2 Deputy Chief Bryant and all community attendees welcome
3 to the Board of Police Commissioners meeting. Please note

9 the meeting. Thank you and now Chairperson Bell.

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Ms. White. I appreciate
11 you opening up for the business part of it. I'm going to
12 call the meeting to order. We'll have an invocation by
13 Chaplain Gregory Wilson.

14 CHAPLAIN WILSON: Thank you, Commissioner. May we
15 pray? Father, we want to thank you for everything that
16 you have done before we ask you, we want to say thank
17 you. We want to let you know that we're grateful for your
18 grace and your mercy. Oh, God, we ask now that you bless
19 our Mayor, bless our Chief of Police. Oh God, bless every
20 official, whether he be appointed or elected. God, now we
21 ask that you bless this Board, crown them with knowledge
22 and wisdom, knit them together in unity so that they may
23 accomplish the tasks set before them. Keep their hearts
24 pure and their eyes turned to your face as they work in
25 the best interest of the people they are called to serve

1 in this city. We ask this in your son Jesus' name. Amen.

2 ALL: Amen.

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Chaplain Wilson. Before
4 I introduce the Commissioners at this time, Ms. White
5 could you post or share the rules of decorum for the
6 Board meetings. Is that possible now or you need a second
7 to do that?

8 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir. We are working on pulling that
9 item.

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay, there it is right there. I
11 just want to share this with the Board. This is the new
12 package every week. But we're not going to continue to
13 share this with you in your package. It does not serve
14 any purpose because it's basic primarily, but I wanted to
15 highlight the business that the Board should be conducted
16 in accordance with the latest edition Robert's Revised
17 Rules to the extent where they do not conflict with the
18 bylaws. Each member has to cooperate with the Chair,
19 preserve order and decorum, and no Commissioner should by
20 conversation or otherwise delay or interrupt a person on
21 the Board. Now we have a commissioner that is ongoing,
22 activities that are totally inappropriate. And this Board
23 is going to take every step within the confines of legal
24 and our bylaws to address that issue. So I want the Board
25 to be aware, look at the bylaws, and look at all

1 concerns, that we really are concerned about. We don't
2 need to be reminded of public comments about the behavior
3 of Commissioners in terms of how they should conduct
4 themselves. We hold high standards for this Board since
5 1974, and I want to say that in the last year or so, our
6 interim Board Secretary has made it honorable in terms of
7 that title over and over again in her address to us as a
8 Board member. So we should live up to the expectation of
9 holding this position, whether you're elected or
10 appointed by the City Charter. And that's something that
11 we should abide by in that whole process. I cannot say
12 how these things have been handled last year, and going
13 into this year. And as Reverend Holley Commissioner
14 Holley stated it's enough, it's enough. We are not here
15 for that. We're here to conduct business by the City
16 Charter mandate. It's as simple as that, and that should
17 be our calling and our duty and responsibility. That's
18 why I wanted to say, remind the commissioners publicly
19 and also that the public can see that we do have a rule
20 of conduct, and our officers are held to a high standard.
21 When they participate in this meeting, they conduct
22 themselves appropriately at all times. And in most cases,
23 the public does in a way. But I just think we need to
24 help to highlight and that's what I'm doing here to
25 highlight that we have an invocation to set the tone that

1 we should be prayerful, we should be thankful. And I give
2 Commissioner Burch that distinct privilege that she
3 initiated when she joined his Board, that we should have
4 a Chaplain at all out meetings, and that's something that
5 she takes credit for and that we acknowledge, and we
6 bring that on to set the proper tone. So that's what we
7 try to do in all our forums.

8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: It's throughout Michigan, that
9 Boards meet, and you should not have this type of
10 disruption. It needs to cease, and if I'm speaking in
11 your lane and indirectly to you, or you feel that I'm not
12 directly, I apologize, but if I have to call people out,
13 I will do that. You know who you are and there's an
14 individual that engages and people are supporting that
15 type of behavior. So we need to discontinue that. So I
16 just wanted to share that with you. I hope that you take
17 it in the spirit that it is given. It's all about order
18 and decorum and trying to conduct our meetings.
19 Individuals have gotten off our meetings because it has
20 been extremely too long, and therefore it causes some
21 stress, not only to the Commissioners but to DPD
22 personnel and the public. To be honest with you, we've
23 been approached by that over and over again. I don't know
24 why they haven't said that to you directly, but it's
25 quite clear what we've been engaged in. So on that note,

1 I'm going to move right into the approval of the agenda
2 for February 11th. Commissioners.

3 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: I move that we approve the agenda
4 for February the 11th.

5 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Point of information, sir.

6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I'm sorry.

7 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Point of information, sir.

8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I'm want to get it on the floor
9 first, please. Did I get a motion, we had a motion.

10 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: No, I was just asking about how
11 we are going to follow the agenda, as you said. It was
12 supposed to be the introduction of the officers, and
13 Commissioners next.

14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Say again, now, sir.

15 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Shouldn't we have the
16 introduction of the Commissioners before we go to the
17 agenda?

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. Your point of order is
19 taken. Thank you. Thank you. I stand corrected.
20 Commissioners, would you introduce yourself? I'm
21 Commissioner Willie Bell, District 4, Chair of the Board,
22 starting with District 1.

23 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Commissioner, Darryl Brown,
24 District 1.

25 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. District 2. District 3.

1 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Good afternoon, everyone. This
2 is Commissioner Shirley Burch of the famous District 3.
3 Love and respect where you live.

4 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 5.

5 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Commissioner Willie Burton,
6 here.

7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. District 6.

8 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Commissioner Carter, District
9 6.

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. District 7.

11 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Police Commissioner William M.
12 Davis, District 7. Love where you live and love where you
13 work and we should always follow our bylaws and charter.

14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you for that point of order.
15 Commissioner Hernandez At-Large.

16 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Good afternoon.
17 Commissioner Hernandez At-Large, present.

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Jones.

19 COMMISSIONER JONES: Good afternoon everyone. Police
20 Commissioner, Martin Jones and Happy Valentine's Day to
21 everyone as well.

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Commissioner Holley.

23 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Thank you very much. Jim Holley
24 present.

25 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Thank you,

1 Commissioner. Ms. White.

2 MS. WHITE: Yes, through the Chair. Madam Vice-
3 Chairperson Holt and also Commissioner Bernard.

4 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. Commissioner Holt.

5 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Thank you. To the Chair, Ms.
6 White. Yes.

7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I apologize.

8 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Thank you. Vice-Chair, Annie
9 Holt, At-Large. Good afternoon to this most honorable
10 Board and staff. To the citizens of Detroit and also to
11 the men and women in blue, Detroit police department
12 helps to protect us, citizens, here in the City of
13 Detroit. Good afternoon.

14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. District 2.

15 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Commissioner Bernard, present.
16 I guess I was new and I don't know what was going on.
17 Thank you, Mr. Chair.

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Thank you. I thank you
19 for the point of order. Now we move to the agenda.

20 MS. WHITE: Through the Chair. You do have a quorum,
21 sir.

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Ms. White.

23 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: So move.

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Been properly moved and second.
25 Discussion. Those in favor, aye.

1 ALL: Aye. Aye.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Those oppose? Motion carries. The
3 next item is the minutes. Is there any correction to the
4 minutes?

5 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: So move.

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Second.

7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: If none, the minutes are approved
8 as read or written by this body. Madam Secretary.

9 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir.

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. We move on to,

11 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Excuse me, Mr. Chairman, that's
12 improper. You should call a roll call vote even on the
13 minutes.

14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Sir, I followed the order that
15 we have received in parliamentary training. Is there
16 any opposition to the minutes?

17 COMMISSIONER BURTON: (Audio Distortion).

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Introduction of the
19 staff, Ms. White.

20 MS. WHITE: Yes. Through the Chair, honorable Board
21 and DPD executives, and community attendees. The
22 Department of Innovation and Technology is monitoring and
23 recording the Board's meeting today. Our court reporter
24 is Mr. Don Handyside and the following Board staff
25 members are in attendance today, Mr. Robert Brown,

1 Administrative Specialist, Ms. Teresa Blossom, Community
2 Relations Coordinator, Ms. Jonya Underwood,
3 Administrative Assistant, Ms. Tiffany Steward,
4 Investigator, Lieutenant James Coles, representing police
5 recruitment and police HR division, Interim Chief
6 Investigator Lawrence Akbar, Supervising Investigator
7 Ansley Cromwell, supervising investigator LiSonya Sloan,
8 Senior Investigator Rosalia Madrigal and Assistant
9 Corporation Counsel Erica Savage-Whitely are also
10 present. And also Mr. Chair, if I could go ahead and
11 indicate the representatives and special VIP guests at
12 this time. I have a notification.

13 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir. I have a notification that
14 former Police Chief Chester Logan is in attendance today,
15 representative to City Council, President Protem, Mary
16 Sheffield is also present and Ms. Marie Overall of State
17 representative Tyrone Carter's Office and Ms. Overall is
18 also an Officer within the 4th Precinct Community
19 Relations Council. And those are all of the notifications
20 that I have at this time. Thank you.

21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Ms. White, would you
22 bring forth Chief Logan to the panel after we speak to
23 elected officials on such and such, I want to have him
24 next speak. Chief of Police, Deputy Chief, Elaine Bryant
25 representing Chief Craig.

1 DEPUTY COMMISSIONER BRYANT: Yes, sir. Through the
2 Chair.

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Good to see you this afternoon.
4 Would you introduce DPD personnel?

5 DEPUTY COMMISSIONER BRYANT: Thank you, sir. Through
6 the Chair. As you said, I'm sitting in on behalf of Chief
7 James Craig. I'm Deputy Chief, Elaine Bryant. We also
8 have Director Chris Graveline and Captain Lena Liddell,
9 both from Professional Standards as well as Commander
10 McGinnis from the 9th Precinct. I'm not aware of anyone
11 else that's on this call. I can't see. So if I could get
12 some help from Melanie, that'd be great.

13 MS. WHITE: Yes, I'm looking through the call.
14 Captain Michael Parrish is also present on the line.
15 Commander, Kyra Joy Hope, Commander Daryl Patterson,
16 Director, Christopher Graveline, Captain Kimberly
17 Blackwell Commander, Michael McGinnis. I believe I might
18 have mentioned. Commander Nick Giaquinto, Sergeant Glenn
19 Anderson. And those are all of the names that I see at
20 this time. Thank you.

21 DEPUTY COMMISSIONER BRYANT: Thank you.

22 MS. WHITE: Mr. Chair. Okay. Mr. Chair. His video
23 appears to be frozen at this time. Madam Vice-Chairperson
24 Holt.

25 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Okay. Thank you. Ms. White so by

1 next item on the agenda is the Chairs officer's report.

2 So do we have access to that Ms. White?

3 MS. WHITE: Madam Chairperson, we can come back to
4 that item and pull that information and send it to your
5 email. If you would like to move to the next agenda item,
6 which is the resolution, and we're also working with
7 Chairperson Bell's technology as well.

8 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Okay. And so have we identified
9 someone who will read the resolution for Corporal Eugene
10 Schaden?

11 MS. WHITE: No, ma'am, if we have,

12 COMMISSIONER JONES: Through the Chair, I'll
13 volunteer to do that if we can get this moving along.

14 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Okay. Thank you so much,
15 Commissioner Jones, for volunteering.

16 COMMISSIONER JONES: Okay. All right. With the
17 Chair's permission and all in attendance, a resolution
18 honoring Corporal Eugene Schaden?

