

# Social Vulnerability Index: Detroit

Figure 1 illustrates socioeconomic vulnerability measures as follows:

Poverty – population living below Federal poverty level

Unemployment – age 16 and over seeking work

Per capita income – 2013 inflation-adjusted

Education – age 25+ without a high school diploma

Health insurance – age less than 65 without insurance




Figure 2 illustrates housing/transportation vulnerability measures as follows:

Large apt. buildings – 10 or more housing units per building

Mobile - percent of housing units

Crowding – housing units with more than one person per room

No vehicle – households with no vehicle available

Group quarters population living in group quarters

Figure 3 disstrates household composition & disability vulnerability measures as follows:

Seniors – aged 65 or

Youth - aged 17 or younger


Ability - Civilian with a disability


Family structure – single-parent households


Figure 4 illustrates minority status vulnerability measures as follows:

## **Behavioral Health Snapshot**


- Nationally, there was a 1,000% increase in emotional distress reported to emergency hotlines (NIH 2020)
- Wayne County represents 46% overdose deaths in MI (CDC 2020)
- Detroit has the highest burden of opioid overdoses in MI (CDC 2020)
- Detroit has the 4th highest number of people living in economically/socially distressed zip codes in the US (Bloomberg)
- Detroit has the highest burden of adverse childhood experiences (ACEs) in the US >80% (Kresge/Youth Wellness 2019)
