that we should have more
13 discussion and research on this particular matter and
14 take it up next week. I'm in favor of tabling.

15 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I call the question.

16 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Mr. Davis.

17 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Call the question.

18 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Ms. White, can you do a
19 rollcall vote, please.

20 SECRETARY WHITE: Yes. Madam Vice
21 Chairperson Holt?

22 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes.

23 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Bell?

24 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes.

25 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Brooks?

1 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Yes.

2 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Brown?

3 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yes.

4 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Burch?

5 COMMISSIONER BURCH: No.

6 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Burton?

7 COMMISSIONER BURTON: No.

8 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Davis?

9 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes.

10 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Griffie?

11 Commissioner Holley?

12 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Yes.

13 SECRETARY WHITE: Madam Chairperson, the
14 motion passed.

15 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. Any new
16 business, Commissioners?

17 COMMISSIONER BROWN: So Madam Chair just one
18 thing if I may. Can we put something out that we can
19 just have a special closed session meeting to really
20 discuss this before the board meeting for next week, if
21 that's possible, to make sure that we're not violating
22 the Open Meetings Act or anything, just so that we can
23 have a discussion about it and that way when we come
24 back before the public and everyone else, everybody has
25 a full understanding if we can invite the CFO and

1 Dr. Anderson, all the parties there so we make sure that
2 we're all on the same page of what it is that's expected
3 of us to do.

4 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: There are certain --
5 only certain reasons to go into a closed session or have
6 a closed session and the attorney would be more versed
7 on that than I am and I don't know that to discuss the
8 budget or budget information is a part of that. So if
9 it is, then we'll have it, that's fine. But the CFO did
10 send out a very detailed list of all of the different
11 categories last week. So you can --

12 SECRETARY WHITE: Madam Chairperson.

13 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Yes.

14 SECRETARY WHITE: Just to add. A closed
15 session on this matter would require a vote and so
16 that's just to add what you've already indicated.

17 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. New
18 business?

19 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair.

20 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Yes.

21 COMMISSIONER BELL: I just want to commend
22 the board staff and OCI staff for doing an outstanding
23 dealing with the crisis situation that we're dealing
24 with. I just wish them the best in terms of their
25 health and safety. And I think we need to also send out

1 the organization chart. It's been stated that all our
2 personnel are the same but it's clearly not, as you well
3 know, so we need to share that with the board. Once
4 again there's an organizational chart that make a
5 distinction in terms of how we operate as a board like
6 most organizations, so I would make that request prior
7 to that next meeting and I'm supportive of Commissioner
8 Brown that we need to have a discussion in reference to
9 this particular issue 'cause it concern me that every
10 meeting, every form that I attend with Chief Craig he
11 always commend his executive team whether it be at a
12 graduation, any formality he recognizes executive team,
13 and we act as though we don't have an executive team,
14 but as some of us are well aware that we have executive
15 team that work extensively on behalf of this board even
16 prior to this incident here. People have stepped to
17 fill the shoes of people departing from this office. So
18 I cannot say enough in my six years that I'm proud of
19 this board and this staff, so Madam Chair, I just want
20 to share that with the audience and also with the board
21 to give them that reminder.

22 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I'm proud of you Bell.
23 I'm proud of you.

24 COMMISSIONER BELL: It's not about
25 Commissioner Bell. It's about the people who carry out

1 our daily duties and function of the board.

2 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Madam Chair.

3 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Burton?

4 COMMISSIONER BURTON: So I move that during
5 this pandemic crisis with every black male in city of
6 Detroit with a baseball cap and a surgical mask look
7 alike, we should -- we as a body need to exercise our
8 fiduciary responsibility. I encourage my colleagues
9 today to ban Detroit Police Department from using facial
10 recognition for one year during this pandemic crisis
11 'cause we cannot afford to misidentify a single person
12 wearing a baseball cap, a surgical mask, and a hoodie.

13 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Hearing none the motion
14 fails. Next announcement.

15 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I support.

16 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: May 14th, 2020 at 3
17 p.m.

18 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Wait, Madam Chair --

19 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: -- virtual board
20 meeting. Our next community meeting will be Thursday,
21 May 11th, 2020 at 3 p.m. It will be a virtual meeting.
22 At this time we will have oral communications from the
23 audience, please give your name for the record and limit
24 your comments to two minutes, please. Mr. Brown.

25 MR. BROWN: I currently have two at a time.

1 Mr. Eric Blount. Followed by Ms. Ashley Smith.

2 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Before you start I
3 believe Commissioner Davis was trying to second
4 Commissioner Burton's motion.

5 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Who's the first person?