19 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I think it is Schaden.

20 COMMISSIONER JONES: All right. Want to get the
21 correct pronunciation?

22 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: I think it is Schaden.

23 COMMISSIONER JONES: All right. Well, whereas Eugene
24 Schaden was appointed to the Detroit Police Department on
25 January 29th, 2001. Upon graduating from the Detroit

1 Metropolitan Police Academy, Police Officer Williams
2 began his career at the 12th precinct. And, whereas he
3 dutifully served the 12th Precinct in Western District in
4 the 12th Precinct again before assignments to Eastern
5 District, 5th Precinct, and Homicide. Officer Schaden
6 displayed tremendous diligence and aptitude in his
7 assignments. On October 18th, 2018, he was promoted to
8 the rank of Corporal and continued to serve at homicide
9 until his retirement. And whereas, during his law
10 enforcement career, Corporal Schaden was the deserving
11 recipient of the Chief Merit Award, the Chief Unit Award.
12 Perfect Attendance Award, Consent Judgment Award, and the
13 Major League Baseball All-Star Recognition Award, the
14 Rosa Parks Funeral Recognition Award, and the Super Bowl
15 XL Recognition Award, as well as Commendations from
16 supervisors and numerous letters of appreciation from
17 citizenry;

18 COMMISSIONER JONES: And whereas Corporal Schaden,
19 has tirelessly served the Detroit Police Department, the
20 citizens of Detroit and its neighboring communities for
21 20 years. His professionalism, commitment to public
22 service, integrity, and dedication have been a credit to
23 the Detroit Police Department. He is highly respected as
24 a consummate professional. Now, therefore, be it resolved
25 that the Detroit Board of Police Commissioners speaking

1 for the citizens of Detroit, and the Detroit Police
2 Department awards this resolution and recognition of
3 Corporal Randolph Schaden, for 20 years of dedicated and
4 diligent public service. His professionalism, integrity,
5 and lifelong commitment to the City of Detroit and its
6 citizens merit our highest regards. We thank and
7 congratulate you Corporal Eugene F Schaden.

8 COMMISSIONER JONES: Through the Chair. I move that
9 adopt this resolution in its entirety as written for
10 Corporal Eugene F. Schaden.

11 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Second.

12 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I'd like to make it.

13 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Commissioner Holley.

14 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Yes.

15 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: In the first paragraph it has
16 Police Officer Williams.

17 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Yes, sir. Thank you for noting
18 that, need for correction.

19 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Yes.

20 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: And I believe Commissioner Jones is
21 reading from the copy that you received in the package,
22 sir?

23 COMMISSIONER JONES: That is correct.

24 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Okay. So in that instance, also the
25 name Randolph was included in error as well. So,

1 MS. WHITE: Yes. Through the Chair, if I may.

2 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Yes, Ms. White.

3 MS. WHITE: Yes, we did include the updated copy in
4 your most recent packet including your email inbox today.
5 So have those corrections duly noted. Thank you,
6 honorable Board.

7 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Okay. Is there a second to
8 Commissioner Jones' motion?

9 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Second.

10 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Second.

11 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Second.

12 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Thank you. So all agree. Aye.

13 ALL: Aye. Aye.

14 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Okay. The next thing I need agenda
15 is the people police report. Understanding at this point
16 to Ms. White that you're trying to clear out the
17 technical difficulties involving Chair Bell's system.

18 MS. WHITE: Yes ma'am.

19 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Okay. Thank you. So I believe
20 Deputy Chief Elaine Bryant is here to provide the
21 information for us.

22 MS. WHITE: Yes ma'am.

23 DEPUTY COMMISSIONER BRYANT: All right. Thank you.

24 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: You're welcome.

25 DEPUTY COMMISSIONER BRYANT: Through the Chair, I'll

1 start with crime. So our overall part one violent crime
2 is up 5.6% specifically, homicides are down 10.7%, non-
3 Fatal shootings are up 56.4%, sexual assaults are down
4 25.9%, aggravated assaults are up 23.2% and robberies are
5 down 40.6%, carjackings are up 43.8%. When it comes to
6 our property crime overall was down 30.5% specifically,
7 burglaries are down 36.2%, larcenies are down 35.7% and
8 auto thefts are down 13.5%. Bringing that total part one
9 crime, 19.4% down. That's where we're at for this year.
10 As far as our stats are concerned fighting crime for the
11 week of February 1st through February 7th, we confiscated
12 84 handguns from the City of Detroit streets, 71 CCW
13 arrests. We had a total of 164 felony arrests. Some of
14 which included robbery armed, possession of a stolen
15 motor vehicle, assault with intent to commit murder,
16 criminal sexual conduct, felonious conduct, felonious
17 assault, and fraud, just to name a few. We also wrote
18 2,521 citations and conducted 1,898 traffic stops for the
19 week. In regards to our injured officers, we still have
20 Sergeant Michael Bailey from the 7th Precinct who was
21 injured on May 31st, 2020. He was injured during
22 protests. He was helping with crowd control. He is still
23 recovering at home after having multiple procedures due
24 to his injuries.

25 DEPUTY COMMISSIONER BRYANT: We have police officer

1 Yosef Mana, who's assigned to Taskforce Administration,
2 which is a part of organized crime. He was injured on
3 January 6th, during a traffic accident. He's also
4 recovering at home from injuries sustained. Police
5 officer Brenda Hernandez from the 4th Precinct was
6 injured on January 8th of this year. She sustained
7 injuries to her face trying to restrain a person during a
8 police-run. She's also recovering at home at this time
9 and Police Officer Tyler Gabaner from the 5th Precinct.
10 He was injured on January 25th of this year during a
11 traffic accident. He's also recovering at home at this
12 time. I know the Board requested information regarding
13 Police Officer Nicholas Bruno. Nicholas Bruno was
14 injured, he was off duty and he was on his way to work at
15 the 9th Precinct. And he was traveling in his vehicle
16 when he was struck by a motorist that disregarded a red
17 signal. He is still currently at St. John's hospital. He
18 suffered some serious injuries. So he is at the hospital
19 right now. We ask that you please keep him in your
20 prayers, as well as all the other officers that were
21 injured. That driver was detained regarding that incident
22 as well. In regards to the fatal crash that occurred in
23 the 2nd Precinct on February 8th, in the morning. The
24 incident involved two police officers that were driving a
25 scout car. They were on their way to back up some

1 officers in the 4th Precinct. While they were driving,
2 there was a traffic accident, their vehicle collided with
3 another vehicle. We all know that unfortunately, someone
4 lost their life in that incident. That incident is
5 currently being investigated by the Fatal Squad at this
6 time. And those officers are off disabled. Our COVID
7 stats. We have 18 quarantined at this time and 7 have
8 tested positive. So obviously those numbers are way down
9 from where we were. So we are moving in the right
10 direction with that. The department has vaccinated or
11 scheduled to vaccinate 39% of its essential members. So
12 as of today, we've had 1,110 COVID-19 vaccination. And
13 out of those 884 DPD members have received both doses. So
14 that is all that I have to report at this time.

15 MS. WHITE: Through the Chair.

16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, ma'am.

17 MS. WHITE: I just wanted to make Madam Vice-
18 Chairperson Holt aware that the Chairperson was back on
19 the call.

20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Vice-Chair Holt. Thank
21 you. I appreciate that. I've been having an ongoing
22 problem. I thought we had resolved it, but anyway, that's
23 what it is. Did we hear from Chief Logan?

24 COMMISSIONER BURCH: No.

25 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Can we hear from Chief Logan now?

1 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. And also following that
3 would be Captain Blackwell.

4 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: No questions?

5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Let's pause. I want to hear from
6 Chief Logan. I'll get back to the questions because he's
7 he was patient on my call last week and I want to give
8 him the opportunity.

9 CHIEF LOGAN: Commissioner Bell. Good afternoon.

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Good afternoon, sir.

11 CHIEF LOGAN: Good afternoon to all the Board
12 members. Can you hear me okay?

13 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes. Good afternoon.

14 CHIEF LOGAN: I really didn't have much to say. I
15 wanted to be around when you guys introduced my daughter,
16 who's really the speaker of the family. My tenure as a
17 police officer is up, but hers, she's got a long way to
18 go, and I think you all are to be congratulated in voting
19 for her, approving her unanimous the last week. It speaks
20 volumes about her character and I'll let you meet her
21 yourself. Thank you, that's all I have to say.

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Chief Logan, you've
23 always been modest, but you've been a key part of this

24 DPD department for a long time. We go back a long
25 way. I just want to commend you. And now we got a second

1 generation carrying on. So I think that's something I
2 really appreciate. I had the opportunity to talk with
3 Captain Blackwell on a couple of occasions and I'll give
4 her an opportunity to have the floor.

5 CAPTAIN BLACKWELL: Good afternoon, honorable Board.
6 Good afternoon fellow officers and to the public,
7 greetings. Thank you for having me. I do apologize for my
8 absence last week in regards to some previous travel that
9 was previously planned and I just wanted to take the
10 opportunity to thank you all, to show my appreciation. I
11 have already met Commissioner Burch. We have exchanged
12 numbers. We have a good relationship already. The Board
13 I'm already familiar with, but I wanted to take this
14 opportunity to just say thank you. And you won't be
15 disappointed. Very, very grateful. Thank you.

16 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Through the Chair.

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes ma'am.

18 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: May I share a snippet of
19 congratulations?

20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, ma'am.

21 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: You know, last week Captain
22 Blackwell, I wanted to comment even further about your
23 police career record. And they all shut me down because
24 we had already approved the promotion and all, and I
25 promise you, your police career record is impeccable

1 along with apparently those folks who know you can attest
2 to that as well. So thank you so much for your service,
3 and you're with the head leader of the Board Commissioner
4 Burch, so I know you're in good hands.

5 CAPTAIN BLACKWELL: Thank you so very much.

6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

7 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Mr. Bell.

8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes.

9 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Mr. Bell, I just want to say to
10 Chief Logan, we served together for years and years when
11 he first came to the 11th Precinct. So it's an honor to
12 work with his daughter and I know if you have any
13 squinting, as they say, the size of a mustard seed of
14 your father's character, I know Commander Slappy, and I
15 better get ready because this lady, I mean, she's got to
16 follow her dad, and she's got her own ideas. I can't
17 wait for us to work together. May God bless you. And
18 thank you for accepting the position given by our
19 honorable Chief Craig.

20 CAPTAIN BLACKWELL: Thank you. Thank you to the
21 Chief as well. I look forward to working with you all.

22 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Congratulations.

23 CAPTAIN BLACKWELL: Thank you, Commissioners

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Thank you, Chief Logan,
25 and thank you Captain Blackwell for your attendance. I

1 wish you the best in your career. I want to say, you some
2 huge feet to step in because you wear high heels and I
3 have daughters, so I won't even go there. I won't even go
4 there, but your father's been a blessing to me my entire
5 32 years in this department, and he's still serving this
6 community in Highland Park. So we just say, thank you,
7 sir.

8 CAPTAIN BLACKWELL: Thank you,

9 CHIEF LOGAN: Commissioner Bell?

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes.

11 CHIEF LOGAN: Just two quick things.

12 CHIEF LOGAN: Yes, sir.

13 CHIEF LOGAN: I'm retired again. I'm no longer in
14 that department.

15 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. You're retired. How many
16 times?

17 CHIEF LOGAN: That'll be three times.

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Three times, okay.

