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5 MS. WHITE: Good afternoon, and welcome to
6 the Detroit Board of Police Commissioners meeting.
7 Today's date is Thursday, September 17, 2020. And

24 Regarding public comments, each speaker
25 will have two minutes to speak. BOPC staff will

9 And now Vice Chairperson Holt.

10 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you,
11 Ms. White. And thank you, Chair Bell for allowing me
12 this opportunity to share additional information as
13 relates to the 2020 census.

14 Now let's understand low census counts,
15 present low census counts are not necessarily unique
16 to the City of Detroit. In fact, the situation is
17 very pervasive throughout the United States. So much
18 so that a bipartisan group of senators is offering a
19 potential solution which -- by introducing a bill
20 which is to have the census continue through
21 October 31st, which was proposed in April of this year
22 as well.

23 Now, if the census is discontinued on
24 September the 30th, it is guaranteed that cities will
25 be undercounted and the federal funds of the \$5,000

1 per person not counted for each of the next ten years
2 will be lost to those cities.

3 Now, we in Detroit need to continue to
4 encourage anyone who has not submitted a 2020 census
5 to do so immediately. It's a very, very simple
6 process. All the person needs to do is on their
7 phone, you don't necessarily have to have a computer,
8 it's you go to the my2020census.gov. And I promise
9 you that website will be very anxious to accept your
10 census information.

11 Now, if a person is uncomfortable about
12 using the phone in that manner, the individual can
13 call 1-844-330-2020, that's 1-844-330-2020.

14 Thank you Chair Bell for this opportunity.

15 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Vice Chair
16 Holt, for that public service announcement which is
17 crucial to the City of Detroit and the State of
18 Michigan and to this nation that we be properly
19 represented by the census process.

20 As Chair of the Board of Police
21 Commissioners, I'm going to call the meeting to order
22 at this time.

23 Ms. White, would you introduce the Chaplain
24 for invocation, please.

25 MS. WHITE: Yes. Chaplain Curtis

1 Longstreet is on the line to provide the invocation.

2 Chaplain Longstreet.

3 (Invocation given.)

4 AUDIENCE: Amen.

5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Chaplain
6 Longstreet.

7 The next point of business will be to
8 introduce our commissioners, and I'm going to start
9 with our Vice Chair.

10 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Good afternoon
11 again, Annie Holt, At-Large.

12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. District 1.

13 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Good afternoon. It's
14 Darryl Brown of the 8th Precinct, Champs of the
15 Intramural Police Department's baseball team over here
16 at District 1.

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. District 2.

18 COMMISSIONER GRIFFIE: Good afternoon.
19 Commissioner Evette Griffie, District 2.

20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. District 3.

21 MS. WHITE: I know she was on the line
22 earlier.

23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: We'll come back to her.
24 District 4 is Commission Bell, present.

25 District 5. District 5. We will come

1 back.

2 District 6?

3 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Good afternoon. Lisa
4 Carter for District 6.

5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Good afternoon, it's
6 good to see you. Thank you.

7 District 7.

8 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Good afternoon
9 everyone. Police Commissioner William Davis, District
10 7.

11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, sir.
12 Starting At-Large will be Hernandez, Commissioner
13 Hernandez.

14 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: (Technical
15 difficulties.)

16 MS. WHITE: I did slightly hear
17 Commissioner Hernandez, but I believe we are
18 experiencing --

19 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Good afternoon.
20 Commissioner Hernandez At-Large.

21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, sir.
22 Commissioner Jones At-Large?

23 COMMISSIONER JONES: Good afternoon,
24 commissioners. Commissioner Martin Jones, At-Large.

25 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, sir.

1 Reverend Commissioner Jim Holley, At-Large, from the
2 historic Little Rock Baptist Church.

3 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: You know I'm here.
4 Jim Holley present.

5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Thank you
6 for your attendance.

7 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Commissioner Bell, I
8 did hear you. I apologize, I was not unmuted on my
9 end. I'm Commissioner Shirley Burch of the famous
10 District 3, love where you live. Thank you.

11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Thank you.
12 District 5. Ms. White?

13 MS. WHITE: Yes, we have a quorum.

14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: We have a quorum?

15 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir.

16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. The next
17 item would be approval of the agenda for September the
18 17th meeting. What is your pleasure, commissioners.

19 (Motion moved and seconded.)

20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: So moved and supported.

21 Any opposition? No.

22 Ms. White, the motion passed?

23 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir.

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I think the next item
25 would be approval of minutes for September the 10th,

1 2020. What is your pleasure, commissioners?

2 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: So moved.

3 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Second.

4 CHAIRPERSON BELL: It's been properly moved
5 and supported. Any discussion? Any opposition? No.

6 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: No.

7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Commissioner.
8 Duly noted, Commissioner Davis.

9 MS. WHITE: Motion passed.

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. At this time
11 I see a First Assistant Chief Stairs is with us.

12 I'm sorry, Ms. White, would you introduce
13 the staff.

14 MS. WHITE: Good afternoon, honorable
15 board. Through the chair the Department of Innovation
16 and Technology is monitoring the board's meeting today
17 and also the court reporter this afternoon is
18 Ms. Diane Szach.

19 And for the board, staff introductions, the
20 following staff members are in attendance today,
21 Mr. Robert Brown; Ms. Teresa Blossom, the Community
22 Information Coordinator, Ms. Jonya Underwood,
23 Administrative Assistant; Ms. Tiffany Stuart, assigned
24 to the board's staff; Interim Chief Investigator,
25 Lawrence Akbar; Supervising Investigator, Lasonya

1 Sloan; Supervising Investigator, Ainsley Cromwell; and
2 Senior Investigator, Rosalia Madrigal, and that's the
3 staff introductions at this time.

4 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Ms. White.
5 Now, our First Assistant Chief.

6 ASSISTANT CHIEF STAIRS: Good afternoon,
7 Board. Today I have with me Deputy Chief until
8 Monday, September 21st, Todd Bettison, who will be the
9 new assistant chief here with us; Deputy Chief Haas,
10 chief legal advisor; Director Stein from support
11 services; Director Graveline and Commander McGinnis
12 from Professional Standards; and Captain Aric Tosqui.

13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Assistant
14 Chief Stair. Thank you. We move on to -- Ms. White,
15 do we have any elected officials or representatives of
16 elected officials or any other VIP personnel?

17 MS. WHITE: Yes. Through the Chair. We do
18 have Lieutenant Mark Young, President of the
19 Lieutenants and Sergeants Association. And that
20 concludes the special VIPs at this time.

21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Ms. White.
22 And thank you for all those in attendance. Hopefully
23 I said good afternoon to all in terms of the panelists
24 and commissioners and the VIPs. We hope to do a
25 timely meeting, take care of business, and also -- so

1 we hope to move to that point in time, and bear with
2 us, but if you have any critical concerns that we need
3 to address, you need to contact Ms. White by email or
4 text, and she would entertain that and if we can
5 handle it, we will. If not, we'll pass it on to the
6 proper channels whether it's the Chief of Police or
7 his staff or the commander that represents that
8 particular concern.

9 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir.

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Before we get to my
11 comments, I just want to have a couple of talking
12 points that Ms. White worked up on my behalf for our
13 retiring Assistant Chief White, James White. As you
14 well know we will celebrate his retirement tomorrow,
15 and I will probably make these remarks, but I just
16 want to share with those of you in the audience who
17 might not be in attendance. A.C. White did so much,
18 and a single resolution cannot include it all, so the
19 board wants to point to a few special achievements in
20 his remarkable work with us and for his contributions
21 that he made to this community.

22 Assistant Chief White worked extensively to
23 help bring the department into compliance with two
24 federal consent decrees. Even after federal oversight
25 ended, A.C. White still made sure audits and other

1 operational practices continued to protect civil
2 rights and keep DPD in compliance.

3 A.C. White sat at the board table with us
4 many, many Thursdays, but he also worked extensively
5 with us every day -- every other day and on
6 everything, audits, policy development, policy
7 revision, office space. He was responsible when the
8 board moved to public safety headquarters and when we
9 moved to the Office of Chief Investigator and OCI
10 staff to Merrill Plaissance. And he always showed the
11 same respect, professionalism, and commitment no
12 matter what the task was.

13 The Board must say more about his work on
14 policy, especially those involving body-worn cameras
15 and tasers, because he made sure the equipment was
16 right, the training was right, the implementation was
17 right, and the use in the field is right today. Even
18 as he was leaving, he still was ensuring that those
19 details are in order -- and that's why Detroit is the
20 only major department in the state to have and deploy
21 body cameras throughout the department and to require
22 they work and get turned on.

23 A.C. White facilitated and managed access
24 of Department's advanced technology systems that
25 enhance the OCI's investigative efforts as well as the

1 Department's investigation: Records Management
2 System, Computer Aided Dispatch System (CAD),
3 WatchGuard System, and much more of the nuts and bolts
4 essential to police work and public oversight,
5 oversight and accountability.

6 So I just want to commend him in terms of
7 his contribution and efforts, and his work in an area
8 that we all our concerned about. So I'm looking
9 forward to that relationship with retiring A.C. White.
10 I don't think we're going to have another A.C. White
11 any time soon, but I know he's got some big shoes to
12 fill, but he has that professional -- and I was so
13 happy when he got initiated into DPD Fit and we got
14 out there and not only (inaudible), he led the academy
15 in terms of the fitness. I think a lot to my academy
16 days with Officer Travis, Ernest Travis. I was a
17 track and field guy, and this guy was a challenge to
18 me, and I just think that type of physical capacity of
19 A.C. White. I just want to share that with you.

20 MS. WHITE: I just want to also indicate --
21 Mr. Chair.

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I can hear you.

23 MS. WHITE: Yes. Just for the record, we
24 are hearing some technical difficulties from your
25 microphone. And so if there is anyway where, you

1 know, everyone can make sure that we have the
2 headphones and the volume appropriately so we can hear
3 every word that you're saying. I did just want to
4 share that with you so we hear all your remarks, sir.

5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. Thank you, ma'am
6 okay. In what experts call the largest sustained
7 mobilization in modern history, some 23 million people
8 across the U.S. have attended the demonstrations since
9 George Floyd's death. Specific polls from mid June
10 suggest, demonstration against racism and police
11 violence led to more than 7,800 arrests in the United
12 States of America. According to a national survey of
13 more than 600 people, widely attended --

14 MS. WHITE: Mr. Chair.

15 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Can you hear me?

16 MS. WHITE: Now we can hear you. There was
17 a little gap, yes, sir. We can hear you now.

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I don't know, is that my
19 end or what?

20 MS. WHITE: I believe it is some technical
21 connectivity issue on your end, but we can hear you
22 now. I believe Commissioner Hernandez was trying to
23 reach you as well.

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. Yes, sir,
25 Commissioner Hernandez.

1 MS. WHITE: Okay. Okay, Chair Bell.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay.

3 (Technical difficulties.)

4 MS. WHITE: I'm sorry, through the Chair.

5 I believe Commissioner Hernandez may have been trying
6 to offer some information as it relates to the
7 technical piece, but I know it is a very sensitive
8 situation, and we just have to remain still to get all
9 of the comments out, because there are some technical
10 difficulties.

