5 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Good afternoon. I
6 am police commissioner Vice Chair Annie Holt and I am
7 conducting this meeting in the stay of chairperson Lisa
8 Carter. And I'm representing as a member at large. I
9 will be conducting this afternoon's virtual meeting. On
10 behalf of the board for those in attendance and viewing
11 this meeting on your government cable channel, thank you
12 for joining our meeting. Chaplain Glenn Hodges will be
13 providing the invocation. Chaplain Hodges.

14 CHAPLAIN HODGES: Yes, ma'am. I'm un-muted.
15 (Invocation given.)

16 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, Chaplain
17 Glenn Hodges. Ms. White, will you please do a roll call
18 of the commissioners who are on the meeting.

19 SECRETARY WHITE: Yes, ma'am. Commissioner
20 Bell?

21 COMMISSIONER BELL: Present.

22 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Brown?

23 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Present.

24 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Brooks?

25 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Present.

1 CHAIRPERSON CARTER: Commissioner Burch?

2 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Good afternoon,
3 present.

4 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Burton?
5 Commissioner Burton? Commissioner Davis?

6 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Here.

7 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Griffie?
8 Commissioner Griffie? Commissioner Holley?

9 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Present.

10 SECRETARY WHITE: And Madam Vice Chair,
11 Chairperson Carter should be joining us soon. At this
12 time you do have a quorum.

13 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you so very
14 much and Commissioners, thank you for your time that
15 you're investing in this meeting. We have a few
16 business items for consideration. May I have a motion
17 to approve the agenda?

18 COMMISSIONER BELL: So moved.

19 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Second?

20 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Second.

21 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Madam --

22 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: A motion --

23 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: This is Evette
24 Griffie. Oh sorry.

25 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: A motion has been

1 moved and seconded, is there discussion? Ms. White,
2 will you have a roll call for acceptance of the agenda?

3 SECRETARY WHITE: Yes. Commissioner Bell?

4 COMMISSIONER BELL: Present yea.

5 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Brown?

6 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yes.

7 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Brooks?

8 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Yes.

9 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Burch?

10 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes.

11 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Burton?

12 Commissioner Davis?

13 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes.

14 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Griffie?

20 SECRETARY WHITE: The motion passed.

21 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you. Now may

22 we have a motion to approve the minutes for May the
23 14th, 2020?

24 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: So moved.

25 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: So moved.

1 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay, the motion has
2 been moved and second. Is there discussion? Thank you.
3 Ms. White, may we again have a roll call in support of
4 the minutes?

5 SECRETARY WHITE: Yes. Commissioner Bell?

6 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes.

7 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Brown?

8 COMMISSIONER BROWN: No.

9 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Brooks?

11 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Burch?

12 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes.

13 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Burton?

16 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Griffie?

17 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Yes.

18 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Holley?

20 SECRETARY WHITE: Madam Vice Chair?

21 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: It has been moved
22 and second and the minutes stand approved. Ms. White,
23 will you introduce the board staff?

24 SECRETARY WHITE: Yes. Thank you, Madam
25 Vice Chairperson. Before introducing the board staff,

1 the Department of Innovation and Technology is
2 monitoring the board's meeting today and our court
3 reporter this afternoon is Mrs. Caitlyn Hartley. For
4 the following staff members are in attendance today:
5 Attorney Jermaine Wyrick, Mr. Robert Brown; Mrs. Jonya
6 Underwood, administrative assistant; Ms. D'Layne
7 Richards, legal assistant; interim Chief Investigator
8 Lawrence Akbar; supervising investigator Lasonya Sloan;
9 supervising investigator Ainsley Cromwell, and senior
10 investigator Rosalia Madrigal. And that concludes the
11 introductions at this time, Madam Vice Chair.

12 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, Ms.
13 White. Good afternoon Deputy Chief Marlon Wilson.

14 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Good afternoon.

15 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you. Deputy
16 Chief, will you please introduce the DPD executive
17 members in attendance?

18 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Yes, I will. I'll
19 start off we have Deputy Chief Todd Bettison. We have
20 Director Marcella Anderson. Director Christopher
21 Graveline from internal affairs. We have Deputy Chief
22 Grant Ha. We have Commander Slappey from the 11th
23 precinct. Commander DeShaune Sims from the 12th
24 precinct. Captain Liddell from internal affairs.
25 Commander McGinnis from internal affairs. We got

1 Captain Parish as well, and we got Lieutenant Mark Young
2 from the Lieutenant and Sergeants Association.

3 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, Chief
4 Marlon Wilson. Ms. White?

5 SECRETARY WHITE: Yes.

6 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Would you introduce
7 the elected officials, VIPs, civic leaders in attendance
8 or share with chairperson based on view of participant's
9 list.

10 SECRETARY WHITE: Yes, at this time I do not
11 see -- I have not received a list of those VIPs and
12 elected officials and I am scrolling the list and I do
13 not see any members for that category. I would also
14 mention that Commissioner Griffie has since joined the
15 line, so I did want to make sure that you were aware of
16 that as well.

17 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you. I
18 believe I heard her but thank you again for bringing
19 that to my attention.

20 Again, thank you for joining us this
21 afternoon for our virtual board meeting. Given the
22 critical impact of the coronavirus, the board will
23 continue to utilize this virtual platform for our weekly
24 business meetings until further notice. Please note a
25 few housekeeping rules before we move on. We have

1 distributed instructions on how to access the virtual
2 meeting and information on participating during the
3 public comments section of the agenda. Please note the
4 following: Upon joining the meeting participants will
5 join the meeting muted. Please do not start your video
6 unless invited to do so by the host. Video and images
7 deemed inappropriate by the chair will result in your
8 dismissal from the meeting. To make a public comment
9 please complete the Smart sheet form referenced on the
10 board's agenda. You may raise your hand by clicking on
11 participants in the attendee controls at the bottom of
12 your computer screen. You will then see raised hand at
13 the bottom of the participants list. Or you may dial
14 star 9 if you are participating by mobile device. You
15 may use any one of these options by 4 p.m. to
16 acknowledge for public comment. During presentations
17 and remarks all microphones except for the chairperson
18 and the presenter will be muted to ensure presenters to
19 hear and to be -- avoid any microphone feedback.

20 Commissioners, microphones will be un-muted
21 during each question and answer period of the agenda.
22 As a reminder, Commissioners, please acknowledge the
23 chair and wait until acknowledged -- and wait until
24 acknowledgement if you would like to make a comment.

25 Finally, if you are experiencing technical

1 difficulties, please dial any of the call-in numbers
2 listed on the agenda to rejoin the meeting or for
3 commissioners please contact staff for assistance.
4 Again, we thank you in advance for your cooperation and
5 patience.

6 The Centers for Disease Control and
7 Prevention and the World Health Organization continue to
8 emphasize the importance of health and safety measures
9 for our mental and physical health. As we continue
10 through this time and highlight May as mental health
11 awareness month, we encourage you to stay updated about
12 the Coronavirus and its associated impacts by visiting
13 the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention website,
14 the World Health Organization website, as well as your
15 local listings such as Michigan.gov website, city of
16 Detroit website and other local resources for more
17 information. Continue to adhere to safe and local
18 public health mandates so that we stay healthy and save
19 lives.

20 Let's be reminded everyone in the city of
21 Detroit should complete the census questionnaire.
22 Michigan is now the 4th leading state of completed
23 census questionnaires. I will continue to emphasize the
24 necessity of completing these forms to ensure our
25 communities receive the resources that we need to survey

1 -- to survive and flourish. And I might add here
2 although Michigan is 4th in the nation the city of
3 Detroit as compared to other large cities throughout the
4 nation we're second from the bottom of complete of those
5 census, so it's really not good for us here in the city
6 of Detroit. We really need folks to realize the urgency
7 of completing those census forms.

8 As we do every week on behalf of the board I
9 want to express the board's concern and support for
10 fallen and injured officers and their families. Officer
11 safety and citizens protection are two of the most
12 important priorities of the board. Our board receives a
13 weekly report from the department listing injured
14 officers and I ask that Deputy Chief Marlon Wilson
15 provide us with any updates during his report. The
16 Board of Police Commissioners meet every week except for
17 the Thursday -- Thanksgiving and Christmas holiday.
18 Typically, we meet at police headquarters every Thursday
19 at 3 p.m. except every second Thursday of the month when
20 we meet in the community at 6:30 p.m. However, as
21 indicated before we will hold virtual meetings every
22 Thursday at 3 p.m. until further notice. Under the
23 Detroit city charter Article 7, Chapter 8 the Board of
24 Police Commissioners is in power with supervisory
25 control and oversight of the police department. Our

1 board has broad supervisory responsibilities that
2 includes but is not limited to investigating noncriminal
3 citizens' complaints, monitoring Detroit -- monitoring
4 department operations, working with the mayor and the
5 chief of police to establish police policies, rules and
6 regulations, and acting as the final authority on all
7 disciplinary matters. As an oversight agency the board
8 has the broad responsibility to protect the citizens and
9 create policies to mandate compliance.

10 Additionally, the board works to eliminate
11 police misconduct, discriminatory police practices and
12 unnecessary use of force by police. The board believes
13 in transparency, community input, and accountability and
14 as a civilian oversight agency we must protect the
15 rights of citizens and victims and safeguard the city
16 against unwarranted lawsuits. Our objective is to
17 ensure the safety and protection for everyone.

18 Commissioners, there are several important
19 items for your consideration and information in your
20 board packet e-mailed to you on Tuesday of this week and
21 in your packet today. Under my report we will take up
22 the chief's recommendation to promote 9 lieutenants, 20
23 sergeants, and 22 detectives. I will ask for a vote at
24 the appropriate time. I would like to -- I would like
25 to highlight the updates made to the facial recognition

1 report that you received this week based on the meeting
2 that took place with department executives Captain
3 Tosqui and Director Stein and Vice Chairperson Holt last
4 week on behalf of the board. Based on the meeting
5 discussion the following updates were implemented to
6 review and consideration by the board and the public:
7 Inclusion of demographic information including race and
8 gender of probe photos (sic). Inclusion of source of
9 probe image. Indication of whether or not a violation
10 in policy occurred. Discussion and update on facial
11 recognition report included in the open data portal
12 which is forthwith coming after additional measures are
13 implemented. Commissioners, as we do with other
14 department operations we will continue monitoring and
15 evaluating department -- the department's use of this
16 technology and its effectiveness as well as continue
17 working with the department to ensure transparency and
18 accountability.

