I have missed so many opportunities because of my record and now I feel like I have so much more in store for my life and for my future.

I appreciate being a law-abiding citizen because I have seen the other side-its jail, probation, court, fines, freedom taken away, time wasted, opportunities gone, life changing for the worst. And I could blame it on my traumatic childhood, lack of community growing up, having no father and a young mother, my appearance, racial discrimination, my peers, or my ignorance of the law--but I can't blame anyone but myself and my lack of guidance. Thank God for programs like PCS that help give people like me a second chance. Someone who wants to be better in life. Who wants more out of life. And who's opportunity was stripped from them in the past but who now doesn't take any moment for granted.
