About Police Commissioner Bernard and the Detroit Board of Police Commissioners

Linda D. Bernard is the only African-American attorney to argue and win three precedent-setting cases in the Michigan Supreme Court – one saving the City millions of dollars and the other two providing new financial benefits and privileges to all Michigan workers. She is also the only attorney on the Board of Police Commissioners.

A graduate of WSU's Monteith Honors College and Law School, Bernard is also the first African American to earn a Masters of Law degree from the University of Pennsylvania Law School. She also holds certifications from several institutions, including The Harvard Business School.

Her career spans the public and private sectors. As President and CEO of Wayne County Neighborhood Legal Services, Bernard founded law centers that served HIV-positive persons, seniors, youth and ex-offenders, as well as the largest Mediation, Housing Placement, and Domestic Violence centers in the state.

Bernard has served on more than 25 boards, including the Eastern Michigan University Board of Regents, Black Family Development, Detroit Regional Chamber of Commerce's CEO Roundtable, and Wayne County Head-Start Policy.

A multi-media personality, Bernard is a fellow of the Michigan State Bar Association and has received more than 100 awards including the Michigan Bar's Highest Honor, the Champion of Justice Award.

District 2 residents elected Bernard in a November 2020 special election to fill a vacancy and reelected her in 2021. District 2 includes the 12th Precinct, as well as parts of the 2nd, 8th and 10th precincts.

Having also served as Chief Legal Counsel to the BOPC, Bernard attended her first meeting as a Police Commissioner on December 3, 2020.

The Board of Police Commissioners (BOPC) is comprised of 11 members. Seven are elected by districts like City Council members, and four are atlarge mayoral appointees approved by Council. All 11 Board members serve without compensation as a vital civilian board to help ensure police powers and practices comply with Constitutional protections and community policing standards.

The 1974 City Charter first established a civilian oversight board. The BOPC derives its current powers and duties from the 2012 Charter, which strengthened independent, citizen oversight.

Authority: The Board has supervisory control and oversight of the Police Department.

Meeting Schedule: The Board is required to meet at least once each week but may vote to recess during the Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year holidays. All meetings are held in accordance with the Open Meetings Act.

Specific Duties:

- Establish policies, rules and regulations in consultation with the Chief of Police, and with the approval of the Mayor
- Review and approve the departmental budget before its submission to the Mayor
- Receive and resolve any complaint concerning the operation of the Police Department except those involving criminality
- Act as final authority in imposing or reviewing discipline of employees of the department
- Make an annual report to the Mayor, Council, and the public of the department's activities during the previous year, including the handling of crime and complaints, and of future plans

Other Board Responsibilities:

Staff:* The Board appoints a Board Secretary and a Chief Investigator, along with other investigators to handle citizen complaints against police/DPD.

Chief of Police: Whenever the Chief of Police position becomes vacant, the Board is responsible for conducting a professional search to identify qualified candidates. The Board submits a list of the final candidates to the Mayor, who makes the appointment subject to City Council approval.

Police Personnel: The Board appoints a civilian as Director of Police Personnel. The Board also approves all promotions made within the DPD.

Office of the Chief Investigator (OCI): OCI investigates citizen complaints against police and other DPD staff and reports findings to the Board.
