

Employment Growth by Region, Indexed to 2001





Head Start Teacher employment in Detroit has fallen by 17.1 percent since 2001, despite strong growth over the past 5 years — a trend expected to continue over the next 10 years. The region is expected to see 181 job openings each year through 2032 resulting from retirements, occupational transfers, and growth. The role offers an overall median hourly rate of \$24.03, with bachelor's degree holders earning 26.2 percent more than those with just an associate degree, on average


Chart 4: Employment Growth by Region, Indexed to 2001

As recently as 2022, over one-third of Head Start Teachers in Detroit held a certificate or associate degree (34.0%). The majority possessed a bachelor's degree (35.3%), while 16.6 percent held an advanced degree. This was one of the youngest teaching professions, with just 16.4 percent of the workforce set to reach or exceed retirement age in the next 10 years. Nearly 3 in 4 Head Start Teachers identified as White (72.2%), while those identifying as either Black or African American accounted for just 3.8 percent of employment.

Chart 7: Workforce by Age Group, 2022





Chart 8: Workforce by Race/Ethnicity, 2022



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
