ARPA OVERVIEW

The \$1.9 trillion federal stimulus bill called the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA), was signed into law in March 2021 to combat effects of the COVID-19 pandemic

- Included \$350 billion in State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (SLFRF)
- Detroit was awarded \$826.7 million

All ARPA-funded projects must comply with US Treasury's "Final Rule" released in January 2022

Projects must align with one of these four primary categories:

Response to Public Health Emergency with respect to COVID-19 or its negative economic impacts
Infrastructure investment for water, sewer, and broadband

•Premium Pay for eligible workers

oGovernment Services to the extent of reduction in revenue experienced due to COVID-19

ARPA **cannot** be used directly for pensions, debts, settlements, judgments, or rainy day funds ARPA **cannot** be use for expenses incurred prior to March 3, 2021 ARPA funding must be **obligated by December 31, 2024** and spent by December 31, 2026