19 From the chief's office I am requesting
20 updates on city wide crime statistics and any critical
21 issues or incidents facing the police department. I am
22 also requesting updates on the following: The Detroit
23 news article discussing the 3.5 million dollar wrongful
24 arrest award against a Detroit police officer that was
25 reversed, arrest and citation data, and any other

1 important items implementing -- impacting the
2 department. Today we will have one presentation,
3 Professional Standards Bureau by Director Chris
4 Graveline and Captain Lenay Liddell (sic) or Lena
5 Liddell. Our board -- our interim board secretary
6 Ms. White will also provide us with various updates and
7 incoming weekly correspondence.

8 Lastly, I want to announce a few reminders.
9 Upcoming board elections. Commissioners, Article 4 of
10 the Board of Police Commissioner bylaws governs the
11 officers of the board including the nomination process
12 for the election and duties of the officers. Section 2
13 entitled election of officers and terms states a
14 relevant part. The members may elect officers annually
15 from its membership by majority vote. The term of
16 office is for one year or until the successor has been
17 elected. Further, new offices may be created and filed
18 at any meeting of the board except as otherwise provided
19 each officer will hold office until such officer
20 successor is duly elected.

21 Please note the following information for
22 the nominations process under section 3 of the board's
23 bylaws. A, any board member who is eligible to serve
24 may self nominate or be nominated by a fellow member. A
25 member need not be present to be nominated provided they

1 have previously indicated their willingness to serve.
2 B, it is the responsibility of the candidate to inform
3 the board members of his or her intention to run for
4 office. C, once the chair opens the nominations
5 process, nominations may also be taken from the floor.
6 Nominations do not need a second. Members who are
7 nominated from the floor may decline or accept the
8 nomination but must do so on record. The chair will
9 need a motion and a second to close the nomination.
10 Section four states that -- voting states -- I'm sorry
11 voting states that a quorum is required for voting.
12 Only members presented -- only members present are
13 eligible to vote and any member may vote for him or her
14 herself. Please see section 6B duties of officers for
15 more details on office requirements. We have -- we will
16 have board elections on Thursday, June the 11th, 2020,
17 the second Thursday in June. Please plan to attend and
18 cast your vote.

19 As a reminder Monday, May the 25th, 2020 is
20 Memorial Day where we pay tribute to men and women who
21 have died while serving in the military. The board's
22 office will be closed. Please enjoy your holiday as you
23 honor those who have made the supreme sacrifice while
24 serving in the military and remember to stay safe and
25 well.

1 Again, if participants would like to make a
2 public comment, please complete the Smart sheet
3 referenced on the board's agenda or you may raise your
4 hand by clicking on participants in the attendee
5 controls at the bottom of your computer screen. You
6 will then see raised hand at the bottom of the
7 participants list. Or you may dial star 9 if you are
8 participating by mobile device. You may utilize any of
9 these options by 44 p.m. to acknowledge for public
10 comment. Please also note video or images deemed
11 inappropriate by the chair will result from your
12 dismissal from the meeting. During the public comments
13 section of the agenda each speaker will have two minutes
14 to speak. Mr. Brown will acknowledge each speaker. We
15 will ask that you remain respectful and professional.
16 Please also note the board continues to accept citizens
17 feedback by telephone, e-mail, fax, and mailing and will
18 respond accordingly. The telephone numbers to the

20 And the Office of the Chief Investigator's number is
21 313-596-2499. Again 313-596-2499 should you like to
22 file a citizen complaint regarding alleged police
23 conduct.

24 At this time please silence your cell
25 phones, other electronic devices, and other background

1 sounds to prevent interrupting this meeting. Finally,
2 in the spirit of effective communication please treat
3 each other respectfully and professionally.
4 Commissioners, please be reminded not to speak until you
5 are recognized by the chairperson and address your
6 comments to issues that are relevant to the agenda. My
7 objective is to run an orderly meeting and conduct --
8 and conclude within a reasonable time. Thank you.

9 Now Ms. White, at this time I would like to
10 have the motion of Chief of Police James E. Craig
11 recommendation to promote to the ranks of lieutenant 9,
12 sergeant 20, and detectives 22.

13 SECRETARY WHITE: Yes, Madam Vice Chair.
14 Before you go to that item I did want to also mention
15 that Mr. Brian Tennille representing council member Roy
16 McCalister is also on the line, so I just wanted to make
17 mention of that.

18 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you for
19 sharing that information, Ms. White. So is there a
20 motion in support of Chief Craig's recommendation?

21 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair?

22 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes, Commissioner
23 Bell.

24 COMMISSIONER BELL: If Ms. White would post
25 the motion I would make a motion and I will process to

1 the rank of lieutenant and Ms. White can make the
2 announcement for sergeant and detectives. If that is
3 permissible with the chair.

4 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes, please and
5 thank you for that suggestion.

6 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yeah.

7 SECRETARY WHITE: Okay. I will post the
8 motion now.

9 COMMISSIONER BELL: Do the motion come
10 before or after the names are called?

11 SECRETARY WHITE: The motion will come
12 before but I can -- I am sending to that to you now.

13 COMMISSIONER BELL: Okay, thank you.

14 SECRETARY WHITE: Yes, sir. And actually
15 while I am retrieving that and I'll go ahead and read
16 off the names for the first rank, the lieutenant
17 promotional candidates. Those candidates are as
18 follows: Sergeant Amber S. Roberson, Sergeant Jason R.
19 Adams, Sergeant Scott E. Hall, Sergeant Shelley
20 Holderbaum, Sergeant Velma J. Hampton, Sergeant Shadana
21 M. Bullock, Sergeant William A. Diccicco, Sergeant David
22 **A. Patterson, and Sergeant Shannon A. Hampton to the**
23 **rank of lieutenant. And Commissioner Bell, those --**
24 **that motion language should be in your inbox.**

25 COMMISSIONER BELL: I thought it would show

1 up on the screen but I guess that not the case.

2 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Ms. White, you are
3 aware that it's attached to the agenda. Is there some
4 way you could share that with him instead?

5 SECRETARY WHITE: I can try that way. I am
6 actually on my electronic, my mobile device and so the
7 motion language is not attached.

8 COMMISSIONER BELL: Well, Madam Chair, I
9 move that sergeants that's been named by the board
10 secretary for the rank of lieutenant be approved by this
11 body for the promotion to the rank of lieutenant.

12 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Is there a second?

13 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Second.

14 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: It has been moved
15 and second regarding the promotion of the lieutenants.
16 Is there discussion?

17 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes.

18 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Davis?

19 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes. Are we talking
20 about doing a single vote for all of them at one time or
21 individually? Because, if so because I know there's
22 some on here with very bad discipline records that I
23 would be voting against.

24 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you for that
25 discussion. Is there other discussion?

1 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yeah, Madam Chair,
2 along the same lines that Commissioner Davis was saying.
3 First, I just want to just thank Ms. White for the job
4 she did with laying out and categorizing everything.
5 And some of the stuff that's in there is really
6 appalling but what I would like to see on the next
7 go-around if we could have the dates of when these
8 things actually occurred, 'cause I mean if somebody did
9 something early on in they career, and we're talking 20
10 years later and they're up for promotion, I think some
11 consideration should be given but looking at what I'm
12 seeing right now I think I'm in agreement with
13 Commissioner Davis.

14 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Which is that we...

15 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Vote on them
16 individually.

17 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: I'm sorry?

18 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Vote on them
19 individually.

20 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Oh okay. Well at
21 this point are there any other discussion? Okay I guess
22 we need a roll call vote, Ms. Holt -- I'm sorry,
23 Ms. White, on the motion.

24 SECRETARY WHITE: Yes. Commissioner Bell?

25 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yea. I can amend my

1 motion that we vote individually for the rank of
2 lieutenant.

3 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay now in that
4 regard what's the -- is the motion then rescinded or
5 what?

6 COMMISSIONER BROWN: It's amended.

7 COMMISSIONER BELL: Amended motion that's on
8 the floor, if there's a second for the amended motion.

9 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Oh okay. All right.
10 Well do we have a second on the amendment?

11 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Second.

12 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. Discussion?
13 All right. Here we go. Roll call vote, Ms. White, for
14 the amendment.

9 motion passed, Madam Vice Chair.

10 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay, on the
11 amendment, so we need to go back and make a motion in
12 support of Chief Craig's recommendation.

13 COMMISSIONER BELL: No, we good. We just
14 have to vote them up now individually.

15 SECRETARY WHITE: Okay, so for -- so the
16 first name for the rank of sergeant to -- the
17 promotional rank of sergeant to the rank of lieutenant
18 excuse me is Sergeant Amber Roberson.

19 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yea. I'm sorry roll
20 call, please.

21 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Roll call vote,
22 Ms. White.

23 SECRETARY WHITE: Yes. Commissioner Bell?

13 motion failed.

14 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, Ms.
15 White. So now we need a motion for the promotions of
16 sergeants.

17 SECRETARY WHITE: Yes.

18 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Bell,
19 would you offer that motion?

20 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yes, Madam Chair, but I
21 think this going to be a long drawn out process and
22 perhaps we can lift up those names that commissioners
23 have concern in reference to making a motion. When I
24 make the motion -- after I make the motion then we can
25 go immediately to that, then thereafter we can entertain

1 the rest of them in a body more or less for the sake of
2 time if that's permissible. If the commissioner
3 understand my discussion at this time.

4 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. Now
5 Commissioner Bell, so you're suggesting that we go into
6 a discussion independent of now?

7 COMMISSIONER BELL: No, ma'am. I would make
8 the motion for them individually but the commissioner
9 would have the opportunity thereafter to list the
10 opposition to individuals that they did not want to be
11 promoted, if there's consistency on two or three
12 commissioners have speaking to that versus -- but if not
13 it's up to the body.

14 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. Now in my
15 example I would have to have those materials in front of
16 me in order to be in support or not in support, so I
17 guess I need to better understand how you plan for us to
18 offer constructive support or not.

19 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Madam Chair?

20 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Brown.

21 COMMISSIONER BROWN: I understand clearly
22 what Commissioner Bell is saying.

23 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay.

24 COMMISSIONER BROWN: I think that looking at
25 it, if everyone has the list in front of them, I only

1 see like four candidates on here that I would probably
2 recommended promoting right now. I think going forward
3 after this we need to go into a closed session to have
4 some discussion about these things before we get to this
5 thing point and then have some further discussion with
6 the chief's office.

7 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I agree.