11 Commissioner Hernandez, are you still
12 there?

13 Okay, it looks like he left.

14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Maybe he'll rejoin us.
15 Okay. And we can make sure that we send this out
16 properly without interruption. But when it came to
17 arrests, the faces were less diverse. While there is
18 no racial breakdown of protest arrests nationwide,
19 some city and county records in the first week after
20 Floyd's showed that many of those who were jailed were
21 white. I'll while give you an example. Of the 2,172
22 people in Chicago, that the Chicago police department
23 arrested May 29th through May 31, more than 7 percent
24 were black and 10 percent were white. That's the
25 disparity as pointed out.

1 The disparities go beyond arrests. When we
2 come down to employment, arrests or conviction can
3 decrease the likelihood of getting a call back for
4 jobs. So how they impact, unlike the civil rights
5 (inaudible), and then they're incarcerated, you know.
6 But in this day and age they make a difference upon
7 arrests. I just I hope that (technical difficulties).
8 every level of the system and not just focus on
9 the police officer. We need to look at the judges, we
10 need to look at the jury, we need to look at the
11 parole board, the criminal just system needs to be
12 reformed. So we do need to take the whole
13 responsibility, and I hope that what we have witnessed
14 with A.C. White in reference to this department and
15 reform, we're on the right track, and perhaps with due
16 diligence we'll stay on the right track, and that's
17 why we engage with the commissioners and also with
18 Chief Craig all the concerns that we address, we must
19 do make sure we have accountability. Thank you.

20 Now we move on to the resolution for
21 Assistant Chief James White. That would be provided
22 by Vice Chair Holt.

23 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you,
24 Commissioner Bell. The resolution honoring Assistant
25 Chief James E. White.

1 Whereas the distinguished career of
2 Assistant Chief James White brought him into constant
3 contact with the Board of Police Commissioners in the
4 vital role of civilian oversight both in law
5 enforcement and in civil rights. In every endeavor
6 A.C. White showed the utmost knowledge, expertise, and
7 pride in being a law enforcement professional and a
8 member of the Detroit Police Department.

9 And whereas James E. White was appointed to
10 the Detroit Police Department on January 8, 1996 upon
11 graduation from the Detroit Metropolitan Police
12 Academy, Police Officer White began his career in the
13 6th Precinct. He was also assigned to internal
14 controls. On October 27, 2000 Officer White was
15 promoted to the rank of sergeant and reassigned to the
16 6th Precinct and later to Northwestern District IOU.
17 Sergeant White was promoted to the rank of lieutenant
18 on June the 1st, 2006 and assigned to the operation
19 Portfolio.

20 And whereas on December 3rd, 2007
21 Lieutenant White was appointed to the rank of
22 Commander and assigned to the northeastern district,
23 western district, special projections, second training
24 staff, office of the assistant chief of police, and
25 officer of civil rights.

1 Commander White was appointed to the rank
2 of Deputy Chief on December the 20th, 2012 and
3 reassigned to the Assistant Chief of Police Office on
4 February 27th, 2013. Deputy Chief White was appointed
5 to the rank of Assistant Chief of Police, and whereas
6 A.C. White with vision, leadership, teamwork, and
7 attention to detail excelled in administration and
8 policy. His close and effective collaboration with
9 the Board of Police Commissions helped ensure the best
10 policy, practices, and procedures to keep Detroit a
11 national leader in transparency and accountability.
12 Assistant Chief White worked extensively to help to
13 bring the department into compliance with the United
14 States Consent Decree Judgment.

15 And whereas he is a graduate of Wayne
16 County Community College and Wayne State University.
17 He holds an Associate's degree in general studies and
18 a Bachelor's degree in sociology with a concentration
19 in psychology.

20 MS. WHITE: Madam Vice Chairperson? Okay.
21 Excuse me, through the Chair, I believe again we are
22 experiencing technical connectivity issues. The
23 Department of Innovation and Technology is checking on
24 that right now, but it seems that we have lost Madam
25 Vice Chair for the moment.

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Do you want to continue
2 on reading the resolution, please, if you can see it.

3 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir. And I do want to
4 indicate that the resolution that was being read was
5 not the most up-to-date resolution. And so with the
6 honorable board's permission, Chairperson Bell, I
7 would like to read the most up-to-date resolution.

8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

9 MS. WHITE: For the resolution honoring
10 Assistant James E. White, whereas the distinguished
11 career of Assistant Chief White brought him in
12 constant contact with the Board of Police
13 Commissioners in the vital role of civil oversight
14 both in law enforcement and in civil rights, in every
15 endeavor A.C. White showed the utmost knowledge,
16 expertise, and pride in being a law enforcement
17 professional and a member of the Detroit Police
18 department.

19 And whereas James E. White was appointed to
20 the Detroit Police Department on January 8, 1996 upon
21 graduation from the Detroit Metropolitan Police
22 Academy. Police Officer White began his career in the
23 6th Precinct. He was also assigned to internal police
24 controls. On October 27th, 2000 Officer White was
25 promoted to the rank of sergeant and reassigned to the

1 6th precinct and later to northwestern district IOU.
2 Sergeant White promoted to the rank of lieutenant on
3 June 1st, 2006 and assigned to the operation
4 Portfolio.

5 And whereas on December 3rd, 2007
6 Lieutenant White was appointed to the rank of
7 Commander and assigned to the northeastern district,
8 western district, special projects section, training
9 staff, Office of the Assistant Chief of Police, and
10 Office of Civil Rights. Commander White was appointed
11 to the rank of Deputy Chief on December 20th, 2012 and
12 resigned to the Assistant Chief of Police Office. On
13 February 27th, 2013 Deputy Chief White was appointed
14 to the rank of Assistant Chief of Police.

15 And whereas Assistant Chief White with
16 vision, leadership, teamwork, and attention to detail
17 excelled in administration and policy. His close and
18 effective collaboration with the Board of Police
19 Commissioners helped ensure the best policies,
20 practices, and procedures to keep Detroit a national
21 leader in transparency and accountability.

22 Assistant Chief White work extensively to
23 help bring the department into compliance with the
24 United States Federal Consent Decree Judgement.

25 And whereas he is a graduate of Wayne

1 County Community College and Wayne State University.
2 He holds an Associate's degree in general studies and
3 a Bachelor's degree in sociology with a concentration
4 in psychology. He earned a Master's of Science in
5 counseling from Central Michigan University in 2018.
6 He earned an MBA certificate from the Wayne State
7 Leadership Academy and the Mike Ilitch School of
8 Business. He is a member of the International
9 Association of Chiefs of Police and an ex-official
10 member of Michigan Commission on Law Enforcement
11 Standards. A state certified counselor, he is
12 involved with numerous organizations where his
13 contributions and leadership will continue.

14 Now therefore be it resolved that the
15 Detroit Board of Commissioners speaking on behalf of
16 the Detroit Police Department and the citizens of the
17 City of Detroit recognizes and honors the commitment
18 and devoted spirit of Assistant Chief James E. White.
19 His unmatched and relentless pursuit of effective
20 organizational management is greatly appreciated and
21 has proven to be an invaluable asset for the entire
22 department. We thank and congratulate you for a job
23 well done Assistant Chief James E. White.

24 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Mr. Chair, I move
25 that we accept the resolution for A.C. White.

1 MR. HERNANDEZ: Second.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: It being properly moved
3 and second, discussion? No discussion.

4 Those in favor aye.

5 BOARD: Aye.

6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Those opposed.

7 The motion carries.

8 Thank you Ms. White and Vice Chair Holt.

9 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you. I think
10 my granddaughter had her computer on, so she had to
11 turn it off. So I think I'm on for the duration.

12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. Thank you, Vice
13 Chair Holt. We understand the technology and we
14 understand grandkids, too.

15 Now we're going to move onto the second
16 resolution for Corporal Bryant Searcy, and that would
17 be Commissioner Jones.

18 COMMISSIONER JONES: You know what, I'm
19 having a little bit of a problem over here, too. I
20 don't have a copy of it in front of me.

21 CHAIRPERSON BELL. Okay. Neither do I.
22 Ms. White?

23 MS. WHITE: Yes. If it is your pleasure,
24 we have just pulled it up through the shared screen
25 feature. And please advise if you would like to read

1 it from the shared screen, or I can read that as well.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Jones?

3 COMMISSIONER JONES: Yes, if you can read
4 it, because I'm trying to pull it up now.

5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: We understand. Thank
6 you.

7 MS. WHITE: A resolution honoring Corporal
8 Bryant Searcy Posthumously.

9 Whereas Bryant Searcy was educated in the
10 Detroit Public School System and graduated from
11 Detroit Central High School. Corporate Bryant Searcy
12 was a loving husband and father to his wife Sherry and
13 daughter Chassidy (ph). And whereas Bryant Searcy
14 grew up in a loving home and accepted Christ into his
15 heart at a young age under the leadership of Pastor
16 E.L. Branch of Third New Hope Baptist Church. He was
17 a dedicated and active member of the church singing in
18 the youth chorale, volunteering, and serving as a
19 senior saint in the security ministry.

20 And whereas Bryant Searcy was hired by the
21 Wayne County Sheriff Department as a police officer in
22 November 2002. His leadership and aptitude in his
23 assignments was acknowledged, and Deputy Searcy was
24 appointed to the rank of corporal on November 12th,
25 2005.

1 And whereas Corporal Searcy loved and lived
2 life to the fullest and encouraged those around him to
3 do the same. His favorite quote was "Live in the
4 moment and enjoy the journey."

5 During his law enforcement career, he
6 received numerous awards, letters of appreciation, and
7 other accolades. Corporal Searcy was a consummate
8 professional and was well-loved by his co-workers.

9 And whereas Corporal Searcy diligently
10 served the Wayne County Sheriff Department and the
11 citizens of Wayne County for 18 years. His loyalty,
12 integrity, professionalism, and standard of commitment
13 was a credit to the Wayne County Sheriff Department.

14 And now therefore be it resolved that the
15 Detroit Board of Police Commissioners speaking for the
16 citizens of the City of Detroit and the Detroit Police
17 Department awards this resolution posthumously for
18 recognition of Corporal Bryant Searcy's dedicated and
19 diligent public service, his professionalism,
20 integrity, and devotion to the citizens of Wayne
21 County and throughout the City of Detroit, and merits
22 our highest regards. Detroit Board of Police
23 Commissioners.

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioners, what is
25 your pleasure?

1 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Chair, I move that we
2 adopt this resolution to the Board archives.

3 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Support.

4 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Properly moved and
5 supported. Discussion?

6 Those in favor, yes.

7 BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS: Yes.

8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Those opposed.

9 The motion carried.

10 Thank you, Ms. White, and thank you
11 Commissioner Jones.

12 I just want to say I was -- it was brought
13 to my attention that prior to him joining Wayne County
14 Sheriff Department, I tried to encourage him to join
15 Department Police Department. He was a great staff
16 member at St. John Hospital, and when his wife was
17 pregnant with their first child, they gave him a baby
18 shower. That's how much love the nurses and the
19 doctors had for this young man.