19 CHIEF LOGAN: Three times, but I just want to say
20 thank you so much. We go back a long way and as much time
21 as you have, and I thought about it today. I've been
22 involved in police work in various jurisdictions for
23 parts of seven decades. And the best thing about police
24 work is the people you meet along the way. I don't know
25 for everybody on the Board, but I would have loved to

1 work for you all. But I do know you Commissioner Bell,
2 Miss Burch, Reverend Holley. I know you all are first-
3 class people and I want to take it upon myself to
4 recommend to you all, just to thank you. Thank you so
5 much for your service.

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you.

7 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Thank you.

8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Chief Logan.

9 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Mr. Bell.

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes ma'am.

11 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Could I just say one more thing?

12 I know we have to go on, but Captain Blackwell your
13 father may have retired, but he's never given up on the
14 community. He is in a project where, nobody did this, but
15 Jesus, he is, in partnership with the City of Highland
16 Park and Detroit to revitalize that reservoir that's been
17 dead and ugly for years. Your father stepped right in
18 when I approached him. Now he's working together to
19 revitalize that of our village. You will find out more as
20 you drive around the city, but thank you, Chief Logan.

21 CHIEF LOGAN: Thank you.

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I just want to say one more thing
23 about Chief Logan. He's also uplifted the military in
24 terms of initiating a program in the City of Detroit and
25 the State of Michigan. So he's a great veteran supporter

1 also, and I'm one of those people who has been at those
2 types of activities from his service. Once again, we can
3 go on and on about Chief Logan, but we're going to thank
4 you on that note and leave. And we're going to move on.
5 Thank you.

6 CHIEF LOGAN: Thank you, sir.

7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. A question for Deputy Chief
8 Bryant.

9 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes, I have a question.

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, ma'am.

11 COMMISSIONER BURCH: This is not a question, I guess
12 it's a comment and working with DC Bryant and the
13 Commander, which now will be also Captain Blackwell.
14 There are so many ideas that we've shared together and we
15 hope that these come to fruition, but I appreciate DC
16 Bryant because she's open to the community to listen to
17 the ideas. They help in the many solutions that are
18 needed to decrease the crime in number 11. I thank you,
19 DC, Bryant.

20 DEPUTY COMMISSIONER BRYANT: Through the Chair.
21 Thank you, ma'am, it's been a pleasure. Also, you'll be
22 hearing from me next week as well. We want to schedule a
23 meeting with you. We have some ideas and we want to run
24 past you.

25 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Very good.

1 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Mr. Chairman.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner? I'm sorry. Reverend
3 Holley, you and Commissioner Holt, I mean, Davis.

4 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Thank you Mr. Chairman. Mr.
5 Chairman, don't forget, we have Counselor President
6 Sheffield there, and I don't want you to forget that.

7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Oh, okay. I'm sorry. I'm glad you
8 brought that to my attention. We're going to go to her
9 shortly. Ms. White, could you prepare to bring her on and
10 Commissioner Davis then we'll hear from Counsel.

11 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I still have a question.

12 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Go ahead with your question, sir.

13 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: DC Bryant, thank you for being
14 there today. When you have the carjacking, are we
15 prosecuting these people that are carjacking?

16 DEPUTY COMMISSIONER BRYANT: So, we arrest, but
17 prosecution, doesn't lay in our hands but definitely
18 arrest, and we're doing all that we can. And I know,
19 while I say up 43.8%, it's like, wow. But when you look
20 at the numbers and one is one too many, as far as I'm
21 concerned. So we're looking at 16 years-to-date last
22 year, 23 year-to-date this year

23 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Mr. Chairman, I won't be as
24 long, but DC Bryant, my understanding is that those would
25 be people that are caught with guns, illegally, the

1 courts are letting them out. I'm going to make sure
2 that's my understanding, but can you get you a few basic
3 things? Can you find out are the courts allowing
4 carjackers. Are we really trying them or are they getting
5 away? And then the other thing I want to ask you, I need
6 to have something at some point from your office, if you
7 don't mind about the human trafficking,

8 DEPUTY COMMISSIONER BRYANT: I'm sorry. Could you
9 repeat that? What traffic?

10 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Human traffic.

11 DEPUTY COMMISSIONER BRYANT: Human traffic. Okay.

12 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Thank you, Mr. Chair.

13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Mr. Davis.

14 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Good afternoon, Deputy Chief. My
15 question is about the police, and their reaction with
16 alleged squatters, because I've heard a couple of cases
17 where people are telling me that the police have come to
18 people's houses, where they may have a dispute with the
19 landlord and the landlord is putting them out and using
20 the police to put people out the house the same day. I
21 thought that was a violation of policy.

22 DEPUTY COMMISSIONER BRYANT: So I know about, I'm
23 sorry. Through the Chair. I know about one particular
24 incident that was addressed or two particular incidents
25 that were addressed. And I know that we are absolutely

1 instructing the officers on the right way to do things.
2 Those particular incidents are I want to say anomalies,
3 the majority of us, we have it and we do it, right? So we
4 are not in the business of getting in the middle of civil
5 disputes and we're not in the business of putting people
6 out like that. So I just want you to rest assured that
7 that is not something that is common.

8 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: So in general, do you all put
9 people out for people not paying their rent too?

10 DEPUTY COMMISSIONER BRYANT: So we are not in the
11 business of putting people out of their homes. That is a
12 civil dispute unless there is something specific
13 regarding criminal activity. So we don't get in the
14 middle of that squatter dispute regarding whether or not
15 the person paid or they didn't pay. That is something
16 that has to be taken up through the courts.

17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Davis, if I might.
18 Actually, I won that case in the Michigan Supreme Court.
19 No one can be put out without due process, i.e. they have
20 to have a notice to quit. You have to go to court and
21 there has to be an adjudication. Now, once there is a
22 writ of eviction, then usually the Sheriff's handling it
23 or bonds people at the court are handling it. The Detroit
24 Police Department does not, but as a Deputy Chief, Bryant
25 said, if there's an illegal activity in the house, then

1 that's different. But it's illegal and it's
2 unconstitutional now in Michigan. It didn't use to be,
3 but it is now, praise the Lord.

4 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: That is my understanding also.
5 Thank you.

6 DEPUTY COMMISSIONER BRYANT: Through the Chair, as I
7 said, the majority of our officers, we get it right, and
8 we're making sure that we stay on top of that.

9 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Through the Chair.

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir.

11 COMMISSIONER BROWN: DC Bryant, thank you for coming
12 before us today. I just had a question. I have been
13 getting a lot of calls and concerns about the loitering
14 issues with these panhandlers in the streets. And I
15 talked to some of our officers. We know that there's no
16 ordinance for it, but what can we do to address it,
17 because one, it's creating blight in the areas that they
18 are leaving trash everywhere. And it's a safety concern
19 for some of the people standing in the middle of the
20 street during, moving traffic, by the panhandling. Is
21 there anything that we can instruct the officers to do
22 until we can get an ordinance done addressing the
23 loitering and panhandling in the streets?

24 DEPUTY COMMISSIONER BRYANT: Yes. So through the
25 Chair, that is an issue and again, a concern for all of

1 us. And one of the things is maybe finding out why these
2 people are loitering or panhandling. Maybe there is some
3 sort of resources that we can offer to assist them to be
4 put in a better situation. Sometimes we're dealing with
5 people that are homeless, that don't know where to go, or
6 sometimes we're dealing with people that have some sort
7 of mental issues. So maybe we can address it from a
8 social standpoint and perhaps provide some services to
9 them.

10 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Okay. And then, do you know off
11 the top of your head - I think is there is an ordinance
12 about walking in the street? Is that still enforceable?

13 DEPUTY COMMISSIONER BRYANT: Jaywalking?

14 COMMISSIONER BROWN: No, just walking in the street.

15 DEPUTY COMMISSIONER BRYANT: I would have to look
16 more specifically into that. I know what you're saying
17 instead of using when there are sidewalks available?

18 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Right.

19 DEPUTY COMMISSIONER BRYANT: Or they are walking into
20 the street.

21 COMMISSIONER BROWN: I mean, they are just standing
22 in the streets and it's becoming, I would want to get
23 ahead of it before the warm weather start hitting,
24 because we know we're going to have more. And I just want
25 to look out for the safety of these people, because it's

1 been a few times where I almost hit one on Grand River
2 myself. But I mean, it's becoming a problem now, and I
3 think it's going to get worse when it gets warm. If we
4 can just get ahead of it, but we have a plan of action of
5 how are we going to deal with it?

6 DEPUTY COMMISSIONER BRYANT: Yes, sir.

7 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Thank you, ma'am.

8 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Through the Chair.

9 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Vice-Chair Holt.

10 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Thank you. Okay, to piggyback on
11 the request that Commissioner Holley made as it relates
12 to human trafficking and I'll take this up with Ms.
13 White, but I was on the 8th, no, the 4th Precinct
14 community relations meeting this week and they had a
15 phenomenal speaker, whose name is Jim Collins. So I'll
16 share that information with Ms. White and maybe she and
17 Commissioner Holley can, can get into some dialogue
18 whereby perhaps we can have a presentation at the Board
19 meeting. I don't know, about two months ago, we received
20 in our packets, the DPDs policy as it relates to
21 squatters. So point here is DPD does have a very defined
22 policy as to how police officers are supposed to behave
23 when they encounter squatters. And I think Assistant
24 Chief Bettison too, obviously, would be a resource that
25 if we needed, he would be, I suspect, open-minded to come

1 and help us better understand the DPDs policy on
2 squatters and how police officers are supposed to behave

3 COMMISSIONER BURTON: To the Chief to Chairman Bell.
4 I mean Commissioner Bell.

5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir.

6 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You know, thank you
7 Commissioner Bell. Question for the Chief. Some time ago,
8 I actually called for the video where Nikita Wallace who
9 was a protestor that was placed in a chokehold by DPD.
10 When would that video be available to the Board?

11 DEPUTY COMMISSIONER BRYANT: Through the Chair, I'll
12 have to get back to you on that.

13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Thank you. Thank you,
14 DC Bryant. I just want to clarify that is Mary Protem.
15 Mary Sheffield is not on the call. She has the
16 representative from her office on the call. So I just
17 want to acknowledge that. We have got to move - before we
18 move on, prior to the chief's report, I don't know if I
19 miss part of it, but Vice-Chair Holt, you need to speak
20 to the 5th Precinct activity of the Chief Citation this
21 morning, if you would. I don't know if you covered this
22 prior to me being off or not.

23 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: No, I did not. We were invited.
24 Commander Ewing and Chief Craig issued accommodations for
25 the gallant behavior of police officers. And one example,

1 the police were called to a home that the woman, the wife
2 in the home called 911, and was screaming into the phone,
3 indicated that her husband who had a gun and was holding
4 her and the kids' hostage, and she was fearful of her
5 life and her children's life, and the police were
6 successful to go into the home and arrest the husband.

7 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: And consequently, relieved the mom
8 and the children. One of the young people, I think maybe
9 a 9-year old was so relieved that he actually jumped on
10 one of the police officers and hugged the police officer
11 and said to him, thank you, thank you, thank you for
12 helping save our lives and my mom's life and the second
13 incident, I'm sorry, Chair Bell, it escapes me. I was so
14 overwhelmed with that one.

15 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, ma'am.

16 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: There were two incidents.

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes.

