RE: **Legislative Policy Division Report on the Status of the 2022-2023 Financial And Budgetary  
Priorities, Public Policy, Planning And Action Resolution**

This report provides an overview of the status of the financial and budgetary priorities of the Council for the fiscal year 2022 – 2023. The Legislative Policy Division (LPD) has committed to report on a quarterly basis the status of the Council's Closing Resolution; this is the first report issued under this endeavor.

The FY 2023 City Council Closing Resolution acknowledged the city's positive trajectory toward the future with ongoing reinvestments in its infrastructure, continuing fiscal constraints to ensure balanced revenue and expenditures while providing improved services to its citizens. To this end, the Council outlined 92 resolutions to further address the needs and concerns of the community that were not funded or fully integrated into the FY 2023 Adopted Budget.

### SUMMARY

LPD submitted a request for information to the city agencies identified in the Council's Closing Resolution for additional action. Agencies were requested to identify the status of the resolution; if the resolution is: 1. Open, in progress; 2. Completed and closed; 3. Action under consideration; 4. No Consideration given, no action planned; or 5. Not applicable. Agencies were asked to provide additional comments on the status of the resolution for further clarification. Agencies were also provided with an opportunity to comment if actions were required from external sources such as state or federal legislation.

The OCFO, Office of Budget assisted in obtaining responses from department directors, staff and/or Agency CFO. The responses received were not as detailed as we expected, and some will require additional discussion. As this is our first effort in the monitoring and tracking of Council resolutions, we hope to submit more meaningful and complete status reports on Council's budget priorities. Items included in the Council's Closing Resolution resulted from Council's deliberations on the budget and compromises made to ensure that a balanced budget was adopted. As such, it is expected that full consideration is given to the implementation of Council's stated priorities. If a priority is not feasible, not considered for implementation, then a statement clarifying the lack of action is in order. Communication that explains action or lack of action on a priority will assist the Council in developing future priorities. Communication that presents alternatives to priorities that the Administration deems not feasible demonstrates a willingness to work with the Council

to address stated priorities. Acknowledgement of the priorities listed in Council's Closing Resolution advances the will of the community to have their issues seriously considered in the budget process. It is LPD's hope that as we periodically report on Council's priorities that we will have a more thorough discussion on how to meet the needs and expectations of the community expressed in these priorities.

The priorities, public policies, planning, and actions included in the FY 2023 Closing Resolution were organized into the following twelve (12) areas:

- **City Internal Services:** this area addresses issues of improvements to essential services that the city provides to residents, businesses, and visitors such as public safety, public works, parks and recreation, transportation, financial services, etc. The priority for this category is to enhance the accountability, accessibility, efficiency/effectiveness, and quality of city services.
- **City Services- Environmental:** mitigation of air, water and land environmental pollution is the main areas of concern under this category.
- **City Services- Infrastructure:** improvements to the city's major infrastructure include roads, streets, bridges sidewalks, water and sewage, public lighting, buildings, etc.
- **City Services- Communications:** the city communicates with the public through various channels, websites, social media, written and audio presentations, in-personal and virtual meetings. Citizens, businesses, and visitors have expressed their lack of notice and awareness of city activities and services. The priorities listed in this area are to increase the transparency, accountability and responsiveness of city agencies and departments to citizens. Actions included in this area include informing and educating the public about the city's programs, services, policies, and initiatives, to solicit feedback and input and to also build trust and confidence in city government.
- **City Services- Transit - Mobility:** the city operates a public transit bus system the Detroit Department of Transportation (DDOT), supports a light-rail People Mover system, parking facilities, city airport and support the Detroit- Wayne County Port Authority. The priorities under this area are to improve the mobility, safety and sustainability of the city's transit services.
- **Constituent Services:** providing information, assistance and referrals to residents and businesses on city services is paramount to meeting the needs of the community. Areas of concern under this category are fair/free and accurate elections, providing support and wrap-around services for those in need of assistance including an educational component.
- **Cultural Initiatives:** continuing support of the city's cultural institutions, both capital and operating funding.
- **Economic Development:** building strong communities through employment opportunities/ job creation, development of new markets and industries, and supporting community wealth building efforts. Priorities in this category include providing funding for retail studies, increase compliance- enforcement of the Community Benefits agreements, increase minimum wages and develop skill trades programs.
- **Employee Compensation and Benefits:** the FY 2023 Budget includes funding for 10,000 employees to provide city services. Priorities included in this category are to ensure that the city attracts, retains, motivates, and maintains a diverse and qualified workforce by providing fair and competitive compensation and benefits.
- **Health Initiatives:** addressing health disparities and improving access to health care are two of the priorities included in this category.

- **Housing Initiatives:** include addressing housing insecurity with programs that include access to affordable housing, homeownership support, retaining home ownership through home repair programs and homelessness prevention programs are priorities included in this category.
- **Neighborhood Development:** providing retail and commercial development in city neighborhoods; providing financial assistance and technical assistance to local entrepreneurs, small and minority owned businesses and conducting appropriate analysis and studies to further refine the needs of the community are some of priorities listed under this category.

## RESULTS

This report outlines the city achievements and challenges in implementing the City Council’s financial and budgetary priorities and polices for the FY 2023 Budget. In total, the FY 2023 Council Resolutions, per this report, 74% of the actions were either under consideration, in progress or completed. The remaining 26% are statuses that require additional follow-up (incomplete), discussions (no consideration given), or not applicable.