20 So I would reach out to his wife in terms
21 of making sure that we have contact and hand deliver
22 that resolution in terms of the family. Such a loss,
23 such a bright young man. He was a spirit-filled young
24 man, so we just pray for his family and pray for the
25 Wayne County Sheriff as we always do for our law

1 enforcement family.

2 Now, Ms. White, we are going to bring on
3 our Assistant Corporation Counsel to speak to an issue
4 that we all have been dealing with.

5 MS. WHITE: Yes. Through the Chair, Chief
6 Legal Counsel of Special Projects, Attorney Megan
7 Moslimani from the City of Detroit Law Department.
8 Her microphone is unmuted at this time, and she can go
9 ahead and speak with regards to the matter of facial
10 recognition technology and the Board's authority.

11 MS. MOSLIMANI: Hello everybody. Hope
12 you're all doing well. So I know it's been made a
13 motion at several meetings as I understand about the
14 facial recognition technology and software. However,
15 I did want to provide a legal opinion today during the
16 meeting. And it's my legal opinion that that is not a
17 power -- it's not within the powers delegated by the
18 charter of the Board of Police Commissioners. I do
19 not think that the board has the power to revoke the
20 use of facial recognition technology at the Detroit
21 Police Department. The board does have supervisory
22 powers, however, those are broad.

23 And I think it's important to remember it's
24 not on how the police perform their day-to-day duties
25 in preserving the public peace, preventing crime,

1 making arrests and enforcing the laws of the State of
2 Michigan and the United States Constitution. You
3 know, it's on the police to do that day to day. The
4 Board of Police Commissioners does have, you know,
5 oversight on whether police officers -- and final say
6 and authority on discipline and things of that nature
7 and approving the budget. However, we have to look
8 towards the charter, and the charter does not specify
9 our powers specifically related to what this motion is
10 based on, and we can't interpret language that isn't
11 there.

12 So at this time based on the current
13 charter, it's the legal opinion of City of Detroit Law
14 Department that this board does not have the power to
15 tell the police department they cannot use that
16 software.

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you,
18 Ms. Moslimani.

19 MS. MOSLIMANI: You're welcome.

20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Ms. White, we're going
21 to move on to A.C. Stair representing the Chief of
22 Police.

23 MS. WHITE: Yes, Chair.

24 ASSISTANT CHIEF STAIR: Good afternoon
25 honorable board. I absolutely am happy to be here

1 with you all today on behalf of the chief who had a
2 previous meeting that overlapped the time of your
3 board meeting.

4 I also wanted to say what a beautiful
5 tribute to Corporal Searcy.

6 And then also at it relates to my partner,
7 Assistant Chief White, who absolutely was always a
8 professional, who had tremendous impact as a police
9 officer and police executive on this police
10 department, but I'll take note and just say that he
11 was an even better friend, or is a better friend,
12 because he'll still be my friend once he leaves here.
13 And we're all super excited, and what a really nice
14 resolution from the Board of Police Commissioners.

15 I'll jump right into crime. Homicides, we
16 have 38 more homicides this year as compared to last
17 year at the same time for a 21 percent increase. We
18 have 199 less sexual assaults this year as compared to
19 last year for a 31 percent decrease. Aggravated
20 assaults we're up 23 percent. Nonfatal shootings
21 we're up 52 percent today as compared to last year
22 this same time. Robberies were down 17 percent with
23 274 less robberies this year as compared to last year.
24 We're down 8 percent in carjackings. The total Part 1
25 crimes we're still up 12 percent. Part 1 property

1 crimes, we're down a total of 22 percent.

2 Last week our officers confiscated 101
3 handguns, 7 long guns, and made 97 CCW arrests. I
4 also wanted to take note, I checked with
5 communications just to get an idea of the number of
6 calls that our officers are going to that have some
7 kind of gun nexus, and from last Thursday until today,
8 they went to 783 calls to service that had a gun
9 nexus, which really again reinforces the fact that our
10 members are courageous and unrelenting when it comes
11 to serving and protecting the citizens of the City of
12 Detroit. We have some illegal gun stats -- or illegal
13 drifting stats as well. Last Saturday we had an
14 operation September 12th. The officers made 77
15 traffic stops, wrote 118 tickets, towed 19 vehicles.
16 There were 6 felony arrests and 5 weapons recovered
17 just on that night alone.

18 As it relates to protests, the last protest
19 in the City of Detroit was the last Friday. There is
20 not one scheduled this weekend in Detroit. However,
21 there is a protest that is scheduled in Warren.

22 We still have four officers who are on the
23 critically injured in the line of duty. Police
24 Officer Mark Robbins (ph) still continues to undergo
25 physical therapy after he was injured critically in a

1 traffic accident. Detective Beckham (ph) although
2 showing some improvement per police medical, she still
3 continues to be off and attends PT or physical therapy
4 two to three times a week after suffering a gunshot
5 wound. Sergeant Mark Bailey as you may recall was one
6 of our members who was injured in the earlier days of
7 the protest on May 31st. He is being treated now by
8 orthopedic specialists. And then finally Keith
9 Anthony was recently injured and sustained both a head
10 injury and some major injuries to his lower
11 extremities and is recovering from surgery at home at
12 this time.

13 Covid numbers are that we have currently
14 9 members who last tested positive for Covid. So a
15 total of 365 members of the Detroit Police Department
16 tested positive for Covid at some point in time since
17 the pandemic hit. And as of today we have 18 members
18 who are quarantined or isolated, 4 of which are
19 civilians. The other 14 are sworn.

20 I also wanted to make note, I'm sure
21 everybody saw that our officers were on a 30-hour
22 standoff on the west side of Detroit which resulted in
23 a safe release of the two hostages, but unfortunately
24 a death of a suspect, a suicide, who suffered mental
25 illness. And I know that was a discussion last week

1 as well. And with speaking to the Chief, he
2 definitely wanted me to convey to Commissioner Burton
3 that he's really looking forward to, you know, doing
4 some work with him as he helped to volunteer on last
5 week.

6 And then finally, we have a recruit
7 graduation tomorrow as well of 27 new police officers
8 who will be assigned on Monday the 21st, and that
9 graduation is at Campus Martius. 4.

10 That ends my report, sir.

11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Assistant
12 Chief Stair. Do we have any questions?

13 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I have a question.

14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I think Davis, and then
15 Commissioner Burch.

16 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes. My question is
17 do we have an update on the environmental audit? I
18 know one was initiated in the 6th Precinct, but we
19 probably should get an assessment for it city-wide,
20 because there is a number of people that still think
21 there is a number of officers that do racist things.

22 ASSISTANT CHIEF STAIR: I do not have an
23 update on the environment audit, sir, but I will reach
24 out to you directly with an update after this call
25 once I talk to the folks involved.

1 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Thank you.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Burch.

3 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes. Thank you,
4 Mr. Chair. I just wanted to say regarding first to
5 the attorney, she might be gone, but I am so grateful
6 that this issue about facial recognition will now be
7 put to rest off of our shoulders as commissioners. So
8 I thank her personally for coming on the program today
9 to put it to rest.

10 I also wanted to say, Mr. Chair, to A.C.
11 White is a wonderful human being as far as his heart
12 is for mental health. That's what we're dealing with
13 all over this world, and I'm so proud that he's going
14 to be a part of that, hopefully with Conrad Malek, let
15 but in knowing -- this is on a personal level, we also
16 had the African Museum, the Charles H. Wright African
17 Museum where he was there supporting one of his
18 officers for the organization called Detroit I. And
19 they come from London to hear the story about
20 Detroiters. So I know A.C. White on a different
21 level, a very kind man. I look forward to working
22 with him in the community of the ideas that he have.
23 Thank you, Mr. Chair.

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you for your kind
25 remarks.

1 Any other commissioner? Commissioner
2 Brown.

3 COMMISSIONER BROWN: To A.C. Stair, just
4 always want to thank the men and women of the
5 department for all they do. I'm happy to hear that
6 the guns are coming off the street. I just wondered
7 if they found any of mine that were stolen years ago.

8 On a serious note, it was good to be out to
9 see the men and women in the department get out and
10 participate in some activities where they could relax
11 and reset with the intramural softball tournament,
12 which I was happy to know that the winners are the 8th
13 Precinct are the champs. But it was good to see
14 everybody get out and come together and relax and just
15 reset, you know, have some time to themselves, and it
16 was good to see that.

17 Also -- well, I also want to talk about the
18 policy issues later, but just thank you -- thank the
19 men and women for their service, and I really
20 appreciate that we're staying on top of it with the
21 guns. That's very important to me. And I wasn't
22 joking, I did have two stolen out of my home in a BE
23 about ten years ago.

24 ASSISTANT CHIEF STAIR: Through the Chair,
25 certainly, Commissioner Brown, we can look into that,

1 and absolute it's important for our membership to, you
2 know, be able to get a chance to unwind, because
3 they -- again they're relentless in the work that they
4 do to serve the citizens of City of Detroit.

5 And if I could through the Chair, to
6 Commissioner Burch, when you met Assistant Chief White
7 for I Detroit, he was supporting me, because you and I
8 both will be a part of that population.

9 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Oh, thank you. So
10 that's you. Bless your heart. Thank you.

11 ASSISTANT CHIEF STAIR: Yes, ma'am. I have
12 a picture of all of us in my office.

13 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes, thank you so
14 much. I do, I kept the picture.

15 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Mr. Chair, just one
16 more thing. And this is to anyone who wants to answer
17 it, but mainly to A.C. In just looking at the point
18 of complaints that come in, I was going through the
19 software and the issue and talking it over. Have we
20 gone away from complaints that could be settled and
21 resolved right there in the station as opposed to
22 everything going to OCI? I mean, because some
23 complaints that I was looking at and following up
24 through were things that could have just been easy to
25 resolve right there in the station and with the MPO's.

1 So have we totally left from that practice, or --

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Brown, that
3 was back in my day. You can no longer -- by our SOP
4 and charter mandate, we cannot resolve complaints at
5 that level. We have to take the complaint and work it
6 out administration-wise. Back in the day supervisors
7 could talk to the complainant and try to resolve it,
8 and we took those steps, but that's been out the
9 window a long time ago. Is that correct, Assistant
10 Chief Stair?

11 ASSISTANT CHIEF STAIR: That is correct,
12 sir. And, you know, it protects the citizen and the
13 officer at that point, and whoever is going to be the
14 investigating supervisor who gets the initial
15 complaint, they have to forward it over to the Board
16 of Police Commissioners, OCI.

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. I just want
18 to say back in the day, I keep saying back in the day,
19 when we got a man with a gun run, we was excited, you
20 know to respond. But it appears this is a different
21 day and age with all these guns out here and all these
22 shootings. And I just want to commend these officers
23 with the potential danger that's there because people
24 are strapped and they do not hesitate to use them on
25 others and the police. So we have to really be very

1 cautious in terms approaching people, because out of
2 nowhere they might respond. Thank you.

3 Before we leave Assistant Chief White one
4 more time, I want to acknowledge Commissioner Holley
5 for working up this beautiful plaque for A.C. White.
6 And I don't know if we can show it at this time or at
7 some later time.