18 COMMISSIONER BURCH: The other one was fatal. The
19 other one became fatal, right, DC Bryant.

20 DEPUTY COMMISSIONER BRYANT: Yes. Through the Chair,
21 the second incident was a situation where a gentleman
22 shot a young lady inside of a home and then the family
23 called because they were distraught. And when the
24 officers got there, initially they were told that he was
25 shot as well inside. So they went inside the home to try

1 and do preservation of life in case anyone was still
2 alive. And when they entered the home, the perpetrator
3 was still alive and he had a gun. So they were trying to
4 get him to put the gun down, put the gun down. And then
5 unfortunately he did take his own life in front of them.

6 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Correct.

7 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Right.

8 DEPUTY COMMISSIONER BRYANT: The young lady was also
9 deceased.

10 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes.

11 DEPUTY COMMISSIONER BRYANT: When he shot himself, he
12 went to the hospital and he died later.

13 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Thank you, Deputy Chief Bryant.
14 Through the Chair, and I believe all of those officers
15 that received the accommodations today are assigned to
16 the 5th Precinct. Correct Chair Bell?

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, ma'am. I thought it was
18 rather unique when Chief initiated a watch program in the
19 Precinct to recognize those always in the roll call room.
20 That normally does not have in my police career. So he
21 not only came out, he invited the media and also invited
22 his executive team and others to participate. And those
23 all who were standing proudly to receive their awards.
24 And I just say that was really a highlight of myself and
25 Commissioner Holt to witness that type of honors and

1 accolades of getting the Chief citation in their work
2 environment. I thought that was very impressive. And so
3 you might say some news clippings of that award ceremony.
4 We can't do it. We always hear about the bad incidents of
5 what police call, but we need to also hear about the good
6 things that are happening in law enforcement. The more
7 good versus bad. So I just want to lift that up and thank
8 Vice-Chair Holt for participating and Chief Akbar was
9 also on the scene. So I thought it was really a great
10 morning to kick off on a Thursday.

11 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: And thank you for inviting me,
12 Chair Bell.

13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: You're always part of the team.
14 Thank you. We move on to the HR report. Lieutenant Coles,
15 one of my favorite lieutenants who is serving a very
16 significant role in terms of HR, Lieutenant Coles.

17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman, just a quick
18 question. Is Deputy Chief Bryant going to cover the
19 facial recognition report that's in her pack or no,
20 that's just for information?

21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: We don't normally cover that. If
22 you have some questions and concerns, we received that
23 weekly.

24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes, I know.

25 CHAIRPERSON BELL: But if you have something

1 specific,

2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes. She's still there, or,
3 oh, there you are. I see you now. I just wanted to ask
4 you, I mean, I've noticed that all of the people that
5 were doing facial recognition are all African-American. I
6 think you had one white person this year and you are
7 using the system routinely. And I just want to understand
8 the process that you're utilizing to use it. The policy
9 that we adopted said that there were only supposed to be
10 facial recognition for very serious crimes, like murder
11 and stuff like that. And I just wanted to know how it's
12 really operating from your perspective, Chief Bryant.

13 DEPUTY COMMISSIONER BRYANT: Through the Chair, that
14 is correct. Facial recognition is used for specific
15 crimes, part one violent crimes. So you are correct in
16 that aspect. If there is someone on the call from the
17 Real-Time Crime Center, I think they would be more
18 appropriate to answer your question

19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you.

20 DEPUTY COMMISSIONER BRYANT: That you have. So I
21 don't know if,

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: What we can do is get back to that
23 question.

24 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: That's fine.

25 CHAIRPERSON BELL: We can share that at a later time.

1 We want to move on. Thank you. But we'll definitely give
2 you an answer to that in terms of the policy directive on
3 that. So Lieutenant Coles.

4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you.

5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, ma'am.

6 LIEUTENANT COLES: Thank you. Through the Chair, sir,
7 I did want to just try to just get one little point in
8 that I wanted to make. Sergeant Jordan who in charge of
9 field - I'm sorry, who works with field recruiting,
10 wanted me to make sure that I said thank you to
11 Commissioner Holley, who had given him the time this last
12 week to meet with them and share a little bit of airtime
13 with them for field recruiting and maybe having
14 opportunities in the future to do more. So we just wanted
15 to definitely say thank you for that opportunity. Thank
16 you for helping us to get the word out. And again, we
17 wanted to just reiterate that if there are any
18 commissioners who have any suggestions or know of any
19 gatherings that the field recruiting unit can go and take
20 part in, please get that information to us. You can get
21 it to us through Secretary White and we would definitely
22 try to get as many resources as we can to all of the
23 locations that we can. As you know, we're interested in
24 trying to get Detroiters. So if there's anything that's
25 happening in Detroit that we can try to make ourselves a

1 part of, we would definitely be there. So just to go into
2 the report and this is our human resources report in
3 February for January 2021, all documents provided, which
4 contained - you have documents provided, which contain
5 detailed information with respect to staffing, hiring,
6 and manpower by race and sex specifically for sworn
7 members. Our current staffing numbers for sworn members.
8 Positions filled, we have 2,583. Positions vacant, 89.
9 For civilians, the total positions we have are 645, and
10 the positions vacant is 98. For our sworn recruiting
11 fiscal year to date, from January until I'm sorry, from
12 July 2020 to January 31st is the total number of
13 applicants we've had is 2,522. The number that we have in
14 progress is 54. The number that we have hired is 101. For
15 lack of interest, we have 138. Temporarily disqualified
16 is 1,444. For disqualified permanently is 309. And the
17 number that we have awaiting NACOLEES is 476. As we look
18 at the testing that we've had for the week. I'm sorry,
19 for the month of January, the number for our written
20 exam, the number that we had scheduled is 88. The number
21 that actually appeared is 53. Out of that 53, 42 of them
22 actually passed and 11 failed. We have 5 who rescheduled,
23 and we had 30, who are no shows. For the physical
24 agility, we had 120 people scheduled. We had 72 who
25 appeared. Out of that 72, 42 passed and 30 failed. We had

1 17 people who were rescheduled for the test and one
2 person who withdrew from the process at that time. And
3 for a total no shows of 30. As we look at the Academy,
4 they graduated a class of 21 in January. The total number
5 of new hires that we have sworn is 18. Civilian is 21,
6 for a total of new hires of 39. As the Detroit residency
7 information goes, as of January 31st, 2021, residents in
8 Detroit who are sworn is 574. The number of civilians is
9 334. The number of police assistance is 30. Our attrition
10 numbers for January, for the sworn we had 23 that left.
11 For civilians, we had 12 for a total attrition number of
12 35 and no police assistants left. But we have a leave of
13 absence or restricted duty for sworn members who are on
14 FMLA continuous. We have 50 FMLA intermittent is 157. On
15 medical leave is 1, for the military is 4. We have for
16 restricted are 151, disabled is 47 and sick 17. For our
17 sworn personnel suspensions, we only have 4 police
18 officers suspended in January. And again for monthly
19 separations for January 2021 is 23. And for our drop
20 program, we have a total of 594 people as of January
21 2020. And those are the numbers. And I will take any
22 questions that you may have.

23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: To Lieutenant Coles.

24 LIEUTENANT COLES: Yes, sir.

25 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: To the Chair.

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes ma'am.

2 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Oh, as I indicated earlier,
3 Lieutenant Cole, this packet that you gave us is
4 noteworthy, and it gives us a pretty clear example of
5 those items of which you passed when you're trying to
6 hire potential police officers. Now, as I have a question
7 about the stats that show it's under candidate failure by
8 7/1/2020 to 1/31/21, and it's identified as drug usage.
9 Well, you know, the governor brought out her clean slate
10 Bill in October 2020. Now, how does a candidate qualify
11 if they were one of those individuals who fell under the
12 clean slate Bill? Do you go back and try to pull that
13 person in, or what?

14 LIEUTENANT COLES: Quite a few people are in that
15 process right now. We are in the process of trying to
16 gather the names, which actually we did. We were able to
17 pull the names, but we have to look at each one of the
18 candidates and determine the reason for their
19 disqualification to determine if they qualify. We are
20 trying to get that done, but it's a project that we have
21 to do at the same time, as we're trying to recruit the
22 people that we have. So it's not as fast as I would like
23 it to go, but we have already looked into it. We've
24 already pulled the names and we were starting to try to
25 reach out to them as well as reaching out to the people

1 who we have, who are lack of interest and who withdrew to
2 see if at any chance if they wanted to come back or if
3 they were ready to reapply or join the process again. So
4 we have definitely been doing that, just trying to reach
5 all of our resources that we have for everybody that
6 we've lost, if they have the ability to come back, we're
7 trying to see if we can reach out to them.

8 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: And thank you for the response. One
9 other question through the Chair. Chair Bell, is it okay?

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, ma'am.

11 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Okay, good. All right. You've noted
12 here under that same candidate for failure, you have 530
13 files on hold. What does that mean?

14 LIEUTENANT COLES: So, when we have a file on hold
15 that means that there are questions and or issues that we
16 have with the candidate's application, as it could be
17 where we need to reach out and try to find more
18 information as far as an arrest record that they've had.
19 And it could be something that they've said was a
20 misdemeanor that we initially saw as a felony. So we've
21 been reaching out, trying to get information from the
22 arresting agency and or the courts that they went
23 through. And it's also if we're asking them for
24 information and we are requesting more information from
25 them. For instance, we have people who sign up, but they

1 don't put their licensed picture in there. So we try to
2 reach out to them and until we get them to respond back
3 to us, we have to put them on hold. We don't want to
4 disqualify them, but we just can't leave them in the
5 process as being active, because we don't want the
6 numbers to look inflated. As you know, we have like 500
7 people in there that could be moving forward, and we
8 will, as soon as they give us the information we need,
9 but in a lot of instances, we just can't get back in
10 touch with them. So we continue to reach out, we call
11 them, email them and text them at least three times. And
12 then we put them on hold and we continue to wait to see
13 if we get anything. After approximately three months or
14 so then usually we'll just make them a lack of interest.

15 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Okay. Thank you so much, Lieutenant
16 Coles.

17 LIEUTENANT COLES: Yes, ma'am.

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Commissioner Holley
19 then Commissioner Jones.

20 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.
21 Lieutenant Coles, I recruited a young man today and Ms.
22 Blossom, Theresa Blossom. Can you work with her and make
23 sure that I can do anything I can to mentor this guy that
24 I brought in today. Will you talk to Ms. Blossom about
25 that, would you please?

1 LIEUTENANT COLES: Through the Chair. Yes,
2 definitely.

3 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

4 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Commissioner Jones.

5 COMMISSIONER JONES: Good afternoon. Lt. Coles.

6 LIEUTENANT COLES: Good afternoon, sir.

7 COMMISSIONER JONES: The report that you put together
8 is a pretty comprehensive report and I've listened to
9 your report before and there was one thing I had been
10 curious about is the difference in the numbers between
11 those persons that were scheduled for certain events,
12 like the written and the physical agility test versus the
13 ones that actually appeared. Is there, just out of
14 curiosity, is there any particular reasoning behind so
15 many being scheduled and then people just not appearing
16 for these examinations?