8 COMMISSIONER BROWN: I mean, I just have to
9 give Interim Secretary White props on putting this
10 together and laying it out.

11 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you,
12 Commissioner Brown for that detail and candidate
13 suggestion along with Commissioner Bell.

14 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair --

15 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Madam Chair.

16 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes, sir.
17 Commissioner Davis.

18 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I would suggest that
19 perhaps we should initially start off with the people
20 that have no discipline and perhaps we could vote for
21 them in a group. And then the ones that do have
22 discipline we could decide whether or not we going to be
23 for or against them. But all the ones with discipline
24 I'm voting against.

25 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. Thank you for

1 your comment, Commissioner Davis. Someone else is
2 speaking?

3 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, in light of
4 this type of discussion I think we in a position that
5 the motion -- I make a motion that we table for the rank
6 of sergeant to next week to take this under
7 consideration.

8 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Support.

9 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: It's been moved and
10 second that we table the support -- Chief Craig's
11 support, the list of sergeants at this meeting. Is
12 there a discussion?

13 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Madam Chairperson
14 Reverend Holley.

15 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes, Commissioner
16 Holley.

17 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: My concern is, and I
18 support Commissioner Bell, but my concern is that why
19 would the chief vote -- recommended people that have
20 some of these kind of undisciplined characters with
21 them. I don't -- it looks like to me he ought to be in
22 the meeting to justify some of these promotions that he
23 is recommending. I think he ought to be -- have some
24 justification for this.

25 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: And I thank you,

1 Commissioner Holley. I believe that's the point that
2 Commissioner Brown alluded to but I think we're -- is
3 there any other discussion?

4 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair.

5 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes, sir.

6 COMMISSIONER BELL: Commissioner Holley is
7 correct but there's a whole a lot that go into play in
8 reference to promotion by contract and by the chief
9 authority, so we have to have a closed discussion. If
10 we have that concern about an individual, we cannot have
11 a public discussion, so that's why I suggest that we
12 table next week and then we can bring that into play
13 prior to that meeting of all those concerns and it's
14 been echoed in the past, it's quite clear that it's
15 unreadiness here. So that would be something that we
16 have to take in consideration.

17 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay, thank you.

18 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Madam Assistant Chair.

19 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes, Commissioner
20 Burch.

21 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes, I just think we
22 need to move on and do this discussion at closed
23 session, 'cause I think we're taking up a lot of time
24 that we going back and forth. I just think we should
25 move on and vote to have a closed session about this.

1 Thank you.

2 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Madam Chairperson,
3 Reverend Holley.

4 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes, Reverend
5 Holley. I mean, Commissioner Holley.

6 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I'm okay but I can't
7 believe sister Burch is talking about time but since she
8 is -- I love her so much -- but I just think I'm asking
9 the chief ought to be there to justify this. That's all
10 I'm asking, whether it's a closed session I think the
11 chief need to be there to justify these promotions.
12 That's all I'm asking.

13 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you,
14 Commissioner Holley, but I think we have a vote to table
15 the discussion -- to table the motion.

16 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Madam Chair, I call the
17 question.

18 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes. Ms. White,
19 would you call the votes?

20 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Bell?

21 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yea.

22 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Brown?

23 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yea.

24 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Brooks?

25 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Yes.

1 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Burch?

2 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes, ma'am.

3 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Burton?

4 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Present.

5 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Davis?

6 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes.

7 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Griffie?

8 Commissioner Holley?

9 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Yes, ma'am.

10 SECRETARY WHITE: Madam Vice Chair?

11 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes.

12 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner --

13 Chairperson Carter? Okay, the motion passed, Madam Vice

14 Chair.

15 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you,
16 Commissioners for that very focused and professional
17 discussion. Now we need a motion in support --

18 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair. I think we
19 are in the same predicament here with the detective
20 rank. I move that we table promotion to detective to
21 next week also.

22 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Second?

23 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: I second. Second.

24 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Discussion? It's
25 been moved and second. Ms. White, may we please have a

1 roll call vote?

2 SECRETARY WHITE: Yes. Commissioner Bell?

3 COMMISSIONER BELL: Yea.

4 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Brown?

5 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yes.

6 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Brooks?

7 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Yes.

8 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Burch?

9 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes, ma'am.

10 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Burton?

11 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Present.

12 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Davis?

13 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes.

14 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Griffie?

15 Commissioner Holley?

16 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Yes, ma'am.

17 SECRETARY WHITE: Madam Vice Chair?

18 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes.

19 SECRETARY WHITE: Chairperson Carter? The
20 motion passed, Madam Vice Chair.

21 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you. Now
22 we're going to move on to the chief summary of CompStat
23 and crime information that will be given by Deputy Chief
24 Marlon Wilson.

25 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Yes, ma'am. Through

1 the chair.

2 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you.

3 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: I'll start out with
4 crime. Year to date we currently have 90 homicides,
5 which is a 23 percent increase. Sexual assaults we're
6 at 246, which is a decrease of 26 percent. Aggravated
7 assaults we're at 3,230 which is an increase of 4
8 percent. Nonfatal shootings we're at 260 which is an
9 increase of 31 percent. Robberies we're even at 737.
10 Carjackings as well we're even at 63 year-to-date. That
11 gives us an overall violent crime increase of 1 percent.
12 Go to property crime. Burglaries we're at 1,899, which
13 is a decrease of 23 percent. Larcenies we're at 4,446
14 which is a decrease of 12 percent. Motor vehicle thefts
15 we're at 2,274 which is pretty much just under 1
16 percent, and that gives us an overall part one reduction
17 of 12 percent, part one property crime.

18 I'll kind of note two recent incidents that
19 were in the news. For the last few hours we had a 3
20 year old shot and a four year old. The three-year-old
21 is still recovering at the hospital; three-year-old
22 female was shot in the stomach in the 7000 block of Nett
23 Street yesterday at 10 p.m. The victim was with her
24 mother driving in the location when two unknown black
25 males it appears got into a shoot-out striking the child

1 in the car.

2 The next incident happened a few hours later
3 earlier this morning at 12:50 a.m., 18000 block of
4 Birwood. A four-year-old male was shot; he was inside a
5 residence. Several shots from a high powered rifle were
6 fired inside -- fired into the location, unfortunately
7 fatally injuring the four-year-old. Really have vague
8 information on the shooter, but we're looking for a
9 white mid-sized Jeep. That will conclude crime.

10 Get into sick and injured officers. SPO
11 Connor Donahue who was injured recently in a vehicle
12 accident he's at a rehab facility now recovering. And
13 we have two members currently hospitalized as a result
14 of the COVID-19. Rapid test and quarantine information,
15 we currently have 35 members who are quarantined.
16 That's a break down of 26 sworn, 9 civilian. The
17 department has returned 1,127 members to full duty
18 status.

19 Get into the tickets associated with
20 COVID-19. Year-to-date we've issued 2,551 citations and
21 6,048 warnings. Going a little further down the next
22 question that was posed by the board was to get an
23 update on the news article regarding the 3.5 million
24 dollar wrongful arrest. I'm going to have DC Grant Ha
25 speak on that.

1 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Ms. White?

2 SECRETARY WHITE: Yes, we are locating him
3 in the participant list to un-mute him.

4 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, I'm
5 sorry.

6 SECRETARY WHITE: Oh no, that's no problem.
7 Thank you for your patience.

8 ATTORNEY HA: Madam Vice Chair, if I may --
9 hello?

10 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: We can hear you.

11 ATTORNEY HA: Okay, I'm sorry, I didn't know
12 if you could. So the case that they were talking about
13 is called Marvin Seals and it was a lawsuit stemming
14 from an incident back in January of 2012. Mr. Seals was
15 arrested as a part of a joint federal task force and the
16 defendant officer Zberkot was the intake officer, so he
17 didn't have any role in the arrest. His sole duty and
18 responsibility was to book Mr. Seals. Some time in
19 January -- I'm sorry sometime in 2018 there was a trial.
20 The jury awarded Mr. Seals 3.5 million dollars. The
21 litigation attorney spoke with the jurors after the
22 verdict and basically their rationale was well, all the
23 people that were really responsible were no longer
24 defendants so somebody had to be responsible, so they
25 made Officer Zberkot responsible. The city on behalf of

1 Mr. Seals -- I'm sorry Officer Zberkot appealed the
2 matter and the Court of Appeals said that Officer
3 Zberkot was not grossly negligent, and he did not engage
4 in misconduct and therefore reversed the 3.5 million
5 dollar verdict.

6 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Question -- thank
7 you. Are there questions from the commissioners?

8 COMMISSIONER BROWN: That's just good news.

9 ATTORNEY HA: Yes, it was.

10 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: As I understand it
11 was the highest amount in a suit in the state of
12 Michigan. So yes, it was Commissioner Brown, good news.
13 Good news. Any questions for Deputy Chief Marlon
14 Wilson?

15 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yes, Madam Chair.

16 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you. Yes,
17 Commissioner Brown.

18 COMMISSIONER BROWN: So in light of Congress
19 passing the act to include coronavirus deaths in the
20 line of duty death category, are you familiar with that?

21 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Yes, sir.

22 COMMISSIONER BROWN: So is it safe to assume
23 that Captain Parnell and the name of the 9-1-1
24 dispatcher escapes me, I think his name was Shawn
25 something. I just don't know at this time. Are they

1 going to be considered to fall upon that category? And
2 also I did see that congress or someone was putting an
3 act together to extend that to the families of police
4 officer, first responders, and I just -- I didn't get a
5 copy of what the actual language was but I'm thinking it
6 is including the families that may have been affected by
7 the corona deaths like in the case of Ebbie Herbert. It
8 was -- is that something that's being considered also,
9 are we familiar with that, and how are we pursuing it?

10 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: I'm not familiar with
11 the extension. Maybe Grant Ha can kind of chime in but
12 to answer your question, the first part of your
13 question, yes, Captain Parnell and members from
14 communications will be considered a line of duty death.

15 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Okay.

16 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Any other -- thank
17 you Deputy Chief.

18 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I have a question.

19 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Davis.

20 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Question. Has domestic
21 violence cases gone up or gone down, 'cause I know in
22 other municipalities I've heard they've gone up. How
23 are they doing here?

24 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: We do track that data
25 weekly. It has not went up, surprisingly. I mean, when

1 we started this pandemic we did think that it was going
2 to go up but we have not seen an increase in domestic
3 violence but we have seen an increase in homicides and
4 nonfatal shootings.

5 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Thank you.