8 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I have one more
9 question.

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Davis.

11 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes, sir. Of the
12 27 new officers from the recruiting class, how many
13 are from Detroit and how many are black?

14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I can respond to that.
15 I spoke to that class this morning myself and
16 Investigating Chief Akbar, and I was impressed with
17 that class. Over half of the class are
18 African-Americans. I don't know about all of them
19 from -- I mean, what percentage from Detroit. Maybe
20 A.C. Stair can speak to that. But the youngest was
21 19, the oldest was 36. And I mean, it was a great
22 class to interact with. I'm looking forward to their
23 career path. But I say that recruiting and the
24 academy -- maybe I should extend this to A.C. Stair on
25 this. Would you respond?

1 ASSISTANT CHIEF CHAIR: Yes, sir. So I
2 don't have the demographics of the graduating class,
3 but obviously I can pull them for you. What I can see
4 is that the classes that we are hiring and graduating
5 continue to be very diverse. Certainly, you know, the
6 number of members who live in the city aren't that
7 high, but I will tell you that so many of us who don't
8 live in the city have and certainly are stakeholders,
9 because we have family and friends in the city and we
10 care about the people who we serve every day.

11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. And what
12 you're seeing is this outstanding plaque worked up by
13 Commissioner Holley, and it reads Assistant Police
14 Chief James E. White, In recognition of your
15 unwavering dedication and leadership to the citizens
16 of the Detroit and to the men and women of the Detroit
17 Police Department, and it's outstanding. Thank you,
18 Commission Holley. When you see the legendary figures
19 from John Brown, Frederick Douglas, Dr. Martin Luther
20 King, and my President, Barack Obama, it is
21 outstanding. I don't know how Commissioner Holley,
22 when I first saw this when there was a recognition for
23 the chief and the executive team, I said, wow, this is
24 something that perhaps we can share with our board,
25 and he has been so kind. This is something that you

1 would treasure on receiving this, and it would be
2 prominently displayed. I'm going to put Assistant
3 Chief White on my speed dial to make sure that we have
4 that ongoing interaction that Commissioner Burch just
5 mentioned that as he has a wealth of knowledge. So
6 I'm so pleased. And thank you, Commissioner Holley,
7 on behalf of the Board.

8 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Thank you.

9 CHAIRPERSON BELL: If there are no other
10 questions, thank you Assistant Chief Stair. Thank you
11 for reporting out.

12 ASSISTANT CHIEF STAIR: Yes, sir. Thank
13 you, sir.

14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: We can deal with the
15 policy now, Ms. White.

16 MS. WHITE: Yes sir. Through the Chair, as
17 we are bringing up the power point presentation for
18 this afternoon, honorable board, again good afternoon,
19 and good afternoon 1st A.C. Stair, and the DPD
20 executives and all meeting attendees.

21 Just to give a brief update on the four
22 follow policy directives that are set for your review
23 and vote on today. They consist of the following,
24 body-worn cameras, tasers, X2 conducted energy
25 weapons, property control, and foot pursuit. Please

1 note that these policies have been under the board's
2 purview or jurisdiction for some time, and one of the
3 directives most recently transmitted based on recent
4 updates was the body-worn camera policy directive.

5 So I just wanted to just give you some
6 background in terms of staff has been reviewing and
7 evaluating all four policies, and we've conducted
8 extensive research and analysis into all of the best
9 practices, best standards across the country, and even
10 common practical approaches that would be beneficial
11 to include in those policy directives in connection
12 with the Detroit Police Department.

13 I should mention that these policy
14 directives, most of them were developed and created
15 back in 2017 with the Detroit Police under the
16 leadership of course of the honorable board, Chief of
17 Police Craig, 1st A.C. Stair, and all of the DPD
18 executives, but more specifically with Assistant Chief
19 James White as was indicated earlier, with A.C. White
20 on a number of policies and policy directives for the
21 development of sound, comprehensive, and safe policy
22 directives. So much of the work that you see before
23 you today with these four policy directives,
24 specifically body-worn cameras and tasers, was
25 developed and created from the support operations unit

1 headed under Assistant Chief White and again under the
2 leadership of the honorable board, Chief Craig, 1st
3 A.C. Stair, and the DPD executives.

4 So just give some brief background
5 information and just updates for your review, and then
6 I also would like to mention that the honorable board
7 of course had the opportunity to review the policy
8 directives along with the public and the community, we
9 always generally post the policy directives on the
10 board's website for public feedback and review and
11 inspection. And of course we always receive the
12 honorable board's recommendations or any additional
13 feedback. And of course I'm sure there will be some
14 additional updates as well from your honorable body.

15 So just starting with -- if we move to the
16 next slide, it's actually Slide 3 Regarding the
17 body-worn camera policy. So as I indicated earlier,
18 in 2017 the department started its pilot program on
19 the body-worn cameras deploying segments of the
20 department with the body-worn cameras to test out the
21 equipment, test it out and identify any lessons
22 learned and any best practices for the policy
23 directive, and of course the department shared that
24 policy directive with the board for its review and
25 evaluation and its contribution in terms of any policy

1 recommendations.

2 And so at that time the board did make
3 substantial policy recommendations based on again
4 research and analysis into best practices consisting
5 of and not limited to NACOLE, the National Association
6 for Civil Oversight of Law Enforcement, best
7 practices, the President's Task Force, President
8 Barack Obama, the task forces of 21st Century
9 Policing, and other best practices that are available
10 in terms of law enforcement policy directives. And so
11 with that research, the Board made the following
12 recommendations, and I'm just going to highlight just
13 a few and not go into any specifics, but I did already
14 share the actual directive, so if it's your pleasure
15 you can review those directives in detail.

16 But just to highlight a few of those
17 recommendations that the board made in 2017 with
18 respect to body-worn cameras, they consist of
19 secondary employment officers being required to wear
20 body-worn cameras -- body-worn camera footage, and I
21 believe I'm actually a slide ahead, but I will just
22 continue to go on. Also the Board made a
23 recommendation for department members to wear
24 body-worn cameras during the execution of search
25 warrants based on citizens complaints of alleged

1 police misconduct during narcotic raids, search
2 warrant executions. The Board also in 2017 made
3 recommendations for the department to require that the
4 body-worn camera remain activated during the entire
5 police-citizen encounter for transparency and
6 accountability. And also the board has recently --
7 or, excuse me, the board also made recommendations in
8 terms of the Office of Chief Investigator having
9 access to the body-worn camera system for a citizen
10 complaint investigation.

11 So those were just some of the
12 recommendations, some of the highlights of the
13 recommendations that the board provided back in 2017.
14 Since that time the department has -- and of course
15 the board has continued to review and update the
16 policy directives because we know that the policies
17 are a living, breathing document and they can be
18 changed and updated at any given time on an as-needed
19 basis. So based on that particular review, some of
20 the highlights that the department has recently made
21 to the body-worn cameras consist of the following:

22 **A requirement of the Board of Police**
23 **Commissioners and OCI to access body-worn camera video**
24 **and audio based on not only citizen complaint**
25 **investigations but disciplinary investigations in**

1 whole, because the board also investigates, reviews
2 and hears matter concerning suspensions without pay
3 and other disciplinary matters. And then also the
4 department of the board to receive access to the
5 body-worn camera system based on policy compliance or
6 to ensure that policy compliance is being adhered
7 with.

8 Also the recommendation was added for
9 investigative commands to secure and activate
10 body-worn cameras when executing search warrants or
11 effecting an arrest. And then additional training
12 requirements were made to the body-worn camera policy
13 directive as well as the assignment of body-worn
14 cameras to members, and then outlining supervisory
15 responsibilities in terms of making sure that audits
16 and inspections are being -- are taking place and that
17 the equipment is assigned and that it's operable
18 during the officer's or during the member's entire
19 tour of duty.

20 So again, all of these provisions are
21 contained in the actual directive, and the details are
22 all there. I would also like to just briefly
23 highlight, too, in the body-worn camera policy
24 directive, the update, one of the last major updates
25 that was made by the department consisted of the use

1 of body-worn cameras for members assigned to a task
2 force with federal partners. So this particular
3 provision outlines the requirements to activate
4 body-worn cameras when executing a search warrant or
5 effecting an arrest. It also outlines the
6 requirements for saving the body-worn camera footage
7 pursuant to the department's retention period, and
8 then list the procedures regarding when a concern
9 might arise as relates to whether or not the officer
10 should continue to have their body-worn camera
11 activated during those joint task forces.

12 So all of those details again are outlined
13 in the policy directive. And if the honorable board
14 has additional recommendations at this time or
15 additional concerns with respect to the policy, we
16 have asked, you know, for that information to be sent
17 to us so that we can include it in our transmission to
18 the department. But based on all of those details and
19 all of those requirements and updates that were
20 included based on both the board's recommendations and
21 the department's additional research and analysis, we
22 are recommending that the body-worn camera policy
23 receive a vote of approval for today.

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioners, what is
25 your pleasure?

1 (Motion was moved and supported.)

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: It's been properly moved
3 and supported. We'll take a roll call vote.

4 Commissioner Vice Chair.

5 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Oh, I'm sorry, yes.

6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

7 District 1.

8 District 2.

9 MS. WHITE: I believe, through the Chair,
10 Commissioner Griffie, had to step away.

11 COMMISSIONER BROWN: That was a yes for
12 District 1, Brown.

13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Okay.

14 District 3.

15 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Support.

16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 4. Yes,
17 Commissioner Bell.

18 District 5.

19 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman, I would
20 like to table this until next week. I'm just now
21 getting to -- seeing this for the first time, and this
22 hasn't been -- whatever these changes are have not
23 been talked about at this table before this body and
24 the public, and I think we have some great concerns,
25 but I would like to see what changes -- what changes

1 are we making?

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. District 6 has
3 stepped away.

4 District 7?

5 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes.

6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. Commissioner
7 Hernandez, At-Large.

8 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Yes.

9 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Jones,
10 At-Large.

11 COMMISSIONER JONES: Yes.

12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Holley,
13 At-Large.

14 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Yes.

15 MS. WHITE: The motion passed.

16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

17 MS. WHITE: The second policy directive is
18 regarding Tasers X2 Conducted Energy Weapons, and we
19 are moving to just a couple of pages through the Power
20 Point presentation. And, please, honorable board, all
21 of these directors have been shared during or shared
22 with this week's packet, last week's packet, and
23 several times throughout the past month, and it's been
24 on the board's website for quite some time as well
25 just to give the honorable board some time to look

1 through the policy directives and also to allow the
2 public to weigh in on any policy recommendations that
3 they might have had.

4 So with respect to the Taser X2 Conducted
5 Energy Weapon, again this policy directive was
6 previously reviewed, evaluated, researched back in
7 2017 by the honorable board. And there were extensive
8 panel discussions, extensive meetings, and extensive
9 meetings even between the Board of Police
10 Commissioners and the Detroit Police Department and
11 Assistant Chief White and the entire staff on DPD as
12 it relates to the policy act of the actual less lethal
13 weapon of the Taser X2. And so with that, the board
14 did approve a policy directive in 2017. However, the
15 department implemented a training directive for its
16 pilot program. So the department started out the
17 pilot program to test out the weapon to see if there
18 were any additional policies that needed to be added
19 to the actual directive before they implemented it
20 into a final directive, which is what you have in your
21 packet this afternoon.