6 MR. BROWN: Mr. Blount.

7 MR. BLOUNT: Yes, good afternoon board. I'm
8 going to try to get through this without breaking down.
9 Again, this year another young black unarmed male was
10 lynched in Georgia. So I think we need to understand
11 what happens here in this city, in this county, and in
12 this state as well. So for Deputy Chief Wilson, you're
13 the highest ranking officer here so I need to know from
14 you and have it recorded what are the rules around
15 citizen arrest by regular citizens and ex-police law
16 enforcement officers? I yield my time for his response
17 but I would like my clock to stop because I have a few
18 more issues I'd like to address.

19 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: No, Mr. Blount, you can
20 address all of your issues and then we'll answer the
21 questions.

22 MR. BLOUNT: Okay. Lieutenant Gardner and
23 Captain Liddell if in an officer involved shooting if
24 there is no footage of the body-worn cameras or the
25 scout car video, then what? I would strongly suggest

1 that that officer be placed on suspension without pay
2 and without benefits.

3 Thirdly, Attorney Wyrick, you and Attorney
4 Grant Ha seem to disagree on the ability to appeal the
5 arbitrator's decision on Corporal Jones. Can we please
6 have an update on that?

7 A few months ago the board revealed that
8 there is an investigation going on on false affidavits
9 supplied by police officers. We need an update on that
10 as well.

11 And lastly, the facial recognition
12 technology. Yes, thank you, Chairwoman Carter the
13 reports are out there on the BOPC website but they are
14 atrocious. They -- half of them can't be used. Three
15 of them are repeats from the previous week. Two of them
16 have blank information in the weekly --

17 MR. BROWN: Madam Chair, speaker time is up.

18 MR. BLOUNT: Thank you.

19 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Deputy Chief Wilson.
20 Can you respond, sir?

21 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, it's more
22 or less an attorney issue or question. To address it
23 specifically.

24 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Yeah, I spoke to Grant
25 Ha via text so he's going to answer the question.

1 COMMISSIONER BROWN: He's muted.

2 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Madam Chair.

3 ATTORNEY HA: Madam Chair.

4 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Mr. Ha.

5 ATTORNEY HA: So in regards to Mr. Blount's
6 question in regards to a citizen's right to arrest, a
7 citizen may arrest in regards to a felony committed in
8 their presence. In regards to retired police officer,
9 the retired police officer has no more rights than a
10 regular citizen.

11 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: That's it? Okay.

12 ATTORNEY HA: That's it.

13 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Through the chair?

14 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Holt.

15 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes, in regards to
16 Mr. Blount's discussion involving the facial recognition
17 report that's online. Ms. White and I are in discussion
18 'cause I saw Mr. Blount on counsel's executive meeting
19 this Monday I believe it was, so to Mr. Blount through
20 the chair, Ms. White and I are aware of your concerns
21 and we're going to go into dialogue with Captain Tosqui
22 and we're going to see what else can be done in terms of
23 that report. And thank you for your concern through the
24 chair.

25 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. Mr. Brown.

1 MR. BROWN: Ms. Ashley Smith.

2 MS. SMITH: Yes. Hi, how's everyone?

3 Chair, thank you and rest of the members of the board.

4 Thanks for actually answering my call. I also wanted
5 information on the whereabouts or where I can find the
6 resolution; and two, I also agree with Mr. Blount, what
7 have you concluded between both attorneys Ha and Wyrick,
8 especially with, you know, Corporal Jones being
9 convicted of an assault? So those are -- that's all I
10 have to say. I yield my time.

11 MR. BROWN: Madam Chair, your next speaker
12 who phoned in ending with 777 followed by Mr. Scotty
13 Boman.

14 MS. SMITH: You see how they didn't even
15 answer my question.

16 MRS. PANSELL: Hi, this is Sharon Pannell.
17 This is for Deputy Chief Wilson. My concern is about
18 Second Precinct --

19 MS. SMITH: I'll file a complaint --

20 MRS. PANSELL: -- and also about the
21 officers that's ill and how many are positive or how
22 many came back and how many is out, please.

23 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: So through the chair
24 if I can get a little bit clarification. Are you
25 talking specifically for the people that's positive at

1 number two?

2 MRS. PANSELL: Yes.

3 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: I'm sorry, I don't
4 have that number but I can say that right now we have 40
5 members that are positive.

6 MRS. PANSELL: At the Second Precinct?

7 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Not at the Second.
8 That's the entire department.

9 MRS. PANSELL: The whole department? So
10 who's taking over over there?

11 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: The Second Precinct,
12 if I can recall the Second Precinct only has like maybe
13 10 or 11 people that are quarantined.