- Twenty-two (22) of the agencies indicated their resolutions were **Open, in progress**. The departments indicated that implementation of these resolutions was underway and may be awaiting additional actions, such as contract approvals, hiring process, etc.
- **Completed and Closed-** 44 respondents indicated that their resolutions were completed and closed; however, some included no additional information. Without supporting comments such as: the action taken, date of completion and other clarifying information it is difficult to determine the true disposition of the Council’s resolution. Some resolutions we know were implemented because it has city-wide impact, such as the Parental Leave benefit resolution. This benefit appears on the employees’ pay stub. However, additional information would be helpful to determine the impact of the program.
- Three (3) resolutions are **Under consideration** by their respective departments: 1. The Board of Zoning (BZA) has indicated that they are currently managing their caseload and don’t have a current need for more BZA panelists. 2. The Detroit Public Library has indicated that they are in discussion with Wayne State University for a structural assessment of the Monteith Branch Library to determine facility needs. The branch remains closed until a determination is made. 3. Human Resources considers the restoration of seniority for Detroit Council Central Staff employees as an action for City Council. The department can assist with information on impacted employees.
- The status of eleven (11) resolutions were noted as **No consideration given; no action planned** which indicates that these issues are not expected to be implemented in the future. Activities not being pursued:
  1. Airport: the re-opening of McNichols from Outer Drive-Conner intersection to Van Dyke. This is a long-standing request that has been opposed by several Administrations.
  2. Mayor’s Office: reinstate the 311 Call Center and transfer the responsibility to the Department of Neighborhoods. The department responded that they have operational the Improve Detroit app and citizens have access to the Dept of Neighborhoods.

3. Allocate \$3 million in the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds to the Make It Home Program. The Housing & Revitalization Department (HRD) indicated that they are still utilizing the initial ARPA funding.
  4. Establish a \$17 million Capital Improvement Fund for Detroit Homeowners. No comment given on why this will not be implemented.
  5. Allocate \$3 million from ARPA funds and private donations for a Guaranteed Income Pilot Project. No comments given as to why this resolution will not be considered nor implemented.
  6. Designate or hire additional staff in the Office of the Chief Financial Officer (OCFO)-Office of Development and Grants to work with City Council staff. No comment given by the department as to why this action will not be implemented.
  7. The Department of Water and Sewerage Department (DWSD) has indicated that they do not have jurisdiction to implement a Pervious Concrete and Asphalt Pilot Project for roads and pavements. LPD will follow-up with the Department of Public Works (DPW).
  8. DDOT is not considering acquiring a 3-D printer for replacement parts. They indicated they have not seen an advancement in the technology for replacement parts for coaches.
  9. Additional staff for the Auditor General was not considered. This issue was addressed in the FY 2024 Budget; however, the department may have additional requests.
  10. Providing direct relief payments to citizens of Detroit aged 65 years of age and older is not under consideration by the Administration. No comments given.
  11. Urging to use ARPA dollars to provide direct relief payments of \$1,400 to retirees who were negatively impacted by the COVID – 19 pandemic is not under consideration by the Administration. No comments given.
- Two (2) departments indicated that the resolution actions requested were **Not Applicable**. Police had indicated the issue of increase pay for the City Council Executive Protection Unit is a Labor Relations issue. The Building, Safety Engineering, and Environmental Department (BSEED) has noted that a Uniform Land Use Review procedure is not a BSEED process.
  - The status of eleven (11) resolutions was incomplete and require follow-up with the responsible agencies.

Of particular note, movement on the Housing Initiatives, Cultural Initiatives and Economic Development resolutions were two-thirds or so complete with additional actions taken on these issues in the FY 2024 Budget. Likewise, resolutions relating to city services are not advancing as well and may require additional follow-up or discussion.

The chart below shows the status of resolutions open or closed by department. The difference between the total number of resolutions and the number open or closed represent the remaining segment (24%) under consideration, not under consideration, not applicable or incomplete. This remaining segment requires additional follow-up and/or City Council discussion, if so desired.

**Conclusion:**

LPD appreciates the efforts of those participating in providing the status of Council resolutions. The comments submitted assist the Council and the Administration in maintaining accountability and transparency on issues of high importance to the community.

LPD reviewed the comments pertaining to the status reported and found that additional explanations and/or clarification was required. Additional questions were generated by LPD from our review.

- In some cases, we found the responses did not address the concerns- issues stated in the Council resolution.
- More accurate assessment of resolution status; some actions indicated as closed appears to be in progress.

- Resolutions were noted as closed and completed without any relevant details as to actions taken and dates completed.
- Pending items- those open and in progress need to identify the next steps in the process, anticipated completion dates and if there are any impediments to completing the projects.
- Resolutions in discussion or under consideration could use explanation on the issues of concerns.
- Resolutions where no consideration was given, and no future action is planned require at minimum an explanation as to why this resolution is not feasible for implementation.
- LPD will continue to follow-up with the respective agencies on the status of resolutions that are incomplete and lacking information.

Additional discussions may be needed to further identify the roles and responsibilities of city agencies and external organizations to advance the Council's priorities.

Open lines of communication between the Administration and Council on the issues the impact our community will overall benefit all members of the community by promoting transparency and accountability.

This report effort is off to a good start but there is room for improvement.

LPD has many follow-up questions related to the responses to this status inquiry. We have arranged the questions by agency and by order of the resolution. Only resolutions requiring additional follow-up are shown in this list. We request that the departments give their full attention to responding to our questions, so that we may move forward on actions that require more significant discussion.
