

U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Community Development Block Grant – Disaster Recovery (CDBG-DR) Funding

What is CDBG-DR?

- In the event of a presidentially declared disaster, the federal government provides immediate <u>response</u> efforts through FEMA and other agencies. Response efforts include rescue, safety, shelter and other actions taken in the immediate aftermath of the disaster.
- In some instances, after the disaster response, Congress will then appropriate Community Development Block Grant – Disaster Recovery (CDBG-DR) funds to help communities with presidentially declared disasters <u>recover</u> from those disasters. Recovery is defined as restoring housing, infrastructure and economy to pre-disaster conditions.
- Those funds are then allocated by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Office of Disaster Recovery (ODR) and passed along to impacted States and Local Units of Government.

Why did the City of Detroit receive CDBG-DR?

- On February 8, 2024, FEMA announced that President Biden approved a Disaster Declaration for Michigan (*Eaton, Ingham, Iona, Kent, Livingston, Macomb, Monroe, Oakland and Wayne counties*) for Severe Storms, Tornados and Flooding that occurred between August 23-26 of 2023.
- As a result, Congress approved \$12B in CDBG-DR across 24 grantees, including the City of Detroit, for disasters that occurred in 2023 and 2024.
- The City of Detroit was awarded \$346,864,000 in CDBG-DR funds for the August 24-26, 2023, disaster.

CDBG-DR "Unmet Needs" and Award Determination

HUD determines the allocations for each CDBG-DR grantees using the following formula:

+ \$\$ needed for the community to address needs caused by the disaster

- Amount if FEMA Individual Assistance (IA) Awarded to Residents

Amount of FEMA Public Assistance (PA)
 Awarded to the City Directly as well as any
 matching from FEMA for infrastructure needs

- Amount of assistance provided by the Small Business Administration (Housing & Businesses)

= Total CDBG-DR \$\$ for "Unmet Needs"

Basic Guidelines of CDBG-DR

- CDBG-DR-funded activities and programs must respond to disasterrelated impacts that are not fully addressed by other funding sources
- CDBG National Objective
 - Low-to Moderate Income Households at or below 80% AMI
 - Slums & Blight (capped at 30%)
- CDBG Eligible Activities
 - Housing
 - Infrastructure
 - Economic Development
- "Tie Back" to the August 2023 Storm Events
- Duplication of Benefits

CDBG-DR Eligible Activities



Housing

- Elevating homes
- Rebuilding homes
- Homeowners & renters are eligible



Infrastructure

- Bioswales
- Combined sewer separation
- Flood protection infrastructure





Proposed Timeline

Deadline	Task
January 2025	Publication of the FR Notice for 2023 Grantees
January – February 2025	Identify Potential Projects, Conduct Unmet Needs Assessment, Prepare DRAFT Action Plan
March 2025	Community Engagement – 30 Day Comment Period
April 2025	Submit Action Plan to HUD
May-June	City Council Accept and Appropriate HUD Funding Grant Agreement Signed – 6-year Period of Performance Begins