17 LIEUTENANT COLES: Through the Chair, sir. Honestly,
18 if I knew that, I would have all of them back here. A lot
19 of times it's just that they decided they want to do it,
20 and at the last minute, from what we were hearing, their
21 family didn't want them to do it. You know, they have
22 loved ones that say no, or they just back out. A lot of
23 times we try to contact them after they don't show up and
24 they don't even answer the phone for us anymore. So we
25 continue to try to make efforts to reach out to them

1 because actually on the day when they don't show up, we
2 try to call them, we send an email request to them to see
3 what's going on, if something happened on their way
4 there, and then we'll make other arrangements for them.
5 But honestly, I have no idea exactly what's going on. We
6 try to call them like a day or two before testing, just
7 to verify that they're still interested and do they still
8 want to come? But we still have a lot of people that just
9 don't turn up.

10 COMMISSIONER JONES: I'm just curious because I know
11 that even being scheduled for something like that, they
12 probably have gone through a process to be a part of. You
13 want to know why drop out when you're scheduled for your
14 written or your physical agility test. Okay. All right.
15 Thank you so much. I appreciate your answer.

16 LIEUTENANT COLES: Yes, sir.

17 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Mr. Chair. Mr. Chair.

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I'm sorry.

19 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Am I muted?

20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Who is speaking?

21 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: No Commissioner Burch, you're not
22 muted.

23 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Okay. Thank you.

24 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: It's between Commissioner Burch and
25 Commissioner Bernard.

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. Thank you.

2 COMMISSIONER BURCH: So, I may speak?

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, ma'am.

4 COMMISSIONER BURCH: All right. To Lieutenant Coles,
5 a suggestion and please be candid with me. Okay.

6 LIEUTENANT COLES: I always am.

7 COMMISSIONER BURCH: How many chaplains do we have? I
8 think it's like a hundred, right?

9 LIEUTENANT COLES: Through the Chair, ma'am I'm
10 sorry, I have no idea what that number is.

11 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I think it is, Mr. Bell, isn't
12 it? We got about a hundred chaplains.

13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I spoke to a class about 30
14 something. They had probably arrived at their hundred. If
15 not, they were pretty close to that, because that was
16 their goal, if I recall Deputy Chief Bryant?

17 DEPUTY COMMISSIONER BRYANT: Through the Chair, I
18 think Commander Hope is on the call. That's her job. She
19 can answer that.

20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay.

21 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Then I can ask my question.

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay.

23 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Where is she?

24 MS. WHITE: We're preparing to enable her microphone.
25 Thank you.

1 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Here's the question. Lieutenant
2 Coles.

3 LIEUTENANT COLES: Ma'am.

4 COMMISSIONER BURCH: With you being short-staffed
5 right? Why not think of a way like Reverend Holley's
6 heart is about recruiting. Why not utilize the service of
7 our chaplains? You give them a script of the things that
8 perhaps they should ask, and then they add their own
9 script that maybe this would be a source to encourage
10 those people to become officers when they back out of the
11 application. Give that list to Reverend Holley and work
12 with the chaplains. What do you think of that idea?
13 Nothing but a pal and nothing beats a failure but a try
14 sir.

15 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Right.

16 LIEUTENANT COLES: Through the Chair, ma'am, I have
17 no problem with it. I will work through our department,
18 through my executives to make sure everything is fine
19 with that. But I have no problem with it.

20 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Then get back with Reverend
21 Holley.

22 LIEUTENANT COLES: If it's okay with the Chief's
23 Office, I'm fine. Yes ma'am.

24 COMMISSIONER BURCH: You're good. Is that good
25 Reverend Holley?

1 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: I'm afraid to say no.

2 LIEUTENANT COLES: Me too. We're on the same page,
3 sir.

4 CHAIRPERSON BELL: While we're waiting on Commander
5 Hope, Commissioner Bernard.

6 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Just real quick, Lieutenant
7 Coles. On your age of sworn members by race and sex, you
8 have three members that are between the ages of 73 and
9 77. I was just wondering what they do for the department.
10 That's all.

11 LIEUTENANT COLES: To the Chair, ma'am, I honestly
12 right off the top of my head I couldn't tell you. I'm
13 sorry.

14 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: I was suggesting that they
15 retire. I just was wondering.

16 LIEUTENANT COLES: No, I was just saying, I do know
17 of at least one Sergeant that works in the area that I
18 work and who's going to have his 50th year coming up this
19 weekend. So I can't really specifically tell you, but I
20 know that they are still productive as the 25-year-olds.

21 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Okay.

22 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Through the Chair, one last
23 question about the same chart that Commissioner Bernard
24 referenced. Chair Bell, is that okay?

25 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, ma'am.

1 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Okay. Lieutenant Coles, is that
2 again, the same chart that Commissioner Bernard reference
3 and you identified these sworn officers by race and sex.
4 Now, my question has to do with the fact that you have
5 black males, 928 total, and then you have white males,
6 828. Now to me, this chart shows at some point or
7 another, we have more sworn black officers than white. Is
8 that an accurate understanding on my part?

9 LIEUTENANT COLES: Ma'am are we looking at the one
10 where they are actually working or are we looking at the
11 one that I put together.

12 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: The title is age of sworn members
13 by race and sex.

14 LIEUTENANT COLES: Oh yes.

15 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: So then, in fact, we have more
16 black officers?

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, ma'am that has been true
18 since the 70s, the late 70s. A majority of African-
19 American police started with Coleman Young.

20 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Thank you, Chair Bell.

21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I also want to indicate that it's
22 okay if a person starts the process and they drop out. It
23 took me several months to make my mind up that I wanted
24 to complete the process and the late Commander Ridley
25 Robinson you know, pretty much contact my parents because

1 he knew them. Then also, thereafter, people drop out of
2 an academy class. They changed their mind after they get
3 into the Academy. So we don't want to - like the Marines.
4 We want a few good men and women who are going to stay
5 the course and we challenged them to be the best they can
6 be. So that's how that process works. And we're trying to
7 get a Bill now that if we train you, we need to be
8 reimbursed. So don't be disturbed by those numbers
9 because it is not unusual.

10 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: The reason I brought it up Chair
11 Bell is because the assumption is that there are more
12 white police officers than black.

13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: If you look at the chart, you get
14 it all the time, you get the breakdown.

15 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Okay, thank you. Thank you Chair
16 Bell.

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I just want to share that
18 information with you. This has been a predominant black
19 African-American men, the majority, and also in command
20 and sergeant rank since the 70s, late 70s.

21 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Well, I'm enlighten by these
22 numbers, and thank you.

23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. No, I'm just trying to
24 enlighten the Board and the public, ma'am. I'm not
25 focusing on you. I just want to set the record straight

1 in terms of how difficult it is to recruit, you know and
2 they're trying their best. We just spoke to a class, a G
3 class and they started out with a number, and they're
4 down to X number. So that's just how this process works.

5 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: If I may, Mr. Chairman, what
6 you're saying relates directly to what Akbar told the
7 Board last week.

8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, ma'am.

9 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: In terms of the complaints
10 that we have regarding officers, most of them occur
11 between the hours of 3 in the afternoon and midnight. And
12 he has a chart that showed that most of those officers
13 had been with the force less than two years. And that now
14 under the collective bargaining agreement the officers
15 with more seniority, get to choose their shift. So what's
16 happening is you have young rookie officers that don't
17 have a seasoned officer with them. And as a result, it's
18 creating some conflict within the community. And it's
19 where most of the tickets are given, where most of the
20 complaints come from and everything else. So the age, you
21 know, them not having a mature officer with them makes a
22 difference in terms of experience. But I guess we can
23 look at that when it's time for the collective bargaining
24 agreement. So we could maybe get some experienced people
25 with younger people so we can reduce our complaints and

1 our lawsuits.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Well, that's not in our territory
3 as far as a collective bargain, it's up to the Mayor. But
4 we move on to Commander Hope. I guess you're going to
5 give us the number of chaplains then we're going to move
6 on..

7 COMMANDER HOPE: Yes. To the Chair. It's a total of
8 103 chaplains, sir.

9 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I was on the right path.

10 COMMANDER HOPE: Yes, ma'am.

11 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Very good. Thank you, Commander
12 Hope.

13 COMMANDER HOPE: You're welcome.

14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Commander Hope.

15 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Okay.

16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. We're going to move on
17 to the 9th Precinct. Commander McGinnis. And thank you,
18 Lieutenant Coles.

19 LIEUTENANT COLES: Thank you, sir.

20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you and I appreciate you.

21 COMMANDER MCGINNIS: Through the Chair. Good
22 afternoon honorable Board. My name is Michael McGinnis
23 and I am the Commander of the 9th Precinct. My partner,
24 Captain Gary Johnson had a prior commitment and could not
25 be with us today. I will start my presentation with the

1 statistics year to date through February 1st year to date
2 2021. We have experienced a 12% decrease in violent
3 crime, which includes murders, robberies, and CSCs.
4 Unfortunately, we have seen an increase in aggravated
5 assaults and we are up in that category by 27%. We are
6 pleased with a 29% decrease in property crime, which
7 includes burglary, larceny, and motor vehicle theft.
8 During that reporting period officers from the 9th
9 Precinct recovered 55 guns 36 of which were in an
10 illegally concealed carrying capacity and the prosecution
11 rate for those 36 is at close to 70%. Among the Precinct
12 strategies, we are, of course, a ceasefire Precinct. We
13 are all in with ceasefire with the targeted enforcement.
14 We target high impact offenders and we utilize custom
15 notifications as a means to communicate the ceasefire
16 message. And we're doing that on non-fatal shooting
17 victims who are uncooperative. We give them the ceasefire
18 message as well as someone who might've been arrested for
19 CCW, but the warrant was denied for one reason or
20 another. We do a custom notification with them. As far as
21 our initiatives, we have a ShotSpotter that we'll be
22 rolling out sometime in March. There's a new gun liaison
23 program where officers from the Precinct's Detective Unit
24 and special operations will receive some training on
25 better ways to collect guns and conduct interviews with

1 the individuals that were in possession of them to
2 further our efforts to decrease gun violence.

3 COMMANDER MCGINNIS: And then we have two really good
4 programs that I'm excited about. The first I'm going to
5 mention is our community-based crime reduction grant.
6 This is a grant that awarded I think it's about a million
7 dollars. It covers a portion of the 9th Precinct and 910
8 scout car area, as well as a portion of the 5th Precinct.
9 And this is from Fiat Chrysler and what's exciting about
10 this initiative is it is community-based and right now,
11 the project manager is working on a survey that will be
12 distributed to the community to find out what the
13 community wants the police to do on enforcement to help
14 improve their lives and their neighborhoods. So it
15 involves Michigan State University and members of the 9th
16 and 5th Precinct. And it's a data-driven partnership. And
17 it also is going to include some physical infrastructure
18 components as well as employment services. So we're in
19 the early stages of this program, but I think it shows a
20 lot of promise. The second initiative is our CIT program.
21 The 9th Precinct is the first Precinct outside of
22 downtown services to roll out the crisis intervention
23 team. And we started this last week. We went live last
24 week and that is a partnership with the Detroit Wayne
25 Integrated Health Network. And it's a cold response with

1 police and behavioral health specialists from either the
2 Northeast Guidance Center or Team Wellness. And so we
3 have two officers and a behavioral health specialist and
4 they respond to certain category runs like suicide, an
5 overdose, and a non-violent mental and their response is
6 designed to bring the psychological services to the
7 individual that needs them. And so we've had one week
8 under our belt so far and they've responded to 24 runs
9 that are associated with their initiative.