22 So that is what this policy consists of,
23 the final product of the lessons learned, best
24 practices, and additional information that the
25 department learned during that pilot program. But as

1 it relates to the board's recommendation that it made,
2 the board made some 13 to 15 recommendations
3 substantive recommendations to the policy directive,
4 all of which the department accepted, and they
5 include, but are not limited to, ensuring that the
6 policy directive concerning tasers considered the --
7 if we go back one slide, considered the special
8 populations when deploying and discharging this less
9 lethal weapon. Also the board made recommendations as
10 it relates to the notification and reporting
11 procedures regarding the deployment and discharge of
12 the less lethal weapon. And then the board made
13 substantial recommendation as it relates to the
14 department being required to conduct random audits of
15 the actual data downloads and recertification, and
16 those audits are conducted by the Civil Rights
17 Division of the department.

18 And then there were several recommendations
19 made to the department, all of which is contained in
20 the policy directive and itemized for your review in
21 the additional policy before that you received.

22 And if it is your pleasure at this time,
23 the recommendation is for the board to approve the
24 policy given that the board has already worked with
25 the department extensively in developing the final

1 draft of the directive that you have in front of you.
2 And given that the Board already approved this policy
3 directive back in 2017, it's just now been codified
4 into a permanent directive as opposed to a temporary
5 training directive.

6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Ms. White.

7 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Chair, we are
8 accepting a motion at this time?

9 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, ma'am.

10 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: I move that we
11 accept the Taser X2 Conducted Energy Weapons as
12 explained by Ms. White.

13 (Motion supported.)

14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: It's been properly moved
15 and supported. Discussion?

16 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Through the Chair,
17 I think Commissioner Brown has a discussion item.

18 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yes. I just wanted to
19 be clear on one point on the policy change, that it
20 did say that they're not going to be allowed to carry
21 tasers while at secondary employment?

22 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir, that is correct. And
23 also in addition to -- well, as an aside to your
24 point, it is prohibited off-duty as well, and then
25 there is a specific provision within the policy

1 directive that talks about the procedures as it
2 relates to investigating those concerns regarding the
3 conducted energy weapons.

4 And so again the recommendation, and the
5 honorable board just previously approved the use of
6 force policy directive, but the recommendation is to
7 approve the Taxer X2 Conducted Energy Weapons as long
8 as it is in connection and in alignment with the use
9 of force policy that was just approved previously by
10 the honorable board.

11 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Okay. Thank you.

12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Roll call.

13 Vice Chair Holt.

14 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes.

15 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

16 District 1.

17 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yes.

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 2.

19 District 3.

20 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Did you call me?

21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, ma'am. District 3.

22 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes.

23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 4. Bell, yes.

24 District 5.

25 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman, once

1 again I'm unable to vote on this today due to the
2 fact --

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 7.

4 COMMISSIONER BURTON: -- that community
5 hasn't seen this policy in this form. (Technical
6 difficulties.)

7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 7.

8 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes.

9 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. And At-Large,
10 Commissioner Hernandez.

11 At-Large, Commissioner Jones.

12 COMMISSIONER JONES: Yes.

13 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Hernandez, yes.

14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: At-Large, Commissioner
15 Holley.

16 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Yes.

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Ms. White.

18 MS. WHITE: The motion passed.

19 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

20 MS. WHITE: The third policy directive is
21 relating to property control, 306.3. And just a few
22 key updates that the department made to these two
23 directives, or this directive, and again these are
24 directives that have been in place, and only updates
25 have been made and revisions have been made to these

1 directives. So this -- the last two directives,
2 property control and foot pursuit, are not brand new
3 directives.

4 Again, the property control directive will
5 ensure the property that is in the DPD's possession is
6 properly received and recorded, securely stored, and
7 proper disposition is made according to the law. So
8 the key updates include, but are not limited to
9 defining key terms for clarity and operation,
10 outlining procedures for outside agencies recovering a
11 firearm stolen from within Detroit city lines, and
12 also specifies procedures for forfeited firearms and
13 the responsibilities of supervisors or officers -- and
14 officers in charge of the case. And also the policy
15 directive also codifies the process for forfeiting
16 guns through the Michigan State Police and outlines
17 that procedure detail.

18 And so again at this time the
19 recommendation is to request a vote of approval for
20 Property Control 306.3.

21 (Motion moved and supported.)

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: It's been properly and
23 supported. Discussion.

24 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman, you
25 know, I would just like to know why we are in a rush

1 to push these policies today, when the community
2 hasn't been given a chance to weigh in on each one of
3 these line items. We do have policies already in
4 place for instance for body-worn cameras and use of
5 tasers and so forth, but the community has not been
6 able to weigh in on these different changes.

7 I am -- these changes -- I have not been
8 able to review these changes. I'm just now learning
9 about it today in this session. These are very good
10 topics, and I'm sure the policy may do some good, but
11 we want to know what is really in the policy. We want
12 to know, you know, what the policy is today versus
13 what changes, you know, you're trying to implement.
14 Something like this should have been brought before
15 the community, allow them to weigh in, some continuing
16 conversation or dialogue versus -- prior to taking a
17 vote on these things today.

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Row call vote.

19 Vice Chair?

20 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes.

21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 1.

22 COMMISSIONER BROWN: No.

23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 2.

24 District 3.

25 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes.

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 4, yes.

2 District 5.

3 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I'm going to abstain
4 because this --

5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 6.

6 District 7.

7 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes.

8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. At-Large
9 would be Commissioner Hernandez.

10 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Yes.

11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Commissioner
12 Jones.

13 COMMISSIONER JONES: Yes.

14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Holley.

15 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Yes.

16 MS. WHITE: Motion passes.

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Thank you,
18 Ms. White. Thank you, Commissioners. Is that the
19 extent of our policies?

20 MS. WHITE: We just have one last one.

21 Through the Chair.

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay, one more. Thank
23 you.

24 MS. WHITE: The last one is foot pursuit,
25 202.7 This particular directive, the purpose of this

1 policy is to provide guidelines and possible
2 alternatives to assist members of the department in
3 making decisions on when to pursue on foot and when to
4 terminate that pursuit.

5 Again, honorable board, these policies have
6 been under the board's jurisdiction for months, and we
7 have conducted again extensive research in terms of
8 the policy, best practice, and also awaiting any
9 recommendations that the community may have, the
10 honorable board, or any additional research that we
11 might gain, you know, as the days go on, because as we
12 know policies change from day to day. But we try to
13 we make sure to incorporate all of the best practices
14 that we have learned from NACOLE, from some of the
15 other industry standards that we have been reviewing
16 as it relates to the President's Task Force, President
17 Barack Obama, the International Association of Chiefs
18 of Police, the Brennan Justice Center, and then there
19 is a list of references that are listed at the end of
20 this Power Point presentation and always included in
21 the board's records for your review in terms of
22 identifying the research that we actually conducted
23 and looked into to come up with the policy
24 recommendations.

25 But again, this policy, Foot Pursuit, is in

1 line with best practices outlined primarily in the
2 IACP, the International Association of Chiefs of
3 Police and other best standards. And some of the key
4 updates that were made to this policy directive just
5 consisted of the following, adding additional
6 consideration regarding when to pursue, when not to
7 pursue. So understanding or informing department
8 members that the legal standard for pursuing on foot
9 is involving reasonable suspicion. And so the officer
10 or the member has to have knowledge and information
11 that the individual that they are seeking to pursue
12 has committed a crime, is committing a crime, or will
13 commit a crime. So that consists of reasonable
14 suspicion standard, and so that's required. And then
15 there are a list of provisions that the department
16 walks through in terms of considerations for when to
17 pursue and when not to pursue an individual.

18 Also the updates consisted of outlined risk
19 factors associated with engaging in a foot pursuit.
20 And so the risk factors take into account that the
21 department member may have other alternatives to
22 pursue an individual and may not need to engage in a
23 foot pursuit at that time. Some of the other
24 alternatives include assistance through air support,
25 containment of the area, conducting a canine search,

1 saturation of the area with patrol personnel, and/or
2 the apprehension at another time and place when the
3 member knows the identity of the subject or has enough
4 information to pursue a later apprehension. And so
5 those additional provisions were added to the policy
6 directive.

7 And then also the last update consisted of
8 procedures for termination of a foot pursuit. And so
9 again the policy directive walks through those
10 procedures in which the department member would
11 terminate the foot pursuit. Also gaining the
12 assistance from the supervisor in making sure that all
13 of the information is properly documented and
14 accounted for and included on their activity logs and
15 various reports.

16 And so at this time the recommendation is
17 to receive a vote on the Foot Pursuit Directive 202.7.

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: The chair will entertain
19 a motion, and we will get to discussion.

20 (Motion was made and second.)

21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: The motion was properly
22 moved and supported.

23 Now Commissioner Burch, discussion.

24 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes, thank you. I
25 just wanted to ask Ms. White was this part of what we

1 call the foot pursuit, this was not involving the
2 officer having a weapon of the person in pursuit,
3 right?

4 MS. WHITE: Through the Chair, I'm not sure
5 I understand the question.

6 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Okay. You called it
7 foot pursuit.

8 MS. WHITE: Yes.

9 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I'm saying if the
10 officer is doing foot pursuit, and if he has a weapon,
11 he's not supposed to use it on the suspected victim or
12 criminal? That's what I'm asking you. That's not in
13 this?

14 MS. WHITE: Well, so foot pursuit there are
15 number of provisions that outline -- I'm sorry.

16 The policy directive walks through a number
17 of provisions in terms of when the officer is to
18 engage in a foot pursuit, and again it's supposed to
19 be done while in a safe manner where it is not harmful
20 to anyone in the area, it's not harmful to -- it does
21 not pose, you know, any threat or harm to the officer
22 or the member -- or the individual which they are
23 pursuing. And so again, it walks through the
24 provisions in which it would be safe to conduct that
25 foot pursuit, and then it also works through

1 provisions in which it would not be safe, and it would
2 be time to terminate the pursuit or not to engage in
3 that foot pursuit. So those specific outlined
4 provisions are included in the directive that we
5 transmitted. So I'm not sure if that might answer
6 your question.

7 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I think so, Ms. White.
8 Thank you.

9 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Discussion?

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Roll call. Or
11 discussion, go ahead.

12 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I had some discussion
13 as well. I didn't get to weigh in, Chairman.

14 MS. WHITE: Through the Chair?

15 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes.

16 MS. WHITE: Yes.

17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman, you
18 know, based off of this policy recommendation, we
19 already have a foot patrol policy already put in
20 place. Once again this is brought to my attention
21 here at the 12th hour in this board session. We have
22 not talked about this continuing in our meetings where
23 the community was able to weigh in on whatever this
24 new Section Number 202.7. Something like this should
25 have been brought up as far as changes so we could see

1 what the policy says today as far as what language you
2 want to put in it going forward.

