


GRIXDALE LISTENING SESSION

Council Member Angela Calloway's team met with several city officials on Thursday, April 20th, including the Director of Planning and Development, the Department of Neighborhoods Director, the Director of Construction & Demolition, the Chief Enforcement Officer of Property Maintenance from the Buildings and Safety Engineering and Environmental Department (BSEED), the Director of Planning & Analysis of Detroit Land Bank Authority, and Deputy Director of Complete Streets of the Department of Public Works and residents from the Grixdale neighborhood. This neighborhood, located east of Woodward between 7 Mile and McNichols, deserves better city services and will get them. At the urging of Council Member Calloway, city officials are now demolishing dangerous buildings; boarding up and securing salvageable buildings; preparing others for rehab; and selling vacant lots to adjoining property owners. General Services Department crews are cleaning alleys and repairing streets. The long overdue work is finally going forward with an intensity not experienced in decades. More importantly, Council Member Calloway and the city officials explained that planning for the neighborhood will be based on the comments and ideas of the residents. During the meeting, residents shared their concerns regarding prostitution, drug infestation, wildlife, and blight enforcement.

CAREER & EDUCATION EXPO AT JUDGE MATHIS COMMUNITY CENTER

On Saturday, April 15th, Judge Mathis hosted a free career and education expo at the Mathis Community Center. The event provided job seekers and education enthusiasts a platform to meet with potential employers and colleges. The event offered employment and education opportunities and provided support services for families, seniors, and those struggling with substance abuse and mental health issues. Having Council Member Calloway and her team present to provide information on city programs was also a valuable addition to the event. It's important for communities to come together and offer support and resources to help residents succeed and thrive.

RED WINGS TAKE OVER JACK ADAMS ARENA

Council Member Calloway and her team joined the Detroit Red Wings on April 11th at the Jack Adams Memorial Arena for their annual takeover. The event included free ice skating, street hockey, music, and pizza from Little Caesar's. The United by Hockey Mobile Museum was parked outside the arena and curated to celebrate hockey's trailblazers and changemakers. The museum was housed in an 840-square-foot truck and included artifacts from players, a hockey card collection, and videos highlighting the history of hockey. This event was an excellent opportunity to unite the community and celebrate the rich history of this beloved sport.



COUNCIL MEMBER CALLOWAY'S CLOSING RESOLUTIONS FOR THIS YEAR'S FY24 BUDGET

DDOT Strategic Framework for Transit-Oriented Development:

• Transit Oriented Development (TOD) is an urban planning concept that encourages cities to develop housing adjacent to reliable and accessible transportation. The Federal Transit Administration described TOD as "Dense, walkable, mixed-use development near transit that attracts people and adds to vibrant, connected communities." The Federal Transit Administration believes that a successful TOD leverages public investment in transit to promote these areas: Neighborhood Revitalization; Affordable Housing; Public and Private Investment; Increased Ridership for Transit systems; Congestion relief, improved air quality; and Improved Safety for pedestrians. As of 2023, the Federal government has expended over \$100M in funding to local governments for Transit Oriented Development projects. The City of Detroit and the Department of Transportation do not currently have a TOD Strategic Plan/Framework. We urge DDOT and all necessary parties to complete and execute a Transit Oriented Development Framework.

Adaptive Reuse of vacant office space into housing units (HRD):

• To curb the loss of affordable housing, Council Member Calloway urged HRD to work with potential public and private partners to appropriate funding to adapt current vacant office spaces into affordable housing units. Currently, cities nationwide are directing resources to survey, identify, and adapt vacant spaces for residential use.

Funding for Sports Equity Programming (GSD):

• On average, Black and Brown students have access to far fewer teams and sports, and the city spends much less per Black and Latino student than for students of other races. We are urging GSD to begin a sports equity campaign and programming that seeks to right this injustice in partnership with the students, educators, activists, and other advocates.

Funding for Adaptive Reuse of office space into residential (DEGC):

• In 2020, the Calgary Economic Development Corporation rolled out their office to a residential dashboard that tracked progress on adaption efforts across North America. The Downtown Development Authority has determined priorities for the transformation of our city center, including incentivizing real estate development, supporting vibrant initiatives, developing downtown diversity, and improving downtown safety, security, and quality of life. We are urging the DEGC-DDA to allocate a percentage of funding toward the implementation of an Adaptive Reuse Program to meet the priorities for downtown development.

COUNCIL MEMBER CALLOWAY'S CLOSING RESOLUTIONS FOR THIS YEAR'S FY24 BUDGET

Establishing the Environmental Enforcement Officers (Citizens Blight Patrol):

• Council Member Calloway earmarked \$200k within the existing GSD FY24 Budget to establish the Environment Enforcement Officer Program. Environmental Enforcement Officers (EEOs) would monitor communities to prevent and deter illegal dumping. Through educational outreach and enforcement actions, EEOs educate Detroiters on the consequences of illegal dumping and hold unlawful dumpers accountable. They will monitor illegal dumping "hot spots," conduct forensic investigations, cite dumpers, coordinate abandoned waste removal, and collect data to inform and improve enforcement efforts. EEOs would integrate and expand existing Citizen Blight Patrol units.

Palmer Park Lighting Improvements (GSD):

- GSD has identified and will earmark \$20k within their existing FY24 budget for Lighting Improvements at Tennis courts and athletic areas.
- Street Funding and Redesign for Permanent Traffic Calming Islands (DPW). DPW has identified and will earmark \$200k within their existing FY24 budget for Street funding and redesign for permanent traffic calming infrastructure at the intersections of Seven Mile and Parkside, and Cambridge and Canterbury.

They received a \$25,000 grant for building renovations, and during the ribbon-cutting event, invited guests were able to take a tour of their building.