10 COMMANDER MCGINNIS: They've come into contact with
11 31 individuals. They petitioned 5 for medical treatment
12 at one facility or another. They have not used force in
13 one of these cases, which is just great, just
14 spectacular. They've engaged in 47 proactive encounters.
15 And they've done follow-ups on 31 different locations or
16 individuals. So that program I think is really exciting
17 and I'm fairly confident that we're going to see it
18 multiply throughout the department. As far as community
19 programs, we just had a senior's game day. It's the first
20 Saturday of every month. It was a senior bingo and that
21 went very well. There was a group of seniors that were
22 very pleased to have some interaction, even though it's
23 virtual. It has some interaction in play bingo and seeing
24 the officers. Our MPOs took part in Ford's critical
25 conversations. It was an initiative hosted by PAL and

1 they had virtual meetings once a week with kids ages 12
2 to 18. They are getting ready to engage in an advancing
3 African-American mentor program, which is a monthly
4 meeting with youth age 13 to 18. We have the brotherhood,
5 sisterhood, and city camp programs, and those were put on
6 hold because of COVID. However, we're expecting to have
7 those up and running again either by the end of this
8 month or the beginning of March. And then my final note
9 is the community youth Comstat. We participated in a
10 youth Comstat. It was by Wayne State Urban Studies. It
11 was just really informational and I took a lot out of it.
12 So it was my first time participating in one of those.
13 It's similar to a regular community Comstat, but this was
14 designed towards youth. So the Precinct is involved in
15 that. And with that, that's my report. If anyone has any
16 questions, I'd be happy to answer them.

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Well, Commander, welcome to the
18 9th Precinct. Thank you for your command and your
19 presence. I wish Captain Johnson, the best.
20 Commissioners?

21 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes, definitely.

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Burch.

23 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I'd like to speak, Mr. Chair.

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, ma'am.

25 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I thank you so much. Face-To-

1 Face we finally meet each other. I want, especially, all
2 of my co- Commissioners to understand. I've never met
3 this gentleman before and he's never met me, Commander
4 McGinnis. I introduced myself to him, I believe Monday or
5 Tuesday of this week. Right away he obliged of a pilot
6 that I was just starting with other leaders in our
7 community. Long story short, Mr. Bell, this gentleman
8 sent like 4 or 5 or 6 NPOs to the Lomax Temple Church to
9 pick up food boxes, to do a drive-by. Everybody, I'm not
10 talking about a drive-by shooting. I'm talking about
11 drive-by love. He took our love signs to the homes, the
12 baskets that were prepared from Lomax to seniors' homes
13 that perhaps may never see an officer, except if it was a
14 crime. So this gentleman, I commend him already. And when
15 you mentioned that million dollar grant, sir, are you
16 going to use any of that money to build these closed up
17 buildings? In other words, if their infrastructure is
18 still good, would some of that money be used to, perhaps,
19 open it up to be centers for children in the community to
20 go to learn a trade or either do exercise. We have so
21 many ideas that we shared with the Mayor and with DC
22 Bryant. But you, sir, you stepped in and knew nothing
23 about us, when everybody else on this panel knows but I
24 thank you for being the Commander of the 9th Precinct. I
25 am your Commissioner for a while and we will work

1 together. I thank you so much, Mr. Bell.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes ma'am.

3 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Through the Chair.

4 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, ma'am.

5 COMMANDER MCGINNIS: Thank you, ma'am.

6 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Thank you, Commissioner Burch, for
7 sharing that event. Because when you text me and shared
8 it, even then, it just showed your determination to get
9 things done and to get them done quickly and in a hurry.
10 Thank you, Commander McGinnis. You mentioned ceasefire.

11 COMMANDER MCGINNIS: Yes.

12 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: I've attended an event. It was pre-
13 COVID over at Triumph Church and it was sort of a
14 lighthearted conversation. There was a meal. The young
15 folks who attended the event were given the opportunity
16 to even apply for a job or get their GED, but the flip
17 side was, well, the final point that needed to be
18 understood by the attendees was that if you don't take
19 advantage of these opportunities to uplift yourselves,
20 then you will put yourself in a position to be more
21 stringently monitored. How was your ceasefire event that
22 you discussed?

23 COMMANDER MCGINNIS: What it sounds like what you're
24 describing was a call in which was a staple for the
25 ceasefire initiative. Unfortunately, COVID's put those on

1 hold still.

2 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Okay.

3 COMMANDER MCGINNIS: But we're still managing, and
4 when we do the requested notification, we go out to the
5 individual's house and we go with the outreach partners
6 and we tell them, you know, let's say that this is a non-
7 fatal shooting victim. What we're trying to do is prevent
8 them from 1, engaging in retaliation, and 2, offer them
9 services to help them go down a path that is more
10 desirable and contributing to society. So the program
11 itself actually tracks how many of these individuals are
12 taking advantage of the services that the outreach has
13 offered. And unfortunately, I'm sorry I don't have that
14 statistics with me, but we do monitor and track that. And
15 so that's the goal.

16 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Thank you for sharing.

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Commander. I wish you
18 the best. The 9th Precinct has always been a very, very
19 busy Precinct as you well know. A very, very important
20 part of the Northeast side, and Commissioner Burch and I
21 share the 9th Precinct. So we look forward to the
22 interaction with you, and I just wish you the best in
23 terms of your command and the officers at the 9th
24 Precinct, they do an excellent job and I just can't say
25 that enough. They are in the midst of a whole lot of

1 crime-fighting, a whole lot of community-building, also,
2 as you mentioned. I don't play bingo, but I think maybe
3 Commissioner Burch plays bingo, maybe that senior thing,
4 we could drop in.

5 COMMISSIONER BURCH: That's for the elderly. I'm not
6 elderly.

7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. Well, thank you. We have to
8 move on.

9 COMMISSIONER BURCH: One more thing Mr. Bell. I
10 wanted to say to him, the Commander that the naysayers,
11 you always have negative people in the community. What
12 they say about number 9. You know, I'm just saying you
13 have a record of that, there is a lot of crime going on
14 like it is all over the city, but they will point out
15 certain Precincts and say, well, 9th is doing well over
16 there. They got all this kind of equipment and all of
17 this support and they're chasing the criminals into
18 number 11. That's not going to happen on Commander
19 Slappy's watch. That's not going to happen on her watch,
20 but we've had to get rid of these people who do not want
21 a quality of life and chase them out of Detroit. That's
22 what we got to do and make a plan for that, Commander
23 McGinnis.

24 COMMANDER MCGINNIS: Yes, ma'am.

25 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes.

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Thank you again,
2 Commander. Let's move on to Ms. White.

3 MS. WHITE: Yes, sir. Through the Chair honorable
4 Board. Please note the following incoming correspondence
5 items for the week of February 11th, the honorable Board
6 we received weekly DPD facial recognition technology
7 report for February 1st, 2021 through February 7th, 2021.
8 The second correspondence included the facial
9 recognition, 2020 annual report. The third item consisted
10 of the human resources report. The Detroit public safety
11 foundation submitted

12 MS. WHITE: In the 2020 annual report, and you also
13 received various staff reports in your weekly packet. And
14 that concludes the incoming correspondence for this week.

15 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you, Ms. White. Before we
16 move to unfinished business, I just want to say to
17 Commissioner Burton that we are in the process of
18 addressing the staffing and the budget of the Board
19 including OCI, and overall by Charter mandate duties, and
20 responsibility; that is forthcoming. HR has just
21 completed a due diligence process with the HR director. I
22 think we are in the final stages of salary completion.
23 That's been going well to my understanding. So I just
24 want to share that with the Board that the next stage
25 will be pointing out as soon as possible, probably in the

1 next week or so in terms of where we are with the budget
2 and the staffing. So we had to come to grips with the DPD
3 budget and those issues had to be worked out. Then we
4 concentrated on the HR director and I'm pleased that the
5 Board was able to do finalization last week, in terms of
6 that process. I think we made a great hire and hopefully,
7 everything goes well in terms of her taking the job. So
8 unfinished business.

9 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Mr. Chairman, when are we
10 going to address the issues regarding the BOPC budget?

11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I'm sorry.

12 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: As I said, I'm sorry. When are
13 we going to address the issues regarding the BOPC budget,
14 or just a draft of it? So we can really start to ---

15 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I think we're going to have that
16 next week. I think we're going to have that - we're
17 trying to work with the city financial people and HR is
18 to address that. I think we're pretty close to dealing
19 with that. Keep in mind, Commissioner. I wish we had
20 staff that extends beyond the interim Board Secretary.
21 There's so much that comes into that office that she
22 tried to deal with, it's a tremendous task.

23 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: A few of us can work on the
24 budget, a few Board members who are interested and myself
25 included on that because it is critical.

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Oh, we all have an interest in
2 that. We will be sharing. Yes, ma'am. New business.

3 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Unfinished business, sir.

4 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I'm finished first, yes.

5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Speak up.

6 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Okay. I'm finished as it relates
7 to - is the Board going to try to fill the position for
8 finance that was - previously the Board has been vacant
9 for over a year?

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: As I stated, just a few minutes
11 ago, we're going to address the issue of staffing and our
12 budget shortly.

13 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Okay. I'm still requesting the
14 executive summary of our budget for the BOPC.

15 CHAIRPERSON BELL: We are going to work that out,
16 sir. I just explained to you, we're trying our best to
17 address that. And we are going to address it. It's not
18 going to just go away. It's an issue that we do every
19 year. A little bit more commonsense of what we're trying
20 to do, and there are certain steps.

21 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: It would be helpful, sir, if we
22 had an operating budget committee that people know about.

23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: No, sir. Commissioner Burton, did
24 I hear some other Commissioners?

25 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes, for unfinished business,

1 and then I do have something for new business. I mean,
2 but we're unfinished business. Last year, the Board did
3 vote to define a policy for the police department
4 participating in a 1033 program, along with other
5 programs like the 1122 program. When we were to start
6 work on that policy, it was voted on and adopted by the
7 Board.

8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I would have to review that matter
9 with Ms. White in terms of - if that's the case, we'll
10 report out on that. And I know the department has
11 responded to your concern in reference to that whole
12 militarization process. Yes, sir. Any other,

13 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes, yes, sir. Mr. Bell.

14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, ma'am.

15 COMMISSIONER BURCH: This is on the public comment
16 from last week.

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, ma'am.

18 COMMISSIONER BURCH: And the people, it did hit my
19 heart because I've asked this question before, regarding
20 our chaplains, that however you can do it, sir, find a
21 way in the budget that they get something, a stipend or
22 something, some kind of pay. I think they deserve it,
23 those are chaplains. And the other issue is that one of
24 the comments was that the Amber alert, it used to come on
25 my phone whenever a child was missing, it popped up on my

1 phone and gave a description. And then people would like,
2 look for that child. What happened to that?

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Burch, I get those
4 Amber alerts on my department phone all the time. And the
5 media also shared those concerns, the missing, there's a
6 certain criterion. The media also run those. So I get
7 those alerts all the time, on my department phone. So you
8 need to check your department phone, you will see those
9 alert on Amber persons. Normally they're young people or
10 a senior citizen or whatever. Let's continue.

11 COMMISSIONER BURCH: But I'm just trying to tell you,
12 she wasn't getting them. I wasn't either. I have a good
13 phone.

14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Department phone.

15 COMMISSIONER BURCH: No problem. I just want to know
16 where is Amber?

17 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. It's still there, it's still
18 intact.

19 COMMISSIONER BURTON: New business, Mr. Chairman.

20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir.

21 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Please forgive me. I have an
22 emergency. Can I be excused?

23 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. Commercial Holley.