3 This is something that we have not talked
4 about from a community standpoint, and I just think
5 that this is not the time to start pushing someone's
6 agenda at the 12th hour when the community has not
7 been included in the conversation who doesn't really
8 know the best practices or procedures because we
9 haven't talked with other civilian oversight boards
10 nor have we brought this matter up before NACOLE,
11 which this Board of Police Commissioners falls under
12 that umbrella.

13 I would like to know the best practice and
14 procedures for all of these different things, and it
15 would have been nice had those individuals come up
16 before this body to talk about their best practices
17 and procedures and allow the board as a whole along
18 with the community to weigh in on these different
19 things. I think it really does a disservice to the
20 community, to the commissioners who haven't read this,
21 but still rubber stamping this today, because we owe
22 it to the community when they elected us to serve
23 them. So I wish this would have come before us
24 sooner.

25 CHAIRPERSON BELL: We'll call a vote. Vice

1 Chair Holt?

2 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Yes.

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

4 District 1.

5 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yes.

6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 2.

7 District 3.

8 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes.

9 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 4, yes.

10 District 5.

11 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Abstain due to the

12 fact that I'm just seeing it for the first time.

13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 6.

14 District 7.

15 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes.

16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: At-Large, Commissioner

17 Hernandez.

18 Commissioner Jones?

19 COMMISSIONER JONES: Yes.

20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Holley.

21 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Yes.

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Ms. White?

23 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Yes.

24 MS. WHITE: I believe that might have been

25 Commissioner Hernandez.

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. Thank you. Do we
2 have a majority?

3 MS. WHITE: Yes.

4 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Ms. White.

5 Thank you, Ms. White, and thank you, Board.

6 That is the completion off all of the policies.

7 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Mr. Chairman.

8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes.

9 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Commissioner Holley.

10 Please let me ask a question, and I'm sorry about my
11 naiveness or my ignorance, but where are we with the
12 no-knock policy. Where are we with that?

13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: We don't have a no-knock
14 policy in the State of Michigan.

15 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: We don't.

16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: And the Assistant Chief
17 can speak to that.

18 ASSISTANT CHIEF STAIR: What I do know,
19 sir, is that there was a meeting conducted at 2 p.m.
20 this afternoon in regards to the subject at least. I
21 don't have an update, but I certainly can make sure
22 that the board is provided with one.

23 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Thank you.

24 MS. WHITE: Through the Chair, we'll make
25 sure to follow up with 1st A.C. Stair on that.

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, thank you. Thank
2 you, Commissioner Holley.

3 We can move on, Ms. White.

4 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Honorable board,
5 again if you will please refer to your agenda. All of
6 the incoming correspondence for this week is included
7 on the agenda, and I'd just like to highlight just a
8 few items because we have gone through the policy
9 directives extensively today, and again it's been on
10 the board's website and in the board's weekly packets
11 for maybe four or five, probably six months or so. So
12 they have been transmitted previously to the honorable
13 board.

14 But just to highlight the other items, the
15 FOIA request from the Law Offices of Attorney Jermaine
16 Wyrick. We did receive that correspondence, and we
17 forwarded that FOIA request to the City of Detroit Law
18 Department for their review and further action.

19 And also the honorable board received a
20 weekly DPD Facial Recognition Report for the week of
21 September 7th, 2020 through September 13th, 2020.

22 And then lastly the National Association
23 for Civilian Oversight of Law Enforcement, they are
24 holding their 2020 conference meeting next week, and
25 the honorable board should have received that notice

1 to RSVP for that meeting to attend a NACOLE meeting
2 and learn more information not just about oversight on
3 the whole, but about the NACOLE organization and its
4 operations.

5 And also, through the Chair, we know that
6 Chairperson Bell sits on the NACOLE Board and is a
7 member at-large for that organization. During that
8 meeting they will also not only go through conference
9 details and logistics in terms of number of
10 registrants and attendees and the outcome and the
11 results of the conference and wrapping up that
12 conference, but they will also hold elections for
13 upcoming seats that are vacant on the NACOLE board.
14 So if you would please be sure to RSVP for that
15 meeting to cast your vote, it would be greatly
16 appreciated. And staff will also make sure you
17 receive the notice if you have not.

18 And that concludes the incoming
19 correspondence at this time.

20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Ms. White.
21 Unfinished business.

22 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair?

23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes.

24 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I move that we begin
25 to post a position for OCI with the City of Detroit's

1 main HR department.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: We are not prepared at
3 this time. We would be -- you just received the
4 director of personnel resume including the criteria
5 for that. We'll move on that first, and we should be
6 acting on that next week. We can work on that other
7 criteria, but the director of personnel as I stated is
8 the most priority in reference to that particular
9 matter.

10 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I second his motion.

11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Any new business.

12 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair, we
13 have a second on the table, on the floor right now,
14 Mr. Chairman. You've got to honor the second. It's
15 been properly seconded.

16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: What is the pleasure of
17 the board?

18 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Is there a question?

19 CHAIRPERSON BELL: The question is that we
20 move on working up the interim -- I mean, the position
21 for chief investigator.

22 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Do we need a roll
23 call?

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: We'll conduct a roll
25 call and then discussion.

1 Commissioner Holt.

2 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: I abstain.

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 1.

4 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yes.

5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 2.

6 District 3?

7 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes.

8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 4, no.

9 District 5.

10 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes.

11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 7.

12 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes.

13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: At-Large, Commissioner

14 Hernandez.

15 MS. WHITE: I do see Commissioner Hernandez

16 still on the line.

17 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Abstain.

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I'm sorry?

19 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Hernandez?

20 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: He abstained.

21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Jones.

22 COMMISSIONER JONES: No.

23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Holley.

24 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: No.

25 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Did I call District 2.

1 Yes. Ms. White?

2 MS. WHITE: Yes, the motion passed.

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. At this time
4 we move onto any new business?

5 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yes.

6 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes. Go ahead,
7 Commissioner Darryl.

8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Only one person at a
9 time.

10 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Go ahead.

11 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Thank you for being so
12 polite. Thank you, Commissioner. I just wanted to
13 bring up as far as Mr. Bell, I think the
14 recommendations today, and I want to say to Ms. White,
15 I was not disrespecting her. I sent in
16 recommendations to Ms. Blossom, to yourself, and to
17 Mr. Brown and to Ms. Underwood of things that I think
18 would help this board. I'm just wondering is that
19 going to be read, sir, what I sent in this morning?
20 That's the first thing.

21 And then I wanted to recommend that this
22 board since we work so closely with the police
23 regarding the guns that they continually collect, that
24 this board takes the position, Mr. Bell, where we
25 would somehow decrease advertising buy guns out of the

1 pawn shops in African American neighborhoods. They
2 post these billboards, and I think it should be
3 something if we did it together at least post it with
4 the board's agreement that we do not need negative gun
5 advertising in our neighborhood. That's one thing.
6 And then when you add it to the other questions that I
7 had that I sent to Ms. Blossom and the rest of the
8 people, or may I read what I sent them?

9 CHAIRPERSON BELL: We will take a look at
10 it, Commissioner Burch. We will take a look at it and
11 we'll have discussion on that matter. Thank you.

12 MS. WHITE: Through the Chair.

13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes.

14 MS. WHITE: Excuse me, Mr. Chair, also the
15 honorable board. I did not receive the correspondence
16 that Commissioner Burch is referring to, so please
17 also send -- feel free to send me that document as
18 well because I never received it. Thank you.

19 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair.

20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes.

21 COMMISSIONER BURTON: For new business, I
22 move that the Board of Police Commissioners create a
23 policy with the police department's relationship with
24 the 1033 program with the Department of Defense,
25 create a policy based off of the relationship

1 throughout the program that they are with called the
2 1033 Program to protect citizens. The 1033 Program is
3 when they buy military grade equipment. So right now
4 the Detroit Police Department does not have a policy,
5 and a policy does fall under the Board of Police
6 Commissioners jurisdiction.

7 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yes, I second the
8 motion.

9 CHAIRPERSON BELL: It's been properly
10 moved. Discussion?

11 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yes. Mr. Chair, I
12 just wanted to ask a few questions to A.C. Stair if
13 she knows. Do we already have an agreement set up
14 already or a soft policy or something or directive of
15 how we're dealing with the 1033 Program so far?

16 ASSISTANT CHIEF CHAIR: I believe, through
17 the Chair, there is a soft policy agreement. I'm not
18 sure if I would call it an agreement. I know
19 Commissioner Burton I think back in July, sir, sent in
20 a request for some information in regards to it, and
21 we forwarded the information over. However, I can
22 always follow back up with you and the honorable board
23 with additional information.

24 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Okay. Thank you.

25 ASSISTANT CHIEF CHAIR: Yes, sir.

1 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Mr. Chairman.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes.

3 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Are we doing
4 discussion right now or a motion?

5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Discussion, yes, sir.

6 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I don't mind the
7 motion. My concern is should we not have some
8 discussions before we have a policy of pros and cons
9 so we understand it from the beginning to the end in
10 terms of what we're really voting on. Should we not
11 have a debate or discussion before we get to a policy?

12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I agree with you,
13 Commission Holley. It's a point in time. We don't
14 set a policy by itself, it's a joint effort with the
15 chief representing the department, and also with
16 Mayor. So basically that discussion should take
17 place. However, there is a motion on the floor, so we
18 would move for a roll call vote at this time.

19 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Under discussion as
20 well. Based off of looking at what is taking place
21 across the country, we saw -- you know, we saw what
22 happened when we turn on the news, and what we see on
23 the news is not pretty whatsoever. And as elected
24 officials being part of the bridge between the police
25 and the community, it's our responsibility to create

1 policies, work with law enforcement, but create
2 policies together in a partnership that's going to be
3 best useful in protecting our community, but not
4 harming our community.

5 And so right now across the country we want
6 to see police reform, and I know more importantly
7 Detroit wants to stand out and step out and be leading
8 this conversation, and so -- especially from the
9 community standpoint. And I just think that knowing
10 that there is not a policy in place as of yet, we as a
11 board can approve today to create a policy. The
12 policy is not going to be created overnight. But the
13 fact that a policy can come before this body, and I
14 just, you know -- so I call that we as a board
15 exercise our judicial responsibility and approve today
16 for a policy. The policy can be created, you know,
17 before the year is out, but we do need a policy,
18 because the 1033 Program with the Department of
19 Defense allows the departments and agencies to buy
20 substantial military grade equipment. And so the
21 community doesn't want to see this type of equipment
22 being deployed in their community.

23 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: And won't be that
24 long, can I just rebuttal that?

25 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, go ahead.

1 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: What I'm saying,
2 Commissioner Burton, we may get there, but I think we
3 ought to have an intelligent discussion, debate,
4 information and research, and we may get where you
5 want to get, but I don't think you have a policy
6 before you have the agreement to go get the policy
7 without discussion. That's all I'm saying here.

8 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Well, the motion has
9 been --

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Thank you.
11 Commissioner Burton, you already stated your position.

