INVESTING IN THE COMMUNITY

Every spring (March - April), City Council goes through the process of negotiating and approving the City's budget for the next fiscal year (July 1 - June 30). This past spring, I championed \$2.664m for this fiscal year:

- Housing & Revitalization Department: \$1m to expand shelter services and operations
- General Services Department: \$900,000 for Phase II improvements at Fort Street Bridge Park
- Fire Department: \$600,000 to launch a Nurse Navigation Program for non-emergency health services and preventative care
- Ombudsman Office: \$164,000 to hire two new community engagement staff

SPECIAL PROJECTS


Last year, I secured \$1.25m for streetscape improvements along West Warren and \$1.45m for a slow streets project in 48217, both of which are moving forward this fall and into 2025. While proud of these strides, I know we have many more investments we need to make to develop our neighborhoods.

POLICY UPDATES

Earlier this year, Council approved my first piece of environmental justice legislation: the Fugitive Dust Ordinance! This ordinance requires certain businesses to submit a plan outlining their efforts to mitigate fugitive dust, and enables BSEED to enforce such plans and impose penalties for those in violation. Council also approved my Healthcare Facilities Ordinance on October 1, which creates personal bubble zones around individuals and a buffer zone around clinics providing healthcare services to protect all staff and patients, and ensure public safety. • Language Access - This will formally make language access City law versus an executive order.
