Licensing

Under MRTMA, § 8, MRA created Michigan's Social Equity Program to promote and encourage participation in the marijuana industry by people from communities that have been disproportionately impacted by marijuana prohibition and enforcement and to positively impact those communities. Detroit's licensing process includes separate tracks for "equity" and "non-equity" applicants.

The City of Detroit is committed to providing opportunities for applicants and licensees to operate brick-and mortar businesses. A study is underway to identify appropriate zoning and qualifying land parcels.

1st 30-day application period

- 14 Non-equity Retail Licenses & 14 Equity Retail Licenses
- 5 Non-equity Microbusiness and 5 Non-equity Consumption Establishment Licenses & 5 Equity Microbusiness and 5 Equity Consumption Establishment Licenses
- Unlimited Licenses

2nd 30-day application period

- 12 Non-equity Retail Licenses & 12 Equity Retail Licenses
- 5 Non-equity Microbusiness and 5 Non-equity Consumption Establishment Licenses & 5 Equity Microbusiness and 5 Equity Consumption Establishment Licenses
- Unlimited Licenses

3rd 30-day application period

- 12 Non-equity Retail Licenses & 12 Equity Retail Licenses
- 5 Non-equity Microbusiness and 5 Non-equity Consumption Establishment Licenses & 5 Equity Microbusiness and 5 Equity Consumption Establishment Licenses
- Unlimited Licenses

2027 Medical-to-Recreational license application period

After the initial three application periods, beginning January 1, 2027, any license-holder of one or more licenses to operate a medical marijuana provisioning center, having been the holder of such license(s) since prior to the effective date of this ordinance, may apply for an adult-use retailer license.

Frequently Asked Questions	Answers
Are there additional distance or zoning requirements for recreational cannabis businesses?	As of today, no changes have been made to Chapter 50 of the 2019 Zoning Ordinance. The distance requirements for medical marijuana will remain the same for adult-use recreational marijuana facilities. However, the Detroit City Council is reviewing the ordnance to see if amendments are needed.
Is there a limit on the number of licenses an applicant can apply for? Does the ordinance allow for franchising – multiple brick-andmortar businesses under the same brand?	There is no limit on the number of licensing applications that one can submit; however, each license requires a separate application. The ordinance does not allow for franchising.





Make sure you are registered to vote

- You can register at any time up to 8 p.m. on Election Day at the Clerk's office. If you're registering another way, your voter registration application must be received or postmarked at least 15 days before the election.
- Register and Vote on the Same Day
- ✓ You can register to vote and vote in person on Election Day at the Clerk's office. You'll need to bring your proof of eligibility and residency.





Early Voting Options

- ✓ Online and mail requests for an absent voter ballot must be received by City Clerk no later than 5 p.m. the Friday before the election. If you're already registered at your current address, you can request an absent voter ballot in person at your clerk's office anytime up to 4 p.m. on the day prior to the election.
- ✓ If you're registering to vote or updating your address by appearing at your clerk's office on Election Day, you can request an absent voter ballot at the same time you register. If you request your AV ballot the day before the election or on Election Day, you must vote the ballot in the clerk's office.
- ✓ Your completed absentee ballot should be received by the Clerk's Office by 8 p.m. on Election Day.





In-Person Voting Options

- ✓ On Election Day, registered voters must vote at their local polling place. Unregistered voters must go to their clerk's office to register and vote there or at their polling place.
- ✓ You can look up the locations of <u>your clerk's</u>
 <u>offices and your polling place</u> in the voter
 information section on the <u>Michigan Voter</u>
 <u>Information Center website</u>
- ✓ You will be asked to show ID when you check in to vote. If you don't have one, you can still vote. If this happens, expect a poll worker to ask you to sign a form before you vote that explains you didn't have an ID. Your ballot will be included with all others and counted on Election Day.