12 Okay. A roll call vote.

13 Commissioner Holt, a roll call vote.

14 VICE COMMISSIONER HOLT: May I have a
15 repeat of the motion.

16 MS. WHITE: Through the Chair. The motion
17 was for the Board and the department to create a
18 policy regarding the 1033 Program based on the
19 department's 1033 Program.

20 And then also for the record, Commissioner
21 Hernandez is trying to get in on the discussion.

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Commissioner
23 Hernandez.

24 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Mr. Chairman,
25 Commissioners, we're not voting on the policy today.

1 We're voting to approve a policy going forward. So
2 the policy is not going to be created today.

3 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Are you able to
4 hear me?

5 MS. WHITE: Yes, now we can hear you,
6 Commissioner Hernandez.

7 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: I think my mic
8 might be delayed. So as a point of clarify, is this
9 motion or through this motion would we be approving
10 that Commissioner Burton take the lead to draft a
11 policy? Just as a point of clarification. I'm trying
12 to understand.

13 COMMISSIONER BURTON: No, that the Board of
14 Police Commissioners and the chief's office will work
15 together on creating a policy going forward. Right
16 now there isn't a policy, but we are not going to
17 draft a policy today. But the board can work in
18 agreement with the chief's office, with the department
19 for creating a policy, and also have the community to
20 weigh in as well. But under the board's jurisdiction
21 we can't create a policy, rules and regulations. So
22 right now this is a program that's in place without a
23 policy. So we won't be approving a policy today, but
24 we are saying that --

25 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Through the Chair.

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes.

2 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Through the Chair.
3 Commissioner Burton, so would we count on you given
4 that you're bringing this motion to light, that you
5 would lead that effort to draft that policy? Is that
6 what you're committing to? That's the point of
7 clarity that I'm trying to make to the entire to the
8 entire board.

9 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I don't think we should
10 that get that clarity. He indicated that's really --
11 the motion is somewhat out of order, because --

12 COMMISSIONER BURTON: It's not out of
13 order.

14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Because he already spoke
15 to that issue. But we can take a roll call vote.

16 Vice Chair Holt.

17 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: No.

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 1.

19 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yes.

20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 2.

21 District 3.

22 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes.

23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 4, no.

24 District 5.

25 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes.

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 7.

2 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes.

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: At-Large, Commissioner
4 Hernandez.

5 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Hernandez?

6 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: No.

7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Jones.

8 COMMISSIONER JONES: Yes.

9 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Holley.

10 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: No.

11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Ms. White?

12 MS. WHITE: The motion failed.

13 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Through the Chair, I
14 have counted the motion as passing.

15 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir, excuse me. Through
16 the Chair, the motion passed.

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

18 Any new announcements?

19 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Mr. Chairman, can you
20 hear me?

21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes.

22 COMMISSIONER BROWN: I still have just a
23 comment on the new business.

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir, go ahead.

25 COMMISSIONER BROWN: What I wanted to say

1 is that I disagree with the decision from corporate
2 counsel on the position, because there was some things
3 in there she was not clear on, what she stated on the
4 authority of the board.

5 We do have supervisory control, and she was
6 saying how broad it was. So it does fall under the
7 purview of the board to approve the operating and
8 budget of items and things as it relates to the police
9 department with our supervisory control and budgetary
10 oversight. So I'm going to pursue this outside of the
11 board and the City and maybe go to the Attorney
12 General to get another opinion so it's just unbiased.
13 So we just take it out of the hands and the opinions
14 of us and the City so that there is no conflict, and
15 let's see what the Attorney General's response would
16 be to that. And I will write the letter and draft it
17 and send it on.

18 And also, second, I did request a closed
19 session to discuss the things that you're talking
20 about with the policies and stuff like that. Where
21 are we on that? I haven't heard anything about
22 scheduling any closed sessions coming up. And I know
23 I did send in a letter for a young man who wanted an
24 appeal about applying to the department. Where are we
25 on that?

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Well, I don't know. I
2 would hope that you direct it to Ms. White, and we'll
3 respond.

4 Announcements, the next meeting is going be
5 on Thursday, September the 24, 2020. Thereafter
6 October 8th, 2020.

7 At this point in time we can move on to
8 oral communications/public comments.

9 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: I have an
10 announcement. Through the Chair.

11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, ma'am.

12 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Thank you. Under
13 the leadership of Governor Whitmore, the Michigan
14 Department of Health and Human Services has expanded
15 the testing of Covid communities. Several churches
16 are involved in that effort, Harper Memorial Baptist
17 Church, Historic King Solomon Baptist, and even WCCC.
18 If folks are interested in having what they call the
19 noninvasive Covid testing done, they can call
20 1-888-535-6136. That's 1-888-535-6136 to make an
21 appointment. Thank you.

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

23 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Under announcements,
24 the Shriner's in addition with Councilwoman Pro Tem
25 Sheffield in District 5 with Commission Burton, there

1 will be food drive this Saturday at Tennessee Baptist
2 Church. I will send out a flyer to Ms. White that I
3 just finally got that she can send it out that if we
4 know of anyone that is in need of any food or meals or
5 that wants to come by and volunteer to pass food out,
6 you're more than welcome. But we'll be over there,
7 and also conducting our voter registration drive, and
8 you would be able to sign up for the census.

9 VICE CHAIRPERSON HOLT: Oh, Wow. Thank
10 you.

11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Oral
12 communication from the public?

13 ROBERT BROWN: Good afternoon, Mr. Chair
14 and this honorable board. I currently have 13
15 speakers. The first three speaks will be JW, followed
16 by Lieutenant Mark Young, and Minister Eric Blount.

17 JW: Can you hear me?

18 ROBERT BROWN: Yes.

19 JW: Great, it works today. Okay. First
20 you all, I would just like to say Chairman Willie
21 Bell, you are just blatantly biased to my Commissioner
22 Willie Burton, and if I had a child watching this
23 meeting, I would be embarrassed for the leadership of
24 this body, and it's just really unbecoming of this
25 body. The way you treat him, cut him off, don't take

1 him seriously, it's just bad. So I really would
2 recommend you think about that, sir, because I went
3 and was looking for the documents. I couldn't find
4 the body cam policy, which was not followed by the
5 police officer that slammed me to the ground last
6 summer. It would be nice if someone is checking
7 whether that was really a malfunction or something
8 else.

9 And by the way, that officer, I don't know
10 if your policy talks about where the camera is, but
11 this gentleman had his camera at his belt. So what
12 are they making videos of I would like to know.

13 So, no, the information was not there.
14 You're a body that's supposed to be for the public,
15 not the police. So I do agree with Commissioner
16 Willie Burton. I didn't hear -- well, I did miss a
17 couple meetings, but, yes, this should be discussed
18 before the public. You can hear back from the public
19 like that little tidbit about where this police
20 officer was wearing his camera, then claimed he didn't
21 have it or that it malfunctioned.

22 So I'm glad that somebody unmuted me and I
23 was able to speak. But please, Commissioner Bell,
24 really your treatment of my commissioner is just
25 unacceptable. So hopefully you can change your

1 behavior and make this body more honorable.

2 ROBERT BROWN: Lieutenant Mark Young.

3 LIEUTENANT MARK YOUNG: Violence is
4 increasing without no fear of punishment. Everyone
5 wants to be in charge without accepting the risk.
6 Anti-police rhetoric, police political pontification
7 is backfiring. There is going to be a ban. The
8 moment that you ban the equipment that protects the
9 men and women that's going out here against barricaded
10 gunman, I'm going to call for a ban of our own. Ban
11 you from politically pontificating at our services, at
12 our bedside, and our grave sides. That is disgusting.

13 We've seen numerous barricaded gunmen over
14 the last few months, it is increasing with no risk,
15 with no risk or punishment for these violent
16 offenders. I support and applaud the men and women of
17 the Detroit Police Department. They are going out
18 there and doing a fabulous job. We should be appalled
19 and angry and sickened by the actions against our law
20 enforcement officers. We do not support innocent
21 citizens being victims by law enforcement or anybody
22 else. The members of the department are dependable,
23 not expendable, and their sacrifice is great, and we
24 should be appreciating them to the fullest. If you
25 really want to make change, suit up, because we're

1 hiring.

2 Lastly, lastly. The census, if people fail
3 to follow the census, we will be in bankruptcy part
4 two, and it will be a bad situation and you don't have
5 to worry about the city.

6 I yield the rest of my time.

7 ROBERT BROWN: Minister Eric Blount.

8 MINISTER BLOUNT: Can you hear me, Board?

9 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes.

10 MINISTER BLOUNT: For the record, this is
11 Minister Eric Blount, a lifelong Detroiter, and my
12 comments are as follows. All Detroiters should be
13 extremely afraid of the Detroit Police and the city
14 leaders, and here is why. This week a federal judge
15 rejected DPD and the city's request to continue
16 terrorizing Detroiters, even peaceful protesters. The
17 major reason for the judge's decision is, and I quote,
18 "The city and the police department lack a factual
19 basis for their motion." This conclusion by a federal
20 judgment that the police lacked facts to support their
21 actions. The police who have the power on their hips
22 to take a life, to arrest, detain, and request a
23 warrant. It is with this reality that I again beg all
24 Detroiters to video record all police contacts with
25 the public, especially people of color. All of the

1 recent police brutality situations were reported by
2 concerned citizens who just happened to be on the
3 scene. The police department and many others continue
4 to deploy a strategy of delay and deny the public
5 release of body-worn cameras. I pray that this
6 federal judge's decision will lead to what will be the
7 third consent decree forced upon DPD as a result of
8 its systemic exploitation of the citizens of Detroit,
9 the city I love and people I care for.

10 As far as no-knock warrants, even the death
11 of or own seven-year-old Aiyana Stanley Jones and the
12 2020 murder of Breonna Taylor, why is there not a
13 policy on no-knock warrants, not even a fast track
14 effort. On foot pursuits, the definition of
15 reasonable suspicion is very low.

16 ROBERT BROWN: Mr. Chair, your next three
17 people will be Mr. Anthony Scinell (ph), Susan
18 Steigerwalt, and Detroit DSA.

19 Mr. Scinell. Go ahead, sir.

20 MR. SCINELL: Hello. Yes, a City of
21 Detroit resident and taxpayer, I'm calling for the
22 either immediate resignation or termination of what I
23 call the Liar and Chief of Police James Craig who is
24 waging a manufactured and phony law and order
25 political campaign in concert with the fascist

1 President Donald Trump to cover up (inaudible) with AG
2 William Barr, and a land bank bandit, corporate
3 conspirator, Michael Duggan, and it's neither the
4 safety nor the enforcement of law in Detroit, but the
5 chief's own personality propelled media agenda which
6 one on one hand would say that demonstrators are
7 outsiders, but police, his police agents are not. So
8 I'm calling for the immediate termination of the
9 chief's employment with the city.

10 And also the corporate counsel's opinion
11 that you can't rule on facial recognition, that's
12 really a ridiculous opinion in my view.

13 And finally, I support Commissioner
14 Burton's attempt to formulate a policy on the 1033
15 program, which I personally believe should not exist,
16 and the United States Congress needs to abolish it.
17 Thank you.