6 ATTORNEY HA: Madam Chair, may I address the
7 previous question from Commissioner Brown?

8 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes, sir. Grant Ha.

9 ATTORNEY HA: So in regards to Captain
10 Parnell there is a fund that officers get when they
11 parish in the line of duty. And under Lieutenant John
12 Whitmer he made an application for that 350 thousand
13 dollars and that was presented to the chief, and the
14 chief signed off on it, and to my knowledge that will be
15 the first time that someone has made an argument for in
16 line of duty based upon a disease. So based upon that
17 what happens with that then we'll make efforts to get
18 whatever funding that we can for COVID for Captain
19 Parnell and his family.

20 COMMISSIONER BROWN: What I was speaking of
21 is that Congress just passed an act to extend that to
22 add coronavirus deaths as to be included as a line of
23 duty death. They just signed that in the law. The
24 other part that I saw was that they were trying to
25 extend that to the families that, you know, if you

1 yourself may have been asymptomatic and may have taken
2 it home and affected your wife and she may have passed
3 due to you being exposed, you may not even be sick, I
4 guess that was the thinking with extending that to the
5 families of first responders. I just -- I saw it and I
6 haven't heard anything else about it. I just wanted to
7 see if you guys were up to date on it or knew anything
8 about it and --

9 ATTORNEY HA: No. I'm sorry, sir, I'm not
10 familiar with that one.

11 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, Grant Ha.
12 Commissioner Brown, is it possible for you to send that
13 information to Ms. White so that we all will have an
14 understanding as to what it is you're sharing?

15 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yeah.

16 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: You said you saw it
17 someplace?

18 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yes.

19 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: May I ask that you
20 send it --

21 COMMISSIONER BROWN: I'll send it to her.
22 I'll go back and go through these files and I will send
23 that to her.

24 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: We would appropriate
25 that so that we're all as educated about this issue as

1 you are. Any other questions to deputy --

2 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes, Madam Chair.

3 Madam Chair.

4 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes, Commissioner

5 Burch.

6 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes, thank you. I
7 would just like for the officers to share, if they
8 could. There was a barricade gun man in the 11th
9 precinct and I just wanted to know was that due to COVID
10 or was it domestic violence because I understand it was
11 a young lady that escaped from harm but they had the big
12 tank like going down the street to this location. Could
13 you elaborate on what was wrong if you found out with
14 the young man that barricaded himself?

15 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Through the chair I
16 don't have that, the details in front of me but what I
17 can recall that occurred in 2000 block of Greeley
18 Street. I believe that was a domestic incident and
19 they're still looking for the defendant in that matter.

20 COMMISSIONER BURCH: They didn't capture
21 him?

22 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: I don't believe he was
23 inside the location when they cleared it. I stand
24 corrected. I stand corrected. I'm looking at it now,
25 the suspect was taken into custody.

1 COMMISSIONER BURCH: He was. So now they
2 got to evaluate and see was it COVID or was it just
3 domestic because, you know, people are very antsy today;
4 some of them are afraid. We need to know as far as the
5 community what was his issue, if you could let the
6 public know that.

7 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Yes, ma'am. 'Cause
8 the initial information that I'm looking at right now is
9 that it was domestic related; it was his girlfriend who
10 fled the location but to get a little deep into it I'll
11 have to talk to the 11th precinct to see if it was
12 connected to the COVID scare.

13 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Sure. Thank you so
14 much.

15 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. Are there any
16 other questions? Thank you Deputy Chief and Grant Ha
17 for your cooperation with this report.

18 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: You're welcome.

19 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay now next on the
20 agenda we will have a Professional Standards Bureau
21 report or presentation.

22 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: Good afternoon, Madam
23 Vice Chair.

24 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Good afternoon.

25 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: This is Director Chris

1 Graveline if I could also request that interim secretary
2 White un-mute Captain Lena Liddell as well. She is
3 going to be helping with this presentation.

4 SECRETARY WHITE: Yes, sir, will do.

5 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: And once we have
6 Captain Liddell, she will actually begin the
7 presentation this afternoon.

8 CAPTAIN LIDDELL: Good afternoon, honorable
9 board.

10 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: I'm sorry. Oh thank
11 you.

12 CAPTAIN LIDDELL: Can you hear me now?

13 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes, I can.

14 CAPTAIN LIDDELL: I'm Lena Liddell Captain
15 of Internal Controls, which is an entity within
16 Professional Standards Bureau. I oversee force
17 investigation and internal affairs. Can we go to the
18 third slide, please? This slide gives a brief overview
19 of how complaints are processed in the internal affairs
20 office. If there is a possibility of criminality in the
21 complaint but not enough information to move forward
22 with the full investigation, we'll assign it as a
23 preliminary investigation which is also known as a PI
24 case. If there's evidence of criminality or serious
25 misconduct, it is assigned as an internal affairs case.

1 If there's no criminality or there's lesser misconduct,
2 it is turned over to the Office of the Chief
3 Investigator to the involved member's command and is
4 assigned to our office as a no case.

5 Next slide please. Our cases are given 90
6 days for completion. Priority cases are expedited.
7 Cases can be delayed due to prosecutorial review, court
8 proceedings, forensic DNA testing, and duty status of
9 the involved officers. Currently, there are 21 cases
10 under review by the Wayne County prosecutor's office, 8
11 of which were submitted in the year 2018.

12 Next slide please. There are currently 44
13 duty status modifications, 11 of which are
14 administrative duty, 23 administrative no gun, 5
15 suspended with pay, and 5 suspended without pay.

16 Next slide, please. In a four-year
17 comparison internal affairs cases are as follows: In
18 2017 we had 157 cases for the year but 68 for
19 year-to-date May 16th. For 2018 we had 155 cases, 68
20 year-to-date; 154 in 2019, 61 year-to-date. This year
21 as of May 16th we have 43 cases, so there's a 38 percent
22 decrease in comparison to the year 2017.

23 Next slide. Four-year comparison for the
24 preliminary investigations. In 2017 we had 77 cases, 21
25 year-to-date; 88 in 2018, 32 year-to-date; and 98 2019,

1 31 year-to-date. And for the year 2020 as of May 16th
2 we have 43 preliminary investigations assigned to our
3 unit. There has been a 95 percent increase from the
4 year 2017. Most of those increases are due to lawsuits
5 and larceny allegations at the now operated city tow
6 yards.

7 I will now turn the presentation over to
8 Director Christopher Graveline of Professional Standards
9 Bureau.

10 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: Thank you, if we could
11 go to the next slide please. This slide shows the cases
12 investigated by our force investigations over the last
13 four years. And so in 2017 we had a total of 38 cases
14 investigated by force with 13 investigated year-to-date.
15 In 2018 there were 34 cases total with 12 year-to-date;
16 2019 there were 37 with 15 year-to-date, and there have
17 been 14 cases year-to-date. So this year 2020 is
18 essentially statistical similarity with the last three
19 years.

20 We can go to the next slide. This -- we
21 also investigate any time a Detroit police officer
22 discharges their firearm. And generally speaking these
23 fall into four categories: It could be fatal shootings,
24 it could be nonfatal shootings, shots fired but did not
25 take effect, or an unintentional discharge of their

1 firearm. And so what we see in 2017 we had three fatal
2 shootings, four nonfatal shootings, two shots fired, one
3 unintentional discharge. We had -- and these are all
4 year-to-date totals right here. In 2018 there were two
5 fatal shootings, three nonfatal, two shots fired, one
6 unintentional. 2019 there were zero fatalities, one
7 nonfatal, one shots fired, and one unintentional. And
8 in 2020 year-to-date -- actually I have to report a
9 slight error in this slide we have had zero fatalities
10 year-to-date, two non-fatal, and four accidental
11 discharge. Once again it was not a fatal shooting this
12 year. We had a fatal shooting right towards the end of
13 2019 and, unfortunately, that got put on to this slide
14 but there actually have been zero fatal shootings
15 year-to-date.

16 We can go to the next slide, please. This
17 shows a three year comparison not of year-to-dates but
18 the actual annual total, so we don't see 2020 on here,
19 but in the complete year in 2017 there were four fatal
20 shootings, there was five nonfatal shootings, eleven
21 shots fired, and four unintentional. In 2018 there were
22 two fatal shootings, three nonfatal, two shots fired,
23 one unintentional discharge; and in 2019 there were
24 actually two fatal shootings. This is where that error
25 came in. There were actually two fatal shootings in

1 2019, five non-fatals, three shots fired, and four
2 unintentional discharges.

3 Go to the next slide, please. We also
4 investigate any fatal pursuit accidents, and I know this
5 has been a topic of conversation for the last couple of
6 weeks about the pursuant policy, and one of the reasons
7 that we have our pursuant policy is we want to make sure
8 we mitigate any risk to citizens out there based upon
9 police chases. And as you can see in this particular
10 graph on year-to-date in 2017 we had three fatal
11 pursuits. In 2018 we had one fatal pursuant year to
12 date. 2019, zero. And this year we've already had one
13 fatal pursuit.

14 We can go to the next slide. And then
15 year-end totals for fatal pursuits in 2017 there were
16 five, in 2018 there were two, 2019 there was one. And
17 then there were also two critical pursuits in both the
18 years of 2018 and 2019.

19 Then, finally, if we go to our next slide.
20 This is case closure rate for our entire IA to date, so
21 this is what we have done to date. We've had nine
22 sustained, six not sustained, one exonerated, nine
23 administrative closures, ten not sustained for what was
24 the original reported misconduct but then sustained for
25 other misconduct, and four unfounded.

1 And just to put those numbers into some type
2 of context, if we can go to our next slide. These are
3 our case closure rates over the last three years. And
4 so what you've seen is an increase in same findings over
5 the last three years from 2017 to 2019, a decrease in
6 the not sustained, as well as holding steady more or
7 less for admin closures and for sustained but sustained
8 for other misconduct. And with that if we go to our
9 last slide that's our Professional Standards Bureau
10 report for this year subject to any questions.

11 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, Director
12 Chief Graveline, and Captain Lena Liddell.
13 Commissioners, any questions, please?

14 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes.

15 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes.

16 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Davis
17 and Commissioner Burch.

18 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Question, do ya'all
19 also have any information to track any of the other law
20 enforcement activities inside the city of Detroit like
21 say the state police, county sheriff, or federal
22 agencies that might have discharged weapons or
23 shootings?

24 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: Through the chair. No,
25 we do not, Commissioner Davis. We do not keep any stats

1 on outside agencies' police activities in terms of
2 force, uses of force.

