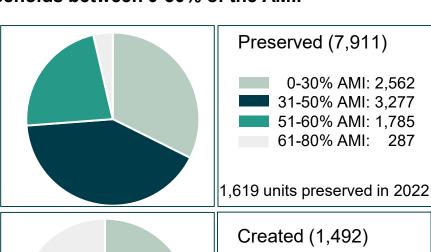

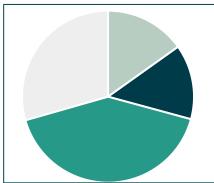


Affordable Housing Preservation and Development

66% of affordable housing units preserved or created <u>since 2015</u> are affordable for households between 0-50% of the AMI.

Housing Stability Services

Rental Assistance

- Convened stakeholders from legal services, 36th District Court, and homelessness services to coordinate on eviction moratoriums and providing funding in April of 2020
- Provided rental assistance to 32,000 households, 10,000 of whom were facing eviction, since spring 2021

Homelessness Solutions

- Continued to provide Covid-19 isolation shelter services through fluctuations in the pandemic. To date 1,820 persons have been assisted, preventing wider spread of the virus through shelters
- Provided funding to help construct Detroit's first healthy housing center that was completed in 2022
- Administer homelessness solutions funds to serve approximately 7,170 Detroiters annually (note that number is not deduplicated)

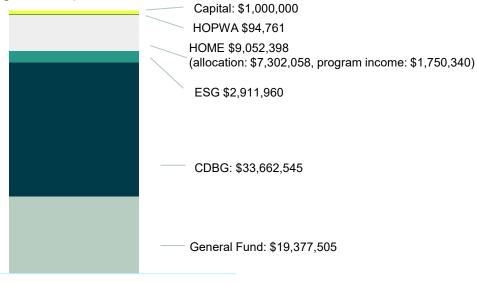

Annual Federal Allocations

Detroit receives an annual allocation of each of these sources based on a statutory formula. HRD administers each program except for HOPWA (Health), for which HRD provides compliance assistance only.

In addition to proposed fiscal year budget shown on left, HRD is currently administering and additional (approx.) \$300 million.
