WHAT TO DO WHEN



REPORTING MEDICAL EMERGENCY

Remain calm and provide the 9-1-1 operator:

- ✓ The address of the emergency
- ✓ The phone number you are calling from
- ✓ What is the emergency

The dispatcher will then ask:

- If you are with the patient
- How many are hurt or sick
- If the patient is breathing or coughing
- How old the patient is
- If the patient is awake or unconscious

REPORTING FIRE INCIDENTS

Please provide the dispatcher with:

- ✓ The address of the fire
- ✓ The phone number you are calling from
- ✓ Your name

The dispatcher will then ask:

- What happened
- What type of building or structure is involved.
- If you are at the location

IS IT AN EMERGENCY?

WHEN TO CALL 9-1-1

When dealing with sickness or medical crises, patients, parents, and other caregivers often turn to hospital emergency rooms. However, not all health care problems require the expensive, intensive care offered at the closest ER.

In many instances, urgent care clinics are a more efficient and effective source of care. Sometimes a primary care appointment may be your best option.



GO TO THE ER/ CALL 9-1-1

- Trouble breathing
- Chest pains
- Fainted
- Uncontrolled bleeding
- Sudden numbness or weakness
- Severe pain
- Serious injury



GO TO URGENT CARE

- Could not reach your doctor
- Need medical care today, but feel safe to wait a few hours
- Received instructions from your doctor to go to an urgent care



CALL YOUR DOCTOR

- A cold
- A simple backache
- A sore throat
- An earache
- Or when you need medical care but feel safe to wait a day or two

DON'T WAIT UNTIL ITS TOO LATE!!

When you or a loved one begin to show signs of ill health, make an appointment with your doctor immediately. An early visit with a doctor can avoid an emergency room visit before it happens!

INSTALL

Place smoke alarms on every level of your home, inside bedrooms and outside sleeping areas



USE

Use flashlights during power outages, not candles



TEST

Test smoke alarms monthly. Replace batteries at least once a year.

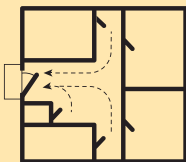


DON'T FORGET

Do not leave burning candles unattended

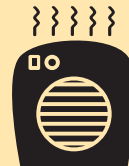
PLAN

Have a family fire escape plan and practice the plan twice a year



TURN OFF

Turn off space heaters when you leave the room and don't leave them unattended



GET OUT

If there is a fire in your home, get out, dial 9-1-1, and do not go back inside



SMOKE OUTSIDE

Only use smoking materials outside

OUT OF REACH

Keep lighters and all portable sources of fire or sparks safely out of children's reach



KEEP AWAY

Keep flammable items away from anything that can get hot, such as space heaters