3 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Had ya'all thought
4 about doing that?

5 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: We have not. Simply --
6 we're a pretty active internal affairs and force
7 investigations unit already but we have not really
8 tracked any of those others. We could begin to track
9 just numerically but often times we would -- those other
10 agencies would not report back what their findings were.
11 So simply what we would be able to show was the initial
12 it happened as opposed to what those findings were. I
13 think a lot of the outside agencies would be reluctant
14 to come back and report what their findings were in
15 terms of sustained or not sustained misconduct.

16 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Thank you.

17 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Burch?

18 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes, ma'am. Thank you
19 Madam Assistant Chair. I would like to go back to where
20 -- so can you hear me?

21 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: Yes.

22 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Okay, good. When you
23 mentioned the pursuits, you know, like when the police
24 we know that through Chief Craig our officers are
25 trained not to chase but here's my issue. I'm thinking

1 more along the lines of preventive. Why can't we have
2 more of what we call decoys or even if the state police
3 whomever it is if we're short of the officers, a decoy
4 could be placed in hot spots where they can catch these
5 people that are recklessly driving. That's my whole
6 issue. And that's the problem over the whole city of
7 Detroit. I'm speaking, sir and ma'am, about the 11th
8 precinct that Commander Slappey does an excellent job,
9 I'm not speaking against what she's doing, okay? I'm
10 saying why can't you have more decoys; why can't we,
11 whomever the department it needs to go through, that we
12 would have signs and really enforce those signs for
13 speeding and give that person 200 dollars when it's
14 reckless. I believe that would cut down on the
15 ridiculous driving in the neighborhoods. Please comment
16 on what I said. Thank you.

17 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: Yes, commissioner,
18 through the chair.

19 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Madam Chair, before he
20 responds can I just ask him a question?

21 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Brown,
22 sure.

23 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Along the same lines
24 and thank you, D.C. Graveline and Captain Liddell for
25 your report. I appreciate all the information. To be

1 clear to that my issue is not just chasing people all
2 over the city, it's when officers are trying to effect a
3 traffic stop so whatever that may be, they got to pull
4 someone over. I'm hearing and witnessing on the radio
5 out there that people will attempt to act like they're
6 going to pull over and then they just pull off from the
7 police. And my question is not to just go chasing
8 people all over the place, it's just, okay, once they do
9 that what are we going to do about it? What are we
10 doing? That's what I'm talking about with the policies.
11 As I understood last week it was just totally
12 misunderstood what I was saying. That's what I'm
13 looking at is that people are pulling off once they're
14 being pulled over and summoned to pull over by a police
15 officer on a traffic stop and people are just pulling
16 off. You know, they don't have any concern about
17 darting into traffic just like Commissioner Burch's
18 concern with the reckless driving. They don't have any
19 concern at all. Yeah, I understand the no chase policy;
20 I understand that they're not going to chase people to
21 give them a traffic ticket, but the question is what are
22 we going to do about it to make them think twice about
23 it?

24 I understand a couple weeks ago an
25 individual that works for this department, and I'm going

1 to leave it at that, wouldn't pull over for a police
2 officer and it was, you know, they was speeding, you
3 know, and took this person all the way down to head
4 quarters, you know, and it was like, okay, what were you
5 thinking that you don't have the right or responsibility
6 to pull over and respect the people that you work with.
7 So this is what I'm saying, my point is, okay, with our
8 policy yeah, I know we don't want to chase; I got that.
9 But, okay, what are we going to do about it after the
10 point? They just run from the police, just don't pull
11 over, and nothing is done about it? That's what's my
12 concern.

13 DIRECTOR GRAVELINE: If I can address two
14 points. First in terms of Commissioner Burch's question
15 I'm going to defer to D.C. Wilson and also TSS. They're
16 the ones who set up strategy for more decoys or whatnot.
17 In terms of just the no chase it's always a balance of
18 risk out there, right? And that's what we're hoping to
19 instill within our officers to think about; it's not
20 just we need to stop this guy right now. Now with
21 putting that information out over dispatch the people in
22 that precinct, the other officers in that precinct, if
23 they encounter that same person in a more controlled
24 ability to stop that person, they can effect that stop
25 as well. And so it's working together but also it's

1 very important simply because too often times what we'll
2 see when these chases happen is the people who really
3 don't care about other individuals are the people who
4 are taking off and the people who get hurt are the ones
5 who are just going through a green light at an
6 intersection. That's why it's important, you know, for
7 us to make sure that we're also instilling the message
8 of we have to make sure that we don't have a law less
9 city, right? But also at the same time we don't want to
10 create such a dangerous environment that for those
11 people who are just traveling out on the road that
12 they're worried about a 90 mile per hour police chase
13 coming.

14 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Madam Vice Chair, if I
15 may.

16 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yeah.

17 COMMISSIONER BROWN: The other issue is
18 this, so let's just say an officer is trying to effect a
19 traffic stop, and the person decides he's going to play
20 I'm going to pull over then pull off. (Inaudible)
21 understanding what's going on and that person caused the
22 accident that puts us in the point of responsibility it
23 will appear that we were chasing this person. So it's
24 like all these things that we need to look at to
25 redefine a policy to include the things, okay, what are

1 we going to do, you know, if the person pulls off,
2 should the officer just get in his car and drive behind
3 him slowly? You know, what should we do because at the
4 same time we have to protect be ourselves against these
5 frivolous lawsuits because I can see it coming, you
6 know, and it's going to happen because the way people
7 are pulling off from the police it's just a total regard
8 and disrespect for the police today and we need to do
9 something; it needs to stop and we need to do something
10 about it, the reckless driving, all of it, it needs to
11 stop and we need to start pinpointing and hammering it
12 down and cracking down on it. I mean, whether it's
13 impounding these vehicles. It makes nice undercover
14 police cars but we need to get some better policies
15 addressing this issue for today's point that we're
16 experiencing right now 'cause this is like they just
17 don't care, they just pulling off. And it's like we
18 can't just sit here and say, well, we're not going to
19 chase. Okay, we know that. But what's our follow-up?
20 What do the public understand and know that if you do
21 this, there's a penalty that you're going to have to
22 pay?

23 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Madam chair?

24 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Any other questions
25 from the commissioners?

1 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yeah, Madam Chair. I'm
2 trying to get back in. Thank you so much. I appreciate
3 all your input, Commissioner Brown, but I want to hear
4 the answer about what I asked. Why can't we enforce
5 with a higher cost of a ticket? Why can't we have more
6 decoys? So I don't want you to deviate from what I
7 asked in the beginning and then you have so many
8 questions coming from my dear commissioner. Please
9 answer what I asked you about decoys and about the
10 price.

11 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Through the chair D.C.
12 Wilson, I can answer that question.

13 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you.

14 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: So Commissioner Burch,
15 I'll get with D.C. Bryant and Commander Slappey in
16 respect to the 11th precinct because we can deploy some
17 decoys and different things in the 11th precinct to try
18 to address that issue. So I'll get with them after this
19 call.

20 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I appreciate it, thank
21 you.

22 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Then follow-up with,
23 Commissioner Brown. What we're actually seeing it's a
24 growing trend with this, you know, not pulling over and
25 kind of playing chicken with the police, if you will.

1 And it's really pinpointed to that part of the drifting
2 community, drag racing community that's not working with
3 the chief. So we are actively identifying those
4 individuals. D.C. Bettison, I don't know if he's still
5 on the phone, but he's done a great job with his team
6 making lock-ups, forfeiting cars. We just did an
7 operation where we had Intel where our Detroit Griffin
8 Community, those with an active role were going to
9 Atlanta. We teamed up with Atlanta Police Department;
10 we made over 40 arrests. One of the key players that's
11 generating all of this he's locked up and he's probably
12 in custody on a felony charge.

13 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, Deputy
14 Chief. I'd like to ask a question as well. And I know
15 we have a very marginal reserve and I'm not trying to
16 compare our police force with those of other
17 municipalities, but sometimes when you see, you know,
18 what I might view as a traffic stop by the law enforcers
19 you don't see one car you'll see two. So now is that a
20 practice that we subscribe to here in the city that when
21 you do stop someone two police cars are involved in that
22 ridiculous stop?

23 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Probably 'cause they
24 only have one-man cars.

25 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: And that's the

1 question. So typically we do not utilize that process
2 because when you look in our neighboring jurisdictions
3 say Livonia or Canton a lot of their cars are one person
4 cars, so --

5 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Oh so they can
6 afford to have two cars at one stop?

7 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Absolutely.

8 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. Thank you for
9 sharing.

10 DEPUTY CHIEF BETTISON: I just want to chime
11 in. Yeah, I just want to chime in. D.C. Wilson kicked
12 it over to me real quick that in regards to Commissioner
13 Brown question, you know, what can we do? We are doing
14 some things. Actually, we got video of a young man
15 doing a drifting exhibition, reckless driving I should
16 say, at a gas station and he was doing doughnut
17 maneuvers around gas pumps and we were able to -- the
18 thing is you have to actually by law be able to have a
19 picture of the individual to show that that person is
20 the actual one driving at the time along with
21 identifying the car. In working with Grant Ha he got
22 the information over to the prosecutor's office and we
23 actually ended up getting a warrant to seize that
24 vehicle. We were able to put a case together and we
25 actually did go out at a later point in time and seize

1 that vehicle.

2 So when we get information to be able to
3 identify the vehicle, even though it pulled off, if we
4 got the license plate and we can pull surrounding video,
5 it may be a business video or maybe from Green Light
6 work; if we can get any type of video proving that the
7 person who's operating that car at the time was the one
8 that was engaged in that reckless driving, then we can
9 secure possibly a warrant for arrest and a vehicle
10 seizure, and we will utilize technology to do that. So
11 that's our way to be able to definitely hold folks
12 accountable and work on keeping the community safe as
13 well without engaging in high speed pursuits. And of
14 course we're working, you know, the, you know, through
15 our real time crime center and getting information about
16 when these type of exhibitions will take place, we
17 definitely are going to hold people accountable and
18 don't forget about air support. That's another
19 mechanism where we can still follow and not have a per
20 se vehicle behind them at the same time.

21 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you, Deputy
22 Chief Bettison. That was an enlightenment. Are there
23 other questions from the commissioners? Okay. Again,
24 thank you DPD for your very thorough discussion. And
25 thank you commissioners for pointed questions. Okay

1 next on the agenda is report from the interim board
2 secretary.