24 COMMISSIONER HOLLEY: Alright. I got an emergency.
25 Can I be excused?

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. I understand. Thank you. I
2 wish you our best. Thank you. Commissioner Burton.

3 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You know, I want to put back
4 out there on the record today for February 11th, I move
5 that we post all vacancies for the Board of Police
6 Commissioners. I move that we post those vacancies within
7 two weeks due to the fact that our budget will be getting
8 approved shortly before the city council. And so if those
9 positions are not posted, then the BOPC loses those
10 dollars. So I move that we post all vacancies for the
11 BOPC.

12 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Support.

13 CHAIRPERSON BELL: It's been properly moved and
14 supported. Discussion.

15 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Chair Bell.

16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes ma'am.

17 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Is it accurate that if we do not
18 post those positions within two weeks, then the Board
19 loses that money. Is that an accurate statement?

20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: No, ma'am that is not accurate at
21 all. Our budget is what it is. Those positions are still
22 there. I haven't heard that before. I tried to explain to
23 this Board the process of how HR and the financial people
24 work. That is not true at all. I haven't heard that
25 before. That is totally inaccurate information.

1 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Discussion. Mr. Chairman.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: We are having a discussion, sir.

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Mr. Hernandez

4 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Point of clarity. Is this
5 motion for us to basically agree with what you just
6 reported out on, Chair Bell?

7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: That is correct what he reported
8 on.

9 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: It seems as if he just
10 addressed it?

11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes. It's totally inaccurate
12 information. It's not factual at all. And HR and finance
13 people will speak to that. As we know this is my 8th year
14 with the Board and we have always transition positions or
15 whatever. That is totally incorrect. Commissioner
16 Bernard.

17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: It is my understanding Mr.
18 Chairman, I haven't done this with the city for many
19 years, that if in fact, positions remain vacant, for
20 example, if it has been vacant for a year or whatever
21 that money can be pulled back because it's viewed that
22 you don't need the position because you haven't filled
23 it. I think that Commissioner Burton suggestions simply
24 that they'd be posted, you know, perhaps would save them.
25 I mean, especially since you said the city wants to pull

1 back money anyway. I mean, if you have positions vacant
2 for a year or more, they're going to pull the money.

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Bernard, once again
4 Commissioner Burton's motion is that we lose that money
5 in two weeks. That is totally inaccurate. And that's what
6 we voted on.

7 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Can I add to that discussion? I
8 have not said anything under discussion yet.

9 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir. Commissioner Burton.

10 COMMISSIONER BURTON: All right. So my motion to be
11 very clear is that I move that we post all of the Boards
12 vacancy positions. That was the simple motion. Secondly,
13 under discussion, we have always had an attorney on the
14 Board. I'm during my second term on the Commission, we
15 actually hired our finance person for our office. Once
16 again, the finance person that represents our office Faye
17 Johnson, she's been separated. It would be one year.
18 She's been gone one solid year. Basically, when our
19 budget goes over for approval by the city council. They
20 going to look and say, hey, you all have been operating
21 without a financial person for a year. You have all been
22 operating without a Board attorney for almost a year. So
23 it's very important that we do post these positions. We
24 don't have to come up with any language because the
25 language is already there. These are positions that the

1 board already has posted and has hired for. The motion is
2 only a simple motion that we move to post these
3 positions, not to say that we are going to hire in two
4 weeks or hire in 30 days. It's just to post the position.
5 So when our budget does go over to the city council for
6 approval,

7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Sir your motion was to --

8 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You have a plan on filling
9 those vacancies. That's, you know, ---

10 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Thank you, sir. I think
11 it's clear as Commissioner Hernandez stated, Vice-Chair
12 Holt was that we, in two weeks we lose funding and that
13 is not the case. Are we right?

14 COMMISSIONER BURTON: That wasn't a motion.

15 CHAIRPERSON BELL: The motion is already on the
16 floor, sir.

17 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Discussion.

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: We're going to do a roll call on
19 that motion

20 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I don't get a discussion.

21 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Oh, I'm sorry.

22 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I asked for a discussion three
23 times, sir.

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Go ahead, Commissioner Davis.

25 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I would like to say, I agree

1 with Commissioner Linda Bernard and that I also worked
2 for the city for over 34 years. And I started off in main
3 personnel, and I can tell you historically if you
4 continually leave vacancies, money is re-appropriated to
5 other things. So I think it would be wise for us to at
6 least post as soon as possible for all of our vacancies,
7 period.

8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Davis, I'm going to
9 state once again, HR and the financial people, that is
10 not accurate at all. And I don't care how long you've
11 been working with the city. We all are. We're going to
12 start the roll call vote now Commissioner Holt.

13 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Okay, Chair Bell, please if I
14 may.

15 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, ma'am.

16 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Okay. Now in posting those
17 positions within two weeks, is that sufficient time to
18 get those positions up and going? Do we have that kind of
19 time?

20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Holt, you did not
21 hear the motion. The motion was that we need to post all
22 positions because we will lose funding in two weeks. That
23 is the motion on the floor.

24 COMMISSIONER BURTON: That wasn't a motion.

25 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: That's not the motion.

1 COMMISSIONER BURTON: That wasn't a motion.

2 CHAIRPERSON BELL: That was the motion.

3 COMMISSIONER HOLT: Are we calling the vote?

4 CHAIRPERSON BELL: That was the motion that was made.

5 COMMISSIONER BROWN: To the Chair. Can we have

6 Commissioner Burton just repeat his motion?

7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: The motions, is in the hand of the

8 Chair now. And I think that was the motion. So,

9 Commissioner, we can open the vote.

10 COMMISSIONER BURTON: The motion was that I moved

11 that we post all BOPC vacancies and my recommendation is

12 that we post in two weeks. That was a recommendation.

13 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: So we are called to vote?

14 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes. Ma'am.

15 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: I'm abstaining, I abstain.

16 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 1.

17 COMMISSIONER BROWN: District 1 is yes.

18 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 2.

19 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes.

20 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 3.

21 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes.

22 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 4. No. District 5.

23 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes.

24 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 6.

25 COMMISSIONER CARTER: No.

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: District 7.

2 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes, definitely.

3 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Hernandez,

4 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Abstain.

5 COMMISSIONER BURCH: We have two abstains.

6 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Commissioner Jones.

7 COMMISSIONER JONES: No.

8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Ms. White.

9 MS. WHITE: Mr. Chair. There were 5 yes votes and 3,
10 no votes, and 2 abstentions.

11 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Did Reverend Holley vote?

12 COMMISSIONER BURCH: He's gone.

13 MS. WHITE: Commissioner Holley is not on the call.
14 Through the Chair, Commissioner Holley is not on the
15 call. So again, the results were 5 yes votes 3, no votes,
16 and 2 abstentions which are counted as no votes.

17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: So it's a tie. It didn't pass.
18 It did not pass.

19 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Okay. We move on to the next item.
20 Mr. Brown announcements.

21 MR. ROB BROWN: Good afternoon Mr. Chair and this
22 honorable Board. Your announcements for the day. The next
23 BOPC virtual meeting dates are February the 18th, 2021 at
24 3:00 PM. February the 25th, 2021 at 3:00 PM. And I'll go
25 straight to our communication, sir, if that's okay with

1 you?

2 COMMISSIONER BURCH: We're not doing announcements
3 first Mr. Bell?

4 CHAIRPERSON BELL: I'm sorry.

5 COMMISSIONER BURCH: We're not doing announcements
6 first before we go into the public comment?

7 CHAIRPERSON BELL: We doing announcements now. Do you
8 have an announcement?

9 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Yes, sir. I wanted to announce
10 what just came across. If everybody didn't get it.
11 Breaking news regarding our Mayor Duggan has been asked
12 to come to see President Biden regarding the recovery for
13 all of the citizens in Detroit. Is everybody aware of
14 that?

15 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: No.

16 COMMISSIONER BURCH: It just came across my phone
17 that he's going to Washington tomorrow. I think that's a
18 good thing and I just hope he goes with the right mindset
19 and receives what we deserve back here in Detroit. And
20 also Mr. Bell, I wanted to share of Fat Tuesday, that's
21 punski. So my store's Imperial at 8 miles and Schaefer
22 and 7 miles. They're going to have punski donuts for you
23 all to go by and buy some for yourself. I thank you so
24 much.

25 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Did you say buy or you're are going

1 to donate?

2 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I said buy. I gave you - that's
3 okay.

4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Thank you, Commissioner Burch,
5 you look out for your community. I am so proud of
6 you. CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you. Mr. Brown.

7 MR. ROB BROWN: Yes, sir Mr. Chair. I currently have
8 8 speakers. Your first three speakers will be Ms. Bernice
9 Smith followed by followed by Ms. Sharon Parnell followed
10 by Mr. Eric Blunt.

11 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

12 MR. ROB BROWN: Ms. Smith.

13 MS. SMITH: Okay. Good afternoon, Commissioners. It's
14 a pleasure to talk to you again this afternoon. Just like
15 to give you an announcement about, we lost a great leader
16 yesterday and her service was yesterday. Abena Hogan. She
17 has been a worker in the city for, oh my gosh, at least
18 15 years, to my knowledge. So she had a beautiful service
19 and I just want all of us to know that she's at a better
20 place, now. Also, as far as that news that you were
21 speaking about, you can get them on the TV, the alert
22 news. So this is what I have. So I just want to commend
23 you today. You had a very good pleasant meetings for us
24 to listen to, and I hope it continues to be that way.
25 Take care. And may God bless all of you and be safe.

1 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

2 MR. ROB BROWN: Ms. Parnell.

3 MS. PARNELL: I don't really have anything to say
4 today, but just stay safe everybody and Happy Valentine.

5 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Thank you.

6 MR. ROB BROWN: Minister Eric Blunt.

7 MINISTER BLUNT: Can you hear me, Board?

8 CHAIRPERSON BELL: Yes, sir.

9 MINISTER BLUNT: Yes. Commissioners, please quit
10 complaining about the length of these meetings. When the
11 vast majority of the conversations are manipulated away
12 from police misconduct. Why can't details regarding
13 officers on disciplinary assignment be reported as often,
14 and as much as fallen and injured officers? Commissioner
15 Davis, you started out on the right path asking about the
16 officers illegally used to evict citizens. But the
17 question of this Board should be what discipline was
18 measured out to the officers and their leadership
19 involved in this situation. If a US Congresswoman Rashida
20 Tlaib can make time to protest in front of the Precinct,
21 why can't this Board focus on the discipline related to
22 this police misconduct? Commissioner Burton, when you ask
23 about where the video is on the chokehold of one of the
24 Black Lives Matter leaders during last year's peaceful
25 protest, DC Bryant can only say that she will look into

1 it. The expected response is "what, you haven't received
2 that video yet, you should have received it and you will
3 receive it by the end of the day." Commissioner Bernard,
4 your questions to me, need to be addressed in public
5 spaces. So I'm requesting that public speakers be given 5
6 minutes if their district is being highlighted, I yield
7 my time.

8 MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair, the next three speakers
9 would be Ms. Michelle George followed by CAC member,
10 Scotty Bowman and a speaker by the name of James. Ms.
11 George.

