Types of Cases: "[a]ny summary proceeding commenced in the 36th District Court to recover possession from an occupant of any residential property or any administrative proceeding which threatens the occupancy of an occupant, including, but not limited to, eviction proceedings, mortgage foreclosures, property tax foreclosures, land forfeiture proceedings, and threats to rent subsidies

Eligibility: 200% of the Federal Poverty Level


- City Council + Mayor= \$6 million for full representation in Jan 2023, along with an additional 12 million

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Office of Eviction Defense Goals & Priorities

- Use available funds to increase full representation to income eligible tenants
- Maximize coordination & relationship with 36th District Court to increase the
 effectiveness of the RTC program and foster collaboration on City priorities such as
 increasing rental compliance among landlords in the City
- Maximize coordination & relationship with our city's Housing Helpline so that tenants can quickly speak with a RTC attorney when needed, & connect to wrap-around services
- Improve community outreach to connect with important community groups and members who support RTC, additional outreach to increase City residents' awareness of RTC, and outreach to about 20% of tenants who we estimate do not show up to court and receive default evictions as a result
- We have funds available and are accepting proposals for the creation of a web-based app or mobile friendly materials to further educate eligible tenants about their legal rights and procedures under RTC
- Data dashboard coming to show true impact and outcomes of City RTC cases