3 SECRETARY WHITE: Yes, thank you, Madam Vice
4 Chairperson. Honorable commissioners, please see item
5 ten of the agenda for incoming correspondence this week.
6 The board received the following items: Number one, DPD
7 facial recognition report number 28 with updates.

8 Number two, correspondence from Mr. DeWayne
9 Williams regarding a citizen's complaint alleging police
10 misconduct, and we've also forwarded that complaint to
11 the Office of the Chief Investigator for appropriate
12 resolution.

13 Number three, correspondence from Mrs. Janet
14 Smith regarding a citizen's complaint also alleging
15 police misconduct and we've also forwarded that
16 complaint to OCI for resolution.

17 Number four, the DPD promotional packet.

18 And number five, an anonymous complaint
19 shared by Deputy Chief Bettison which we've also
20 forwarded to the Office of the Chief Investigator for
21 appropriate resolution. And that concludes the incoming
22 correspondence at this time.

23 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you,
24 Ms. White. So do I understand that we too have this
25 anonymous complaint, the board does?

1 SECRETARY WHITE: Yes.

2 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: It's in our packet?

3 SECRETARY WHITE: Yes, that should have been
4 in your inbox.

5 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. Thank you.
6 Before we go on I'd like to say thank you Commissioner
7 Brown for sending that e-mail. So fellow commissioners
8 you might want to revisit your e-mails, and perhaps I
9 don't know maybe we can have some dialogue in support of
10 the monies that would be extended to support first
11 responders as a result of the COVID-19. So again
12 Commissioner Brown sent us all that e-mail. Is there
13 any unfinished business?

14 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam chair?

15 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes, Commissioner
16 Bell.

17 COMMISSIONER BELL: I'd just like to revisit
18 the board secretary report. In reference to the
19 discussion about promotion I would ask that Ms. White
20 provide information and background in reference to how
21 this process work and our role, the contract, and all
22 that before. It's not just about the chief showing up
23 it's about our legal rights and role that we need to
24 play in this. This is not the first time we have raised
25 this issue, but I think we need to go into closed

1 session but we need to be prepared prior to. I think
2 Ms. White clearly understand my concern and you
3 understand those issues that we talked about. It just
4 not a light subject, so we need to make sure we prepared
5 to have that discussion with background support
6 material.

7 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you,
8 Commissioner Bell. Ms. White, I'm sure you understand,
9 right?

10 SECRETARY WHITE: Yes, ma'am. I have noted
11 the concerns.

12 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you. Okay do
13 we have any new business?

14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes, yes, yes.

15 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Burton,
16 is that you?

17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes. I have a couple
18 items under new business. Number one, I move that with
19 the city vehicles (inaudible).

20 COMMISSIONER BROWN: I think we lost him.

21 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I think he's frozen.

22 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. Commissioner
23 Burton? Ms. White, does Commissioner Burton have access
24 to chat?

25 SECRETARY WHITE: No, the chat feature is

1 not enabled but if he has any issues, he can always feel
2 free to contact the staff's numbers listed in the
3 correspondence we sent earlier but he appears to be
4 frozen at this time, Madam Vice Chair.

5 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Does that mean he
6 cannot hear us?

7 SECRETARY WHITE: He should be able to hear
8 us but for some reason there are some technical
9 difficulties on his end.

10 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Madam Chair.

11 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Burton?
12 I've been on several Zoom meetings and sometimes when we
13 don't update --

14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Madam Chair.

15 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: -- update a version
16 sometimes the screen will freeze or we'll just get
17 disconnected from the Internet. Are you ready,
18 Commissioner Burton?

19 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yeah, Madam Chair.

20 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes, sir.

21 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I have a few items. I
22 have a couple of items for new business. I move that
23 the Board of Police Commissioners city vehicles be used
24 for non -- concerns about staff using city vehicles for
25 take home. So I move that we use our city vehicle for

1 staffing when they're working and not to be taken home
2 vehicles, 'cause it's not (inaudible).

3 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay, Commissioner
4 Burton did I understand you to say you wanted to move
5 that Board of Police Commissioners not take home the
6 city issued technology?

7 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Vehicles.

8 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Oh vehicle. Is
9 there a motion -- is there support? Is there support?

10 COMMISSIONER BROWN: I'll support it.

11 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. May I know
12 who?

13 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Brown.

14 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Brown?

15 COMMISSIONER BROWN: That's correct. We
16 have some discussion.

17 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you,
18 Commissioner Brown. You want to lead the discussion?

19 COMMISSIONER BROWN: I think we should let
20 Commissioner Burton lead the discussion but I -- and
21 then I'll --

22 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Well, it's going to
23 be a challenge with him freezing like this.

24 COMMISSIONER BROWN: I'm under the
25 impression that what he's saying is the vehicles that

1 are assigned to OCI and assigned to the Board of Police
2 Commissioners not be used as take-home vehicles during
3 this time since they're not working in the office or
4 coming to the office. I'm under the impression that
5 that's what he's saying but I just -- I wanted to
6 support his motion just so we could have some discussion
7 about it to be clear on what it is he's asking. It's
8 just not my interpretation.

9 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Well, is it
10 appropriate to take a motion based on the fuzziness of
11 his motion even though you seconded?

12 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yeah, I heard his
13 motion. I can hear him going in and out of it. And
14 Madam Chair going forward I really think that we should
15 follow some of the rules of motions that they should all
16 just be written down and e-mailed in so that everyone
17 have a copy of what --

18 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Understood.
19 Understood. Okay. The motion that Board of Police
20 Commissioners should not take motor vehicles home has
21 been second. Those in support?

22 COMMISSIONER BELL: Discussion. Discussion.

23 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Oh continued
24 discussion.

25 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, acting --

1 the interim chief investigator Lawrence Akbar reported
2 out at his last reporting process it been a standard
3 procedure the staff, OCI staff do not take vehicles
4 home. They are locked in the parking lot. They are
5 parked. That has been the policy for quite some time.
6 That is not the case in reference to OCI. And it also
7 falls within the board function too with the exception
8 of the board secretary and interim secretary because
9 they are pretty much function at all hours and
10 responding to different concerns; so basically the
11 motion is pretty much not appropriate because that's not
12 the case with the board or OCI staff. That's been the
13 policy for quite some time.

14 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: So do I understand
15 you say because it's an inappropriate motion --

16 COMMISSIONER BELL: No, the motion's on the
17 floor. The motion -- I withdraw that comment.

18 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay, thank you.

19 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Madam Chair.

20 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Is there any other
21 discussion?

22 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Madam Chair?

23 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Burton?

24 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You know, right now
25 the mayor's cutting 3,000 city jobs.

1 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay, wait. Wait,
2 wait. I'm sorry, Commissioner Burton, are you talking
3 about your motion regarding the automobiles going home
4 by BOPC staff? Is that your discussion?

5 COMMISSIONER BURTON: It's all part of the
6 same discussion. The mayor's cutting 3,000 city jobs.
7 We as a body have to be fiscally responsible. So, you
8 know, we have staff taking home city vehicles. We have
9 -- the body has to do a better job of tracking our
10 vehicles, monitoring where our vehicles are as far as
11 our fleet. Once again no staff person should be taking
12 home a vehicle or take-home car especially during this
13 pandemic crisis or anything else when the board is not
14 even working outside of -- inside the office. So and it
15 also brings up concerns to the community, you know,
16 where, you know, this raises a lot of concerns and as a
17 body we don't want to put ourselves in those type of
18 situations.

19 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you,
20 Commissioner Burton. Okay. We're going to call the
21 vote to a question. Ms. White.

22 SECRETARY WHITE: Yes. Commissioner Bell?

23 COMMISSIONER BELL: Nay.

24 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Brown?

25 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yes.

1 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Brooks?

2 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Nay.

3 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Burch?

4 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I pass.

5 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Burton?

6 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes.

7 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Davis?

8 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes.

9 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Griffie?

10 Commissioner Holley?

11 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: No.

12 SECRETARY WHITE: Vice Chair Holt?

13 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: No.

14 SECRETARY WHITE: Madam Chairperson? The
15 motion fails.

16 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you.

17 Commissioner Burton, as I understand you have a second
18 motion?

19 COMMISSIONER BURTON: My second motion Madam
20 Chair would be I move that... oh my second motion is I
21 move that Board of Police Commissioners... I move that
22 the Board of Police Commissioners when it comes to our
23 quarterly mailing that each commissioner that represents
24 their district where that letter is tailored towards
25 that commissioner and that district. A lot of citizens

1 across the city of Detroit when they get letters in the
2 mailbox their commissioner looks like a dot or doesn't
3 have anything about the work that they've done on the
4 commission or anything of that nature. So I move that
5 when we do do our mailers quarterly, when they do go
6 out, that those commissioners that represent those seven
7 districts where that district -- where that mailer is
8 tailored towards that commissioner.

9 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. Let me see if
10 I understand your motion.

11 COMMISSIONER BURTON: -- message to their
12 constituents.

13 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: You're saying --

14 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, did I hear
15 a second?

16 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Second?

17 COMMISSIONER BELL: Okay. Who made the
18 second?

19 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: I'm asking for a
20 second.

21 COMMISSIONER BELL: Well, you don't have to
22 ask for a second. If there's no second, there's no
23 second.

24 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Second.

25 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: The motion fails.

1 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Didn't Commissioner
2 Davis second the motion?

3 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: I'm sorry?

4 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I seconded his motion.

5 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. Discussion?

6 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I have a question and
7 discussion.

8 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay.

9 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Have any of the
10 quarterly reports ever show cased like three or four of
11 the commissioners or is it just usually about the chair
12 and vice chair?

13 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Your question is to
14 whom, Commissioner Davis?

15 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Anybody who can answer.
16 'Cause it appears like a lot of times the mailers are
17 veered towards the chair and vice chair.

18 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair?

19 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes, Commissioner
20 Bell.

21 COMMISSIONER BELL: It's unfortunate
22 Mrs. Blossom is not here to speak to that but basically
23 that is not accurate at all in reference to the news
24 letter but the motion is somewhat not grounded in facts
25 or circumstances that we prepared to deal with. I heard

1 a whole lot of discussion but I don't know specifically
2 what we voting on in a way, you know, but Mrs. Blossom
3 is not here. She would be the authority to speak about
4 what Commissioner Burton raised, so.

5 SECRETARY WHITE: Madam Vice Chair?

6 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes, Ms. White.

