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

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

## Metro Detroit's Foreign-Born Population

## Pre-COVID

#### Warrendale Immigrant Integration Initiative-IIMD

- Established local office at 111 Kirby for Immigrant Integration Initiative- USCRI, IIMD, ICD.
- Secured general funds \$140,000 for the International Institute of Metropolitan Detroit for the development and implementation of a housing strategy for immigrants and refugees in Detroit.
- Secured contract for two-year implementation with IIMD
   & USCRI.
- Provided blueprint for future resettlement.





### Warrendale Community Inclusion project

Warrendale Community Inclusion project report completed November 2020

## Detroit Innovation District GEIR

- Received \$25,000 from National League of City/Kauffman Foundation to implement the Global Entrepreneurship in Residence Program.
- Secured a partnership with Global Detroit and Wayne State University for Detroit Innovation District Global EIR- for immigrant entrepreneurship.
- OIA presented DID GEIR at the Mayors Summit on Entrepreneurship on September 17 & 18 via zoom.
- Simon Forester, Passive Bolt becomes the first entrepreneur in February 2022.



#### Detroit FastTrac

- Received \$15,000 from National League of City/Kauffman Foundation in 2021 to implement Immigrant Entrepreneurship program.
- Secured a partnership with International Institute of Metropolitan Detroit and leveraged \$15,000 additional funds for a total project funding of \$30,000.
- Commitment of 10 candidate for first cohort. Twelve candidates enrolled in the program.
- Currently seeking funding for 2023 FastTrack Informal Entrepreneur training program.



### Expand Lead Contractor Training-SDBA/MIHCA.

- Received \$15,000 from Erb Family Foundation and City provided a matching \$15,000 to implement the Lead Contractor Training Program in January-February 2020.
- Cohort 1 (English) was February 1 February 29. 12 of 15 English Supervisors Certified.
- Cohort 2 (Spanish) was February 29 March 21. 11 of 11 Spanish Workers/Supervisors completed the Worker Training
- Received \$170,000 from the Erb Family Foundation in October. City provided \$75,000 as match.
- In 2021 trained 36 people, with 36 RRP certified and 17 Lead Certified with retakes pending for 9 participants.





### Certified Welcoming City – Welcoming America

- Completed Certified Welcoming self assessment in August 2020. Scheduled zoom interviews for city dept heads, community leaders and agency directors on immigrant inclusion. Certified Welcoming audit report provided in February 2021.
- Audit response and plan due May 31, 2021.
- Supported Naturalization & National Citizenship Day on September 10 w/IIMD via zoom.
- On September 17, New American Economy announced Detroit at the 7th Best City for immigrant inclusion and engagement for 2019. The City was among the most improved, climbing from #19 overall with significant improvement in its socio-economic score.

#### Other initiatives...Census 2020 & COVID Impact

Supported the Southwest Detroit Businesses Crisis Response Team to assist with **PPP loans**, MEDC, DECG & TechTown grants. Detroit **UndocuFund** Detroit Immigration Task
Force. Four communitybased organizations
supported funds
disbursement for cash
assistance to Detroiters.

Coordinated support from the North American Chinese Association-Michigan to confront hate against Asian Americans.

Coordinated with ITF for the production of 35 videos for **Be Counted Detroit Census** utilizing Detroit Immigrant influencers.

Promoted **Census** zoom presentations with immigrant & refugee agencies.

#### Afghan Refugee Resettlement


- Secure funding for housing assistance for 12 months
- Secure support services funding for resettlement agencies
- Resettle 50% of Afghan families designated to Southeast Michigan
- Identify affordable housing for Afghan refugees
- Partner with refugee resettlement agencies for employment, transportation, health, language access, and support services






## Resettlement Distribution by Organizations Per CERA funding quarter
