

I am pleased to share with you "DPD's Report Card." DPD's men and women in Blue continue to vigorously "PROTECT AND SERVE" our community, and when DPD's actions are questionable, I promise you transparency and accountability. Detroit's city-wide 2022 crime stats are impressive when compared per capita with other large metropolitan areas. All Part One Crimes (violent crimes) decreased in 2022: Aggravated Assaults (non-fatal shootings) decreased by 11% to 12,967. Rape decreased by 15% (697). Robbery 7% to 1,403. Homicide was the lone exception. A murder before the new year increased by one Detroit's homicide rate over 2021 to 309. Other news - new 4-year labor agreements were signed, increasing "Copper" salaries (my nephew's term) by a minimum of 13% to \$73K for 2023! The "Brass, Sergeants, Lieutenants, Commanders, Deputy Chiefs, also got megabucks, a minimum of 4%. Detroit is now competitive with Police Depts in the suburbs. Hopefully, we will no longer lose hundreds of officers we trained (the best training in the state) to surrounding communities. I wish you God's Blessings, Excellent Health, Freedom, and Prosperity!

# TASK FORCE MEETS TO BRING AWARENESS TO HUMAN TRAFFICKING

first meeting of Council The Member Calloway's Human Trafficking Task Force took place on March 15 at the Palmer Park Community House. The task force includes representatives from the Covenant House, Alternatives for Girls, the 10th Precinct, the 11th Precinct, and Neighborhood Legal Services. The purpose of the task force is to (1) Bring awareness to the issue of human trafficking in Detroit; (2) Educate the public and target audiences about the issue in an appropriate manner; (3) Put forth legislative proposals that could help address the issue; and (4) Discover appropriate resources that are available and provide them to those who need them. We are looking forward to all the great work the task force will do.

### **LEGISLATIVE/POLICY UPDATES**

- Property Tax Rate Reduction: In February 2023, Council Member Calloway proposed a decrease in the property tax rate of 2 Mills that would take effect July 1, 2023. Later, Mayor Duggan announced a property tax rate decrease of 1 Mill effective July 1, 2023, and an additional 1 Mill decrease effective July 1, 2024. This is progress but not enough progress. Council Member Calloway will continue to work for more property tax relief for the average resident. High property tax rates are a barrier to growth and a better future. We are unsatisfied with the current system and will continue the struggle for our residents.
- Split Rate Property Taxes: Land speculators buy cheaply large quantities of land, guess when the prices of the land would rise enough to make a profit, and then sell that land. They often demand outrageous hostage prices for vacant lots and houses. This real estate business plan is bad for business and contributes to urban blight. Land speculators are a barrier to neighborhood growth. The current practice is bad for neighborhoods and bad for the average resident. This practice has gone on far too long. Council Member Calloway will work with Mayor Duggan to enact a split rate tax that will tax land at a higher rate than the building on the land. For most residents, this will not affect the amount of property taxes paid. For land speculators, this will be a huge burden and will finally force them to either develop the land or sell it to someone who will develop it. The days of the greedy land speculator will be over. We ask everyone to support the split-rate property tax reform. We know there will be a fight as special interest groups attack the idea.









### **LEGISLATIVE/POLICY UPDATES**

- Cashless Businesses: Detroit is a welcoming however, residents feel city; some unwelcomed when they cannot do business at locations that do not accept cash as a form of payment. Many Detroiters do not have bank accounts, credit cards, or debit cards. All Detroit businesses should be open customers with cash to pay for the transaction. In cooperation with the Law Department, Council Member Calloway drafted an ordinance prohibiting most cashless businesses. This will eliminate another barrier and will ensure that everyone is welcome.
- **Short-Term Rentals:** Detroit needs effective regulations surrounding the short-term rental industry. Airbnb and other rental platforms are used by hundreds to rent properties for a day or a week. Most rentals are without incident. Some rental operations are a big problem. Finding solution a allowing responsible rental operators and banning rental will irresponsible operators challenging. This is a big task. Council Member Calloway will work to find a solution. We need your help and suggestions. Please give us your comments.

Bishop Dr. Dora R. Scott, affectionately known as "The Church Lady," was recently presented a Spirit of Detroit Award from the office of Council Member Calloway for her outstanding leadership and twenty-year-long commitment to her congregation at Word Restoration Ministries, where she has served tirelessly as the Senior Pastor and Founder. Bishop Dr. Scott has also made a significant impact through her many years of work with Project Tyme and has helped at-risk youth turn their lives around and become positive societal contributors. Bishop Dr. Scott founded Project Tyme to assist delinquent youth in Detroit. Bishop Dr. Scott's example reminds us of the importance of giving back to our communities and positively impacting the lives of those around us. We can all learn from her leadership and commitment to helping others.