7 SECRETARY WHITE: If I may add to that
8 concern about what is covered within the quarterly news
9 letters or BOPC news letters overall. The news letters
10 cover all of the commissioners, the entire Board of
11 Police Commissioners as a whole, and all of the
12 activities and the activities conducted by the Board of
13 Police Commissioners as a whole so it's not geared
14 toward one or two commissioners, it's geared to cover
15 all of the operations and the entire board activities
16 for the entire board. So it's not geared towards one or
17 two commissioners, and that is the case with every news
18 letter that is distributed throughout households
19 throughout the city of Detroit, it covers the entire
20 board.

21 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you,
22 Ms. White. Now are we in a position to vote down or up?

23 COMMISSIONER BELL: Off the question.

24 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Offer the question,
25 Ms. White.

1 SECRETARY WHITE: Yes. Commissioner Bell?

2 COMMISSIONER BELL: Nay.

3 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Brown?

4 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Nay.

5 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Brooks?

6 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Nay.

7 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Burch?

8 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Nay.

9 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Burton?

10 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes.

11 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Davis?

12 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Nay.

13 SECRETARY WHITE: Commissioner Griffie?

14 Commissioner Holley?

15 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Nay means no?

16 SECRETARY WHITE: Yes.

17 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Well, how did you guys
18 go and second the motion and then vote no on it, too.

19 COMMISSIONER BELL: That's right.

20 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: You guys need to --
21 this mental health month, you know.

22 SECRETARY WHITE: Madam chairperson Carter?
23 Madam Vice Chair, the motion failed.

24 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you. At this
25 point we'll now have announcements.

1 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Madam chair -- okay.

2 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Burch?

3 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes, ma'am. You said
4 new business then you went to announcements, so I guess
5 --

6 (Talking at the same time.)

7 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: I'm sorry. You have
8 new business? Commissioner Burch, you have new
9 business?

10 COMMISSIONER BURCH: It's okay. I just want
11 the District 3 and the whole Detroit community to know
12 there will be two food distributions with the census
13 cards, free masks. This will be this Saturday at
14 Pershing High School, 7 and Ryan, and then on this
15 Sunday coming it will be at the 7 -- at the 8 Mile
16 Dequindre Belmont Shopping Center. The hours for both
17 of those events is 1 to 3, so you have Saturday and you
18 have Sunday. I have all the literature. Every knows my
19 number out in the universe; they can simply call to
20 receive the flyer.

21 Then I wanted to say, Madam Chair, one more
22 thing. The excellent job that, regardless of how we as
23 police commissioners are over civilian authority, I
24 understand all of that, but working together with the
25 police department to make it better for the whole city

1 of Detroit is what my goal is. So I think we need to --
2 sometimes we get out of sorts of attitudes. I just want
3 to say I'm for getting along with the officers, with the
4 citizens but for correction but please don't ignore
5 ideas that are given to you, Madam Chair, okay? I'm
6 just saying for the whole I just appreciate the police
7 because we need them they just need more help. That's
8 what I wanted to say. Thank you, Madam Assistant Chair.

9 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you,
10 Commissioner Burch. Anymore new business? Okay now we
11 are ready for announcements. Robert -- Mr. Brown?

12 MR. BROWN: Yes, ma'am. Madam Vice Chair, I
13 currently have five speakers. I'll call them by twos.
14 Your first speaker will be Mr. Eric Blount followed by
15 Mr. Rhuben Crowley.

16 MR. BLOUNT: Good afternoon board. Can you
17 hear me?

18 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes.

19 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes, good afternoon.

20 MR. BLOUNT: Yes. I am -- for the record my
21 name is Eric Blount. I recognize one of the few small
22 acts of independence exhibited by this board today in
23 holding discipline officers accountable on some level by
24 forcing the vote on individual promotions and requesting
25 Chief Craig reason -- Chief Craig's reasoning for

1 requesting the promotion of disciplined officers.
2 Because this public is not allowed to view these reports
3 the only comments revealing material points was at the
4 timing of these disciplines were not listed. So a
5 reasonable person can only assume that the disciplines
6 were very recently. Again, this week related to this
7 topic I'm demanding that disciplined officers were
8 ineligible for promotion for at least five years.

9 In regards to the wrongful arrest in 2012 of
10 Marvin Seals, the settlement, and its reversal is not
11 good news if a citizen was wrongfully arrested. This
12 innocent citizen was arrested at his job and imprisoned
13 for 15 days. The city stated the arresting officer had
14 probable cause. What evidence was there? This is
15 another one of the practical reasons why we are so
16 against the evilness of facial recognition, the
17 misidentification of people of color will only compound
18 this situation in similar wrongful arrest. So please
19 remain neutral even if it's a cost savings to the city.
20 Someone must be held accountable. Please recall that at
21 least three of the Board of Police Commissioners are in
22 agreement to appeal the arbitrator's decision to promote
23 Officer DeWayne Jones.

24 MR. BROWN: Madam Chair, the speaker time is
25 up.

1 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you.

2 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Madam Chair, can I just
3 respond to that, and maybe Commissioner Bell just on the
4 point of the promotions if I got it right. A lot of the
5 promotions --

6 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Mr. Brown, is that
7 you?

8 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yes, Madam Chair.
9 They're not hand picked. I believe they go by the
10 ranking system of how they score on the test in the
11 ranking. Is that true Commissioner Bell and D.C.
12 Wilson?

13 COMMISSIONER BELL: Commissioner Bell. Yes,
14 that is true. It's a collective bargaining process.
15 It's outline promotion process. It's not a casual
16 process. As you well know they probably went through a
17 promotional exam last year. Officers have right to be
18 promoted in terms of rank to sergeant and to detective.
19 So it's a complicated process and also our role in this
20 whole process is not what you think it might be but we
21 must weigh in to enlighten everybody.

22 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you. The next
23 speaker, Mr. Brown?

24 MR. BROWN: Mr. Crowley, you're un-muted.

25 MR. CROWLEY: Can you hear me?

1 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes.

2 COMMISSIONER BROOKS: Yes.

3 MR. CROWLEY: First I would like to thank
4 Commissioner Holt for hosting this, it's terrific. I
5 think it's a beautiful idea and you should continue
6 this. Since I only have two minutes I'm going to
7 definitely get straight to it. There should be no
8 policy or procedure, no policy in actuality where the
9 Detroit Police Department can't protect and serve any of
10 their citizens within the city limits of the city of
11 Detroit. So why is there agreement or arrangement with
12 the DMC whereas the Detroit Police Department has to
13 gain permission to investigate a lawfully legitimately
14 requested investigation of a felony before they can go
15 and do any kind of police procedures? So that is one of
16 the questions I have.

17 Now in regards to the police department's
18 3rd precinct there's a Lieutenant Angelique
19 Chadwick-Bills who is just totally against -- totally
20 off the chain. She's breaking police policy and
21 procedures and as a matter of fact she's interfering
22 with an investigation proceeding or taking place, in the
23 first place. She has taken the case from a sergeant
24 there, Detective Hughes, who was assigned the case by
25 the commander of the precinct and Ms. Chadwick-Bills she

1 took the case from him in the process of him calling me
2 back to give me some information that he gleaned from
3 the conversation he had. So he had the notes in his
4 car, he went out to retrieve the notes, and before he
5 could get back to call me back the case was taken from
6 him. Now how is that possible?

7 Now in regards to the command structure. I
8 got a call from Deputy Chief Todd Bettison, which was a
9 bunch of bull. And --

10 MR. BROWN: Madam Chair, your speaker time
11 is up.

12 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you,
13 Mr. Crowley. Next Speaker.

14 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Madam Chair, this is
15 Commissioner Brown.

16 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes.

17 COMMISSIONER BROWN: If I can respond to his
18 first issue. I think D.C. might concur with it. With
19 this issue with the DPD over the medical center, the
20 medical center and places like that are under Act 330 so
21 they're considered a police department. And DPD has to
22 follow the same rules no different than getting into
23 investigations as they would for something in Southfield
24 or anything in Wayne State, like Wayne State is a police
25 department and Detroit Medical Center are considered

1 police through Act 330. And I believe that's probably
2 what the policy or whatever they have worked out that
3 they have to go through because they are a separate
4 department.

5 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you,
6 Commissioner Davis. Robert, may we have a next speaker?

7 MR. BROWN: Yes, Madam Chair, your next
8 speaker will be Ms. Ashley Smith followed by
9 Mrs. Michelle George. Ms. Smith.

10 MS. SMITH: Hold on. Yes, yes, yes. Hello?
11 Hello?

12 COMMISSIONER BURCH: We hear you.

13 MS. SMITH: Thank you. Thank you. I'm
14 Ashley Smith. I think it's amazing that you guys are
15 actually able to listen to the Detroit charter to
16 complete your responsibility as the police board of
17 commissioners. Also, you know, we're still concerned
18 about Officer Jones still being a member of the Detroit
19 Police Department. I'm wondering if you fired him
20 already.

21 Thirdly, is there any administrative
22 documentation of his promotion being that during corona
23 it was very difficult to attain or to create and also...
24 I think that's it for me. Thank you for respecting, you
25 know, the constituents of Detroit and respecting their

1 rights as we follow the Detroit charter. Thank you.

2 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you,
3 Ms. Smith. The next speaker, Mr. Brown?

4 MR. BROWN: Mrs. Michelle George? I don't
5 see her with an audio. She has a video. Okay Madam,
6 Chair, why don't I go to the next speaker. The next
7 speaker with phone number ending with 201. You're
8 un-muted.

9 MS. MONTGOMERY: Hello. My name is -- can
10 you hear me?

11 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes, we can.

12 MS. MONTGOMERY: My name is Cathy
13 Montgomery. I did put my name in the system but it
14 doesn't seem to be showing up each time.

15 MS. SMITH: The first two bedrooms --

16 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Ms. White, I think
17 her mic is still open? Sorry about, Ms. Montgomery.

18 MS. MONTGOMERY: Okay. I do appreciate that
19 the Board of Police Commissioners is taking each
20 individual recommended promotion seriously and any
21 discipline reaction that these officers have had before
22 you approve their promotion. I'm glad you postponed the
23 additional motions (inaudible) information (inaudible)
24 the officer's record. I still want to know what the
25 Board of Police Commissioners has done the last --

1 MR. HAYES: I'm so sorry I was on a call and
2 didn't realize I had an incoming, I'm sorry.

3 MS. MONTGOMERY: Have you heard anything I
4 said? Hello?

5 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Mr. Brown?

6 MR. BROWN: Yes, ma'am.

7 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Could we start
8 Ms. Montgomery's time over again please?