14 MRS. PANSELL: That's not what they said
15 last week. That's why I'm questioning it, sir.

16 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Yeah, and the number
17 changes because obviously, you know, if a person -- you
18 know, we're doing our rapid tests, so if a person tests
19 positive and he or she clears screening, they can come
20 back to work.

21 MRS. PANSELL: Okay. Well, that's my
22 precinct and I was just concerned and I wanted to know
23 if -- how many people are positive or, well, is that the
24 word I'm trying to say? Okay, that's all. That's all.
25 Thank you, sir. I appreciate you. But can you please

1 -- update next week, please.

2 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Yes, ma'am.

3 MRS. PANSELL: Thank you. Have a great day
4 ya'all.

5 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Madam Chair, before
6 Scotty Boman speaks I believe Ms. Smith she was directed
7 as a question and probably it should go to the board
8 attorney. I know that we recommended that we would get
9 a legal opinion about the issues with the arbitrator's
10 ruling as opposed to the authority of the board from
11 corporate counsel. I believe that's what she was
12 alluding to that she needed an answer from that, 'cause
13 I think that's what we're waiting on.

14 MS. SMITH: Correct.

15 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: If Mr. Wyrick is on the
16 line. He can answer that question. He did get
17 something from corporation counsel from my
18 understanding. Mr. Wyrick.

19 ATTORNEY WYRICK: Hello?

20 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Waiting for Attorney
21 Wyrick.

22 ATTORNEY WYRICK: Hello?

23 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Attorney Wyrick.

24 SECRETARY WHITE: Attorney Wyrick, you're on
25 the line.

1 ATTORNEY WYRICK: Yes, we did get an opinion
2 earlier from corporation counsel Garcia. He's of the
3 opinion that because the Board of Police Commission is
4 not a party to the Collective Bargaining Agreement that
5 the city is in agreement with the Detroit Police
6 Officer's Association, that the BOPC does not have
7 standing to make the appeal, that the city of Detroit
8 would have to make the appeal in this matter; and he
9 also opined that the city at this time is not appealing
10 the promotion.

11 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. Mr. Blount.

12 MR. BROWN: Mr. Boman.

13 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Sorry, thank you.

14 MR. BOMAN: Yes. First of all, I urge you
15 to appeal it anyway, because the charter says you are
16 the final authority. They are usurping your authority
17 and if you got other people that are complicit in
18 usurping your authority, forget that. Assert your
19 authority or you're not doing your job and you are
20 tacitly approving of DeWayne Jones beating up a woman
21 and rewarding him with a promotion.

22 Secondly -- or why don't you just fire him?
23 Okay, I don't think that agreement prevents you from
24 firing him. So just fire him, okay, then you don't have
25 to worry about a promotion. Done.

1 Secondly, I heard again that the Board of
2 Police Commissioners is involved in violating citizens'
3 civil -- I mean, that the police department is being
4 instructed to violate citizen's rights under color of
5 law. News flash, the governor's emergency powers were
6 terminated on April 30th. The legislature failed to
7 renew it, so anybody who's listening if an officer
8 attempts to ticket you for going about your business, it
9 is your duty to inform them that they are violating your
10 rights under color of law and that you should then make
11 a complaint with the chief investigator and with the FBI
12 that this person is violating your rights.

13 Finally, there was a motion made by Willie
14 Burton that was seconded by Bill Davis that the chair
15 refused to recognize and that was out of order.

16 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you, Mr. Boman.
17 Who's next Mr. Brown?

18 MR. BROWN: Madam Chair, that was your last
19 speaker.

20 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Thank you. Our next
21 meeting will be next week -- we already discussed that.
22 So if there's no other business before this body I will
23 --

24 COMMISSIONER BELL: So moved Madam Chair.

25 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: -- to adjourn. What?

1 COMMISSIONER BELL: So moved for
2 adjournment.

3 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Second.

4 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: It's been moved and
5 supported that we adjourn. Is there any discussion?

6 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes, Madam Chair, I
7 noticed that my mic just became un-muted. For the
8 record you are being -- you are not following Robert's
9 Rules of Order when you silence a commissioner by muting
10 my mic.

11 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: You have a lot of nerve
12 talking about Robert's Rules of Order. If there's no
13 other discussion --

14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: -- establish --

15 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those in favor of
16 adjournment?

17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: -- thousand people
18 that live in the Fifth District.

19 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those in favor of
20 adjournment?

21 ALL: Aye.

22 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Those opposed? The
23 motion carries. Thank you all for attending the
24 meeting. Have a good weekend. Thank you.


