RE: RESOLUTION URGING THE MICHIGAN LEGISLATURE TO ALLOW

ANIMAL CONTROL OFFICERS TO MICROCHIP AND TO ADMINISTER

RABIES VACCINES

Council Member Fred Durhal III requested that the Legislative Policy Division (LPD) provide a resolution urging the Michigan legislature to allow Animal Control Officers to microchip and to administer rabies vaccines.

RESOLUTION URGING THE MICHIGAN LEGISLATURE TO ALLOW ANIMAL CONTROL OFFICERS TO MICROCHIP AND TO ADMINISTER RABIES VACCINES

- WHEREAS Detroit Animal Care & Control responds to over 20,000 calls and shelters roughly 8,000 dogs annually; and
- **WHEREAS** In many cases, Animal Control Officers discover that dog owners are not in compliance with state law and local ordinances requiring dogs to be registered and vaccinated for rabies when they respond to calls; and
- WHEREAS Currently, the Michigan Dog Law of 1919 requires that rabies vaccines must be administered and certified by an accredited veterinarian and that microchips must be administered by a veterinarian, animal control shelter, or animal protection shelter; and
- WHEREAS There are very few accredited veterinarians operating within the city of Detroit and it can take weeks to schedule an appointment for a rabies vaccine and/or microchipping; and
- WHEREAS Additionally, the cost of a veterinarian visit and transporting an animal to a veterinarian are barriers that discourage dog owners from complying with state and local law; and
- **WHEREAS** For cities like Detroit with a high volume of loose and stray dogs, it is imperative for the law to allow Animal Control Officers to be as efficient as possible with their time and resources; and
- WHEREAS Allowing Animal Control Officers to administer microchips and rabies vaccinations on-site in the field will increase public safety by significantly increasing the number of registered animals who are vaccinated for rabies; NOW, THEREFORE BE IT
- **RESOLVED** The Detroit City Council hereby strongly urges the Michigan legislature to amend the Michigan Dog Law of 1919 to allow Animal Control Officers to administer microchips and rabies vaccines to dogs when responding to calls in the field, **NOW BE IT FINALLY**
- **RESOLVED** That the Detroit City Clerk send copies of this resolution to Mayor Mike Duggan, the Detroit delegations of both the Michigan State House and Senate, in addition to Governor Gretchen Whitmer.
