2024 Information from the City of Detroit Department of Public Works

Use these guidelines to properly dispose of all waste to **prevent being ticketed** and **ensure items are picked up**.

Curbside Changes

NEW

Trash, recycling, bulk, and yard waste will be picked up **WEEKLY**



NEW

You can now place **household renovation materials** at the curb



ACCEPTABLE

- Wood and lumber (bundle and remove nails, screws and staples)
- Cabinets (remove doors)
- Carpet and padding (bundle and remove staples and nails)
- Toilets
- Paneling (bundle or place in contractor bags, remove nails and screws)
- Tile (in contractor bags)
- Drywall (in contractor bags)
- Each item, bag and bundle must weigh less than 50 lbs.



NOT ACCEPTED

- Concrete, brick, asphalt and shingles
- Tires and other auto parts
- Metal poles and pipes
- Tree trunks
- Hazardous waste including asbestos and lead, liquids and paint (Drop off these items at the Hazardous Waste Facility, 2000 E. Ferry)

The DOs and DON'Ts of Curbside Collection



DO

- Place items at the curb by 7 a.m. on collection day but no earlier than 6 p.m. the night before

TRASH

- Place bagged trash in your black trash container

RECYCLING

- Empty and rinse items and place them loose in your blue recycling container

YARD WASTE

- Place yard waste at least 6 feet away from containers. Residents may use a container labeled **YARD WASTE** on **BOTH SIDES**.



- Yard waste is collected from April 1 - December 20.
- **BAG:** Place grass clippings, leaves and twigs smaller than 2 inches in diameter in paper, biodegradable bags
- **BUNDLE:** Branches and twigs up to 4 feet long and 4 inches in diameter

BULK ITEMS

- Place up to 2 cubic yards of bulk and renovation materials at the curb (about the size of two stoves)
- Place items at the curb in separate piles, do not intermingle items
- Renovation materials should be in contractor bags or bundled, be under 4 feet in length and width, and weigh less than 50 lbs.
- Loose material (such as tile and drywall) must be bagged in black contractor bags
- Paneling should be broken down and bundled in pieces 2 feet x 4 feet or smaller
- Cut carpet into strips up to 4 feet wide, rolled and tied into bundles
- Appliances: Remove doors and drain refrigerants
- **REMOVE nails, screws and staples from materials**



DON'T

- **Do NOT** leave containers at the curb past 9 p.m. on collection day

TRASH

- **DO NOT** leave bags of trash at the curb
- **DO NOT** place more than one trash container at curbside on collection day. Residents using a second container without DPW approval will be subject to having the second container removed.

RECYCLING

- **DO NOT** bag recyclables

YARD WASTE

- **DO NOT** place yard waste in plastic bags or mix yard waste and bulk/renovation materials
- Disposal of yard waste larger than 4 inches in diameter is the resident's responsibility. Take yard waste to J. Fons Transfer Station, Southfield Yard or Davison Yard.