18 ROBERT BROWN: Ms. Steigerwalt.
19 Ms. Steigerwalt?

20 We're going to Detroit DSA.

21 DETROIT DSA: Hello, this is Anthony
22 Dellicolli from Detroit Democratic Socialists. I
23 would like to comment on this Board claiming that it
24 doesn't have the authority to ban facial recognition
25 technology. Regarding DPD's use of the technology

1 following the false arrest of Robert Williams,
2 Commissioner Griffie in the meeting on June 25th
3 requested a full report and said, quote, "If I cannot
4 attest to the effectiveness of the program, I will
5 shut it down. I will work with my colleagues, and we
6 will not allow you to use it any more," end quote. So
7 either that was all a charade to diffuse the
8 controversy surrounding the jailing of an innocent
9 man, or Commissioner Griffie and the rest of this
10 board knows that they have the authority to ban it,
11 but choose to allow Chair Bell to make excuses about
12 why they cannot.

13 Do what many other major cities have
14 already done, which by the way have much less
15 population of African-Americans, vote to ban facial
16 recognition technology and recommend that city council
17 do the same, and that will be the end of it. Thank
18 you.

19 ROBERT BROWN: Mr. Chair, the next three
20 speakers will be Ashley Smith followed by Richard
21 Newman followed by People Power.

22 Ms. Smith.

23 MS. SMITH: I'm Ashley Smith, sister of
24 Detroit Police victim Sheldy Smith. One, we need to
25 end no-knock warrants, they're being removed from all

1 all different places in the country. We need to stop
2 Project Green Light, Justice for Sheldy. Chief Craig
3 and also members of this board, you guys need to step
4 down.

5 And then Lieutenant Mark Young, you've got
6 to stop drinking the Kool-Aid. There is a lot of
7 issues going on in this police department, and I think
8 we have room for improvements that are realistic.

9 I've been around the world, and I'm
10 literally afraid for Detroiters and their pets who
11 have been victims of the police board and the police
12 department. I have asked on several occasions for
13 several months to get an update for the promotion of
14 Dewayne Jones. I still have not received that. I'm
15 just asking, because it just -- I don't -- it's just a
16 little bit ridiculous at this point. I'm disappointed
17 with the conduct today. We have to give our
18 commissioners the ability to do their jobs. And I do
19 believe that we should be able to communicate about
20 different policies being enacted that effect
21 Detroiters. Remember Detroiters pay taxes and you're
22 responsible for them. I yield my time.

23 ROBERT BROWN: Mr. Newman.

24 MR. NEWMAN: Hello, can you hear me?

25 ROBERT BROWN: Yes, sir.

1 MR. NEWMAN: Hi. My name is Richard
2 Newman. I'm in District 3 in Detroit in the
3 Conant-Davison neighborhood. First of all, I wanted
4 to voice my support for what Commissioner Brown said
5 about taking outside opinions about the powers of the
6 police board and get an independent legal advice to
7 really determine like what the powers are, because it
8 seems clear from the charter that the police board has
9 the power to establish policies rules and regulations,
10 and also to guide policy through budget approval. And
11 under those items in the charter, it seems that the
12 Board of Police Commissioners could take a stand on
13 facial recognition technology and the 1033 program. I
14 do want to applaud the board for deciding to establish
15 some policies on the 1033 program. I hope the
16 policies will be not to use it. But regardless, this
17 is -- you know, this is the job of the board.

18 So I really am looking forward to that
19 independent review of these powers, and I really hope
20 we can move forward with banning facial recognition
21 technology, banning the involvement in the 1033
22 program. And even if it's not within your legal
23 authority, you have a moral imperative to take a stand
24 on these things. So I'm really looking forward to
25 hearing from you next week and the weeks to come and

1 see how you move forward with these really important
2 policies for Detroiters. Thank you so much. I yield
3 my time.

4 ROBERT BROWN: People Power.

5 PEOPLE POWER: September 24th, 2020 for
6 immediate release. By unanimous vote the Detroit
7 Board of Police Commissioners has decided to end the
8 Detroit Police Department's use of facial recognition
9 technology. At today's Board of Police Commissioners,
10 the BOPC voted ten-zero with Commissioner Carter in
11 absentia to immediately end DPD's use of the
12 controversial facial recognition program. I could no
13 longer sit by and see innocent men and women
14 unlawfully arrested, said Commissioner Shirley Burch,
15 District 3, who made the motion to ban facial
16 recognition. As a Christian I was guided Isaiah 1:17,
17 learn to do good, seek justice, correct oppression.
18 Commissioner Burch was seconded by Chairman Willie
19 Bell in the motion to ban FRT who noted in the spirit
20 of the late John Lewis, now is the time for us to make
21 good trouble and stand up to those who continue to
22 pressure the Board to allow DPD to use this broken and
23 racist tool. I clearly read that our first duty in
24 the 2012 charter is to in consultation with the Chief
25 of Police and with the approval of the Mayor

1 established policies, rules and regulations will now
2 make the revelation that facial recognition shall not
3 be used.

4 All go with whatever Chairman Bell said,
5 added Vice Chair Annie Holt. Debate on the matter was
6 short and powerful said Commissioner Holley, At-Large.
7 I hear the cries of the public on this matter, and let
8 the citizens of Detroit know I know my Christian duty,
9 I am with you, I will protect you. We will end this
10 facial recognition program today. Commissioner Evette
11 Griffie noted that many times DPD has come on BOPC
12 calls and used circular and extraneous arguments to
13 defend the program. She added facial recognition
14 technology is not DNA. If the tool is broken, it
15 can't be used.

16 Commissioners Burton, Brown and Davis who
17 long supported the ban expressed gratitude for the
18 actions of the board. It feels like the first action
19 we've taken as a real civilian oversight board noted
20 Commissioner Burton. Public comment at the time end
21 of the meeting was overwhelmingly in support of the
22 action. It's a start, it's about time, noted an
23 justice activist on the call. The facial recognition
24 technology ban should go into effect immediately.

25 ROBERT BROWN: Mr. Chair, your next three

1 speakers will be Ms. Tawana Petty, followed by
2 Ms. Michelle George, followed by Ms. Susan
3 Steigerwalt.

4 Ms. Petty.

5 MS. PETTY: Thank you for bringing in the
6 law department to discuss facial recognition. I found
7 it extremely confusing that the opinion would be that
8 this board could not regulate DPD's use considering
9 they passed policy. You all passed the policy
10 approving use. So it's just -- I think that if the
11 Attorney General determines that you don't have that
12 power, then we need to re-evaluate why you can pass
13 policies that you can't undue. However, I don't
14 expect that community members will let up about this
15 issue because of a verbal opinion anyway.

16 Fighting face recognition and mass
17 surveillance isn't just about the inevitable targeting
18 and criminalization, it's also about the foreseeable
19 exclusion, social control, and further marginalization
20 of communities who are already regulated to the
21 margins of society. We need to have confidence that
22 this body can offer responsible oversight and will
23 oversee this technology. You should not be passing
24 any policies that you don't have the power to
25 regulate. That makes absolutely no sense. Think

1 about that.

2 So any policy that you're passing through,
3 especially without scrutiny, because I'm seeing
4 policies just get waved and passed through, they're
5 going to have an impact on the entire City of Detroit,
6 and then when it comes to hold folks accountable to
7 those policy, you opt out of it. And that is very
8 discouraging.

9 So if I was serving on any body and I was
10 told that I can't regulate a policy that I'm passing,
11 I would be in an uproar. And so all I'm asking is
12 that you consider that when you make decisions, what
13 is your ultimate ability to hold people to the fire on
14 the decisions that you're making. Thank you for your
15 time.

16 ROBERT BROWN: Ms. Michelle George.

17 MS. GEORGE: Can you hear me? Hi,
18 Mr. Brown.

19 To the Chair and to A.C. Stair, because I
20 just want to get that in, A.C. Stair, I'm going to try
21 to email you, because there is a missing young lady in
22 the last two months, and I asked that question before,
23 but no one gave me an answer, so maybe I can email
24 you. I've just noticed that we've been having a lot
25 of missing young ladies, but also some found, but some

1 have not, I want to make that comment.

2 Also to Chairman Bell and to this honorable
3 board, and I was listening to the policy, just like
4 what Ms. Petty was stating, Detroit isn't an apartheid
5 system. We have with the Mayor, and I respect the
6 Office of Mayor, with the Mayor we have a Financial
7 Review Commission, School Board, Emergency Management,
8 all of these things, but if we keep hollering enough,
9 the Lord will hear our prayer, that facial recognition
10 will be banned, because if Portland can ban a most
11 racist system that China used to control human
12 behavior, and to -- and talk about race, that's how it
13 began if you look at China.

14 I pray for the families, and also my
15 condolences to the family of Bryant Searcy they buried
16 last week, his family.

17 But Chairman Bell, you can hear and see
18 that you control the microphone and the power. Thank
19 you Commissioner Burch for putting that in there,
20 Commissioner Bell, but if we cry out to the Lord, he
21 will hear us. It will be banned hopefully under a new
22 administration, a new African-American Attorney
23 General. And I don't want to see the Detroit Police
24 Department on a consent decree, but it looks like you
25 may wind up down that path. We see the racism -- I

1 just did a video Racism and Your Health. With Breonna
2 Taylor, and this is not -- we know their Law
3 Enforcement Act, serve and protect, but we see what is
4 happening with black faces. But Detroit Board of
5 Police Commissioners, some of you, you are
6 perpetuating the racists upon our system with
7 apartheid. So we will fight this and we will win, and
8 let's vote next year with Mayor. Thank you, bye-bye.

9 ROBERT BROWN: Ms. Steigerwalt.

10 Ms. Steigerwalt?

11 Through the Chair, it seems like she's have
12 trouble, so Ms. George is the last speaker.

13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Mr. Brown.
14 If there is no other business here, the Chair will
15 entertain a motion for adjournment.

16 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: I thought you had
17 another speaker. Are we going to allow
18 Ms. Steigerwalt to speak, or what are we doing with
19 that?

20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I guess she's not
21 responding.

22 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Is she still on the
23 line?

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I don't know.

25 COMMISSIONER BROWN: I've been unmuting her

1 from the last.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: The Chair we'll
3 entertain a motion for adjournment.

4 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Mr. Chair, before you
5 have make that motion, I would just like to say that
6 when you do speak to me regarding the recommendations,
7 that we meet with the board so they can help make that
8 decision, please don't just let it be you what I have
9 to say. And Ms. White, I will forward the message to
10 you. Thank you.

11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: You can always speak to
12 the board, Commissioner Holt, you can communicate
13 through email, attach whatever that is.

14 The Chairman will entertain a motion for
15 adjournment.

16 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I'm Commissioner
17 Burch.

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Burch, thank you for
19 clarifying that.

20 COMMISSIONER JONES: Motion to adjourn.

21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir.

22 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Second.

23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: It's been properly moved
24 and second. Any discussions?

25 Those in favor yes?

1 THE BOARD: Yes.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Those in no.

3 COMMISSIONER BURTON: No.

4 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Motion passed. Thank
5 you. We stand adjourned.

6 (The meeting was adjourned at 5:13 p.m.)

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
