

COUNCIL MEMBER'S CORNER

LEGISLATIVE/POLICY UPDATES

- Council Member Calloway continues to be a staunch No Vote regarding adopting Shotspotter technology. The Council Member objected to the \$7M contract being returned as she does not support any monied appropriation to adopt Shotspotter.
- The Council Member proposes that \$14M should go to preventative long-term programming like poverty solutions, affordable housing, eviction diversion, job opportunities, and mental health response teams.
- Council Member Calloway has submitted a resolution to draft an ordinance that would ban 'Cashless' businesses in the City of Detroit. According to a report by the Univ. of Michigan, over 23% of Detroiters do not have bank accounts, and over 32% are financially insecure. Cashless businesses limit access to our most vulnerable, who rely on cash transactions for everyday essential purchases of goods and services. To have a cashless business in Detroit is an act of economic segregation and should have no place in our city.
- The Youth and Civic Engagement Task Force convened its first two unofficial meetings with community-based organizations and educators. The first official meeting will be in mid-October. If you are interested in our efforts, please contact our office via CouncilmemberCalloway@detroitmi.gov.

COUNCIL MEMBER CALLOWAY CELEBRATES PROJECT CLEAN SLATE

Project Clean Slate honored their 1,000th expungement of 2022 by hosting a celebration with the Detroit Pistons. The Detroit initiative helps residents expunge criminal convictions and access better employment, housing, and educational opportunities. During the event, Council Member Calloway shared her gratitude and appreciation for the initiative stating, "It's all about access. The expungement program does that. It grants recipients access to new opportunities."

The first leg of the tour took visitors to the Wayne State University Mike Ilitch School of Business, Eddystone Apartments, and Little Caesars Arena. During that time, residents asked questions regarding affordable housing, the future of Detroit's education system, sustainable infrastructure, and the revitalization of not only downtown but also the neighborhoods. The tour's second leg encompassed Columbia Street, Global Resource Center, and Fox Theatre. After the tour, residents shared their ideas and concerns in a survey. Many asked tough questions and expect to meet with The District Detroit and Olympia Development team soon.

Families from all over the city gathered on September 24th to celebrate the turn of seasons. The mission of the Congressional Black Caucus Foundation, Inc. (CBCF) is to advance the global Black community by developing leaders, informing policy and educating the public. Council Member Calloway, along with her team and colleagues attended the 51st Annual Legislative Conference in Washington D.C. to connect with fellow change makers and creative thinkers. While at the conference, Council Member Calloway had the opportunity to meet with a plethora of elected officials- U.S. Senator Gary Peters, U.S. Representative Brenda Lawrence, U.S. Representative Rashida Tlaib, U.S. Secretary of Housing and Urban Development Marcia Fudge and many more. The week-long conference was chockfull of discussions about public policy, policy reform, education, affordable housing, HBCUs, and more.







THE JOE LOUIS GREENWAY IS UNDER CONSTRUCTION

Detroit residents and city officials recently celebrated the start of construction on the second major leg of the Joe Louis Greenway. Construction on the half-mile section from Grand River to Fullerton began late last month. To prepare for construction, 2, 200 tons of waste and over 200 tires were removed and disposed of. The Joe Louis Greenway will be 27.5 miles long once it reaches completion. The greenway will connect 23 neighborhoods and overlap with well-known trails like the Detroit Riverfront and the Dequindre Cut. Council Member Calloway joined Deputy Mayor Todd Bettison to celebrate the new construction.


BC3NP




