RE: 2021-22 Community Development Block Grant/Neighborhood Opportunity Fund (CDBG/NOF) Overview and Public Service (PS) funding recommendations

This report provides an overview of the 2021-22 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG)/ Neighborhood Opportunity Fund (NOF) program along with the Commission's funding recommendations for the Public Service activity categories.

BACKGROUND

The Housing and Revitalization Department (HRD) is the City's lead department in administering the CDBG/NOF program. The Mayor's office has completed their review for the 2021-22 program year and subsequently forwarded their recommendations to the Commission for its consideration and recommendation to City Council. Attached to this report is a chart listing the recommendations from the HRD, Mayor's office and City Planning Commission.

The three primary objectives of CDBG funding are to: 1) Provide services to low- to moderate-income individuals, 2) Eliminate slums and blight, and 3) Address urgent need. Similar to last year, this review deals only with Public Service (PS) organizations recommended for funding through the CDBG/NOF program. HRD did not include Homeless Public Service (HPS) or Public Facility Rehab (PFR) funding with this Request for Proposals (RFP), given the department's efforts to once again align the HPS award timeline with that of the Emergency Solutions Grants (ESG) program. For the past decade, the City of Detroit has utilized HPS funds as a match for the ESG program in order to ease the financial burden on the subrecipients and to leverage the Federal funds awarded by HUD.

The unforeseen impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic on the City of Detroit and the city's most vulnerable populations, i.e., individuals suffering from chronic homelessness, has caused HRD to shift their priorities for the PFR program. The Request for Proposals for PFR was issued in the latter part of 2020 geared specifically toward organizations providing emergency shelter to homeless individuals. That RFP closed on December 18, 2020, with a total of four organizations submitting responses to the RFP. It is anticipated that interdepartmental consensus review of these applications will be completed within the month of February 2021. Similarly, to last year, HRD plans to release a RFP for HPS in the Spring 2021.

On Monday, February 8, 2021 at 1 PM, Your Honorable Body is scheduled to hold a Committee of the Whole session to receive an overview of the 2021-22 CDBG/NOF process, followed by a 1:30 PM public hearing and a 3:30 PM appeals hearing for the PS program funding recommendations.

On Tuesday, February 16, 2021, City Council is scheduled to vote on the NOF PS 2021-22 allocations.

APPLICATION REVIEW PROCESS

Timeline for the 2021-22 CDBG/NOF Review

The timeline for the 2021-22 CDBG/NOF review followed the course of previous years. On July 1, 2020 HRD held a virtual Best Practice Forum. For the past several years, the City of Detroit has utilized the BidSync system for the receipt of applications and supporting documentation. However, this year, the Oracle system was utilized for the CDBG/NOF process. In light of this change, three virtual Oracle training workshops were held via Zoom on June 9th, July 27th, and September 10th. This past year, the application was made available online via the City’s Oracle system - from September 9, 2020 through October 9, 2020. All NOF PS proposals were due on October 9, 2020 by 4:00 p.m.

Proposal Writing Workshops

HRD hosted two virtual proposal writing workshops via Zoom. The first workshop was held Wednesday, August 19, 2020. The second workshop was held on Thursday, September 10, 2020. RFP workshops were also recorded and posted on the HRD website, as well as the City’s YouTube page. Additionally, a recorded link was sent to those who registered for the RFP workshops. In an effort to further spread the word about the NOF program, HRD presented during a Community Development Advocates of Detroit (CDAD) member meeting.

Submittals and Review

PS has five sub-categories: education, health, public safety, recreation and seniors. The total number of applications received this year for PS was 50, which is the same as FY 2020-21 compared to 48 the previous year (FY 2019-20).

HRD screened the proposals and determined that seven of the proposals did not meet threshold requirements listed in the application. A summary of the seven proposals that did not meet threshold are listed on the attached chart.

HRD worked in cooperation with CPC staff, the Office of Grants Management (OGM) and the Office of Contracting and Procurement (OCP) in reviewing the submitted CDBG/NOF applications. During the months of October 2020 through January 2021, CPC staff met with HRD, OGM, and OCP to conduct a joint review and scoring of each proposal. Each proposal was scored separately ranging from 0 to 100 points using a scoring criteria grid; then the staff met to discuss each proposal and develop a single consensus proposal ranking. As in previous years, it was agreed amongst staff that proposals scoring less than 80 points would be not be recommended for funding due to a low score. Afterwards, HRD reviewed the number of proposals, final consensus data, and anticipated entitlement amounts, in order to determine HRD recommended funding amounts.

CDBG FUNDING

The City of Detroit CDBG allocation for 2021-22 from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) has not yet been released. The following table shows the amount of the Detroit CDBG allocation for the past nine years.

The table shows a steady decrease in funding the past nine years, except for a 9.9% increase three years ago, a .4% increase two years ago, and a 2.2% increase last year.

Public Service 15% Cap

Federal regulations require that no more than 15% of the entitlement funds (plus program income) be allocated toward PS and HPS funding. The Administration is allocating \$5,027,736 for PS and HPS for 2021-22 based off of an estimated allocation of \$33,518,241 versus the \$5,292,817 that was allocated for 2020-21. This number represents an anticipated decrease in funding over last year.

Threshold Criteria and Funding Priorities

Back in 1994, City Council and the Administration first approved eligibility criteria for both NOF/CDBG funded proposals. Since then, City Council has relied increasingly on the criteria to determine eligibility of the proposals. In July of 2007, partly in response to concerns of HUD, the City Council adopted Joint Threshold Criteria to be utilized by both the legislative and executive branches of government. For this year once again, the Administration and City Council’s joint threshold criteria were listed in the application.

In June 2020, CPC staff asked each Council Member to identify and rank funding priorities for PS, via a survey form. As a part of the 2021-22 application, the following priorities for PS were listed: Public Safety, Seniors, Education, Recreation, and Health.

CPC REVIEW AND RECOMMENDATION

On Thursday, January 28, 2021 following deliberations City Planning Commission voted unanimously in support of the funding recommendations submitted by the Administration, noting that the recommendations were based on interdepartmental consensus review and ranking score, the group’s ability to meet the joint threshold criteria and past compliance with standards and benchmarks of the CDBG/NOF program.