12 MS. GEORGE: Yes. Can you hear me, Mr. Brown, Mr.
13 Brown? Okay. Let me look at my clock because I'm looking
14 at two minutes. Okay. So, to Chairman Bell, to this
15 honorable Board. Thank you, Commissioner Burch, for
16 speaking out, because there are so many missing young
17 ladies. It is not an Amber alert on them, Commissioner
18 Bell. So hopefully, I've written the assistant chief
19 emails about the missing persons. There's not an Amber
20 alert. Now when that 11-year-old girl got snatched in
21 Louisiana, it went across the country, and thank God for
22 those sanitation workers who saw that kidnapper and were
23 able to bring that baby is alive. That is what you're
24 supposed to do. That is not happening Detroit. And I
25 noticed that. So I hope we can get on that. Also, my

1 sympathy too, of course, queen Avena. In the chaplain
2 program, you will see a difference if you involve your
3 chaplains into, first of all, they could be prayer
4 warriors to get a prayer to the Lord. And then you would
5 have a structure like Commissioner Burch said to start
6 them out with a stipend. When they're in that program for
7 the Chaplain Corps, they have to go to the homes of
8 suspects. They can't even carry weapons as they carry at
9 other police districts. So you start treating them right?
10 What you all got to is change the city. Will you start
11 treating those preachers, right? So we're going to
12 advocate for them as well and hopefully, the Mayor being
13 in DC doing what he is supposed to do and look out for
14 this crime-ridden city. So we're going to be watching to
15 see what President Biden say to him because I'm going to
16 be emailing him after the Mayor's visit. So hopefully
17 Commissioners, you will reach out and speak out for the
18 people more. Thank you very much.

19 MR. ROB BROWN: CAC Member Bowman.

20 CAC CHAIR BOWMAN: Hello, Scotty Bowman here. Well,
21 there are a few things to comment on. First of all, the
22 whole thing with the last few meetings, a couple of
23 meetings ago, even had one of the members, Commissioner
24 Burton was blocked out completely. And I'm not sure if
25 this was you know if there were any secret communication

1 from the Chair, but certainly, some reason and whoever's
2 controlling the access to the meeting blocked out a
3 Commissioner and doing that is, you know, it's criminal.
4 It's really effectively overthrowing the results of the
5 2017 election when you deny a person who is supposed to
6 be representing a district an opportunity to represent
7 that district. As always fired Dwayne Jones already, stop
8 funding facial recognition technology, stop funding the
9 use of military technology and fancy crowd control
10 devices, such as Elrod and Sound Cannons. And I'm trying
11 to remember, there was one other thing I wanted to get
12 to, and I'm looking at that clock and it's distracting.
13 But I'm sorry, I yield my time.

14 MR. ROB BROWN: A caller by the name of James.

15 MR. CROWLEY: Yes, this is Rubin Crowley. I'm going
16 to dismiss all formalities and it goes straight to it.
17 The situation regarding DPD case number 1911110221.

18 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: He's muted.

19 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: He's muted.

20 MR. CROWLEY: Hello, can I be heard?

21 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Now you can.

22 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Start him over.

23 MR. CROWLEY: Can my two minutes be restarted. I'm
24 only at one minute and 30 seconds. I'm going to fulfill
25 the whole two minutes of the.

1 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Okay. You have two minutes, sir.

2 MR. CROWLEY: Okay. Once again, I'm going to dismiss
3 with all formalities. The situation regarding DPD case
4 number 191111-0221 crime report number 200206835 OCI case
5 numbers 716907-1937 and 72096. The direct actions of
6 Lieutenant Agilely Chadwick Bell, the covering of those
7 actions by then-Deputy Chief Todd Bettison, the direct
8 actions of Interim Chief Lawrence Akbar, and the actions
9 of the Chairman, Willie Bell, and his secretary Ms.
10 Melanie White. Ms. Melanie White has raised accusations
11 of harassment and inappropriate contact by me regarding
12 that. But she has yet to get any of the Board members any
13 of the messages I've been leaving for the last several
14 months. I've tried to contact Commissioner Brown for 3
15 months. This past week, three weeks Commissioner Burton,
16 Reverend Jim Holley, Commissioner, Holley, and
17 Commissioner Burch as well. I spoke with Ms. Burch and
18 Mr. Holley just yesterday and I ascertain that they have
19 not received any of the messages I've left, given
20 directly to Melanie White. And there's an ongoing routine
21 of members not getting messages directed towards them.
22 Could you kindly take up the matter in front of the full
23 Board with full participation from every citizen that
24 wants to be privy to that information going on in that
25 Board meeting? Thank you.

1 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Troubling.

2 MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair, I don't see Chaplain
3 Wilson, so we'll go to Ms. Tawana Petty.

4 MS. PETTY: Thank you. I would love to see a
5 presentation from this Board regarding how each of you
6 interprets civilian oversight. My ask is rooted in an
7 ongoing feeling that this Body is not transparent with
8 the public and does have the political will to perform
9 actual oversight with the exception of a few
10 Commissioners. When any Commissioner asks deeper
11 questions on issues that would address community concerns
12 on things like police budgets, BOPC budgets actually
13 explaining what you are learning from the face
14 recognition reports, on police complaints, and on racial
15 justice issues, the rotating ongoing Chair Bell stops the
16 conversation and redirects the discussion to behind the
17 scenes and out of the public view. I do not know how any
18 Commissioner can have comfort with this. I do not know
19 how this is beneficial to the relationship between law
20 enforcement and the community. None of us knows
21 everything. But what I do know is that transformation
22 rarely happens when it's relegated to the darkness.

23 MS. PETTY: I hope you will consider shifting the
24 culture of this Body in order to increase equity on the
25 Board and public voice. The residents of Detroit are

1 suffering from increasing poverty and distress. Nearly
2 half of the residents have lost their jobs since COVID-
3 19. We will never be able to surveil and police them all
4 away. And we shouldn't want to. Let us think about the
5 quality of life issues that will continue to increase the
6 quality of life crimes until we do something different to
7 address it. Let us think about what it truly means to
8 strengthen police and community relations in a way that
9 honors all voices, even the ones we don't agree with. I
10 yield my time.

11 MR. ROB BROWN: Mr. Chair that was your last speaker.

12 MS. WHITE: Mr. Chair.

13 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Ms. Holt?

14 MS. WHITE: Okay. Madam Vice-Chairperson, it appears
15 that Mr. Chair's technology is challenged at this time.

16 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Is there a motion to adjourn?

17 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: So moved.

18 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I have a question, madam Vice-
19 Chair.

20 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Commissioner Davis.

21 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Yes. It sounds troubling if
22 messages are being left for Commissioners and are not
23 being forwarded to them. If that's the case, I would
24 think somebody might need to be fired.

25 COMMISSIONER BROWN: I have experienced the same

1 thing as well, madam Vice-Chair, of not getting messages
2 that have been personally delivered to the office for me.

3 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I like to make the motion.

4 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Please wait a second. Okay. I will
5 touch base with Ms. White to see what this conversation
6 is about.

7 COMMISSIONER BURTON: I support Commissioner Davis'
8 motion and I experienced the same thing too with District
9 5 residents.

10 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Excuse me, Commissioner Burton.
11 Commissioner Davis, and what is your motion?

12 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: My motion is if we have staff
13 members not delivering messages that are being placed,
14 they should be terminated.

15 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Support.

16 MS. WHITE: Through the Chair.

17 COMMISSIONER BROWN: The motion on the floor.

18 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: 10 seconds, Ms. White.

19 MS. WHITE: Yes, ma'am.

20 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Thank you, Commissioner Brown. Is
21 there a discussion? Is there a discussion?

22 COMMISSIONER BURTON: Yes. Madam Chair.

23 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Yes, Commissioner Burton.

24 COMMISSIONER BURTON: You know district by residents
25 has reached out to me in the office and I have not gotten

1 those messages. Also, not long ago, it was in 2019 I was
2 also the only Commissioner here in the City of Detroit
3 that was invited to be on the stage for the Forbes 30,
4 under 30, and that messages did not reach me. I found out
5 about that that I was invited to be on a panel of three-
6 way after, like months after the event actually occurred.
7 But I was invited to represent at the Forbes 30, under 30
8 on a panel with Dwayne Wade, but more importantly just
9 recently,

10 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Okay. Thank you, Commissioner
11 Burton.

12 COMMISSIONER BURTON -- reached out and I have not
13 gotten the message.

14 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Thank you. Commissioner Burton.

15 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Madam Chair.

16 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Commissioner Burch.

17 COMMISSIONER BURCH: I recommend that we have a full
18 investigation first before we go around trying to
19 terminate somebody. First, we got to bring everything to
20 the head of a meeting of this Board and the ones that are
21 accusing. And then we come to a decision, but don't go
22 rapid and say terminate somebody. That's not fair. That's
23 my recommendation. So I'm not voting for anything you all
24 vote today.

25 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Why?

1 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Thank you, Commissioner Burch.

2 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Vice-Chair Holt, I have a
3 recommendation as well. That any, and all messages or
4 correspondence that's currently at the Board for Board
5 members, that it immediately be shared and that it'd be
6 shared under separate cover in a separate envelope. So if
7 it is for one of us individually or for the whole Board.
8 I would simply request that Melanie get that out as soon
9 as possible, just so we can see what we're working with
10 because that's a corrective action. And then we could
11 certainly do that without disrupting our current staffing
12 situation.

13 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Thank you, Commissioner Bernard. So
14 Commissioner Burch, do I understand that you feel we
15 should table the motion that was made by Commissioner
16 Davis?

17 COMMISSIONER BURCH: That is correct.

18 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Support.

19 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Is there a second?

20 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Support to table.

21 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Thank you. Questions. Those in
22 favor to table a motion? Vice-Chair, yes to table.

23 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Commissioner Jones.

24 COMMISSIONER JONES: Yes.

25 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Well, we can hear you, but I saw

1 your hand go up and down.

2 COMMISSIONER JONES: Yes.

3 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Thank you. Commissioner Bernard.

4 COMMISSIONER BERNARD: Yes.

5 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Commissioner Burton.

6 COMMISSIONER BURTON: No.

7 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Commissioner Hernandez.

8 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Yes, table.

9 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Thank you. Commissioner Davis.

10 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: No.

11 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Thank you. Commissioner Brown, are
12 you still with us?

13 COMMISSIONER BROWN: Yes, I'm still here. My vote is
14 no.

15 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: No to table, correct?

16 COMMISSIONER BROWN: That is correct.

17 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Thank you, Ms. White, what's the
18 vote?

19 COMMISSIONER CARTER: I didn't vote.

20 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Oh, I'm sorry. Commissioner Carter.
21 Okay. May we please have your vote?

22 COMMISSIONER CARTER: I vote to table, yes.

23 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Thank you. So Ms. White, please.

24 MS. WHITE: Yes. Through the Chair, there were 5 yes
25 votes and 4, excuse me, 6 yes votes and 3 no votes.

1 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Thank you, Ms. White. So I would
2 say at this point both Commissioner Burch and
3 Commissioner Bernard gave some suggestions on how we can
4 resolve the situation and we'll take it up with Ms.
5 White.

6 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: I hope they are taken and I hope
7 they are resolved with transparency.

8 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Excuse me, Commissioner Davis. I
9 heard you the first time.

10 COMMISSIONER DAVIS: Okay.

11 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: So thank you.

12 COMMISSIONER CARTER: Madam Chair.

13 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Yes, Commissioner Carter.

14 COMMISSIONER CARTER: I move to adjourn.

15 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: Thank you.

16 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Second.

17 COMMISSIONER HERNANDEZ: Support.

18 VICE-CHAIR HOLT: See you next Thursday.

19 COMMISSIONER BURCH: Have a good night. Don't forget
20 Tuesday.


