Charter Revision Commission

FY 2021-2022 Budget Analysis by the Legislative Policy Division

The 2018 Charter Revision Commission of Detroit is a public body organized pursuant to the affirmative vote of the people of the City of Detroit at an election held Tuesday, November 6, 2018, to propose revisions to the Charter of the City of Detroit (current Charter being effective as of January 1, 2012). The citizens of Detroit will vote on proposed revisions.

The Charter Revision Commission began its three-year charge to review and to modify the City of Detroit's 2012 Charter.

For FY 2022, the Mayor has recommended \$116,500 in the Non-Departmental budget for the Charter Revision Commission a reduction of \$183,500 (61.17%), given that the 2022 fiscal year is the final year of funding for the Commission.

<u>Issues and Questions</u>

- 1) The Mayor has recommended \$116,500 for the Charter Revision Commission for FY 2022. Is this a sufficient level of funding for the Commission to complete its work on the Charter? If no, why?
- 2) According to a February 2021 article in the Detroit News, the Administration is alleging "...the commission's revisions could spur an "imminent fiscal crisis" that would send the city \$3.4 billion into debt within four years, trigger placement of an emergency manager and violate terms of the city's bankruptcy order." How does the Commission respond to these comments and what type of research methods did the commission use that factored in the Commission to make its recommendations?
- 3) What was the Commission's rationale in recommending an elected corporation counsel?
- 4) What was the Commission's rationale in recommending an elected Fire Commission? How would a commission improve upon the operations of the Fire Department?

NON-DEPARTMENTAL (35)

- Media Services, formerly the Detroit Cable Communications Commission (established by ordinance in 1981), is the City's local video franchising authority with direct responsibility for review and issuance of franchise agreements and permit agreements to telecommunications providers for use of the City's right-of-way for telecommunications facilities. As the City's video production and television broadcast services provider, Media Services is responsible for daily programming, operation and management of Government Access Channel 10, Education Access Channel 22, Neighborhoods Channel 21 and Public Access Channel 68. Media Services interfaces with the Mayor's Office; City Council; City departments and commissions; educational institutions; and community organizations to produce programming that is responsive to the public's diverse information needs and interests.
- Communications Services staff promotes a positive city image with effective communications with the City's customers residents, business
 owners, employees, visitors and the media. As the communications arm, staff provides high-quality service to city agencies and elected
 officials in their efforts to communicate programs, initiatives and information to various audiences. Services include strategic communications
 planning and counseling, media relations, event planning, website management, writing, graphic design, photography and Total Copy Center
 services. Staff support Motor City Makeover and Halloween in the "D", under the Mayor's Communications Director.
- Pension Administration is responsible for the administration of the employee retirement systems, and it is the governing body for the
 Employee Benefit Plan. The Retirement Systems fully reimburses the City of Detroit for Pension Division personnel costs.
- . Funding for the Detroit Charter Revision Commission is included; FY 2022 is the final year of funding for the body.

The Non-Departmental agency records the salaries and benefits for the 11 elected officials of the City of Detroit: Mayor, City Clerk and City Council Members, in the Elected Officials Compensation cost center. General Fund contributions are made to enterprise agencies, cultural agencies and the Detroit Wayne Port Authority and Detroit Land Bank Authority (below).