9 MR. BROWN: Yes.

10 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: There's so much
11 interference with her, please.

12 MR. BROWN: Yes.

13 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you.

14 MS. MONTGOMERY: Okay.

15 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: You now have two
16 minutes.

17 MS. MONTGOMERY: Okay. Thank you. I did
18 want to congratulate the Board of Police Commissioners
19 for taking serious consideration on these recommended
20 promotions and, you know, being conscious of any
21 disciplinary actions that these officers have had and
22 taking that into consideration before you approve any
23 promotion. I do want to know what the commission has
24 done since the last meeting to appeal the promotion or
25 reject the promotion of Corporal DeWayne Jones because

1 of his very inappropriate handling of a mentally ill
2 woman.

3 And in response to the discussion that came
4 up about police officers pulling over citizens for
5 traffic violations and the citizens pulling off after
6 they've, you know, pulled over, why can't the officers
7 issue a ticket based upon the license plate number on
8 the vehicle and have it mailed to the owner of that
9 vehicle's home? I think forcing someone to forfeit
10 their vehicle because of doing something illegal in
11 their car that seems to be a very harsh punishment for a
12 traffic violation. You can issue a ticket for whatever
13 they were doing wrong when they were pulled over.
14 That's just my recommendation in handling that
15 situation.

16 MR. BROWN: Madam Chair, the speaker time
17 has ended.

18 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you
19 Ms. Montgomery. Deputy Chief Wilson, is there not a
20 policy to say that here in Detroit you cannot assign a
21 ticket to a licence plate or?

22 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Yeah, in the state of
23 Michigan and in the city of Detroit you have to be able
24 to identify who's actually behind the wheel of the
25 vehicle.

1 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. Because in
2 Houston you go through a red light, you get a ticket.

3 DEPUTY CHIEF WILSON: Yes. Some states,
4 yes.

5 MR. BROWN: Madam Vice Chair, we got
6 Mrs. Michelle George on the line.

7 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you.
8 Mrs. Michelle George.

9 MS. GEORGE: Hi, how are you?

10 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: I'm great and you?

11 MS. GEORGE: Thank you. Thank you,
12 Mr. Brown. I just wanted to -- Deputy Chief Wilson and
13 the Deputy Chief Bettison I'm glad to find everybody's
14 safe. I wanted to briefly mention to Deputy Chief
15 Wilson the police officers, and I miss Captain Parnell
16 so much and the other, you know, in -- our condolences
17 go out to the family of the dispatcher. Is there any
18 way let the officers know to make sure they have access
19 to a pulse oximeter. That tells how much oxygen is in
20 their blood, because sometimes if you sit in a patient
21 home, even if they may have the coronavirus, and I don't
22 know if some are hospitalized, make sure they have that
23 little device called a pulse oximeter that they can get
24 Walgreens and Wal-Mart. That's very important. That
25 way if they see their oxygen level dropping below 95

1 percent, they can go to the emergency room, so they'll
2 have that. I just wanted to interject that in.

3 Also about -- I do agree with the
4 commissioners about the citizens of Detroit. There's
5 some areas -- and this occurred in pre-pandemic and I'm
6 glad Chief Craig is doing well and other officers, and
7 we do keep in prayer every night, but there's some areas
8 in the city of Detroit that do not even see police. And
9 I know police are riding around the perimeter but when a
10 neighborhood do not see a police, and then -- and I know
11 Deputy Chief Bettison is doing well with the guys that
12 are doing the figure 8 but the thing is the citizens
13 they do not respect the officers; and that was one of
14 the things I've been trying to meet with Chief Craig
15 about. There's just certain -- and I remember one of
16 the councilmen talk about that you can't bargain with
17 certain things at this time. If they're doing those
18 figure 8s, they're going to disrespect the police
19 officers.

20 Also I think there should be a deterrent
21 where officers should be seen in the neighborhood even
22 if you can you pretend like a car is sitting. We know
23 the officers and we glad that the 1,000 came back 'cause
24 we do want our officers healthy but you have a city full
25 of crime. They're not going to respect. And we going

1 to pray for those children.

2 MR. BROWN: Madam Chair, your speaker time
3 has ended.

4 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you
5 Mrs. George.

6 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Madam Chair?

7 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Excuse me,
8 Commissioner Burch. Mr. Brown?

9 MR. BROWN: Madam Chair, that was your last
10 speaker.

11 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: She was the last
12 speaker. Okay, Commissioner Burch and then I want to
13 jump in after you've spoken.

14 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Okay. Thank you. I
15 just wanted to commend I think her name was the citizen
16 called in Mrs. Scott that she's only verifying what we
17 spoke on earlier about decoys and about the speeding
18 that we just need more viability of police cars planted
19 in neighborhoods and they don't know if somebody's
20 coming back or not to get in that car. That's why it's
21 so important to do decoys. I just wanted to thank you
22 Mrs. Scott and keep on working with whatever area you
23 live in, work closely with your precinct commander.
24 Thank you, ma'am.

25 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Burch,

1 that was a Mrs. Montgomery, okay?

2 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Okay.

3 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. Now I'm just
4 wondering Mr. Blunt I think he was getting to what
5 process or what progress we are engaging in as the Board
6 of Police Commissioners regarding Corporal Jones.
7 Commissioner Bell and Commissioner Davis -- oh
8 commissioner -- oh Attorney Wyrick, could you share some
9 enlightenment on where we are as the Board of Police
10 Commissioners?

11 ATTORNEY WYRICK: Through the chair. Very
12 specifically I did send some correspondence through
13 corporation counsel Garcia based upon a section in the
14 Detroit City Charter 7.5 which basically says when
15 there's a conflict between two different governmental
16 departments within the city of Detroit, in this instance
17 the Detroit Board of Police Commission and the Detroit
18 Police Department and by extension too to some extent
19 the law department, that at that point corporation
20 counsel should issue a memo basically affording the BOPC
21 to seek outside counsel or facilitation what a highest
22 elected public official which can be the mayor, the city
23 council president or one of their designees.

24 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: So have we gone to
25 meet that suggested action?

1 ATTORNEY WYRICK: I've sent a letter to
2 corporation counsel regarding that. We're waiting to
3 hear back from them.

4 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. Thank you,
5 Attorney Wyrick.

6 ATTORNEY WYRICK: You're welcome.

7 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Bell,
8 you have a comment?

9 COMMISSIONER BELL: Just to be clear
10 Corporal Jones is no longer Corporal Jones. Corporal
11 Jones is Sergeant Jones. Arbitrator ruling that he
12 would be promoted forthwith with the ruling and
13 retroactive pay based on his class promotion to the rank
14 of sergeant. So he is Sergeant Jones. Thank you.

15 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you,
16 Commissioner Bell. If there is no other business --

17 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes, Madam -- I'm
18 sorry, Lord Jesus. One more thing, Madam Chair. I just
19 wanted to say I think we all should congratulate former
20 Commissioner Conrad Mallet being appointed by Mayor
21 Duggan as the Deputy Mayor of Detroit, because he was a
22 commissioner. So you think that's appropriate, Madam
23 Chair?

24 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you,
25 Commissioner Burch. Okay. It's to be noted that our

1 next meeting will be Thursday, May the 28th --

2 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Madam Chairperson?

3 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: -- at 3:00.

4 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Madam Chairperson?

5 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes, Commissioner
6 Holley.

7 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Please forgive me. I
8 didn't know that you had -- that you had new business
9 but quickly can I just ask what are we doing to get back
10 into the studio -- into the building? What plans are we
11 making when we come out of this? Who's in charge of
12 that? Who's really trying to get us back? If the
13 police department is there, the fire department is
14 there; I'm asking is there any plans at all this year,
15 next year but who's in charge of that, and why aren't we
16 -- why aren't we putting somebody in charge of that and
17 so that we have some idea of where we going in the
18 future?

19 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay thank you,
20 Commissioner Holley. Okay, I'm not the expert on this.
21 All that I know is that the governor says we cannot go
22 to a state of normalcy until May the 28th. However, I
23 believe the city is working and they're trying to get
24 their employees back in place, so can someone --

25 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Madam Chairperson, I

1 don't mean any harm. I'm just saying to you is we ought
2 to have something in place so when the governor says go
3 we don't have to wait for two or three months to go. We
4 ought to be working on this with a sense of hope and
5 expectation.

6 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Again, I believe the
7 city is leading that charge, Commissioner Bell?

8 COMMISSIONER BELL: Madam Chair, I would
9 inform Commissioner Holley that that task would be to
10 the board secretary, interim board secretary. I'm
11 pretty sure once the governor make a ruling that you can
12 meet above ten people, then we would fall under that
13 guideline. The governor indicated by the end of the
14 month, so perhaps next month we would be prepared and
15 it's not that complicated to meet as long as you meeting
16 the criteria of mass and spacing, et cetera, et cetera.

17 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Ms. White, you want
18 to get in on that discussion?

19 SECRETARY WHITE: Yes, Madam Vice
20 Chairperson. Honorable board, I recently transmitted
21 the governor's last updated info on the release of the
22 executive order coming up on May 28th. In addition to
23 that I noted in there that both myself and interim chief
24 investigator are finalizing a plan for staff to return
25 back to their work site full-time or, you know, back at

1 police headquarters and OCI. Please note, however, that
2 we all are in transit back and forth to both of those
3 facilities. We've recently received the personal
4 protection equipment from the Detroit Police Department,
5 and after we received that and implemented the city's
6 policies and guidelines for safety measures and health
7 protections, we will return back to the work site
8 permanently but I have transmitted that documentation to
9 the honorable board and I can retransmit all of those
10 documents.

11 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Thank you, Madam
12 Chair.

13 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: There's no need to
14 retransmit, Ms. White, I saw it. I saw it. I didn't
15 read to your specificity but I saw the e-mail, okay?

16 SECRETARY WHITE: Yes.

17 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Commissioner Holley,
18 do you have anymore questions?

19 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: No, ma'am, but thank
20 you for allowing me to do that.

21 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: On sure. Okay, if
22 there are no more questions, again we will be meeting
23 next Thursday May the 28th at 3:00. Our next community
24 meeting is Thursday, June the 11th at 3:00. So on that
25 note do we have motion to --

1 COMMISSIONER BELL: So moved, Madam Chair.

2 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Second.

3 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Okay. It's been
4 moved and seconded that the meeting is closed and
5 there's no discussion. Have a safe and happy holiday
6 celebration.

7 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Happy Memorial Day.

8 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: All right. Bye now.