BULK ITEMS

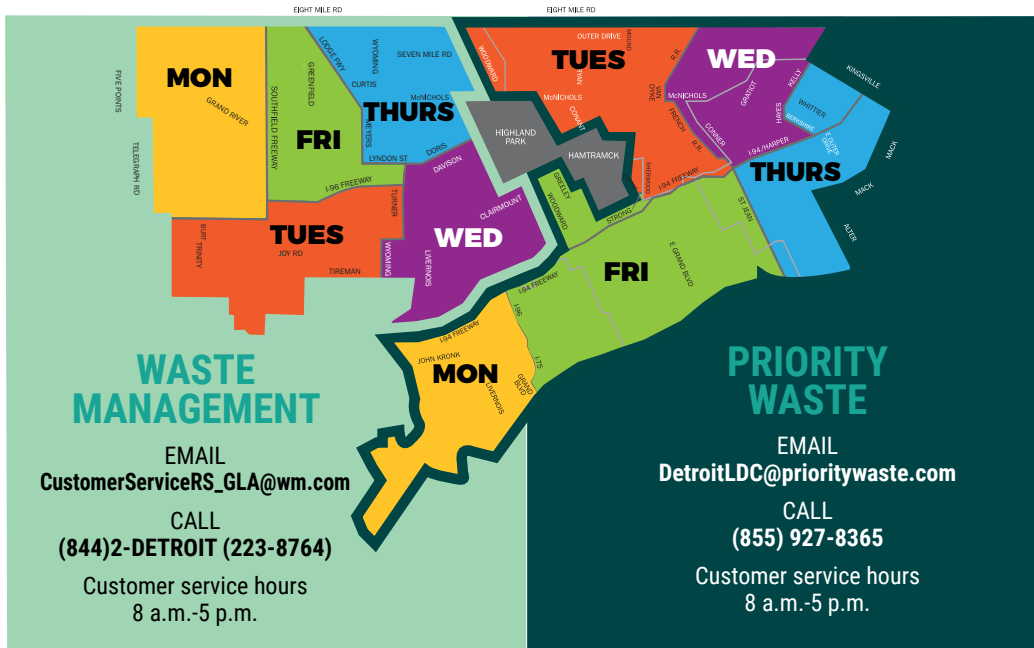
- **DO NOT** place bulk items at the curb that exceed 1000 pounds or 2 cubic yards.
- **DO NOT** place bulk items in front of vacant lots on your block; it will increase the likelihood of it not being collected on your scheduled collection days.
- **DO NOT** place household renovation materials longer than 4 feet in length and width, more than 50 pounds in weight, or loose at the curb.
- **DO NOT** place flammables, explosives, paint, batteries, medical waste, fuel, oil, tires, car parts, needles, radioactive materials, and chemicals. Hazardous waste may be dropped off at the Household Hazardous Waste Facility at 2000 E Ferry St.

COLLECTION DAY EXCEPTIONS

Yard Waste: Collection is from **April 1 - December 20**

Holidays: Collection is pushed back one day following New Year's Day, Martin Luther King Jr. Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Thanksgiving and Christmas.

For example, if a holiday is on a Monday, and your normal collection day is Friday, you will be serviced on Saturday.

KEEP DETROIT CLEAN



NEED A WEEKLY REMINDER?

END ILLEGAL DUMPING

Please properly dispose of ALL waste. It is prohibited to place items in front of vacant lots and vacant homes. Avoid a ticket by following the guidelines.

Use the **Improve Detroit** mobile app to report illegal dump sites.

Call **9-1-1** to report illegal dumping in progress.

Have Too Many Bulk Items or Renovation Materials?

Spread the items out over multiple collection weeks, and stay within the 2-cubic yard maximum each week.

DPW also offers affordable paid pick-up for bulk items or renovation materials. Call **313-876-0004** for a quote or more information.

Residents can also take bulk items and yard waste to a free drop-off location.

Note: There is a fee to dispose of construction materials at J. Fons Transfer Station.

Block Clubs

HOW TO GUIDE

What is a block club and why should you create one in your neighborhood

A block club is a neighborhood organization whose members come from the neighborhood and whose purpose is to solve problems of the members, spread information on helpful resources, and create community projects that benefit the area. Block clubs help strengthen the community, and those that participate become better neighbors and better citizens. They improve the health, safety, physical and economic standards of residents, and they develop a spirit of cooperation and social interaction among residents. Knowing your neighbors creates a sense of community.

Who is involved

Members are anyone in your neighborhood interested in coming together.

How to create a block club

Only a few dedicated people are needed to get your group started. You can recruit more neighbors by passing out flyers or making an announcements in the community, church, or newspapers.

Where and when to have your block club

Once you gather a few neighbors, decide where and when you'd like to have your meetings. Many groups ask surrounding churches or community organizations if they have space to use. It is common for block clubs to meet once a month for an hour or two.

Next steps

Make it official by contacting your district managers to acquire a block club application and register with the city of Detroit. This is important if your block club chooses to partner with the city to address city services or request street closures for a block club party. The city will also be able to connect your block club with quest speakers and resources and that can be presented at the meetings.

Having trouble where to start?

Your district managers are able to provide a helpful block club starter kit and other information and resources to get you on your feet running.
